Vote Favors Auditorium Site Change

A show of hands during the second annual meeting of the Twin Falls Civic Auditorium association Tuesday night indicated overwhelming support in favor of locating the proposed auditorium at Twin Falls high school. The vote came after five members of the association's board of directors were reelected. The architectural and design committee, headed by Paul Bull, recommended during the meeting that convention center facilities be eliminated from the plans due to a lack of finances and because of plans by the Holiday Inn Corp. to construct a motel with such facilities here in the near future.

Jet Hits U.S. Housing Area Near Tokyo

TOKYO, May 5 (AP)—A U.S. F-4 Phantom II jet fighter plane crashed into a residential area about 20 miles southwest of Tokyo, killing two persons and injuring eight others, two seriously, a U.S. military spokesman said today. The plane, carrying four crew members and about 10 cars were damaged. The dead and injured are believed all Americans, but this was not confirmed by the spokesman. The spokesman said the disabled aircraft crashed into a residential area, damaging four to six dwellings. The pilot, Col. Elvis H. Walker of Ft. Pleasant, Tex., bailed out and received an ankle injury, the spokesman said.

Richfield School Bond Issue Okayed

RICHFIELD, May 5—Richfield school patrons gave overwhelming approval to a \$300,000 bond issue Tuesday which will result in reconstruction of the Richfield elementary school, destroyed by fire March 2. There were 200 who voted in favor of the issue and only 13 voted against it. The bond issue will be used with \$107,000 in insurance money to rebuild the school and a new cafeteria. It was reported Tuesday night the bonds will be issued with the final payment to be due in 20 years. After the fire, elementary and junior high school students were moved to other locations around town, with the first graders attending classes in the First Methodist church, the second graders at the LDS church, and the seventh and eighth graders being moved into the high school. Hot lunches are now being served in the American Legion hall basement and all students are transported there by school bus, because the building is located along the highway and school officials feel it would be too dangerous to let the students walk. The new facilities, to be completed in about five months, will include a cafeteria annex on the north side of the high school, and a new eight-room elementary-junior high school west of the new cafeteria.

Soviet Union Promoting Advertising

MOSCOW, May 5 (AP)—Moscow is going Madison avenue. The communist party newspaper Pravda announced yesterday that the Soviet Union is entering the advertising business in a big way to promote catchier slogans and better neon signs and radio newspaper, television and radio advertising. Pravda linked the introduction of Madison avenue techniques to the current campaign to give Russians more and better consumer goods. As a result, advertising joined profit as a "rehabilitated" word in the communist lexicon. Russian managers were told to spruce up their store windows and to advertise on radio and television. Pravda lashed out at advertising, Soviet style, which up to now has consisted of such announcements as "drink tomato juice" and "buy goods at our department stores." "We have had enough of such four-letter imperatives," Pravda declared. It advised Russians to learn from foreigners by improving store signs and devoting more imagination to advertising. The newspaper announced that the state is setting up three new agencies—the All-Union Firm for Commercial Advertising of the State Committee on Trade, the Central Union Trade Advertising Administration, and "The Intradepartment Advertising Council."

Tax Petitions Pass 21,000 Mark

BOISE, May 5 (AP)—Signatures on sales tax referendum petitions filed in the secretary of state's office passed the 21,000 total today with the deadline two weeks away. Backers of the anti-sales tax move must file signatures of 25,545 qualified voters with the secretary of state by May 18 to obtain a referendum. Petitions filed today came from Twin Falls county, with 223 signatures of registered voters, and from Bounding county, with 192. That increased the total to 21,222.

"Informer" Testifies At Klansman's Trial

HAYNEVILLE, Ala., May 5 (AP)—An FBI informer testified today that he was holding a loaded gun when a white civil rights worker was slain—but that he couldn't prevent the shooting. The witness, Gary Thomas Rowe, jr., also said 12 shots were fired at the time Mrs. Viola Liuzzo of Detroit was killed following a march from Selma to Montgomery on March 25. He had testified yesterday that Ku Klux Klansman Collier Leroy Wilkins, jr., the defendant, was the killer. Attorney Matt H. Murphy, jr., general counsel for United Klans of America, Inc., questioned Rowe. Rowe said he was reasonably certain he heard 12 shots in all fired at the Liuzzo car—six addressed to her.

Idaho Park Bill Is Sent To Johnson

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Congressional action was completed today on a bill to create a Nez Perce national historical park in Idaho. The senate accepted house amendments and sent the bill to the White House for President Johnson's consideration. The measure would authorize the interior department to designate a historical park in the Northern Panhandle section of the Nez Perce Indian country. The park would preserve 22 separate sites in an area about 60 miles wide and 110 miles long with the cost of land acquisition estimated at \$630,000.

Dr. Sheppard Back to Jail

CINCINNATI, May 5 (AP)—Dr. Sam Sheppard was ordered back to prison today to resume the life sentence for the slaying of his wife interrupted temporarily by a federal judge who ruled he had been unfairly tried. The Sixth U.S. circuit court of appeals agreed with the judge who freed Sheppard that publicity about his trial "was not of a nature calculated to inspire confidence in the objectivity and good taste of the public news media." But it held there was no constitutional basis for overturning the conviction. Sheppard's lawyer, F. Lee Bailey of Boston, has 20 days in which to appeal this ruling. He said today he would fight "direct to the U.S. supreme court" if necessary. Sheppard will not go back to prison until the court's order has been served on him. For Sheppard, the decision ended months of uncertainty. He and the former Ariane Touben-Johnson, the 35-year-old blonde who married soon after his release from prison last summer, had lived quietly in suburban Cleveland awaiting the appeals court decision. "When you've gone through 10 years of hell," Sheppard said in his only interview since his release, "you know how precious your freedom is."

House Okays Request for 700 Million

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—The house overwhelmingly backed up President Johnson's Viet Nam and Dominican Republic policies today by sending to the senate an emergency 700-million-dollar defense appropriation bill. The rollcall vote was 508 to 7. All seven votes against the bill were cast by Democrats—Reps. George E. Brown, jr., of California, Philip Burton of California, John Conyers, jr., of Michigan, John G. Dow of New York, Don Edwards of California, Edith Green of Oregon and William Fitts Ryan of New York. One Republican, W. E. Brock of Tennessee, voted against the bill but changed his ballot after a huddle with Republican leaders. Both the house and senate appropriations committee approved the special appropriation this morning, and there was a good chance the senate would pass the bill later today. Most of the money will be used to buy guns and ammunition and otherwise finance the fighting in Viet Nam. Some of it may be used to foot the cost of U.S. intervention in the crisis in the Dominican Republic. All is for use during the remaining weeks of the fiscal year ending June 30. In a report, the house committee noted that the President has authority to obtain the 700 million dollars from funds already available but said "prudence dictates the enactment of the proposed supplemental appropriation." Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara testified at the committee meeting. McNamara told newsmen later that only a small part of the emergency funds would be needed by U.S. military forces in the Dominican Republic. "The great bulk will be used in Viet Nam," he said, adding an optimistic report on combat successes of both South Viet Nam and U.S. forces there recently. "There has been a definite fall-off in the overt large-scale Viet Cong attacks recently," McNamara said. Johnson was asked about the Viet Nam war last night during a walking news conference. He said: "It's just something we've got and I don't know how to find the answer. I've tried everything I can."

Agreement to End Hostilities Signed

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, May 5 (AP)—An agreement to end hostilities in the Dominican Republic was signed today by contending forces in the civil war. The pact is a preliminary step toward negotiating the political issues that caused the bloody, 12-day-old strife. The agreement establishes a freeze on military positions held by both sides. It calls for the evacuation of political refugees and respect for the U. S.-established international zone for refugees. Both the insurgents and contending military junta had endorsed the agreement earlier in the day. In effect, it formalizes the precarious cease-fire already in effect. The agreement was signed by members of the five-man peace commission of the Organization of American States, the military junta, and the rebel leader, Col. Francisco Caamano DENO.

U.S. Troops In Dominican Total 19,363

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—The defense department announced today that there are now 19,363 U. S. troops in the Dominican Republic. This is 5,363 more than the last officially announced total reported by President Johnson in a radio television broadcast Sunday night. There was no immediate word on when or how the increase was made. The defense department broke down its total to 12,439 army troops and 6,924 marines. It said the army troops are mostly members of the 82nd airborne division. The marines are mainly of the second marine division. The Pentagon also reported today that six have been killed in the fighting there—three army men and three marines.

8 Guerrillas Are Killed by Marine Unit

DA NANG, South Viet Nam, May 5 (AP)—U. S. marine infantry squad played a deadly cat-and-mouse game with communist guerrillas today and killed eight in their most successful operation of the war. Two Leathernecks were wounded in the action near Binh Thau village, eight miles south of Da Nang. About 400 marines were in the field. They came upon the Viet Cong unexpectedly after one company was helicoptered in to join others which had remained out overnight. After maneuvering several hours, the marines applied a hammer-and-anvil tactic, assaulting the Viet Cong targets and throwing in rockets and heavy machine-gun fire. When the smoke cleared, eight Viet Cong were dead. The marines figure that probably 20 got away. Several wounded Viet Cong were found in Le My village by a party from the second marine battalion. They had been hit in a fight near the same village yesterday.

Rocket Launch Is Rescheduled

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla., May 5 (AP)—Another attempt was planned today to launch a Project Fire spearhead over a blazing ballistic course to measure the heat which will envelop manned Apollo ships returning from the moon. The launching of the Atlas booster rocket was scheduled in a favorable seven-hour period starting at 5:21 a.m. The shot was postponed yesterday because of 50 per cent cloud cover over the South Atlantic reentry area.

Paratroopers Are Landing in Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, May 5 (AP)—An armada of transport planes landed 1,900 U.S. paratroopers in South Viet Nam today. They are the first American army ground combat units sent to fight the communist Viet Cong. Another 2,300 men of the 173rd airborne brigade were expected from Okinawa soon, probably this week. Half of the 1,200 paratroopers were landed at Bien Hoa air base 15 miles northeast of Saigon. The rest came in at the Vung Tau airstrip on the South China sea 40 miles southeast of Saigon. U.S. army forces already in Viet Nam are here as advisers to the South Vietnamese forces and as training personnel. The paratroopers are expected to have the same assignment that the U.S. marines now have at the Da Nang air base and Phu Bai, 350 miles north of Saigon—defense in depth of the key installations with a liberal sprinkling of offensive operations against the Viet Cong. The paratroopers are expected to become a major buildup area for U.S. troops, similar to Da Nang. As the new arrivals took up positions there, Vietnamese air force fighter-bombers were streaking down on suspected Viet Cong positions about five miles away, pouring cannon and rocket fire into the ground. Most of the troops were too busy to notice, although the cannon shots were clearly audible.

Senator Hits Dominican, Asia Actions

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., May 5 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., yesterday criticized U. S. action in the Dominican Republic and called for a halt to both disputes there, the United Nations. "I don't see how the U.S. States can hope to set itself as the policeman of the world and jump in whenever a place," the senator said in a news conference prior to an address here at Union college. Morse said the United States by taking unilateral action, "done more to weaken the United Nations than any other act in the world." The senator said the troubles in the Dominican should be solved through the Organization of American States (OAS), "which is an arm of the United Nations." President Johnson acted within his power by protecting American lives, but "walked outside the OAS charter," which, Morse said, contains no authorization for intervention. He added that evidence is accumulating that the U. S. is intervening. Concerning the Viet Nam situation, Morse said that all equipment and personnel sent to South Viet Nam since 1954 has been in violation of the Geneva accord. He said what is needed is a multilateral conference of the combatants in Viet Nam presided over by non-combatant nations. "We have to live up to our duty under the U. N. charter," Morse said, contending that U. S. action in South Viet Nam "is to create an American form of totalitarianism and political colonialism."

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MEASURE OKAYED
WASHINGTON, May 6—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved today a bill authorizing one million dollars to construct a new building to replace the American chancery damaged by a Viet Cong terrorist bomb explosion in Saigon March 30.

SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY
A deep mass of cold air is spreading over this district and is considerably colder at upper levels than air which moved in at the beginning of the week.

Today will be much cooler than yesterday. Temperatures will likely not rise above the 40s this afternoon in much of the Snake river valley and will drop well below freezing in all sections with minimums in the middle and upper 30s in most agricultural valleys. Protective measures should be provided for tender plants and trees fruit wherever practicable. Partial cloudiness and light breezes are not expected to prevent freezing temperatures tonight. Generally cool temperatures with partly cloudy skies and less wind are expected Thursday.

Cooling today will be all the more chilling due to winds of 15 to 25 miles per hour and a few showers, snow flurries at higher elevations, may be expected this afternoon and early tonight. Precipitation probably will not be sufficient to halt field work in most sections but cold winds may be enough to discourage many. Soil temperatures will cool several degrees in the next 24 to 36 hours in the upper levels.

FIVE-DAY FORECAST
The five-day period Thursday through Monday will be relatively cold period with high pressure at the surface and aloft remaining centered well off the coast and with a northwesterly flow prevailing at upper levels to keep colder than normal air over the Intermountain region.

Temperatures will probably average seven to 18 degrees below normal with the coldest temperatures for the period tonight. Breezes are not expected to prevent freezing temperatures tonight and possibly frost again over the week-end. Normal maximum and minimum temperatures for this period are Gooding 68-41, Twin Falls 72-46 and Burley 63-38.

Precipitation occurring as a few showers or snow flurries in extreme eastern parts of southern Idaho Thursday and showers at lower elevations and snow in the mountains in all sections over the week-end will average less than .10 of an inch in Magic Valley.

Wind will be frequently 15 to 25 miles per hour from westerly to northerly. Soil temperatures will cool several degrees today and Thursday but will show gains later in the week and will average in the upper 40s and lower 50s in the three- to eight-inch depth.

Sunshine will average 65 to 75 per cent of possible with an average of .6 of the sky covered by clouds.

Cooler than normal temperatures will slow germination of seed and development of all planted crops and pastures. Frost and freezing temperatures expected in all areas tonight and most sections Thursday night may again threaten the district by Sunday or Monday.

to the city commission. He said if the city were involved, it would have to justify operation of the facilities by maximum usage.

He said the city commissioners have informed the auditorium board in a letter that the city would be responsible for the auditorium if it is constructed on the proposed site.

When asked if the board was strictly committed to the Addison avenue property, Dr. Brumfield replied that it was not, but said after weighing other locations and keeping in mind their obligation to the association members, the board members felt that this property was the most feasible.

J. T. Anderson, chairman of Twin Falls school district No. 411 board of trustees, said the board had advised the auditorium association in a letter last year that locating the auditorium on school property was the best solution.

Anderson said, however, that since that time there have been additions to the high school, and the present heating system would not be adequate for the auditorium.

He said the school board proposed during a recent meeting with the auditorium association board and the city commission that it would deed land at the high school to the association; which in turn would be deeded to the city. However, Anderson said the amount of money available now could not build an auditorium large enough to serve the high school.

Original plans of the association called for a 1,200 seat auditorium. It was brought out during the meeting, however, that the \$312,000 which the association had in cash and pledged is not quite enough to build a first-class 800 seat auditorium.

Anderson said to justify deeding property to the association, the auditorium should seat at least 1,500.

It was suggested a bond election or direct levy could be passed to supply additional funds, if it was constructed at the high school.

At the end of this discussion, a show of hands was taken which indicated most of those attending the meeting would be willing to work for a bond issue, give up the convention center plans and concentrate solely on construction of an auditorium.

Although the vote indicated strong support of a high school site, it was pointed out the decision was not binding on the board.

Re-elected to the board Tuesday night were H. Ted Roth, William Grange, Mrs. V. N. (Grace) Patrick, H. G. Lauterbach and John B. Robertson.

The nearly 300 persons present at the meeting displayed their confidence in the board by unanimously reelecting the five members and applauding their efforts at the conclusion of the meeting.

King Hill Voters Reelect Trustees
KING HILL, May 5—L. B. Lawson and Nathan H. Miller were reelected Tuesday to two-year and three-year terms, respectively, during the annual trustee election of Glenns Ferry joint school district No. 192.

Red China Blasts Russia In Editorial

TOKYO, May 5—Communist China yesterday accused Russia of lack of faith in the Vietnamese communists and said the Soviets are "caared out of their wits" by United States military strength.

The attack on Moscow came in an editorial in Red Flag, the theoretical publication of the central committee of the Chinese communist party.

It did not mention the Soviet Union by name but the reference was made clear by its denunciation of "modern revisionists."

The term has been planned by the Peking regime on the Kremlin leaders and other communists who follow the Moscow policy of peaceful co-existence.

"The modern revisionists," Red Flag said in an article distributed by the communist New China news agency and monitored in Tokyo, "do not and are not willing to understand the laws governing peoples' war."

"They worship the armed might of U. S. imperialism and have no faith in the strength of the Vietnamese people," they are scared out of their wits by U. S. war blackmail. They are even afraid that the Vietnamese people might involve them in disaster."

The publication chided the "revisionists" and said the "spectacular victories" scored by the Vietnamese communists "have dashed to the ground their theory that weapons decide everything and that magic weapons of the general line of 'peaceful co-existence.'"

Snow Whitens Peaks at Hailey

HAILEY, May 5—Snow fell on the Sawtooth mountains and foothills here Tuesday night. It was 21 degrees at Hailey Wednesday morning and only 38 degrees at noon.

Ice has frozen in Hailey the past three nights. At Fairfield no snow was reported but it was 29 degrees at the forest service office, although residents unofficially reported a low of 23 degrees.

New School Desegregation Rules Explained

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—The federal government's new guidelines for school desegregation could be the biggest single push toward abolishing racially separated school systems since the landmark 1954 supreme court decision.

Issued last week by U. S. Education Commissioner Francis B. Keppel, the guidelines will use as a lever to achieve desegregation one of the basic facts of U. S. educational life—that nearly every public school in the country depends on federal funds to survive.

The burden will be upon local school districts to show they are living up to the conditions set down in the guidelines in order to remain eligible for federal funds, including the new grants made available by President Johnson's 1.3-billion-dollar education program.

The conditions set forth by Keppel are aimed at getting compliance with the civil rights act passed by congress last year. The act states in its Title VI that "no person shall on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal assistance."

Here is the how, when, where and why of how the guidelines will operate:

Q—What are the basic requirements of the new guidelines?

A—By this fall, all public school districts must desegregate at least four grades to show their "substantial good faith." These grades must include the first grade of elementary school, the first and last high school grades and the lowest grade of junior high school.

In addition, the guidelines set the fall of 1967 as the target date for complete desegregation in order to remain eligible for federal funds.

Q—Who will be most directly affected?

A—The requirements of the civil rights act apply to all the school districts in the United States. The main burden of compliance will fall on segregated southern school districts, however, while the new rules will mean little more than paperwork for many northern districts.

The office of education has sent the guidelines to school districts whose plans for desegregation have been rejected as unacceptable. Of the 27,000 school districts in the nation, about 19,000 have been given at least a temporary clean bill of health. Keppel's office still is processing another 3,400.

Q—Will the guidelines mean an end to all racial imbalance in schools?

A—Not necessarily. Education officials say they are set up to bring about desegregation, but not integration. They are not intended to cover so-called de facto segregation or such systems as the segregated private schools that have replaced public schools in some sections of Virginia.

Q—Exactly what types of discrimination are the guidelines aimed at, then?

A—The office of education says that segregation exists if race or color is a factor in student assignment; if teachers remain racially segregated; or if any activities or services—including school bus transportation—remain segregated or discriminatory.

School districts will have to show that they are taking steps to correct these conditions to meet the "substantial good faith" requirement. Faculty desegregation must begin by this fall to meet the guidelines.

Everyone in Magic Valley stands to benefit from the proposed mental health clinic. First of all, the persons who need the service will find it readily available and they can receive treatment and attention while continuing to reside with their families.

HIGHER REQUIREMENTS

Following a trend that has developed all across the nation, Utah-supported colleges have raised admission standards and/or tuition costs for next fall.

In the face of a veritable flood of applications, some colleges and universities have adopted another policy that might be open to question. Nowadays they require a cash deposit in advance from any prospective student.

If the trend to ever-higher college entrance requirements is continued, it will be only a short time before even average students will not be accepted.

FAIR WARNING

The Twin Falls police department reported the other day that it's testing three new types of radar units before purchasing another of the mechanical speed checkers.

Many cities across the nation have posted warnings on approaches to the city: Warning! Speed Checked by Radar! Actually, there's no reason to warn drivers.

In any event, local drivers have been warned the police department will have two radar units. Presumably, both units could be in service at the same time in two different parts of the city.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

BY ANDREW TULLY
WASHINGTON, May 5.—I think Lyndon Johnson will cop this one running away. His policy on the Viet Nam war not only is simple enough for even a New York Times editorial writer to understand; it is by itself a propaganda victory over the Peking-Hanoi axis.

BLOOD ON OTHER HANDS — Johnson has put the Peking-Hanoi alliance on the spot with a simple question: Is it proper for the United States to support a policy which states that the war continue, not Washington. It is the reds who are dragging their feet while Lyndon Johnson reaffirms his offer of "unconditional discussions."

Johnson is wrong in refusing to call these critics — the Fulbrights of Arkansas and the Moraes or Oregon — appeasers. Their proposals call for the same kind of appeasement that has made Munich a dirty word. Yalta, Berlin, Chamberlain and the others all held that if an aggressor is permitted a little victory he will be satisfied.

On the wider stage of world affairs, Johnson is on solid ground in refusing to jump every time a Fulbright or a Moraes clear his throat. Overall, American policy remains the containment of communism throughout the world.

THE GULLIBLE VIEW — The critics' bleats that the conflict in Viet Nam is a civil war have the tone of those remarks of an earlier school which saw Mao Tse-tung as an agrarian reformer and which deplored Czech "oppression" of German minorities. It is the easy way to view the situation; it is always simpler to surrender to a footpad with a gun than to aim a left hook at his jaw.

To be sure, there are South Vietnamese in honest opposition to the Saigon regime. But this is a "civil war" that was started by North Vietnamese gunboats in the Gulf of Tonkin under Hanoi's command after the Geneva agreements. Since then, Hanoi has succeeded in infiltrating thousands of regular troops. Johnson is right again in deposing that if this infiltration could be ended some kind of peace might be managed.

Views of Others

IDAHO COULD CLAIM CAMPING TITLE
North Idaho might have a great chance to declare itself the camping capital of the whole region after the international Girl Scout Round-up in July at Fergus Falls.

All the ingredients would be there: Elbow room in abundance for hundreds of campers; beauty of landscape and magnificent lake; and just for a starter, workable facilities and utilities and, perhaps a chance to acquire a prodigious stock of camp furniture.

NOT THE RIGHT CHOICE

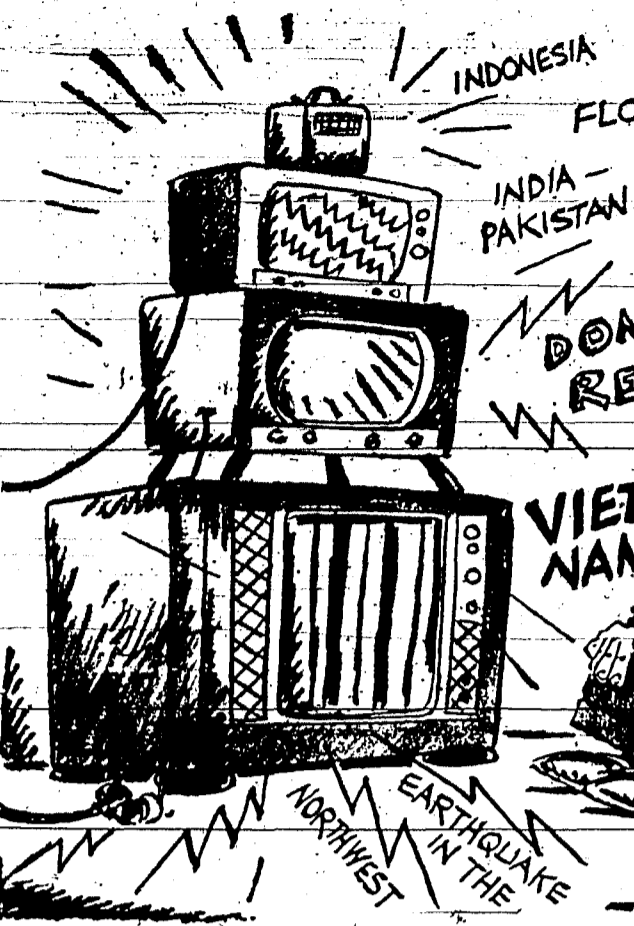

Poor Man's Plato

Fire the cannons, declare a holiday, beat the drums, raise the flag, raise the flag — it's the season of Karl Marx's birthday. He was born May 5, 1818.

Jeffersonian parallel runs through "Das Kapital" through "The Communist Manifesto." Neither Communist understood the brave new world of freedom.

At one time in German history there were 350 separate self-governing royal entities. The nation's power was like a leaky beer mug.

She was the last land in Europe to colonize, one of the last to industrialize and the last to overcome the ravages of the Thirty Years' War (1618-19). Deep roots make many provincial Germans confuse power with justice.

Both Marx and Hitler were provincial people; they wrote of the world but neither knew it. They had not traveled in a true sense and in their macabre logic they merely shot their prejudices.

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Interpreting the News

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—President Johnson, whether or not he has the Truman and Monroe doctrines in mind, is seeking to justify his use of troops in the Dominican Republic and Viet Nam.

He sounds like an echo of Harry S. Truman and James Monroe. But while Truman and Monroe were in office, the United States was not in Europe, warned Europeans not to interfere with the independence of Latin-American countries.

Eventually there was some hypocrisy in the way the United States practiced the Monroe Doctrine. Although still insisting all outsiders must keep hands off Latin America, it interfered there for more than a generation after 1895.

President Theodore Roosevelt summed up the expansionist American mood in the early part of this century. He said he would "show those dagos in Latin America they will have to behave decently."

American interference left a long legacy of Latin-American resentment. One example: From 1916 until 1924 the United States occupied the Dominican Republic with marines, keeping it under military rule.

More recently President John F. Kennedy in 1961 backed the disastrous Cuban invasion to topple Fidel Castro.

In 1947 President Truman ended isolationism by abandoning that part of the Monroe Doctrine which said the United States would not interfere in Europe.

At first he said he was sending troops into the revolt-torn Dominican Republic to save the lives of Americans there. Later he suggested people trained outside the Dominican Republic were trying to gain control.

Finally he said the American goal was to "prevent another communist state in this hemisphere." And Monday he went all out by saying U.S. troops would not leave the Dominican Republic until communism was stopped dead.

He said, and this is where he combined the doctrines of his predecessors, the United States won't "let the communists set up any government in the western hemisphere." He apparently forgot about Castro.

This method of gradually getting to the main point was followed by Johnson in turning loose U.S. forces to fight communism in Viet Nam. At first, he stressed the goal was to help the South Vietnamese keep freedom.

Later he stressed this one: If South Viet Nam was lost it would echo a Truman "encouragement and spur on those who seek to conquer all free nations within their reach... our own welfare, our own freedom, would be in danger."

The Doctor Says

By WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT, M.D.
Q — What do you think of the new treatment for hemorrhoids, in which the doctor places rubber bands tightly around them and they disappear in about a week?

A — When properly applied this method is painless and effective. It has been used successfully for hemorrhoids as well as non-bleeding piles. Some persons get a recurrence of their hemorrhoids after having had them cut out.

Q — How important is that Pap test? My doctor says it isn't necessary to do it unless a tumor is present.

A — The whole purpose of the Pap test for cancer of the uterine cervix is to discover a malignant tumor before it can be detected in any other way.

Q — My daughter, now 17, took radioactive iodine for an enlarged thyroid gland about seven years ago. When she marries what are the chances that her children will be normal?

A — The radioactivity in iodine is completely dissipated within a few weeks. Furthermore, it tends to concentrate in the thyroid, not in the ovaries. Your daughter has, therefore, nothing to worry about on this score.

News Around Idaho

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—The 60 machinists striking the Hancock Steel corporation plant turned down a company proposal yesterday they said would give increased benefits to the few employees. But officials of Machinists Local 1491 agreed later to take a membership vote today on the company's proposal that the men return to work while increased benefits are negotiated. Ernest Ferry, secretary-treasurer of the local, said the company also proposed the contract be effective for two years. The union asked a one-year contract and the company originally offered one lasting three years. The machinists began picketing the plant at midnight Saturday when the old contract for two years expired. The workers returned to picket lines after turning down the company proposal yesterday afternoon.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Sales tax referendum petitions carrying signatures of 750 registered voters were filed today in the office of Secretary of State Arnold Williams. They came from Bernook county and increased to 30,790 the number of signatures on file.

ST. MARIES, May 4 (AP)—Bids for work on two bridges and clearing of a road in St. Joe national forest have been called by the U. S. forest service. One project includes construction of a 140-foot prestressed concrete bridge and reinforcement of an existing treated timber bridge on the Fishhook-Little North fork road. The other calls for clearing, grading and removing sloughed material along 28 miles on the St. Joe river road.

POCATELLO, May 4 (AP)—A cablegram from San Salvador, El Salvador, received here yesterday by Mr. and Mrs. Walter D. Service brought word that their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Pat Johnson and two sons are safe following the earthquake there Monday. Johnson is manager of a dairy plant in San Salvador.

POCATELLO, May 4 (AP)—Appointment of a new Idaho State university president will be made before the end of the month, according to Curtis Eaton, Twin Falls, president of the Idaho board of education. The appointment will be discussed at a board meeting here Thursday and Friday, Eaton said, but the selection will be made at a special meeting later. ISU has been without a president since last summer when Dr. Donald E. Walker accepted an appointment in California.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Idaho's mining future and proposed reduction of silver content in U. S. coins are among subjects to be considered by the Idaho Mining association at its 1965 convention here May 20-22. "The Silver Dilemma" is to be the topic of Rep. Compton I. White, Jr., D., Ida. Sen. Len B. Jordan, R., Ida., is to discuss "Idaho's Stake in Public Lands Policy." The outlook for mining's future in Idaho is to be the subject of the opening session with a "general appraisal" by Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission today announced it will conduct a public hearing June 8 in Boise on proposed revision of its rules covering extension of domestic water service. The commission said proposed new rules will be considered and it invited privately owned utilities, which provide domestic water service, to be present at the hearing. The agency said the proposed new rules would be intended to make it easier for a customer to obtain water service in areas where installation of water mains is necessary to provide that service.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court in a 3-2 decision that an employee with 1066 1/2 hours of service becomes eligible for unemployment benefits when the struck firm resumes business. The court ruled that Teodora Totolica, who participated in a strike against Western Equipment company, became eligible for benefits when the firm resumed operations with nine new employees. A worker participating in a strike is not eligible for unemployment benefits, the court held, but when work stoppage ends, the fact that it was caused by a labor dispute does not make strikers ineligible.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Vocational counselors were advised today to retain an over-all emphasis on the current emphasis on aiding the poor. The state department of labor and the manpower development and training act of 1963 have greatly expanded the work of the counselor, said Norman McGough, Washington, D. C., chief of the branch of counseling and testing for the bureau of employment security. He spoke at the opening of a three-day regional workshop attended by employment counselors from four states. The counselor working under the new program, he said, must be able to handle and nurture motivation, aspiration and a sense of identification with the larger society.

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—What to do with vacant office space for which Idaho is paying rent will be a question before the state land board this month. The offices on the third floor of the Bank of Idaho building were left vacant Feb. 27 when the public utilities commission moved to the new state industrial building. Rental on the third floor—about half of which is now vacant—is about \$25,000 a year. The land board—composed of Gov. Robert E. Smylie and four other elected officials—discussed the situation at its last meeting and agreed to meet again early this month to reach a decision. One plan was to move the state department of agriculture from the Statehouse into the Bank of Idaho vacancy.

MOSCOW, May 4 (AP)—Voters here yesterday approved a \$400,000 bond issue and a seven-mill operations and maintenance levy in a school election, according to complete, unofficial returns. Money from the bond issue will go for a 16-classroom addition and a gymnasium-field house at Moscow Junior High school. The vote on the bond issue was 868 yes, 244 no and 5 void. For the seven-mill on the bond issue was 868 yes, 244 no and 5 void, according to the unofficial returns. Two incumbents were returned as subdistrict trustees. Don Castellaw won re-election in subdistrict No. 2 and Dr. Donald Adams was returned in subdistrict No. 5. Election officials said the 1,243 vote was a record turnout for a school election.

Looting Is Reported in Revolt Area

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The state department said yesterday it had received reports of damage and looting at two U.S. business establishments in the Dominican Republic. Department press officer Robert J. McCloskey said "looting and damage" had been reported at the Santo Domingo branch of the National City Bank of New York and the Pepsi Cola Bottling company there. He had no further details.

The department said 14,000 pounds of medical supplies from U.S. defense department stocks in Puerto Rico were delivered to the Dominican Red Cross yesterday for distribution to 10 hospitals. About 38,500 pounds were distributed previously. An American ship, the Alcoa Ranger, with two million pounds of U.S. surplus food aboard, is on its way to the Dominican Republic. It attempted to dock there last week but was "unable" to do so, the department said.

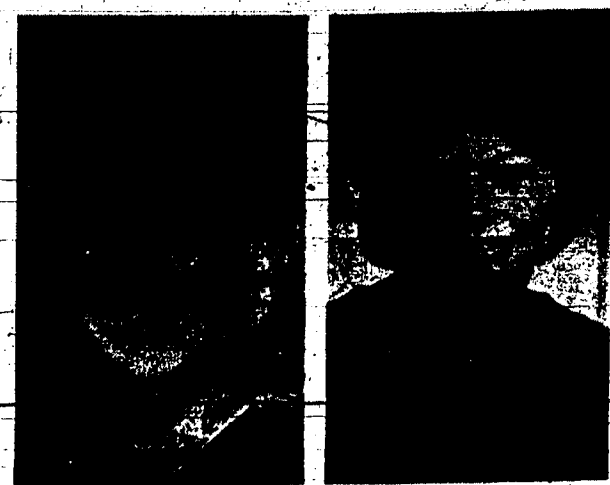
The department said the latest evacuation figures were: 3,223 persons removed from the country, including 1,987 Americans and 1,235 others representing more than 25 nationalities. U.S. medical supplies were being distributed by the Dominican Red Cross, CARE and Caritas, a Catholic relief service. The state department said U.S. military forces were assisting in distribution of food.

It said the marines had established a 50-bed hospital in the eastern section of the city, and the army has set up a 100-bed hospital. Both were for treating civilians. The food included beans, powdered milk, flour, edible oil and rice.

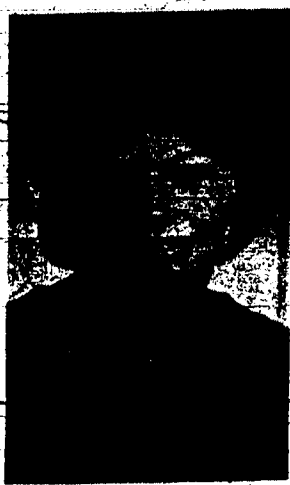
Red Satellite's Orbit Altered

The satellite, launched April 23, has been used for TV broadcasts and is designed to transmit telephone, radiophone and radio signals between Moscow and Vladivostok, the report in the government newspaper Izvestia said. Molniya-1 is Russia's first communications satellite.

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Sandwiches Banned on Space Flights

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Space agency officials have voted to ban sandwiches from space flights because of the risk of "corned beef" incidents similar to the one that occurred during the recent Gemini flight.

NASA Director James E. Webb and flight director Robert H. Gilruth referred to the incident in recent testimony before a closed session of a House appropriations subcommittee. Their remarks were made public today.

Gilruth said it was "foolish" for Young to smuggle a corned beef sandwich aboard the Gemini spacecraft against the rules. Young shared the sandwich with Grissom during the flight.

The space official said no harm was done by the incident but that "I think maybe this will not happen again."

Webb took a sterner view, saying that this was not an adequate performance by an astronaut.

"These are outstanding young men, and they are under a strain," he said, "but this is the United States of America. Space program, and a matter of policy, we are not going to permit individual to superimpose their judgment as to what is to be taken on these flights."

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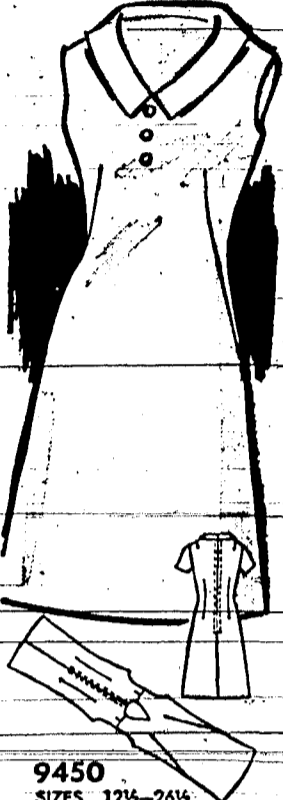

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Britain Bans Visit by U.S. 'Beat' Group

LONDON, May 5 (AP)—British beat groups will no longer be able to perform in the United States under a decision announced yesterday by the British Musicians' union.

American jazz musicians and orchestras also will be prevented from making British tours.

The ban goes into effect as soon as existing contracts have been honored, said Harry Francis, assistant secretary of the union.

He said the decision to end the exchanges "definitely came after consultations between the union and the American Federation of Musicians."

The two groups have operated an exchange agreement since early 1955.

"Recently, however, abuses on the part of promoters on the American side have crept in, and British groups have been booked into additional engagements for concerts and in television programs while in the United States," said Francis. "These extra engagements," he added, "were not in the contracts approved by the union and the federation."

2 Corpomen From Region In Caribbean

SANTO DOMINGO, May 5 (AP)—Two Intermountain region youths are among several Peace corpomen who have been elected to remain in the troubled Dominican Republic despite orders to leave for their own safety.

Terry Fuller, 25, Driggs, and Richard Maxfield, 23, Pocatello, Idaho, a brother yesterday and joined fellow Americans for a brief meeting in the small nation's capital city.

Peace corps Director Robert Satin, Santo Domingo, ordered all corpomen to leave the area when the uprising spread through the country. But the volunteers told Satin they wanted to stay.

"We went to another hospital and finally the Peace corps said, 'All right stay.' We were gone only about half an hour and when we came back the doctors and nurses and patients kissed us and embraced us," said Virginia Pearson, 25, Portsmouth, Va.

"The hospital was jammed with wounded, all of them rebels," she added.

Fuller and Maxfield worked throughout the height of the fighting last week.

About 120 Peace corpomen are stationed in the country. Their feeling is they will just go on helping the people as much as they can.

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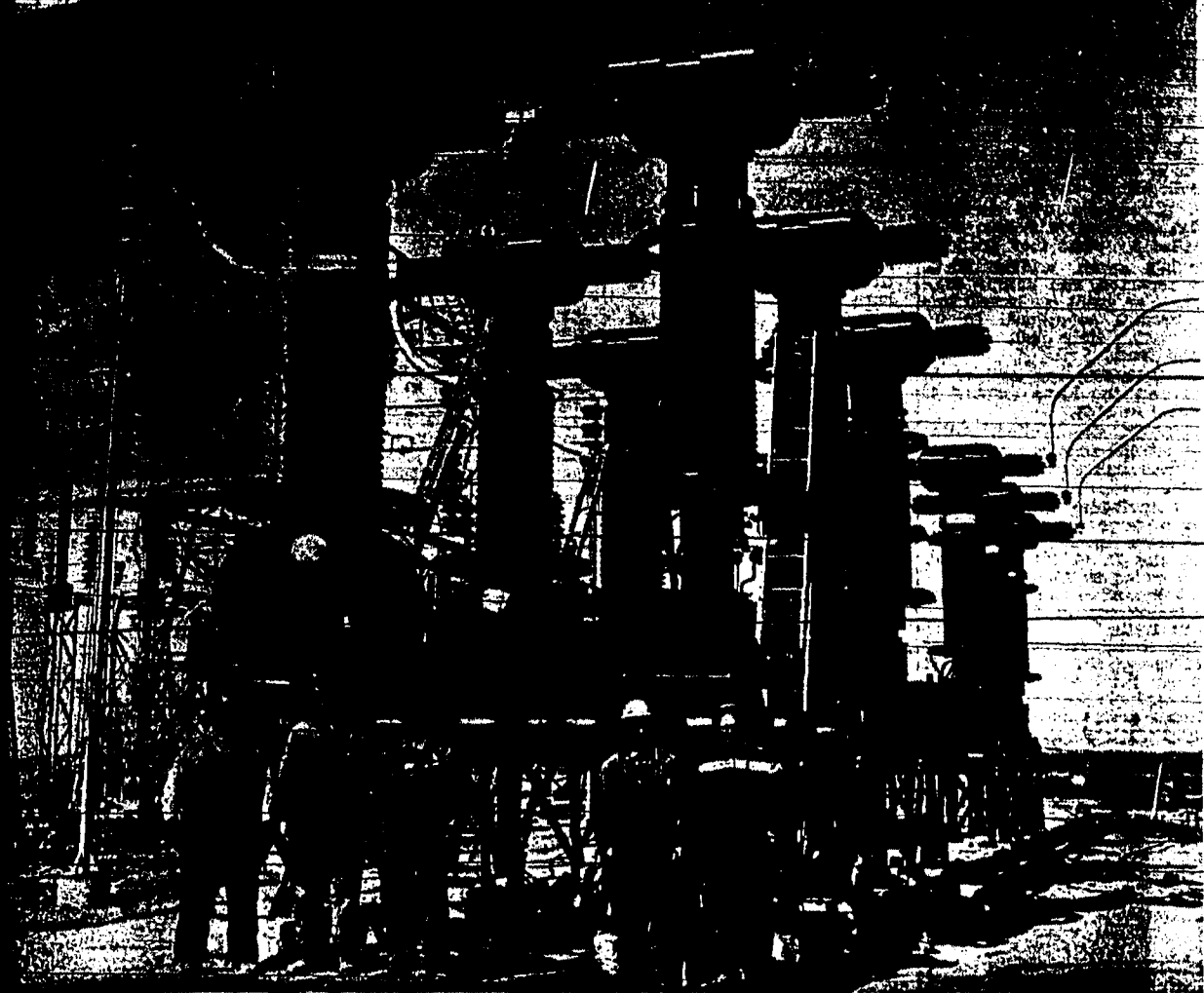

U2 Pilot Is Awarded CIA Medal

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—The central intelligence agency in a secret ceremony has awarded a medal to Francis Gary Powers, the U2 pilot whose crash deep inside the Soviet Union "shook the world—and caused a good deal of anguish to the CIA," the New York Herald Tribune said today.

A Washington dispatch noted that the crash five years ago last Saturday "chilled East-West relations and ended any meaningful contact between President Eisenhower and then Soviet Premier Khrushchev."

The copyright story also said in part:

Powers, who ostensibly was a test pilot for the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation, "manufacturer of the U2," received the medal in a ceremony about two weeks ago at the CIA's headquarters in Langley, Va. He actually had been a \$30,000-a-year pilot for the CIA.

Powers, now 35, is not supposed to wear the medal and is not supposed to tell anybody about it.

When the Herald Tribune asked a spokesman for the CIA to confirm the award, he replied: "No comment at all. He's a former employee. We don't comment on former employees."

It was reliably learned, however, that the medal was awarded at a ceremony attended by several top officials.

Powers, captured by the Soviets, was traded to this country in 1957 for the Soviet master spy, Col. Rudolf Abel, who had been sentenced in Federal court in New York City to 30 years in prison.

Last night, for the first time, Soviet officials admitted that Abel was engaged in espionage for the Soviet Union when he was arrested in New York in 1957.

A Soviet security forces general during a television talk in Moscow about Soviet espionage work during World War II, singled out Abel as an outstanding Soviet intelligence agent.

Russia Says Abel Was Master Spy

MOSCOW, May 5 (AP)—Russia made a rare public admission yesterday that Col. Rudolph Abel served as a Soviet master spy and was decorated after being exchanged in 1957 for U2 pilot Francis G. Powers.

A Moscow television program told Abel's story for the first time to the Russians and disclosed he served with the security forces since 1927. Abel was imprisoned by a New York court for 30 years in 1957.

Journalist Sergei Smirnov indicated Abel—which is an assumed name—was now living in Moscow and probably was watching the television program.

An unidentified general recounted Abel's history which he said included sending intelligence to the Soviet Union of Nazi Germany's plan to attack in 1941.

The officer described how Abel finally was arrested during another assignment and defended in court by American lawyer James Donovan against a "possible death sentence."

But at no time did the general disclose this happened in America.

It was Donovan who later was instrumental in negotiating the exchange between Abel and Powers. Powers was held spy by the Soviets after his U2 plane was downed over Russia in May, 1960.

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Space Official Says Russia Leading Race

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Despite U. S. outlays of seven billion dollars a year, Russia still leads this country in the space race, and according to space Director James E. Webb Russia's aim in space is world domination. Webb said the United States has proposed cooperative space ventures, but the Russians "in this field as in many others . . . have been competitors and have been seeking some means to gain power over us and the means to further their interests in dominating the world."

Webb compared the U. S. and Soviet space programs and goals in closed-door testimony taken by a house appropriations subcommittee last month and made public today.

He said this country's Apollo or moon-shot program is two years behind schedule. He blamed budget cuts for the delay. But he said there still is hope the United States can put men on the moon by the end of the decade, as planned.

Webb said space outlays by this country have been climbing steadily to a total of more than seven billion dollars projected for the 12 months starting July 1. Of this, the space agency he heads will spend about 5.2 billion dollars, with the rest allotted to the defense department and other agencies.

NEW DELHI, India, May 5 (AP)—The United States is shipping wheat to India faster than it can be passed out to hungry people whose lives depend upon it.

A massive wheat clog is developing in India's old-fashioned ports and the nation's bureaucracy is unable to line up enough trains or trucks to get the grain to villages in the interior.

U. S. experts who surveyed India's distribution system were appalled by what they found.

India's seven leading ports, they reported, can handle 650,000 tons of grain per month under normal conditions. In an emergency, they can unload 700,000 tons.

Yet, 1,119,000 tons arrived in April and the same amount is expected in May.

Normally, the United States ships 600,000 tons a month but even this has strained port facilities.

The April-May crush resulted from a huge number of ships freed from American coast ports when the U. S. longshoremen's strike ended in March.

But the American experts say the major reason for the clog lies in India.

They found, for example, that a 22,000-ton ship is the largest that can berth in Bombay. Calcutta cannot take anything with a deeper draft than 22 feet.

Tankers of 100,000 tons are drastically cutting shipping costs and unloading times in major ports of other countries. No giant tankers can be used in India unless smaller ships unload grain outside the ports.

Under study is a proposal to take four 10,000-ton Liberty ships out of American mothballs and station them outside Bombay harbor to unload the big yellow.

Shipowners put a surcharge on cargo destined for India because their ships will be idle in port for days or weeks before unloading.

American experts feel initiative could solve the port problem.

"First," an American said bitterly, "we have to get port officials out of the tea rooms. The men on the docks will work if they're told what to do."

Better scheduling, so that 15 ships don't arrive in the same port the same day, would help.

The Americans also complain about unloading procedures that

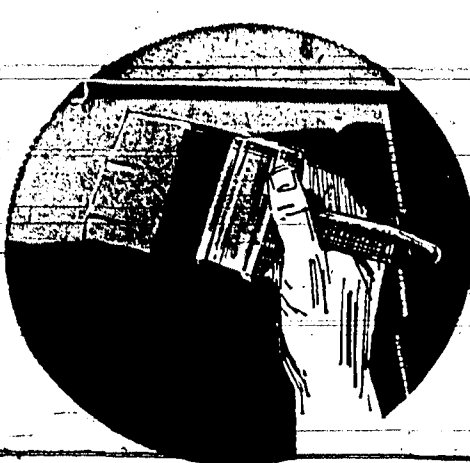

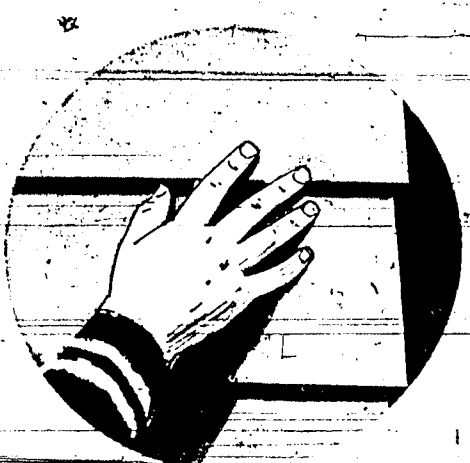

Unpublished Songs of Cole Porter Found

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Some 75 and 100 unpublished songs written by Cole Porter have been found in the late composer's files. The list includes such titles as "Bertie and Gertrude," "Baby," and "Ha-Corally Kills the Women."

Porter, who died last October at the age of 72, was such a prolific songwriter that he often wrote two or three songs for the same stage situation. Most of the unpublished songs were written for Broadway musicals but were never produced. Some were for a motion picture that was not made.

Dr. Albert Sbray, chief editor of *Chapin* and company music publisher, disclosed yesterday that he made the discovery while looking into Porter's inventory of music material at the late composer's Waldorf Towers apartment last December, January and February.

Sbray said that John Wharton, Porter's attorney for 20 years, had asked him to examine the material. "They are in the style of Cole Porter, all fit for the stage," said Sbray.

Wharton said that at the present he had no plans for the unpublished works except to find out more about them by sitting down and listening to them played and sung.

As for long-range possibilities, he said: "Someone may offer to do a new show. They may be added to a revival or single songs recorded from them."

Wharton suggested that some might be used in a revue along the lines of a current off-Broadway hit, entitled "The Decline and Fall of the Entire World as Seen Through the Eyes of Cole Porter, Revivited." The show is composed of little-known, published Porter songs.

Porter wrote such hits as "Just One of Those Things," "Night and Day," and "Begin the Beguine."

"The legislature," Guernsey said, "provided for the permit requirement many years ago so that forest wardens could know immediately which fires are controlled and which are uncontrolled."

"It also reduces the number of fires that are started both in recently and carelessly during periods of high fire danger."

Reasons for Easier Traveling in U.S. Listed

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Only a few years ago a motorist had to do some hard driving to go 450 miles in one day.

Now the man or woman at the wheel can cover 600 miles easily and with little effort.

Shrinking of traveling time has been made possible by the nation's network of interstate state highways. More than 22,000 miles of the projected 41,000-mile system is now open to traffic.

It is now possible to leave Atlanta early in the morning, after breakfast, and arrive 650 miles later in Miami or Miami Beach without meeting a traffic signal and enjoy a late supper. Before this limited access artery through Georgia and Florida was built, it required almost two days of hard driving to cover the distance.

Opening of the interstate system is causing a revolution, too, in businesses which are dependent on the highways for existence.

Motels, restaurants and service stations are forming "one-stop service complexes" to serve travelers' needs with a minimum of inconveniences.

For example, two large firms which are independent of each other, Quality Courts motels and the Phillips Petroleum com-

pany, together are building new million-dollar service centers.

A new motel on U. S. highway 50 near Orlando not only has a playground for children but also a closed-circuit television system which enables parents to watch them without leaving their rooms.

The developments of the Interstates and improvement of existing highways has caused a burgeoning of state parks and privately operated camping grounds.

Some of these camps offer the out-of-door type motorist plenty of room for tent-pitching and cooking near swimming pools, playground and grocery-market establishments.

Long-distance travelers can also take advantage of the vastly improved highway system

even if they do not own a car. Highway improvement, along with top-flight motel accommodations, are making it easier for the U. S. department of commerce to persuade Americans to "See America First" instead of spending their money in Europe.

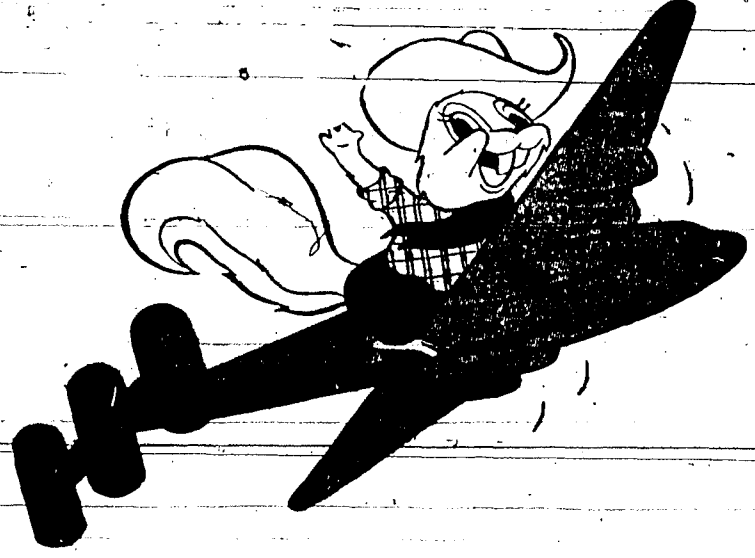

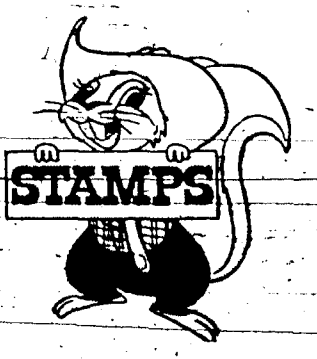

Finding Summer Work for 300 Students Is Big Job

Problems existing in summer-time employment for youths were discussed Tuesday night during a meeting of the Youth Employment Service (YES) advisory council at the Twin Falls office of the employment security agency. Larry Mitchell, an agency employee and YES program coordinator, said more than 300 Twin Falls school-age youths already have applied to the agency seeking work during the summer. Now the agency and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which co-sponsors the program, have to find jobs for them. Mitchell notes that during the past two years more than half of those who have applied for work were girls, but less than one-fourth of the employers indicated a preference for female workers. "There is a drastic need for jobs for girls in offices and in sales work in order that they might gain experience which is necessary when they begin seeking fulltime work as adults," Mitchell said. Many girls are willing to do all types of housework and babysitting. Others, particularly high school and junior high school girls, already have been trained in office skills and could be utilized by business firms to fill in while employees are away on vacation. Another problem exists in securing work for youths, both boys and girls, on farms or other agricultural-related work. "Many of those who have applied so far are city youths with little or no previous farm work experience, although they have expressed a desire to work on farms," said Mitchell. He noted that having city youths work on farms entails a closer degree of supervision by the farmer, at first. "But students are able to do commendable jobs if farmers will take time to give them some training," he said, adding that girls also have proven to be good farm workers — "They're patient, hard workers and stick with it." Although tabulation of YES job placements does not officially start until after school is out for the summer, Mitchell commented that the agency already has placed more than 50 students in service stations, odd jobs and other employment. And he stressed that none of the placements so far this summer have been for girls. Commenting on growth of the program, Mitchell said, "I attribute this to the fact that life youths have been doing good work. I think without exception they're willing to work and they are limited only by lack of experience. Registration and placement of youths is handled by the agency in the same way employment is sought for unemployed adults. When a student goes to the employment security agency he is interviewed and a card is filled out and then filed for future reference. Comments by the agency on personal appearance and manners are noted on the card, which helps them in jobs to which they will be suited. The YES advisory council is comprised of 11 members, including...

the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which co-sponsors the program with the employment agency, and Mitchell is program coordinator. Although the program normally does not begin until the last of May, it already is well under way. With more than 300 youths already registered. (Times-News photo)

Idaho Grid Player Dies In Hospital

SPOKANE, May 5 (AP)—A University of Idaho football player who collapsed last Wednesday during a spring football practice session, died this morning in Spokane's Deaconess hospital. Dead is Michael Decker, 22, Grangeville. A hospital spokesman said Decker passed away at 3:08 a.m. The spokesman said Decker did not regain consciousness during the time he was at the hospital. Decker, who had served in the Army, was a freshman trying out for halfback on the Idaho team. He was not on a football scholarship. The young man collapsed seconds after complaining to a coach about dizziness and nausea. The practice session had just started and there had been only slight contact work when Decker became ill. The University of Idaho coaching staff said they could not pinpoint when Decker was injured, and there remains no definite link linking Decker's injury with football. After collapsing, Decker was rushed to Spokane, where doctors performed brain surgery to relieve the pressure of a blood clot on the brain.

Duty Abroad For Cadets Is Called Off

WASHINGTON, May 5 — About 2,800 cadets and midshipmen of the three major armed service academies will have to do without the broadening influence of foreign travel this year and next. The defense department disclosed today that summer training duty abroad has been called off for West Point and Air Force academy cadets and for Annapolis midshipmen. The reason: "A continuing unfavorable international balance of payments." In other words, the future of officers would spend dollars in foreign countries and thus would aggravate the outflow of U. S. gold. "The midshipmen summer training cruises will be restricted to operational training and visits to U. S. ports," the Navy said. Since the summer of 1960, the army has sent West Point cadets for 30-day tours with the U. S. seventh army in Germany. Instead, the army said, cadets will be sent to Hawaii, Alaska, the Panama Canal zone and to army units in the continental United States. Air force cadets have participated in what was called "over-seas field study" each summer since 1959. Now the cadets have been assigned to operational Air force groups.

Q. On the advice of my broker I bought some stock of a rather small insurance company at \$8.75 a share. When that stock went up to better than \$10 a share, I gave the broker a stop loss order at \$9.

The stock dropped below that price. But the broker failed to call my attention to the fact that he was too busy and "forgot about my order."

As a starter, you should be told that there is no such thing as a "stop loss order" in the correct technical sense.

A stop order is an order that becomes a "market order" (to buy or sell at the best possible price) once the stock involved trades at or through the price named in the stop order.

And here's the key point—as far as your situation is concerned: "Stop orders can only be used in trading on stock exchanges, where there is a recorded price of each transaction. They can't be used in over-the-counter trading, where there is no central record of trading prices."

Q.—I have been reading about certain "brokers" who collect commissions in return for placing deposits in some banks and savings and loan associations. This puzzles me. I have accounts in both a bank and a savings and loan association. When I make a deposit, I either take it in personally or mail it in.

What special service could a money broker provide me in order to earn a commission? An important point: Those money brokers don't collect commissions from the depositors. They get their commissions from the banks and savings and loan associations in which they place the deposits.
