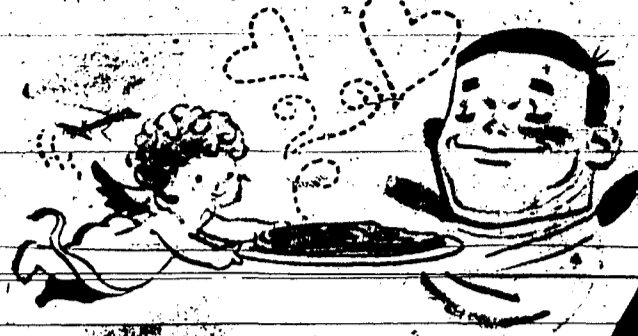

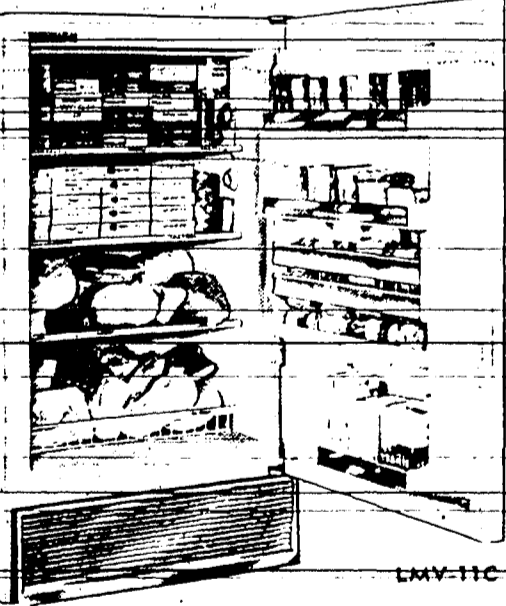

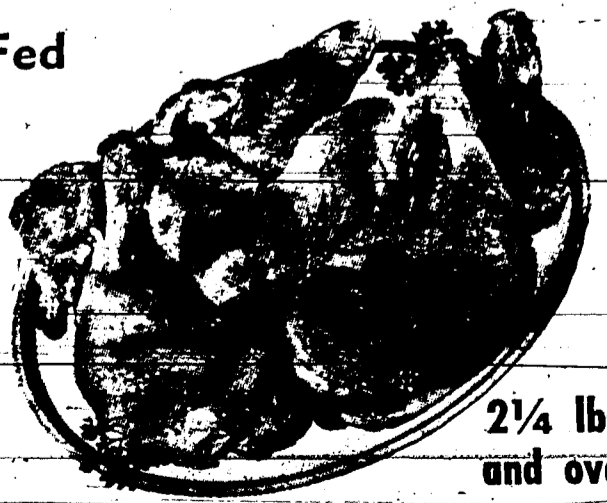

1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 8-ounce can button mushrooms
1 can water, include the water from the mushrooms in this
1 cup salted cashew nuts
1 pound butter
cup rice, uncooked

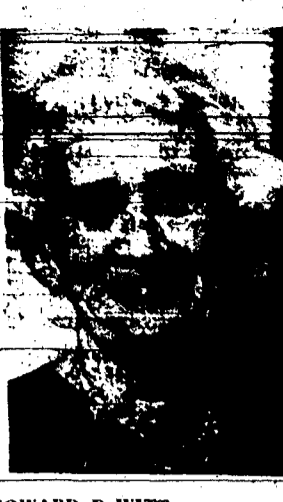

Legislature Is One of Strangest

By RICHARD CHARNOCK
BOISE, Feb. 10 (AP)—In the history of the Idaho legislature, this session of the legislature is one of the strangest in its history.

From all outward appearances, lawmakers seem to be moving at a snail's pace. In fact, the legislature has been in session for only a few days and only a very few bills have been introduced.

Personal bills are conspicuous by their absence. And while a few major pieces of legislation have been introduced, none at this writing has come to a vote in either house.

Instead, the senate has busied itself from time to time with criticism of press coverage while in the house one representative devoted 25 minutes of his time to a debate on a liquor bill that was dead on arrival.

Leaders in both parties in the house and senate have remarked more than once in conversation about the direction the legislature may be headed and some quite frankly are concerned. This is the sixth week of the session. It had advance billing as the week when the log-jam would break, when lawmakers would come to grips with the big problems confronting them.

The house revenue and taxation committee expected to have its major tax proposals—both the three per cent sales and use tax and the Farm Bureau alternative on income taxes—in the hopper by the "forepart of the week."

For more than a week, the joint finance appropriations committee had been expected almost daily to arrive at a decision on how much state aid to recommend for the public schools.

And, the house education committee, which already had introduced a bill spelling out a new formula for distributing the state aid, was expected on Monday to resolve conflicts by seeking amendment of the bill.

Well, Sir, Monday came and went. But it was just another day, another page on the calendar.

The revenue and taxation committee reported it had begun work on the "tax relief" features to accompany the sales tax bill. But the "forepart of the week" the bills were supposed to be introduced had acquired a Saturday at the earliest label on it.

Reports from the finance appropriations committee indicated no decision yet had been reached on school aid.

And, the house education committee, still grappling with the formula, was permitted to join the list of committees which may introduce legislation right up to the last day of the session.

Now, all this might give you the impression that your legislators are not working. And, that is not exactly correct. Behind the scenes in committee, a lot of work has been and is being done.

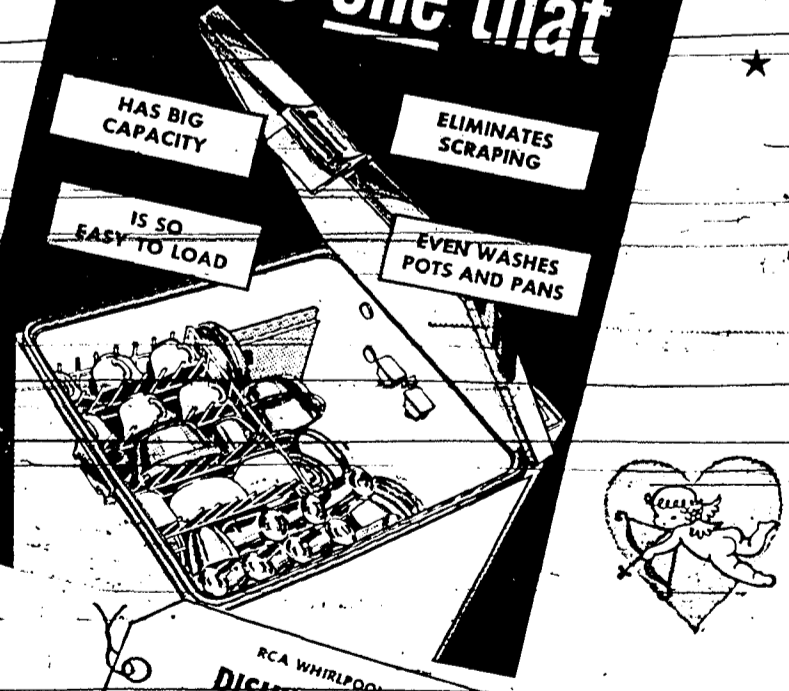

But in Britain bystanders have started chasing robbers and fugitives with an enthusiasm that has raised the problems reported in the following dispatch.

LONDON, Feb. 10 (UPI)—A 12-year-old girl flung a broken bottle under the tires of the getaway car of armed bank robbers.

Three truckers raced through crowded Piccadilly to capture a robbery suspect and cart him off to the police station in their truck.

A yacht designer smashed his new automobile against the stolen Mercedes of an escaping prisoner.

All over Britain the public, aroused by an unprecedented outbreak of underworld violence, was heeding the advice of a high Scotland Yard official to "have a go" when they saw a crime being committed.

Assistant Commissioner Randolph Bacon qualified his New Year's Day suggestion that the public tackle criminals, however. He did not mean it to apply to everyone in every case.

Alarmed city organizations — with millions of unarmed citizens shot and beaten in vain battles — have in recent days qualified it still further.

But all the public seems to remember of what Bacon said is the war cry "Have-a-go!" and a variety of people have been taking long chances against experienced lawbreakers.

The Sunday Citizen in a front page editorial charged Bacon was

"encouraging unarmed and untrained citizens to tackle gun-

"The odds against the citizen getting away alive are high," the newspaper said, "against escaping uninjured are higher, against making a dent in the crime statistics graph astronomical."

Nevertheless, in the first 10 days of January there were several outstanding examples of

public health against criminals — he kept moving the car back-

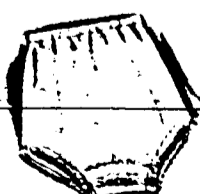

Wives Airlifted Out of Saigon

MANILA, Feb. 10 (AP)—A group of American army wives airlifted out of South Viet Nam on orders from President Johnson arrived here yesterday en route to the United States. Some said they wanted to go back to Saigon.
 "I said if we ever had to leave Saigon, they would have to carry me to the plane kicking and screaming," Mrs. Phyllis Knox of Richmond, Va., told newsmen.
 "Well, it wasn't quite that bad—but almost, I didn't want to go."
 Mrs. Knox's husband, Paul, is an air force captain serving as an intelligence adviser to the South Vietnamese army. She spent 18 months in Saigon, teaching English to Vietnamese children.
 "I loved every minute of it," Mrs. Knox had her two children—Arnon, 15, and Troy, 8 with her. Troy was sporting a GI crew cut and a military fatigue uniform.
 "There were times of insecurity in Saigon, Mrs. Knox admitted. "When your house is bombed, as ours was last year, you begin to wonder," she said. "But all in all, I can say that I was never really frightened, even during the coup in November last year."
 "Maybe we're a little bit too dumb to be frightened. Maybe we think that they're not going to hurt us. And it's very exciting. I wouldn't have missed it for anything, really."
 Mrs. Knox said when she left Saigon early Tuesday morning, all of the Vietnamese children she taught came to the airport yelling "Mrs. Knox! Mrs. Knox!" "I cried when I saw them," she said.
 Mrs. Harry Sommer, 49, of Ft. Pierre, S. D., said she resigned herself to the fact that she would have to leave her husband, a lieutenant colonel in the army.
 "We're the wives of army officers and this happens to us," Mrs. Sommer said. "If this helps in the situation, we're to do it."
 Mrs. Frank Schogren of Lead, S. D., said she received notice that she would have to leave only Monday night.
 Mrs. William H. Trpton of Maryland sounded a similar sentiment. She said she was "surprised and shocked" when told she and her son Bill, 18, were under orders to go back home.
 "We left so fast we don't know what's up," she said.
 Mrs. James Davis of Orlando, Fla., said: "I was expecting the order, but I didn't expect it so soon." She was accompanied by her two daughters—Katherine, 15, and Pamela, 11.
 "The situation among the American families is calm and quiet," Mrs. Davis said. "There was no confusion and the departure was very orderly."
 Mrs. W. L. Stierzik of Lansing, Mich., said she had lived in Saigon for two years with her three children—Deborah, 10; Steven, 7, and Sherry, 4.
 Asked whether she hoped to go back to Saigon, Mrs. Stierzik replied: "It would be nice... what-ever the government says."

He said he planned to spend the rest of the week in London "if nothing else happens" then return to New York.

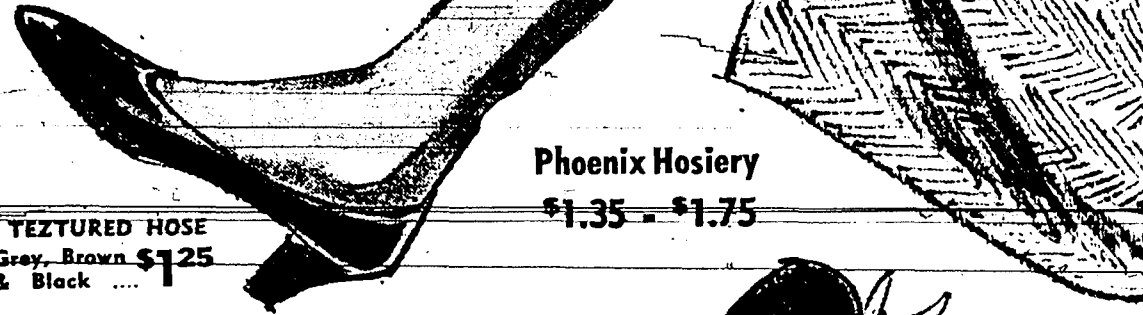

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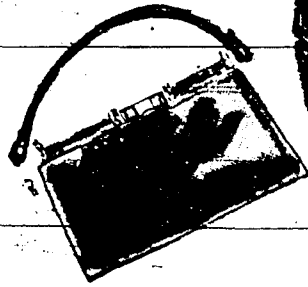

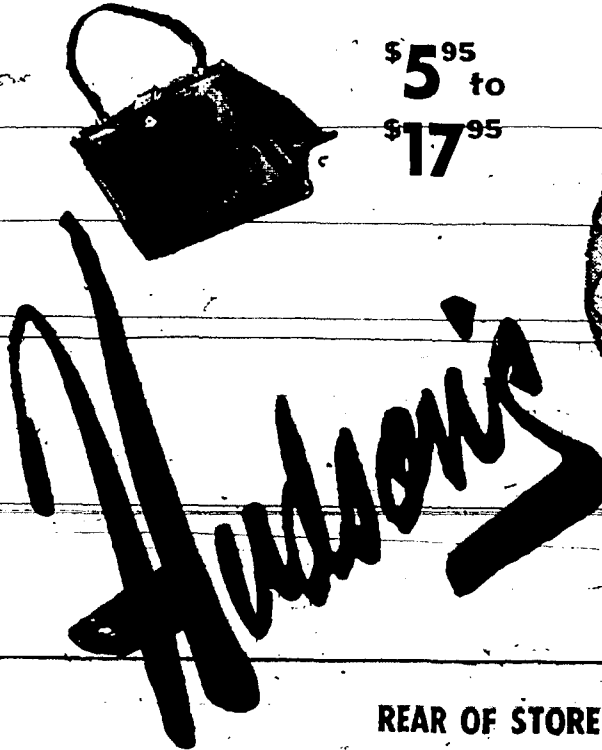

Former Resident Of Kimberly Dies

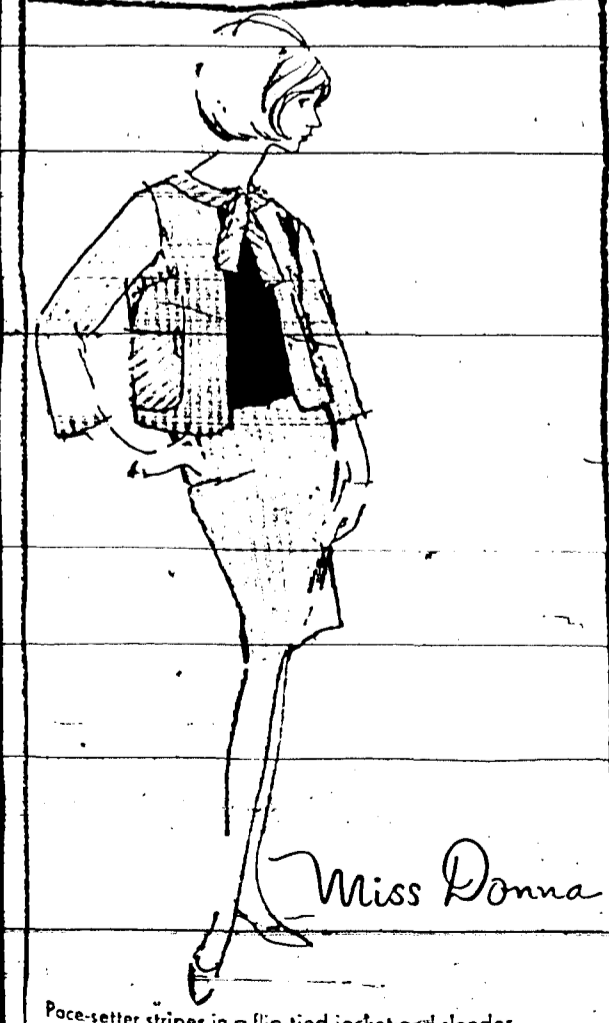

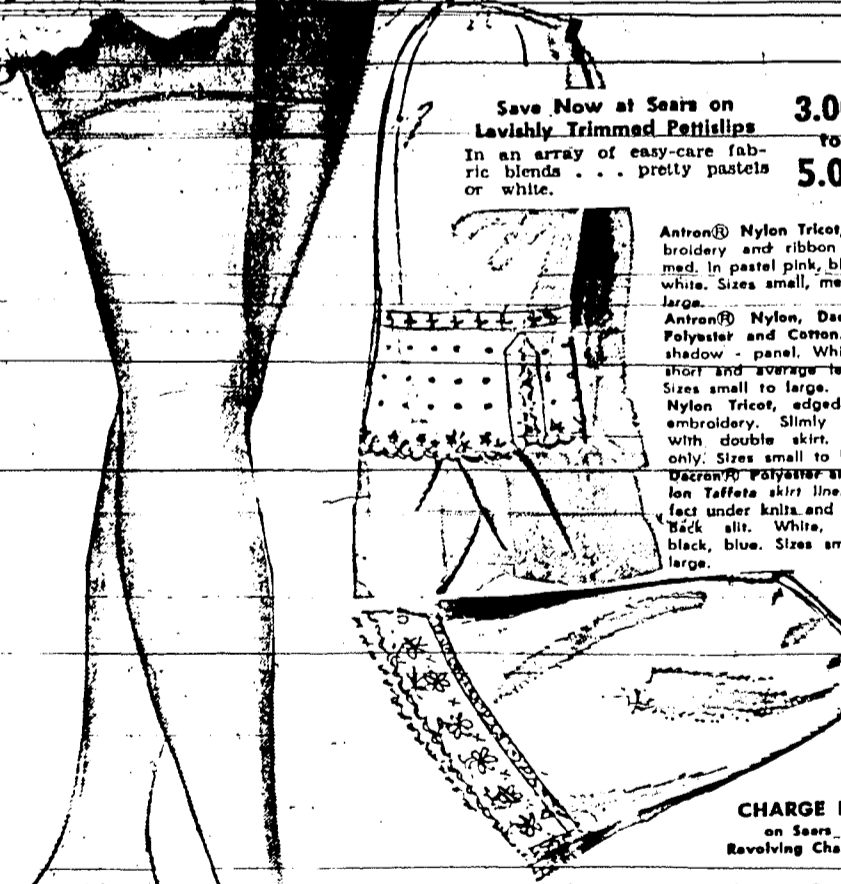

Romania Is Pushing Aside Red Control, Seeks West Aid

BUCHAREST, Romania, Feb. 10 (AP)—Romania is firmly pushing aside the strong hand of Russian controls on her industry and society, and reaching for help and support in the West.

Next to Yugoslavia, Romania has taken the most independent stride of any of the East European states. The attitude of her communist party leaders reflects a general loosening of the Soviet grip through the Red belt in the wake of de-Stalinization, de-Khrushchevization, and the clash with Red China.

The country doesn't intend to try to break out of the Soviet orbit, not now, even though delegation after delegation has

headed westward in recent months building up political, cultural and especially business contacts.

The United States has lowered some of its own trade barriers with the immediate result that American companies have agreed to build two new factories in Romania, the first in years.

Many things have been done to emphasize Romanian nationalism and reduce Russian influences.

The younger generation seems all for it.

"It is the new renaissance," said one young intellectual at a dinner party.

Older people are more cau-

tious, although they, too, know of relatively bold steps toward what many here speak of as "de-Russification."

The Romanians have had to switch political affiliation many times through the centuries that it is a wonder they preserve any nationality at all.

They are a Latin country, especially in language, and almost equally in appearance and manner of speech and gesture. They had horrible experiences in both world wars. They were allied with Germany in 1914, but promptly overrun by the Germans, Austrians and Hungarians.

The country was virtually occupied by the Germans before World War II started. It soon was shared out like war booty, without a shot, Russia, with Adolf Hitler's agreement, occupied Besarabia as far south as the mouth of the Danube. Hungary took Transylvania.

2 Units Fight Over Northwest River Status

LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 10 (AP)—A modern David and Goliath battle of sorts has been taking place for five years between a group of conservationists and a department of the federal government.

The fight involves some 60 miles of high mountain river and scenic canyon country, located in the Wallowa-Whitman national forest of northeast Oregon.

On one side is Save the Minam, Inc., a small, vocal conservation group. The U. S. forest service is on the other.

The Minam organization is composed primarily of members from the counties of Wallowa, Union, Umatilla and Baker.

Howard Esk, La Grande, president of Save the Minam, says U. S. supreme court Justice Wil-

liam O. Douglas supports local efforts to preserve the turbulent Minam river and canyon as a primitive area.

That is what the fight is about; and at stake is one of Oregon's last wild rivers.

The forest service had proposed to build a road along a section of the lower Minam river. Conservationists said this would open up the remainder of the scenic stream to hordes of tourists and thus destroy the region's native beauty.

The river drops out of the majestic Eagle Cap wilderness area, 220,000 acres of year-around snow-capped peaks, lakes, waterfalls, timber, big game animals and breathless beauty.

The Minam rushes, crystal clear, down an escarpment of boulders, white sand shoals,

through narrow canyon walls, high mountain meadows, and roaring rapids before it merges with the sluggish Wallowa river at the tiny town of Minam on the Union-Wallowa county line, some 35 airline miles northeast of La Grande.

From the little crossroads community the two rivers flow a few miles together, then pour into the Grande Ronde river for the final journey into the Snake river.

Four years ago at a forest service hearing into its road proposal, testimony was overwhelmingly in favor of keeping the Minam country as it is. Two years ago another hearing was held and the issue became almost dormant.

Then the forest service coun-tered with a new proposal: It would put about 12,000 acres of a wild river as set by the geological survey. It did not meet these requirements: it is a pollution stream, it has a vast drainage area, 50 public bridges closer than 10 miles, and no roads in the area.

The Wild Rivers group is expected to recommend to the department of agriculture that 80,000 acres of the Minam river drainage be reclassified as a wilderness area. It will recommend, too, that no roads be constructed at any point along the primitive river, one of the few such streams in the Pacific Northwest, not stocked with hatchery trout.

Then a third force entered the picture. An Oregon Wild Rivers committee was formed at Eugene with backing of the Oregon Guides association. Its purpose was, and is, preservation of the state's few remaining primitive streams.

This new committee asked the Save the Minam group to assist in a survey to see if the Minam met the rigid requirements of

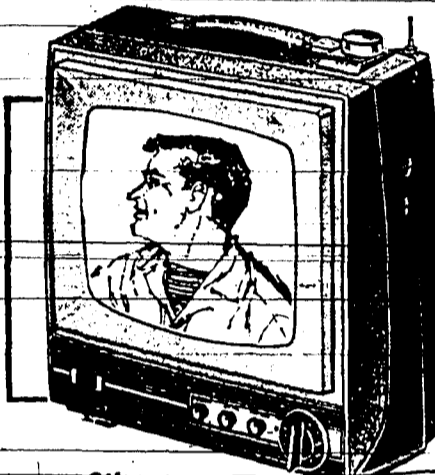

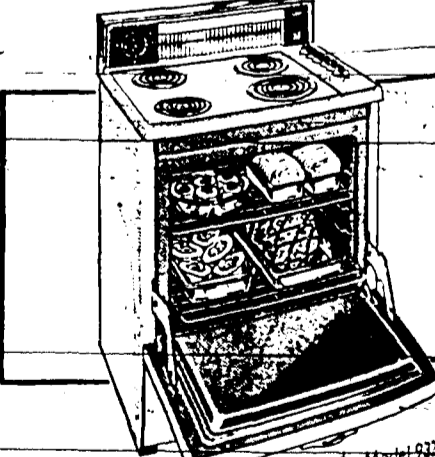

Communist China's Position in World Affairs Is Explained

Communist China exploded its atomic device last October. Observers in the West predicted the Peking regime would make the most of the world's membership in the atomic club. Peking failed to back up verbal support with anything but some hard-pressed rebels in Asia and African nations suggest a foreign policy rather than reckless.

weakness and the constant need to maintain its forces in readiness in case of attack against its own shores. Yet this huge country of 700 million persons, which without doubt aspires to the predominant voice in Asia, weighs heavily on the thoughts of leaders around its rim from Japan to Afghanistan. How is it that Communist China can exercise such leverage on its neighbors and yet be so weak by western standards of 20th-century technology and development? Is Red China really a menace, or is it a paper dragon? First, what are Red China's sources of strength? Then what are its sources of weakness? Red China's greatest strength without a doubt, is its vast population, a resource that allows it

to maintain the largest standing army in the world—2.5 million men—and in addition a militia that covers every village in a country larger than the United States. But the reality of the military balance of power is not quite so favorable to the Chinese. This fact is being brought out by such modern military practices as the conduct of reconnaissance flights over the territory of a country not equipped with the advanced electronic detection and guidance systems needed to prevent over-flights. For instance, the U.S. air force has been conducting such flights over the China mainland for years with planes like the high-altitude U-2, sometimes manned with Chinese Nationalist pilots, "Spy-in-the-Sky" satellites will make this even more com-

monplace in the future. China also complains about intrusions into its territorial waters without being able to take effective action to stop armed vessels from violating its self-proclaimed 12-mile limit. Today's advanced aircraft make it possible to imagine a high-speed pinpoint air strike against the plant or plants manufacturing materials for China's nuclear development program. Some military men think that such a strike carried out without publicity and having the effect of seriously setting back China's nuclear timetable, would lead the Peking leaders to adopt a less bellicose propaganda line and would show the timorous leaders of Southeast Asia that Communist China is not such a fire-breathing monster after all. Peking has been careful not to

over-extend its capabilities in any way that would open it to receiving a bloody nose. It has on various occasions threatened to send its ground forces into Laos or Cambodia to "defend" those weak countries against foreign imperialists. American military sources believe that China has at least 10 divisions of troops within one day's motor march of Southeast Asia. But Peking prudently has kept these troops in Southern Yunnan province rather than sending them across China's borders. Their psychological effect is greater than their military capability in an age of nuclear weapons. An important factor in China's caution may be the serious effect on China's arms arsenal, especially its air force, by the reduction of Soviet supplies as a re-

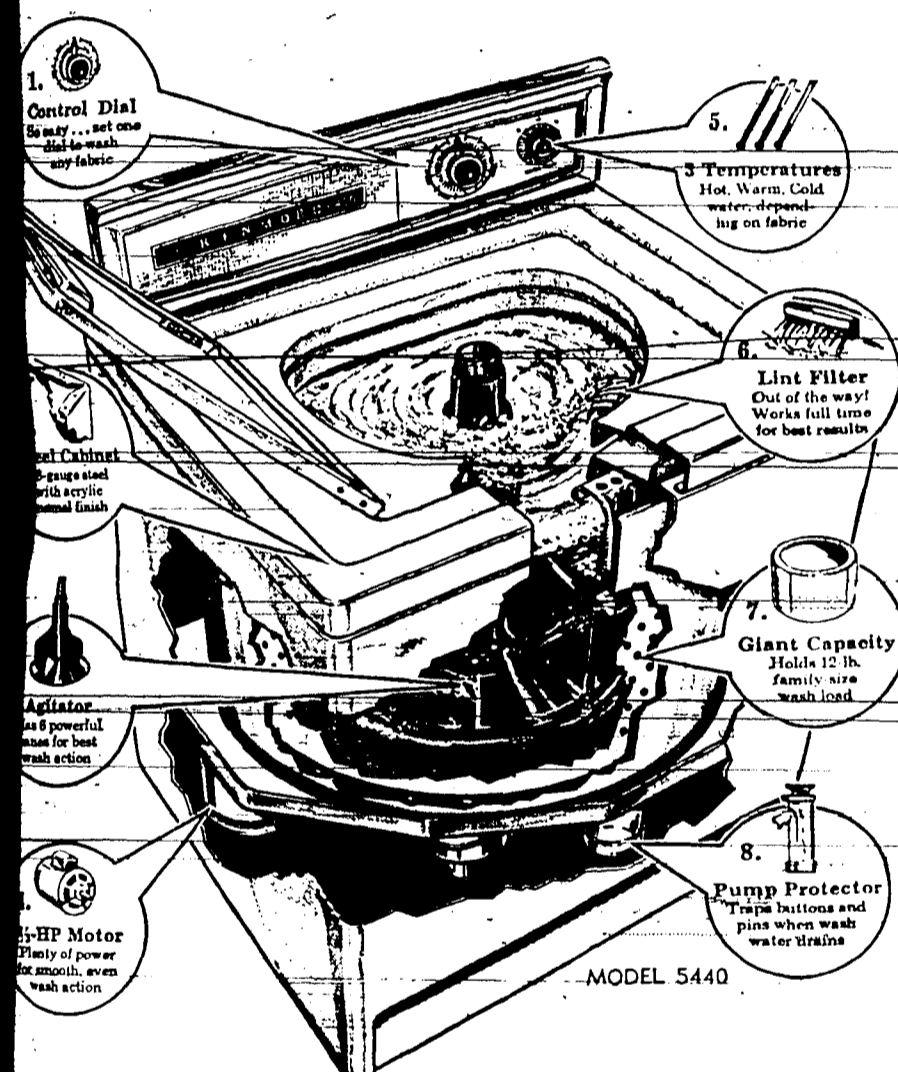
sult of the Sino-Soviet dispute after 1960. In the one instance where Peking did send ground troops into a neighboring country—the Indian border invasion of October and November, 1962—air cover was not required. Furthermore, Peking acted only after it had made careful logistical studies, adequate preparations and intelligence reports of the inadequacy of India's preparations. It quickly withdrew the troops after achieving the shock effect it desired. It is probable that the main motive behind the Chinese action in India was political. By showing how poorly prepared the Indians were, after a lengthy propaganda campaign to portray India as the party in the wrong over the border dispute, China added much to its political

strength without risking very much militarily. Such an opportunity may never recur. China's neighbors if they respect her, also see the need now for readying themselves against the whirlwind. Mao Tse-tung, leader of the Chinese communists, had frequently said that all potential power grows out of the barrel of a gun. Mao's dictum applies to international politics as well as to internal revolutions. But the secret of success, in Mao's book, is never to place oneself in the position of having to use the gun. By threatening belligerent actions, the Chinese achieve yet another goal besides inspiring respect in their neighbors. They entangle the United States, described by Peking as the arch-enemy, in all sorts of defensive

alliances. They then proceed to stir up trouble by cultivating neutralist sentiments and by forcing the United States to show its hand and live up to its commitments. Communist China sometimes appears as a sleeping dragon. It calls the United States a paper tiger because there have been so many instances in which the United States has declined a commitment of its forces in support of one of its policy goals. Nebraska's Legislature Gets New Attention

LIVOLIN, Neb., Feb. 10—The nation's only one-house legislature is receiving more attention than a debutante at a coming-out party these days, and Nebraskans couldn't be happier.

The U.S. supreme court's historic "one-man one-vote" ruling has prompted the interest.

Not a few students of government in not a few states are asking: If both houses of a two-branch legislature must be apportioned on a population-only basis, why bother with two houses?

Or, as Nebraska Gov. Frank Morrison is given to asking: "Why run the milk through the separator twice?"

Nebraska's unicameral legislature has been in operation for 28 years, and by now stands thoroughly accepted. Not one serious move to revert to the bicameral has developed in recent years, and detractors are hard to find in the Cornhusker state.

A survey of 68 present and former legislators in 1961 turned up only four who favored returning to the two-house system.

Whether Nebraska's system will serve as prototype for state legislatures generally remains to be seen, but it's receiving much scrutiny.

"We haven't gotten so much attention since 1937 when the unicameral-bicameral issue was the national high school debate subject," said Hugo Srb, a former two-house senator who has served as clerk of the one-house legislature since its inception.

"The eyes of the nation are turning to Nebraska," says Morrison. "We have the biggest chance for advertisement the

state has ever had."

Former Gov. Dennis J. Roberts of Rhode Island, chairman of a constitutional convention in his state, spent three days inspecting the Unicameral Nebraskans use the word as a proper noun—and interviewing its leaders, and went away determined to urge the system for his state.

What visitors are finding in the marble-clad legislative chamber in Nebraska's showpiece statehouse is a 49-member law-making body, currently in biennial session and wrestling with the many of the same knotty problems, notably spending and taxes, that are occupying bicameral legislatures elsewhere.

The 49 senators are elected on nonpartisan ballots without party labels. They receive a salary of \$2,400 a year; during their terms of office.

Regular sessions are held each two years, special sessions when needed—nine of them in the last 28 years.

The lieutenant governor presides over the legislature. Senators designate one of their group as speaker, but the post is largely honorary. Hired employees include the clerk and attorneys to draft and review bills.

The legislature has 15 standing committees, the principal function of which is to give publicity to bills and decide whether to kill them or send them to the floor for further action. Assignments to standing committees are made by a 13-member committee on committees, whose chairman is elected by the legislature as a whole and whose other members are selected in regional caucuses.

Senators meet as a legislature each 10 o'clock, Monday through Friday, and devote their afternoons to committee hearings.

Until this year, the unicameral had 49 members. A reapportionment bill passed two years ago increased the number to 49 and placed in effect a new constitutional amendment increasing terms of office from two to four years.

Originally, the legislature was apportioned on a population basis, but in 1902 voters approved a constitutional amendment giving 20 to 30 per cent weight to area, and the legislature employed the area factor in redistricting in 1963. The U.S. district court has since objected to the area amendment, and the present legislature is under court order to reapportion once again.

The Unicameral had its birth in 1894 when its chief proponent, the late U.S. Sen. George W. Norris, wore out two 300,000 automobile tires touring the state to drum up support for the necessary constitutional amendment. Although widely acclaimed as the father of REA—Rural Electrification Administration—and TVA—Tennessee Valley authority—Norris considered the Unicameral his top achievement.

Voters approved the constitutional change in 1924, and the 1935 legislature wrote the laws necessary to put the single house into operation in 1937.

Norris was particularly insistent that the Unicameral be nonpartisan.

"Our state ought to be conducted on business principles. The issues which divide the great political parties in our country should in no way interfere with the business operations of our state.

"If the divorcing of our judges and our school officials from partisan politics is a good thing, if their official duties have no connection with partisan politics, why not extend the same theory to members of the legislature, whose official duties nowhere, nor in any degree, connect them with partisan politics."

"I've talked with governors and others in partisan legislature states and they tell me many legislators will oppose a bill they believe in simply to embarrass the governor for political reasons."
