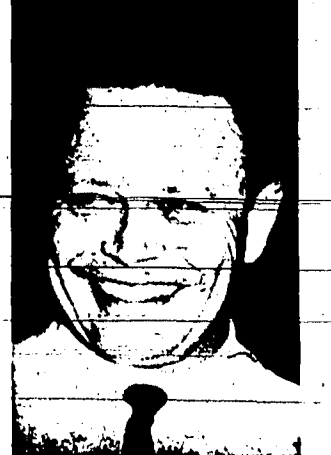
## Tornado Bombardment in Six Midwestern States Kills 210, Damage Is High

The nation counted 210 killed in a Palm Sunday tornado bombardment of six Midwestern states. The U. S. weather bureau said 37 twisters injured thousands. Property damage estimates came to several millions. While search of the debris from shattered homes continued today in some sections, Indiana counted 110 dead.

### Flooding Continues, Guard Units Called

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 12 (AP)—Three national guard units were ordered into the battle today against Minnesota's costliest flood in history, a major disaster which has driven an estimated 20,000 persons from their homes. The raging Minnesota river continued its relentless destruction. The Mississippi was swelling and smaller rivers throughout the state spilled over their banks. President Johnson declared 39 counties a disaster area yesterday and promised full federal help. The federal aid will apply only to public facilities such as roads, bridges and buildings.

Ohio 54, Michigan 36, Illinois seven and Wisconsin three. Iowa reported extensive damage but no deaths. The rampant weather front spun the twisters through the Great Lakes and Ohio valley diminished today as it spread into the East and Southeast. Sunday's storms were deadlier than those the night of March 21-22, 1953, when twisters killed 209 in Arkansas, Missouri and Tennessee. The worst single day in terms of tornado death toll was in 1925 when a March 18 barrage of twisters took 689 lives in Missouri, Illinois and Indiana. Indiana authorities had no estimate of the number of injured or the cost in property or paths across the state's northern and central area. Power and communication failures hampered any assessment. Some highways were blocked by wreckage. At least 22 towns had fatalities. Dunlap, southeast of Elkhart, had many dead in a crushed and scattered trailer home community. One hundred houses were destroyed in Greentown near Kokomo. One hundred cottages were flattened at Koonitz Lake north-west of Knox. Lapaz and Wyatt near South Bend were lashed. In Ohio, the metropolitan Toledo section took the hardest punches, with 13 deaths listed and searchers seeking other victims. The Red Cross reported 178 injured were admitted to hospitals. Near Lima, in the Cairo-Bluffton area 12 were killed; 18 died in Lorain county near Cleveland. Gov. James A. Rhodes declared the tornado-smashed communities a disaster area. Fifty-three cars of a freight train were derailed by the wind south of Lima. Michigan's southern section was ripped from Grand Rapids to Hillsdale county. Deaths occurred in widely scattered places. Five deaths and 100 injured were reported in the Grand Rapids area. Across the state near Hillsdale, five were killed. Nine died at Manitow Beach in Lenawee. See TORNADO, Page 2, Col. 4

### U.S. Ships Artillery Pieces to Viet Nam

SAIGON, April 12 (UPI)—U. S. marines today began unloading a shipment of big guns in Da Nang—including a platoon of eight-inch howitzers, the biggest artillery pieces ever brought to South Viet Nam by any one. A military spokesman said the marines did not have nuclear warheads for the weapons, but they were capable of hurling such projectiles up to 14 miles. The eight-inch howitzers, a battery of 155 mm howitzers and other heavy equipment were unloaded at the main docks in the center of Da Nang 350 miles north of Hanoi. The arrival was in line with the continual buildup of the U.S. marine expeditionary force at Da Nang.

### Indiana Survivors Shaken, Confused

LEBANON, Ind., April 12 (AP)—I have talked to some of the people who survived the tornadoes that ripped across northern and central Indiana last night and they were still shaking and had a glassy look in their eyes. In a Lebanon hospital I saw a man with blood streaming down his back. I asked why he didn't sit down. "Why, there's nothing wrong with me," he said. He turned and found he was cut from the shoulder blade to his belt line. A boy was standing in the hall wrapped in a blanket. All he had under it was a belt. I suppose it was all the clothing he could find. There were so many injured that nurses were treating patients in the halls. Cots had been brought in from the National guard armory for the worst hurt. The dead were being taken there as the mortuaries filled up. They were being placed on the floor. I saw a late model Thunderbird which had been plucked up by a twister north of Lebanon and tossed 200 yards into a field. It was literally rolled into a ball. The driver was the only one of the four people in the car wearing a seat belt and he was able to walk back to the road. Two were killed and the other was in critical condition. Civil defense people said 75 to 80 homes were damaged around Lebanon. Many of them are beyond repair. Some just aren't there any more. One guardman at the armory sent word to his wife to send him some cigarettes and some change and said to tell her not to expect him home for a day or two. An aged woman was found dead in a smashed house in the Elizabeth area. About an hour later an electrical cooperative repair crew found a boy in his early teens—probably the dead woman's grandson—lying critically injured near a barn about a hundred yards away. Ray Wilk, whose house was badly damaged, said, "The house started to shake and tremble. Then all hell broke loose." He said his wife and daughter were in a front room watching television. And although they were thrown clear across the room, nobody in the family was hurt.

### Johnson Inks 1.3 Billion School Bill

JOHNSON CITY, Tex., April 12 (AP)—President Johnson, sitting in the shadow of "this little school of my childhood," has signed into a law a 1.3-billion-dollar education aid bill he says will bring "quality and equality" to schooling. At a simple ceremony Sunday two miles from his ranch home, Johnson reached the high point of a busy week-end that saw him pay his respects to Houston's futuristic baseball stadium, accept retired Vice Adm. William F. Raborn, Jr., as new chief of the central intelligence agency, and round a fresh warning of American determination in Viet Nam. Johnson, with his first teacher sitting by his side, said of the education bill: "As President of the United States, I believe deeply no law has ever been signed or will ever be signed more to the future of America." Behind him was the tiny, weathered home which 53 years ago was a one-room schoolhouse where, as he told several hundred spectators as well as his old teacher, Kate Dredrich Loney, 72, "I started school when I was 4 years old, and they tell me, Miss Kate, that I recited my first lessons while sitting on your lap." Scores of old friends and schoolmates assembled for the occasion from all parts of Texas were ready to testify this was true. This is fitting that, in setting a precedent by using only one pen to sign the bill, Johnson handed the writing instrument to Miss Kate. Of the new law, Johnson said: "It represents a major new commitment of the federal government to quality and equality in the school that we offer our young people. By passing this bill, we bridge the gap between helplessness and hope for more than five million educationally-deprived children in America."

### T.F. Man Is Toastmaster Area Winner

A speech on poverty by Roy Slotten, Twin Falls, won him the first place designation in the area three Toastmasters serious speech contest and a chance to compete in the district serious speech contest. Slotten competed with two other Area Three men Saturday night in the Roundup room, Rogerson hotel. Also competing were John Mitchell, Rupert, and Walter Tolleson, Burley. Area three encompasses Maglio Valley and the district includes eastern Oregon, southern Idaho and Utah. The contest was under the direction of Bill Roberts, area governor. Also attending the contest were Gail Miller, Idaho Falls, district governor, and James Bagber, Salt Lake City, district lieutenant governor. The district contest will be held April 24, in Twin Falls.

### Injuries Are Fatal to Man After Mishap

RUPERT, April 12 — A Nampa man pulled over and under the large wheel of a farm tractor died Saturday night in Mindoka Memorial hospital. LeRoy Nelbaur, 51, was standing on the drawbar of a tractor that apparently hit a rut, throwing him forward onto the tire, then over and under it, investigating officers said. It was believed that Nelbaur may also have been run over by the front wheels of the carry-all the tractor was pulling. He was taken to the hospital by ambulance after the accident Saturday afternoon on the Max Herbold farm. He died at 11:20 p.m. Saturday. Funeral services are pending the arrival of relatives at the Walk mortuary, Rupert.

### Raborn Is Named New CIA Chief

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Retired Vice Adm. William F. Raborn, Jr., headed back for Washington today, this time to become the new chief of the central intelligence agency. Raborn, 59, was tapped for the spot yesterday by President Johnson. He succeeds John A. McCone, the West Coast industrialist who became head of the super-secret agency in 1961. There have been reports since last December that McCone wanted to return to private life. Raborn will leave the vice presidency of Aerojet General corporation, Pasadena, Calif., to take over his new post. He retired from the navy in September, 1963, after serving as deputy chief of naval operations for research, a job in which he also was based in Washington. Johnson chose Richard G. Helms, 52, a one-time newspaperman, as Raborn's deputy director for plans since the CIA was created in 1947. He succeeds Lieut. Gen. Marshall S. Carter.

### 400 Deposit Boxes Looted In Montreal

MONTREAL, April 12 (AP)—Burglars looted 400 safety deposit boxes at a Montreal bank during the week-end and got away with what appeared to be a major haul. Police at the scene told reporters there was no way of estimating the total value of the loot immediately. One unidentified high-ranking officer was quoted as saying: "It looks like a big one. It could be a million-dollar job." Depositors besieged the bank this morning as news of the robbery spread. Police and bank investigators kept the bank doors locked. Some depositors sat on the sidewalk weeping. Police said the burglars were equipped with diamond drills and torches and bored their way into the vault from its roof. The burglars jammed the bank's door locks. Employees arriving to work had to call a locksmith to let them in. The burglar alarm was tampered with to prevent its going off.

### T. F. Airport Improvement Plan Pending

Twin Falls airport commission is still awaiting word from West Coast airlines officials in Seattle before making future plans for improving facilities at the airport. Edwin Woods, secretary of the commission, reported Monday that the federal aviation agency "has not yet made a decision." West Coast airlines is planning on landing its new DC-9s at the Twin Falls airport. Woods said the FAA stated that the airport is large enough for the airplanes landing there at the present time and the FAA does not see any reason why the airport should be enlarged. Ray Rostrom, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, said the chamber sent a copy of the minutes of a meeting with West Coast officials and the airport commission to the airlines but has not received an answer. Rostrom pointed out, however, that no answer was requested.

### Lowery in Fair Condition After Kidney Surgery

Warren Lowery, county commission chairman, was listed in fair condition Monday at Magic Valley Memorial hospital where he is recovering from the surgical removal of a kidney. Surgery was performed Tuesday and Lowery has been in the hospital since that time under the care of a private nurse.

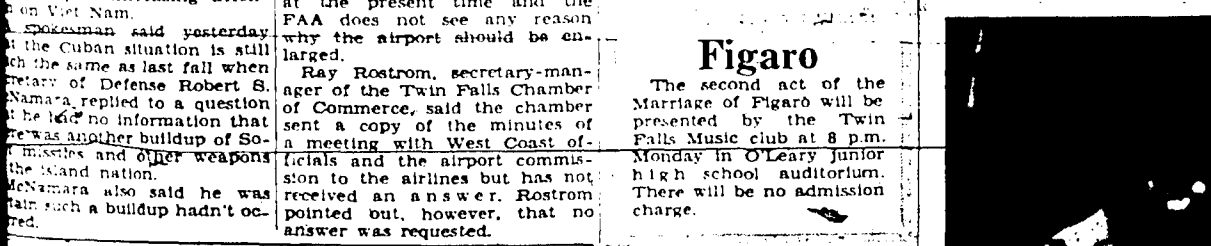

### Pan American Resumes Flights

NEW YORK, April 12 (AP)—Pan American World Airways, the nation's largest international airline, was flying around the globe today on normal schedules. An 11-day strike by more than 1,400 Pan American's 1,529 pilots ended yesterday in a settlement which federal mediator Leverett Edwards said involved "about 40 pages of fine print." Pilots secured a reduction in required working hours. Under the new pact, Pan Am pilots will work a maximum of 12 to 15 hours, depending on the nature of the flight, during a 24-hour period. The old contract had an 18-hour daily maximum.



### Girl Scouts To Turn Park Into "City"

**FARRAGUT STATE PARK, April 12 (AP)—**The 1965 International Senior Girl Scout roundup—spiced with a bit of World's Fair—will turn this quiet park into one of the nation's largest cities in July.

Some 9,200 Girl Scouts and 1,700 leaders from 40 nations and all 50 United States are expected by the Idaho commerce and development department to form the state's tenth largest "city" July 15-28.

Louise Shaddock, the department's head, expects the roundup to draw 70,000 visitors to Idaho during those two weeks.

The girls' 138 flags will be ceremoniously raised and lowered each morning and night along the avenue of flags on roundup grounds at the southern tip of Pend Oreille lake.

Off the avenue will be fair-like exhibit grounds, where Girl Scout groups—and several industries—will display crafts and wares from around the world.

Montana Girl Scouts plan to demonstrate training techniques in forest fire smoldering and New England groups are sure to be making old-fashioned maple syrup.

An authentic Indian village, Idaho braves will be making canoes and arrowheads and squaws will be making baskets the way their ancestors did.

A chuekwaagon cook will be serving old western sourdough in a frontier village. Idaho elk, deer, bear, salmon and steelhead will be on display in a zoological garden.

Guided bus tours will take the girls through 150 miles of Kaniksu national forest and emphasize conservation, the roundup's theme.

The girls are to plant a forest of 1,000 Ponderosa pines—a memorial to Idaho and a permanent reminder the girls can show children and grandchildren on future vacations.

Each night, troops of 64 girls will hike to lakeshore cities for campfire programs.

The tent city will have its own hospital, police force, food warehouses and bus service to shuttle girls and visitors around the grounds.

The warehouses will store tons of meat, fruit, vegetables, staples and thousands of eggs and quarts of milk for scout units to draw daily and cook over charcoal stoves.

The police force will include more than 100 state, military, county and city policemen. The sixth U. S. army plans to establish a camp nearby to house its police, hospital and maintenance personnel.

Idaho expects to keep its cost for the roundup under \$350,000, Miss Shaddock said, thanks to maintenance work by the army, national guard and army reserve units and 1964 youth conservation camp workers.

Private firms and individuals also have helped, she said.

Farragut was the site of a naval training center during World War II that trained more than a million men, housing as many as 70,000 of them at one time.

Most of the buildings were sold and moved after the war, leaving behind a huge concrete-block brig.

The brig is being remodeled for roundup headquarters. Later it will become park headquarters.

Nearly 1,000 men in national guard and army reserve engineer units broke up and removed 150 concrete slabs last summer and seeded the grounds with grass.

With the grounds cleared, 63 boys from the state's summer youth conservation camp moved into the area to clear and beautify trails and roads. They also trimmed poles for the avenue of flags.

The roundup at Farragut will be the girl scouts' fourth. Others have been in Michigan, Colorado and Vermont.

Gov. Robert F. Smylie joined state and scouting officials in adding for the roundup two new areas. The Farragut site was selected over 35 others after months of elimination.

Mrs. Helen McKinney, Lemhi County Cancer Society chairman, said the local chapter has provided funds for Sandy's and Mrs. Mott's transportation and living expenses while in Idaho Falls where Sandy has been receiving treatment.

Sandy has three sisters, Brenda, 12, Kaye, 11, and Dorothy, 9, who attend school in Salmon. Mrs. McKinney said the cancer fund drive now under way is expected to be completed by the end of April.

She said that "even without a present cure, there has been a striking improvement of acute leukemia. Much of this has come about through recently discovered use of drugs in combination or in specific sequence developed largely under the National Cancer Institute's remarkable program of research."

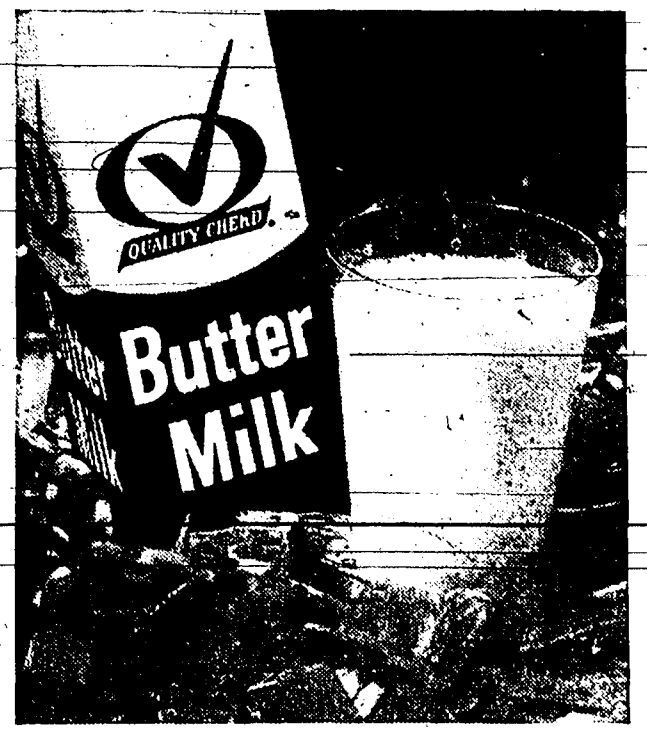
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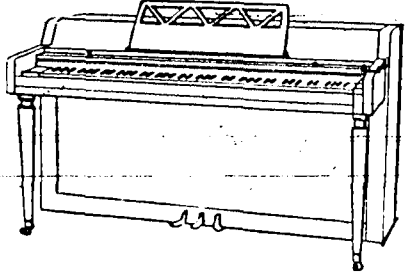
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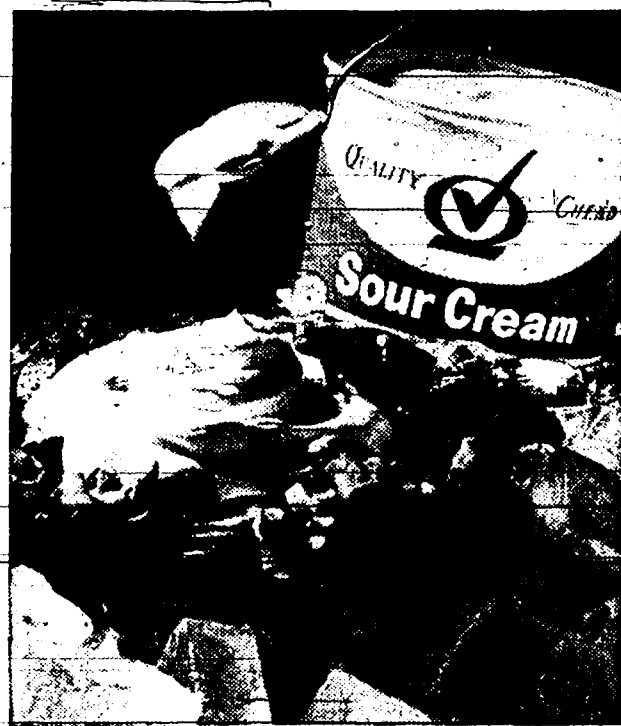
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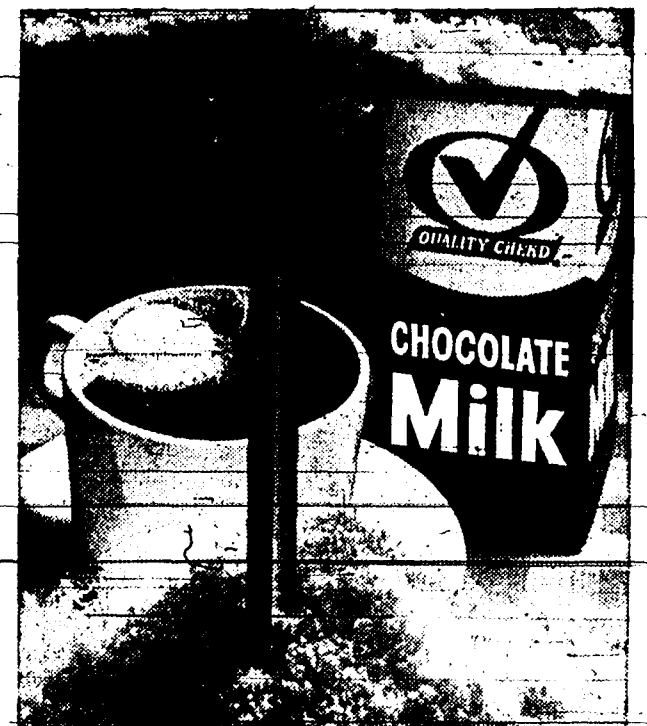
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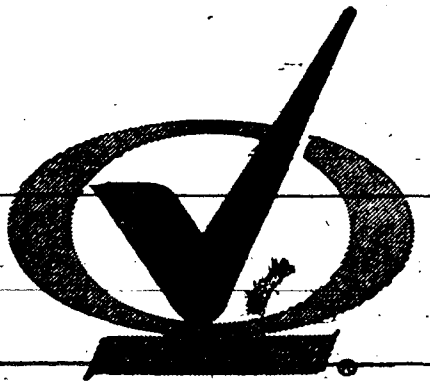
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## Measurements Are Taken at Fish Creek

CAREY, April 12 — Measurements taken at the Fish Creek reservoir Friday showed 90 feet of water with a maximum of 92 feet, reports Lee Eldredge, vice president of the Carey Valley reservoir company water district.

The inflow was 134 second feet, which came from the combined waters of West Fork, Fish Creek and Crooks creek. The spillway together had 100 second feet of water emptying out of the reservoir. All the water is going down the Fish Creek ditch and out into the reservoir east of Carey.

The main outlet for the reservoir, the highland canal, still needs repair work. Rain and muds repair work.

It is hoped that the water in the reservoir can be held at the present level and not rise any more until the highland canal can carry the water. Eldredge and Alan Peterson were at the reservoir area most of the day Friday.

## U.S. Riflemen Will Be Sent To Viet Nam

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP) — U.S. riflemen will be sent to South Viet Nam to strengthen security at some 75 locations there.

The riflemen are based, it is learned today, at about 1,400 troops, including military police, will be spread around the country in detachments.

The infantrymen and MPs will relieve helicopter mechanics, supply clerks and others who have had to stand guard against attacks from communist guerrillas.

Since the Reds made a damaging attack on a barbed wire compound and an air field at Pleiku earlier this year, many military units have had to do double duty at many posts—their regular jobs and standing security guard as well.

The infantrymen and MPs are part of the several thousand reinforcements agreed on at the time of Ambassador Maxwell Taylor's conferences here about 30 days ago.

Most of the additions—which will reach South Viet Nam over a period of months—will be applied to strengthening the logistics system in the country.

On top of straightening out inefficiencies, it is obvious the more will lay a logistics base to support large U.S. combat forces if a decision should be made to produce them into South Viet Nam.

Among other things, the army will develop port facilities and supply points at various cities along the South Vietnamese coast.

This will permit supplying U.S. elements inside the country on a short axis rather than by long air or surface routes leading from Saigon.

Engineer elements will speed some necessary construction which reportedly has been lagging.

The communications system, vital to the efficient operation of modern armies and air forces, will be expanded with more American specialist technicians.

The army is expected to send additional light observer aircraft.

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# News Around Idaho

**BOISE, April 12 (AP)—**The Missoula Mont. ewe that set all that publicity for producing quadruplets has nothing on one in Boise. She had four lambs and she's a city dweller. She is owned by W. H. (Bill) Spickelmire, a Boise bus driver, who keeps five around the yard in a residential area here "mostly to keep the grass down." Ewes are only built to mother two lambs, so Mr. and Mrs. Spickelmire feed and care for two of the four born March 23. The ewe feeds Fatty and Mike. The Spickelmires feed Tom and Jerry. Spickelmire didn't know the birth of four lambs was so unusual. One of his ewes had three lambs last year and he says he wouldn't be surprised if another has five next year.

**BOISE, April 12 (AP)—**Removal of load and speed restrictions from three sections of Idaho state highways was reported today by state highway engineer Ellis Mathes. The sections include state 21 from the Ada-Boise county line to Boise creek, state 28 from the Lemhi store to the Salmon junction, and state 57 from High Bridge to Nordman.

**BOISE, April 12 (AP)—**A Boise student's composition, "Suite for Strings," is to be performed by the Boise Philharmonic in concert at Caldwell and Boise this week. The suite was composed by Wallis Bratt, a Philharmonic cellist, at the University of Utah in 1953 under the direction of Leroy Robertson, a Utah composer. It was selected for performance last year at the Northwest Composers Symposium at Stanford university. Also in the program are Tchaikovsky's "Fidelio" and Beethoven's "Concerto for violin and orchestra in D minor." The concert is scheduled for 8:15 p.m. Tuesday in Jewett chapel-auditorium at the College of Idaho in Caldwell and Wednesday in Boise high school auditorium.

**BOISE, April 12 (AP)—**This city's first soap box derby—racing of homemade coasting cars by boys 11 through 15 years of age—is scheduled July 17 and 18. "This derby," said Darrell Campbell, derby director, "is the only race in which a boy designs, builds and drives his own coasting car in supervised competition." He said the location of the race will be announced later. Sponsors are Larry Barnes Chevrolet, where boys accompanied by parents may obtain entry information, and the Statesman newspapers. The local winner will receive a \$500 savings bond, a trophy and eligibility to enter the all-American soap box derby at Akron, O., Campbell said. He said entries are expected from throughout Idaho.

Oscar Miller said Mrs. Ankrum, who was alone in her car, had slowed to turn left from U. S. highway 91-101. Her car was struck from the rear by Dixey as she started to turn. Both cars were northbound.

**LOS ANGELES, April 12 (AP)—**Learning to ride a skateboard often is a period of alarmingly frequent fractures, said a spokesman for the Quaterly Skateboarder, a new magazine. "Anyone can make a board, and they've become popular all over." Several companies are manufacturing the boards, and sales have outdistanced production schedules. Prices range from \$2.98 to \$29.95—and boards are selling by the millions. The fad is not limited to youngsters. For the more sophisticated, motorized skateboards are available. A California man has a power model which will propel his 200-pound rider at 10 miles an hour. The model is operated by a manual throttle and steered by the rider shifting his weight. Surpassing hula hoops in its scope of interest, skateboarding will stage its first national championships at Los Palms stadium in Anaheim, Calif., in May. Events will be held for girls, all ages; junior boys 11 and under, and senior boys of 12 and over.

## Harry Truman Says King Is Troublemaker

**NEW YORK, April 12 (AP)—**Former President Harry S. Truman described Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. today as a "troublemaker." He also called the Rev. King a "no good outfit" which should be "legislated out of existence." Truman made the comments when asked by reporters during his customary 20-minute morning walk, to evaluate the effectiveness of the recent civil rights demonstrations in the south. The former president was reminded by newsmen that King had been awarded a Nobel peace prize. "I didn't give it to him," he replied.

Truman repeated a statement he made several days ago that he thought last month's civil rights march from Selma to Montgomery, Ala., was silly and had "not accomplished anything."

Leaning heavily on his cane, Truman, who will be 81 on May 8, walked at a slower pace than formerly.

# New Vietnamese Rule Discussed

**SAIGON, April 12 (AP)—**The fledgling Pham Huy Quat government of South Viet Nam has taken such a firm grip on the country's political fabric that it has even surprised itself. "Maybe we came in at a lucky time," said one cabinet officer. He speculated that the government took office just as the whole country was getting fed up with political anarchy.

Quat took office on Feb. 17 on the heels of almost two years of rioting and military revolts. The gray-haired physician had been on the job for less than 48 hours when tanks and soldiers flooded the capital in still another coup d'etat attempt.

The attempt failed, but it was followed by days of tension as most of the country's generals maneuvered, successfully, to fire their own commander in chief, Lieut. Gen. Nguyen Khanh. With that kind of legacy, the smart money in Saigon gave Quat's new regime no more change of success than his predecessors had enjoyed, that is, no chance at all.

But to the astonishment of almost everybody, Saigon has now gone through seven weeks without a riot or an armed revolt. The calm has so encouraged the government that it has lifted martial law from the capital for the first time since November. It has cut the Saigon curfew to only two hours, for the first time in half a year.

Even censorship controls have been loosened. A respected French-language newspaper was just closed down for a month because it published a gloomy editorial about the war. But newspapers are no longer banned.

in bunches of six or seven at a time. The relative calm has been largely due to the fact that Quat's government is a private enterprise, where the usual work was done. Quat has tackled a whole range of needless bureaucratic habits which had plagued provincial governments without being noticed in Saigon. Another technique of diplomatic rule is face-to-face persuasion. A powerful civil subordinate or general is likely to get a flattering invitation to a private

ministerial dinner, and receive government policy directives in the form of personal persuasion. This is a time-consuming way to run a government. But it wins the support of the men who have to carry out government policy. It may be quicker and more efficient in the long run, because directives sometimes get lost, side tracked and ignored when they are transmitted through the clogged, official channels of the bureaucracy. Quat has turned a diplomatic blind eye to problems which could have gotten a stronger but less cautious government into serious political trouble.

Quat's regime had provided a shadow of a hope that such stability was in the making. By South Vietnamese standards, his remark was one of giddy optimism. The secret of Quat's success has evaded even members of his own government, and most ministers still keep their fingers crossed. "We hear the same coup rumors every Saturday," one of them wryly admitted. But, for the moment, it looks as though Quat's own experience as a veteran diplomat and the national weariness with rioting and troublemakers have combined to give him a period of delicate stability.

The former foreign minister has used the arts of a diplomat to try to run South Viet Nam without stepping on any toes. One technique is the "national conference." Where previous governments have loudly proclaimed their interest in the country's 45 provinces, Quat demonstrated his by calling all the province chiefs to Saigon for a two-day conference. The public recognition helped flatter the powerful province chiefs, whose support can make

Four convention of District Women's clubs will be held from 8:30 a.m. April 20 at the First Methodist church.



**Check Is Given To T.F. Canning Kitchen by Club**  
A check for \$375 was presented to Mrs. J. H. Sharp, manager and secretary-treasurer of the Twin Falls Canning Kitchen, Inc., by Mrs. Faren Faler, president of the Twentieth Century club, to purchase a new kettle for the kitchen and to aid in converting the kitchen to gas.

The money was raised by benefit card parties and rummage sales sponsored by the Twentieth Century club. Downtown merchants donated gifts for special prizes at the card parties and Mrs. Esther Allred donated one of her original hat creations as a special prize.

This check signifies the fulfillment of Mrs. Faler's president's project for 1964-65. The Twin Falls Canning Kitchen, Inc., a non-profit organization, was started in 1948 as a community project. Approximately 75,000 cans of fruit, vegetables and meat were canned last year by residents from Twin Falls, Buhl, Castleford, Pler, Jerome, Murtaugh, Kimberly, Hansen and Gooding at the canning kitchen.

Last year, 465 persons registered to use the facilities at the kitchen. This year the number is estimated at 450 to 500 persons.

"A lot of surplus vegetables and fruits would go to waste if it were not for the canning kitchen," stated Mrs. Faler. "Many women, even young brides, go to the canning kitchen each year and are always well supervised by Mrs. Sharp and her employees. So many of the younger brides in the community do not have the proper facilities in their homes to comply with canning problems, and Mrs. Sharp always comes to their assistance when they need advice, recipes and assistance at the kitchen," she noted.

A lot of women in the community having more fruits and vegetables than they can use for themselves, go to the canning kitchen, can them, and give them to needy persons at Christmas time.

The Canning kitchen is slated to open July 1.

Mrs. Sharp stated that Mrs. Faler's community project would benefit many Magic Valley residents and appreciation was expressed to the Twentieth Century club.

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# NICKLAUS WINS SECOND MASTERS TITLE

## Record-Shattering Score Of 271 Leaves Palmer, Player Nine Shots Back

AUGUSTA, GA., April 12 (AP)—Jack Nicklaus, blond young-goliath with awesome power, won his second Masters title Sunday by nine shots with a record-shattering 17-under-par 271 and established himself firmly as golf's new super-star. The 210-pound Golden Bear, a comparative babe of 25, climaxed one of the game's great all-time performances with a final round 69 and an unprecedented margin over his two fellow members of the big three, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player. After the powerful Nicklaus once started his charge at the halfway point, the others never had a chance.

The world's finest golfers and the massive, demanding Augusta National course — 6,080 yards of frustration and elusive par 73 — were left numbed by the impact of the big Columbus, O. boy's assault.

Nicklaus' rounds of 67-71-64-69 — 271 cracked by three shots the record 274 which Ben Hogan set in 1953 — held proudly for a dozen years.

His previous largest winning margin in this tournament, a mushrooming spectacle that lures the world's best players, was seven strokes — the gap by which Dr. Cary Middlecoff captured the title in 1955.

On his closing round, Nicklaus had only one bogey — at the fourth hole, his first in a stretch of 29 holes — and four birdies. He missed other birdies on the 520-yard 15th hole where two tremendous blows put him on the green, putting for an eagle. His first putt from 40 feet went six feet past. On the next try, the ball hit the back of the cup and curved away.

Big Jack refused to be discouraged by this unlucky turn. He parred the short 16th easily and on the 400-yard 17th fired his approach to within 18 inches for his final birdie.

By this time a large part of the gallery of 50,000, swarming over the picturesque course, was lining the fairway and hugging the green.

They let out a deafening roar and it was easy to see that courses were in for a new gallery menace — Jack's Pack, replacing the rampaging Arnie's Army.

This indeed may well be the start of the Nicklaus era, just as the game passed through periods in which Bob Jones, Ben Hogan and Arnold Palmer dominated.

Of the 81 players who began last Thursday, only 10 were able to break par and none of them gave it the wallop that Nicklaus administered.

Palmer, the defending champion and four-time winner, never got his charge under way and finished with a 70. Elmer, the little South African, scrambled to a 73.

Player had three consecutive bogies on the front nine and lost three strokes with a bogey at the 11th and double bogey at the 12th, where he dumped his tee shot into the water at the left.

Palmer had a bogey at the fifth, consecutive birdies at the eighth and ninth, another at the 13th and then parred in the rest of the way.

It was a good round, but lacked the sensational trademark of Palmer's traditional surge.

Mason Rudolph shot a par 72 for 283 and fourth money. Dan Sikes, 34-year-old campaigner from Jacksonville, Fla., had a final 75 for 285 and fifth.

Little, former U. S. open champion, shot a 74 to tie for sixth at 286 with Spain's Ramon Sota, who closed with par 72.

They were followed by Tommy Bolt and Frank Beard, tied at 287.

Nobody else was able to crack par.

Nelson finished ahead of his old rival, Hogan, by shooting a 74 for 290. Hogan also had a 74 for 291.

The best-of-7 Eastern division finals, in which the Celtics seek a ninth straight crown, continues Tuesday night at Philadelphia.

Russell, who brought the blocked shot to the game, gave "author" Will Chamberlain some schooling in the art of defense while Sam Jones pumped in 29 points. Veteran cornerman Tommy Helms added 24.

Although 76ers' starting guard Al Bianchi was disqualified just before the half, the visitors refused to wilt in the face of the Boston fast break until the late stages. Bianchi drew automatic ejection when he got two technical fouls in the same ranting outburst against referee Norm Drucker.

Teammate Hal Greer pushed Bianchi halfway down the court in a successful effort to keep him from charging Drucker. Chamberlain scored 30 points and Greer 28 in the losing cause but the Celtics' defense kept the 76ers forward fairly well in check.

In this latest NBA version of "There's No Place Like Home," the Celtics took the floor apparently bent on atoning for their overtime loss Tuesday night when they blew a four-point lead with just a few seconds left in regulation time.

The Boston victory was accomplished despite a heavy impost of fouls. Russell operating with four from the opening minute of the second half.

Until the fast break began, Russell and Sam Jones kept the Celtics just a couple of steps ahead of Philadelphia. Russell blocked eight shots to Chamberlain's none and outrebounded his arch rival 16-7 in the first half as Boston built a 64-53 lead at intermission.

Chamberlain had the scoring edge 16-5, but Russell had the big plays which made the difference.

Russell also had five assists and a steal in the opening half.

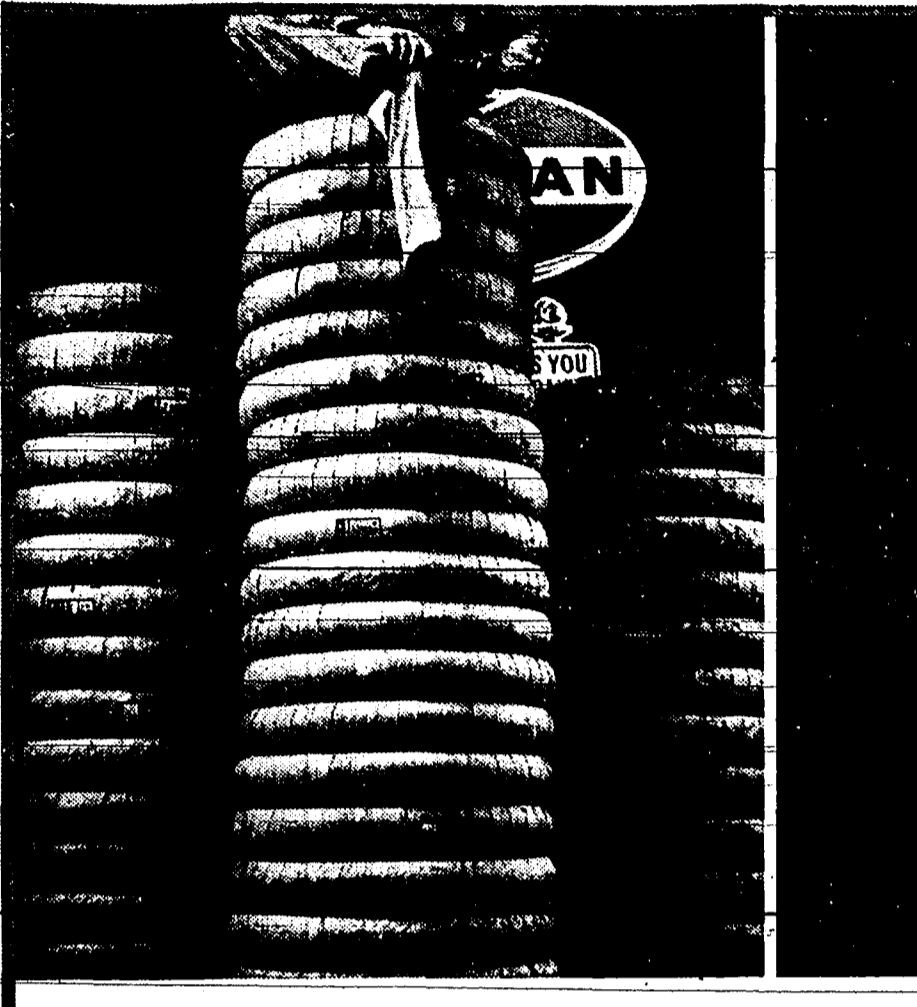

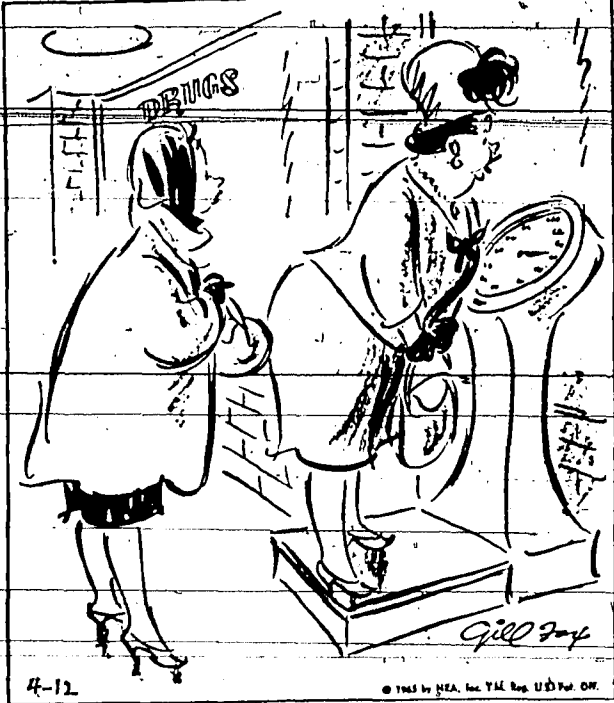

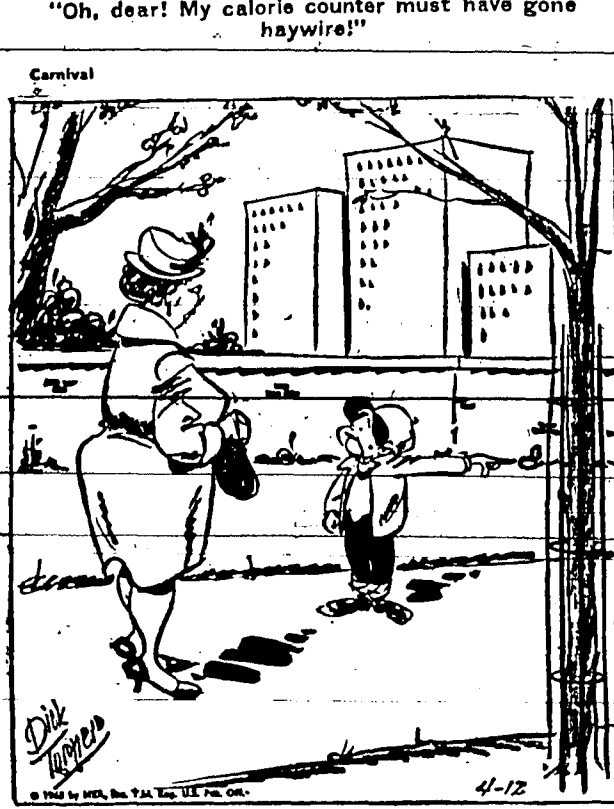
