WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—President Johnson says he is very hopeful a way can be found to spark Viet Nam peace talks. But he says the American desire for peace is coupled with a "refusal to retreat." The air-jungle war in Southeast Asia dominated Johnson's 34-minute news conference late yesterday before 300 reporters gathered around television and radio microphones in the historic East room of the White House.

Plane Crash Kills Former T.F. Man, 32

DILLON, Mont., April 28 (AP)—Leslie D. (Doc) Mayer, 32, Dillon, a former Twin Falls resident, was killed Saturday when the single engine plane he was flying crashed after takeoff from a ranch runway 40 miles south of here.

Mayer, a former commercial pilot, made a low altitude turn and headed back across the runway in a plane owned by a cousin, Harold Briggs. Briggs said the plane was flying only about 50 miles an hour and 30 feet above the ground when it stalled and crashed.

Mayer had intended to fly the plane to Salt Lake City for servicing. Mayer was on a flight to Ogden, Utah where his father was in the hospital. He apparently was killed instantly when the Piper Super Cub crashed.

Mayer had worked for Wagner's trucking firm in Twin Falls prior to moving to Salmon last June. He remained in Salmon until December working for Loening, then went to Dillon where he was employed in trailer sales in conjunction with Tom's Trailer Sales, Salmon.

He is survived by his widow, Jeanne, and two sons, Rex, 3, and Mike, 8.

T.F. Pastor Transferred To Caldwell

The Rev. Earl W. Riddle, pastor of the First Methodist church here the past five years, will be transferred to the Caldwell church June 1 and the Caldwell pastor, Dr. Harold N. Nye, will come to the local church.

The exchange of pulpits assignment has been approved by district superintendents in the two districts and by Bishop A. Raymond Grant of the Portland area. The exchange will be verified at the annual session of the Idaho conference to be held in May at Burley.

The Rev. Mr. Riddle and his wife have been active in civic and cultural life of the community. He is president-elect of the Magic Valley Council of Churches and heads the migrant ministry program in Twin Falls.

He is vice chairman of the Ministerial association, member of the Mental Health council and vice chairman of the Visiting Nurses association of Twin Falls county.

During his ministry here, the Rev. Mr. Riddle has conducted God and Country Scout classes for nearly 20 boys.

Mrs. Riddle has organized and directed several youth choirs at the church and is active in the Twin Falls Music club.

The Riddles have three children, Martha, a sophomore at the University of Idaho, and two who will be graduated from Twin Falls high school.

Dr. Nye has served as pastor at the Caldwell church for the past 16 years. The Caldwell church has a congregation of about 1200 persons and a modern building constructed about seven years ago.

School Bond Issue Approved in Jerome

JEROME, April 28—A \$300,000 school bond issue for new construction and renovation of existing facilities was approved here Tuesday by a 71 per cent majority vote. There were 692 patrons in Jerome school district No. 261 who voted for the bond issue and 279 voted against it.

Sonnich Sonnichsen, school board chairman, said in a statement issued after ballots had been counted, "On behalf of the school board I would like to thank the community for its support of the school district and sincerely hope that the board continues to warrant the support it has received."

The bond issue will be used to construct a 12-room addition to the junior high school, provide a new maintenance shop and storage facilities for the school.

Work to be done includes remodeling of existing science facilities at the junior high school to comply with recommendations of the Northwest association of Secondary and Higher Schools. Last fall the association, which accredits schools, warned the district to correct these inadequacies.

A new central district office for the school superintendent will be provided for in the new addition to the junior high school.

Other projects include remodeling girls' shower and dressing room.

De Gaulle Calls for Neutral Asia

PARIS, April 28 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle called again Tuesday night for a neutral Southeast Asia free of outside influence and a strong, independent France.

In a 15-minute television and radio "reside chat," de Gaulle condemned the war in Viet Nam but avoided any direct criticism of U.S. military action there.

De Gaulle said French policy holds that "no hegemony exercised by anyone, no foreign intervention in the internal affairs of any state, no country whatsoever to maintain peaceful relations with any other country whatsoever, can be justified."

Auditorium Site On Addison Avenue East Is Purchased

The board of directors of the Twin Falls Auditorium association voted Tuesday night to purchase the Grace Keveran property on Addison avenue east as the site for the auditorium-convention center. The officers of the corporation were authorized to proceed immediately with the final details of the purchase.

Junior College Fee Schedule Announced

Board members of the College of Southern Idaho set student tuition and special fees at their meeting Tuesday night at the college office in the old county hospital building. Dr. James L. Taylor, college president, said the fees will be in effect when the junior college begins operation here this fall.

The fee schedule set up by the board for students who are residents of Twin Falls county is: \$50 for full-time students. Full-time non-resident students will pay \$375 per semester tuition, plus the \$18 fee.

Area non-resident students will meet these expenses through the county in which they reside paying \$225 and student paying \$168.

Part-time resident students living in the county will pay \$5 per semester hour and non-resident part-time students will pay a total of \$37.50 per semester hour, with their county paying \$22.50 of the amount.

Idaho students who reside out of the junior college area will pay \$393 per semester, which includes the \$18 fee. Out-of-state students will pay the same amount plus \$10 per semester hour more, up to a maximum of \$100.

Dr. Taylor reported that he and Robert Blotstock, Jr., Pfler, board chairman, and members of the Idaho state board for vocational training, interviewed applicants in Boise Monday for director of the school's technical training program.

He said a director is expected to be appointed before the end of the week.

Dr. Taylor said students who have not yet taken their residual American college tests will be charged \$18 each if the local college administrators the test.

Aircraft Hit Red Targets In Viet Nam

(See photo on page 12) SAIGON, South Viet Nam, April 28 (AP)—American and Vietnamese planes hammered North Vietnamese patrol boats, barracks and roads in seven raids today, military spokesmen reported.

Six Vietnamese Skyraider pilots claimed the destruction of six military barracks in one area, eight smaller buildings in a second target zone and 10 other military structures in a third.

They also said they sank 15 junks and hit three small wooden bridges.

Other Vietnamese Skyraiders supported by eight U.S. air force F100 jets hit two ferry areas, causing "severe damage" to the My Ly river ferry 8 miles southwest of Dong Hoi and "moderate damage" to the ferry complex at Huu Hung. The latter had been hit earlier.

Mississippi River Floods Illinois Area

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., April 21 (AP)—The flood-swollen Mississippi river smashed through a levee south of Quincy, Ill., today inundating an industrial and residential area as well as farmland.

Flood officials said an estimated 60 families fled to higher ground as the waters, pouring through a 160-foot-long breach, flooded about 5,500 acres in the South Quincy drainage district.

Cancer Drug Trial Starts In Chicago

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—Dr. Andrew C. Ivy and three associates went on trial in U. S. district court today on charges of fraud in connection with the "cancer drug" Krelbiozen.

After many delays, the case was called in Judge Julius J. Hoffman's court. But it may be some time before testimony is given.

Hoffman himself was to conduct the questioning of the prospective jurors, and his examination was expected to be technical and thorough.

The government was expected to take two months for its case, said it was not known how long the defense would take. In all, court observers said the case may last four to five months.

Mediator to Assist With New Contract

SUN VALLEY, April 28—A federal mediator is expected at Sun Valley May 7 to help negotiate a new contract with about 50 employees and the Janus corporation.

Thomas McGehee, secretary-treasurer of the Sun Valley-Ketchum Trades council, said there have been five meetings with officials of the Janus corporation over the labor contract, dealing with wages, hours and working conditions at Sun Valley.

Trade unions belonging to the Trades council include carpenters, steamfitters, electricians, operating engineers, painters, teamsters and laborers.

Joseph Leggett, vice president of the Janus corporation, said wages to the various trades vary from a low of \$2.60 per hour to a high of \$3.25.

On an average, the corporation has offered about a 15 cent hour increase and the Trades council is asking for an average of 18 cents, with the rate differing in the various unions.

Contract between the union and the corporation will expire Saturday. Members of the Trades council are only about one-fifth of the personnel employed at the resort, Leggett said.

U.S. Plane Damaged by Korean Jets

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—A U.S. RB47 reconnaissance plane was attacked and damaged by two North Korean MIG17 fighters over the Sea of Japan, 50 miles from the Korean mainland yesterday, the defense department announced today.

The brief announcement said the U.S. plane suffered damage but was able to land safely at Yokota air base in Japan and there were no injuries to the crew.

The incident occurred about 11:30 p.m. EDT yesterday. The defense department said, "The aircraft was flying more than 80 miles from the Korean mainland, and parallel to the coast, at the time of the attack."

Steel Union Adopts Pact Extension

PITTSBURGH, April 28 (AP)—The United Steelworkers union today adopted a four-month, no-strike contract extension. The union had overcome a rising tide of opposition before agreement was reached.

Buhl Youth Is Awarded Scholarship

BUHL, April 28—Richard W. Zurek, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Zurek, route 3, Buhl, has won a National Merit Scholarship corporation award to Michigan State University. He is one of six students in Idaho, and the only one in Magic Valley to obtain a scholarship under the program.

Zurek is valedictorian of his senior class at Buhl, belongs to the student senate, is president of the National Honor society, was business manager for the senior class play and served as Spanish club president.

He has received the Bausch and Lomb Science award and intends to study mathematics at Michigan State, the nation's oldest land grant university, which has about 400 merit scholars enrolled on its campus.

More than 1,000 outstanding students—the largest number in the history of the nationwide program—have been named winners of four-year awards to the colleges of their choice.

Individual financial need determines the amount of each winner's award, but stipends range from \$400 to \$6,000, more for the four years of college. Average maximum stipend is \$1,500 or \$6,000 for the four years.

Soviet Aide Confers With French Chief

PARIS, April 28 (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko conferred here yesterday in a "friendly" meeting that apparently warmed up French-Soviet relations but produced no startling new agreements.

De Gaulle and Gromyko talked for an hour and 20 minutes with only interpreters present in the French president's private office at the Elysee palace.

Shortly before they met, the French foreign office announced that France and Outer Mongolia had decided to establish diplomatic relations, following three months of negotiations.

No official explanation was given for the French move. It was noted, however, that France has been tightening up its relations recently with communist bloc countries. The French established diplomatic relations with Communist China 15 months ago.

After the meeting with de Gaulle, Gromyko described the talk as "useful." He said the atmosphere was friendly.

Gromyko said he and de Gaulle discussed a number of direct French-Soviet problems as well as some international problems.

Club Told of Need for Water Improvement

Needed improvements to the Twin Falls water supply and distribution system were discussed by Dr. John P. McNeese and City Engineer Paul Newton, representing the TWIN Falls Water Improvement committee, during a meeting of the Twin Falls Exchange club Tuesday noon at the Rogerson hotel Desert room.

McNeese explained problems and inadequacies in the city's present water system and told what proposed improvements would be made if the May 18 2.5 million dollar bond issue election is approved.

If the bond election passes, the city would take its water supply from Blue lakes on the north side of the Snake river canyon; would discontinue use of five pumps which now pump only sand or contaminated water; build a new five million gallon reservoir near Frontier field and cover the existing reservoir, and make improvements to the city's water mains and distribution system.

It was pointed out that the new supply of water would require only light chlorination, which would hardly be detected in drinking water. No other chemicals would be needed and the current taste would not be present in the new system. It was noted.

McNeese noted it is not planned that taxes would be increased to pay for the proposed improvements. Instead, they would be paid through an increase in water rates and by lease of canal water-shares.

One point, stressed during a question and answer period, was that proposed increases in water rates would still go into effect, regardless of whether or not the bond issue is approved.

McNeese commented that basically the problem is whether to improve the city's water system now with a bond issue, or to do it over a period of 20 years, which would cost the same and would result in less improvement than from the bond issue.

McNeese said main problems in the present water system are bad taste, low pressure, limited capacity and no room for growth with the current facilities, and that the old equipment is wearing out and needs to be replaced.

When asked if fire insurance rates would be affected if the bond issue was not passed, McNeese and James Blake, a local insurance man and member of the club, noted that Twin Falls is now rated as class five, and could be changed to class seven, which has higher insurance rates, if the city's water system is not improved.

It was pointed out that on hot days there often is not enough water in the mains to put out

fires in Twin Falls with the present system.

McNeese showed several slides at the beginning of his discussion which showed some of the existing facilities, the contaminated water in the present uncovered reservoir south of the Twin Falls labor camp, and showed the site of the proposed new source of water at Blue lakes. He also passed around pictures which showed the contaminated source of water at Miller dam.

Newton explained the present distribution system and noted the city has some dead-end lines and mains which are too small to adequately serve some residential sections of the city. He said it is planned that the dead-end pipes would be connected, resulting in improved pressure and distribution.

"It isn't a matter of tearing out all the small lines," he said, "but one of connecting them with larger mains."

"In 20 years we could spend the same amount as the proposed bond issue in just patching

up and making minor improvements to the old system," McNeese said. "If we don't do anything at all, it will still cost. Doing nothing will be just as expensive and without accomplishing anything."

"Why not another well, instead of turning to another source of water?" McNeese asked.

Then he pointed out the city has seven wells of which only two furnish good water—"not a very good percentage."

In conclusion, McNeese noted that the Blue lakes supply has been there for hundreds of years and could probably furnish the city with an unlimited supply of water for hundreds more.

Each member of the club was

given a copy of the TWIN committee's water bond quick facts, which are available throughout the city.

He also said the committee has speakers available for all civic and community club meetings. Those interested in having representatives of the TWIN committee address their organizations are asked to contact either McNeese or Armour Anderson.

During other club business, Lloyd LeClair, club president, reminded members of the regional workshop scheduled this week-

end in Salt Lake City. He urged members to attend the conference.

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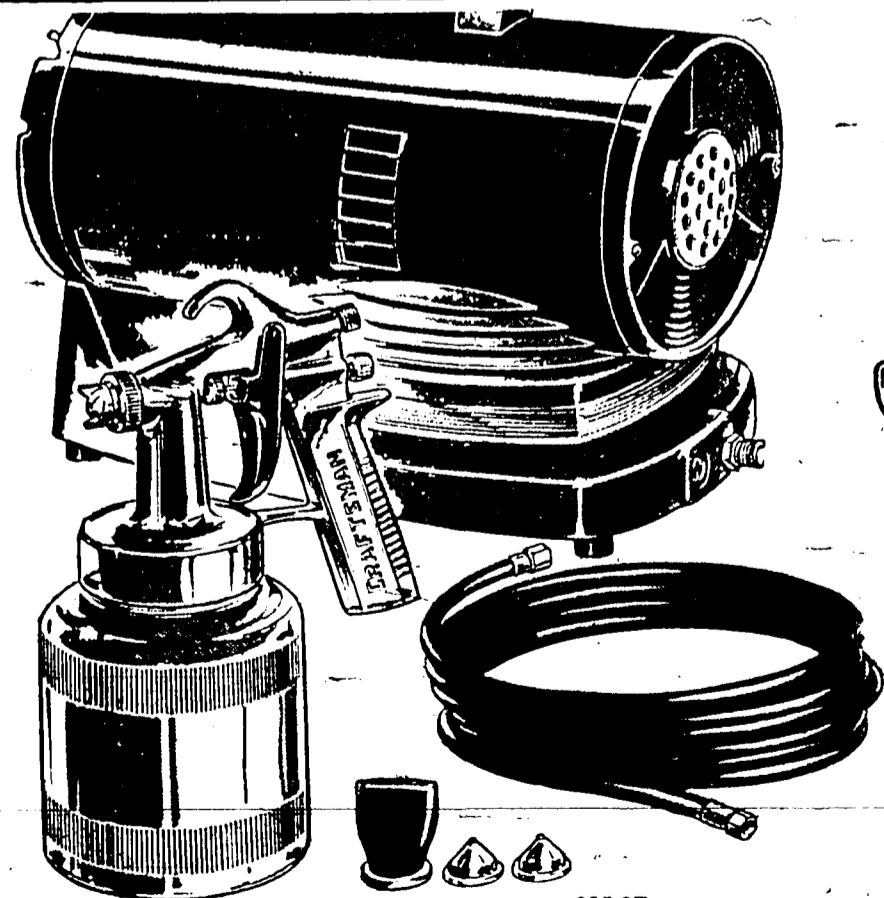
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Top Aviation Posts Are Reshuffled

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—President Johnson yesterday reshuffled the nation's top aviation posts.

The President told his news conference that he was nominating William F. McKee to replace Najeb E. Halaby as head of the federal aviation agency (FAA).

At the same time, he said he was naming Alan Boyd, now chairman of the civil aeronautics board (CAB), to be undersecretary of commerce for transportation.

Charles S. Murphy, now undersecretary of agriculture and a veteran government employee of the Truman and Kennedy administrations, was named to succeed Boyd as CAB chairman.

The President also announced these other personnel changes.

—Wilbur J. Cohen, advanced from the assistant secretary to undersecretary for health, education, and welfare, subject to senate approval.

—Warren Wiggins, who has been with the peace corps since its inception in 1961, to be deputy director of the corps. He replaces Bill Moyers who has become a member of the President's staff.

—Donald F. Turner, former supreme court law clerk who now is serving as a visiting professor at Stanford university, as assistant attorney general in charge of the anti-trust division.

—Leonard C. Meeker, deputy legal advisor for the state department, as top legal advisor of the department.

—John A. Schnitzler, 40, director of agricultural economics of the department of agriculture, to be undersecretary of agriculture, succeeding Murphy.

Administration sources said Johnson's selection of McKee, a procurement specialist for the air force, was tied to Johnson's dissatisfaction with progress of the program to develop a supersonic transport plane (SST). The President was represented as feeling that the SST program needs the best possible procurement expert.

Murphy handled cases before the CAB as a private attorney, and Johnson was said to feel Murphy's deliberate, thorough record in government made him ideal for the CAB job.

The new head of civil aviation is a former career military man. Murphy, the CAB chief, is a 21-year veteran of government service under four presidents. Although he has no aviation background, he is regarded as an expert on legislative work.

Children must be 5 years of age by Oct. 15 to be enrolled. Parents are requested to bring students' birth certificates for registering records.

New first graders will be given an orientation and be entertained in the first grade rooms of the various schools. Parents will be briefed on requirements and given suggestions on getting the student ready for school. Importance of a physical checkup and immunizations will be stressed.

Living Costs Rose Slightly Last Month

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—Higher prices for fresh vegetables and medical services caused consumer costs to rise one-tenth of one per cent in March, the labor department said today. Costs also were slightly higher for rent, furniture, clothing, and recreation during the month. The government's index of consumer prices — the cost of living index — in March was 109 per cent of the 1957-59 average. That meant it cost \$10.90 last month to buy goods and serv-

ices which cost \$10 during the base period. The 109 index compared with a 108.9 figure for February. It was 1.2 per cent above the figure for March, 1964. Increases in food prices accounted for about half of the monthly price rise. A Labor department official said most of the food price rise could be traced to unseasonably cold and windy weather conditions in Florida early this year. The unusual weather retarded the growth of tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, and celery. Potatoes already were in short supply because of a small crop last year. Medical costs rose faster than they have been, with higher fees for doctors and dentists, higher hospital costs and increased

Charles A. Lindbergh Is Striving to Save Wildlife

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The "Lone Eagle" is striving mightily to save elephants, white winged doves, grizzly bears, prairie chickens and other wildlife from extinction. Why is Charles A. Lindbergh doing this? Why is he contributing generously from his wealth, why is he twisting the arms of friends to do likewise, why is he talked the subject up zealously, in his quiet, publicity-shy way? There are two reasons: He is awed by "God's miracle of life," and he knows that many of God's other creatures are menaced by mankind's all-encompassing advance into the habitats of animals. He sometimes wonders if progress as typified by his solo flight over the Atlantic in 1927 in the little "Spirit of St. Louis" — is worthwhile if it leads to the disappearance of species it took billions of years of evolution to produce. Lindbergh, now 63, has been working quite a while on his more-than-hobby. His intense interest in it was highlighted this week when it was announced that he had been named a director of the World Wildlife fund. This organization raises money to save birds and beasts by

such activities as preserving natural habitats of dwindling species; encouraging law officers to crack down on poachers; trying to breed rare animals in captivity — and then releasing them to the wild. Lindbergh, whose home is in Darien, Conn., comes to Washington often, and whenever he does, he drops in at the office of the wildlife management institute to ask how the campaign is going. The president of the institute is Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, 75, former director of the U. S. Fish and wildlife service and world authority on ways to save creatures facing extinction. Knowing Lindbergh's retiring

disposition — the flier is extremely averse to news interviews—Gabrielson had little to say about Lindbergh's intense interest in wildlife projects. But other sources pointed to an article Lindbergh wrote for Reader's Digest last year in which he said: "Is civilization progress? The challenge, I think, is clear; and as clearly, the final answer will be given not by our amassment of knowledge, or by the discovery of our science, or by the speed of our aircraft, but by the effect our civilized activities as a whole have upon the qualities of our planet's life—the life of plants and animals as well as that of men."

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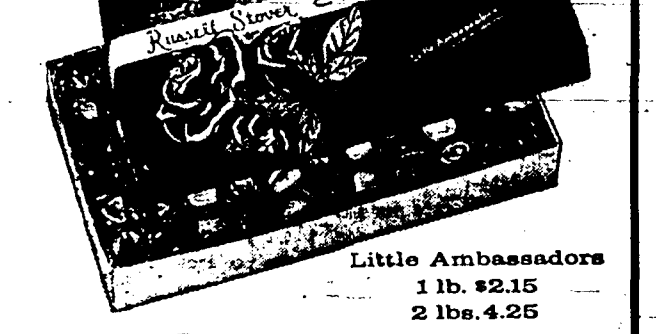

Infiltration Along Loation Trail Rises

VIENTIANE, Laos, April 28 (AP)—Infiltration of North Vietnamese troops southward along the "Ho Chi Minh trail" through back country Laos rose sharply after U. S. air strikes were launched against North Viet Nam, informed sources said yesterday.

The sources said troops are moving down the trail—actually a network of roads and jungle tracks—along several routes negotiable by truck.

They move only at night and appear to be headed for the north central sector of South Viet Nam, east of Da Nang, site of the marine-protected U. S. air base.

The sources said movements of communist forces down the jungle routes was being closely watched despite difficulties presented by the mountainous terrain. It appeared certain that they are headed into South Viet Nam rather than toward any Laotian operation, they said.

Other reliable sources reported "bombardment of North Viet Nam has cost the communist Pathet Lao many of their anti-aircraft weapons as North Vietnamese reclaimed them for defense of their own industrial areas.

Laotian pilots flying air strikes against Pathet Lao positions report little flak.

U. S. jets bombed anti-aircraft installations in Laos after unarmed reconnaissance planes were shot down in the northeast Laos last year.

However, the Pathet Lao radio continues to claim large numbers of U. S. jets and Laotian T-28s downed over communist-held areas.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 28 (AP)—State motor vehicle inspectors and Bridgeport police stopped 1,200 cars and trucks yesterday in a surprise crackdown.

The driver, Michael J. Kwokadr, 19, Seymour, was given a warning. The car, which could be turned only to the right, was towed away.

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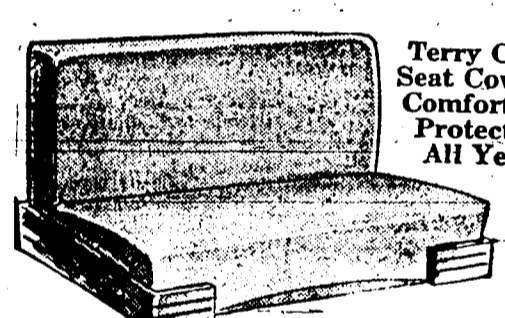
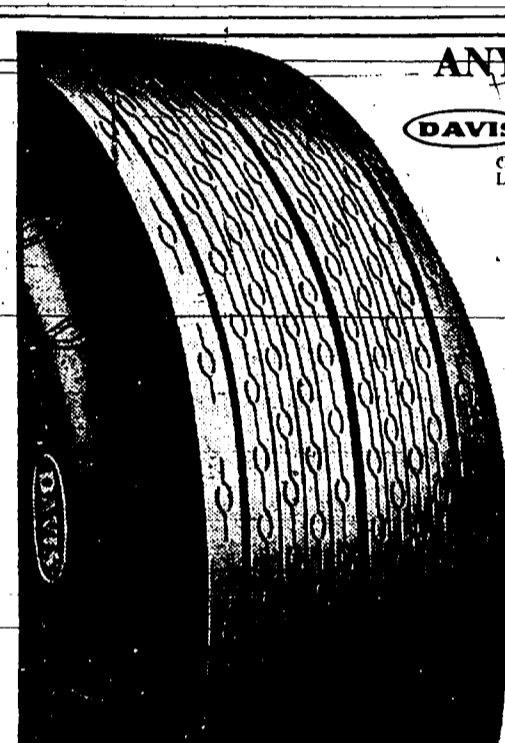

The former Cortez, Colo., soldier said his plane ran out of gasoline while dodging a snow storm.

A doctor here said Keen lost 30 pounds, but was in good condition. Keen said he ate a small portion of raisins and chocolate from his survival rations in addition to the grass.

COMEDIAN IMPROVES CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—Comedian Joe E. Brown, who underwent surgery April 16 to correct a back condition caused by old injuries, is progressing well, says a spokesman. He is expected to leave Franklin Boulevard hospital in a week.

One Left Top Cuban Aide Receives Asylum in U.S.

BEIRUT, Lebanon, April 28 (AP)—Downtown Beirut, center of a city of nearly a million, had two public telephone booths and now has one. Somebody stole the other.

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP)—A top Cuban diplomat who defected rather than return to his home and live under Premier Fidel Castro arrived in New York yesterday aboard the Queen Mary. He asked for and received political asylum in this country.

Julio Cesar del Castillo had been consul-general in the Cuban embassy in London for five years. When he was summoned home, he decided to defect with his wife, Violetta. He is the 15th Cuban diplomat to leave the Castro regime in the past three years.

"My political beliefs are so different from Castro's that I would not want to live under him," he said. "However, I eventually hope to return to Cuba."

In the meantime, he and his wife will make their home with their son, Dr. Julio C. Del Castillo, Jr., a neurosurgeon practicing in Quincy, Ill.

Benjamin Franklin's Gift On Display at Museum Here

When Samuel Osgood, the first postmaster general of the United States, went to France in 1785, he received a gift from one of history's greatest men, Benjamin Franklin.

Franklin was, at the time, living in France and having met Osgood and talked with him to some extent in Paris, he presented the postmaster general with a new gold watch.

Both the postmaster general and Franklin might have been surprised had they realized that almost 200 years later the watch would have found its way to a private museum in Twin Falls, Idaho.

The watch, looking much the same as it did when Franklin presented it to Osgood, may be seen at Herrett's Arts and Sciences center, 1220 Kimberly road.

Made of solid gold with 13 jewels, the dedication is engraved in old French in the back of the watch.

The timepiece has been passed down through six generations of Samuel Osgoods to Samuel W. Osgood, Jr., who inherited it from his father, the late Samuel W. Osgood.

The latest Samuel Osgood, who operates a service station in Rupert, and his mother, Mrs. S. W. Osgood, also Rupert, loaned the watch to Norman R. Herrett for display.

Mussolini Was Executed 20 Years Ago

ROME, April 28 (AP)—Twenty years ago today Italian partisans caught a fleeing man in a German helmet and army overcoat—and executed Benito Mussolini, Mussolini and his mistress, Claretta Petacci, were near Dongo, on Lake Como just a few miles from the Swiss Alps, when they were seized and shot on April 28, 1945.

Their bodies were trucked to Milan the next day, mauled by angry crowds and hoisted up by the heels in front of a gas station.

Mussolini would have been almost 82 now if he had survived the past two decades.

His widow, Rachele, 78, runs a small restaurant in northern Italy.

New Law Helps Counties Set up Libraries

A new law passed during the 38th legislative session just ended, will give counties considerably more leeway in establishing libraries.

The law, which amends Idaho code, also provides that persons voting in an election to create a library district do not have to be taxpayers or property owners.

They must, however, meet residential and age qualifications.

The law provides three ways by which a library district may be established: By election, by petition and by resolution of the board of county commissioners.

In establishing a district by election, petitions calling for it have to be filed with the county clerk within 30 days after the filing of the board of county commissioners has to call an election with the date not more than 60 days after the petitions were filed with the clerk.

A majority vote is necessary to decide the question.

In lieu of establishing an independent library, the library board of trustees can buy specified library services by contract from any taxing unit, or public or private agency which maintains a library.

The unit or agency from which the library services are bought must, however, file an annual report with the trustees showing how funds of the district were spent.

In the same light, the library trustees are allowed to sell library services to units which agree to pay an acceptable fee.

To establish a district without an election, there are two ways

to go about it.

It should be remembered that a library cannot be established in an area of the county which already has a library district.

All that's required is for the board of county commissioners to adopt, by a majority vote, a resolution to establish a library district.

Or, a district can be organized if petitions signed by 51 per cent of the resident electors who voted in the last gubernatorial election in the area involved are filed with the county clerk.

After the petitions have been filed, the county commission must hold a public hearing on the question. And after the hearing, petitions are canvassed for legality as to the number of signatures and their genuineness.

In other words, persons circulating petitions to establish a library district should be absolutely certain that all the signers are qualified electors from the area involved, and that the number of signatures required appear on the petitions.

The final step is for the commissioners to consider the petitions and other factors involved and if they find that procedures are legal, to declare the library district created.

Within five days from entry of the order to create the district, the commission must appoint the members of the first board of trustees.

Another section which was added to the existing law concerns bond elections.

Bonds may be issued to acquire, purchase, or improve a library site or sites; to build a library or libraries, or other building or buildings; to demolish or remove buildings; to add to, remodel or repair any existing building; or to furnish them, operate the library and buy motor vehicles for use as bookmobiles.

The library district can issue bonds only if the amount does not exceed two per cent of the assessed valuation of property within the district.

The board of trustees may call the bond election.

Finally, the library board is empowered to levy taxes on property within the district to satisfy maturing bonds, interest and judgment obligations.

The board also can levy a tax of not more than two mills on the property within the district for maintenance and operation of the district.

Levies must be certified to the county clerk not later than the second Monday in September, each year.

Mrs. Frank Haynes, Twin Falls librarian, said she thinks the formation of new library districts will be of decided benefit to many areas not having such services.

"This law," she said, "facilitates more readily all the services offered by libraries."

Many things were wrong with Czarist Russia in 1915, but worst of all was the shocking unpreparedness of its armies. Men sometimes went into battle without weapons (they were instructed to pick up rifles on the field); without shoes (they were told to take them from the dead); and without any idea of what to do except die and barricade the way with their corpses.

Before long there was a serious shortage of officers, for the best of them had been killed in the early fighting; and there were few replacements. Russia had vast supplies of manpower, but it was short of educated leaders.

That these badly trained, badly equipped, badly fed troops should have done as well as they did is a miracle. They withstood poison gas in January 1915, captured the Austrian fortress Przemyśl in March, lost it in June, yet went on fighting during a year that was marked with disasters in the field and a steadily worsening situation at home.

The court was a nightmare where the all-powerful czar was dominated by his German-

born empress. And she in turn was under the influence of one of the strangest creatures in history, the peasant monk Rasputin, who has been called "a charlatan, a grafter, a debauchee," a drunkard, a blasphemer and a debauchee. That this incompetent trio should control the fate of millions would be unfortunate at any time. In 1915 their appalling misrule brought on revolution as surely as if they had been working under Lenin's direction.

The Germans moved troops in from the Western Front. Joined with those already in the East and with the Austrian army there, they made a formidable array. Their great assault met with little resistance. Russian troops were slaughtered, and literally hundreds of thousands of prisoners were taken, some of whom seemed glad to surrender. The attackers were able to push ahead as fast as a big force can move.

As had been the case in Napoleon's time, and as was to be the case again in the Second World War, Russia's best defense was her enormous size. It takes time to march across huge areas with heavy artillery, and all the

paraphernalia of modern war. All summer long the Austro-German advance went on along a 700-mile front. City after city fell, position after position was taken. Since the invaders had not expected to move ahead so quickly, they had not adequate preparations to bring up supplies to feed men and guns. But despite internal quarrels and occasional slowdowns, they kept going.

The fall of Warsaw on August 5 was a calamity, but what happened a month later was even worse, for the inept czar then took command himself. Only the coming of a Russian winter saved the country when puny Nicholas II played at being a soldier while the monstrous Rasputin was undermining him at home.

The snow and bitter cold that paralyzed the armies in the field did not stop dissension from going on in Russia's major cities. The people, who had been stolidly submissive to autocratic rule for centuries, were beginning to resent the lack of leadership that was losing the war and ruining the nation.

Morton Salt Firm Lists Profit, Sales

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—Morton Salt company has disclosed its profits and sales for the first time in its 117-year history and purchased a 56 per cent interest in Simonis company.

Morton President Daniel Peterkin, Jr. said yesterday the Simonis interest was purchased for cash from Elmer Rich, Chicago, who helped found Simonis in 1910, and his immediate family. The purchase price was not revealed.

Peterkin said that in 1964, Morton earned \$6,184,915, or \$3.87 a common share, on sales of \$95,293,943.

The profits dropped from \$6,587,791, or \$3.90 a share, in 1963 although sales were up from 1963's \$90,884,012.

A Morton official said the company was required to report its basic figures under the 1964 amendments to the federal laws. Assets at the end of 1964 were \$124,896,880 and its net worth was \$7,610,457, the company said.

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—An Arizona woman filed suit yesterday against the federal government asking the food and drug administration to lift a ban on the interstate shipment of the controversial cancer drug Krebiozen.

Geraldine Roy, 45, Phoenix, said she had been using Krebiozen since 1962 for treatment of cancer. She said that the government ban on interstate shipment forced her to move to Chicago to obtain the drug.

She also asked \$200,000 damages and a judgement declaring her right to receive Krebiozen. FINISHES COURSE VIEW, April 28—Lonny Parish, son of Mr. and Mrs. Theral Parish, View, has completed a 12-week training course at the naval training center, San Diego.

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The East room, the most formal of the White House formal rooms, yesterday was turned into a jungle of electronic equipment, milling reporters and booming public address announcements.

Seated on straightbacked gilt chairs, and watched over by unsmiling portraits of George and Mary Washington, 341 reporters answered President Johnson's call for a press conference. Johnson appeared happy. But holding a news conference in the cavernous East room is not without unusual complications.

Assistant Press Secretary Joseph Laitin explained first that there were not enough ash trays. Second, he said he did not want the room filled up with smoke.

To a man and woman, the news personnel complied. There was one exception, however—Press Secretary George E. Reedy leaned against the East room wall not far from the President puffing on a pipe.

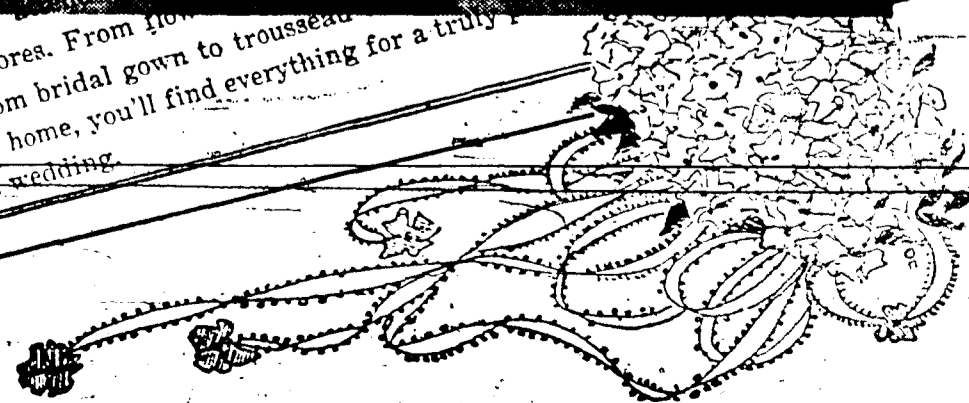

Brides Have Variation Of Bouquets

The bride's bouquet can have many variations—the traditional round one, or a flowing cascade, or flowers attached to a prayer book, or a small nosegay—or even a large spray carried in the arms.

The latter can prove difficult to manage, however, when it comes time to exchange rings.

The flowers the bride selects for the wedding—whether demure, sophisticated or classic—are an important part of the picture created.

Thoughtful planning is more important than the amount of money spent.

A florist can tell you what flowers will be in season when your wedding takes place, and he'll know which flowers create

effects to complement your gown and stay fresh longer.

It might be a good idea to show him a sketch of your wedding gown.

Also, it's important to tell the florist the heights of your attendants so their bouquets can be sized appropriately.

Find out in advance also the favorite flowers and colors of your mother and the bridegroom's mother, and whether they prefer a corsage or pinning flowers to their purses.

Churches often have regulations governing flowers and decorating—and learning these is one less chore for you if you give the florist time to do it.

Tell your florist how many guests you expect at the ceremony, for this will determine

the extent of the decor necessary.

It's just as important that guests at the back of the church be able to enjoy the scene as those up by the altar.

And concerning the reception, greenery and flowers can create a pretty and fitting framework for greeting guests.

One of the most important focal points at your reception is the bridal table—whether you have a buffet table or a sit-down dinner.

If it's a sit-down affair floral arrangements aren't so high that your guests can see one another across them.

Remember in selecting the flowers, that they should reflect you, your personality and the atmosphere you want everyone to remember.

Italian Grooms Leave Brides For 11 Months

SAN GIOVANNI IN FIORE, Italy, April 28 (AP)—Imagine getting married and then not seeing your new wife or husband for 11 months. That's what happens each year in the little Italian town of San Giovanni in Fiore.

The town is poor, and most of the youths seek a living elsewhere. But they save their money, and at the end of the year, return for brides.

This year, more than 100 weddings were celebrated over Christmas and New Years. Family savings were used for one vast succession of celebrations.

But after the weddings, the grooms kissed their brides goodbye for another 11 months. It is too expensive for the bride to travel with their husbands who are working in Germany, Switzerland, France and northern Italy.

Strict Rules Fail to Hinder New York City License Rates

Room 265 of New York City's Municipal building is the office of the MARRIAGE License bureau for the city of New York, which issues more licenses each year than several other whole states.

The number of licenses issued in 1964 exceeded 70,000, or about 3,000 more than normal.

Thomas Lemane, deputy city clerk, attributes the increase to leap year and to the many young men who get married to avoid the draft.

June still is the most popular month for weddings, says Lemane. But other months are catching up fast. For example, in 1965, more than 7,400 licenses were issued in June and more than 6,800 in August.

New York started keeping city-wide marriage records in 1908.

Before that time, the board of health simply provided a book of forms to any person entitled to perform the wedding ceremony.

The official filled out the forms in triplicate, giving one copy to the couple, one to the board of health and keeping one himself.

New York is popular for marriages even though regulations are strict compared to those in other areas. The couple must have a blood test at least 72 hours before getting the license.

After getting the license, they must wait another 24 hours, although this period may be waived by court order in certain instances.

Lemane estimates that three-quarters of one per cent of the people who obtain licenses don't use them.

The bureau itself does some checking to see whether licenses are used or not. State regulations require that the license must be used within 60 days. If it has not been returned to the bureau after about 65 days, an investigation is begun.

Some people who decide not to use the license, mail them back to the bureau themselves.

Lemane says some of them are returned torn up in little pieces. Others are accompanied by nasty letters blaming the bureau for whatever went wrong.

A number of marriages are performed at the bureau's chapel in the Municipal building.

Lemane recalls only one young man who walked out of the chapel to get a drink of water and never returned.

Photographs Are Must on Wedding Day

Much of the fun of a wedding is looking back on it, and having pictures to show your children, grandchildren and friends.

Most brides have a professional photographer take the portrait. And just like everything else about a wedding, this requires plenty of planning.

First, pick your photographer. Study the work of different photographers—from friends, newspaper pictures and other sources.

Decide which style pleases you, then make an appointment.

The photographer probably will advise you to schedule your appointment at least three weeks before the wedding, especially if you want to see your picture in the local paper.

Decide where you want the portrait taken. Most pictures are set in the photographer's studio, but you also can choose the church where the wedding will take place, your home or the bridal shop when you have your last fitting.

If you have a special feature you'd like in the picture, such as a family Bible or heirloom veil, let the photographer know in advance.

Most portrait photographers keep a supply of artificial wedding bouquets as part of their equipment.

This saves the expense of buying a duplicate bouquet and the flowers won't wilt under the hot lights.

The photographer will take care of the picture. You must take care of your appearance. Get a good night's rest the night before the picture taking. Wear the hairdo you plan for the wedding. It's often a good idea to schedule a beauty parlor appointment a day or two beforehand.

Avoid the "painted" look in your bridal portrait, but don't forget makeup altogether.

On the day of the portrait itself, the big secret is to relax. Some photographers even suggest the bride will be more com-

fortable if she takes off her shoes during the picture taking. Few bridal portraits include the feet.

On the day of the wedding itself, you'll want more photographs—taken either by a professional or by a friend or relative who's handy with a camera.

Here are some scenes you'll be sure to want to include:

- The bride in the dressing room with her attendants.
- The bride going down the aisle on her father's arm.
- A scene from the back of the church during the ceremony. (Get the minister's permission.)
- The bride coming up the aisle on her husband's arm.
- The bride, bridegroom and attendants.
- The bride, bridegroom and her family.
- The bride, bridegroom and his family.
- A scene of the couple cutting the cake.
- The bride dancing with the bridegroom.
- The bride tossing her bouquet.
- And finally, the bride and bridegroom leaving the reception and the traditional shower of rice and confetti.

U. S. Couple Weds Twice In Romania

BUCHAREST, Romania, April 28 (AP)—Two young American artists were married here recently first by a communist official and then by a German-speaking Lutheran minister.

The bride and bridegroom, Paul W. Bruner, 25, Carydon, Ind., and Virginia E. Fitzmartin, 25, Penn Hill, Pa., met at the Pratt Institute of Design in New York. Both came to Romania as artists with the American Graphic Arts exhibit touring Europe as a part of the state department cultural exchange program.

The civil service was performed by a woman official in the people's council hall while a tape recorder, supplied by the government, played a pair of rock and roll numbers, "Tutti Frutti," and "Polkadot Bikini."

From there they went to the German Lutheran church, which used to be the principal center of this faith in Bucharest. Now, under the sway of communism, much of its congregation has drifted away.

The ceremony was conducted in German by the 70-year-old pastor, but the couple had been given a translation in advance so they could say, "Ja" in the right places.

They got two marriage lectures, one by the Bucharest official, who talked to them about the virtues of a communist marriage, then by the pastor, who gave them a solemn talk warning them that "love without God is a hell on earth."

As the day of a wedding approaches, it's frequently hard to tell who is more excited — the bride-to-be or her friends and relatives.

One of the best places for everyone to let off a little of this excitement is the wedding shower. It can take place at any time of the day. There are late morning showers with brunch, luncheon showers, afternoon tea showers, buffet-supper showers and after-dinner coffee-and-dessert showers.

Almost any theme can be used for the shower. Some of the most popular are canned goods, paper, kitchen, linen and lingerie.

Experts say, however, that the key to shower success is individuality. Does the bride have a green thumb? Try a garden shower with the invitations issued on plant tags. There are any number of potted plants and garden accessories which make ideal gifts for this type of celebration.

Is the bride a whiz in the kitchen? Hold a kitchen shower and send out invitations written on grocery lists. Invitations for a paper shower could be written on blank checks.

The traditional shower decoration is a parasol, sprinkled with flowers. This decoration is as old as the name "shower" itself, dating back to the 1890's. At that time, Japanese paper parasols were popular, and someone conceived the idea of filling

them with little gifts. The bride-to-be opened the parasol over her head, literally getting a "shower" of gifts.

Other popular centerpieces — either made at home or readily available in many stores — are a bride and groom set or a wedding cake covered with leaves and flowers.

In some areas, it is traditional to end the shower by tying all the ribbons from the gifts together and letting each unmarried girl grab a knot. Whoever gets the last knot, will be the next bride.

Diamonds Are Available in Wide Variety

The word diamond seems to have become almost synonymous with engagement.

Whether you and your fiance shop for an engagement ring together or he buys it alone, there are certain things to keep in mind.

Educate yourself about diamonds. Look at as many stones as possible. Know the different cuts and train yourself to detect graduations in color.

No two diamonds are alike — even if they're the same size. That's why prices vary.

Do business with a reliable jeweler. Ask him to show you diamonds under the loupe — a special magnifying glass which will show the interior body of the gem.

Remember the four C's — carat weight, color, clarity and cut. They act as a team to set the fifth C — cost.

Carat is the unit measure in weighing diamonds. Each carat is divided into 100 points.

Color can vary greatly and will affect price. The whiter the gem, the greater its value. There are over 200 shades of white alone.



UP TO THE ALTAR they go, the Miss and the Mr. (left). And as they turn away to start back down the aisle, they've changed to Mr. and Mrs. An important and never-to-be-forgotten occasion in the life of every man and woman.

Any slight tinge of brown or yellow lowers the price, but it may be so faint it cannot be seen by the untrained eye.

A blue-white diamond is one which shows no body color except blue.

There also are diamonds of clear color such as red, pink, green and even black, but these are rare and may be expensive.

Clarity refers to the absence on presence of carbon spots, bubbles or other imperfections which gemologists call inclusions.

A flawless stone is one which shows no inclusions when examined by a specialist under a ten-power magnifying glass. A tiny flaw that cannot be seen with the naked eye won't affect the beauty of the diamond, but will lower the price.

Cut refers to the skill with which the 58 facets are ground onto the diamond for maximum brilliance.

If the faceting is not precise, according to a mathematical pattern, light can be lost through the bottom or the sides of the stone.

And a diamond requires light in order to reflect brilliance. Cut also refers to the shape of the diamond.

There are four basic shapes: round, pear-shape, marquise and emerald-cut. A round diamond, often called a brilliant-cut, is popular as a solitaire or single-stone ring.

The pear-shape, wide at one end and tapering to a point at the other, is worn with the point toward the fingertip.

A marquise diamond looks like a boat, with a point at one end. And emerald-cut has straight sides and comes in both square and oblong contours.

There are other fancy cuts, such as heart-shaped and ovals which are often set as center stones in engagement rings.

Baquettes are straight-sided diamonds, used as side stones in rings.

Diamonds Are Synonymous With Engagement Rings

Today's traditional diamond rings are all dressed up in new styles.

The classically plain designs, such as the solitaire, are held by either four-prong or six-prong Tiffany settings. Oval and heart-shaped diamonds, called fancy cuts, also are set as solitaires, usually in slender platinum prongs.

Illusion settings also are very popular this year. They give a larger appearance to a small center diamond because metal is built up around the stone, causing the white of the metal to blend into the blaze of the gem.

Reflector settings are another way in which a small diamond can be made to appear larger. A round plate of polished white gold surrounds the small diamond. The reflected diamond

sparkle on the metal extends the true size of the gem.

For the woman who prefers ornate rings, there are numerous styles—featuring engravings on the ring band. Delicate orange blossoms or swirling scrolls run up the shoulders of the ring. Sometimes metal is faceted on either side of the center diamond to resemble baquettes.

A variety of diamond cuts may be set into the ring to produce a pattern. For example, a large round center diamond flanked on the sides by small-marquise diamonds looks like a daisy.

Especially new this year are contour ring sets. Both the engagement diamond and the wedding band, when worn together, seem to be molded in the same design. A tiny metal prong at the top of the contoured wedding band fits snugly into a slot beneath the top of the engagement ring.

Symmetrical and off-set designs appeal to some women. The topside design of the ring purposely is made to lean either to the right or left on top of the finger. Most of these designs have a large center diamond with smaller stones flanking it. The wedding band designed for this type of ring usually is curved, or has a similar design so it fits into the engagement band.

The metal for the engagement ring depends on price and personal preference. Yellow gold, white gold and platinum are particularly popular. The mounting—the part of the ring which encircles the finger—can be of yellow gold, while the head is platinum. The prongs in the head of the ring always are made of platinum, since this is the strongest metal and will hold the diamond securely.

The surface of the metal also adds to the design of the ring. Highly polished surfaces blend in with the diamond sparkle, while textured finishes, such as brushed gold, have the advantage of not showing scratches from wear.

Clouds of Lacy Veils Crown Gowns

According to tradition, every bride is beautiful as she walks down the aisle. Part of that beauty comes from the lacy cloud of veiling which surrounds her head.

Veils come in all styles, lengths, sizes and fabrics, and must be suited to the dress, to the bride's hair-do and to the type of wedding.

Designer Helene Arnhold says lace mantillas are particularly popular this year, with the lace matching that on the dress. They are available in short—shoulder length—or long styles. If the bride can afford it, the lace is often imported from France.

Also popular is the detachable veil—actually two veils in one. This style is used if the bride is wearing a long, formal gown. A short, shoulder length veil is worn for both the ceremony and the reception. A floor length veil is attached for the ceremony only and can be removed to allow

freedom of movement at the reception. Most of the short veils are extremely bouffant, billowing around the shoulders.

The headpiece to which the veil is attached also varies widely. Simple pillbox styles which sit on top of the head are popular, especially for winter, for the girl with a simple hairdo. For the girl with a bouffant hair style, a bow, flower or lace cap can be pinned in the front of the hair, just above the hairline without upsetting the hairdo.

Mrs. Arnhold says that another style-setting for this season is the lace cap which covers almost the whole head and is in keeping

with the simpler hairdos which are now popular. The cap can be topped with artificial flowers, seed pearls or rhinestones.

Most of the headpieces are very small, except in July and August. This also applies to the veils for the bridesmaids. The pastel shades are most popular for bridesmaids' outfits, especially aqua, pink, light blue and Nile green. Usually the bridesmaids' veils are attached to a simple bow which clips on the head. The veils are frequently detachable and the headpiece can be used as a hat later.

Mrs. Arnhold notes that many girls today look for this double

use in the veils they buy since cost is frequently a factor. The price of the bridal veil can range from about \$35 up, depending on the size, the amount of decoration and the type of lace used.

Seed pearls are particularly popular for decoration. It is a good idea to buy the gown and veil in the same place, even if you have a family heirloom veil you'd like to use.

The store frequently can have simple bows which clip on the head. The veils are frequently detachable and the headpiece can be used as a hat later.

PRIZED POSSESSIONS that add a unique decorating touch to the newly-marrieds' apartment can be their wedding photographs. Here is one example of an arrangement of framed pictures above a dresser. Some couples really go all out in decorating the frames for these photographs with colorful paints or tapes that blend in or contrast with the room's color scheme.

Invitations Should Match Wedding Size

The type of invitations you send out for your wedding will depend on what kind of ceremony you're having.

For a small wedding, with fewer than 50 guests, hand-written notes from either the bride or her mother are acceptable. But for a large informal wedding, or a formal ceremony, the bride usually sends out invitations engraved on white, ivory or cream-colored paper.

For formal weddings, a large size paper, folded square, with engraving on the top sheet, is usually used. This is folded once when put in the envelope. The tissue paper is left in to protect the engraving.

A smaller size paper, inserted without folding, is used for less formal weddings.

If you do not wish to use engraving, you may choose a form of printing which resembles engraving. It is less expensive and has become popularly accepted.

Invitations should be ordered from your jeweler, stationer or department stores. Most stores have consultants to advise the bride on the wording.

Invitations to a church "request the honor of your presence." Invitations to a reception read "pleasure of your company."

The invitations should be sent by the bride's parents. If the parents are deceased, they are sent by a close relative.

In cases where the parents are divorced, the invitations are sent by that parent with whom the bride lives.

If all of the guests are invited to both the ceremony and the reception, one invitation is sufficient.

If there is a separate guest list for each event, a small reception card is enclosed with the invitation to the ceremony. The outer envelopes for the invitations should be addressed by hand—never type. The inner envelope is left unsealed and is addressed to Mr. and Mrs. Doe, without first names or address. Young children may be included by writing their first names in a line below their parents'. Older children should receive their own invitations.

Receptions Need Careful Arrangements

Wedding receptions come in all sizes, shapes and price ranges. It's up to you to decide how many people you want to have. Whether you're having the reception at home or at a hotel or restaurant, and how much you want to spend.

A simple reception can be just as lovely and enjoyable as the most lavishly catered affair at a hotel—but it takes more planning. The bride whose parents have a home with a large garden is especially lucky. During the warmer months the reception can be held outside without having to worry whether everyone will fit in the house.

There is, however, the problem of possible bad weather, and the bride who's planning a garden reception would be wise to check with the catering service to see if they provide some kind of shelter, such as canopies or tents, lest a sudden shower dampen the festivities.

Whether you're planning your reception at home or somewhere else, begin early. Lore Mosher, banquet manager of one New York City establishment, recommends the bride chose a spot for her reception about eight months before the date. Miss Mosher says it is possible to plan a reception in much less time, but the date wanted isn't always available.

Find out exactly what is included in the price quoted to you by the catering service. Is it a sit-down dinner, a buffet or a

cocktail-type party? Does it include beverages? Are gratuities part of the total? If there is to be dancing, does the price quoted include an orchestra? How about flowers, table decorations and the wedding cake?

It is also a good idea to check how much variety of choice you'll have about things like flowers, music and wedding cake.

The food will probably be the biggest item in your reception budget. A buffet dinner may be more expensive than the sit-down type because a greater variety of food is required and more food is wasted. Although

there is a great price range, the average wedding meal costs about \$8 or \$10 per person. Punch, champagne or other beverages are extra. Tea sandwiches and fruit punch can total about \$2 per person.

SHOWERS

Bridal showers are never given by the mother, sister, grandmother of the bride or by the guest of honor. Nor are they given by a member of the groom's immediate family.

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3 Traditions Observed in Red Wedding

MOSCOW, April 28—The bride was a 31-year-old school teacher from New York City and the bridegroom was a British student at Moscow university. And their wedding—with touches of American, British and Russian customs— at Moscow's Baptist church drew 1,000 Russian Baptists as witnesses. A church official said it was only the third foreign wedding there since World War II.

The little church was packed for the hour-long ceremony, conducted entirely in Russian by pastor Alexei Karpu. The couple had previously gone through a civil ceremony at Moscow's wedding palace.

The bride, Anne Marie Roos, was given away by the charge d'affaires of the American embassy. She had been a teacher at the British American school in Moscow. A pretty brunette, she wore a white floor-length gown which drew a murmur of approval from the congregation as she approached the front of the church. The Russians seldom see a floor length wedding gown. She also wore a fingertip veil and carried a white Bible. And the organist played the traditional "here comes the bride" just as in American weddings.

The groom, 25-year-old Anthony Hippisley, Ingswood, England, wore a black swallow tail coat and pin-striped trousers. He had been studying Russian literature at Moscow university under the British-Soviet cultural exchange program.

Both responded to the traditional question with "da." At the end of the ceremony, they knelt in front of the pastor and he placed his hands on their heads. Then they stood and he slipped rings on their right hands—Russian style.

After the ceremony, the pastor

performed another Russian ritual—he kissed the groom and merely congratulated the bride. The British ambassador added his touch by giving the couple a wedding reception at the British embassy. The bridegroom's mother and brother were present for the events.

And summing up the happy atmosphere, the wife of one American embassy official commented, "I've never seen so much crying at a wedding."

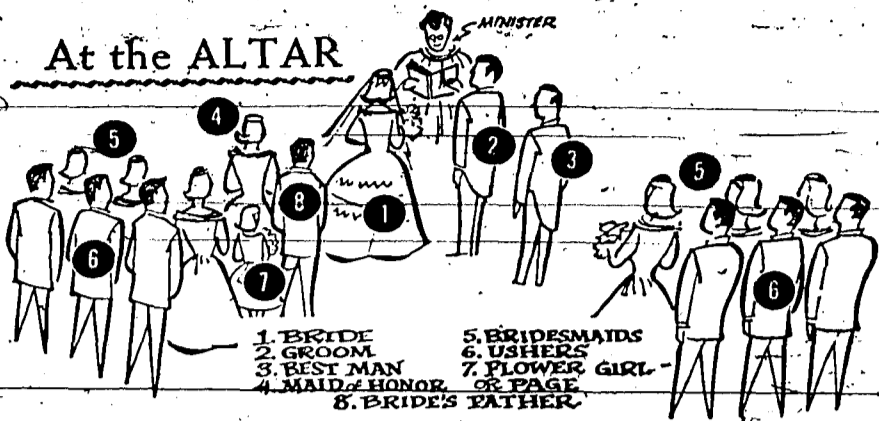

Cooking Terms Are Strange For Unexperienced Bride

About the first month after you're married, you'll decide it's time to throw a dinner party. Your aim probably will be to impress your in-laws with what a fine choice your husband has made in picking a girl blessed not only with beauty, charm, intelligence and good taste but also with great gifts as a culinary artist.

So you break out one of those brand new cookbooks and enter a vast and perhaps strange world of terms. The books are great but sometimes they assume you know a little more about what they're talking about than you do.

For example, one girl was stopped cold when she had to "coddle" an egg. True—that's one that isn't likely to crop up often in everyone's experience, but no matter how long you stand holding that egg and keeping it nice and warm, coddling won't coddle it. To coddle means to cook in liquid which is kept just below the boiling point.

To help you over the hurdles of deciphering those magic recipes, here is a partial list of phrases you'll come across referring to the cooking of meats— which of course will be the most important feature of your meal.

BAKE—to cook in a heated oven, and when this term is applied to meats, game or fowl this cooking method is called roasting.

BASTE—to spread liquid—meat juices or fat—over the surface of the cooking food, generally a roast.

BRAISE—to brown the meat in a little hot fat, then to add the liquid, cover and cook until tender over low heat or in the oven.

BREAD—to coat the meat or fish with fine crumbs made from crushing crackers or dried bread.

BROIL—to cook without fat next to an open flame or over hot coals; this is one method commonly used for cooking various chops and steaks.

DREDGE—to apply a coat of a dry substance—such as flour or sugar—to the outside of the meat.

FRY—to cook in hot fat. There are two ways of frying: The first is to saute with a small amount in a skillet with a small amount of fat. The second is deep-frying using enough fat or oil so that the food will float.

GRILL—means the same as broil.

HEELING—is the final basting of roasts or fowl and is often done with wine or brandy.

MARINATE—to allow the meat to stand in a mixture before cooking; the marinade usually contains oil, an acid, herbs and other seasonings.

PAN-BROIL—to cook uncovered in a hot skillet without fat; and you pour off the fat from the meat as it cooks out.

PARBOIL—to partially cook food in boiling water before you cook it in another process.

ROAST—to cook meat in an oven without it being surrounded by any liquid for moisture.

SCALLOP—to bake food in a casserole with layers of meat, sauce, crumbs, cream or other foods.

SCORE—to make slits in the surface of the meat with a knife or other tool, usually preparatory to inserting seasonings.

SEAR—to brown the meat surface quickly over high heat in a very hot skillet, oven or broiler.

SKEWER—a utensil, usually made of metal or wood, that holds the meat together or in place while it cooks.

STEAM—to cook by suspending the meat in a tightly covered pot over boiling water.

STOCK—liquid in which meat, fowl or fish have already been cooked.

TRUSS—to fasten tightly; for instance, a fowl is trussed with skewers to keep the stuffing inside as it cooks.

Now another word of caution—

The average ages of a bride and groom today are around 25 and 26, respectively, and their engagement period lasts six months. So, what young couple doesn't need to save money?

If this is your plight when you come to decorate that new apartment, take heart. One place you can turn to for inexpensive decorations is your photographic album. You can frame photographs imaginatively and use them to fill the gaps between your furniture and your window gifts. You'll find photos to play in three quarters of the homes you visit. (Incidentally, a survey shows the average couple receives \$1,000 worth of gifts.)

One young couple bought expensive frames at the department store and painted them gray colors, then they used left-over fabric from their living room curtains as the background for the pictures. Another possibility is to use wallpaper or one of the adhesive-backed kitchen or closet shelf papers to create the mats.

Many family members are tempted to have their pictures chosen for such distinction.

Interior designers note that such photographic displays look especially well on walls of hallways or bedrooms, or in the often bare area around the front entrance.

Besides wedding portraits, couples can add candid shots taken at their wedding and pictures they took themselves on the wedding trip.

Wedding Ceremonies Few, Fascinating in White House

WASHINGTON, April 28—The possibility of a wedding in the White House is always exciting. And since Lyndon B. Johnson became President, the public has been watching the social activities of his daughters, Luci and Lynda, with an eye out for any trace of romance.

Actually, there have been very few weddings in the executive mansion itself. Two of the most notable took place in the second half of the 19th century, within 15 years of each other.

One of the most spectacular was celebrated May 21, 1874, when President Grant's daughter Nellie married Algernon Charles Frederick Sartoris, a nephew of the famous actress, Fanny Kemble. Miss Grant's activities had long featured in Washington society. She met her future husband, an Englishman, on the way home from a trip to Europe.

The invitation list to the wedding was limited to 150 high-ranking officials and close family friends. Wedding presents on display in the Oval library were valued to \$60,000 to \$75,000. The Brussels point lace on Miss Grant's white satin wedding gown cost \$5,000.

The wedding ceremony itself took place at 11 a.m. in the East room, decorated for the occasion with orange blossoms from Florida and masses of white flowers. From the ceiling, a huge floral wedding bell was suspended by a thin thread of flowers. The bell swung from a floral arch which included monograms of the bride and bridegroom—all in flowers.

The wedding breakfast was served in the state dining room. The gold service was used and the President sat at the head of the table. In the center was a huge bridal cake, and flags of both England and the U.S. were displayed. The menu was printed in gold on white satin cards.

The next White House wedding took place June 2, 1888, and the bridegroom was none other than President Grover Cleveland himself. When Cleveland entered the White House he was a bachelor and his sister served as presidential hostess.

There had been rumors of a romance between Cleveland and Frances Folsom, daughter of an old family friend and the President's ward. But there had been no comment on these rumors and the wedding itself was almost a surprise. Cleveland wrote to his sister, expressing his desire to keep the marriage a quiet and private ceremony. He wrote the invitations to his family himself, and even revised his own wedding ceremony, omitting the word "obey." Word of the wedding got out, however, and Cleveland and his fiancée were the subject of constant attention.

Again, the White House was turned into a veritable flower garden. In the blue room, where the ceremony was performed, a huge scroll spelled out E Pluribus Unum in flowers. Red and white roses covered the mantels. Red bonfires were used to simulate real flames in the fireplace.

Promptly at 7 o'clock, the Marine band, under the direction of John Philip Sousa, struck up Mendelssohn's wedding march. The President and his bride had no attendants. Pages were written, however, about the

bride's dress, made of corded white satin which was heavy enough to stand alone. The gown was trimmed with Indian silk and bands of orange blossoms and was covered by a silk tulle veil. Some reports of the event said the veil and train were 15 feet long, other accounts made it a full six yards.

Following the ceremony, there was a small reception in the East room and an elaborate meal in the State dining room, where the center of attention was a ship made of flowers, sailing on a mirror lake and carrying the national emblem and a flag with the initials C for Cleveland and F for Folsom.

Ideas for Table Settings Given

Bridal dinnerware, like silver, is usually bought by place settings, each of which is a basic service for one person.

The traditional setting consists of five pieces: dinner plate, salad plate, butter plate and cup and saucer. Another basic item, not included in the setting, is a small bowl to use for such things as soup, cereal and fruit.

Most dinnerware is either china, earthenware or plastic. China is made of china clay and minerals and is non-porous, translucent and resonant. You can see the shadow of your hand behind it when you hold china against the light and it will ring with a clear tone when tapped. Earthenware also is made of clays but it is opaque, porous and non-resonant. It often is more informal in design.

Budget Must For Newly Marrieds

Once a newly married couple has decided that they must budget their money, the hardest job they face is sitting down with a pencil and paper and looking at the hard, cold figures of what their income is and where it goes.

Banking officials and consultants say "It isn't how much money you have, it's how you manage it." And they warn that unless a couple learns to live on their income while it's small, they won't be any better off financially as their income rises.

One consultant in money management suggests that a couple with a working wife should budget their living costs on the man's income.

This is what they'll have to live on eventually. One-third to 40 per cent of the working wife's income can be set aside for her expenses, and the rest be saved.

This early period in a marriage when the wife is working gives a couple a chance to put themselves ahead financially, and it's a chance that won't come again after they start raising a family.

Warning signals should go up when the young couple plunges in on buying a new car. No one thinks about how those monthly payments will pinch when they come on top of furniture payments, for instance.

Besides the monthly payments, there are the car insurance premiums and the money that constantly goes out to keep the car operating.

A young couple should not try to furnish a home all at once, but concentrate on a few big pieces at first, pay them off and then add to them.

It is a good idea to set up more than one savings account. At first the couple should try to accumulate an emergency fund of three to six months of their income.

Then, separate bank accounts can be set up for long-range goals, like buying a home, or shorter-range plans, like next year's vacation.

It's important to plan ahead, also, for yearly bills, such as the insurance premiums, so that you don't have to dig into your savings when they come due.

If you have problems in trying to set up a working budget that covers how you want to live, try consulting your local banker.

Three of Reno's chapels are open 24 hours, but the two operating on somewhat regular hours have more business.

15-Minute Weddings Held in Liberal Nevada Resort

RENO, April 28 (AP)—You can get married in Reno a whole lot faster than divorced—in 15 minutes if you don't want to sit until the certificate is photostated.

The Reno dateline is almost anonymous with marriage-on-the-rocks, yet about six times more marriages go into the record books each year than divorces.

Thousands of couples come to Nevada every year to take advantage of the state's liberal marriage regulations. There are blood tests, no waiting period and normal age requirements.

Marriage is an around-the-clock business in Reno, as well as in Las Vegas and Carson City. Together, the three Nevada cities have 20 wedding chapels. Some are as brightly lit as the gambling casinos.

The chapels offer—for \$15 and up—a more intimate ceremony than local justices of the peace, but less involved than a church wedding.

In three recent weeks, 2,198 marriage certificates went into Washoe county records in Reno. Reno's five wedding chapels handled 1,116 of the ceremonies.

The \$15 minimum in any of the chapels includes a minister who will perform a non-denominational ceremony, and witnesses if needed.

Most often the minister or owner's wife and the chapel's receptionist are the witnesses.

If the couple wants to include a few friends and have the altar candles lighted, the price jumps \$10. And management adds background music.

For \$35 the couple can pack the chapel with family and friends numbering from 20 to 50. But the highest priced category is not very popular.

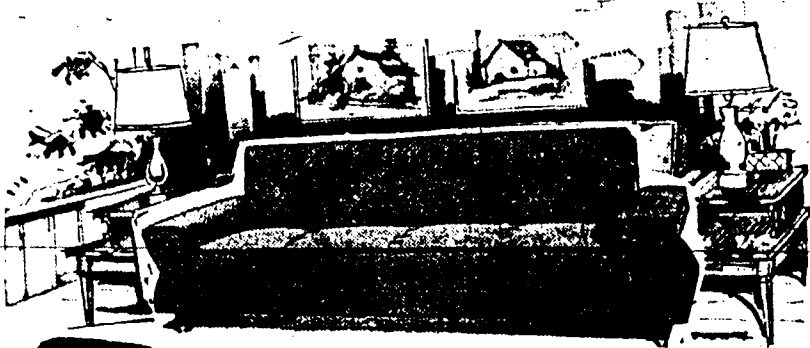
The bulk of prospective newlyweds coming to Nevada arrive alone or with another couple. Double marriages are not rare.

All the chapels will make arrangements for flowers for the bride and the chapel, "at the



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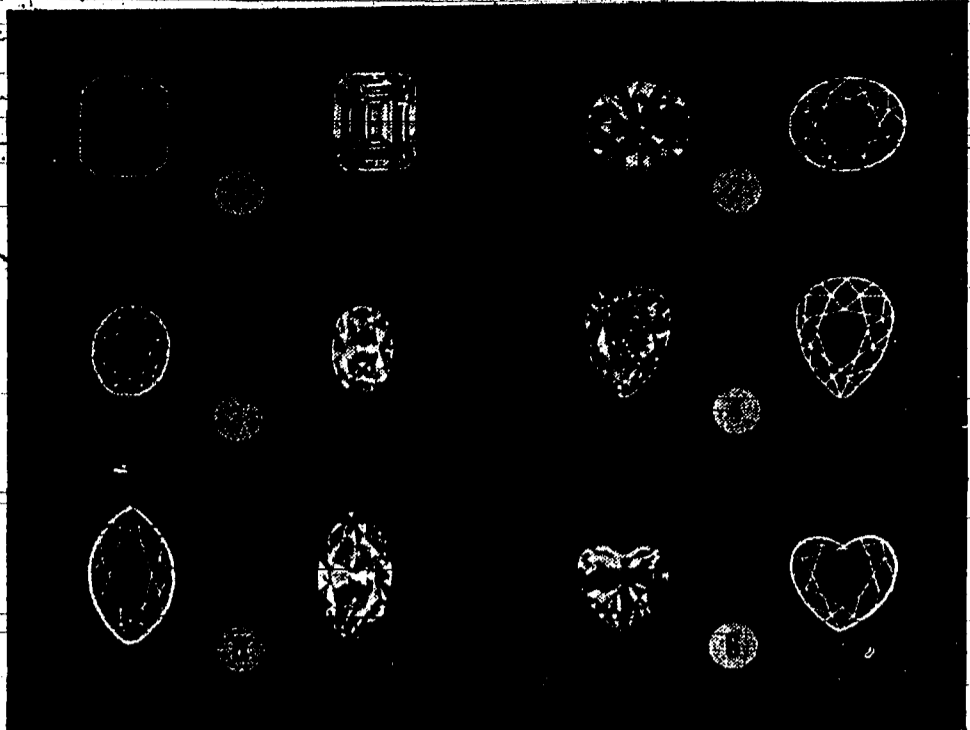

Elopement Is Tougher Now Than in '30s

ELKTON, Md., April 28 (AP)—Gone are Elkton's neon-lighted nuptial specialists and the hordes of cab drivers waiting at the station to direct nervous couples to the nearest preacher.

But Elkton, once the quickie-marriage capital of the eastern seaboard, still has more than its share of couples taking vows.

In 1938, the record year, this town recorded more than 16,000 marriages. Even last year, some 8,400 couples were wed here. In Baltimore, 20 times the size of Elkton, only 129 more marriage licenses are issued each month.

Part of Elkton's popularity with marriage-bound couples stems from its past reputation, but less stringent marriage laws also contribute. Maryland does not require a blood test and couples need wait only 48 hours between applying and receiving their license.

Elkton is also accessible to other states, nestling in the far northeast corner of Maryland, near the Pennsylvania and Delaware borders and only 120 miles from New York.

While Elkton was in its heyday, a couple could be joined for life

Large Amount of Bags Unneeded For Honeymoon

No matter what kind of honeymoon you're taking, a mound of luggage is unnecessary. One large 28-inch suitcase plus a small piece of hand luggage is usually enough for two weeks.

Pack such items as toilet articles and cosmetics in the hand

case, leaving the large suitcase free for clothes. Consider climate when packing. Pack light clothes in warm weather or heavy wool outfits in the tropics.

Select as many double- and easy-care items as possible. Packably in simple styles.

Choose colors so you can accessories—handbags, shoes, gloves—to an absolute minimum by making one set do for several outfits.

Bridal Dress Traditions Are History

Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue.

No one knows exactly where that rhyme about a bride's wedding outfit began. But many of the other traditions surrounding bridal dress are rooted in history.

The white wedding dress and veil worn in most Judeo-Christian weddings around the world today dates back to biblical times.

Hebrew brides wore white for purity and were completely enveloped in veils that symbolized submission, modesty and virginity.

In ancient Greece, it was the custom for brides to spin the flax, weave the cloth and do the sewing for their wedding dresses, also of white.

The Romans carried on the tradition of white. Girls were married in white robes fringed with purple.

The flowing Roman wedding veils, called flammae, were bright yellow. They were held in place with wreaths of verbena which the brides had to gather themselves.

In some parts of the world today, especially in provincial areas of Europe, girls are married in their traditional folk costumes. Since these gowns are so intricately designed and costly, they also are used as holiday outfits.

The bride adds some accessory to the costume to indicate she is getting married. In Norway, a silver filigree brooch is pinned to the blouse of the folk costume.

In Austria and Bavaria, flowered and jeweled bridal crowns are substituted for more ordinary

hats.

Girls in certain Swiss mountain cantons carry long white linen handkerchiefs as symbols of purity when being married. The red woolen braid pinned to the bride's wreath in the Ukraine has a similar meaning.

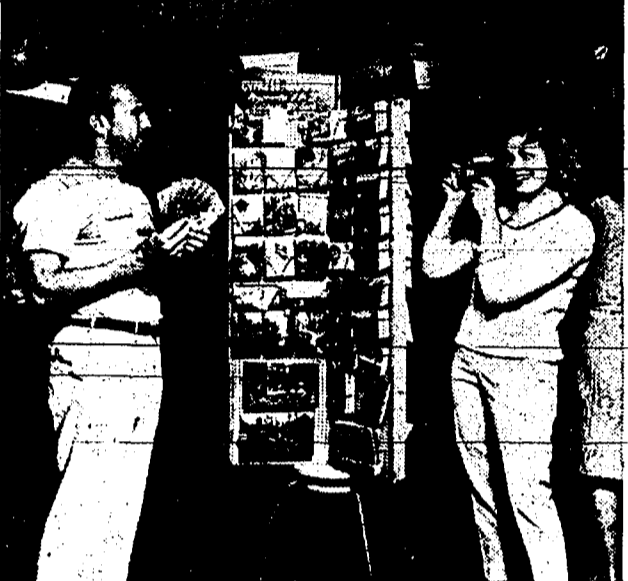
The color red is traditionally associated with brides in the Orient. Everything made for the Chinese wedding used to be colored red—including the invitations, the sweetmeats and the dyed eggs that guests hunted as omens of good fortune.

In 17th and 18th century Persia, white wedding dresses were worn with crimson veils, and in Arabic and Hindu countries the bride's hands and feet are stained with henna for the wedding day.

In Japan the bride wears three layers of kimonos. The outer one is patterned and sashed in red, but is predominantly white, the Oriental color of mourning.

This symbolizes that the bride is dead to her parents once she has moved to her husband's home.

The bridal gowns of India and Southeast Asia are particularly luxurious. Wedding saris are woven of rich parrot silks and often have threads of pure gold and silver.



REMEMBER TO KEEP the background uncluttered as you take pictures to tell the story of your wedding trip. There's no substitute for some camera practice beforehand to be sure the camera is in good working order and to become familiar with how it operates.

Buy or Rent Is Question For Couples

Unless you have a fairy godmother who provides you with a completely equipped home, you'll probably be faced with the question:

"Which is better for a newlywed couple, renting an apartment or buying a home?"

For the young couple, the major expense of a down payment on a house is usually too much. Renting is less expensive since there is less upkeep, no taxes and fewer incidentals like heating.

Also, you may not want to have to furnish a whole house all at once.

If you do have enough money saved to buy a home, the U.S. department of agriculture offers several factors to keep in mind.

First, remember that the larger the down payment and the shorter the term of the mortgage loan, the less the house will cost in the long run.

For instance, a \$15,000 mortgage at six per cent interest paid over 15 years will cost you about half the cost of the original loan in interest.

Money counselors generally advise allowing two and one-half times annual income for purchase of a home.

But do not forget, the wife who is working at the time of her marriage may not be employed a year later.

And children also will increase costs and cut down on money available.

The extras that are involved in buying a house include property taxes, insurance, heat and upkeep. These usually total about four to five per cent of the cost of the home each year.

The total mortgage payment each month should amount to about 25 per cent of take home pay.

This is about the same figure which should be allotted for monthly apartment rent, but prices vary widely with locality. In some areas you may have to go as high as 30 per cent to find an apartment, while in others the rent budget will be less.

With an apartment, you are not buying anything and will make no profit.

On the other hand, you will have less expenses as you go along and will not be tied to a long-term mortgage—an important aspect since many young couples are quite mobile and do not stay in one place long.

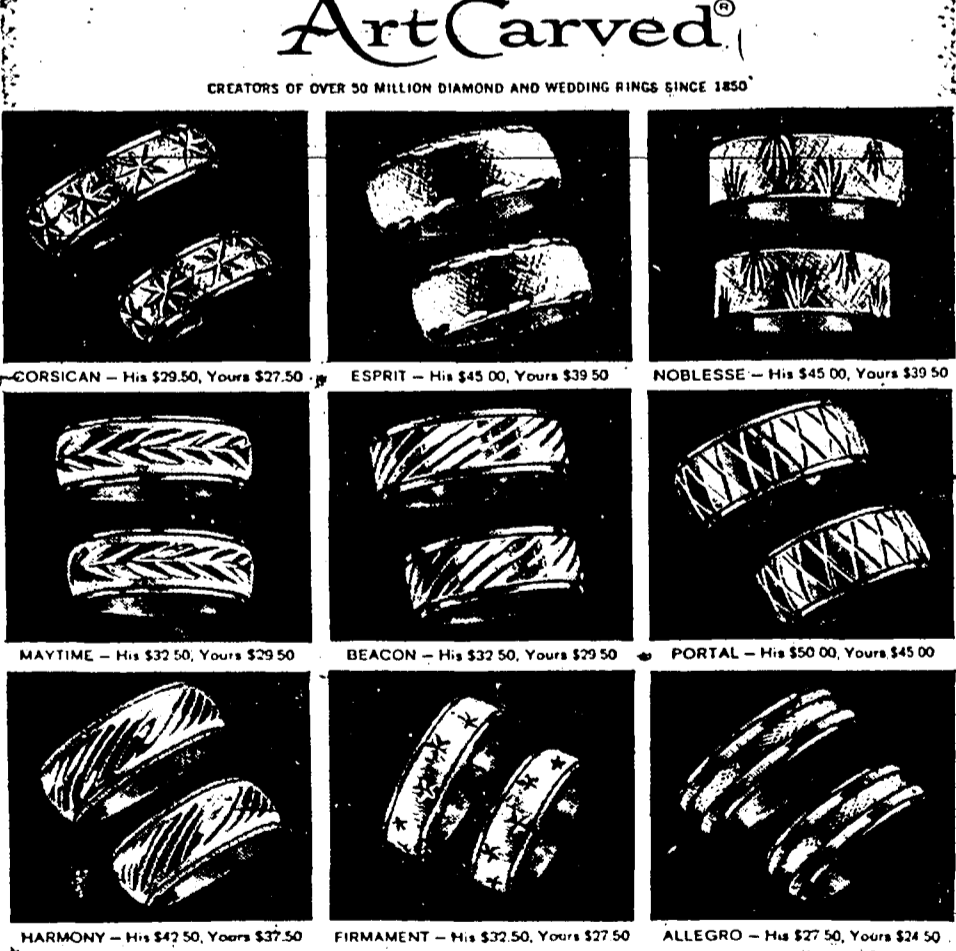

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20 minutes after alighting from the train.

The going price for the hitching process was around \$17. This included the license fee, the minister's fee and a tip to the cab driver.

One or two "marrying parsons" took care of most of the traffic in the 1920s. Then competition became more keen and during the '30s and war years, Elkton's main street was lined with signs and neon light proclaiming the availability of preachers. Billboards on roads leading into town advertised marriage information bureaus.

Marriage solicitors paid the city \$100 a year for licenses to roam the streets looking for out-of-town couples. Taxi drivers would receive gratuities for directing couples to the ministers' doors. In 1923, after the death of one of the more popular marrying parsons, the Elkton Cab company advertised for a replacement, guaranteeing a \$4,000 annual salary.

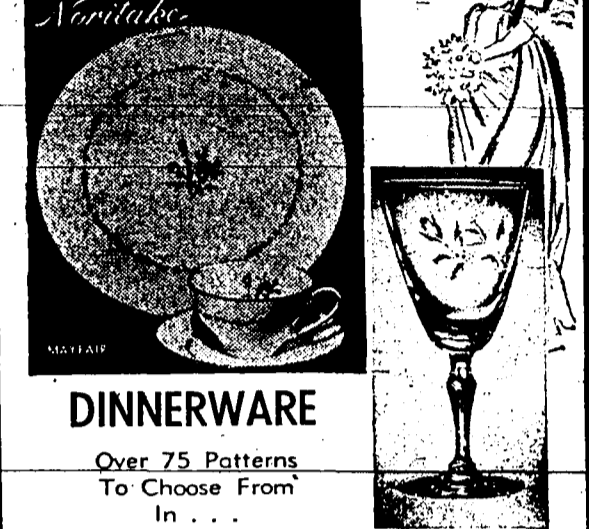
Occasionally a couple would wander into town and reach the marriage license bureau unaided. The clerk had only to satisfy herself that neither had been married before and both were old enough. The clerk could also be counted upon to recommend ministers.

Maryland law, until just last year, required that all marriage ceremonies be performed by clergy. However, the law was unspecified about the ministerial qualifications.

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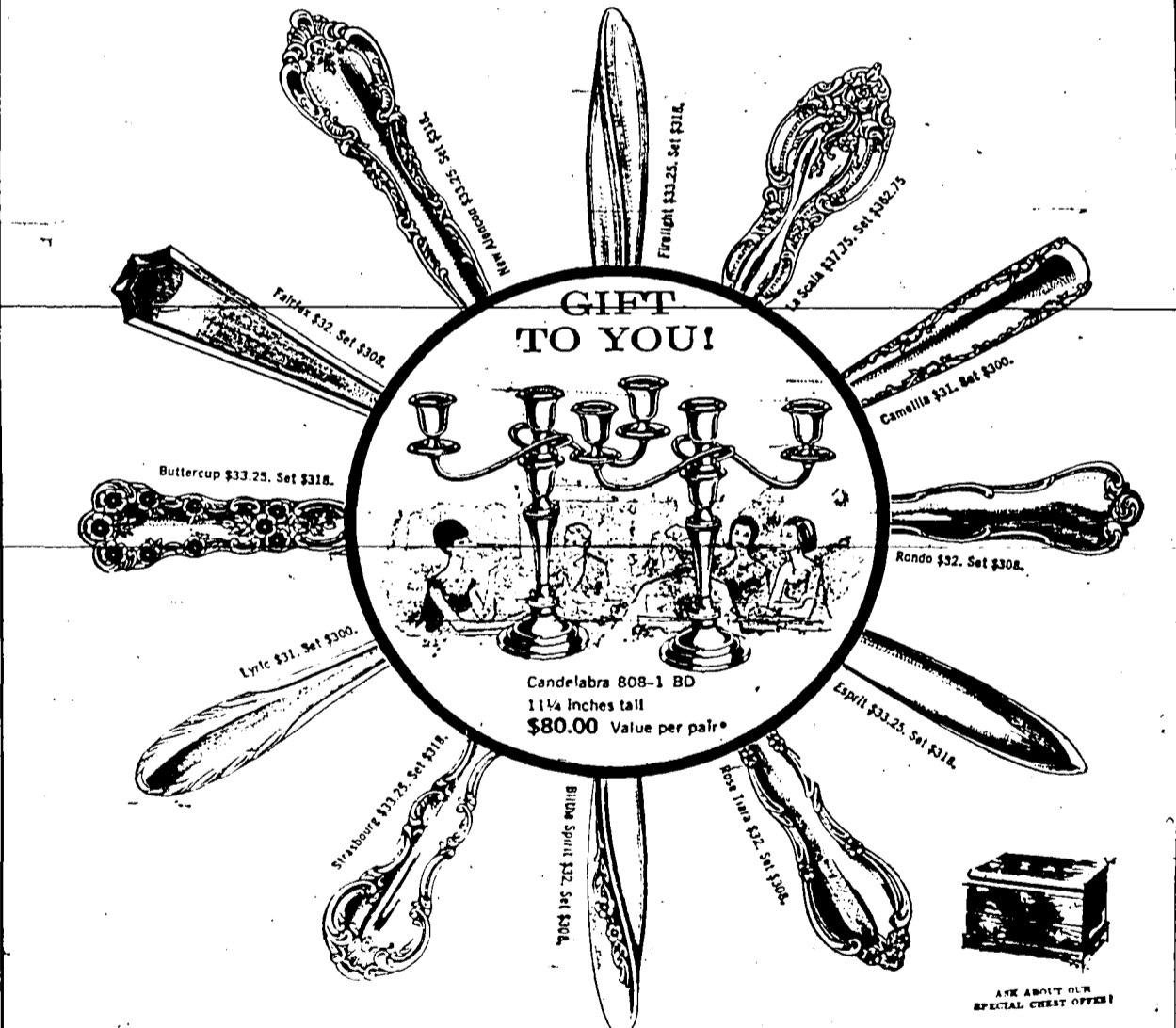
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Rules Listed for Second Marriages

Learning from the many books wedding etiquette, love may last longer the second time around but second weddings are not the same. In fact, the less fuss about the better, advise the tasteless. Still, there must be many of what with today's statistics casting that one out of three marriages will crack up sooner later (either by premature death of one of the partners, or divorce, which is six times more frequent today than 40 years ago). And that most women aren't twice shy.

Some same statistics also show that the widow or divorcee on the edge of her bachelor girlhood when it comes to facing altar again, a fact well known to fashion designers who invariably include a "daughter-of-the-bride" gown in their collection along with the traditional mother-of-the-bride dress.

Usually, the wedding should be in a small church or chapel in the bride's own home. The reception should be the simplest possible (a small tea or party in the bride's home). And the bride does not wear white, does she wear a wedding veil or bridal veil.

She may wear a corsage, but bouquet. And she shuns both large bouquets and myrtle garlands.

One attendant is proposed for the bride (she can choose her sister for this honor) and one for the bridegroom.

And the wedding cake, if there one, should be frosted in pastel and not in white.

Invitations should be informal (less the bride is very young) and usually only family and intimate friends attend the ceremony, although others may be invited to the reception.

The bride is not usually given away, though she may be if she is a very young widow. And gifts are not expected, although friends and relatives frequently send them a second time.

The bridegroom is expected to present, of course, and one time he will have himself through not one of the etiquette books before me bothers to tell him how.

Research of a yard-high stock "advice to the bride" books adds little help to the second bride, however, and none at all to the bridegroom.

In one book devoting 500 pages to rules and guideposts covering the finest details for everybody involved in that first walk down the aisle, only two pages are devoted to the etiquette of second weddings.

With no more than this meager advice to pass on in an article on Rules for a Second Wedding, we are forced to compile a list for the bridegroom on a basis of gaffs we have seen, some of which have ended in the pretty jazzy "happenings."

1. Memorize your bride's name. In fact, if you're the least bit absent-minded or apt to panic under nervous pressure, it's a good idea to concentrate on calling your new bride "Darling," at least until you've safely escaped the last toast and are on the way to your honeymoon.

One flustered husband we know used a non-cancellable cruise to the Aegean islands because the bride lingered too long over cologne while the cab cooled outside the door. "Please hurry, Myrtle," he called upstairs.

Upstairs sat his bride—and sat.

2. Check the guest list carefully. One unlucky bridegroom wired his old college roommate, inviting him to join the wedding party in Las Vegas, where they'd all repaired by plane to celebrate the event.

His old buddy came all right with his new wife, who just happened to be the bridegroom's first wife.

Things went along, gaily civilized, until Mrs. No. 1 and Mrs. No. 2 just happened to sit across the table from each other.

They started comparing notes—and the bridegroom got the champagne in his face.

3. Write out your new address and HAND it to the taxi driver. We know a poor fellow who got off the plane with his happy bride, rounded up the baggage, and automatically gave an address to the cabbie.

The two rode for an hour, lost in each other's eyes, until the driver braked to a stop—in front of his ex-wife's home.

3. Don't panic. Keep your wits about you and remember those same statistics are on your side.

For despite the occasional Tommy Manvilles and Henry the Eighth, most second marriages are happy ones. You already know that not even Aphrodite looked pretty with curlers in her hair; and your bride knows you're no Adonis, either, until you're shaved.

Suggestions Listed for Bridal Gifts

Wedding presents are part of the fun of getting married, even if the new bride does receive three candalabras and doesn't get a single dish towel.

Practical items are always a good idea for friends who want to make sure their gifts are really appreciated. Here are some suggestions to fit every budget and taste:

For \$10 or less: steak knives, magnetized knife holder with kitchen knives, ice bucket, rechargeable flashlight, wooden salt shaker and pepper grinder, glass water pitcher, vase, spice rack, lazy susan, electric tray which can be used for keeping food warm, thermometer and barometer set.

For \$20 or less: carving set, wooden salad bowl and server set, electrical blanket, carpet sweeper, electric knife, electric can opener, tray tables, transistor radio, electric pencil sharpener, dishes which can be used for cooking and serving.

An engagement is never, under any circumstances, announced by the groom-to-be or any member of his family. The announcement is made in the name of the bride's parents, even if she is not living at home.

Honeymooners Can Leave Newlyweds With Memories

Honeymooners can leave newlyweds with glowing memories—or all too often, nagging feelings of disappointment.

An associate professor of education in the department of home and family life at Teachers College of Columbia University, Dr. Paul Vahanian, believes that if a broader perspective were taken about the cold, hard facts of honeymoons, less anxiety would result. For example, a new look should be taken at the timing for honeymoons.

Instead of the conventional one- or two-week trip to some unfamiliar location right after the crowded wedding schedule, Dr. Vahanian suggests that a couple might spend their wedding night in their new apartment or home.

There is a great deal of comfort to be derived from being in a familiar place, surrounded by your own possessions. If the couple wants to leave on a trip, postponing their departure until they are rested and relaxed will add to their pleasure.

Then, too, Dr. Vahanian, who has a broad background in marriage counseling, says there is nothing to prevent couples from taking four or six week-end trips during the early weeks of marriage—instead of the longer and more costly traditional honeymoon.

The honeymoon period is a chance for the two people involved to become better acquainted with one another. But often, Dr. Vahanian says, strain develops when the rosy glow wears off and the two begin to see flaws in one another. Of course this has to be faced eventually, but not necessarily all at once.

"For some people," says Dr. Vahanian, "the one to two-week period of sudden intensive contact exposure to one another may prove to be more strain than the couple can bear. Shorter periods of time when they're together exclusively might prove easier to manage."

Dr. Vahanian says the honeymoon—whether long or short—is important because it sets the pattern for the marriage. "The couple will be far more successful in the long run if they're honest and open with one another about their feelings," says Dr. Vahanian. And he warns about the dangers that lie in starting the pattern of deceiving one another.

"The honeymoon offers an opportunity to get off on the right foot—to find out that it's all right to relax and be yourselves," says Dr. Vahanian. In other words, the honeymoon is a time to overcome self-consciousness.

Here are a few other tips from Dr. Vahanian:

1. Pick a location where you will be at ease—not everyone is happy in a plush resort—or camping out in the Maine woods.
2. Don't go into debt to finance a costly trip—budgeting beforehand will enable you to enjoy the trip while you're on it and not have to face up to low funds once you get home.
3. Avoid getting yourselves too tired out by too much sight-seeing or sports.
4. Don't forget that your partner may need some privacy occasionally—if he or she wants to do something alone it doesn't mean you've failed and are being rejected.
5. Above all, discuss your differences—and be patient as you learn to understand one another.

Other Fashion News for Brides Is Pointed Out

One trend which may be showing signs of growing—among bridal designers—is the so-called mod look. It began in Great Britain—in the wake of excitement over the Beatles—and may become popular in this country.

Sketches show the mod look as a flat-chested silhouette, with square-cut necklines, longer than elbow length sleeves, high waists and A-line skirts. The bottoms of the sleeves and the hems of the skirts have deep overlays of lace.

Headpieces to go along with the mod dresses usually are lace helmets or caps, or short, perky veils.

One designer has said he'll have the mod look for brides in silk organza and peau de sole for spring.

Selecting Silver

When buying silver, it's a good idea to start off with at least six place settings. If need be, you can cut down on the number of pieces in each setting to save money.

The standard setting consists of six pieces: a soup spoon, knife and fork, salad fork, teaspoon and butter knife. An extra teaspoon is recommended, but is not necessary.

If you have to economize, the butter knife and soup spoon may be eliminated in the beginning and added later.

Quick Lesson About Towels Given Bride

Here's a quick lesson about towels.

Sizes are fairly standard—bath, hand and fingertip. You'll also want matching washcloths. Large size towels are popular with men, but you'll find they are a little more expensive.

Quality towels are made from terry cloth. The key to a towel's strength is its underweave. Hold the towel up to the light to see if the underweave is even and closely woven. This is what holds the loops in place and withstands strain. Inspect the loops—which are important because they absorb water. The longer and closer together the loops are, the more absorbent the towel is. The loops should completely conceal the underweave. Now check the edges, called selvages, to be sure they are strongly woven. Be sure hems are firmly stitched and secured at the corners to prevent unraveling.

No matter what your favorite color is—or preferred pattern—there is such variety among towels manufactured today that you're sure to find something pleasing. Just remember coordination when you're shopping. Try to envision how towels will look with your choice of bathmat, etc., to be sure you don't wind up with clashing colors or varied patterns fighting the eye.

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Brides Should Keep Beauty Routines

A marriage license should not be the signal for a girl to forget all those elaborate beauty routines she used to attract her husband. But too many new brides complain they just don't have time to spend on such matters, what with keeping a house and—in some cases—going to work. And other young women point out they no longer have the exclusive use of the bathroom mirror.

To some extent, these complaints are justified, but the new bride should be able to simplify and adopt her beauty routine so it fits in with marriage.

First, hairdos. Today's bride is lucky in this respect, since the latest styles call for the simple, natural look and don't require too much care. A good cut, with shaping and styling included, is worth weeks of nightly settings. If your hair lacks body, or you want a slightly more curly style, try one of the new permanents designed to shape the hair, without actually curling it. A once-a-week hair setting after shampoo should suffice to keep locks neat and attractive. Not only does this save time, but your new husband won't be faced with a mass of curlers. While you're cutting down on time and effort, don't forget those nightly brushings. They keep hair shining and healthy needn't take much time. You can brush your hair while planning the next day's menus, or deciding what to wear or even while watching television.

Next, your skin and complexion. You don't need to go to bed looking like a greased pig just to have a smooth skin and glowing complexion, even if your skin is dry. Just wash your face with hot water to open the pores, then cream your throat and face lightly before getting in the tub for your bath. The steam from the bath also helps open the pores. After about ten minutes, wipe off the excess cream with a tissue. To compensate for the light amount of cream at night, use a make-up with a lanolin base.

If you have an oily skin, you don't need cream at all. A daily astringent facial will do. Wash and rinse your face to remove surface dirt. Then apply thick lather, massaging in the suds for several minutes. Rinse thoroughly with warm water, and end with a cold splash to tighten pores.

Now, for your hands. A weekly manicure is an absolute must, whether you use nail polish or not. You can keep your hands lovely for only a few cents and less than an hour a week. To remedy discolored nails, professional manicurists use hydrogen peroxide. You can buy a small bottle and remove the discolorations with a cotton swab. Next, dip your fingers in warm soapy water to soften the cuticles, which can then be pushed back with a swab. Trim hangnails with cuticle scissors. Apply handcream, especially near the cuticle. This also helps heal cracks in the skin. While the handcream is sinking in, use the peroxide with a swab to clean under the nails. Wipe off excess handcream, then apply polish if desired. If your manicure needs a mid-week touch-up, use a cotton swab to remove polish from one nail without disturbing the others.

Last, but not least, are your feet. You may think foot care is important only in summer when you're likely to go barefoot or wearing toe-showing sandals. But rough heels or knees can ruin your appearance any time of the year. Handcream—or some bath oil in the tub—easily solves this problem with a minimum of effort. Just rub the cream over any rough spots or soak in the oil while you bathe.

Travel Made Easy by Jet Airplanes

Jet planes enable modern honeymooners to go almost anywhere, no matter how limited their time.

Particularly popular are short Caribbean cruises or flight plans under which the couple flies to the West Indies and spends a week on the trip.

The minimum price for most of the one-week cruises is about \$150 per person. But honeymooners should be warned that there are only a few cabins available at these prices and they may have to pay \$200 or more per person. In addition, they will be tipping the room steward and others who render service.

The couple also should include shopping money in the budget. There are no extra expenses for accommodations in the ports—the ship serves as a hotel.

A plane trip to the West Indies is more expensive. Hotel rates in Nassau, for example, cost about \$125 per person, including breakfast and dinner, for one week. This usually also includes sight-seeing tours and some other services. It does not include the fare to Nassau, lunches, evening entertainment or shopping. Young couples are advised to allow about \$15 per day for extras, not counting shopping.

Most young couples are looking for privacy on their honeymoons. Travel agency people report that the last thing honeymooners ask about is entertainment. They are more interested in accommodations, scenery and just being together.

Many don't even admit they are planning a honeymoon. Frequently one member of the couple—usually the bride-to-be—will simply ask for information. After she has all the information and has made up her mind, she admits the trip is a honeymoon.

NO OBLIGATION
There is no obligation on the part of the bride and groom to exchange presents, although it is considered customary. The best gifts are those of lasting value, such as jewelry.

Slim, Easy Sums up '65 Bridal Trend

Slim and easy—that sums up the trend in bridal fashions for our 1965 bride. She'll probably be wearing a sheath silhouette as she takes the all-important walk down the aisle. Department store buyers across the country say that classic lines and simplicity are the key words to describe the designs now popular.

Designers indicate that the controlled bell skirt and the A-line skirt have taken the place of those billowy clouds that once required the bride to struggle with hoopskirts or multitudes of stiff petticoats. And, while it's still possible to find them, the long cathedral train is giving way to the gentle, sweeping chapel length train.

There are more floor length, formal bridal gowns than ever before. In fact, it is quite hard to find the shorter bridal gowns that were very popular just a few years ago.

But these changes do not mean that the new styles are plain. Trimming abounds—in laces, re-embroidered appliques, beads and seed pearls, among others.

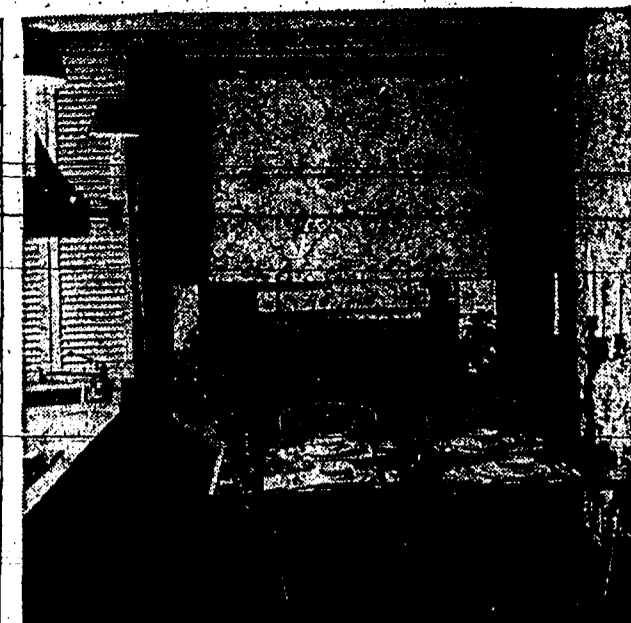
With the high styles emphasizing the shape and cut of the new gowns, fabrics have never been more important.

You can find your dream of a gown among the beautiful silks—perhaps with the ribbed grain effect of peau de sole or the dull, waxy finish of peau d'orange. And silk organzas, rayons and taffetas also dominate the new styles.

The new understated, easy styles show changes from the necklines down to the skirts, but all the changes are intended to show you—the bride—at your up-to-date best.

An upcoming trend is the use of linen and linen-blend fabrics for both the bride's gown and those of her attendants.

The sleeve that extends about half-way between regular short sleeves and the elbow named after the designer Dior—is very prevalent. Another accent frequently found is a narrow bow that extends almost across the back of the waist and fastens

down with a snap. It conceals the seam joining skirt to its top. At the front of the gown, the waist line most commonly rises to give the modified empire effect.

One expensive gown being shown is a white organza sheath over taffeta with a sweeping soft skirt. And it's highlighted by a full-length organza cape—called a 'casque'—that falls from the shoulders and ends as the gown's train. This so-called casque can be detached at the shoulders. (And a budget-conscious bride can wear this gown later as a party dress.)

The one word that pops up most often in describing the necklines of bridal gowns is 'sabrina.' Scoop necklines seem to be most popular for attendants' dresses.

The so-called sabrina neckline has no collar—it is simply a slit that opens the top of the

dress. And the charm lies in its simplicity. The bride who chooses the severest of these necklines should have a long and slender neck—a la Audrey Hepburn, for they are reminiscent of the type of clothes she often chooses.

However, the sabrina is also dressed up in other variations. One gown has a sabrina neckline in scalloped lace and the lace extends down to cover the bodice of the dress.

HINT

The trick to obtaining a well-stocked linen closet is to know what you want and then let others know about it. In many stores today, you can register not only your china, crystal and silver patterns, but your choice of patterns and colors for sheets and pillowcases, towels and tablecloths. That way, you'll eliminate haphazard presents at weddings and showers.

No matter how busy you may be, it's not good taste to put off thanking friends for wedding gifts. Try to make each thank-you note as personal as possible, mentioning the gift, and, if possible, how you plan to use it. Always mention your thanks to both of you. If you duplicate gifts, just thank to experience—it's something that happens to most brides.

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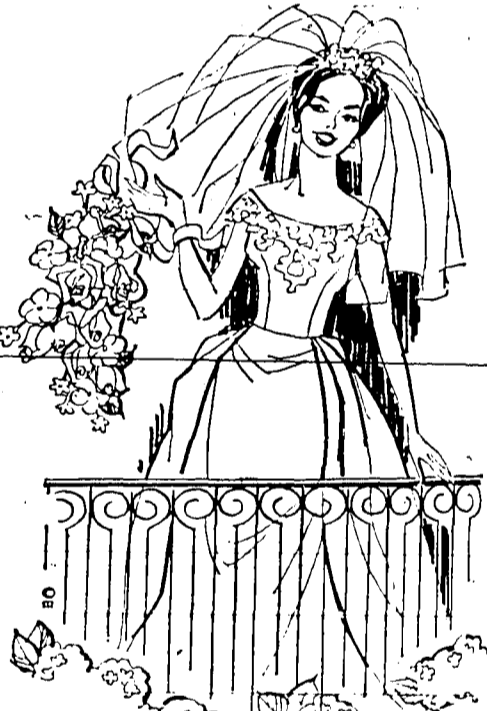

Camera Tips Listed for Honeymoon

Two may be company on a honeymoon trip but there's a third companion that can stretch that trip through the years—a camera.

Here are some tips on how to get the most out of your camera so that your honeymoon pictures will be a joy to you.

Shoot a test roll of film or two at home. This is important if you have a new camera. It will give you a chance to familiarize yourself with it or, if the camera is second hand, to see if it's in working order.

Buy plenty of film beforehand. Keep your camera protected against dust, sun and scratches. Include in your camera-case a notebook so you can jot down facts to link together pictures and places.

If you're trying to shoot something like the Grand Canyon or the New York skyline, remember that your eye sees more than the camera lens. So concentrate on one portion of the scene and compose your picture carefully.

If you're trying to take pic-

tures from a moving vehicle. Hold your camera close to the window to reduce reflection but don't actually touch the window. Vibrations will cause camera movement and result in blurred pictures. For the same reason, don't use a window frame or the back of a seat as an arm rest. Cradle the camera in your hands and steady it by bracing your arms against your body.

When moving, shoot as the scene is directly approaching or receding from your lens rather than when you're crossing its path. This will minimize the effect of the motion.

For small scenes, such as picturesque houses or striking historical monuments, try to obtain

a definite center of interest. You'll find a path or road can lead the eye to your focal point. Or use a foreground object like an overhanging tree branch to frame the view. In such cases, it is usually better to take an overall view of the entire scene or come in for a close-up of some particular point—like the inscription on a monument or the dutch door of a country house.

If you're traveling by car, don't store your camera and film in the closed glove compartment, or on the shelf under the back window, or in the trunk. All these spots get too warm. And when you park, try to find a shady area to protect the film in the

Furnishing Home May Be Staggering Task for Bride

A man's home may be his castle, but it's up to his wife to make the castle livable. Furnishing a new home—either an eight-room house or a studio apartment—can be a staggering task for an experienced homemaker.

For the new bride, who is probably working on a limited budget and isn't sure of her husband's taste, it can be almost impossible.

Furnishings experts and interior decorators and designers offer many different tips for the new homemaker, but almost all agree on two things: a home should be livable and it should express individual preferences and tastes.

The living room should be a comfortable room, suitable for well-proportioned chairs and room to stretch out. The new bride should remember that while she may like to curl her feet under her while reading or relaxing, her husband may prefer to stretch out his legs.

When buying furniture plan ahead. A Louis XIV sofa covered in brocade may be lovely, but will it suit your home? Are you planning a lot of formal entertainment? Or will most of your parties be informal ones where people will be sitting about casually? Think about children. Not only those you may have, but also

children of your friends. If many of your acquaintances have small children which they'll be bringing to visit, you'd be wise to avoid things that spot or break easily.

Don't select your furniture without trying it out. The modern, sophisticated furniture can provide stunning decor on a budget. But first, make sure you're comfortable in low-slung, odd-shaped chairs. If you or your husband is used to traditional furniture, the modernistic style may not be appropriate for your home.

Consider individual hobbies and interests when adding accessories. Fundamental pieces of furniture combined with a few unusual trimmings make an original living room. Try accessories with a foreign flavor: Mexican pottery, monkey-wood bowls from the Pacific Islands or a gay South American blanket thrown over a studio couch can add color and exotic feeling. If you can afford them, paintings always brighten up a room. But decide whether you'd rather have an original by a lesser-known artist or would prefer reproductions of the old masters. An attractive frame does wonders for an ordinary print. Bamboo goes particularly well with modern decor, and is not too expensive.

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Best Man Is Responsible For Groom

In the musical "My Fair Lady," Mr. Doolittle asks his friends to "Get me to the church on time."

In real life, it is the best man who has the job of getting the bridegroom to the church on time.

The best man's duties actually start the day of the wedding rehearsal when he is responsible for taking charge of the ushers and briefing them on any special seating arrangements.

On the day of the ceremony itself, the best man gets the ring from the bridegroom. If there is a ring bearer, the best man sees that he carries out his instructions.

Some best men carry a spare ring from the dime store just in case something happens to the real band.

The best man should obtain the marriage license and the minister's fee from the bridegroom. He helps the bridegroom get ready for the wedding, making sure his bags are packed and usually taking care of the luggage.

He calls for the bridegroom and accompanies him to the church, waiting with him in the vestry—just for moral support.

He should have the bridegroom at the church at least 15 minutes before the ceremony. This is no time for a Johnny-come-lately. After the ceremony, the best



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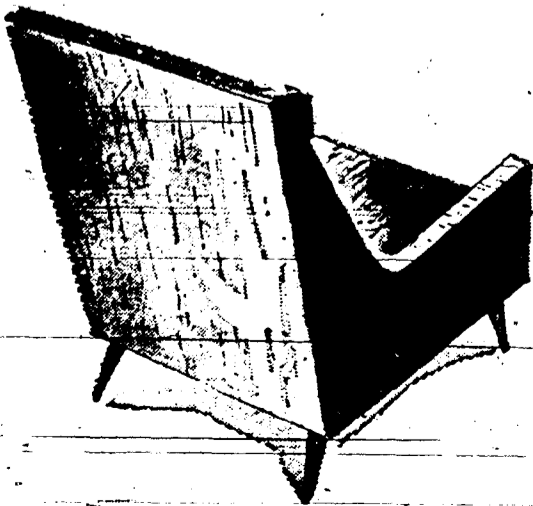
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Music Should Be Planned For Weddings

Too many brides take their wedding music for granted.

That's the complaint of band leader Tony Cabot whose orchestra has played for numerous society parties and weddings, and who, in some cases, is booked as far as two years in advance.

First, Cabot says too many brides don't bother selecting their music at all. They assume the organ will play "Here Comes the Bride" as they walk down the aisle, and they make no plans for the type of music for the reception. Cabot believes that if the wedding ceremony does not take place in a church, a string quartet can play the traditional music. He says that in a hotel, a hall or private home, the organ is out of place.

For the reception line right after the ceremony, Cabot suggests what he calls "ice cream music," light, classical pieces which provide an attractive background without intruding. Remember, he says, the bride should be the star on her wedding day.

The bride should shine also at the reception, and Cabot warns prospective brides to find out exactly what they're getting when they plan their receptions. Is the orchestra included in the price? Will the bride have any choice of what type of music she wants, or who she wants, playing it? In any case, the bride should confer with the orchestra

leader before the reception. Let him know what type of music is preferred. Is the music for dancing or for background? Will most of the guests want to do the frug and watusi, or do they prefer to stick to tried and true dances like the fox trot?

Finally, Cabot has a word of advice for orchestra leaders themselves. He says the band is not entertainment, but accompaniment. He is against bands which dress up in fancy hats and noisemakers and put on a show, detracting from the bride who should be the center of attention.

INCLUDE SPOUSES

If any of the bride's or groom's attendants are married, their spouses should be included in all pre-wedding parties. However, they do not attend the wedding rehearsal and don't stand in the receiving line.

Themes for Weddings Are Suggested

If you're looking for a different theme for your bridal shower, why not try one of these?

Package shower: This may be arranged through the bridal gift registry available in many stores. Each girl agrees ahead of time to contribute a specific sum of money. The hostess uses the total amount to purchase all the gifts in one store, where they are prettily wrapped. They are presented with one big card, including all the donors' names. This way, it is possible to include a few inexpensive gifts along with some more reasonable ones, without causing too much expense to any one person.

Pantry shelf shower: The idea

of this shower is to provide the bride with well-stocked kitchen shelves. Canned goods, a set of canisters, seasonings, packaged goods, staples and intriguing delicacies make good gift ideas.

Clean-up shower: This type of party is best suited to the package plan, since it involves a few expensive items such as a vacuum cleaner. Other ideas are a mop, broom, dustpan and brush, dust cloths, bottles of polish and wax, or rubber gloves.

Wine taster shower: For a

really unusual shower, give your party in the evening with fruit, wine and cheese for a snack. Key the gifts to wine. Gift ideas include a variety of wines — splits are ideal in size for two people — or wine glasses, recipes for cooking with wines, a wicker wine basket or wine rack.

Kitchen shower: This popular type of shower can be given a personal touch if each girl includes her favorite recipe with her gift.

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
