## Tornado Damage Set at 237 Million, Vast Job Of Cleanup Is Under Way

The search for missing victims of tornadoes that ravaged sections of the Midwest Palm Sunday continued today amid accelerated cleanup operations. The toll of known dead over the stricken six-state area stood at 248. The Red Cross estimated at least 5,000 persons were injured. Estimates of damage caused by the twisters totaled 247 million dollars. Indiana, worst hit of the six states, counted 141 known dead. Officials said the toll could go higher.

**OHIO**—64 dead; more than 300 injured; hundreds homeless; damage in the millions; Toledo area hardest hit with deaths also at Pittsfield, Calm and suburbs of Toledo and Cleveland. Three killed in bus hurried from Toledo expressway; Va. West county left without power, and schools closed in Findlay and Fremont.  
**ILLINOIS**—Seven dead, 60 injured; 200 homes destroyed or heavily damaged; loss 10 million dollars; Crystal Lake-Island Lake hardest hit with 80 homes destroyed; Gurnee near Waukegan and Rockton north of Rockford also received major damage.  
**WISCONSIN**—Three dead, all motorists near Watertown, 121 injured, 135 dwellings damaged, loss probably more than five million dollars; Watertown, Evansville, Williams Bay, and Manitowish, Wis., hardest hit.  
**IOWA**—Power lines downed and farm buildings damaged, one severe injury.

### 900 Driven From Homes in St. Paul

**ST. PAUL, Minn., April 13 (UPI)**—Record Mississippi river waters flooded St. Paul's downtown airport and Union railway station today. Nine hundred persons were driven from their homes. Two thousand volunteers worked in shifts around the clock strengthening dikes to protect the city's lowland areas. Mayor George Vavoulis said he was encouraged by indications that the river would fall somewhat short of the predicted 27-foot crest—13 feet above flood stage—late this week. The Mississippi, expected to reach 24 feet at 7 a.m., was at a level of only about 23.5 by mid-morning.

### T.F. County Racing Dates Are Unknown

No information has been released as yet concerning dates for part-mutuel horse racing in Twin Falls county, specifically at the county fairgrounds, Miller. Representatives of the county fair board met Saturday night with the Idaho racing committee in Burley at which time dates for part-mutuel racing were selected by other towns and counties throughout the state.

**MONTREAL, April 13 (UPI)**—Six diamond drill bits and a bag full of candy bar wrappers were the chief clues today in police efforts to track down a gang of burglars who cracked the Royal Bank of Canada of up to a million dollars in cash and securities.

### Higher Water Rates Declared Inevitable

TWIN committee members were told Monday night that water rates here will be increased regardless of what happens in the water bond election May 18. It was a second meeting for the TWIN—Talk Water Improvement Now—committee in the drive to win approval for the 2.5 million dollar bond issue to finance a water supply of water, provide suitable storage and improve distribution. Rates will be increased—basically because present rates don't cover costs, said Armour Anderson, TWIN committee chairman. It also was pointed out that certain inadequacies of the present system must be corrected if the old water system is continued. These inadequacies include the filter plant, present storage reservoir and an outdated and totally inadequate distribution system.

### Survivors Relate Moments of Terror

**COLDWATER, Mich., April 13 (AP)**—The tragedy which struck a 10-mile-long corridor south of here was almost beyond human endurance. Not one—but two—tornadoes raked the area within 30 minutes. "The first had us reeling," said Branch county Sheriff Keith Wilhelm. "The second knocked us out." The deadly game of follow-the-leader was played by the twisters down a two-mile-wide corridor on Palm Sunday. Two Coldwater lake resorts were wrecked, cars were tossed from a highway as far as 200 feet and a house trailer wound up 50 feet out in the lake.

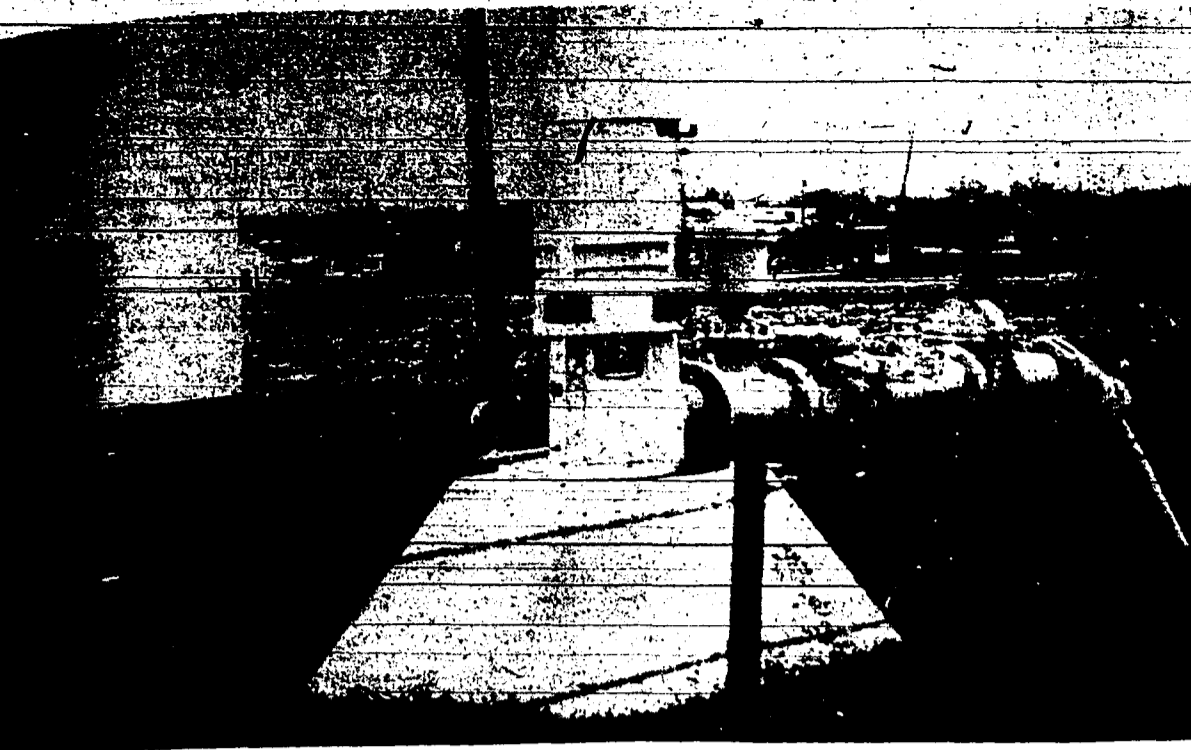

**More Wells Believed Poor Solution to Water Problem**

"More wells" has seemed to be the answer to the problems of the Twin Falls water supply for many years. But it has been found that more wells only contribute water of the same quality to the system and do no lasting good.

At present the city has seven wells of various capacities scattered through the system, in addition to the Snake river and treatment plant supply. Only the

two newest wells, the Filter Plant well and the Reservoir well appear to be of significant value to the overall system, according to consulting engineers Morrison, Marlerie and associates, Helena, Mont.

The Johnson well, located in a junk yard off Washington street south, and the two Lang wells, just south of Highland avenue in a pasture, obtain their water from surface infiltration, as evidenced by the lowering of the water table by pumping, and are, therefore, subject to contamination.

Their locations, sub-standard construction and lack of chlorination facilities make it imperative that these wells be removed from the system.

The Willow Lane well has small capacity and the water is harder than the rest of the supply. It has little value in the overall system except for boosting localized pressures in the immediate vicinity.

Chemical analysis of the Lynwood well shows a trace of detergent, indicating surface contamination, in spite of the depth of the well.

It is continually asked of city officials why they don't drill more wells to solve the water problem. To this H. L. Derrick, city manager, answers, "We would just be getting more water of the same quality and ignoring the real problems."

The consultants have proposed the use of water from the Blue Lakes spring, to provide a purer supply of water for the city. If the water bond issue is passed in the May 18 election, work will probably begin this summer towards a more healthy and satisfactory water system.

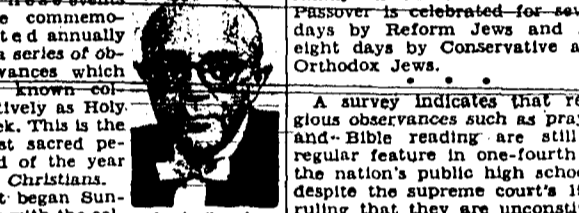

A survey indicates that religious observances such as prayer and Bible reading are still a regular feature in one-fourth of the nation's public high schools, despite the supreme court's 1963 ruling that they are unconstitutional.

The Doctor Says

By WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT, M.D. Q—What causes curvature of the spine? Would a person who had this be bedridden?

A—Curvature of the spine may be lateral (as seen from the back) or forward (as seen from the front). This is called scoliosis, swayback (lordosis) or a forward curvature (kyphosis). These deformities may be caused by a disease or weakness of the muscles, pulling the spine in a given direction as occurs in such diseases as poliomyelitis or muscular dystrophy. Or it may be a developmental defect due to poor posture or the cause may be undetermined.

Scoliosis also occurs in persons who, for one reason or another, have one leg that is longer than the other. The degree of curvature may be mild or severe but in no case would the victim be bedridden because of the curvature.

Q—I am 30 and have been permanently deformed from the draft because of scoliosis in the right in the thoracic spine. Can it be corrected?

A—You have a curvature of your spine to the right in the chest area. Some persons with this deformity carry one shoulder a little higher than the other. The condition usually develops before it does unnoticed until a skeletal X-ray is taken to measure the deformity. But such a back is usually weaker than a normal back and that is the reason for rejection by the armed forces.

## Briton Held For Selling Secret Papers

LONDON, April 13 (AP)—A British army sergeant yesterday was ordered held for trial on charges he sold top secret documents to Arab diplomats for \$210.

The papers reportedly concerned Israel.

Sgt. Peter Sidney Allen, 33, the father of four, said through his attorney he stole the documents and sold them because he could not support his family.

The diplomats named in the charges were Maj. Abdul Hatif Khalil Al-Abbas, assistant Iraqi military attaché, and Maj. Mustafa Hassan Mustafa, of Kuwait of the United Arab Republic military attaché's office here.

Allen, attached to the army department, was to plead guilty under the official secrets act of communicating to other persons various documents intended to be useful to an enemy, his attorney said. No trial date was set.

The offenses with which Allen is charged carry a penalty of three to seven years in prison on conviction.

## Twin Falls Man Is Arraigned on Burglary Charge

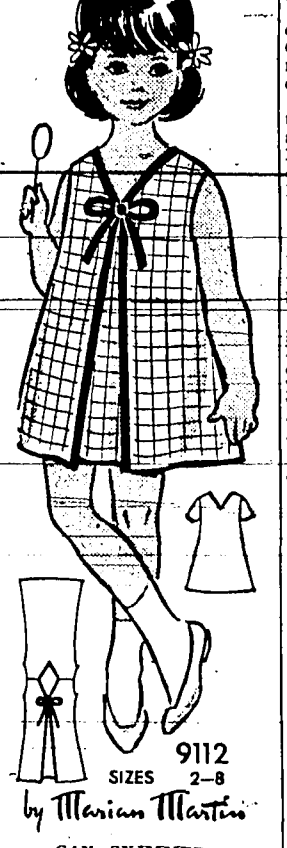

### Program on Patio Plantings Is Presented

A patio should be large enough for its purpose, better too large than too small.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, April 13 (AP)—Avery Brundage, American president of the International Olympic committee, hinted Monday that a continued French refusal to guarantee visas for East German athletes may force the IOC to take the 1968 Winter Olympic games away from the French town of Grenoble. Brundage told a news conference the IOC's position firmly remains that "no city will be awarded an Olympic event where all the athletes recognized by the IOC are not able to participate."

He said the federations also feel that two German Olympic committees would find it easier to raise the funds they need for their competitors.

The six-hour meeting also was marked by a sharp discussion over a federation proposal to distribute television proceeds. It called for the IOC, the federations and the organizers of the game each to receive one-third of the money.

When Col. Russell told newsmen the meeting finally had worked out "a reasonable, friendly solution," Brundage interrupted him to say, "I was shocked that this matter was taken up in the session."

"We are not only sportsmen, we also have to live," Russell replied.

Brundage said the IOC had decided to give recognition and support to three planned regional games—the African games at Brazzaville, the Central American games at San Juan, Puerto Rico, and Asian games at Bangkok. He said the IOC had received assurances they will be staged under Olympic rules.
