

## Late Winter Storm Hits Midwest Area, Tornadoes Batter Parts of South

A massive late winter storm clobbered the Midwest and the Northeast states blocking highways, closing schools and crippling transportation. Tornadoes battered parts of the South. From two to seven inches of new snow fell overnight in the southern two-thirds of Minnesota. Winds 25 to 35 miles an hour caused huge drifts. The Minnesota highway department said that visibility was poor to zero and all highways in the snow area if not actually impassable, were heavy with snow.

## House Gives Okay To Gerrymander Bill

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The house has dealt a blow it hopes is a lethal blow to the gerrymander—odd-shaped congressional district drawn to favor one party over another. It did it by passing a bill setting standards for congressional districts, which require districts to be "as compact as practical." Though the definition is far from precise, the bill's sponsors made it clear they mean the courts to outlaw weirdly shaped districts.

## Fullbright Grant Given To Idaho Girl

WASHINGTON, March 17 (UPI)—Kathleen Rae Von Bergen, a college of Idaho political science major, has been awarded a Fulbright grant to study in India. Announcement of the grant came today from Sen. Frank Church, R., Ida., who said Miss Von Bergen will go to India to study Hindi, the national language of that nation. She will also serve as a teaching assistant in English at an Indian college. Church said the Grangeville girl was named because of her outstanding scholastic record. Fulbright grants for overseas exchange studies only go to the most qualified educators and students, he said.

## Woman Turns Herself Into Fiery Torch

DETROIT, March 17 (AP)—A woman turned herself into a blazing torch on a Detroit street corner last night. She fled Germany and then France because of what she termed political corruption. She once described her ancestry as "partly Jewish and partly Christian," but said she was a Quaker by religion. She is Alice Herz, 52. She was in critical condition today. Mrs. Herz, whose daughter, Helga, is a Detroit librarian, had described herself as correspondent for a Swiss newspaper in both France and the United States in a speech to a Detroit woman's club in 1947. Passers-by beat out her flaming clothing, fed by flammable cleaning fluid.

## Patrick Honored In Parades

NEW YORK, March 17 (AP)—A great green tide surged up 4th Avenue today as sons and daughters of Erin and hordes of men-for-a-day paraded in honor of St. Patrick. The number of spectators ranged from 80,000 to 100,000 and the parade line included 225 marching units and 215 brass bands. Pipe bands and fife and drum outfits assembled from far and near. Steps of St. Patrick's cathedral between 50th and 51st streets were the vantage point for Cardinal Spellman, other Roman Catholic prelates and the parade. In Boston—a traditional stronghold of Irish-Americans—the parade had double significance. It was St. Patrick's day as well as the day of evacuation commemorates the departure of the British from Dorset Heights in 1776. In Baton Rouge, La., Irish-Americans joined the Baton Rouge parade because a green flag had been painted along the route, and New Yorkers celebrated the traditional green traffic in the middle of Fifth avenue—banned last year. 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## Italy Is Plagued With Walkouts

ROME, March 17 (AP)—Strikes by government medical personnel, telephone workers and university teachers hit Italy today. Doctors, chemists and veterinarians employed by the health ministry started a two-day walkout demanding a review of various job grievances. University professors and assistants went out for 24 hours, complaining of "unauthorized delays" in government reforms. More than 40,000 telephone company employes were ordered to strike tonight for 24 hours after contract talks broke down.

## Grissom to Be First "Buck Rogers" Of Space Age in Next Week's Flight

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla., March 17 (AP)—Astronaut Virgil I. Grissom is about to become the first "Buck Rogers" of the space age. If no hitches develop in his Gemini launch, scheduled for next Tuesday, the short, graying Grissom, an air force major, will be the first space traveler, American or Russian, to control the flight of his space ship. Grissom will drive the two-seater spacecraft across the Atlantic, then up into orbit. Other U. S. astronauts have been able to control the attitudes of their vehicles, but not the orbit. The national aeronautics and space administration today outlined details of the mission, the first manned flight of the Gemini program. Grissom's copilot on the three-orbit trip will be a likeable, dark-complexioned navy lieutenant commander, John W. Young, 34. The four-hour, 52-minute flight is to grind out the bugs in the Gemini spacecraft and prepare for the long duration orbital path. Other U. S. astronauts have been able to control

## Senate Concurs in Boost of 2 Million For School Funds

BOISE, March 17 (AP)—The senate refused today to amend the house-approved two million dollar addition to state aid for the public schools and the action apparently cleared the way for final adjournment of the 1965 Idaho legislature. Leaders hoped for adjournment tonight, but a agreed a night session likely would be necessary. House approval of the compromise school fund distribution formula hinged on approval of the additional two million dollars, increasing the total state aid for the schools to 57.3 million dollars. This includes \$200,000 for the teacher retirement program.

## Attempt to Abolish Tax on Oleo Fails

BOISE, March 17 (UPI)—An attempt to abolish Idaho's 36-year-old tax on oleomargarine failed in the state senate yesterday, despite pleas the assessment is "almost barbaric." The upper chamber voted down the repeal bill 18-24 after several senators argued the move would hurt the dairy industry and cut state revenues by more than a million dollars a biennium. Making the plea for abolition of the state's 10-cent-a-pound tax on colored oleomargarine was Sen. Harry Harn, R., Clark. He said it was a discriminatory tax on the "necessities of life."

## Judge Okays March to Courthouse

SELMA, Ala., March 17 (AP)—Sheriff James G. Clark told civil rights demonstrators today they could march three abreast to the county courthouse. The judge's order apparently received by telephone required the marchers to walk in a single file on the sidewalk and to keep their hands and feet off the courthouse grounds. The sheriff attracted some boos and jeers when he got out of his car across the street from the courthouse. Earlier, the Rev. James Bevel, a Negro leader, said the march would be attempted at 11 a.m.

## 6 Witnesses Testify in Burley Trial

BURLEY, March 17—A witness testified in the trial of William Morgan Owens which opened before Judge Lloyd Webb in the Owyhee county courtroom this morning that Owens, charged with shooting of two Oakley youths, told him he "was obeying voices to shoot sadists." Ned Embury, Oakley area rancher, stated Owens knocked on his door between 9 and 10 p.m. Nov. 30, 1962, the day of the shooting, and had a rifle in his hand. Owens' hand was cut, but he refused to tell Embury how it had happened, the rancher testified. Owens is charged with the shooting of Larry Sager, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Sager, and Gilbert Hunter, son of Mrs. Maxine Hunter, as the two were returning from a goose hunting trip at Oakley dam southwest of Oakley. Embury stated he cared for Owens' hand and allowed the man to go to bed in his bunkhouse. Embury was one of six witnesses testifying at the opening session of the trial. Owens is charged with assault with a deadly weapon and with intent to commit murder.

## Unit's Stay on Cyprus Might Be Extended

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., March 17 (AP)—Amid increasing Greek-Turkish tension, the U.N. security council was called into session today to consider extending the life of the U.N. peacekeeping force on Cyprus for another three months. No opposition was expected to the recommendation from Secretary-General U Thant that the council authorize the 6,100-man force to remain on the eastern Mediterranean island republic until June 26. Fresh violence and threats from Athens, Ankara and the Greek Cypriots in Nicosia underscored Thant's warning that only a tenuous peace was being maintained on Cyprus. Fighting has occurred daily since Friday between Greek and Turkish Cypriots in the Lefka area, on the northwest coast of Cyprus. A Greek Cypriot soldier has been killed and two Greek Cypriots and a Turkish Cypriot wounded.

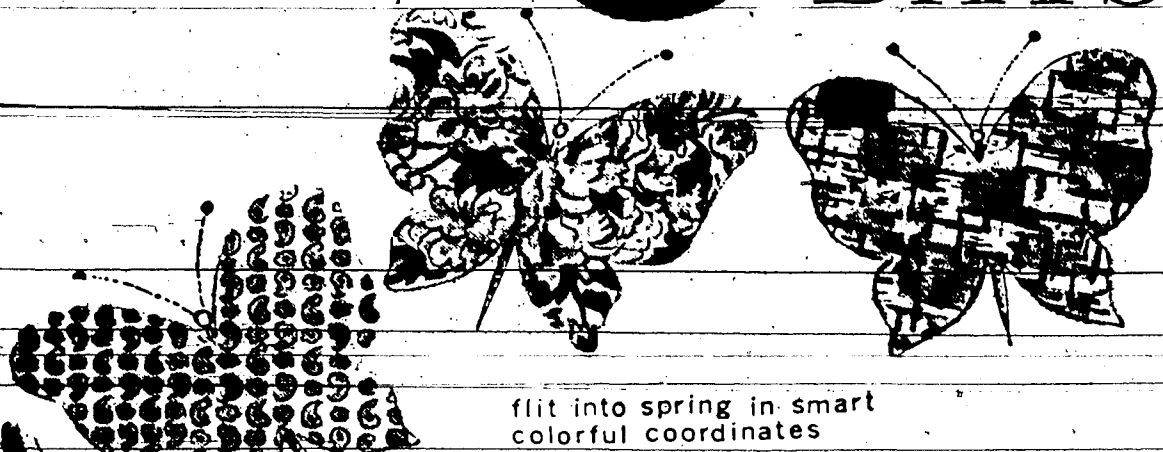
**Delegate Is Named for Blaine Area**

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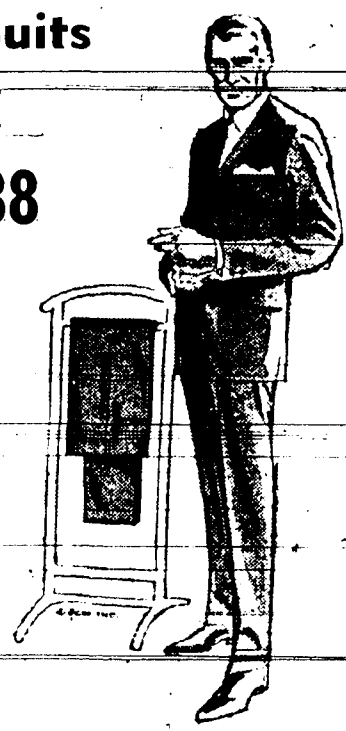

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, March 17—Predictably, the more irresponsible firearms legislation is being introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives, the more the responsible members of Congress are being forced to react. President Johnson's proposal to ban the mail-order sale of guns. This has not endeared Johnson to some of his backwoods cronies who already viewed him with suspicion because he has been seen at a symphony concert and wears a necktie to work. Even in this skyscraper age, it is still dangerous for a politician to suggest that a shooting iron is not quite as necessary to the well-dressed man as his britches.

**TOUGH PROPOSALS**—But the President, an expert at appraising the consensus, apparently has decided that a majority of the citizenry wants the government to make murder a touch more difficult. Indeed, his soundings must have produced an overwhelming sentiment in favor of firearms legislation because his proposed controls are much broader than those introduced earlier in Capitol hill.

For example, a bill sponsored by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, R., Conn., would prohibit the interstate shipment of guns only to juveniles and convicted felons. Other purchasers would merely have to file a notarized affidavit subject to local public review. Johnson's proposal not only bans mail-order guns to all, but prohibits the sale of firearms to persons under 21 or, in the case of rifles and shotguns, to those under 18.

**LRJ HAS INFLUENCE**—It now appears that frenetic devotees of over-the-counter sudden death, who screamed that Dodd's bill was too severe, and maybe communistic, will get a much tougher law. Dodd's influence in the senate is considerable, but falls somewhat short of Lyndon Johnson's; these days what Lyndon wants, Lyndon gets. Skeptics are referred to the Appalachian aid bill which the house, in an almost unprecedented action, passed unchanged in its senate version.

In the matter of firearms legislation, Johnson's influence in Capitol hill is a happy thing because his proposals are good. He has also called for legislation to curb the dangerously ridiculous ease with which fast-back articles are sold around the country. Last year, a Los Angeles arms dealer bought 24 submachineguns from Singapore. And the weapon used to murder President Kennedy was an Italian carbine sold to Lee Oswald by a Chicago sporting goods house.

**DEATH IS CHEAP**—As of now, of course, any juvenile delinquent or hophead or lunatic can order by mail any kind of weapon his twisted psyche covets. Grenades are in good supply. So is that famed tank-killer of World War II, the bazooka, which is just dandy for rubbing banks and chastising your uppity neighbor.

**HIS FRIENDS MAY HURT HIM**  
The defenders of Hubert H. Humphrey have been too quick to criticize, when they questioned President Lyndon Johnson's decision not to send his vice president to attend the funeral services in London for Winston Churchill. Johnson gave no reason for the omission thereby opening the way for his critics to suggest he was determined not to have Humphrey grab the spotlight he wanted for himself.

The duties assigned to the vice president, other than that of presiding officer of the senate, are exclusively determined by the President. No president yet has tried or even consented to give the vice president responsibilities that some political observers recommend. Franklin D. Roosevelt largely ignored his vice presidents, with the result that when he died, his successor, Harry S. Truman, knew very little about what went on in the presidency. Much was made of the role played by Richard Nixon in the Eisenhower administration yet Eisenhower apparently had so little faith in the vice president that he didn't even wholeheartedly push for Nixon's election as president.

Lyndon Johnson had certain opportunities to travel during the John F. Kennedy administration, but it was freely said that the president's brother, Robert Kennedy, and perhaps one or two others of the president's inner circle of advisers, knew more about the presidency than did Mr. Johnson.

# TAYLOR'S VIEWS ON WORLD NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO, March 17—Being on this Pacific flank of our country brings all Far Eastern questions much closer to home. Again, our troops and treasures pour from the port to the Orient as a staging area for our North Viet Nam war.  
As Red China pushes on South Viet Nam, her shadow falling on Japan, India also guesses "What next?"  
The curling Henry J. Taylor smoke of the communist campfires dot the hills of New Delhi. The glow spreads there like a wasting disease.

One of the major problems (and mystics) in our world today is that so many intellectuals are either too civiled or too dense to grasp the obvious about communist imperialism. So was a darling of many of them, the late great faker Jawaharlal Nehru.  
In India it is commonly stated that the greatest peril of communism does not come from the pitiable poor. It comes from intellectual circles.  
Intellectualism in France, Italy and Britain contains some of the same daze. The phrase, "I'd rather be red than dead," did not spring from London's dismal 'Boho. It was born in the intellectual circles at the London School of Economics, et al.

Nehru, who shaped postwar India's neutrality, started his day by standing on his head, yoga fashion, and apparently viewed the world from this position for the rest of the day.  
He imprisoned communists (and others) who threatened his rule at home. But he refused to allow India on the side of those who oppose world communism and based his career on playing off the West against the Soviet menace.  
His performance was a story of sophisticated venality at home and unprincipled opportunism abroad.  
It was an affair of slogan-making, high verbiage and sanctimonious manners, not unlike the Bible-carrying parson who robbed the sage and turned out to be Jesse James.  
In his double game of playing us off against the Soviet bloc he extracted some eight billion dollars from the American taxpayers, the receipt of which, it might add, he always greeted as

In a night club recently in Cap Hatien, an old port on Haiti's northern shore, one of Papa Duvalier's boogymen cut loose with a vicious spray of bullets from a tommygun.  
Killed was one of the prominent citizens and one-time member of Haiti's chamber of deputies. The killer went unpunished.  
The target was the club's orchestra leader who was absent. The machinegun burst simply was an expression of frustration.  
Papa Duvalier otherwise known as Dr. Francois Duvalier, life-time president of Haiti, since 1957 he has gained an unenviable reputation for being the worst tyrant in the western hemisphere.

The boogymen was one of the hand-picked elite who guard the president at all times. In Haiti they are known as the ton ton macoute which in Creole means boogymen.  
The killing of Cap Hatien's prominent citizen aroused resentment but was only too typical of life and the way it can come to a sudden end in today's Haiti which with the Dominican Republic shores the fate of Hispaniola between Cuba and Puerto Rico.  
Early this year Haiti launched a drive to cut in on the trade and travel with the newsmen to attend special at port ceremonies alongside landing strip for jets.

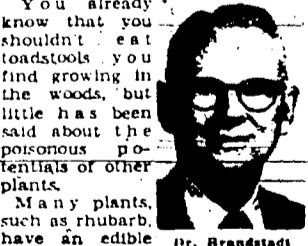

WASHINGTON, March 17, (U)—From President Johnson down, psychological pressure has whiplashed the key figures in Alabama's civil rights turmoil, but none more than the federal district judge in the case, Frank M. Johnson.  
Pressure piled up so fast and intensely, nationwide, on a judge as on this one, trying to decide whether to forbid a march by Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace on civil rights marchers.  
And Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., main spokesman so far for the marchers, has felt the heat from inside his own ranks.

He wasn't there to lead the march which state police broke up on Sunday, March 7, with billy clubs and tear gas. He led another—but only a brief one—the following Tuesday, turning back when police stood in the way.  
This peaceful confrontation and falling back had been arranged by the federal government through compromise on both sides there could be a mile-march, no defiance of the police, then a turn-back, and no police action.

More militant civil rights leaders in Selma, Ala., opposed King's willingness to withdraw. Any expedition had been temporarily banned by Judge Johnson until he could make a final decision.  
King later admitted one reason he had led even this brief march was fear of violence by Selma negroes until he could supply some outlet for "pent-up emotions."  
Discontent within Negro ranks about King's leadership—for not being more militant—could and may have far-reaching results.  
Wallace, who rode into office as a segregationist and vowed "segregation forever" when he took the oath of office, may have felt he was reflecting the feeling of most whites in Alabama when he told his police to use "all necessary force" to break up that Sunday civil rights march.

# The Doctor Says

By WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT, M.D.  
You have been warned to keep household chemicals away from children, but what about the flowers that bloom in the spring?  
You already know that you shouldn't eat household tools you find growing in the woods, but little has been said about the poisonous potentials of other plants.  
Many plants, such as rhubarb, have an edible portion in this case, the stalk, and a poisonous portion (in this case) the leaves, which contain oxalates.  
Others, like foxglove, are a source of potent drugs (in this case digitalis, a heart stimulant, an overdose of which may have disastrous results).  
Even a plant as seemingly harmless as the nutmeg must be treated with respect. Either two or three ground nutmegs can cause loss of consciousness.  
There are in all about 250,000 species of plants, most of which are harmless, but over 100 are potentially dangerous.  
No one knows, for example, how many times a child may have eaten the berries, leaves or blossoms of a plant growing in the yard of the house and had an upset that was attributed to, teaching, a cold or overeating.  
The problem is complicated by



the fact that many plants have two or more popular names and may be known by different names in different parts of the country.  
Furthermore, the toxicity of different species of the same plant varies. An example is found in edible and poisonous mushrooms.  
And then again entirely different plants may have the same popular name.  
Plantain is a banana-like fruit in the tropics. In this country, it is a weed found in almost every backyard from coast to coast. Fortunately neither of these is poisonous.  
Here are some of the commoner plant hazards listed alphabetically:  
The root ofaconite (monks-hood) was formerly used in the practice of medicine, but is now recognized as a deadly poison of no therapeutic value.  
Adder's tongue (dogtooth violet) roots and bulbs may cause violent vomiting.  
Also, sometimes found as a house plant, with cancer-purging Amaryllis, anemone, arisaema, autumn crocus, azalea, habes' breath, banberry, bindweed, convolvulus, bird of Paradise, bloodroot, bluebonnet (a lupine), blue weed, bouncing bet, boxwood and bracken fern all have poisonous parts.  
Buckeye, a horse chestnut, may cause vomiting and diarrhea.  
Buttercup, calabar, camellia, and campion—all poisonous.  
Castor beans will cause violent diarrhea.

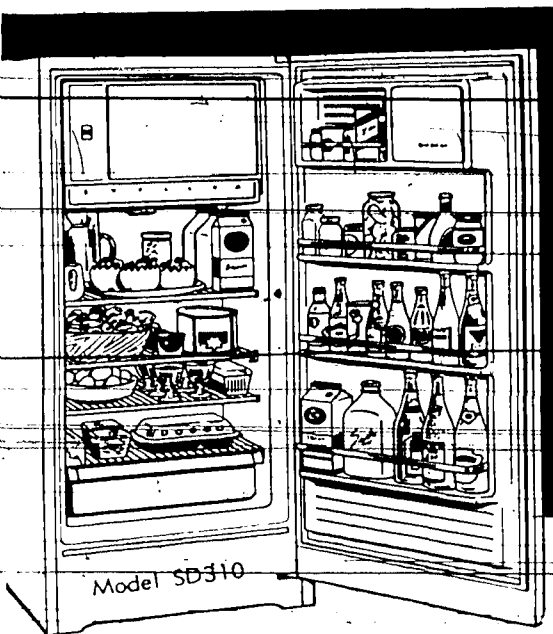

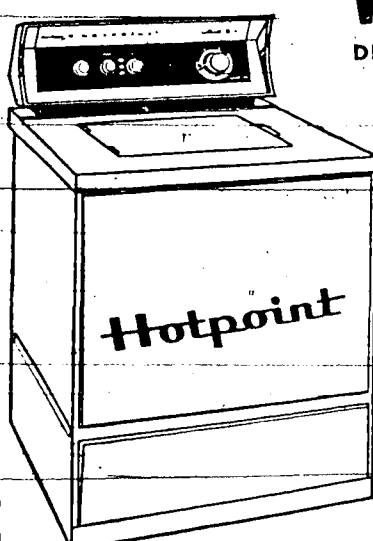

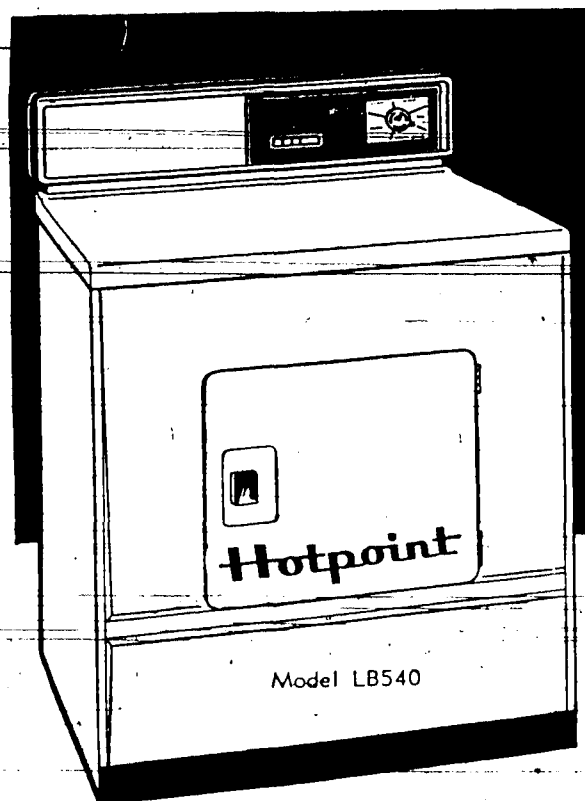

**IDAHO FALLS, March 17 (UP)**—A new "earn and learn" program that would put nearly 20 Idaho Falls high school girls to work as secretaries is being planned here. Victor Cushman, vocational guidance director at the high school, says the girls have had training in typing, shorthand and bookkeeping, and would be available 10 hours a week. He said they would be worth starting salaries. The "earn and learn" program is another step in a current program in which students observe practices in local business, Cushman said.

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—Bids on two highway construction auxiliary projects were asked today by the Idaho highway department. Bids will be opened April 13 on installing a sprinkling system, placing topsoil and planting trees, shrubs, vines and seeding lawn on two interchanges of Interstate highway 15, Broadway and Johns Hole, in Bonanza county. Bids will be opened April 20 on constructing rest area facilities, a water distribution system and drilling a well along U. S. highway 95 at the Alexander-McDowell rest area about 18 miles northwest of Coeur d'Alene in Kootenai county.

**POCATELLO, March 17 (UP)**—The Bannock Memorial hospital board announced yesterday it will invite two architects to discuss ideas on a proposed \$15 million dollar expansion and remodeling. The board extended invitations to Pocatello Architect Grant Brown and his company, Gordon A. Friesen associates, Washington, D. C., and to the firm of Fisher and Davis, Denver. ## Legislature Activity

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—Bills increasing workmen's compensation benefits and boosting payroll taxes for unemployment insurance were killed yesterday in the Idaho senate. The benefit measure went down 19-24 and the unemployment tax bill failed, 10-34. Sen. Arthur Murphy, D., Shoshone, was floor sponsor of the compensation measure, which would have increased benefits to totally disabled workers from the present top of \$37 per week to \$42. Murphy said Idaho now ranks at the bottom among the states in maximum payments to single persons. Sen. Harold Collett, D., Elmore, supported the measure on grounds it would help compensate for the three per cent sales tax, which the current session enacted. Sen. R. H. Young, R., Canyon, opposed the bill. He said benefits were increased \$4 per week by the 1963 session and the continued cost of living has increased since then. The unemployment insurance tax bill would have increased from \$1.25 to \$4.100 the annual wage base subject to the levy. It also would base individual tax rates on an employer's labor turnover.

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—The Idaho house passed and sent to the senate yesterday a bill to allow non-residents a 15-day permit to obtain a motor vehicle license in Idaho if they have received licenses in their home state. The vote was 54-7. Rep. Darrell Manning, D., Bannock, said the measure was an outgrowth of reciprocal conferences with the Utah legislature. He said it was submitted to show "good faith" in the agreements reached.

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—The house approved by a vote of 52-2 yesterday a proposed constitutional amendment which would allow municipalities to issue revenue bonds to finance construction of recreational facilities. The measure, which gained senate approval earlier in the session, will go on Tuesday's general election ballot for ratification by the voters. Rep. Fred Koch, R., Ada, said ratification of the amendment would permit cities to construct recreation projects and to issue bonds against the revenue to pay for them. It was the fifth proposed constitutional amendment to gain approval of both houses. The others deal with the court systems and corporate powers.

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—Penalties for making false bomb reports and obscene or threatening telephone calls would be by bill passed yesterday in the Idaho senate. Falsely reporting to a public or private place would be made a felony by a bill in the senate. Obscene or threatening telephone calls would be a second offense under terms of another measure. It was passed 38-1. Sen. R. H. Young, R., Canyon, said telephone threats "go far beyond the realm of a practical joke and should be limited by statute."

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—A measure appropriating \$60,000 to the department of commerce and development for establishment of a program for industrial development was passed 45-19 yesterday by the Idaho house. Rep. T. F. Terrell, D., Bannock, floor manager for the bill, said the appropriation would enable Idaho to become a leader in the field of inducing industry to move to our state. Opponents contended, however, that the department of commerce and development should have set up such a program in the past financing it with funds it received under its general appropriation. Terrell said, however, that the department had not undertaken an industrial development program because of lack of funds. "The department," he said, "has leaned toward the less expensive task of attracting tourists and needs this additional money to get into the industrial development field."

**BOISE, March 17 (UP)**—The so-called "anti cartharber" bill aimed at keeping out-of-state residents from running for governor. U. S. senator, or U. S. representative was passed yesterday by the Idaho house of representatives. The bill previously gained senate approval but was amended by the house and now must go back to the upper chamber for concurrence. The original bill provided that all candidates for governor, senator and representatives must be residents of Idaho for two continuous years before the election. The house amended the bill, however, to change the requirement for senator and representatives. Under the amended bill, candidates would be required to be "qualified voters" for two years to be eligible for the state ballot.

## Extension OK'd

**VIENNA, Austria, March 17 (UP)**—The Austrian cabinet has approved draft legislation to extend prosecutions of Nazi war crimes beyond June 29, when the 20-year statute of limitations would have come into effect.

The draft bill, passage of which in parliament is virtually assured, will abolish the statute of limitations on war crimes, and exempt murder prosecutions from any limitation.

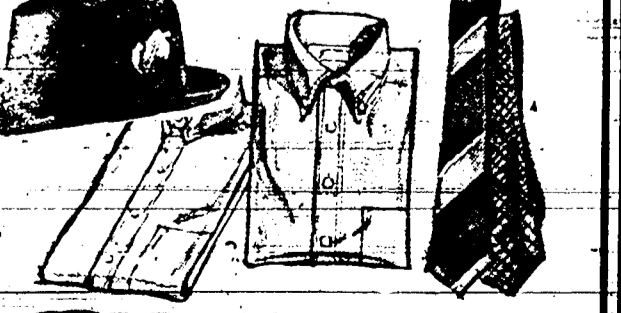

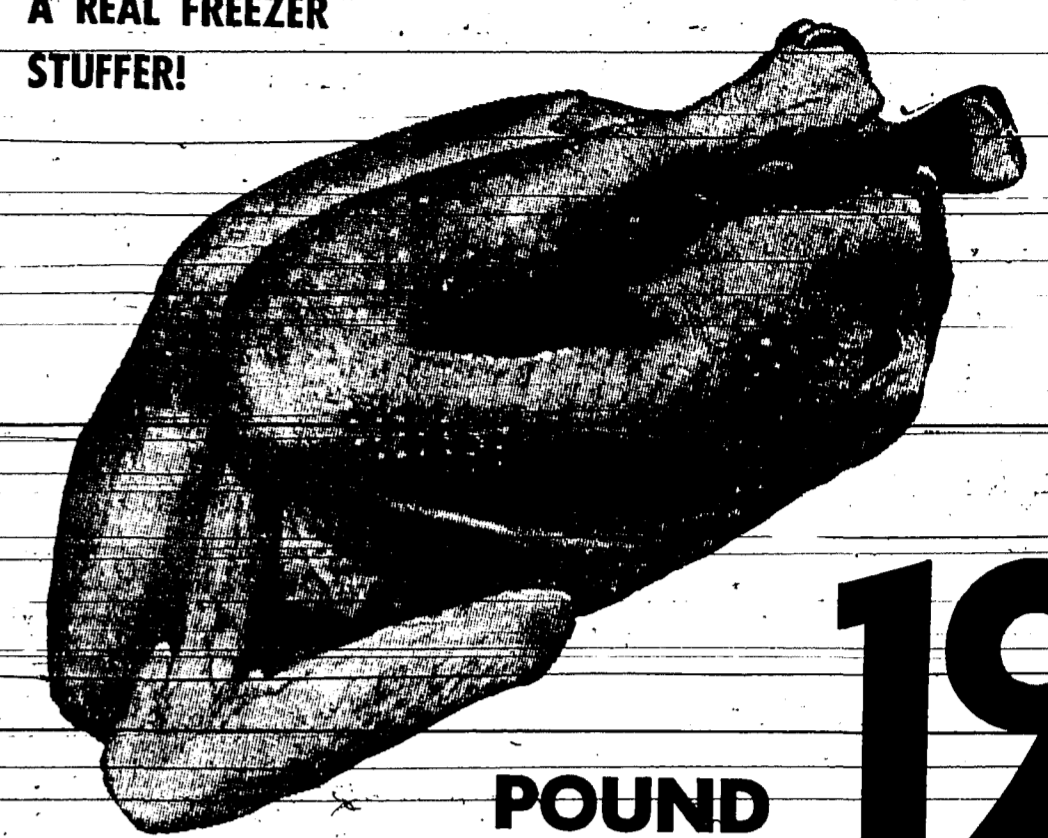

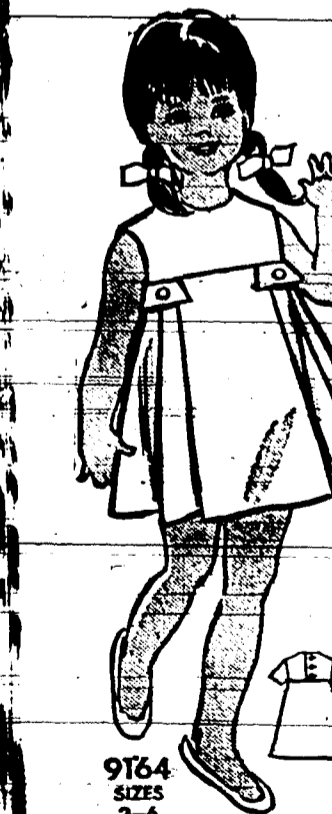

### Calorie Intake Discussed by Woman Writer

NEW YORK, March 17 (UPI) — Eat a chocolate chip cookie and then another and on up to a dozen — and just sit. That's one sure way to add yourself to the statistics concerning the fat of the land. But if you run — 180 steps to the minute — after each cookie, you'll not put on weight. How much energy is there in a cookie? Fifty-one calories. Running three minutes at 180 steps per minute makes the chocolate chip cookie calories expendable. Dr. Frank Konish, of the Department of Food and Nutrition, South Illinois university, Carbondale, gets credit for this bit of intelligence in the battle of the bulge. Dr. Konish, in a report in "Dietetics," Journal of the American Dietetic association, tells of other ways of wearing off the calorie cost of eating. Taking 50 common foods, he figured how long it takes to wear down the calories by walking, bike riding, swimming, running, reclining. This is the new approach to dieting information he thinks is necessary to make Americans lean. Back to the cookie. If you prefer to wear its calories off the ordinary way, reclining, it will take 39 minutes. Eat a dozen and it will take you 28 hours to recline the calories away. Swimming, you wear down a cookie in five minutes; walking, in 10 minutes; bike riding, in six minutes. Dr. Konish figures the calorie-counting booklets ought to show the various ways of wearing off the calorie-cost of eating, giving the waistline-conscious ones a choice of exercise avenues.

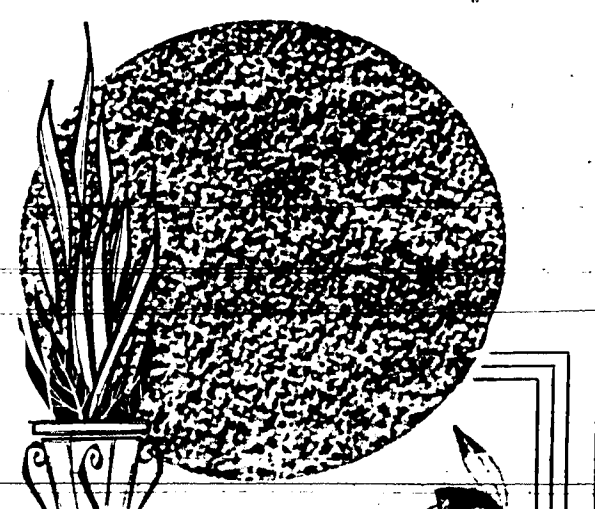

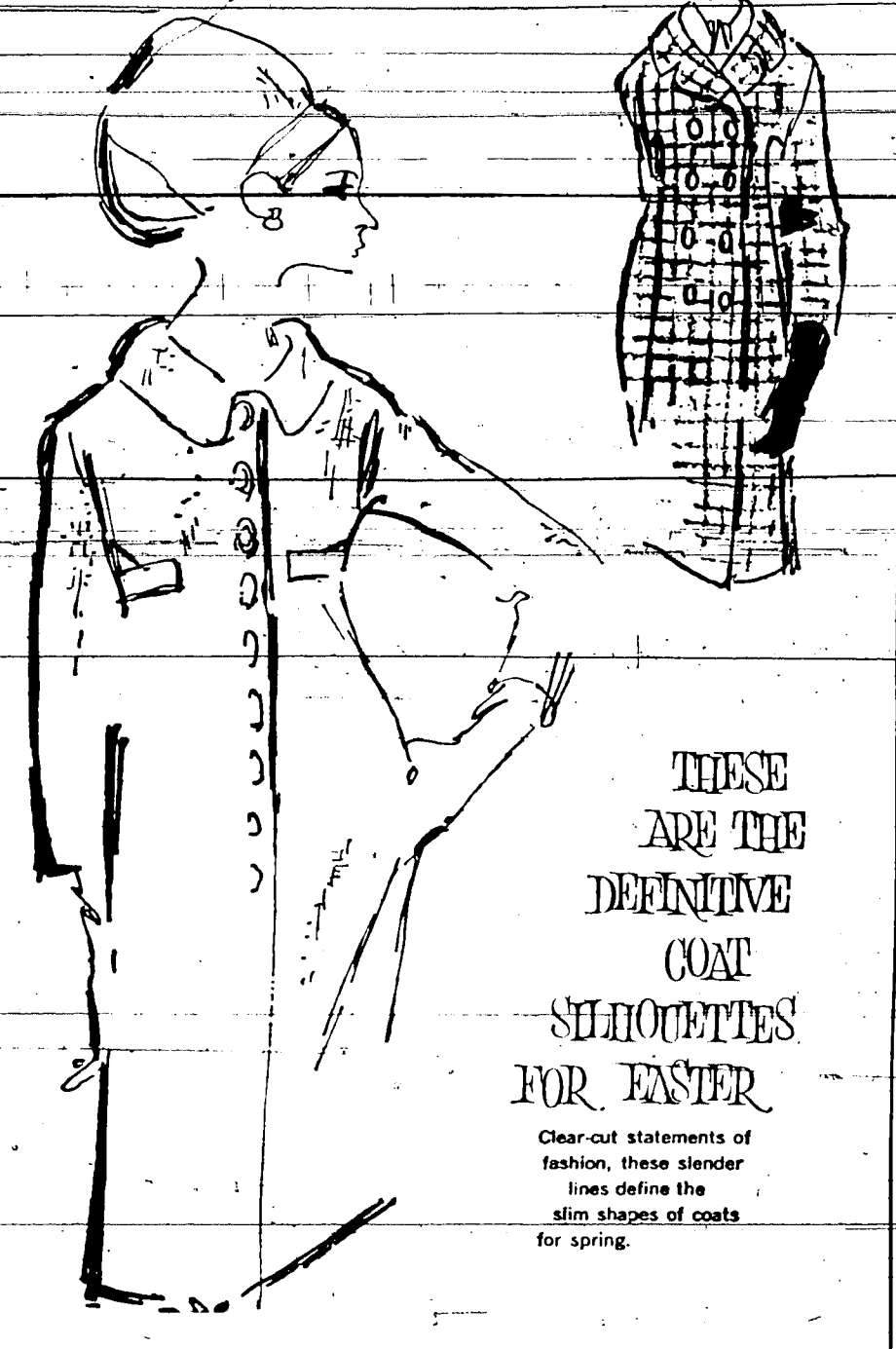

## Fuel Firm Lists Record Earnings

SALT LAKE CITY, March 17 (AP)—Mountain Fuel Supply company had its "best year" in history during 1964 with record earnings of \$5,700,621, the firm's annual report to stockholders today.

"Earnings increased to \$5,700,621, compared with the reported 1963 figure of \$5,589,225," said company president M. M. Fidiar in his message to shareholders.

"Most of the earnings increase is accounted for by record high gas sales," he said. "Non-utility earnings declined somewhat, reflecting a corresponding decline in oil production and an increase in operating costs."

Fidiar said gas sales increased to 112.6 billion cubic feet, stimulated by the coldest weather in the Salt Lake area since 1933.

The firm added 7,851 customers and four new communities to its system during the year—bringing its total service to 213,922 customers in Utah and southwestern Wyoming.

Mountain Fuel continues to investigate possible diversification, the company president said. He added that the firm had acquired control of phosphate ore deposits in southeastern Idaho and northeastern Utah with this in mind.



In your explanations of how the Dow Jones Industrial Average is compiled, you have written that it is figured by adding up the prices of 30 well-known stocks and then dividing by the divisor. You mention that the divisor is now 2.615. And you explain that the divisor has been adjusted downward whenever there has been a stock split or a major stock dividend in one of the stocks used in the average.

That seems elementary. But how is the new divisor computed? I have tried various formulas and have not worked it out. A you and a number of other readers have sent in page after page of complicated formulas indicating that there's a fair amount of interest in this, especially among digitizers who make a hobby out of this kind of thing.

But it's not all that complicated. After there is a split or a stock dividend in one of the 30 stocks used as "components" of the Dow Jones Industrial Average, here's what is done by the people who compute the average.

The new sum (total market price of the 30 stocks) is divided by the old average figure. The answer is the new divisor.

This, I hope, will satisfy you demon statisticians. But, for the sake of other readers, suppose we use an example—with purely imaginary figures.

Let's say that, as of the close of trading on the New York Stock Exchange on a certain day, the market price of each and every one of the 30 components of the Dow Jones Industrial Average is \$100—\$100 a share. (Sure, this is most unlikely. But it makes for easy figuring.) And let's say that the divisor at that time is 2.5—another nice, easy number to work with.

Add up the prices of the 30 stocks and you get a total of \$3,000. Divide that by the divisor (2.5) and the resulting figure for the average comes out as \$1,200. I told you I was keeping this easy.

Now, let's say that just one of the stocks used to compute the average is split, two for one, at the close of business that day. The market price of each share of that particular stock would become \$50, because there will be

twice as many shares of that stock outstanding. Add up the market prices of all 30 stocks—\$90 at \$100 and one at \$50—and you come up with a total of \$2,950. If you continued to use the old divisor (2.5), the resulting figure in the average would be lower—even though true market values of the stocks involved have not changed.

So, the new adjustment is made. The new total (\$2,950) is divided by the old average figure. This produces a new divisor of 2.458. That divisor would then be used until there is another split or major stock dividend in one of the 30 stocks used in that average.

Any of you math wizards who want to prove this can do so by dividing the new total by the new divisor. The result leaves the resulting figure in the average where it belongs—unchanged at \$1,200.

OK! It's 1,200 plus some figures past the decimal point. But I refuse to carry this example on to infinity.

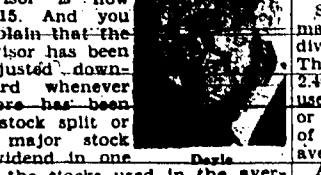

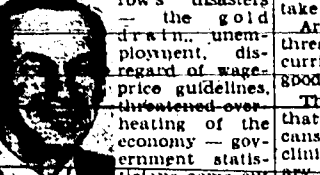

NEW YORK, March 17 (AP)—In college basketball the scoring keeps going up, up—on fewer, but better, shots.  
 NCAA statistics bureau statistics today showed that for the first time major college teams averaged more than 150 points per game. But the number of shots taken by the two teams in reaching that figure averaged far below the record made a dozen years ago.  
 The figures cover 3,944 major college games played through Feb. 27. They show that the average score for two teams in a game was 152.4 up nearly four points from last year's record 148.8. The previous high had been 146.5 in 1956. In achieving the record, the two teams attempted an average of 187.3 shots, both from the floor and from the foul line. In 1956 the average was over 200 shots.  
 The accuracy figures are significant. The teams of 1964-65 connected on half the shots they tried. The field goal accuracy percentage was .430, the free throw accuracy percentage .689 and the over-all figure .500. All three were records.

# Sen. Church Speaks at Potato Meet

POCATELLO, March 17 (AP)—Opposition to federal potato controls is growing. Sen. Frank Church, D., Ida., says and Idaho growers should continue to lead the fight.

"The trend is moving our way," Church told growers attending the two-day Idaho potato conference here in an address last night.

But Church said Idaho farmers should "reach out to these other states that are wavering and help build grower sentiment against controls."

"The Senator said he does not believe a federal control program is a threat as long as prices remain high."

Church also urged support of a potato labeling bill sponsored by himself and Sen. Lew Jordan, R., Ida.

He said the number of potatoes sold nationally under the Idaho label is approximately three times the actual number grown in Idaho.

But he said the labeling problems would not be solved until a method of labeling the potato itself is developed.

"Then," said Church, "the Idaho potato will become as easy to identify as a Sunkist orange."

# Study Shows Doctors Earn Top Money

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—If you want to earn top money, be a doctor, lawyer or merchant chief.

That's the essence of a labor department study on how the nation's approximately 46 million male workers make their living.

The study of 321 occupations showed a median salary range—at the midway point in the high to low listing—of \$14,501 a year for physicians at the top of the list to \$550 for newsboys at the bottom.

Business managers in banking and finance were second highest at \$12,757 and lawyers were high up on the list at \$10,887.

In general, the study shows the higher the education attainment, the higher the salary. But there were some notable exceptions.

Locomotive engineers, for instance, were 38th on the list of highest paid occupations with a median education level of 9.8 years and median pay of \$7,586.

The locomotive engineers, the highest paid craftsmen listed, compared favorably in salary with many professional and managerial workers with college educations.

Milwrights were the next occupational group with less than 10 years of schooling, far down the list in 107th place at a salary of \$5,033.

Although the study is based on 1960 census figures, the author of the report, Max Rutzick of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said the job rankings today are virtually unchanged, although every occupation would show higher salaries now.

The dominance of professional and managerial jobs in the higher salary scales seems to be "a natural structure" that doesn't change much, Rutzick said.

However, he wrote, some professional jobs are comparatively low-paid, especially because of a large number of women in the field who are frequently paid less, "thus lowering the pay scale for the entire occupation."

These include religious workers, with a median education of 16.3 years but a median salary of only \$3,033 for 285th place on the list.

# Astronaut Has Spine Fracture

HOUSTON, Tex., March 17 (AP)—Astronaut R. Walter Cunningham, who landed on his back while trying a body flip on a rebound mat Monday, received a simple compression fracture of a vertebra in his neck, officials of the Manned Spacecraft center said yesterday.

Cunningham, 33, will have to wear a neck brace for about three months. He will be grounded during that period, but will keep up with other phases of astronaut training.

# Meet Favors Proposed Shoshone Job Camp

SHOSHONE, March 17 (AP)—A proposal for a job corps conservation center north of Shoshone was favored at a public meeting Monday night at the courthouse.

Officials of the bureau of land management and Idaho office of economic opportunity gave background information on the purpose, organization and program of the job corps trainees.

Officials present were Arvel Stafford, staff director of the office of economic opportunity; Joe T. Pallini, state director for the bureau of land management; and Sam Heaney forest management specialist for the bureau of land management.

Proposed site for the camp is seven miles north of Shoshone, where a camp for 100 youths would range in ages from 16 to 21 and there would be a staff of 21 persons to handle the organization. These would include a director, deputy work director, education director, counselors, technicians, cooks, medics and clerks.

Their work program might include such things as making a recreational area on the east side of Magic reservoir and near Twin lakes in the fairfield area. They would construct reservoirs and assist with water development and range improvements.

Location of the camp here is proposed because of the extra federal land in the area. Congress has passed a law that the boys cannot drop out of school

just to go into the job corp.

The proposed Wood River camp would be under the general direction of the district manager of the bureau of land management, Shoshone, and under direct supervision of the camp director.

The reason that the camp was proposed at this location is that it is ideally situated from a work project standpoint, officials pointed out. The lands are some of the public lands and contribute to the local economy there are many projects such as roads and trails water development, recreational facilities and other conservation projects that are needed.

The main benefit to a community will be work accomplished in the conservation and re-

creation field. In addition, the college and staff members will be spending money in the local communities. A substantial part of the food and other supplies needed for the camp will be purchased locally.

## God in the Wilderness

The needle on the gas gauge of the plane bounced nervously off "empty" as if it were reacting to something hot.

We must have blacked out for about half an hour from the impact of the crash. The next thing I remember is rubbing my left arm. The pain and knot above my wrist told me immediately it was broken. My right foot was wedged between the seat and the side of the plane; I couldn't move it and it hurt. Then I realized my chin was split, and the right side of my face was bruised.

Ralph's seat had broken loose and he was crumpled against the front of the plane. There was blood all over his face from deep cuts on his head, lips and chin.

Right was coming. We would need protection from the cold to survive. Ralph moved to the back of the plane and returned with some coats and sweaters.

I struggled to get my foot free and finally succeeded. It was badly swollen and felt as if it had been crushed. My feet were like ice.

Cold and sleep are poor partners. We covered ourselves with all the clothing we could find, but it was impossible to sleep much. Occasionally, we talked. Ralph, a devout Mormon, told me not to worry; that we wouldn't die.

"God has placed us in this mess for a reason," he said matter-of-factly. "They will be out searching for us tomorrow, but it may take several days to find us. Meanwhile, there's something I want you to do: read this Bible. Especially the New Testament. Will you?"

I agreed because of the urgency in his voice. Since I'm Jewish, I think he expected an argument. Really, I had intended to read the entire Bible some day because I wanted to learn more about Christianity.

(Editor's Note: Miss Klaben has spent several months in Alaska on an around-the-world trip. Pilot Ralph Flores was taking her to San Francisco in a small plane.)

After that first horrendous night, daylight came about 9 o'clock. Our thermometer registered 48 below. Ralph crawled out of the plane through the broken windshield to build a fire. Meanwhile, I checked our food supply. It consisted of four small cans of sardines, two cans of tuna fish, two cans of fruit salad, a box of saltine crackers, one half bottle of protein pills, one-half bottle of vitamin pills, five pieces of chocolate, two tablets of orange crystals to make a drink. Our water supply was the snow around us. We had to melt it over fire.

In the afternoon of the first day we heard a plane. Neither Ralph's shouting nor waving caught the pilot's attention.

We marked our first week in the wilderness by inventorying our food. It was nearly gone.

I think I worried more about my right foot than I did food. The toes were blackened and they throbbled constantly. I repeatedly asked Ralph if they were dying.

"Don't give up, Helen," he said in a fatherly tone. "Keep praying. Christ will not let us down. At first Ralph's religious zealousness bothered me, but I came to realize that his strong faith was what kept him going. Even though our food supply ran out on the 10th day, he continued to pray. Instead of thanking God for our food, Ralph now prayed for strength to carry on.

The days crept by and finally we reached the one-month mark. We realized that the search had been given up.

Ralph decided he should go looking for help. Maybe he could find a highway or a lumber camp. While he was gone I read

the Bible most every hour of daylight.

When I was alone for the first time a strange calmness swept over me.

As I read the Bible, prayed and meditated about God, I felt his nearness. He had never before been this real to me. I felt love for Him and love for my mother and family as I never had had before.

Instead of complaining, I was able to thank God for His goodness, for Mother, for life. My big worry was that Mother didn't know I was alive. I wanted so much to tell her. Then I realized that for one of the first times in my life I was deeply concerned about someone besides myself.

Ralph returned after eight days, but two days later—our 45th in the wilderness—he left again, hoping to find the source of a buzzing noise. It was ever so faint, but he thought it might be a lumber camp.

That was Thursday. The next day I thought I heard the sound of a plane. Sunday the noise returned.

This time the plane was clearly visible. First I threw an armload of boughs on the fire to raise smoke. Then I signaled with a mirror. Banking sharply, the pilot brought the light craft around and circled back. He had spotted me.

The next morning men came in on foot and carried me plane back three miles to the rescue plane. Another party had found Ralph and we rendezvoused in an Indian trapper's cabin. From there, they flew us to the hospital at Whitehorse. There I called Mom in Brooklyn and we took turns crying.

Two days later I went to Ralph's room to say goodbye. He had lost 66 pounds—down to 120 (I dropped from 140 to 100).

Upon arriving in New York, I was taken to a hospital where the toes of my right foot were amputated. Doctors told me it wouldn't be much of a handicap, and they were right.

While recovering in the hospital, I had time to review the events that took place during my 45 days away from civilization.

One thing I see is that God was able to use this time to speak to me, because for once I had time to listen. The distractions were minimized. True, I was cold, hungry and in pain, yet I believe even these misdeeds were helpful in turning my complete attention to God.

Now that I am back in college, I think a lot about my Alaskan adventure. From it came one overwhelming truth: God is Love. This truth is mine, not because someone else told me, but because I experienced it myself.

### St. Louis Police Have New Weapon

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 17.—The St. Louis police department is armed with a new weapon which it thinks one day may be shooting down more criminals than all the revolvers and riot guns on the force.

It is a computer system that sits in a spotlessly clean, pastel-colored room on the third floor of the sprawling old police headquarters. The machine whirrs and clicks as crime information is fed into them. They act as a great, impersonal eye at studying the daily crime picture in this city.

The computer system is claimed by the St. Louis police. They were among the first in the nation to adopt a canine corps, and to use a "decoy squad" of plainclothes men and women who roam the city's high crime areas.

The computers will be an integral part of the St. Louis department's fight against crime. Other police departments are using computers to make out payrolls, keep track of records, and equipment and such chores but none are known to be using them in actual police work.

The St. Louis operation already has been a subject of study by Scotland Yard, the U. S. secret service and several city police

departments, including Chicago and New Orleans.

The new crime-fighting technique has been in use only since November, but the department says it has already had one immensely successful side benefit: the elimination of some hand-written daily reports by officers. Telephone reports are fed directly to the computer room.

In charge of the computer operation is Scott Hovey, former designer of computer systems for a California firm. He says the possibilities of computer uses in combating crime are virtually endless.

"Right now we are feeding vast amounts of crime information and statistics into the system. The information is fed in within seconds to officers' every auto license number in the state."

"Formerly it took six months to draw a patrol plan for the city from manually kept records—and it was obsolete by the time they got into use. The computer will be able to whip such a plan out in less than a day."

Eventually, this police computer will do away with ponderous record systems. It will be able to furnish criminal information to officers at the scene within seconds.

Hovey gave an example: "Say an officer picks up a suspicious character. He sends in the man's name, physical description and other pertinent information. Within seconds the machine will know whether the man is wanted for anything. Maybe his physical description fits that of a holdup

man who had pulled a robbery just a short time ago. This and

The United States has the general approval of its Allies throughout the world for its raids on North Viet Nam.

Even France, which wants immediate negotiations on Viet Nam, is not against the U. S. air strikes.

A survey of world capitals shows, however, an undercurrent of opposition to the U. S. moves

behind the government approach in some countries.

Britain, France and West Germany—the three major Allies of the United States—have given backing to the raids in varying degrees.

Britain is the strongest. London's view is that communist North Viet Nam is backing the guerrillas in the South, cannot expect to escape the effects of American counter-action.

But the Labor party's left wing, about 50 strong, has urged Prime Minister Harold Wilson to oppose an extension of hostilities to the North.

**EDITORS NOTE:** In the following exclusive interview with St. Patrick, the author, a link is made between the past and beyond the comprehension of the alien mind, the national apocryphal aspects of the changing face of Ireland.

**BY DONALD O. HIGGINS**  
**DUBLIN, March 17 (AP)**—First of all, St. Patrick, I would like to express appreciation on behalf of all Irishmen for your kindness in granting this interview, the first of its kind in recent times.

St. Patrick: "Not at all, it is indeed a very rare pleasure to talk to one of me own."

**Question:** "Now that the celebration of your feast day has assumed world-wide proportions, we in Ireland have often wondered if you had been able to organize anything special among the Irish up there."

I have been particularly impressed by those giant spectacles along Fifth avenue and other American cities."

## Idahoan Edits Book on West

By JEAN MIZER  
HAILEY, March 17 — Fred A. Picard, a sometimes-Idahoan and cultural director of the College of Idaho, has co-edited an unusual book recently released by the University of Minnesota press. Entitled "The Old Land and the New" the volume is an authentic translation of the journals of two German Swiss immigrants to the United States in the 1920's. Extensive literature has been produced portraying the territorial influx of Europeans into America in the late nineteenth century. The journals which form "The Old Land and the New" however, are unique as vivid personal insights into the smaller immigration into the raw ante-

bellum nation. With the candor and saltiness of words forged from vital personal experience, Johannes Schweizer and Jakob Rutlinger wrote daily accounts of their momentous and trying adjustments to the amazing new country. The kaleidoscope of word pictures and personal responses to the drama of new lives in a new world present two major contrasts—the austere but dearly familiar old life against the bewildering, sprawling, rich new one, and the realization of the crudity, meanness and cruelty of a pioneer nation against its opulence, promise and open generosity. "It seems as though a capricious genie had chopped up all possible good and bad together in a concoction and poured it

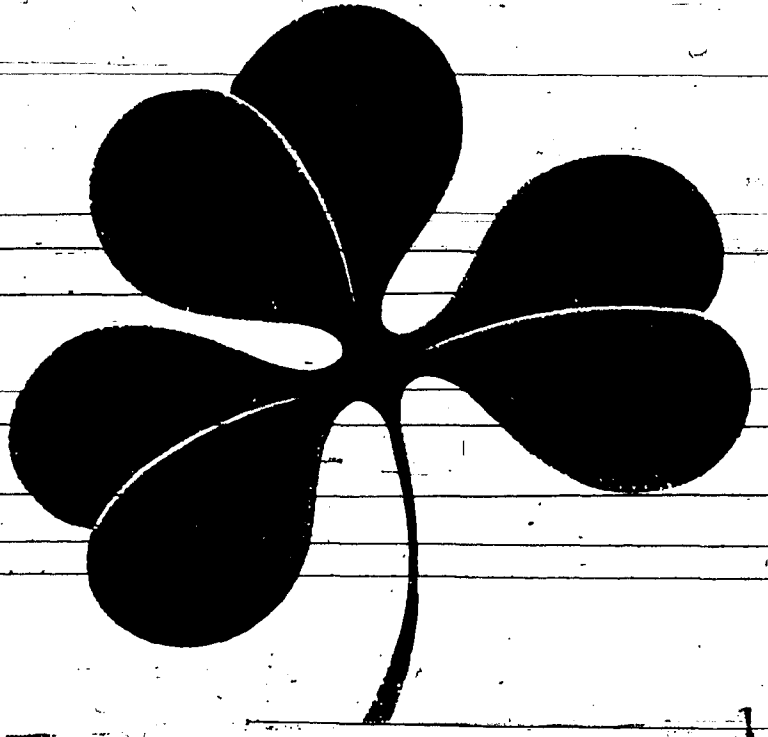
over America," Schweizer wrote rather wearily. Both journal writers were acute observers and their writing conveys a keen sense of people and places from the beginnings of their journeys in the canton of St. Gallen through their moving along the American seaboard from New York to Maryland and as far west as Ohio. Schweizer, wandering from place to place selling Bibles, enjoyed dazzling views of wealthy town houses and learned appreciation of the farmer struggling from indentured slavery to proud independence. He saw Yankee ingenuity and fantastic endurance in far flung poverty-ridden homesteads. Rutlinger put his Swiss craftsmanship into manufacturing of kitchen tablecloths and his

knowledge into teaching school. His activities gave him insight into a people fantastically optimistic with material growth and culturally as barren as the most deprived peasant. Their accounts are telling, often caustic, and utterly lacking in the romantic overtones usually painted over early American life. They are truly an "inside the early USA" in a matter-of-fact, honest approach. The physical appearance of the book is made handsome and interesting by the sketches by Hans Erni, internationally known Swiss artist. Robert Billigmeier, a faculty member of the University of California at Santa Barbara, assisted Picard with the editing. Picard will be best remembered locally as the former owner-manager of the smart Picard shop at Sun Valley and for his original designs and exclusive ski clothing—and as a patron of the
