

Johnson Asks for Swift Action on Voting Rights Bill

WASHINGTON, March 16 (UPI)—President Johnson today swung the full weight of the federal government behind a drive to make good the promise of equality—unkept for a century—given the American Negro. Congress was poised for swift action on the President's proposals. Senate leaders of both parties met with Atty. Gen. Nicholas D. Katzenbach to smooth out the final version of the voting rights legislation Johnson sought.

Senator Raps President's Voting Bill

WASHINGTON, March 16 (UPI)—Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D., La., told the senate today that he would "fillbuster and talk as long as God gives me breath" against President Johnson's new voting rights proposal. Ellender's warning came as Southern senators mounted a strong attack against the plan outlined by Johnson last night in a nationally televised address to a joint session of congress. All signs pointed to eventual approval of the President's proposal to use federal registrars and eliminate literacy tests to guarantee voting rights for Negroes. As senate leaders met with justice department officials to work on a bipartisan bill to carry out the President's program, Sen. Herman E. Tamm, D., Ga., and A. Willis Robertson, D., Va., joined Ellender in attacking the proposal as "unconstitutional."

March Held in Honor of Slain Pastor

SELMA, Ala., March 16 (UPI)—Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., led white through the streets of Selma yesterday to lay a wreath at the courthouse door for a white minister slain in the civil rights struggle. The line of marchers was so long that King was on the courthouse steps eight blocks away before the last man in line reached the "Selma Wall"—the barricade that officials lowered Monday to let the demonstrators march at last.

Ex-T.F. Man Is Decorated For Heroism

Capt. Richard S. Daum, grandson of Willard Daum, route 2, Twin Falls, has received the first oak leaf cluster with "v" device for heroism while engaged in aerial flight in connection with military operations against a hostile force on March 1 in Viet Nam. Captain Daum, who was piloting his aircraft during the assault, had his left hand on the collective pitch control when a small arms round came through the bottom of the aircraft. The round passed through his hand and his overhead window. Although his hand was bleeding profusely he continued the mission in the face of intense enemy ground fire.

Legislature Ties Record On Overtime

BOISE, March 16 (UPI)—Senators defeated an attempt to adjust Idaho's unemployment taxes today as the legislature tied a modern record for the length of a session. The senate turned down 34-10 a house-passed bill that would have shifted some of the unemployment tax burden to unstable industries. The measure was described in debate by lumber county senators as a threat to jobs. This was the 72nd day of the session, the 12th day of overtime.

Israelis and Syrians Trade Artillery Fire

TEL AVIV, Israel, March 16 (UPI)—Syrian artillery and Israeli tanks exchanged fire today along the tense Syrian-Israeli border, Israeli military officials reported. The officials said Syrians opened fire on Israeli tractor drivers working within the Israeli border. One tractor driver was seriously wounded and a tractor put out of action. Israeli tanks answered the fire and "silenced" the Syrian positions, the officials said. There was no indication of any Syrian casualties. The officials said the Syrians opened fire again 95 minutes later and the tanks replied.

Rezoning Delayed to Permit Inspection

A request by Del Butterfield, 1807 Addison avenue east, for the rezoning of property along Addison avenue local was heard Monday night at the regular meeting of the Twin Falls city commission at the city hall. Final action on the request was postponed until the board members are able to personally see the property involved and talk with residents on Shoup avenue east, Sigrid avenue and Morningside drive who have protested the action. Among their objections, stated in a formal protest read at the meeting, were that the value of the residential property would decrease and the traffic created by the rezoning and possible motel operation proposed by Butterfield would be dangerous for children living in the area.

Jury Waived In Trial on Shooting

BURLEY, March 16 (UPI)—The trial of William Morgan Owens, 52, charged with assault with a deadly weapon and with intent to commit murder, will open at 10 a.m. Wednesday before District Judge Lloyd Webb. Owens, who is charged with the shooting of two Oakley boys Nov. 30, 1962, originally was scheduled for a jury trial, but prospective jurors today were being notified by sheriff's officers they would not need to report Wednesday morning.

Gusts Sweep Dust Over Twin Falls

Strong gusts of wind swept Twin Falls Tuesday, and by Tuesday afternoon housewives and custodians of public and business buildings were doing some sweeping of their own. The first real dust storm of the season had some motorists driving through downtown streets with their headlights on, and dust was sifting into most homes, stores and offices. The weather reported average wind speeds were from 23-30 miles an hour with stronger gusts.

Oregon Blaze Is Uncontrolled

DALLAS, Ore., March 16 (UPI)—Officials hoped to bring a 500-acre forest fire in the Coast range 40 miles west of here under control today. The blaze started yesterday when a northwest wind drove flames over firelines during a controlled slash burning project near Crown-Zimmerbach land near Scott mountain. Oregon has had little rain so far this month.

Speed of Accumulating Pennies Will Amaze New Sales Taxpayers in Idaho

BOISE, March 16 (UPI)—One of the first things that amazes a new sales taxpayer is the speed at which pennies accumulate in his pocket. He hardly notices the tax on a small day to day purchase — in fact an argument against the tax is that it is so painless, politicians are prone to raise it. But the pennies present a problem. The veteran learns to anticipate the tax and shell out the right number of pennies with his dollar bill.

To date, 39 states have presented their citizens with the challenge to learn this small skill. And Idaho is about to make it 40. Effective July 1, there will be a three per cent sales tax on virtually every product the Idahoan buys or rents, including a hotel or hotel room. It will be levied on groceries, anything bought in a retail store, cigarettes and other smoking items, cars, boats and liquor by the drink. But it will not apply to haircuts, doctor bills, shoe shines or any other services that do not involve sale of a product. And sales tax drafters have attempted to exempt all items on which the consumer will pay another tax, such as manufacturing goods that will be turned into a retail — and taxable — product. Neither will the tax be levied on bottled liquor bought in state liquor dispensaries, for which part of the cost already goes into the state treasury. The tax is expected to add about 66 million dollars to the treasury. And about 23 million dollars of that is to be set aside for relief of state property and income taxes. Income taxes are to be reduced. See PENNIES, Pg. 4, Col. 7.

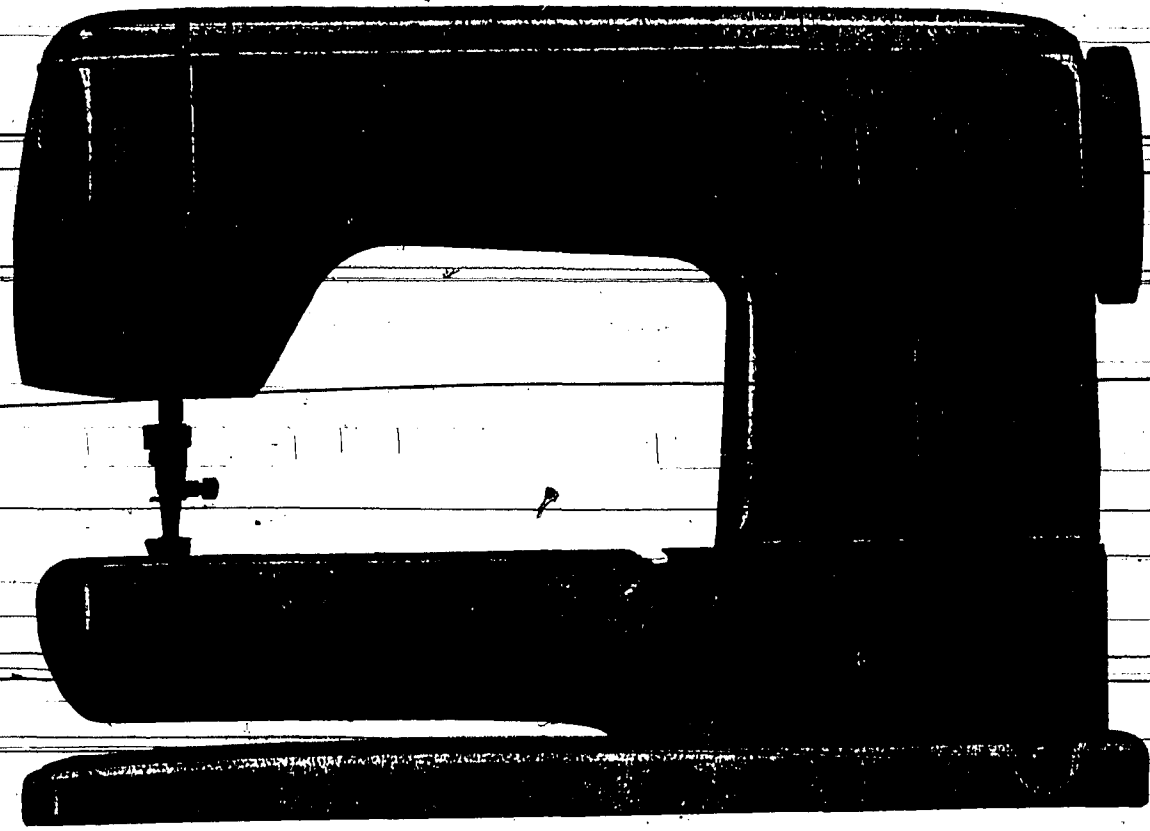

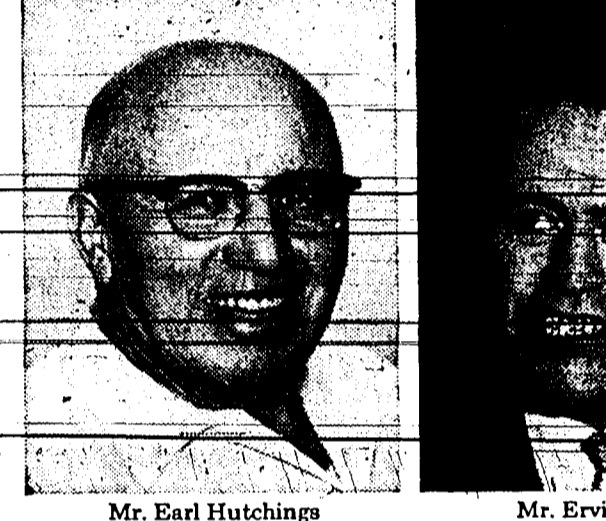

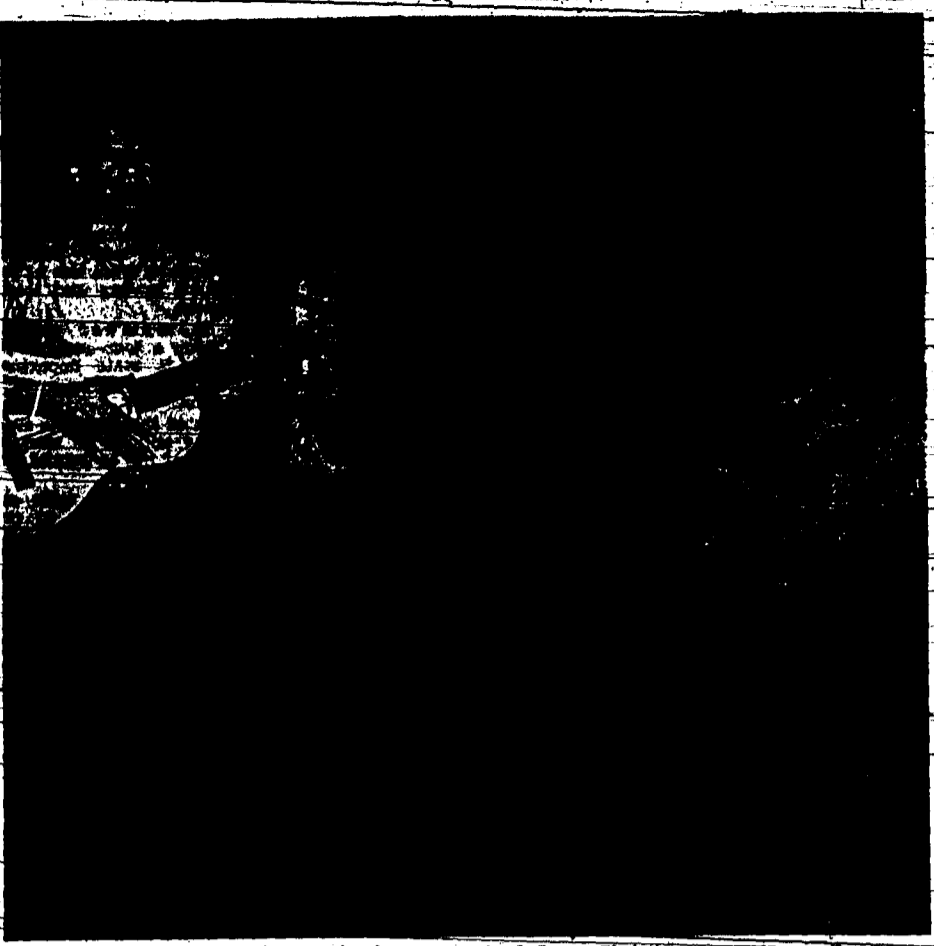

Legislature Activity

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—The senate approved today a resolution asking the legislative council to consider the effect proposed legislation would have on Idaho's business climate. Sen. William Roden, R., Ada, who sponsored the resolution, said it would not require a specific study, but he said it would ask the council to consider the effect on business of any proposals presented to it for study.

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—The Idaho senate revised a house bill yesterday to increase the maximum local school levy to 48 mills, then passed the bill 33-5 and returned it to the house. Sen. Harold Ryan, D., Washington, said the senate bill which would have increased the maximum levy was tied up in a house committee and revision of the house bill would get the matter to the house floor. The maximum would be increased from the present 38-mill ceiling but two-thirds of the voters could approve a levy even higher than the 48-mill ceiling. The house bill, before it was revised by the senate, would have permitted a simple majority of the voters to approve any levy above the present 38 mills. This now requires a two-thirds public vote.

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—The senate confirmed today reappointment of T. C. Waddoups, Moore, as a member of the state tax commission. The appointment, submitted by Gov. Robert E. Smylie last week, is for a six-year term running until March 8, 1971. Sen. Burns Beal, R., Butte, said Waddoups, now 63, has been a member of the commission for 14 years. He has been a resident of Idaho for 60 years and is a former member of the state legislature.

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—Idaho senators approved standardizing tax assessments over the next eight years but some fear cities will use the time extension to gain tax advantages. The measure would adjust tax assessments in Idaho's 44 counties by 1973 to 80 per cent of cash value on real and personal property and 40 per cent on utilities. Sen. William Doe, D., Idaho, predicted cities will control the legislature after reappointment and will get the assessment on residential property reduced to 15 per cent. Sen. Cy Chase, D., Pocatello, said tax assessments should be standardized by 1967. The 1967 legislature could extend this, he said, "by slanting this off for eight years," he said, "we're killing the bill as far as it's concerned." But Sen. William Roden, R., Ada, said the current legislature is the first to try to correct 63 years of tax inequity and it cannot be done in two years. Sen. Walter H. Yarbrough, R., Owyhee, said tax assessments now range from 10 to 30 per cent of cash value in Idaho and "it is impossible for anyone to know how much of the tax burden he bears."

Rupert Chamber Hears City Problems Outlined by Aides

RUPERT, March 16—The proposed city budget was discussed by city officials during the Chamber of Commerce meeting last week at the Hirlinger care. Mayor Wendell Johnson, Mrs. Loretta Klingenberg, city clerk, and Ronald Klebe, city engineer, reported on various phases of the department during the meeting.

Mrs. Klingenberg noted the estimated revenue and expense for 1965 and discussed the \$596,000 proposed budget. She reported revenue for the city was obtained through taxes, which is 80 mills in Rupert with a city evaluation at 2 1/2 million dollars. Revenue also is realized from the highway fund which must be used only for streets and improvements and also revenue from the liquor fund. Revenue also is obtained from taxes levied on county bridges and highways. Revenue derived from the city electrical department also was discussed. According to the city clerk, irrigation costs in the city are \$5 minimum with the exception of Countryside and Vista Village.

Mayor Johnson reported the city council will continue the new fluorescent street lighting project begun last year. He also reported repair on the water tower will cost at least \$5,000. A plastic liner will be put into the tank, as well as a recleaning and repaint job.

A new fire truck, a LaFrance, has been purchased for the city department and will be delivered in about four months, at a cost of \$28,000. The old truck was purchased 23 years ago with a low pumping capacity, and according to the mayor the new truck will take care of the needs of the city amply, even with increased growth.

Facilities at the city office are inefficient and Mayor Johnson reported a need for a new office. A new structure at a cost of \$85,000 was discussed. This would pay for itself in 10 years as the present office costs \$14,000 a year to maintain, the mayor noted.

The mayor also pointed out the police department is working under a handicap in city quarters and the city jail could be improved.

Klebe reported on a master general fund for salaries and travel expenses of state water resources board.

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—St. John's and top-seeded Villanova moved into the semifinals of the National Invitation tournament Monday night. St. John's defeated second-seeded New Mexico 61-54 behind brothers Ken and Bob McIntyre after Villanova edged Manhattan 73-71 on Bill Melchioni's jump shot and free throw in the last 2½ minutes. St. John's will play the winner of Tuesday night's Army-West-Kentucky game while Villanova takes on the Detroit-New York university winner. The semifinals will be played Thursday.

The Redmen, now 13-8, broke a close game in the last eight minutes. Jerry Houston started the spurt with a jump shot that cut New Mexico's lead to 44-43.

Ken McIntyre followed with a jump shot, but Melchioni's hook shot, grabbed the rebound and ran down the court again for the Lobos, run-up in last year's NIT.

Elk and Deer Tagging Is Successful

BOISE, March 16—Some 250 elk and double that many deer were live-trapped, ear-tagged and sometimes given other identification visible at a distance by the Idaho fish and game department during 1964-65, it was disclosed today.

Some of the elk and deer were trucked to other release sites, and 17 mountain goats were trapped on Black Mountain and Snow peak in the Clearwater river drainage and moved to the Seven Devils mountains south-west of Riggs.

Wes Shaw, Boise game biologist in charge of the department's live-trapping and tagging program, said the purpose of live-trapping and tagging game animals is to check seasonal migration routes, distribution, survival, herd, composition by age and sex.
