

T. F. College Gets Permission to Use High School

Agreement on use of Twin Falls high school facilities by the Twin Falls junior college this fall has been reached by the junior college board and school district No. 411 board of trustees. Eldon Evans, junior college board member, announced Wednesday that the school board has given the go-ahead for the college to use high school facilities starting this fall, from the time high school lets out in the afternoon to as late as needed. For use of the facilities, Evans said, the junior college will pay the school district any excess costs incurred because of the use, plus a proportionate share of depreciation on buildings and equipment used.

Miss Saubert, McCall, was the defending champion and has battled with the Gotschel sisters ever since the 1964 Olympics at Innsbruck, Austria.

Bills to Enact Sales Tax in Idaho Signed

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—President Johnson's multi-billion-dollar program of hospital and nursing care for the elderly under social security was approved yesterday by the house ways and means committee. The measure was okayed over solid Republican protests despite addition of a GOP-sponsored voluntary insurance program to cover doctor bills, which were omitted from the original version.

2 Firms Must Pay Claims To Hospital

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court ruled for a second time Tuesday that the Krieger Construction company and American Casualty company must pay claims in connection with construction of the Minidoka County Memorial hospital. L. H. Krieger admitted the claims for labor and materials were justified but court said, but denied liability on grounds his assets had been assigned to the American Casualty company. American Casualty denied liability on grounds Krieger had given the claimants promissory notes to obtain premature release of retainage funds held by the county pending completion of the hospital.

Strike Against Can Firm Ends

NEW YORK, March 24 (AP)—The United Steelworkers strike against the country's major can and container manufacturers ended last night. USW locals representing workers in Continental Can company plants ratified a new work contract agreement with Continental, ending a 74-day strike against the company. Sixteen thousand Continental workers were ordered back to their jobs immediately in plants across the country.

Ranger 9 Dives to Death; Close-ups Of Moon Televised

PASADENA, Calif., March 24 (AP)—Ranger 9 televised live today a dramatic sequence of more than 200 close-ups of the moon as it dove to its death in a lunar crater. The beautifully illuminated series began by showing three craters in sharp detail from 1,300 miles up, and finished by displaying tiny pock marks on the floor of the crater Alphonsus from but a few miles away. The live television, relayed to home viewers by commercial TV networks, was a first for the series, which now has three straight successes in returning close shots of the little known lunar surface.

Reapportionment Action Is Delayed

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—The Idaho legislature took care today of an oversight in its regular session—appropriating \$12,240,000 for the health department—but delayed action on its major business pending further behind-the-scenes discussions. Caucuses were ordered in both house and senate to review proposals to revise legislative membership and congressional districts to conform with court rulings. Leaders expressed hope the special session could adjourn by tonight. The health department appropriation was overlooked in the flurry of winding up the 74-day regular session last Thursday. The senate amended the bill by adding \$75,000 for State Hospital North at Orofino, increasing the institution's appropriation to \$2,075,000. The house concurred in the amendment, then overlooked passing the measure in its revised form.

End Nears

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 24 (AP)—Alabama's civil rights marchers trudged nearer the state capital today and their ranks swelled as hundreds of participants streamed in for a march-ending rally at the statehouse Thursday. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., rejoined the march after a trip to Cleveland, O. When he arrived at the airport on the city's outskirts, King was within a mile of the long, uneven line of marchers. Their ranks had grown to more than 1,000 after the fourth day's march, started by 300.

Climb May Be Slowed by Winds, Snow

WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory, March 24 (AP)—Clouds, wind and a threat of snow descended on Mt. Kennedy today as Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, guided by expert mountaineers, prepared his assault on the summit of the 18,900-foot peak. It was not believed the weather would endanger the success of the climb, but did mean the New York Democratic senator might be pinned down at the base camp for a day or more after the descent. Kennedy has with him what is described as a furred black tiger. It is believed he will place it at the summit as a memorial to his late brother, President John F. Kennedy, for whom the Canadian government named the mountain. Kennedy and four other climbers were presumed to have spent the night at a second camp 4,000 feet further up the mountain. There is no radio contact with the climbers or the base camp. Newsday from the air, Kennedy and the others waved at a plane flying overhead.

Water Will Be Turned Into Canals

JEROME, March 24—Water will be turned into the North Side canal system Thursday at a miller according to Douglas E. Finkelnburg, manager. Farmers are urged to remove panels, fences, and other obstruction from the canals in preparation for the water. Flow past Mitter dam has been reduced to continue the filling of American Falls reservoir, which is expected to be completed about the middle of April. Water will be withheld from some of the smaller canals and laterals until last minute maintenance is completed, as frost is still hampering some of the work. Water will be available for irrigation as soon as it is distributed through the system.

Russian Art Gallery Is Opened

MOSCOW, MARCH 24 (AP)—The Soviet Union, in its search for hard currency, has opened a Moscow art gallery especially to sell foreigners ancient Russian icons and modern Soviet paintings. For years these have been sought after by many eager tourists, diplomats and visiting consuls. But they were not always easy to find. The buyer had to make the rounds of the city's antiquarian second-hand shops, frequently spending hours in long lines, and paying high prices. The really lucky ones might run into an artist who sold some of his paintings. The wise avoided the seedy "businessmen" in drainpipe trousers—the "businessmen"—who speculated illegally in Russian icons along some of Moscow's main streets. But now the authorities have stepped in, apparently realizing the profit involved in the workings of that inexorable law of an accumulated supply, an undeniable demand. Located in the shadows of city hall's dark red building, the new art salon has attractive plate glass windows decorated with en-

ticing artistic tidbits, crockery—correspondent on a recent visit. "Paintings? Something modern? Soviet realism?" the salesman asks. "You state your choice." An attractive girl assistant knocked in brown liris a trap door in the parquet floor... the grinding of machinery... the paintings appear, unceremoniously, unframed, on a dumb-water. The viewing begins. "The prices?" "They can be high. As high as \$100,000." "Why, in fact, we even have some from the Kremlin." We asked the museum keepers if they could let us have a few. A lot piled up during the ages. They said we could. "But the prices can run high, you know... up to \$20,000, some of them," one salesman told this.

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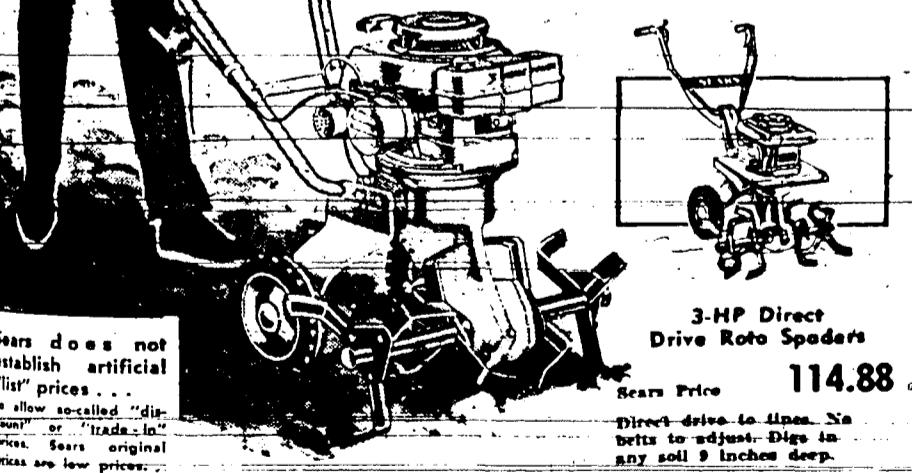

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Her Plan Works
Elmore county Probate Judge Jesse Proshold has proved that publicizing the names of juvenile offenders in Elmore county curbs juvenile crime. Several years ago, when Elmore county had an alarming increase in crime, Judge Proshold started publicizing names of offenders. When juvenile crime declined, she discontinued releasing names. But another rise in the number of arrests of juveniles prompted her to start releasing names of juvenile offenders again. The experience proves that the practice of naming offenders publicly is a deterrent in Elmore county, at least.

Critics of the Elmore county probate judge's policy will be quick to point out that she's dealing with relatively small communities, places in which "everyone knows everyone else." The critics also will note that Judge Proshold processed only 81 offenders in her court last year. Nevertheless, it would be interesting to see what would happen if her policies on releasing names of juvenile offenders were used in a larger center of population by a court with a much heavier case load.

Speaking in Boise the other day, Judge Proshold declared parents are responsible for their children and should set the example for behavior. "Some parents are so busy to care for their children," she declared, "if her observations of the responsibilities and shortcomings of parents are true, then Judge Proshold should carry her publicity policy one step farther and always name the parents of minors who run afoul of the law."

Many judges handling juvenile cases declare that's the wrong approach. Yet their own case loads continue to grow and grow under protection from the glare of publicity. Many judges will refuse to report even the number of juvenile cases they handle and perhaps that refusal is a sort of confession that their own systems are failing. So why are they so adamant about trying the plan of full publicity?

There's no denying the logic of some of Judge Proshold's statements in support of her policy. She points out that parents should be aware of juvenile offenders and their identity to control associations of their own children. The Elmore county judge also declares, "The majority of teenagers are outstanding and shouldn't have to bear the stigma of delinquency because of a few unknowns who leave a bad impression." This statement goes right along with the opinions expressed by delegates to both Boys' state and Girls' state last year. Both sessions supported resolutions in favor of releasing the names of juvenile offenders, indicating the youngsters themselves realize the actions of a few can reflect on the entire group.

Here's another case where most of the "experts" in the juvenile field firmly believe a policy different from their own will not work. They're so firmly convinced by themselves that they won't even try anything different.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?
Taxpayers consumers might wonder a good deal about a statement attributed to Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman in a Chicago talk. He said the Johnson administration may propose that promised increases in farm income be sought through higher farm product prices rather than through bigger government subsidies. Any program requiring higher market prices for farm products would be little different in principle from outright government subsidy. The big difference, of course, is that the price of the farm program wouldn't be reflected in the federal budget. However, it would still be financed by money from the public, whether it came directly from the consumer's pocket or from the federal treasury.

It's difficult to see how agriculture could have any real and lasting benefits from a program that depended on federal law which in effect would set the market price of produce. It would still be a poor substitute for the law of supply and demand. The American Farm Bureau federation has contended for years that most of the ills of agriculture stem directly from government rules, regulations and interference with the normal marketing processes. It is argued that agriculture can never be healthy until it is permitted to function normally under the laws of supply and demand. Of course, the marginal operators or those involved in trying to farm marginal land would be lost without the government program, which may account for some of the opposition to ending federal subsidies and other programs. On the other hand many good farmers have expressed a willingness to take their chances with the laws of supply and demand.

WASHINGTON, March 24 Uncle Sam's mealy-mouthed policy on birth control around the world illustrates one of the major problems of our republican form of government — the politician's fear of offending any group in the population. The agency for international development (AID) has been forced by this fear to adopt a policy that is not only impractical but ridiculous. In response to President Johnson's pledge to help the world deal with the population explosion, AID has decided to tell the affected nations the facts of life but to withhold the means of solving their problem. AID will supply information, training and "educational material" for countries asking for help in their birth control programs. But it will not give them, or sell them, any birth control devices.

INCONSISTENCY — I do not hold that Uncle Sam should expand his function as a kind of official nanny, or midwife, to the world. But if it is official policy to help nations in what the experts call "family planning," it is plain stupid to limit that help to advice.

Such a policy, of course, is another attempt to appease those forces which are opposed to birth control. Some socialist on high has decided that it is not immoral to tell folks how to "plan" their families so long as they are not given the means to implement that plan. But if I were opposed to birth control, I would properly maintain that telling parents there are ways to avoid having babies is just as sinful as providing the device therefor.

CARDINAL CUSHING'S POSITION — A recent statement by Cardinal Cushing of Boston should give our timid politicians an excuse for acting a little more realistically. Cardinal Cushing, who is recognized as a powerful spokesman for Catholic opinion, deposes in simple language anyone can understand that Catholics "do not seek to impose by law their moral views on other members of society."

Cardinal Cushing's statement was made in support of a proposition to legalize the dissemination of birth-control information and devices in Massachusetts. But it applied to the wider-world problem when he states, "it doesn't seem reasonable to me to forbid in civil law a practice that can be considered a matter of private morality." In other words, the cardinal has spelled out the problem for what it is — the private concern of individual parents. He does not say Catholics are in favor of birth control, but merely that the government has a right to legalize it. When he says "Catholics do not need the support of civil law to be faithful to their own religious convictions," he states the case for all sects. A testifying Baptist does not give his imprimatur to the consumption of hard liquor merely because he lives in a country which permits it.

NOT GOVERNMENT'S AFFAIR — There is after all, such a thing as a respect for the beliefs of others. If a Catholic or an Episcopalian wants to limit the size of his family, it may be proper for his church to try to persuade him of the error of his ways. But the government has no right to use its power to brand him a criminal. In the so-called emerging countries people are having too many children they don't want merely because they don't know how to stop. AID, which emphasizes U. S. opposition to "dictating population policies to another country," in effect is doing just that by refusing birth-control equipment to countries which ask for it.

Views of Others

END TO PRIZE FIGHTING?
A writer on boxing spoke in this newspaper the other day of "the moralistic reformers who seem to knock out their enemy by slow starvation — death by knockout." It is "moralistic" to call for abolition of professional prizefighting as a brutal, indeed murderous, sport that degrades those who watch it as well as those who engage in it, then we plead guilty to the charge. When it is suggested that it would be more admirable to be against "twenty deaths by slow starvation" than "one death by knockout," we wonder what subject is under discussion. What has death by "slow starvation" got to do with boxing, except when poverty afflicts the pitiful, punch-drunk has-beens of the fight game? We are against murder in the ring, even if it is called a profession. It is a profession, and force the fighters and their managers to seek another, more civilized, way of making a living.

One day last June, under the headlines of London, Sydney and Manila, three deaths of boxers from injuries suffered in the ring were recorded in the press. The difference between prizefighting and those in other sports is that uniquely in professional fighting the intent is to batter the opponent into such insensibility that he cannot get up and go on.

IMITATE INSTANT FRENCH PROGRAM
Almost "instant" French: A unique "French-in-a-minute" course has recently caught the attention of educators in southern California. The course, devised by French-born educator-linguist Michel Thomas, uses no textbooks, notebooks or blackboards. Mr. Thomas insists that the student relax as much as possible and not even think about French, much less do homework, outside of class hours.

Over the years, Mr. Thomas has specialized in teaching foreign languages this way to adults individually. Grace Kelly is one distinguished alumnus. Now he has begun to teach groups. He was prompted by the success of a recent experiment with five teen-agers, aged 14 to 17, who learned enough French in six hours to qualify for second-semester college French courses.

INVITATION TO GOLF
Former Vice President Nixon will be in political eclipse, but he has made the grade in another direction. He has been playing golf with former President Eisenhower. During General Eisenhower's eight years in the White House, while he was engaged in his much-publicized rounds of golf, he never invited Mr. Nixon to go along, not even to caddy for him. But now Mr. Nixon is not just an ambitious young politician, he is a successful corporation lawyer. Has this made the difference? — St. Louis Post-Dispatch

As a new era dawns for relations between West Germany and Israel, western diplomacy seeks to assess the effect on the man who started it all. When President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic successfully used his blackjacked tactics to force suspension of West German arms shipments to Israel, an end result he could not have wished for would be establishment of formal diplomatic relations between West Germany and Israel, his greatest enemy.

So it appeared that despite Nasser's early boasts and threats there would be serious second thoughts. But regardless of the ultimate effect upon Nasser and the Arab states, ripples of the affair were extending beyond the Middle East. For communist East Germany's strongest man, Walter Ulbricht, whose visit to Cairo touched off the affair, there was a chance for respectability that would come through diplomatic recognition of his puppet regime. For the West Germans there was growing doubt about the effectiveness of the Hallstein policy which for 15 years has dictated a diplomatic break with any capitalist state that recognized communist East Germany.

U. S. Is in Fourth Year of Viet Nam War

SAIGON, March 24—The United States is now deep into the fourth year of an increasingly bloody battle for this land of mountains, jungles, rice paddies and communist guerrillas.

Since May, 1961, when the U. S. first committed itself to support of the anti-communist government, it has poured in vast quantities of men and machines.

From rifles to rockets, from jeeps to tanks, from helicopters to jet bombers, the United States has moved in billions of dollars worth of the most sophisticated weapons on its arsenal.

It has given freely of its brains, its blood and its lives.

All has been to little avail. The world's mightiest nation has been unable to find the key to success in Southeast Asia.

From the day it set foot in this unhappy land, the U. S. course in the fight against the communist has been downhill.

There is one more thing that the United States has committed

here: Prestige. This is a crucial element in the struggle that now is raging.

American prestige has been laid so on the line that defeat has become virtually an unacceptable alternative to more and bigger war.

Only last month Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara told a committee of the congress that the United States had little choice but to make its stand in Viet Nam.

"This commitment in Southeast Asia also finds voice in the so-called domino theory, much and loosely thrown about by American pundits and politicians.

If the theory is correct—and there are doubts that it is—the fall of South Viet Nam would, like one domino toppling

all the others in a line, lead to the communization of Asia.

America's line-of-defense runs the theory, would be pushed back to Pearl Harbor.

Though this may be a more pessimistic view than the facts warrant, it has some effect on the U. S. strategists who are responsible for the recent series of bombing raids against North Viet Nam.

The bombings represent the crux of the political-economic-diplomatic dilemma facing the U. S.

That dilemma is this:

—The communists are running a successful guerrilla war against South Vietnamese troops which now have the total backing of the Americans. The Reds have shown no indication they intend to lose over the confer-

ence table a battle they are winning in the field.

Given their expansionist, revolutionary philosophy and propaganda, it would be very difficult for them to back out in the face of American bombs without making the same admission Nikita Khrushchev made at the time of the Cuban missile crisis—that communism is, to coin a word, invincible.

—The United States, by the very same token, must demonstrate graphically to the Chinese communists, as it did to the Russians, that they can be beaten.

So far it has not been able to do so on the land, where the communists have special ability, special training, virtually unlimited patience.

As a result, the United States

has taken to the air, attacking what the communists call their "sacred soil."

Can United States bombs convince the communists they are invincible? In other words, is victory possible?

These are questions only the communists can answer—and perhaps they themselves have not yet calculated, the cost of getting what they want. In any case they have not yet shown their hand.

No one can say what the communists are planning.

Neither can anyone say what the Americans are doing.

The fact is that by comparison with the communists' objectives, those of the Americans are as muddy as Mississippi river water.

What the communists want in Viet Nam is clear. They want a revolution that will lay the country in their hands. They have been fighting this revolu-

tion, slowly, patiently, but successfully for more than 10 years.

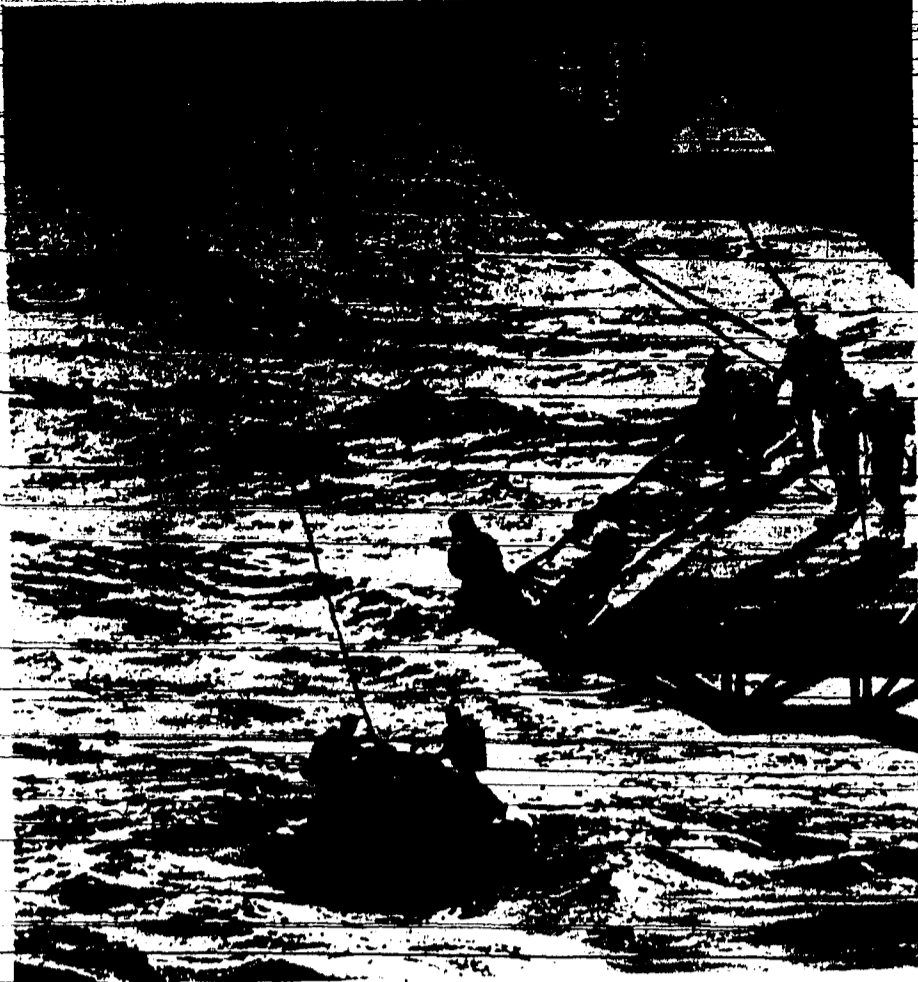

Special Unit Has Heavy Going in Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, March 24 (AP)—As an experiment in unconventional warfare, the U.S. special forces appear to have encountered heavy going in Viet Nam.

"We should be out there in the mountains fighting the Viet Cong at their own game, but where are we?" said a U.S. special forces officer at one of the group's camps.

"We are stuck in camp, and the enemy can see our every move. We have lost control of our troops to the Vietnamese."

"And to cap all of this we will be posted soon to advise district chiefs. That is not a job for special forces, certainly not the special forces I thought I was joining."

These comments put in a nutshell the feelings of many special forces personnel now serving in Viet Nam.

Originally a free-wheeling organization established as a counterinsurgency force, the special forces blossomed under President John F. Kennedy, who saw in their unorthodox concept an answer to the burgeoning trouble of Southeast Asia.

More recently, Special Forces seems to have been having a lean time of it.

A U.S. officer said: "When I volunteered out of the artillery and into the special forces a few years ago, my commanding officer told me, 'You're mak-

ing a mistake. The generals will kill the special forces and your career will die with it.'"

Whether the generals are killing the special forces, or whether they are dying a natural death, there is no doubt that the objectives of the special forces have not been met in South Viet Nam.

Up to about one year ago they were making progress with one of the objectives — winning over mountain tribes to the government cause.

Scores of special teams were operating in Viet Nam's mountains, working with primitive mountain people and supplying weapons to fight the Viet Cong.

There were misgivings about the program. For one thing, the Montagnards were getting thousands of weapons to fight the Viet Cong today — who would they use them against tomorrow? And some of the Montagnards defected to the Viet Cong.

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There was also the problem of allegiance to South Viet Nam. The Montagnards dislike lowland Vietnamese, but they appeared to love the tough U.S. special forces men who worked amongst them.

Eventually, the U.S.-created Montagnard "strike forces" which went under Vietnamese control. Many were turned into popular force units under command of province chiefs.

The loss of control over the Montagnards is now regretted by many officers.

Many U.S. officers charge also that the strike forces are kept in static defense of permanent installations.

Other officers said the special forces have been reduced to an advisory effort, as has the regular U.S. army in Viet Nam.

"The only control we have is that we control the purse strings. This is more than other agencies have and it can be made to be extremely effective in getting what we want."

"But it isn't enough," a captain said.

A U.S. spokesman says about 1,100 U.S. special forces personnel are scattered throughout the country in 40 camps. The main center is at the coastal town of Nha Trang.

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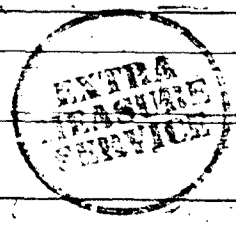
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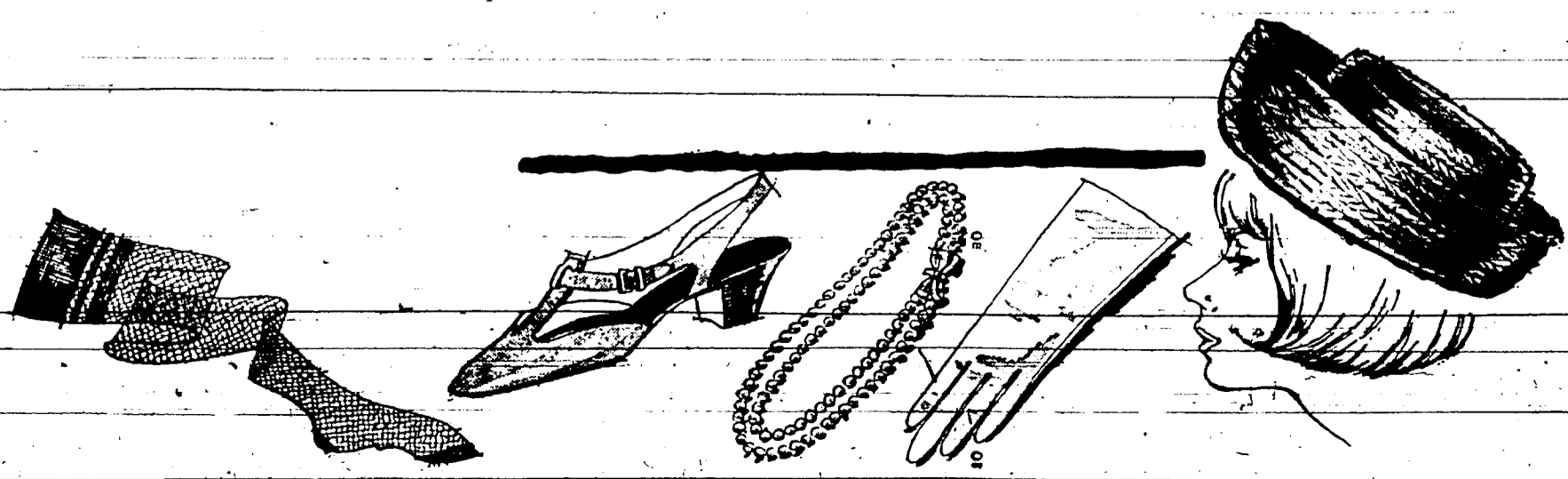
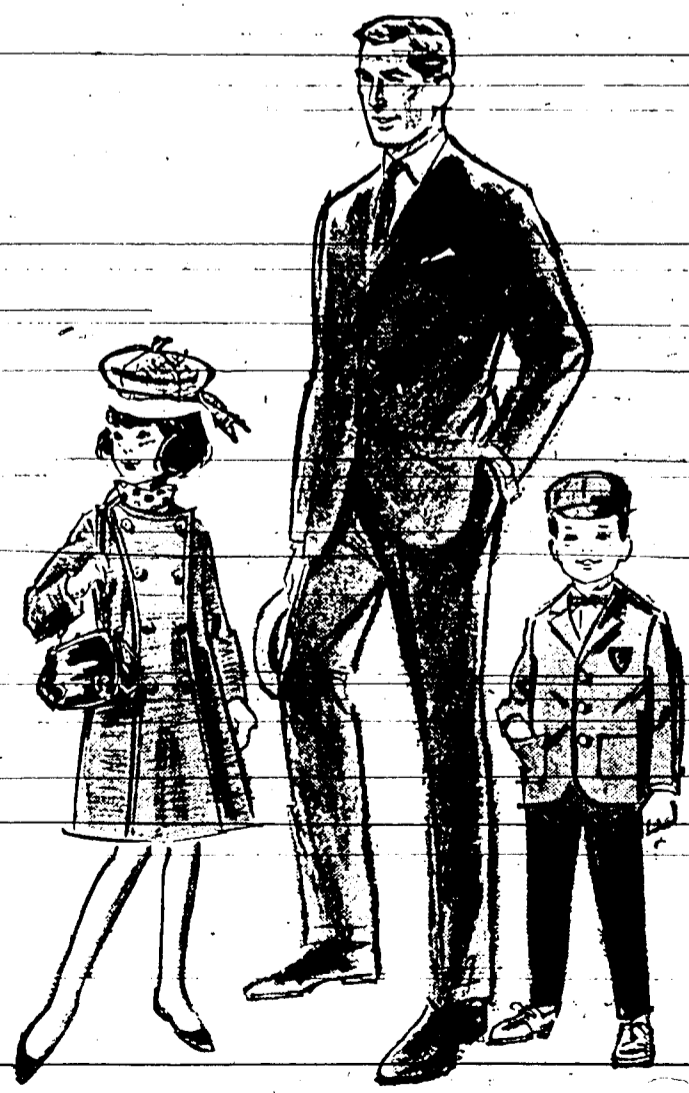

Spring Fashions Represent Gathering of Recent Trends

Starting with the theory that individuality is the essence of good taste and good fashion, new spring styles develop the soft, feminine, ladylike look in a diversity of pretty ways. Blingette news centers around slim, gentle shaping that follows and glorifies the feminine form without tightly "fitting" it. The line is slender, supple, subtly mobile. Color and fabric contribute to the gentle loveliness.

All in all, the fashions of this new season represent a gathering together of recent fashion trends. The skimmie shape, the now-classic A-line, the lively skirt, the feminine touch of full "flair" and bow—they've all been seen before, and they're seen again for spring '65.

Yet, spring fashion sums up tried and true ideas so deftly and delightfully that the total result is very fresh, very new-looking indeed—new and sophisticated simplicity, new in youthful verve, new in excellence of fabric and tailoring in every price range, and new in the many

variations on the theme of the well-bred, ladylike look—variations calculated to please the personal tastes of every woman, yet related to the prevailing mood of fashion.

This mood is reflected in tops bloused and beautiful; skirts on the move in pleats, flares or gathers; in ruffles, bows and flounces, handled with discretion; in ease everywhere. It's a relaxed mood, as seen in deep-cut sleeves, lowered waists, tunics, longer jackets.

Pale pastels delicately hue florals, muted pastels color apron prettily and perfectly. Even the deeper, bolder shades seem misted over with a soft veil of color. Browns from light to dark take on a mellow tone; navy looks richer, gray very young and fresh.

All the neutrals, including black, often add the crisp touch of white, in itself an important spring "color."

In fabrics, a return to flatter, smoother textures reflects the ladylike interpretation of men's wear textures, and sometimes in airy, open weaves such as the crocheted look.

For further individuality, spring fashion offers a counter-trend to the soft, feminine styles. Dubbed "tough chic," this trend is somewhat sportive in inspiration, with emphasis on a lean, spare, elegantly uncluttered look.

News in hole for spring includes: shorter, fuller skirts in both suits and dresses; the costume look of the dress with jacket or coat; and the equally important look of the "separate" dress, returning to fashion prominence: tunic dresses and suits; the cape coat and the wrap coat; slim coats, often flaring toward the hemline, in both single and double-breasted versions; knits over on the increase.

Men Favor Slip-on Type Dress Shoes

This spring, the easy-going male will be wearing new slip-ons for every occasion. During business, social and leisure hours, soft lightweight slippers in a wide variety of styles and textures will keep him a happy refugee from both foot and fashion-fatigue.

Other "soft shoe" styles that will be stepping lightly through spring, reports Shoe Fashions service, are moccasins, moc wedges, slippers and boots for casual outfits, and newly slimmer brogues and oxfords for more formal wear.

The increasingly important "dress casual" category has brought about the expansion of style variations on the slip-on. The choice of leather textures has widened—now encompassing smooth, fine and heavy grained, brushed, suede, waxy and embossed leathers.

Perforated trim—traditional on slip-ons. A novel touch to saddle-strap slip-ons is the elasticated straps for snug fit.

The classic casual slip-on is the moccasin, and for those not hidebound to tradition, there are interesting moccasin variations—high risers, moc bluchers with handstitching, smooth leather moccasins with contrasting leather accents.

Formally attired, the leather slip-on adopts a sleek, outlined look. Side gores are usually hidden, toes are plain but lightly perfed, and leather textures are mirror-smooth or very fine grained.

A dress and business shoe to depend on is the handsome leather brogue. Recent streamlining has slimmed the silhouette and lightened the load of the brogue. But, it's hearty masculinity is sustained through pinkish details, five and six-eyelet closings, and perforations. Water-thin linings of porous leather keep feet cool and dry through the warmest weather.

The leather oxford is a staple in almost every man's shoe wardrobe. This spring, the oxford's long list of fashion features gets new additions in mood effects, high-riding tongues, double tones or textures, and harness and hand-stitching.

A full span of brown tones—from rich deep brown to light golden brown—is most important in men's footwear this spring. But, said the "natural leather" colors and, of course, black will also be prominent. Big news will be the increasing use of white in men's shoes, especially in combination with black and brown in dress and casual.

Wiggery Look More Evident Than Ever

Wigs and wiglets, with great stress on the latter, are more in evidence than ever.

Not just making their appearance in the evening, they've adapted themselves to the every day go-to-business or market life.

An entirely new, more versatile world of wiglets has come into being. The "honeycomb" is one exciting example. Made on a round, open work base, one's own hair can be pulled through the openings and blended with that of the postiche.

A most dramatic use of the honeycomb is created when a dark-haired woman dons a blonde or silver "honeycomb," pulls her hair through and blends it with the wiglet.

Shaping up in the sportswear picture are suit looks—jackets, skirts and tops to put together with ease.

Jackets are cut longer, in take-your-pick designs, including belted and slinky, open and blazer, or precisely detailed and tailored. Some jackets show up sleeveless, the better to show off blouses with important, fuller sleeves and pretty necklines.

Spring's gentle, graceful motion is masterfully built into the coordinated skirts, which take their ease with gathers, low-placed flounces, pleats galore.

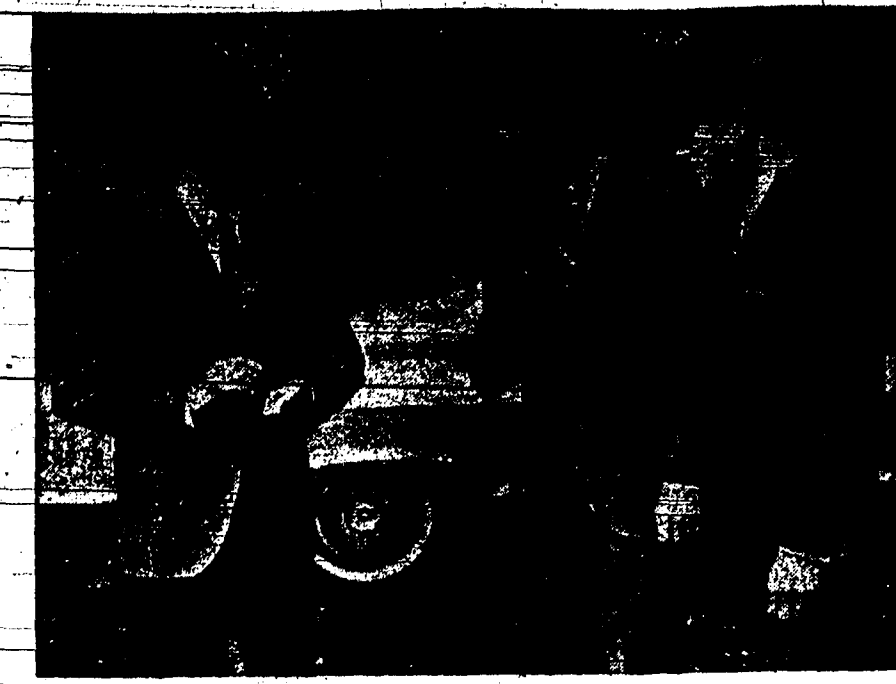

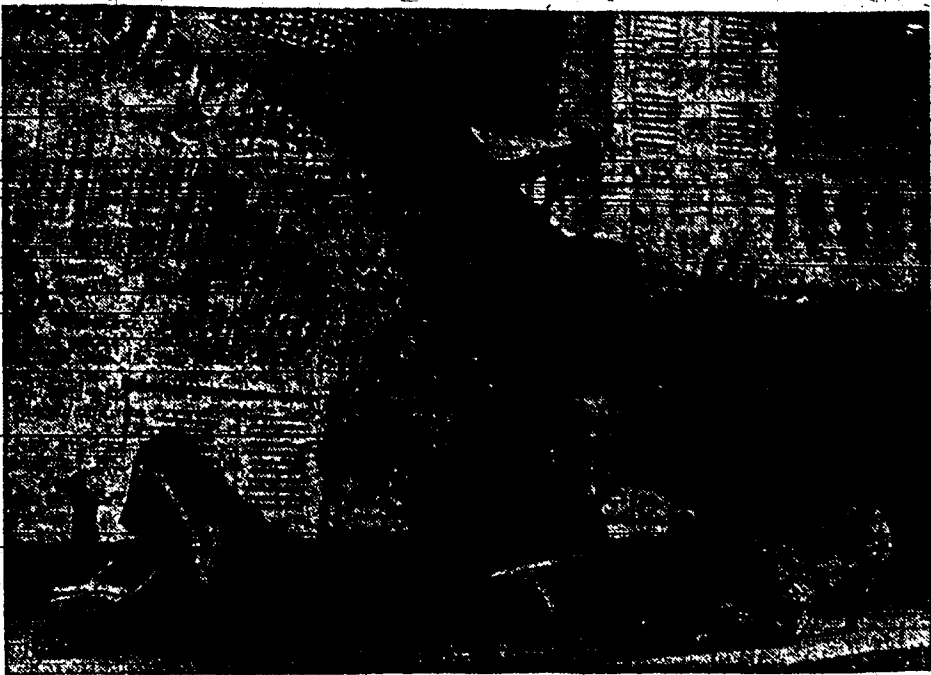

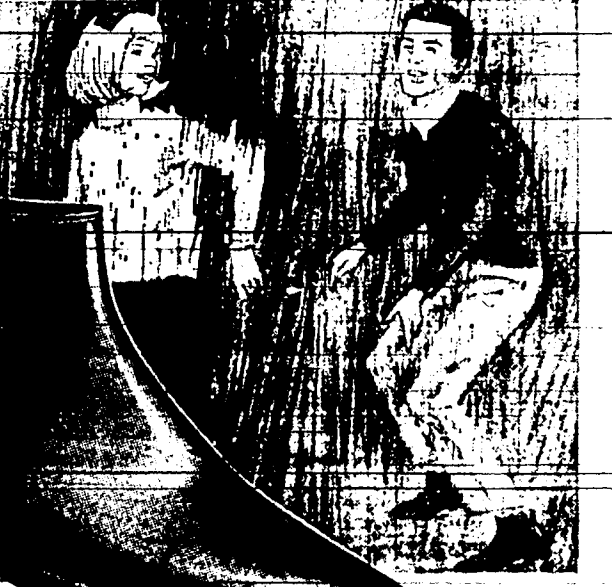

The two-piece dress is an important factor in this spring success story. It can look like a suit, a one-piece dress, or exactly what it is—two parts, often with an elongated top or even a tunic or jumper above a simple dress.

The dress costume continues strong, as a contender with the individual dresses. Coat and dress duo looks especially important; dress and jacket are very much a part of spring. In separate dresses or costumes, pleated skirts, bias cuts

and soft shaping compose the silhouette news. Waistlines slide from the tight empire line to the low hipline, with many resting in between. But that's only the beginning. The biggest excitement of the season is in skirts. They're alive, they're fun and they fit into the modern woman's active life. Ranging from the now-classic A-line to the flared and pleated stylings, the feminine look rules supreme.

Bodices take to soft, blousing, or follow the slim long line. Collars are set-away, high, cowed or absent altogether. Scarves, bows and ruffles lend the feminine touch to many necklines. Among the important styles are the double-breasted coat-dress and the tunic dress. Shift and skimmer dresses abound and apparently have entered the realm of the classics, along with the shirtwaist and the princess dress.

Soft, pretty detailing, such as embroidery, pleats and ruffles dress up the shirtwaist for a beautiful spring.

Furs Take Many Shapes This Spring

Little furs with flattering feminine details highlight spring's gentle look in fashion. Fur colors both blend with and accent the soft, pale shades forecast for this season. The styles take many shapes, from small capes and stoles to boleros, jackets and wraps.

A significant influence for spring is the short, shaped jacket which levels off at the hipline or above. Shoulders are narrow or small; sleeves end just below the elbow. Some fur jackets feature a belted effect.

Little boleros appear in a variety of distinctive and intricate designs. One such jacket, in mink, is bloused in the back and then shaped into a cinching waistband. Another version is cropped at the waistline with wide, bat-wing sleeves and a tiny ring collar.

To accent soft, slim lines, there is an excellent selection of capes and wraps. Spring fur picture, little or not, rests on hide-on-yokes, and many stoles. The many natural color American-bred Ermine mink complement spring's fashion, such as peach and white. The mink colors range from white to beige, honeycomb blues and deep rich gunmetal. Jackets beautifully tailored broadtail display double-breasted revers and button sleeves above short cuffs. Walking jackets in Alaska fur seal, show the pastel glow of champagne. By or black-dyed Lakoda suits jackets that feature all the in details of brass button welt seaming and easily slip shoulders with smartly gathered sleeves, just hip length above flattery of slim gathered tunic.

Foundations Following "Soft Lines"

Today's soft, natural look in outer fashions calls for the same look in underpinnings. Foundation garment makers are meeting the challenge by producing brassieres, girdles and corsets of filmy fabrics and corsets of filmy fabrics skillfully shaped to control without exaggerating feminine curves.

In their figure-refining techniques, the manufacturers are assisted by several developments that permit shape-makers to be gentler and prettier in their persuasive ways than ever before.

For example, the industry now has EFP, a new fusing process in which two pieces of elastic fabric are fused as thin as one, with no ridges, no breaks because there are no seams in reinforced areas.

EFP is both a fashionable and a functional innovation, resulting in girdles that wear well, wash well and control with less bulk.

One of the new EFP styles is embellished with a pattern of roses, while others have curving or geometrically shaped panels patterned with more or less precisely defined floral motifs.

To pair with these pretty new girdles and their companion bra styles are wonderfully constructed brassieres, some of them sheer wisps of skin-toned nylon net, some V-plunged uplifts of delicate lace.

The popularity of both semi-dipped and deeply diving bandeaux and long lines has encouraged a revival of the front closure.

Previously associated with a matronly look because of the difficulty of providing good separation and good fit at the same time, the front-closing bra is now destined for more figure types thanks to newly developed clasps that solve the old problems.

Colors generally are soft as the fabrics of the new foundations, with here and there a navy or a sharp accent color appearing among the cosmetic hues, the whites and the ever-necessary black brassieres and girdles.

"Second skin" corsets and pantie corsets that fit like a stocking are still going strong, and this season there are little more than pantie-styled garter belts.

The longer, slim-legged pantie girdles are darted and self-reinforced to curve the derriere and to afford maximum control with minimum bulk.

Coverage for 'Gentlewoman' Skinny Coats Give Ladylike

Coats on the skinny side, but superbly soft and supple, provide ladylike coverage for spring's "gentlewoman" fashions. On the narrow line to '65, there are neatly tailored coats with high shapings, and sometimes a flare at the hemline. In soft focus are coats with deep dolman sleeves or bell sleeves, and a general feeling of easy blousing above the waist, parting down to the slender look at the hemline. Single-breasted styles take the lead, but there are plenty of double-breasted coats about for those who prefer them. A refreshing new look evolves from fly front closings for both coats and suits. Newest of all looks stems from the return of an old favorite, the wrap coat—prophetic, some experts believe, of a whole new approach to fashion.

Collar Styles Battle for Popularity

While the button-down collar is still king, it is getting a lot of competition from some of its would-be usurpers this spring. There are, for instance, the "pin-or-not" collars. These, varying in length and spread, can be worn "as is," or secured with a pin, and look great either way. Among the pin-or-nots are the "buttonless button-downs," actually button-downs without the button—a growing favorite with college men and old grads, too. Other good new ideas are offered in the spread collars of varying heights and lengths and by-arrangements. A good revival is the round pin-tab style that goes so well with traditional clothes. Another newcomer is a polyester-cotton stretch shirt. All of these really wash and wear without the need of ironing and they stay fresh and neat despite the heat. Solid colors, particularly soft yellows and a new deeper blue, are another summer favorite. Soft shades of tan, gray, and subtle blends round out the solid colors. A new addition to the fashion scene are the miniature tattered checks that have been tamed for town wear. Of course, when the warm weather rolls around, half-sleeve shirts will have their innings. Virtually every shirt mentioned above will be available in short as well as long sleeves.

SHADES FOR SPRING
Pale, pre-dominant, but there are richer, darker shades in fashion for spring, too. Rich wine reds, bottle greens, mustard and spice tones show up, often mingling and mingling in the new flatter tweeds.

DESIGNED FOR ACTION
Fashion gives lots of attention to active sports this spring, with clothes designed specifically for deep-sea fishing and sportscoring, as well as styles for tennis, golf, boating and bowling.

Jewelry

Choose fashion jewelry to help correct beauty "faults," as well as complement costumes, recommends the Jewelry Industry Council.

Round faces, for example, will seem more oval if earrings are slender instead of square or round. Earrings will look longer and more tapered if the fashion ring selection has an oval or diamond-shaped stone.

Wide bracelets are flattering to thin arms; a full necklace is a long single strand with pendant.

Whatever the choice, there's an exciting array available at jewelry or department stores this season.

Waist, Pocket Style Will Be Varied in 1965

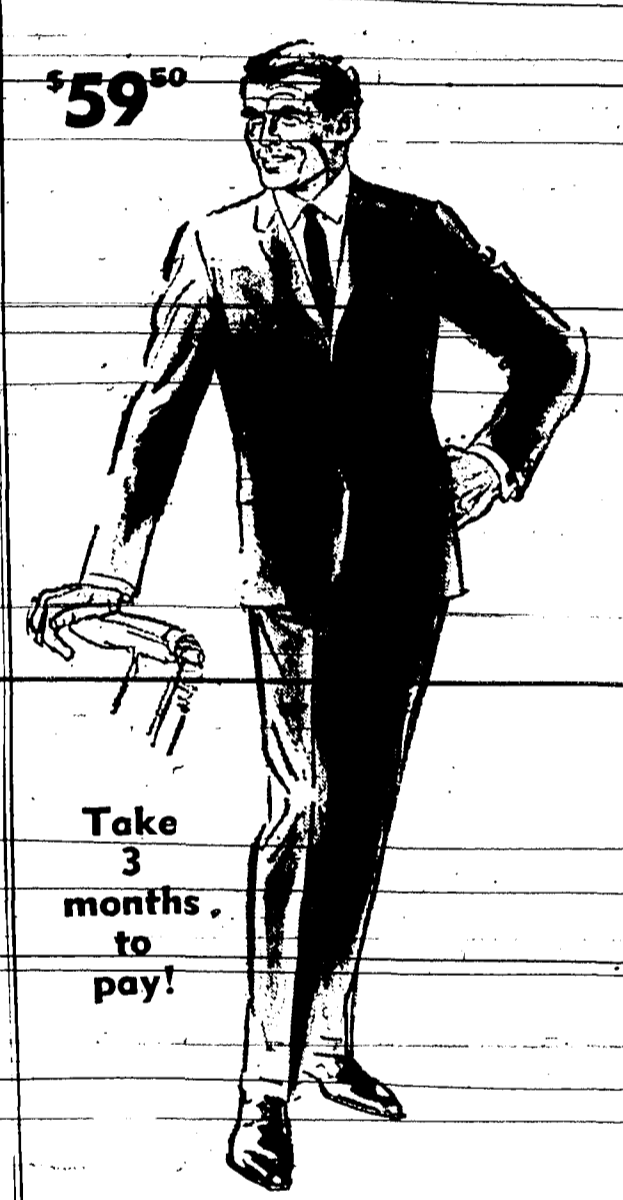
