With plenty of fanfare, Sen. Thomas Dodd introduced senate bill 14 back J. Dodd introduced senate bill 14 back in January; the bill has the avowed purpose of curtailing and strictly regulating the mail-order gun business. It is supposed to keep guns out of the hands of juveniles, criminals and others who could be considered a menace to society. Then about a month ago, with little or no public notice, Senator Dodd introduced another bill, 1592, which goes much farther than the measure he introduced back in January. Quite significantly, the new bill has the support of the Johnson administration.

Among other things, Senator Dodd's new bill specifies a \$1,000 license for anyone manufacturing a m munition.

Does the provision apply to the theusands of trapshooters and hunters who reload their own shells either to save

anyone manufacturing ammunition. Does the provision apply to the theusands of trapshooters and hunters who reload their own shells either to save money or as a hobby? The bill also would give the treasury secretary un-

money ar as a hobby? The hill also would give the treasury secretary unlimited authority to originate all sorts of rules and regulations applying to the sale of guns by dealers.

Senator Dodd's second bill, the one with administration approval, also would regulate interstate traffic of firearms, supposedly including the individual who transports a rifle or shotgun from one state to another for hunting. It's quite apparent that senate bill 1592 is aimed at discouraging the ownership of any firearm for any reason whatsoever. The next step would be compulsory registration of all guns.

Both of the bills introduced by Senator Dodd have something in common. namely, the apparent presumption that firearms commit crimes. Behind the Dodd bills seems to be the thought that crimes of violence can be eliminated by getting rid of guns. The theory is false, naturally, because people commit crimes and will continue to commit crimes of

violence even without firearms. The right approach is demonstrated in house bill 5642 introduced by Rep. Robert Casey of Texas. His bill would punish the person who uses a gun in the commission of a crime. So far, Congressman Casey's measure is the only evidence that anyone in Washington is aware that people — not guns — commit

A good many law-abiding citizens particularly in the West, find pride and leasure in the ownership of firearms. It goes without saying that any attempt to curtail drastically the ownership of weapons will result merely in penalizing the law-abiding person who owns a gun. It's even conceivable that strict gun laws would set the law-abiding gun owner up as a target for any would be criminal interested in acquiring a firearm. It's crystal clear that any criminal who needed a pistol for a planned holdup, for instance, wouldn't shrink from stealing the weapon.


