

## Steelworkers' Union Pledges to Strike on May 1

PITTSBURGH, April 22 (AP)—The steelworkers union voted today to strike the basic industry May 1 to pick up its 18 cents an hour contract demands. At the conclusion of executive board meeting, director Paul Bert said: "No contract, no work." The union's wage committee was scheduled to meet later in the day to give final strike authorization. A walkout would affect 425,000 workers. Negotiators are separated by a 10-cent-an-hour gap. The major producers offer five cents. The union demanded 18 cents.

The hard-and-fast positions plunged steel labor relations to the lowest point since the 116-day strike. The intervening years were peaceful, if not uneventful.

The shutdown of the nation's steelmaking facilities could curtail the booming economy—either in fact or psychologically. In the past, especially in strike years, the union used the wage committee's "strike" money as weapons in continuing negotiations. For that reason, the "vote" doesn't necessarily mean there will be a strike. The union's idea is to show the companies it isn't kidding.

Steelmakers say that all they can get for an 18-cent-an-hour raise would be assurance the union would not strike three and one-half months. The focal point of the argument is the government's 3.2 per cent productivity figure. The government surveyed all U.S. industry and concluded, generally speaking, that annual 3.2 per cent hikes would not be inflationary.

The union says it received less than 3.2 per cent in the last two years. The companies agree with this point. The union says some "catch up" money is due.

The USW figures it should get 3.2 per cent—based on 3.2 per cent of steelworkers' current income of \$4.40 an hour. It is four cents an hour in "catch up" money. The companies, on the other hand, argue that the productivity figure might fit all industries in general, but not the steel industry in particular.

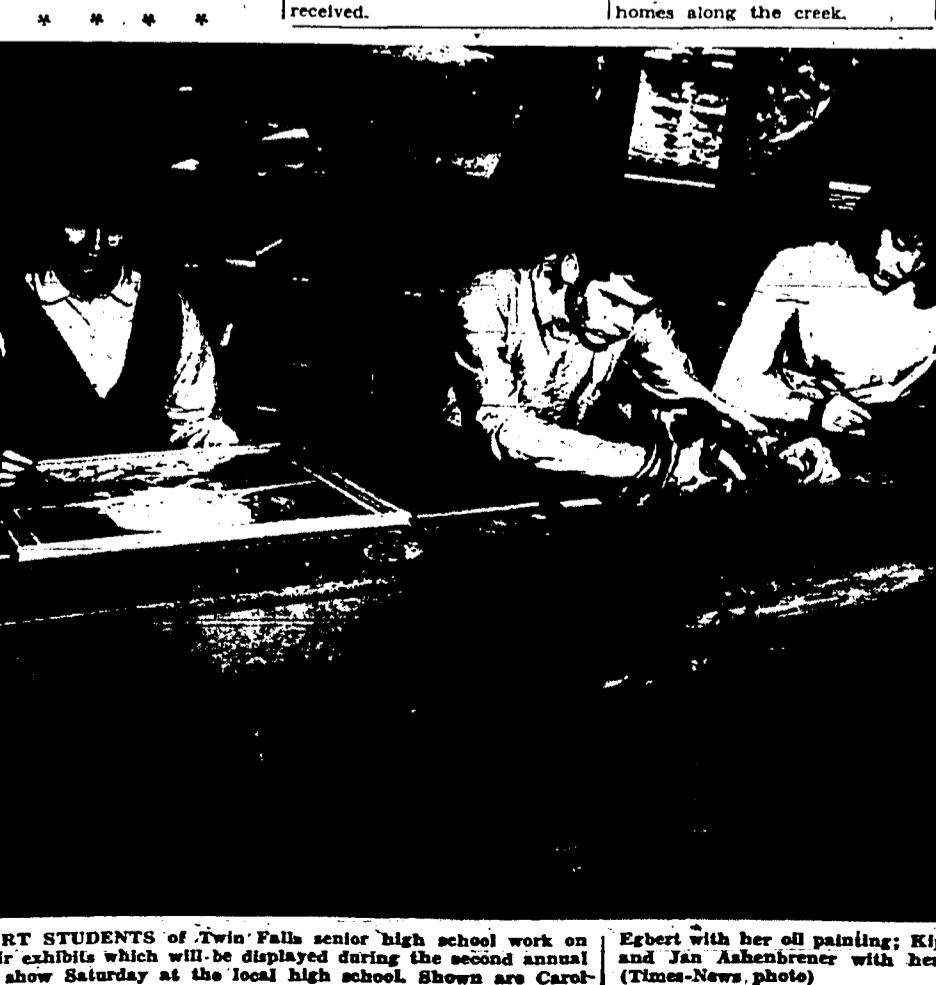

## Idaho's Share

BOISE, April 22 (AP)—State Treasurer Marjorie E. Moon reported today the receipt of a check for \$362,003 from the federal bureau of land management. The money represents Idaho's share of earnings from leases on public lands for the six months ended Dec. 31. The total compares with \$370,517 received by the state for the corresponding period a year earlier. The money goes into the state's public school endowment fund and only earnings from it may be spent.

## U.S. Marines Have First Big Skirmish In South Viet Nam

SAIGON, Viet Nam, April 22 (AP)—U. S. marines skirmished with Viet Cong guerrillas today in the Leathernecks' first extended ground action of the war while American and Vietnamese planes ranged over North Viet Nam on at least nine separate raids. Eighteen navy jets from the carriers Midway and Hancock capped the day by blasting at six communist boats in a river estuary just east of Vinh, midway between the border and Hanoi, with cannon fire and rockets. Pilots said the strike was highly successful.

Planes also strafed and bombed communist targets in South Viet Nam. During an eight-hour patrol into a valley, outside the Da Nang air base the marines tangled twice with the communist guerrillas. One American was wounded slightly, and two others collapsed with heat prostration. The operation included the first helicopter assault landing of U.S. marines in South Viet Nam.

Three squadrons of Vietnamese propeller-driven fighter-bombers—the largest Vietnamese air unit flown so far—lacked a base in North Viet Nam and reported they destroyed it. The target was identified as a base near the My Duc bridge, 30 miles north of the 17th parallel. The bridge itself had been attacked and destroyed in earlier raids.

One of the Vietnamese planes was downed but was believed lost as the result of bad weather rather than enemy fire, a Vietnamese spokesman said. U.S. navy fighter-bombers made five raids during the night on road traffic in North Viet Nam. No planes were lost and groundfire was reported minimal. Pilots reported destroying nine trucks and damaging eight in strafing attacks on three separate convoys. The attacks centered around Vinh, midway between the border and Hanoi.

Navy fliers said the North Vietnamese turned off their headlights as the planes approached, but that flares were dropped and strafing went ahead. On the ground, the marine patrol from Da Nang exchanged machine-gun fire and hurled grenades across a rice field as the communist guerrillas retreated.

It was the marines' first extended clash with the enemy since they landed in Viet Nam six weeks ago. Previous contact had been limited to communist sniping and grenades directed at marine positions around Da Nang air base. ## Gov. Smylie Urges Rivers Act Passage

BOISE, April 22 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie voiced support today for the so-called wild rivers legislation pending in congress, saying it is "a good bill and is sound conservation." "The major result of enactment of the bill," Smylie said in a statement, "would be to restore to the congress itself control over these rivers which in general legislation has heretofore been delegated to the federal power commission. In effect this diminishes the authority of the people's elected representatives." Smylie also made public a six-page statement he said Frank Cullen, Coeur d'Alene, a member of the Idaho fish and game commission, planned to read on the governor's behalf at the congressional hearing on the bill in Washington, D. C.

## Hearings Set Next Week On Medicare

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—The senate finance committee announced yesterday it will start hearings April 29 on President Johnson's six billion dollar health care-social security bill. The fireworks are not expected to start until the first non-government witnesses will be heard. These will include spokesmen for the American Medical association, which contends the bill would centralize control over hospitals and doctors "under a federal bureaucracy."

## Area Science Students Get Top Award

Two Magic Valley seniors have been appointed by Gov. Robert E. Smylie to represent Idaho at the national youth science camp in West Virginia. They are Richard Lee Goldberg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Goldberg, Ketchum, and James Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Williams, Gooding. The science camp has been featured by West Virginia for three years and Idaho representatives have attended each year. Emphasis at the camp is placed on the latest development in the fields of science and physical education.

Williams applied through a recommendation from Ted Nehrbass, his physics department teacher. Mrs. Williams said he has taken all the science courses offered at school. Last year young Williams attended a six-week summer school on national science foundation scholarship at the Colorado School of Mines, Golden. Goldberg, 17, will be graduated from the Wood River high school this spring. He attended Brethart school in Chicago and attended grade school at Ketchum. According to Mrs. Goldberg he has always been interested in science and in addition to taking all the science courses offered at school he has almost completed a correspondence course in electronics.

He attended the National Science foundation High School Institute last year at Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill. He is an honorary student. In March of this year he was chosen to attend the junior second symposium sponsored by the army and the University of Utah. Young Goldberg rated third in a mathematical contest given six weeks ago to 3,000 Idaho students. The 10-day encampment provides an expense paid trip for two science-minded high school graduates from each of the 50 states. Governor Smylie was assisted by Richard Kay, supervisor of science and mathematics for the department of education, in making the selections.

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## Effect of Proposed Water Rates on Users Explained

Residential water users who irrigate lawns and gardens this summer can expect their monthly water bills to increase from 50 cents to as much as \$1.98 under the proposed new water rates. The increase depends upon the amount of water used. Both old and new rates are based on a minimum of 4,000 gallons, which the Twin Falls water department says is the amount most residential users will consume during the winter months. Under the proposed rates the fee for 4,000 gallons is \$2.80, 50 cents more than for the same amount under the present rates. However, the water department said residential users will consume from 5,000 to 15,000 gallons of water per month during the irrigating months of this summer. A breakdown shows that under the existing rates, 5,000 gallons costs \$2.60, at 30 cents for every 1,000 gallons from 8,000 to 8,000 gallons. Under the proposed rates, 5,000 gallons would cost \$3.12, an increase of 52 cents over the present rates. Nine thousand gallons under the present rates costs the residents \$3.60, an increase of 52 cents over the present rates. See WATER RATES, P. 2, C. 7

# Circus Clown Found Beaten To Death

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—Friends and colleagues of Paul Jung were being questioned today in the search for clues to the savage slaying of the circus performer, one of the great clowns of modern times.  
Jung's body, his head crushed by a blunt instrument, was found yesterday in his hotel room only half a block from Madison Square garden where the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus is making its annual appearance.  
The 65-year-old "boss of clown alley," as he was known to the circus world, was lying on his back near the door of the hotel room when he was found by bellboy Archie Thompson and Dean McMurray, assistant manager of the circus.  
His hands were tied beneath his body, which was clad in a white undershirt and brown striped pajamas.  
There were no signs of a violent struggle and no indication that the room had been ransacked.  
Authorities dismissed robbery as a probable motive and theorized that the slayer was someone Jung knew and had allowed into his room. An autopsy was planned today and police laboratory experts were examining a three-cell flashlight found in the hotel room to determine if it might have been the death instrument.  
A native of Dayton, O., Jung performed in vaudeville and with several small circuses before joining Ringling Brothers 31 years ago.

Baker, too, said "I don't suspect foul play" in the man's disappearance.  
Bellesen's wife told police yesterday he left in the family sports car the day before and had not returned. The car was found yesterday in Boise.  
Bellesen, 33, got Klan credentials from Imperial Wizard James Venable of Stone Mountain, Ga. Bellesen said he joined the Klan to "show what it was."  
His credentials were revoked when Venable discovered Bellesen is a Negro.  
Venable said in an interview with a Boise radio station that police in the Klan would harm Bellesen.  
"I don't think he hurt the Klan," Venable said.

dental user \$3.62. Under the proposed rates, the same amount of water will cost \$4.40, an increase of 78 cents.  
The water department says residential users seldom consume more than 15,000 gallons of water per month during the irrigating period. For that amount the user now pays \$4.34 and will pay \$6.32 under the proposed rates, an increase of \$1.98.  
The water department said that some business firms using city water will consume millions of gallons of water per month, and that most will use 15,000 gallons or more in a 30-day period.  
A business firm using 25,000 gallons of water under the present rates will pay about \$5.34; under the new rates the toll will be \$9.52. For 50,000 the present rate is about \$7.34; the new rate will be \$15.52. And for 100,000 gallons, the present rate is \$10.84; the proposed rate, \$22.62.  
The difference in rates lies in the fact that under present rates the user pays 30 cents per 1,000 gallons for 5,000 through 8,000 gallons and from 9,000 through 15,000 he pays only 12 cents per 1,000 gallons.  
Under the new rates, however, he will pay 32 cents per 1,000 gallons from 5,000 to 25,000 gallons.  
And when the rates drop again under the proposed schedule, the user pays 24 cents for every 1,000 gallons from 26,000 to 50,000.  
Under present rates, he pays 10 cents per 1,000 gallons from 16,000 through 25,000 and eight cents per 1,000 gallons from 26,000 through 50,000 gallons.  
Present rates call for a payment of seven cents per 1,000 gallons for 51,000 to one million gallons, while the proposed rate is 14 cents per 1,000 gallons from 51,000 to 100,000; eight cents per 1,000 from 100,000 to 25,000, and all over 25,000, seven cents per 1,000 gallons.  
Presently, the big water user pays only six cents per 1,000 gallons from one million to five million gallons and five cents per 1,000 gallons for all over five million.

The PUC authorized the firm to borrow five million dollars from the First National City Bank in New York, secured by promissory notes, and to issue five million dollars in first mortgage bonds to repay the bank borrowing.

**BOISE, April 22**—The selection of Boise as site for a new factory was announced yesterday by Skyline Homes, Inc., Elkhardt, Ind. Seeking the post from zone two, which includes the west side of Burley, are C. Bruce Young, incumbent; Mrs. Charles Haight, Jr., former teacher and mother of three children, and Grant Wyaatt, farmer and immediate past president of the Cassia county Farm Bureau.

Young, who is completing his last term as Cassia county school trustee, moved to Idaho 20 years ago, first living at Boise where he was active in YMCA work. He moved to Burley six years ago and teaches youth classes in his church.

He has been active in Boy Scout work the past 35 years. He has three sons attending college and a daughter attending high school here.

Mrs. Haight, who taught French at the Burley high school for one year, is a former Fulbright scholar at the University of Clarmont, Terrand, France. She is a member of the Burley public library board and president of the American Field Service unit in Burley.

"I am running for the trustee post because as a former teacher I am greatly concerned with upgrading the quality of our school system," Mrs. Haight declared.

"I am receiving support of several women's organizations whose members desire a closer contact with and a better understanding of the decision-making body of the Cassia county schools. There has not been a woman on the board here for many years."

"I feel I could do much to bring to the attention of other women the educational problems faced by our community and by combining our energies and talents we can work effectively toward bettering our schools," Mrs. Haight declared.

Young university and Utah State university, has been active in Boy Scout and youth work. He was graduated from the Burley high school and has four children in the county school district. He farms 200 acres southwest of town.

"I would like to see adequate school facilities for a better education program for all students in Cassia county," the candidate declared.

## Senseless Crimes Threaten to Become Familiar Part of City Life in Britain

**LONDON, April 22 (NEA)**—Muggings and other senseless crimes of violence that have plagued New York and other big American cities now threaten to become a familiar part of city life in Britain.

Parts of London are becoming unsafe to ordinary law-abiding persons after dark as young hoodlums roam the streets, bent on destruction.

In the last week in December, 1964, muggings alone accounted for three murders in London, two of which took place outside of pubs. All of these killings were apparently motiveless.

There are two new factors which make the present wave of violence different from preceding ones, and which give the police cause for alarm.

One is the increasing use of firearms, usually shotguns by young hoodlums out for kicks.

In the past, teen-ager gangs used their fists mostly whenever there was a rumble, although the old bicycle chain or flick knife made its appearance.

But in recent weeks young gangsters have ignorized their rivals by firing at them with shotguns from speeding cars, making sedate London resemble Chicago of the 1920's.

Smash-and-grab gangs now go armed with everything from sawed-off shotguns to pistols when they raid a bank, a practice which has hitherto been rare in Britain, whose police are unarmed.

An unwritten code long existing between the underworld and the police holds that as long as one side did not take up arms, the other would refrain from taking firearms. Until recently, this understanding has worked remarkably well.

But now gunplay has become contagious, and even youngsters have taken to firing at trains with their air rifles.

The other factor that worries police is the seeming public indifference to violence in the streets, with bystanders slow to go to the aid of victims who are being attacked.

In order to counteract this indifference Scotland Yard recently called on the public to "have a go" at criminals such as bank raiders, providing that the circumstances were right.

This brought the wrath of the British Safety Council down upon Scotland Yard's head. To advise the public to "have a go" at armed criminals is "madness" and "suicidal," the council claims.

Not only would such bystanders get in the way of the police, but they'd risk losing their lives without preventing criminals from escaping.

"You are not being a coward if you keep out of these affairs and let the police deal with them," Graham Spiers, an official of the safety council, explains.

After President Kennedy's assassination the British viewed with horror the ease with which firearms can be procured in the United States. But the situation is little better here. Anyone over the age of 17 can buy a shotgun across the counter.

Most of Britain's shotguns are imported. More than 42,000 were imported in the first 10 months of 1964 from Spain, Italy, France, Belgium and Czechoslovakia—a big increase over the 25,000 brought into Britain in 1963.

Many of these shotguns find their way into the hands of sportsmen and farmers. Britain is still sufficiently rural for large numbers of amateurs to go pecking rabbits regularly on weekends.

BOISE, April 22 (UP)—Opposition to the sales tax represents more than just a fight against a new levy.

For those who live along Idaho's far-flung borders, for those who live in small towns and for those who live on farms, it has become an emotionally-charged battle for survival.

They tell you it hits the small businessman. They tell you it hits the old folks with small pensions. They tell you it straps the young folks with large families. And, they tell you it's evil and they want a chance to vote it out.

Yet it is more than that. In essence, the fight against the sales tax is a symbol of a far greater struggle under way in Idaho. It is but part of a conflict both economic and political that rapidly is bringing Idaho to a crossroads.

In the next election campaign, this conflict will come before the electorate in a number of forms. There are likely to be disputes in both political parties about not only the sales tax but the state spending it represents.

State Sen. William J. Dee, D., Idaho, already has raised the question in the Democratic party by announcing his candidacy for governor on an anti-sales tax, anti-big spending platform. He has counterparts within the Republican party, too, and both are destined to find opposition.

Should Gov. Robert E. Smylie decide to seek the GOP nomination for U. S. senate against incumbent Len B. Jordan, he will bring the conflict to that level as well.

Reapportionment, federal spending versus states' rights, farm subsidies, urban redevelopment — these and many other issues of the 1960's are parts of the conflict for which the sales tax fight is but a symbol.

In picking the candidates they want to run for senate, congress, governor, the legislature and other elected offices in 1966, Idahoans must decide which course they wish to follow.

With his "New Day" program, Smylie has offered — through the three per cent retail sales and use tax — a course of bigger state government with increased emphasis on health, education, welfare and resource development.

There are those who say this is long overdue, that bigger state spending is necessary not only to stop erosion in care, opportunity and development but to stop further encroachment of the federal government.

To bolster their position, they point to increasing federal programs in these fields, to industrial development in neighboring states, to the departure of young people in search of "greener pastures."

ing, for growth through individual initiative.

They believe Idaho, with its population of 670,000 to 700,000, cannot afford to boost general fund spending in one biennium from 98 million dollars to 135 million dollars. And, they say the time has come for Idahoans to "live within their means" and

reject big spenders at both the state and federal levels.

This is the conflict which opposition to the sales tax represents — a conflict that will have repercussions for many years to come. You saw it in part in the national election campaign of 1964, the Idaho legislature of 1965.

It represents a lot more than three cents on each dollar's worth of goods sold at retail. It represents a crossroads.

## Title Fight Okayed by Boxing Group

BOSTON, April 22 (AP)—The Massachusetts boxing commission Wednesday night gave Sonny Liston the go-ahead to proceed with his scheduled heavyweight championship fight with Cassius Clay in Boston Garden May 25.

The commission, in reply to several "inquiries" from Suffolk county Dist. Atty. Garrett H. Byrne, found that Inter-Continental Promotions Inc. is not the licensee of the match and that Liston "is not now guilty of any act detrimental to the public interest."

Commission chairman Herman Greenberg said April 22 there was "serious doubt" that the fight would be held in Massachusetts if an investigation by the commission showed any connection between Liston and Inter-Continental.

Investigators said the 1961 contract which made Liston an official of Inter-Continental had been one of the reasons the World Boxing association had earlier stripped clay of his official title.

The commission, after what it called "an extensive study" said Inter-Continental is "conducting all its business" in the state through local promoter Sam Silverman, the licensee of the match.

Silverman is "duly authorized to do business in the commonwealth" and therefore it is not necessary for Inter-Continental to register with the Secretary of State, the commission said.

## Title Fight Lengthened

PORTLAND, April 22 (AP)—The commercial fishing season in the Columbia river was lengthened Wednesday because the Chinook salmon run is proving larger than expected.

The Washington department of fisheries said the Oregon fish commission agreed to add three days to the season. It will open April 27 and close May 27. There will be 30-hour closures each week-end.

Arthur Oakley, Columbia river fisheries management biologist, said the run may be the largest in seven years. He estimated it would total between 214,000 and 218,000 Chinooks.

The truth is, it appears it could be less than five — individual and ex-

cluding relay events. There is a small saving grace, however, in that this year the local regional will qualify the top three in each event for the state finals in Boise. Prior to this year only the champion and runner-up advanced. The extra spot was a concession by the interscholastic activities association because the track power is found in this area for both class A and B athletes.

On the basis of comparative times it might be difficult to even sneak a relay team or two past the third district. An example is shown in the 800-yard relay where Twin Falls is unbeaten this year. Yet the Bruins' best time is one full second less than a time turned in by Nampa — which ended up fifth.

Boise is the power of the state and Borah is second. They have the speed to control everything from the half-mile down — and are strong in the field events. To give an idea of Boise's strength, Mel Edin, Twin Falls distance coach, believes that a combination of the Boise-Borah teams would whip a state-wide all-star club. If he isn't right, he's not more than a point off.

There are four men who hold out "probables" for advancement past the regionals. Twin Falls has two, George Smith in the 200 and 400-yard dashes and Terry Doods in the mile. Minico has a chance with Jim Whistler in the high jump and John Schorzman, Burley, ran himself into the picture with a 20.3 week in the low hurdles last week.

There are a couple of other "possibles" and more could arise as the season progresses. A lot of the answers will come this Saturday when a few of the Magic Valley schools go to the Boise junior college invitational.

Switching to the class B side, the picture is considerably brighter. So far Magic Valley B runners are ahead in the majority of the events. This is hardly surprising, though, since the area boasts an impressive number of defending state champions.

This area boasts five state champions in Leo McChree, Glenns Ferry, discus; Pat Briggs, Carey, 100-yard dash; Steve Blandford, Wood River, 200-yard dash; Dennis Power, Kimberly, half-mile, and Larry Johnson, Gooding State, two mile.

There are five other events where Magic Valley will have at least one of the top three from last year's finals returning. There is another bright bit to the three qualifiers allowed this district. Johnson won the two-mile last year and Von Nebeker, Wendell, was second. That meant there was no room for Roberts, Carey. It is easily within the realm of possibility that Magic Valley could score a one-to-three sweep in the two-mile a state this year in that all three listed above had had times of 10:46 or better.

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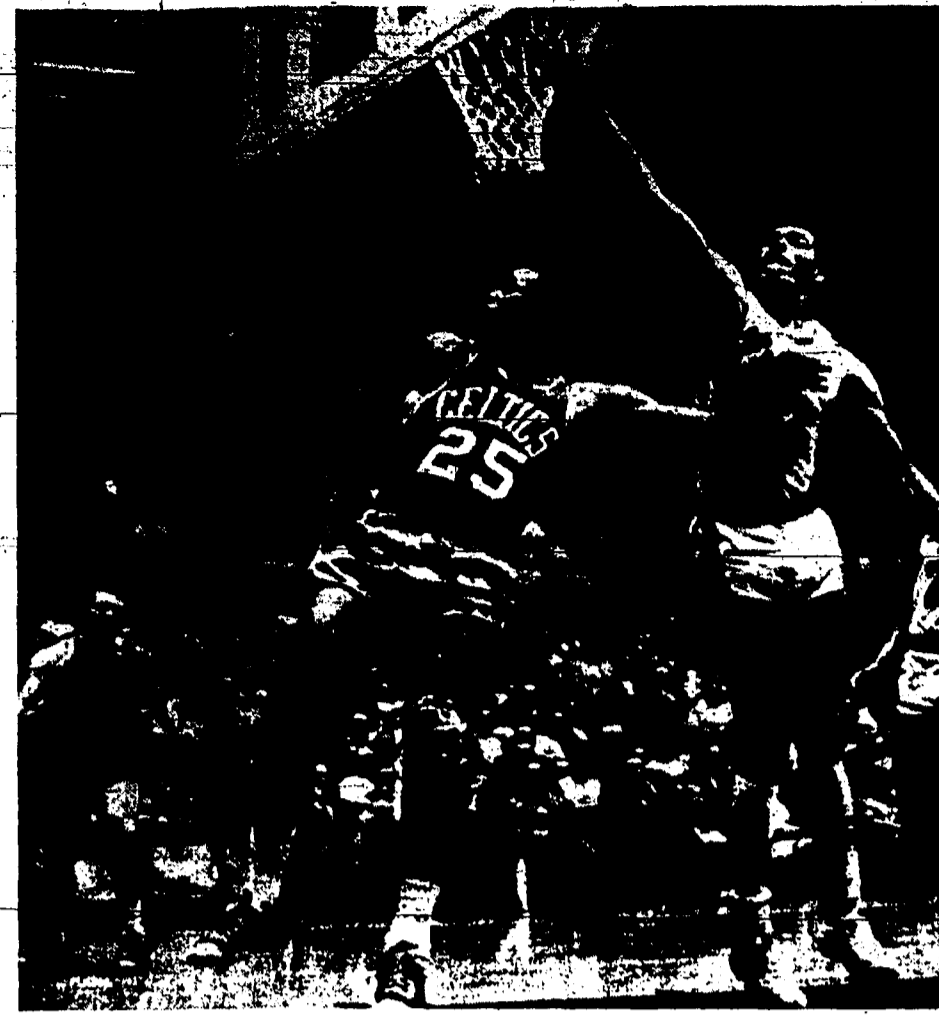

### Actress and Husband Face Bigamy Trial

ROME, April 22 (AP)—Actress Sophia Loren and movie producer Carlo Ponti were ordered today to stand trial in a Rome court July 6 on bigamy charges.

They were originally charged in June, 1962, but no trial date was set pending the outcome of other legal action on their tangled marriage case.

Ponti, who was married previously, was charged with bigamy. Miss Loren, not previously married, was charged with complicity in bigamy.

The producer and Miss Loren could receive prison terms of up to five years if convicted. They have been free pending trial.

Action on the criminal charges was held-up while a civil court decided the status of their Mexican proxy marriage in 1957.

In February the Italian civil court ruled that the Mexican proxy marriage was null because Ponti already was married at the time.

Ponti and Miss Loren had argued the proxy marriage was never valid and they therefore were never married. Opposing the prosecutor's view that the marriage was null because it was bigamous, they presented a 1963 Mexican court ruling that the wedding was invalid for technical reasons because some papers were not properly filled out.

Ponti was first married 18 years ago to Giuliana Finstri. They legally separated. He obtained a Mexican divorce and then in 1957 he and Miss Loren married in Mexico by proxy.

### Actress, Spouse Face Trial on Bigamy Charges

ROME, April 22 (AP)—Italian actress Sophia Loren and film producer Carlo Ponti, married for eight years, must stand trial on bigamy charges, a Rome court ruled yesterday.

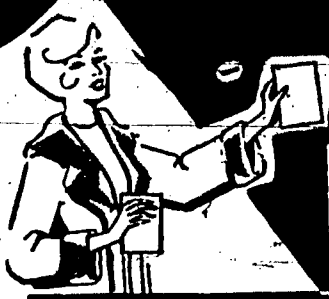

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### Simplot Plant On Canadian Land Planned

POCATELLO, April 22 (AP) — Plans for a 30-million-dollar chemical fertilizer complex in Manitoba were announced yesterday by the J. R. Simplot company.

He said the complex is expected to be completed by mid-1966. He estimated 300 persons could be employed at the new plant, a nitrogen producing facility.

### Contract for Remodeling Hospital Let

POCATELLO, April 22 (AP) — A contract for \$84,460 for remodeling of Marsh Valley hospital at Pocatello was awarded yesterday by Cooper Brothers Construction Company of Pocatello by the Bannock county commission.

The commission squeezed other capital allotments to obtain enough money for the remodeling, bid at about \$20,000 more than expected.

The county has levied three mills to produce about \$106,000 this year for hospital improvements. Of this, Bannock memorial hospital would normally receive \$25,000 and the Marsh Valley hospital \$3,000. The Bannock county nursing home would normally be allowed \$5,000.

But the commission was forced to ask Bannock Memorial to get along on \$10,000 and the nursing home to accept \$4,000, in order to pay the remodeling bills.

The addition to the 17-bed hospital consists of 1,700 square feet and will house the surgical and obstetric facilities. Remodeling will include revision of exits, ventilating, heating and safety facilities.

The hospital is operating under a provisional license from the state board of health. The remodeling is expected to be completed this summer.

## The First World War The Dardanelles, Pathway to Constantinople: 20

There are few things sadder in war than an important campaign which fails simply because it is badly carried out. This is what happened to the major operation of 1915—the attempt to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul), put the Turks out of the war, and enable the Allies to attack the Central Powers from a new direction, the southeast.

When it became obvious toward the end of 1914 that the British, French, and German armies were bogged down along the Western Front in immobile trench fighting, Winston Churchill, then the First Lord of the Admiralty, spoke bitterly about the armies chewing "barbed wire in Flanders" and indicated that there must be other alternatives.

It was first thought that the Dardanelles, a narrow seaway leading to Constantinople, might be taken by a bold naval action with little or no land support.

The steep hills on the 50-mile-long Gallipoli Peninsula on the north side of the passage were defended by Turkish batteries, but the

guns were old and might be no match for the more powerful armament on British and French warships.

Appropriately enough, the south side was the site of Troy, where Homer's heroes had battled for possession of that ancient city.

On Feb. 19, 1915, an Allied fleet with 18 capital ships began the affair by blasting away at the Turkish forts guarding the entrance to the Dardanelles. It did unexpectedly well, although bad weather put off further action until Feb. 25. But on the 26th, marines were able to go ashore and destroy Turkish guns without much opposition.

The fleet moved up the straits, but it was not ready to force passage of the dangerous Narrows until March 18. This delay was fatal, for the Turks had used the time to plant new and unknown mine fields there.

The Queen Elizabeth silenced some of the Turkish batteries with her mighty 15-inch guns. Then the ships moved forward.

Disaster struck quickly. One after another,

three battleships hit mines, blew up and sank. Three others were seriously damaged. Casualties were light, but the naval command, horrified at the loss of valuable ships, decided to call off the assault.

It had no way of knowing that ammunition supplies on the shore batteries were running low and that Turkish officers expected the next Allied attempt to run through the Narrows to be successful. But the attempt was never made.

After the naval failure, an attack on the north side of the Gallipoli Peninsula was planned. In some ways, but on a much smaller scale, this combined operation resembled the invasion of Normandy in June 1944. But the latter campaign was far more sophisticated and vastly greater in the number of men, ships and weapons involved.

Gallipoli was an amateurish, improvised affair in which no one on either side seemed to know what anyone else was doing. And it dragged on for months while troops sickened and died in the hot summer weather of 1915.

### FBI Offers Money, Favors to Obtain "Inside" Information

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP) — Money, patriotic duty, a favor in court—

Those are the persuasions the FBI uses with Ku Klux Klansmen, communists and gangsters when it needs information that can come only from the inside.

Seldom—and usually only for specific jobs—do FBI agents themselves become members of the Klan, the party, or the syndicate.

Frequently—and not only for specific jobs—but often for years of continuing information—individuals already in the organizations are tapped.

Sometimes—and this is more difficult—individuals on the fringes or totally outside, are contacted and urged to join up and start funneling out information.

If Gary Thomas Rowe was, as has been reported, the tipster who led the FBI to the alleged killers of Viola Gregg Luizzo in Alabama, he did so as a Klansman and not as a member of the FBI.

The term "undercover agent" can be confusing.

It sometimes means a trained FBI agent who conceals his identity and pretends to be something else.

But the term also is loosely applied to informers—not in the FBI but who, for some inducement, regularly supply information.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has often said the bureau has the "Klan" virtually wired for sound with informants.

The FBI refused to discuss any aspect of the Luizzo case and

issued a terse "no comment" when asked about a New York Times report that Rowe had been its undercover man in the case.

It is commonly known, however, that the FBI will pay for information, strictly on a cash-on-delivery basis. One justice department source says as much as \$5,000 or \$10,000 may be paid for a particularly important piece of information.

The amount spent by Hoover's men for information each year does not appear in the FBI appropriation chart. But experts describe it as "pretty small potatoes."

Much has been gained from a private, discreet discussion of a man's duty to his country and the need for law and order.

And while the FBI won't talk about it, a potential informant may often be brought around with the oblique reminder that he may, one day, desire leniency for crimes in which he has become involved.

### 8-Death Road Mishap Eyed As Deliberate "Mass Murder"

NEWARK, N.J., April 22 (AP) — Police said yesterday the man at the wheel of a car that smashed into a truck Tuesday night killing his wife and seven of their children may have deliberately staged a high speed mass murder.

Witnesses said Arthur Sherod, 37, became enraged at his wife and forced her into the car at knife-point with their nine children.

"I'm going to kill the whole family," witnesses told police Sherod said as he drove off from the restaurant where he and his family had been having dinner.

Minutes later, Sherod's car careened across four lanes on a highway and smashed into a tractor-trailer truck. Sherod and
