

Appalachia Bill Clears Congress, Awaits Signature

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—The administration's top-priority Appalachia aid bill has cleared Congress and is ready for President Johnson's signature. The bill passed the House last night by a vote of 237 to 165 after 16 attempts by Republicans to amend it were defeated by top-heavy counts and a GOP substitute was rejected 323 to 100. The Senate passed the bill last month. The President was expected to lose no time after approving the bill, one of the major items in his "Great Society" legislative program and the first to be passed.

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—Intermountain region congressmen followed a party-line vote as the House passed 237-165 the administration's Appalachia bill yesterday. Voting for were 232 Democrats and 25 Republicans. Against were 58 Democrats and 189 Republicans. Idaho's Compton White, R., voted for and George Hansen, R., voted against.

Gasline Explodes in Louisiana Residential Area, 17 Killed

NATCHITOCHE, La., March 4 (AP)—A natural gas pipeline exploded in a residential area near here early today. Seventeen persons, including nine children, were killed. Authorities said two or three other children were unaccounted for. At least nine persons were taken to a hospital, but their injuries were not believed serious. A deputy sheriff said the dead and injured were residents of the neighborhood, just across Louisiana highway 1 from the country club.

Legislator Slows Senate Works Over Water Agency Bill

BOISE, March 4 (UPI)—An Eastern Idaho legislator started a slowdown in the senate today and vowed he will continue it until summer unless a water resources agency bill is withdrawn. The action by Sen. Wayne Tibbitts, D., Jefferson, ensured the 38th session will go well beyond the 60-day constitutional limit. Today was the 60th day. Tibbitts said he still is dissatisfied with a bill that would create a water resources board charged with the responsibility of developing state water projects despite the fact it had been amended to ensure legislative control.

License Fee Hiked, Period Is Extended

BOISE, March 4—A house bill which increases the fee for Idaho drivers' licenses also extends the period between renewals. The bill, which has been printed, is a transportation proposal, but was put through the states affairs committee for purposes of introduction. It was referred to the transportation and defense committee. And even though this proposal won't bring in any more money annually than the current law provides, it will, if approved, bring in enough initially to finance the cost of equipment for putting on drivers' licenses, according to Rep. Jack Claiborn, Sr., Twin Falls, and Rep. J. Vard Chabburn, R., Cassia, both members of the state affairs committee.

Constitutional Convention Plan Okayed

BOISE, March 4—House members today approved 69-8 a proposal to call a special convention to make Idaho's Constitution "as up to date as tomorrow morning" and rekindle interest in government. The measure goes into the senate where a two-thirds approval of the total membership of that body, too, will be needed to put the proposed call before the electorate for ratification in the next general election.

Students Storm U.S. Embassy in Moscow

MOSCOW, March 4 (UPI)—A mob of 2,000 students denouncing President Johnson as a "murderer" broke through massed lines of unarmed police and soldiers today and attacked the U.S. embassy. They were driven back in hand-to-hand fighting which raged for hours. It was the most violent anti-American demonstration witnessed in Moscow in more than a decade. As the battle wore on it became clear the fury of the mob was directed as much against police and soldiers as it was against the United States.

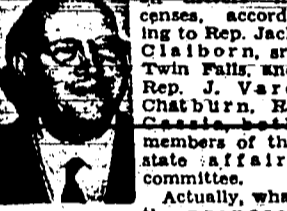

Musicians of 'South Pacific' Production Are Not Amateurs

To many people, a score is many things. To a sports fan, it is the number of points his favorite team makes against its opponent; to an ice skater, it is the marks made in the ice by skate runners; to a mathematician, a score means 20, and to a hot-tempered individual, it is a grudge to be settled. But to Del Slaughter and the 27 members of the orchestra he is conducting, a score is "South Pacific." The members of the largest Dilettante of Magic Valley Group orchestra, ever to be formed, have been "living and breathing" the "South Pacific" score since the first of the year. Most of the musicians in the orchestra accompanying the production are not rank amateurs, as are most of the actors, actresses and behind-the-scenes workers. Almost without exception they are music teachers, either privately or in schools, or are high school students who are very active in music organizations in school. Unlike other members of the production, the musicians are not "getting away from it all" by working on "South Pacific," but, as one orchestra member stated, "Most of us look at it the same way Richard Rodgers does." Rodgers, who with his partner, the late Oscar Hammerstein II, collaborated on the very successful musical-comedy, "South Pacific," said in a March 13 Saturday Evening Post article, "People tell me, 'You're working hard.' 'I have to laugh to myself. This isn't work at all. I don't find it work to write music, because I enjoy it.'"

Such is the attitude of the Dilettante orchestra members. Even though practicing and playing for the Dilettante productions follows—much the same trend as their occupations. It is still pleasure and not work, because they are doing something they want to do. Of the 28 people associated with the orchestra, eight are music teachers and 10 are high school students from the area who participate in music courses in school. There are two husbands and wife teams, Mr. and Mrs. Del Slaughter and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Christopheron, all Twin Falls, in the orchestra. This orchestra, which boasts members for Twin Falls, Bannock, Buhl, Kimberly and Filer, has been practicing separately from the cast and twice weekly, and beginning Saturday will begin practicing with the cast at the Filer high school auditorium. With the production soon to go into the final stages of rehearsal, comes the approach of opening night, March 12. Most orchestra members had been carrying a double load until Feb. 9, when the Twin Falls civil symphony presented its concert. Most Dilettante musicians also are associated with that group. Mrs. Thomas Driscoll, Twin Falls publicity director for the group, said since the orchestra doesn't get to take the bows and share the spotlight as do the actors and actresses, most people don't realize how bland a production would be without an orchestra to back it up and how much time and effort is spent on the production by the orchestra. Never Quit on Boy

In the seven years that I have worked with teen-agers around and about New York's East Side, I have experienced heartache many times. Yet I also have learned this:



Never quit on any human being no matter how bad things seem. Take the boy they called the Cardinal. I met him in 1959 when he was head of a gang called 'The Untouchables.'

A junior in high school, the Cardinal knew his mother and lived with his grandmother. Behind his arrogant face I could read the usual teen-age signs of confusion, frustration and hurt.

I talked to him one day about our youth center and the Christian purpose behind it. 'As far as I'm concerned,' he said, 'church is a place for punks and Jesus Christ is nothing but a good-swear word.'

After I told my story to a group of inmates at the Eastern state penitentiary in Pennsylvania, a boy serving a life sentence for killing a policeman, came up to me. 'You should have talked to us about Jesus Christ before we got here,' he said wistfully.

The first center was opened in a store. No one came around. So I put on a science show featuring electronic equipment in a local public school after this June kids came to the store. When they told me who the gang leaders were I went after them. Progress was slow. The Cardinal was typical. But the Cardinal had a curious nature. He wanted to know more about the electronic equipment set up in the center. He wanted to know about the membership card which each boy needed to participate in our program.

'One day he asked for a card. "You'll have to wait two months," I told him. The Cardinal gave me a chance to learn about the boy, his habits and habits. The Cardinal stormed off. But he came back again. At the end of two months he received his membership. A year later he was elected president of the Sunday school class. "I want to give my heart to Jesus Christ," he told all of us.

"It's not so easy. You'll get some sneers as the Cardinal discovered. But you have Christ's promise that He will be with you. He won't forsake you. But it won't work unless you make Him your leader."

On the following Sunday the Cardinal rejoined his Sunday school class. At the end of the service he asked to say a prayer. "I'll never forget it."

"Please God, forgive me for leaving you down and forgive Scoop here who doesn't know how to pray yet. Please look out for Zip and Scoop too. Help us to learn how to live to please you."

It wasn't hard to get Scoop a job. He had no previous record. But it took two years before the Cardinal found employment. It came one day when a friend simply asked if I knew a boy who needed a job. My friend is a banker. So I had to tell him all about the Cardinal, but I also told him that I had great faith in the boy.

All my friend said was "Let's try." The Cardinal has been working in the bank for three years now handling various deposits, securities and cash. He has paid for all the damage done to the store at the rate of \$5 a week, and completed high school by attending five nights a week. Just recently he was placed in charge of a department in his bank that has 18 employees.

Of course, not everything comes out roses here in the 25th. There are as many failures as there are winners, maybe more failures. Recently, a young fellow we had tried to help was picked up by the police for stealing a car. Discouraged, I told myself there was no hope for him. Then I remembered the Cardinal, and the lesson he taught me. Never quit on a boy.

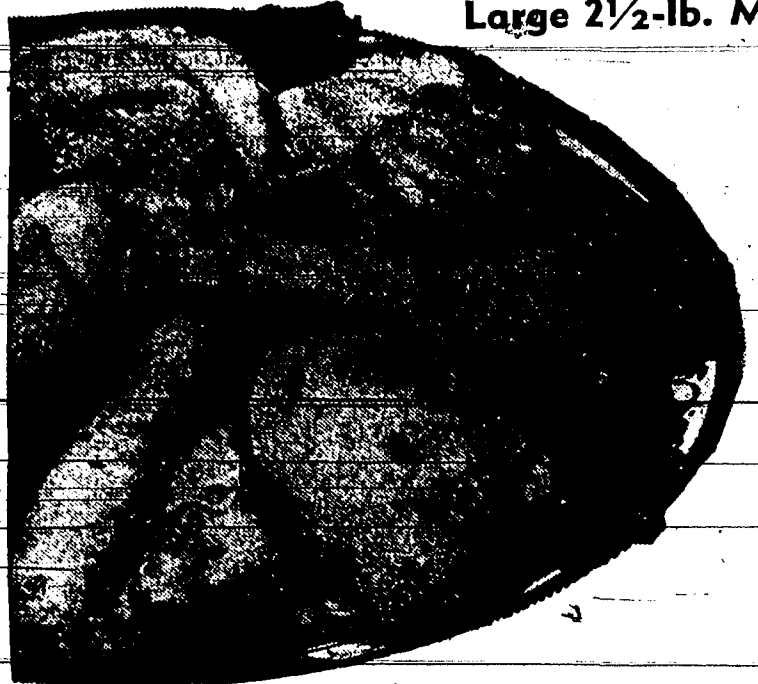

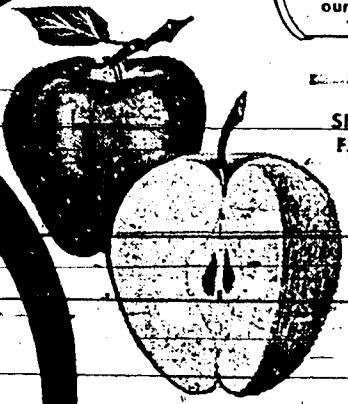
