

## Blaze Destroys Richfield Grade School Building

RICHFIELD, March 2—Richfield students were out of school today, but there was little to celebrate. The 15-year-old grade school building was destroyed by fire which broke out about 8 a.m. Tuesday. Estimated loss is in excess of \$50,000. School board members were conferring this morning over where to set up temporary classes for the 170 grade school pupils. Richfield volunteer firemen, assisted by Shoshone volunteers, kept the fire confined to the grade school, even though the building is only 42 feet from the high school and gymnasium. However, classes also were dismissed today in the high school.

## Narcotics Gear Found In School

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—Tools used for the injection of morphine and three morphine syringes were found in an Idaho school yesterday, Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard confirmed today. Shepard wouldn't name the school where the equipment was found, nor whether it was taken from a student, teacher or locker because of a "continuing investigation." It was the first time in years that any Idaho school has been connected with narcotics, Shepard said. Shepard said agents uncovered the capsules, a hypodermic syringe and a rubber band used as an arm tourniquet yesterday afternoon. Since the goods were found on the floor of the senate chamber, it was adjourned at 7 p.m. last night. (NARCOTICS, Page 2, Col. 1)

## Water Bill Is Amended After Debate

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—Legislation creating an Idaho water resources agency was amended on Monday after two hours of debate yesterday to give the state legislature control over its operations. A series of amendments designed to meet objections that the original bill would give too much power to the agency also includes one specifying that projects revert to local control when they are paid for. The agency's purpose is to plan for all Idaho water not being used to prevent its diversion out of state. Gov. Robert E. Smylie said before the agency was approved in principle by voters last November that it would protect Idaho water from the "covetous eyes of the West Southwest." The key amendment approved today requires the agency's plan to submit its recommendations to the legislature for final approval. Opponents said this would cripple the agency. Proponents said it would prevent creation of an agency with unrestricted power.

## Man Charged In Shooting Enters Plea

BURLEY, March 2—William Morgan Owens, 52, charged with shooting two young boys more than two years ago, pleaded innocent to the charge Monday morning when he appeared before District Judge Lloyd Webb. Judge Webb named Herman Bedke, Burley, as Owens' court-appointed attorney. Owens is in Cassia county jail awaiting trial, which Judge Webb scheduled for March 17. The two Oakley boys, who were wounded in a shooting spree Nov. 30, 1962, which terrorized the community for several hours until Owens was apprehended, have both recovered and are back in school. They are Larry Sager, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Sager, and Gilbert Hunter, son of Mrs. Maxine Hunter. Owens was returned to Burley last week from State hospital ward, Blackfoot, after spending two years in the institution.

## China Has Fair Exhibit In Germany

LEIPZIG, East Germany, March 2 (AP)—The Red Chinese have returned to the Leipzig industrial fair after a three-year absence with an exhibit showing what they can do without foreign help. The motto seems to be "our own production" or "our own technicians." The visitor enters the exhibition hall through a colorfully decorated archway and faces a giant tapestry portrait of Mao Tse-tung. A slogan beneath says that the Chinese people, led by Mao, worked toward building socialism on the basis of their "own initiative." The Red Chinese are the only exhibitors who cite their military efforts in propaganda posters.

## Education Bill OK'd by House Group

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—The house education and labor committee today approved President Johnson's 13-billion dollar school-aid bill, designed to help both public and parochial schools. Overriding nearly solid Republican opposition, the committee Democrats sent the bill toward a house vote, probably late this month, by a vote of 23-8. Two Republicans joined the 21 committee Democrats in voting for the bill. Most of the money is to be spent on schools serving children of low-income families, but 90 per cent of the nation's school districts would share in the one billion dollars authorized by the bill for that purpose.

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—The state treasurer yesterday redeemed \$5 million dollars worth of tax anticipation notes. Treasurer Marjorie Ruth Moon said \$12,750,000 tax anticipation notes are still outstanding.

## Political Sparring Might Sidetrack Vote on Sales Tax

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—A political tug-of-war that could sidetrack the sales tax bill for several days developed today in the Idaho legislature. House Republicans in morning caucus agreed not to rush through a bill to standardize assessments in the state's 44 counties. The bill is considered the key to whether the sales tax will pass the senate. One senator, who asked not to be identified, said the house decision probably would not stop senate debate on the sales tax scheduled today. But he predicted the bill would be defeated. "I won't say that will be the end of the sales tax," he said. "It will probably be reconsidered but we won't take further action until the house passes the uniform assessment bill and the referendum measure."

## Road Board Raps Law Aide Control

BOISE, March 2 (AP)—The Idaho board of highway directors and the department of highways today issued a statement to the state affairs committee of the senate concerning its opposition to a senate bill which would place the supervision of all legal counsel under the jurisdiction of the attorney general. The proposal would give the state attorney general authority to appoint, supervise and discharge all attorneys representing the state and its various agencies, officials and departments.

## Debris Probed

MONTREAL, March 2 (AP)—A three-pronged official inquiry was pressed today into the full cause of the shattering explosion that Monday pulverized a suburban apartment building, killing at least 26 persons. Volunteer brigades, working by flashlight through the night, early this morning, found two bodies in the charred rubble of brick and twisted timber that had been home in suburban Ville Lasalle for more than 100 persons. One was a woman, the other an infant still in its cradle. Most of the victims of the breakfast-hour tragedy were women and children.

## Fourth Big Air Strike Wrecks Red Facilities

SAIGON, March 2 (UPI)—More than 160 U. S. air force and South Vietnamese planes bombed military targets in North Viet Nam today in the heaviest attack of the war. They inflicted massive damage in raids denounced by Moscow as a barbarous provocation. The Americans, using B57 jets against targets in the north for the first time, blew up an ammunition dump at Xom Bang. It was the first raid under Washington's new policy of striking to knock infiltration bases in the north. Three previous air strikes against North Viet Nam were acts of retribution. Xom Bang is 10 miles north of the border and 15 miles from Laos. The South Vietnamese, using Skyraider fighter-bombers struck a munition base at Quang Khe on the coast 50 miles north of the 17th parallel border. They knocked out shore installations and destroyed three to five North Vietnamese naval patrol vessels. A spokesman said between 70 and 80 per cent of the targets were knocked out in both strike zones. The stepping up of the war came as from 800 to 1,000 U. S. marines prepared to land Wednesday in South Viet Nam in the defense against Viet Cong terrorism. The planes today operated from Da Nang, targets of communist attacks in the past. A U. S. air force spokesman said one American pilot and one Vietnamese pilot crashed into the sea and were rescued by amphibious planes. Another American was rescued on land but he gave no details. He would not say how many were missing because "the North Vietnamese may not know."

## Space Rocket Explodes on Launch Pad

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla., March 2 (AP)—A history-making Saturn space rocket exploded on its launch pad today as it was about to blast off in an attempt to hurl a model of the Surveyor space craft toward a make-believe moon. The big rocket had barely struggled inches off the concrete-and-steel pad when it erupted into a massive fireball which sent flames and a huge cloud of black smoke hundreds of feet into the air. Flaming fragments and blazing propellant from the eight million-dollar rocket sprayed several hundred yards in all directions. The approximately 80 members of the firing crew were protected inside a reinforced blockhouse several hundred feet from the pad. The flight control center said there were no injuries. The launching was to have been an important rehearsal for gently landing a "live" Surveyor spacecraft on the moon.

## Man in Custody 'Walks Out' Of Cassia Sheriff's Office

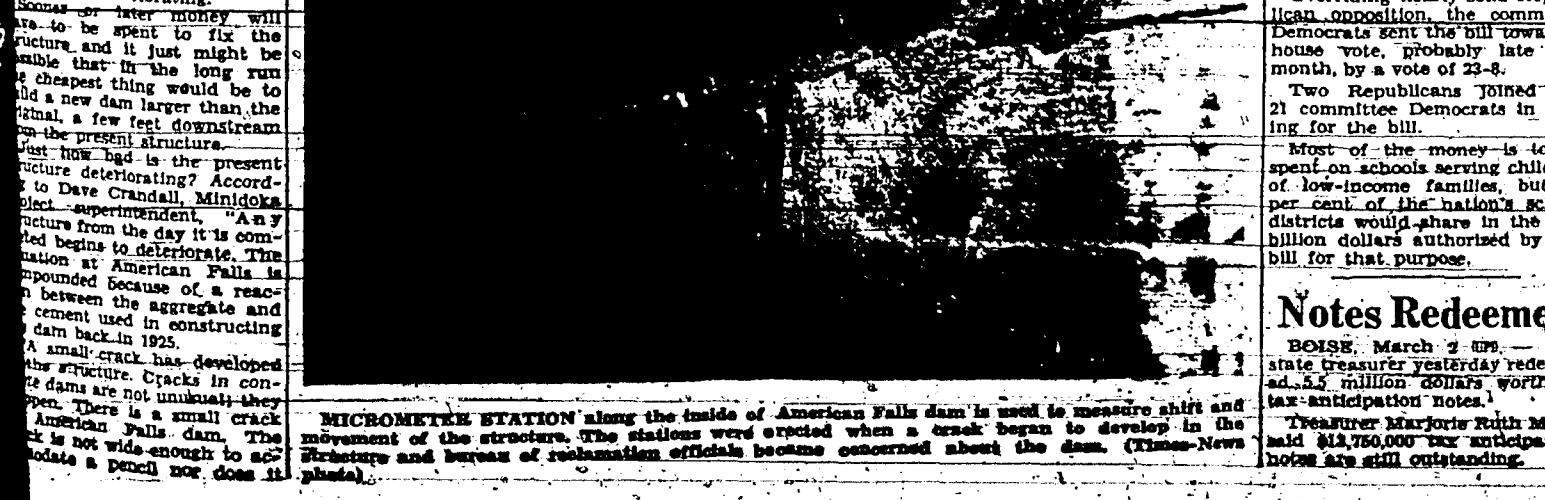
BURLEY, March 2—Cassia county officers are looking today for a 20-year-old man charged with first degree burglary, who walked out of the sheriff's office Monday morning after he had been brought down from the county jail. Faustino Ybarra, 20, Burley, who was scheduled to appear later in the day in probate court, was being brought into the sheriff's office by Deputy Sheriff Glenn Loveland. When Sheriff Ray Mitchell was called to the telephone, Ybarra apparently took advantage of the momentary diversion and walked out the door. An office worker was busy typing and said she looked up once, and he was there. A moment later, when Sheriff Mitchell had ended his telephone conversation, he asked "Where did the guy go?" The typist said she then looked up again, and saw that Ybarra was gone. The sheriff's office, in reporting his disappearance Monday evening, described Ybarra as five feet, 10 inches tall; weight, 152 pounds; medium complexion, dark brown hair, brown eyes, and wearing a white sweater and tan trousers. Ybarra was arrested earlier this winter for allegedly breaking into a potato cellar located south of Burley. He had been brought into the sheriff's office Monday morning to go over papers concerning the incident before appearing in probate court. The Cassia county sheriff's office notified other Magic Valley and southern Idaho law enforcement agencies after Ybarra left the building. Roadblocks were not set up, but officers were alerted to pick up Ybarra if he is located. The Cassia county jail is on the third floor of the courthouse, but the sheriff's office is on the first floor. Ybarra was unarmed when he left the building.

## Secret 'Unity' Meet Continues

MOSCOW, March 2 (AP)—The Kremlin today dropped a curtain of secrecy over the second round of international communist "unity" talks. Visiting representatives from 18 communist parties sympathetic to the Moscow line in the Sino-Soviet feud were believed meeting at an undisclosed location in the Russian capital. In addition, bilateral meetings were said to be taking place.

## American Falls Dam Deterioration Studied

For the past three years the Bureau of Reclamation has been studying the economic and engineering feasibility of enlarging American Falls dam to provide storage water which otherwise would spill unused over Miller dam. A higher dam at American Falls would increase the storage capacity to well over two million feet of water. The present structure is 94 feet high, 5,227 feet long and is 58 feet wide at the base and eight feet wide at the top of the dam. The enlargement is more than 100 feet higher and the thing which gives the comment increased emphasis is the fact that the dam is deteriorating. Some \$10 million more will have to be spent to fix the structure, and it just might be possible that in the long run the cheapest thing would be to build a new dam larger than the present one. ### Treatment for Stuttering Eyed

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa., March 2 (UPI)—The speech and hearing clinic at the Pennsylvania university has undertaken a study to evaluate one technique for treating stuttering.

HONG KONG, March 2—Diplomats here who should know better are buying a "gold brick" from the Chinese who peddle propaganda. It is the significance in the discrepancy between Red China and the North Vietnamese regime on the conduct of the war in the south.

TWO OBJECTIVES—Reportedly, the issue is whether to press for immediate unification of north and south or to seek a coalition government. Hanoi's pledge to unification "peacefully" means Hanoi's represented as having unification now; the Viet Cong as seeking an end to the war by negotiation. Red China, notably in a recent speech by Foreign Minister Chen Yi, has thrown in with the Viet Cong by its declarations that the war can be settled only at the conference table.

IT'S CHINA'S SHOW—From all this, the conclusion has been drawn that a genuinely neutral south Viet Nam is now a possibility because that is what Peking wants. Nothing of the sort is indicated, of course. All these developments, reveal that what has been known all along—that Red China is running the show—and that Hanoi is a devoted communist or fellow-traveling regime in Southeast Asia are merely instruments of Peking's policy.

RAISING FALSE HOPES—Peking is not siding with the Viet Cong against Hanoi. It is siding with itself with its own ambitions. If Hanoi shows gradual takeover through a pious neutralism and the Viet Cong flumps for immediate unification through military force, Peking would support Hanoi.

EXPLOITATION OF MRS. KENNEDY  
It is natural that the American people should have a continued interest in Mrs. John F. Kennedy. Her intelligence, her charm, her children and her courage in life-shattering tragedy called forth sympathy quite beyond the curiosity evoked by all in high places. This feeling for her runs as deeply as the respect won by her husband.

MATTER OF TIME  
A growing clamor for some sort of negotiated end to fighting in Viet Nam finds the United States officially declaring there can be no discussions until communism's aggression ends. At the same time, it appears there's no common ground for talking, but the situation can and probably will change quickly.

# Ocean Explorers Have Discovered Rich Fishing Grounds in Arabian Sea

ANTON, N. Y. — A U.S. expedition has discovered rich fishing grounds in the Arabian sea that may help solve food shortages for the half-billion people who live on its shores.

The U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's expedition began in 1962 and will finish its work in 1965. Some of its preliminary findings are being made public by the U.N. educational, scientific and cultural organization (UNESCO) here.

Scientists from the United States and other nations used water-ski, 100 miles of piano wire, and underwater explosives to chart the floor of the Indian ocean and study the currents and marine life.

Their research findings brought back discoveries including support for a theory that the subcontinent of India "drifted" about 200 miles to its present position in prehistoric times.

They mapped new underwater mountains and traced mountain ranges for thousands of miles under the surface. They checked the relationship between the state of the sea and the weather. But the most important finding for the immediate benefit of the African and Asian nations on the Indian-ocean's rim was the discovery of the new fishing areas.

The Arabian sea is bounded by Somalia, Saudi Arabia, East West Pakistan and India, particularly the latter two, with a combined population of about 490 million.

All of course, have been fishing their offshore waters for centuries.

But none has used the modern fishing techniques tried by the U.S. research ship Anton Brunn.

The former Presidential yacht Williamsburg in the Indian ocean and its twin arms, the Arabian sea and the Bay of Bengal.

Dr. Edward Chin, Boston-born marine biologist at the Woods Hole (Mass.) oceanographic institution, recently described the results.

"In one haul alone Muscat and Oman in the Arabian sea, he said, three tons of fish were caught in 45 minutes, using a 40-foot net.

The Anton Brunn used bottom-trawling and the long lines fishing practiced by the Japanese, in which miles of line and hooks are reeled out.

"There is no such fishing gear in Somalia and the other countries in this fishing area," Chin said. "They can't take advantage of these techniques at the present time."

Chin said there are many fishing grounds as rich as the Arabian sea throughout the world, but many are in polar regions "where they benefit only the seals and polar bears."

If the Arabian sea grounds are developed, however, the market for the fish in nearby nations is limitless.

The Bay of Bengal, to the east of the Indian subcontinent, also was explored by the international research fleet, but its potential was not found to be as great.

Prof. Bruce Heezen of Columbia university's Lamont geological laboratory used the soundings taken by the expedition's

Depth charges were reeled out on 100 miles of piano wire by the British ships Queen and Discovery. The charges were exploded to enable scientists to measure the thickness of the Earth's crust.

Other ships were operated by Australia, France, West Germany, India, Indonesia, Japan, Pakistan, Portugal, South Africa, Thailand and the Soviet Union.

Eleven other nations extended shore facilities or furnished scientists.

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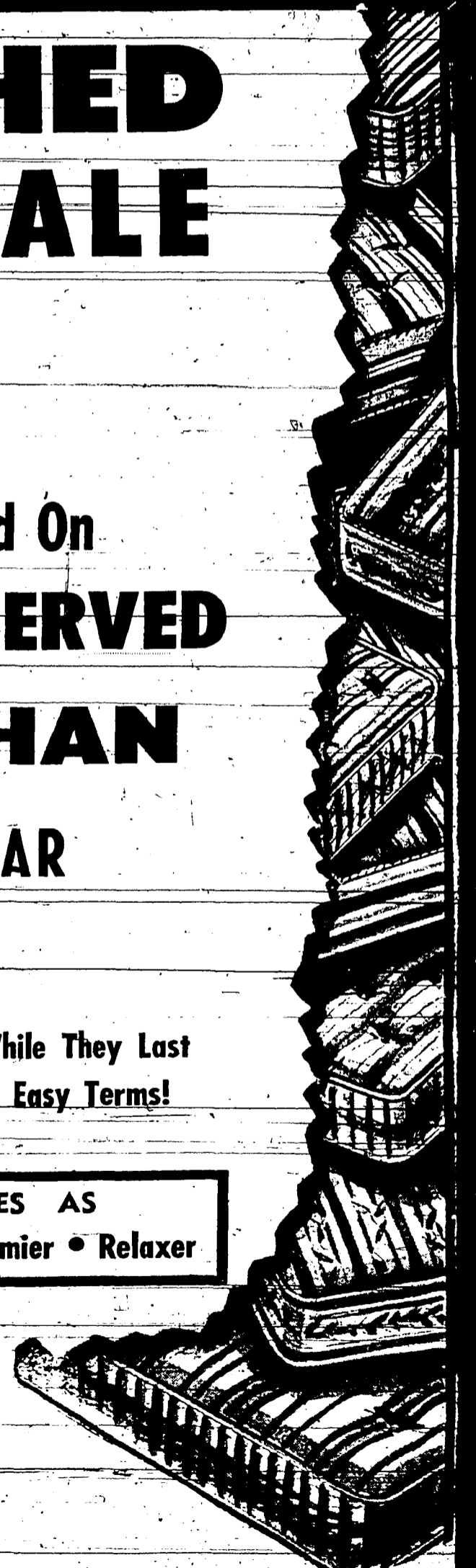

# South Africa's Racial Situation Is Threatening to Shatter World Peace

JOHANNESBURG, March 2 (AP)—Five years ago, soon after the Sharpeville shootings, a South African cabinet minister, in a moment of soul-searching candor, called his country "the polecat of the world."

When he spoke, South Africa was in poor shape. Money was pouring out of the country. Many young South Africans, and some not so young, were quietly packing their bags and leaving for Britain, America, Australia and other parts of the world. In a climate of uncertainty, industry was faltering. And the non-white majority, while doubtfully accepting white hegemony, had suddenly become an awesome militant menace.

Today many things have changed. The South Africa of 1965 is a very different place from the South Africa of 1960.

Economically the country has never had it so good. Money is freely available, and industry and commerce are booming as never before. Immigration has reached an all-time high and emigration an all-time low. On the surface, at any rate, the non-whites have seldom been less rebellious.

But one thing is the same. South Africa is still the polecat of the world. International disapproval of her racial policies has continued and mounted with the rise of the Afro-Asian group. Never before has South Africa had so many enemies abroad and so few friends.

Her enemies are vocal in world councils. The situation in South Africa "threatens more than ever before to shatter peace and plunge the continent of Africa into turmoil and bloodshed," Pakistani Foreign Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto recently told the United Nations. He referred to "a reign of terror against the brave freedom fighters" and the imprisonment of "thousands of opponents of apartheid."

Statements such as this—and they are common these days—serve only to unite the 3.2 million white South Africans in the firm belief that they are faced by a hostile, unscrupulous outside world.

If there is any danger of a holocaust, they say, it springs from the possibility of outside intervention by hostile non-white states.

Certainly the internal security position in South Africa has seldom been more stable. Although it was not always so, the security police have learned a great deal in the last five years. Leaders of groups aimed at the violent overthrow of the white South African regime have been rounded up, tried, and jailed.

Others have escaped and are now carrying on their campaign from outside South Africa. A few have gone underground in South Africa, but generally speaking the underground is a movement without leaders.

There are probably 2,500 South Africans of all races in prison today for what South Africa's critics would call "opposition to apartheid." But every one of them has been charged and found guilty of criminal offenses. None of them were accused of "opposition to apartheid." There is no such offense in South Africa.

The present Nationalist party government came to power in 1948 and has increased its majority at every subsequent election. The party draws the vast majority of its support from the Afrikaner, the white descendants of early Dutch, French and German settlers.

The official opposition, the United party, commands about 45 per cent of the electorate but it is a dwindling proportion. It is the wartime government party in South Africa and its tragedy is that it has never effectively come to terms with the new realities of postwar Africa.

There was a time when the United party was "liberal" and the Nationalist party "conservative," but today the distinctions are blurred.

The so-called "bantustan" policy of the Nationalist government, for example, is giving Africans limited but eventually substantial self-government in their homelands.

This policy, for all its limitations, is a genuine attempt to come to terms with emerging Africa. But in parliament the United party has attacked the bantustan policy as a threat to white supremacy.

The real dividing line in South African politics lies to the left of the United party. Both the two major parties, which command about 95 per cent of the total electorate, are determined not to share political power with the non-whites who outnumber them four to one.

On the extreme left political life disappears underground, to the secret wells of communism and African nationalism.

The strength of African nationalism in South Africa is difficult to gauge. In the early 1950s it was a powerful force. In the early 1960s it was a force to be reckoned with. It is a force that perhaps 60 per cent of detribalized urban Africans support. The main underground African organizations—the African National congress and the Pan-Africanist congress.

In November 1963 African confounded the apartheid critics by turning out in their hundreds of thousands to vote for the black Transkei parliament. Even in Johannesburg thousands voted despite boycott calls. The elections placed a bloc of liberal candidates in parliament, by the elimination of chiefs issued a parliamentary majority for the pro-apartheid Africans.

The wrong comment could create a mild panic, and in view of the situation which happened last year in Los Angeles one can appreciate the position.

"The situation gives new meaning to increased upstream storage.

Last Friday the Times-News inspected the crack. It starts near the spill gates and runs eastward for several hundred feet. The crack is not visible from the outside of the dam.

When the dam was constructed in 1929, a small tunnel was constructed down the center of the structure, running full length of the dam. The tunnel resembles the old Roman catacombs.

Running water comes from "weep holes" constructed in the dam, which run down to bedrock.

The crack is visible in the tunnel along the downstream side of the dam. At different locations there are mineralization buildups on the cement. They are almost chalk white and salty to the taste.

"This mineralization is common in many large structures," said Crandall.

The surface deterioration on the downstream face of the dam is another story. Here the reaction between the alkali and the aggregate is more evident. The hard part of the situation is determining how much would be normal wear and tear and how much is the result of the reaction.

In a few places the scaling is excessive and there are open "rock pockets" on the surface.

Sooner or later this has to be fixed.

Another compounding feature is the highway which runs across the top of the dam. This is a narrow roadway and receives considerable traffic.

The top of the dam is only eight feet wide and the road hangs on pillars which fasten to the downstream face of the dam. In recent years, some of the pillars have had to be reinforced.

It is not known if increased vibration from the highway traffic prompted the reinforcement, or if the reaction caused the needed repairs, Crandall said.

"Undoubtedly each contributed," he added.

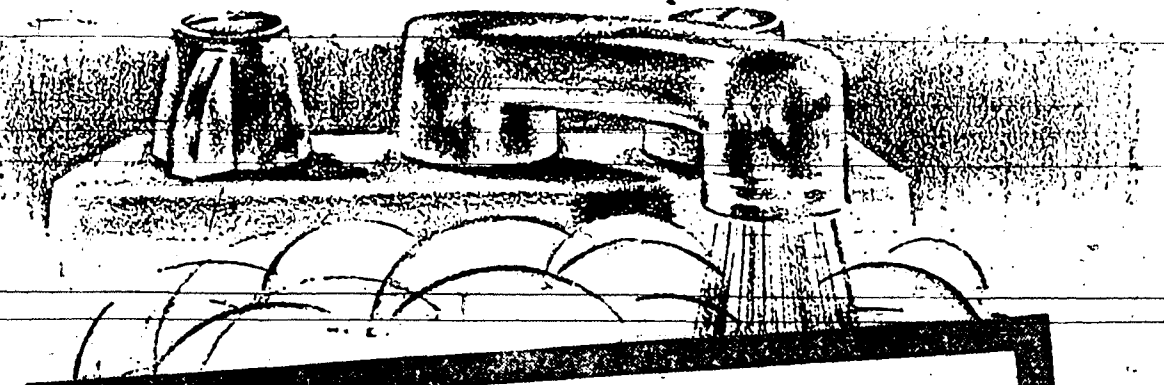

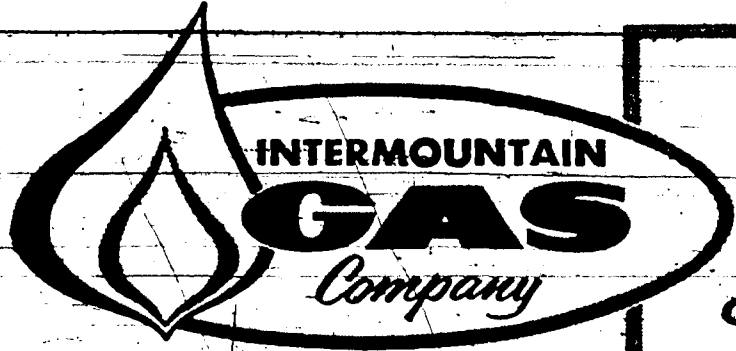

## Aussie Swim Star Gets 10-Year Suspension for Defying Order

HOBART, Tasmania, March 1 (AP)—Dawn Fraser, the world's fastest woman swimmer and star of three Olympics, drew a 10-year suspension Monday from the Amateur Swimming union of Australia. The ban, if enforced, will mean the end of the amazing amateur career of the powerful, 149-pound Melbourne mermaid, who was the first to crack the 60-second barrier in the 100-meter free style for women and who went on to set every women's record in the sprints. The ASU, ruling body of Australian swimming, said Miss Fraser was set down for defying an order not to match in the opening day ceremonies at Olympic games last October.

However, unofficial reports were that the penalty was the result of a long-standing breach between the champion swimmer, a rugged individualist in her training habits, and the Australian authorities.

Miss Fraser, 27, called "Grandma" by her much younger swimming companions, openly boasted of being a party girl who disdained normal training procedures.

"I am the best beer drinker in Australia," she once said.

While most swimmers lead a monastic kind of life, which includes getting up at daybreak and swimming for hours, Miss Fraser said she was essentially lazy and preferred to sleep late.

"This stuff is for the birds," she once said of modern training procedures. "I think one of the reasons I have lasted as long as I have is that I have not let the sport change my life—I let myself go once in a while."

Dawn let herself go often. She gorged herself on steaks and ice cream, sometimes went without any sleep and continued to smash records.

Her independence provoked Australian authorities, friends said, but as long as she was winning gold medals for Australia they were disinclined to take disciplinary action.

As it is, the latest ban is certain to draw strong protests throughout Australia.

The Amateur Swimming Union said it had given strict instructions at Tokyo that competitors who were to see action in the first three days of the games should avoid the exhausting opening ceremonies.

Miss Fraser and three teammates—Marlene Dayman, 15; Gill Duncan, 17; and Lida McGill, 18—were among those who defied the orders.

Misses Dayman and Duncan were suspended for three years each, Miss McGill for four.

No action was taken immediately and Miss Fraser went on to win her 10th gold medal in the Olympics. She has broken close to 50 world records.

She currently holds the world records in the 100-meter, 50.9 seconds; 110 yards, 59.5; 200 meters, 2:11.6, and 220 yards, 2:11.6.

She was the youngest in a family of eight children. Her father, an outstanding soccer player before immigrating from Scotland, died four years ago and her mother was killed March 8, 1964, in an automobile accident that left Miss Fraser with a chipped vertebrae.

After the Tokyo Olympics, Miss Fraser said she expected to compete in the 1968 games at Mexico City.

## Snead Wins Second Straight Seniors

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., March 2 (AP)—Sam Snead, still one of the toughest of the competitors when the money is on the line, stroked his way to an easy second straight victory Monday in the Teacher trophy tournament for senior golfers. The 52-year-old slammer knocked his tee shots out of bounds at the 18th and took a two-stroke penalty, but he couldn't have cared less, for the \$3,500 first-prize had been in his pocket from the start of the final round.

While Snead was shooting a one-under par 71 over the 6,735-yard Fort Lauderdale Country club course for a 72-hole total of 278, his closest pursuers were fading already.

Joe Lopez, sr., of Miami moved in from sixth place with a 67 for 282 to finish four strokes behind Snead and take down second money of \$2,750.

"I could never be content to play below my standards," the 6-foot, 9 inch former-Louisiana State University star told a press conference called by the St. Louis Hawks. "In my heart, I feel this is the correct time for me to step aside."

The owner of the Hawks Ben Kerner, broke into tears. "The balding Pettit had been turning up with a succession of ailments which could be traced to age. He was sidelined earlier this year because of a back injury. He recently as placed on the disabled list because of an aching right leg.

Although he missed 22 of his team's 69 games, the sharpshooting Pettit nevertheless scored 1,087 points.

In his 11 years in pro basketball, he with the Hawks, he scored 20,841 points. No other player has passed the 20,000 mark.

Bob's best performance always has been under pressure," Kerner said before his emotions interrupted his speech. "I don't think his best year as the year we won the title 1957-58. It was in 1962 when the team had a bad year that he played magnificently in a futile cause."

Kerner then broke down and the remainder of his laudatory statement was read by MIKE Aubuchon, the Hawk's legal counsel.
