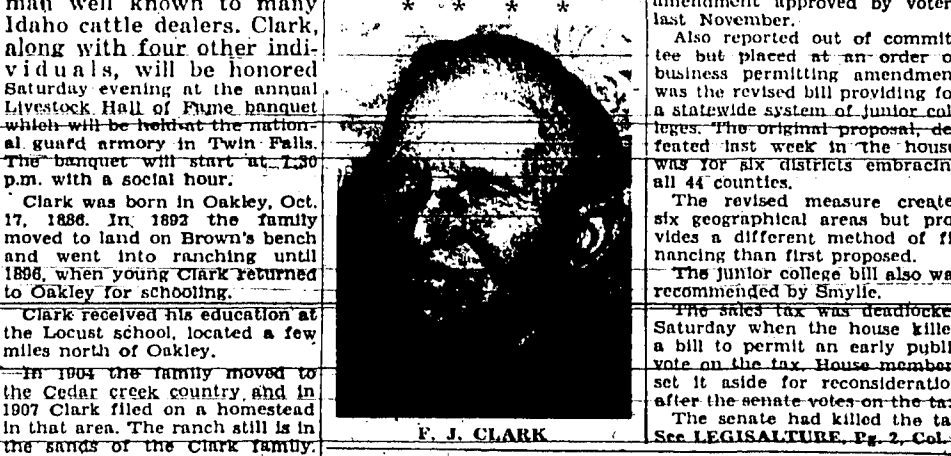

Skydiver Dies After Low Jump

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—A skydiver who they found no evidence that veteran Larry Bentley had jumped and malfunctioned as he fell to his death yesterday.

Bentley, 28, who had jumped 10 times and had been a U.S. forest service smoke jumper, dropped from a plane at 2,500 feet near Boise and appeared in near-vertical position as he fell.

But when he hit the ground, rip-rocks on both the main parachute and reserve had been pulled and the parachutes had just begun to open.

"There was nothing wrong with the parachute as far as we could tell," said Kent Lamberson, president of the Alate Parachute club. "I don't know what happened."

Lamberson said it was "a late pull" but could not explain why. He said Bentley had jumped at the minimum altitude and normally would have pulled the rip-cord almost immediately.

Bentley, the club's parachute pack inspector, was making his second jump with a new type "crossbow" parachute with a number of innovations from a regular parachute.

Carline Church, who had been invited to accompany Bentley on the fatal outing, said he was not careless.

"He was very cautious," she said, "very expert in every move he made."

Bentley, a Boise city fireman, was married and had two children.

Stalin's Empire Is Changing

Part of the breath came from Moscow itself in the rise of Nikita S. Khrushchev who, as he loosened the screws in the U.S.S.R. with his more liberal policies and the dramatic "de-Stalinization" campaign, evoked an echo in the satellites.

The gains to self-rule made in Eastern Europe have come after long and difficult struggle and most experts on the subject doubt the new Kremlin rulers can turn them backward. They have shown no inclination, so far, to try.

The biggest boost to the satellite efforts to shake themselves free of Moscow's grip has been the split between the Russians and Red China. Peking's challenge to Soviet authority over the communist world severely undermined the existing posture throughout the red bloc and nowhere more than in East Europe.

Khrushchev, fighting a rear-guard battle with Red China, allowed the Eastern European countries the chance to develop their own types of communism—so long as they remained allied with the Soviet Union in ideology, in foreign policy and in the military sphere.

The monolithic East European "satellite" empire the late Josef Stalin built on blood, conquest, terror and ruthless political exploitation after World War II is undergoing startling changes. To some extent it already has disintegrated.

There is no drift from communism. The changes are economic, political and nationalistic. All the major countries still remain very much allied with the Soviet military and dependent on Russian arms and manpower for their own security.

But in Poland, Hungary, Rumania and Czechoslovakia there has been a marked backing away from doing everything by Kremlin fiat. The governments are as communist as ever, but each in their own way. Only Bulgaria and East Germany still dance almost entirely to strings pulled in Moscow. And two one-time satellites, Yugoslavia and Albania, have broken away entirely from the Soviet Union's rule.

Yugoslavia under President Tito was an early rebel and was chucked out of the Red bloc by Stalin himself as early as 1948. Albania, siding with Red China in the Sino-Soviet ideological split, broke formally with the Kremlin in 1960.

When the iron curtain came down in Europe after the war the Kremlin had imposed dictatorial rule over more than 90 million people living in an area of some 400,000 square miles.

The red army enforced Stalin's power on Rumania, Hungary, Albania and Bulgaria. In Czechoslovakia the Democratic government of Jan Masaryk was toppled, and in shattered, bleeding postwar Poland a Moscow-trained government backed by Soviet troops took over. East Germany came under Soviet control by virtue of its military occupation.

With the sole exception of Yugoslavia, all these manufactured satellites were kept under the Kremlin fist until Stalin's death in 1953, and continued with little change until 1958. Already, however, the breath of independence from Moscow was blowing.

It exploded in Hungary in the abortive revolution that year that brought Russian tanks to rescue the local regime, and forced a liberalizing change in leadership there and in Poland.

Crushing of the Budapest uprising was the last real blood-letting by the Soviets to maintain their rule of force, and the breath of independence continued to blow.

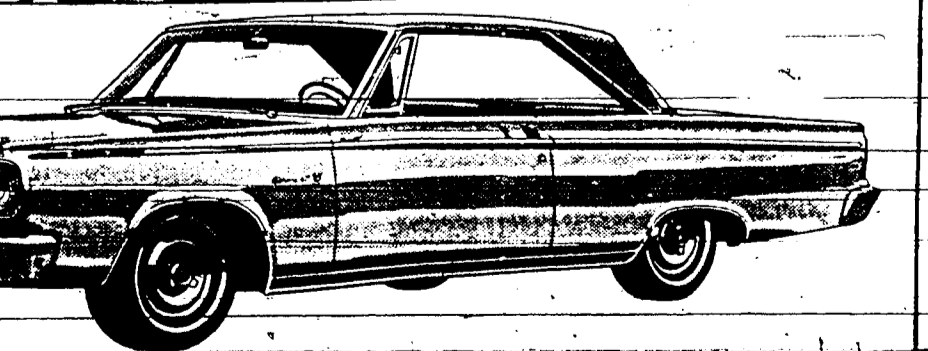

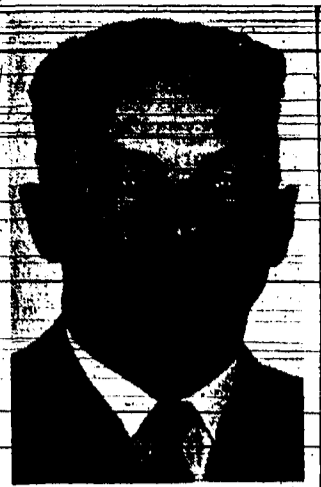
Bob Schrenk, Wendell, placed first in the senior division and Carol Isaac, Lewiston, was first place winner in the junior division.

Utah House Okays Major Revenue Bill

SALT LAKE CITY, MARCH 9 (AP)—The second major revenue bill of the 36th Utah legislature—a two per cent increase in the corporate franchise tax—cleared the house today on a near-party line vote.

The bill, the second and final part of a modified tax plan offered by the Democrats, was approved on a 41-27 vote, it now goes to the senate.

The corporate franchise tax would be hiked from four to six per cent under the Democratic proposal. It replaced a bill recommended by Gov. Calvin Rampton that would have increased the tax by making federal taxes a non-deductible item in calculating the state levy.

Thirty-eight Democrats and three southern Utah Republicans voted for the tax hike while 26 Republicans and one Democrat opposed it.

Rep. M. James MacFarlane, D., Midvale, said the substitute proposal would enrich the state coffers eight million dollars by

the next biennium, compared with a 12 million dollar boost under the governor's proposal.

He said corporations in the state had informed the Democratic leadership that they prefer a flat hike in the tax rate rather than a change in the federal exemption. MacFarlane added that the tax hike would not "destroy our competitive position with other western states in attracting industry."

Republican opponents said the bill does not fit in with the governor's plans to promote the state's industrial development. Rep. Frank Nelson, R., Salt Lake said the state is not competitive in its overall tax structure with surrounding states.

Nelson said "the prospects in the future of our state industrially will be disturbing if this bill passes."

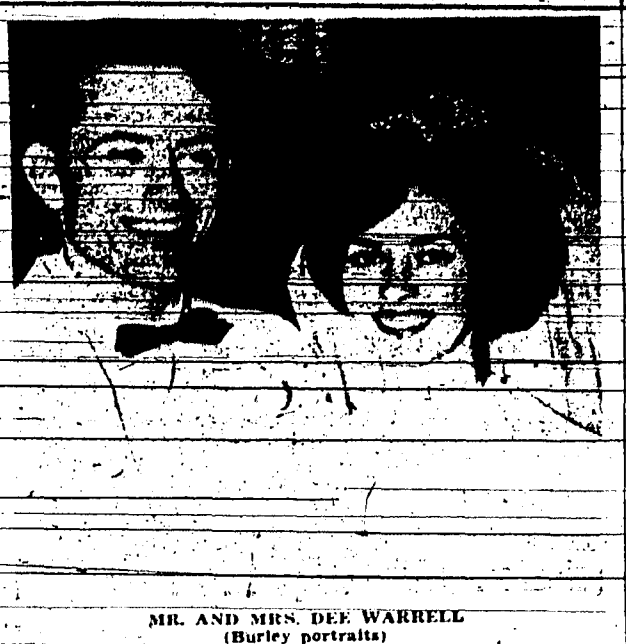

British Jets Warned Off Red Bomber

LONDON, March 9 (AP)—British jet fighters yesterday warned off a Russian jet bomber shadowing a six-nation Allied naval force maneuvering in the strategic North Atlantic, British naval sources said.

The sources said the Russian jet was a twin-jet long range bomber of the type known under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) code name of "Badger."

They said it swept over the British aircraft carrier Ark Royal at an altitude of 200 feet before being warned out of the area by two rocket-armed Sea Vixen fighters.

"Badgers"—Tu-16s—in the past have shadowed other maneuvering Western naval forces, including U.S. vessels in the Pacific.

Yesterday's incident followed another Russian "snooping" attempt that occurred last Friday when a Russian minesweeper was spotted following the NATO force taking part in exercise "Pilot Light."

Allied ships shook off the shadowing Russian vessel in week-end gales, the naval sources said.

Yesterday's incident occurred when the "badger" swept low over the Ark Royal and its escort ships 350 miles northwest of the Norwegian port of Bergen where the North Atlantic blends into the Arctic Ocean.

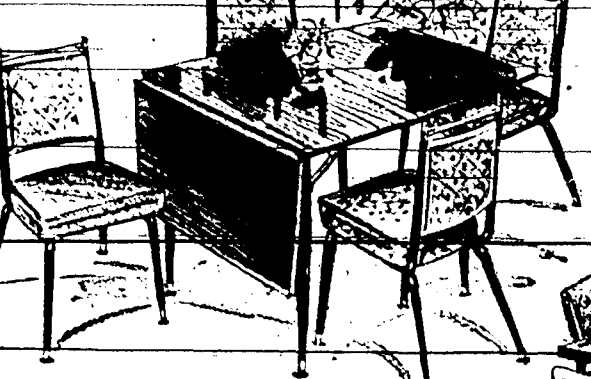

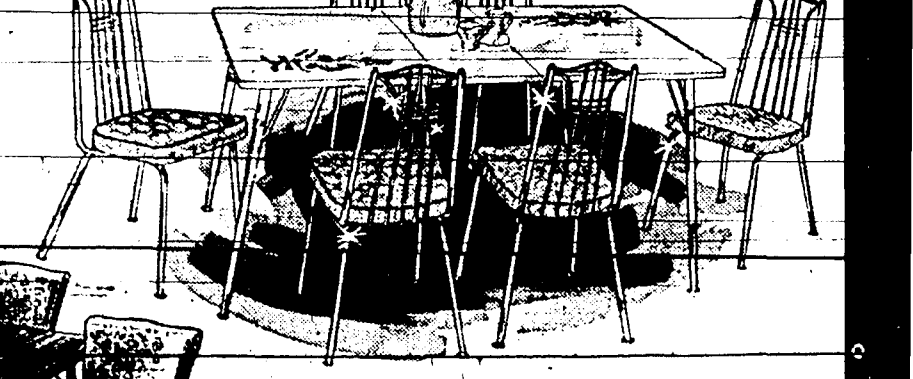

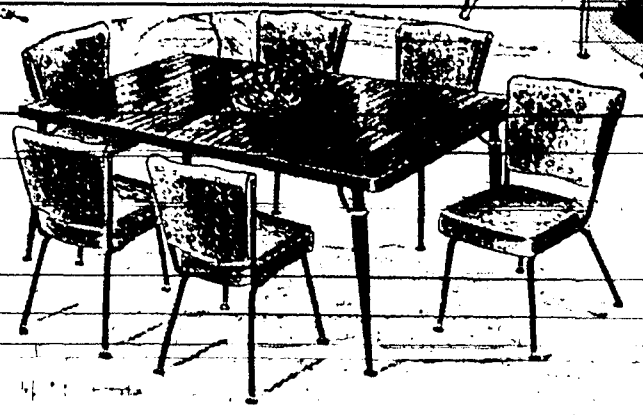
