Sentrys to Continue Organization

SALMON, May 13—A meeting of an organization calling itself the Sentrys attracted an estimated 30 outfitters and guides here and, despite a vote of 23-18 to discontinue the organization, supporters decided to go ahead and incorporate as a non-profit organization.

Morgan DeBoard, Salmon, chairman of the group, told a separate meeting of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association that despite the vote he felt there was sufficient interest to go ahead with the organization.

The group was formed here recently with the announced aim of exploring the possibility of improving the outfitters and guides and tourist trade in Idaho.

DeBoard said afterwards that the organization plans to contact sportsmen's clubs, motel operators as well as outfitters and guides in Idaho for membership.

Harold Hanson, North Fork, who has been seeking a license for the Idaho outfitters and guides since 1963, told the meeting that the Sentrys association was not formed because he has not received an outfitter's license.

"It was formed," he said, "because of things that have come to light in the investigation as to why I haven't received a license. Some of these things are of interest to every businessman and sportsman in Idaho."

Hanson said Idaho has had a drop of 1,911 non-resident big game licenses issued in a two-year period from 1962-64 (1974 in 1963 and 937 in 1964). As a result, he said, loss of license and tax sales to the Idaho fish and game department would be more than \$200,000 and in excess of one and one-half million dollars to the economy of Idaho.

He said that in excess of 50 outfitters were licensed in 1961, 1962 and 1963 who were not licensed in 1964.

"We have a situation where the non-resident is furnishing nearly half of Idaho fish and game department revenue in exchange for 10 per cent of the game. I consider that a good business proposition in any person's language."

Hanson said the organization was not formed to fight the outfitters and guides but as a fact-finding group.

The Idaho outfitters and guides board was scheduled to take up the Hanson license application case today at Boise.

165 degrees offered during the first term of the junior college scheduled to begin classes Sept. 1 will include those which will adequately prepare students for entrance into a university or senior college.

Among academic courses offered will be English, speech, biology, chemistry, American history, western civilization, political science, science, accounting, typing, shorthand, physical education, intermediate algebra, college algebra, trigonometry, German or French, art appreciation, music appreciation and business machines.

Mrs. Marshall (Ruthann) LeBaron, from the Kimberly area, will be teaching biology. She has had five years college teaching experience, is married and has two children.

She received a BA cum laude from the University of Colorado, an MA from Mount Holyoke college, Mass., and has done graduate work at the University of Idaho.

She received a BA summa cum laude in drama from Idaho State university, and ADB from the British drama league in London and an MA in speech from the University of Washington.

She will be speech and English instructor at the junior college on the public school level eight years and one year on the college level. He will be education instructor in the junior college system.

He received his BS from Jamestown college, N.D., his MA from Colorado State college in education and history. He has also done graduate work at Colorado State college.

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP) — The U.S. aircraft carrier Independence has canceled a refueling stop in South Africa later this month because her Negro crew members would be "unwelcome," according to official sources.

No specific reason has been announced for cancellation of the planned stop in Capetown May 28-31. The defense department said yesterday under questioning only that the visit was called off "for operational reasons."

The state department would say only that there had been a change in plans and declined further comment. The South African embassy said it knew nothing about the cancellation.

The three survivors picked up by a submarine were identified as Lieut. Cmdr. Edward Gage, 34, the pilot, Greenlawn, N.Y., and enlisted crewmen Karl Stockerl, 22 West Paterson, N.J., and Otmar Nikoleyzelk, 24, Port Washington, N.Y.

"Outside Step" Custom of Cable Cars In San Francisco Broken by Women

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13 (AP)—Tradition dies hard in this windy city, and none has been laid to rest with more wordage than the custom of the "outside step" of the dear old dinky cable cars.

Since 1873, when they first clattered up the hills of San Francisco, it has been traditional that the weaker sex—that is to say, women—should not ride the outside step.

The outside step—a 10-foot-long running board along the outside seat—was a male stronghold.

The woman who tried to ride this hallowed plank was soon told off by the conductor, or by the gripman who drives the cars with long steel grips that clutch the moving cable.

But in recent weeks the outside step has been integrated for women.

"Get 'em off!" bellowed Tom McGrath, spokesman for the Cable Car Grippers' union, when a college coed, Mona Hutchin, 19, dared break the ice. She insisted she could ride outside lawfully.

And so she could. In fact, so could all females. Turned out there is no law against women riding the step.

"It doesn't make any difference to me whether they ride outside," said husky John Heppburn, gripman of the Hyde Street line.

Conductor Frank Brown agreed. "No difference to me at all," he said. "If they fall off, they fall off. Just wait, they'll start falling off."

No women were on the step at the time. The main objections to their riding there are that they are weaker than men, wear skirts that can blow revealingly aloft in high breezes, and—besides—they're women! The objection about the skirts was based on the theory that the girls, in trying to get their wind-blown skirts down, would forget about hanging on to the railing and topple off.

The latest "spy ring" unearthed, the fourth reported since April 18, operated in Camaguey, in central Cuba, the government said. The names of only 16 of the 31 persons were made public. They included the women, Ines Napoles Hernandez and Irma E. Castillo Rodriguez.

The "spies" were alleged to have used the U. S. naval base at Guantanamo to get intelligence information to Washington.

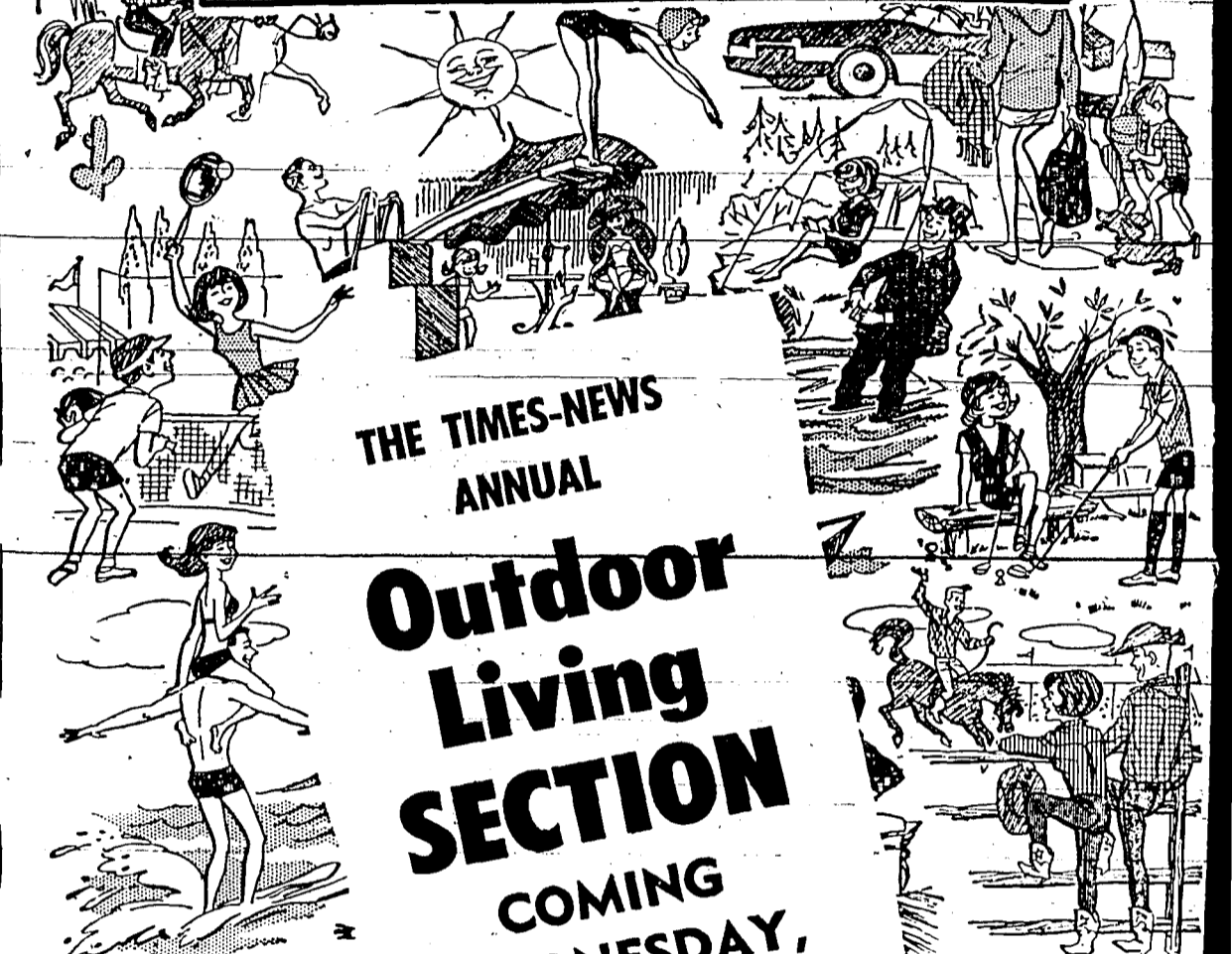

Idaho Power, BPA Feud Erupts Again

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—The long-standing feud between the Idaho Power company and the Bonneville power administration has flared up again before a congressional committee.

And the two Republican members of Idaho's congressional delegation have entered the dispute with a suggestion that it be given a full public airing.

Rep. George Hansen and Sen. Len Jordan said they believed it would be in the public interest to have the public talks aimed at negotiating a contract under which Idaho Power would wheel electrical energy into southeastern Idaho.

"While the principle parties involved will be most affected by specific details of the contract being sought," they said, "we feel that the public should be given an opportunity to know first-hand the problems that stand in the way of completing these negotiations."

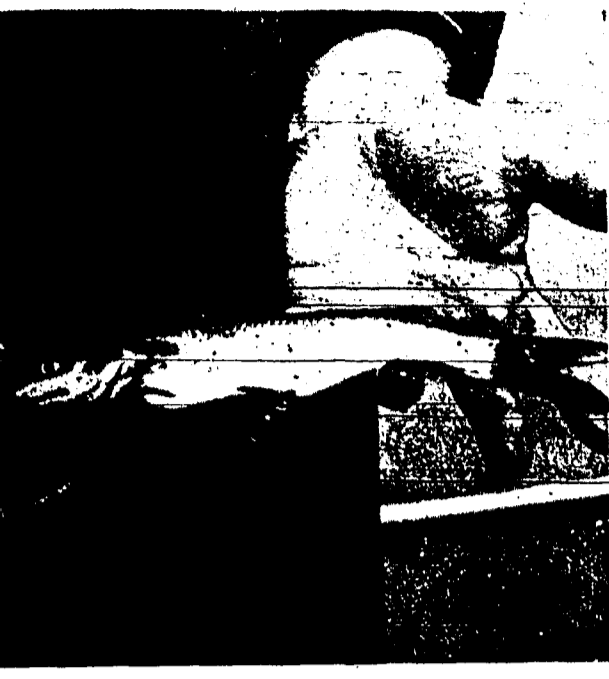

Catfish Will Be Added to Magic Valley Fish List

Catfish will be added to Magic Valley's fishing list this week if all goes well with a transplanting project being undertaken by the Idaho fish and game department. Under the direction of Stacy Gebhardt, district fish biologist, the catfish will be transplanted from Brownlee dam into the Snake river near Hagerman and again at Lake Walcott near Rupert. The fish are being trapped at Wells canyon currently and held until a sufficient number are caught to make a truck trip feasible. Three things have set the project back two weeks so far and the earliest possible planting within Magic Valley won't be accomplished until next week. The trapping began when about 1,000 catfish were being caught per day during the spring run. But when the allotment for Magic Valley came up the run dropped to less than half. Later a load of fish, originally designated for Magic Valley, was lost and last week-end's wind storms disrupted the traps. Gebhardt spent Wednesday putting the traps into working order. The fish will be primarily channel and flathead catfish with a few blues. The channel cats, the most numerous of the expected plant, will attain 20-pound size but a three-to-five-pound average would be good, Gebhardt says. The flathead will grow to 50 pounds but Gebhardt urges Magic Valley anglers to have a little patience with one of that size. The fish and game department notes catfish were introduced into the Boise river in 1893 but the venture proved a failure. After some spot work over the next few decades the department released channel cats in the Snake river between Glenns Ferry and Weiler. The bulk of the catfish population is now found between Lewiston and Swan falls. The largest Idaho channel cat recorded to date was caught by Cecil Beckman, Meridian, in 1963. It weighed 20 pounds, 9 ounces. Larger specimens have been caught accidentally in nets by fisheries workers in Brownlee reservoir but their weights were never listed.

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Dominican Republic Politics Is Like Climate — Subject to Sudden Storms

U.S. forces may be able to maintain temporary quiet in the Dominican Republic, but real peace is something the island has never known.

"Basta ya!" was the cry a short time back among the relatively small, badgered middle-class elements. It meant something equivalent to "Let's cut it out!" It reflected weariness with an unending turmoil.

Almost from the time Christopher Columbus first set foot on the island in 1492, colonial powers squabbled over the island of Hispaniola. The Dominicans became independent 121 years ago, but it took exactly 100 years since they finally ended Spanish domination.

Political peace has been a rarity there.

In the 19th century, the country had 92 different governments. In the 20th century, too, until U.S. marines arrived in 1916 to suppress an insurrection, they occupied the country eight years.

The Dominican Republic is an attractive land with attractive people. About the size of Vermont and New Hampshire combined, it occupies the eastern two-thirds of Hispaniola. Haiti occupies the west. Its 9.2 million people are 10 per cent white, 20 per cent Negro and 70 per cent mixed blood. Legend says its capital city was founded 469 years ago by Bartolomeo, brother of Christopher Columbus.

The climate is pleasant, but, like the politics, subject to sudden hurricanes. It was during a violent hurricane that the era of dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo Molina began, and hurricanes were the one thing he feared

most ever after. A soothsayer told him he would go out as he came in, during a hurricane. He didn't.

The U.S. occupation opened the way for the Trujillo dictatorship. He was an army cadet when it began, and a brigadier general when it ended, in charge of organizing the army. In 1930, at age 38, Trujillo was the nation's most powerful man. The Trujillo era was destined to last 31 years.

Trujillo did well, by some standards. But widespread illiteracy, poverty and unemployment stand a bad record for much of Latin American, persisted.

On May 31, 1961, assassins' guns ended the career of Trujillo. Six months, confusion reigned. Joaquín Balaguer, who remained in the presidency after the assassination, took measures to liberalize political life, but the people wanted all memories of the Trujillo family obliterated.

Political opposition leaders, back from exile, demanded Balaguer's resignation, considering him a remnant of Trujilloism. Fears of a new attempt to restore the Trujillo dynasty were stirred by the return of two Trujillo brothers, Gen. Jose and Gen. Hector, and mobs marched on the national palace.

A flotilla of U.S. warships steamed offshore, evidently to support Balaguer through the crisis. He came up with a compromise—a state council to rule with legislative and limited executive powers, pending elections, and an announcement that the Trujillo brothers would leave.

Juan Bosch, head of the Dominican Revolutionary party just back from exile, threw his support to Balaguer. The council was sworn in. After wild

rioting in January, Balaguer carried out his promise to resign. Once again the country went under military rule under Gen. Rodolfo Ezchavarría, armed forces chief.

Still, the country was preparing for its first free elections since 1924, scheduled for December 1962. There were 10 political parties, but only two really counted — Bosch's and the National Civic union representing conservative elements. Other groups across the political spectrum were led by men seeking personal power. Communist party leaders still were mostly in Cuba. The Castro-like 14th of June movement, with a youth and student following, prepared to boycott the elections.

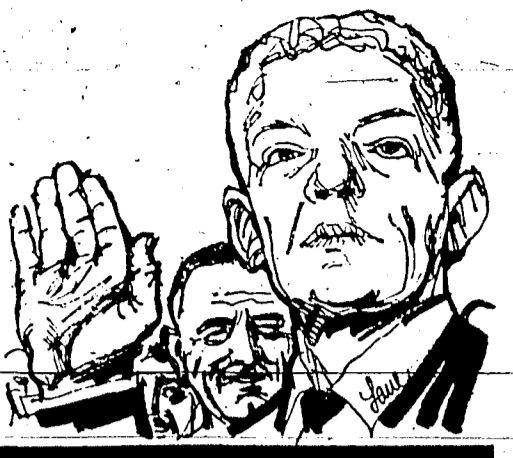
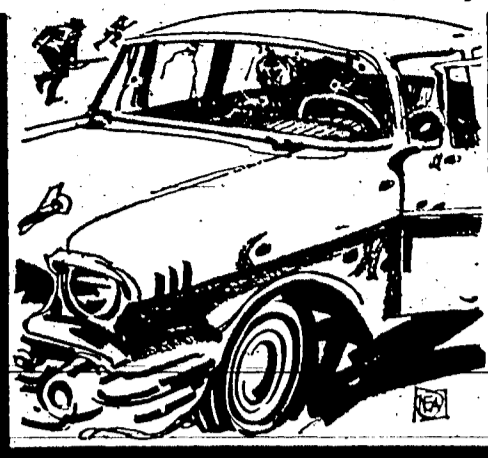
Bosch's party triumph by a wide margin. Bosch, a writer professing anti-Castro and anti-communist sentiments, seemed to impute honorable intentions to elements of the far left. This was a source of worry to military leaders, who also may have worried about Bosch's announced intention of claiming for the country all wealth stolen under the Trujillo regime. The military acted in the traditional Latin American way. They overthrew Bosch after 10 months.

Communists and Castroites denounced Bosch as leader of a mongrel party which they claimed had stolen the election. With Bosch overthrown, they could safely profess indignation.

Violence reigned again last week in the wake of an attempt to restore Bosch by means of a military coup. The Castro-communist elements saw a sudden opportunity in this, and plunged into the confusion in an attempt to turn a coup into a street revolution.

The United States ordered the U.S. Marines in on May 5, 1916 to protect American lives and property. It became apparent that he would have to intervene formally, so on Nov. 29, U.S. forces occupied the whole country and set up a military government. Peace was established and finances, the economy, transportation and education were improved. A satisfactory provisional government was achieved. The United States gradually withdrew, the last of our forces leaving June 26, 1924.

Six years later a revolution expelled the president and paved the way for a ruthless dictator who rigged the 1930 election to become president. He was Gen. Rafael Leonidas Trujillo, who began a notoriously corrupt, iron-fisted, blood-stained regime. But he did maintain order . . . the order of fear. His career ended with his assassination on May 27, 1961. During Trujillo's 31-year reign, Juan Domingo Bosch, a poet, teacher and liberal political reformer, had been exiled—mostly in pre-Castro Cuba.

After Trujillo's downfall, he returned home to great popularity and a sweep of the free election on Feb. 27, 1963. Among those who attended his inauguration was the then Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. But misfortune dogged Bosch's program of drastic social and economic reforms. Trujillo had left the country practically bankrupt. Bosch's austerity regimen met with widespread opposition. He was not a good administrator and quarreled with powerful forces, including the Catholics.

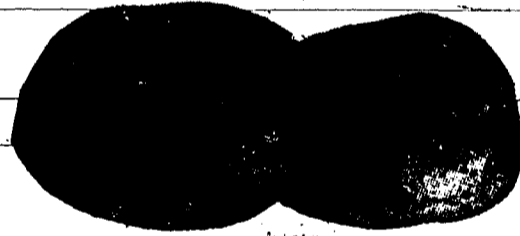

Humphrey, President's "Understudy," Discusses Scope, Intensity of Post

BY WILLIAM THEIS
WASHINGTON, May 12 (UPI)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, like most men pushing 64, pitched his waistline before ordering the creamed chicken and confided:
"I like my job—and I'm learning. That means really getting to know about our great power and all the problems involved in the world's trouble spots. It means in-depth knowledge of what I perhaps knew somewhat superficially before."
The former senate Democratic whip will have been in office as President Johnson's understudy four months on May 20. To date as vice president he has traveled more than 30,000 miles, delivered 60 formal and dozens of informal speeches and visited 11 states and Puerto Rico.
The pace is not too much faster than that which he knew during his 16 years in the Senate. The difference is in the scope and intensity of his assignments.
What has been his biggest challenge?
"Civil rights—carrying out the provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964," he said.

President Johnson made Humphrey the coordinator of both the federal civil rights and anti-poverty programs even before the Minnesotan took office. Officially, he presides as chairman of the President's committee on equal opportunity in employment and of the space council. He sits in with the national security council and cabinet.
Humphrey, who captained the 1964 civil rights legislative drive, has had less to do this year with preparation of the pending voting rights bill. More of his attention has been devoted to pushing jobs for Negroes and working on the anti-poverty and education bills which carry automatic benefits for such people.
The day I interviewed him, the vice president got to lunch in an otherwise deserted Senate dining room at 2:15 p.m. He already had spent almost two hours with the joint chiefs of staff, been briefed by a central intelligence agency officer who daily rides to work with him for that purpose, attended a White House rose garden ceremony, met with a disarmament agency official and the family of an Indiana army officer killed

in South Viet Nam. Ahead were other late afternoon appointments and then, for a change, a free evening.
What aspects of the vice presidency, I asked, have required the most adjustment? Humphrey smiled and said:
"As a senator, I was kind of independent and promoting many projects. Now, I'm using my ideas inside the administration—they may show up later but not as a piece of legislation with my name on them. That's a real adjustment for an outgoing fellow. And there is a far wider range."
The vice president regards his "most delicate" task that of helping to guide the President's legislative program in congress. He spends about half his time on Capitol Hill. "That's what the President wishes"—and that's what the vice president does.
Humphrey's legislative work so far has concentrated on the aid to education bill, the recent 700 million dollar emergency defense appropriation, the Appalachia measure, extension of the arms control act and foreign aid. He still has his old bounce. Meeting new people, especial-

ly young people, delights Humphrey.
"I like people," he said with emphasis.
His stop-and-chat habit imperils his schedule at times. But the high point of this day clearly had been his personal tribute to Mrs. Eugene R. Fowler, Terre Haute, Ind., and her two small children. Her husband, an army captain, died April 27 after stepping on a Viet Cong land mine at Phuoc Binh Thauah.
Humphrey greeted the family in his historic formal office. There were presents for Stephen, 5, and Genie, 9, and the vice president.
"That man gave his life," he said. "If the vice president doesn't have time for people like that, he just ought to quit."
Despite all this, Humphrey believes he is able to spend more time with his wife, Muriel, than he did as a senator. Mrs. Humphrey has a secretary now to help her, and their four children are grown. The Humphrey staff that previously had to devote most of its attention to serving constituents, now can give more direct help to its boss.

MARIETTA, Ga., May 13 (AP)—Steve Deakins is going back to Alaska today to work a gold-mining claim he hopes will yield enough to put him through college.
Deakins, 20, is joint owner of the claim, near Anchorage, with Ed Bowers, a geologist and licensed prospector and a friend of the Deakins family.

"We traveled around Alaska and the Yukon before staking the claim," he said. "The United States and Canada have an agreement that allows Americans to file claims in the Yukon and Canadians to prospect on American soil."
Bowers previously had a claim but last year's earthquake destroyed it. He returned with

Deakins to start work from scratch.
Deakins says he will be in Alaska about 4 1/2 months this year. He and Bowers hope to build a cabin while working their claim.
He plans to return to Georgia next winter and enter college where he would like to major in geology and then go back to

Alaska.
Deakins says: "Many kids go right to college without being really sure of what they want to do. That's when a lot of them begin flunking out. I think I will be better prepared by waiting."
Claim jumpers? They're no problem, reports Deakins. There is nobody around particularly interested in "jumping," he said.

Passengers in Flying Boat Are Dunked

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13 (AP)—Testers of a flying boat designed to zip commuters across San Francisco bay were dunked yesterday when the craft sized.

The four passengers in the Hovercraft, which rides on a jet-air cushion some four feet above the waves, were rescued by a military patrol boat. The Hovercraft was towed to shore.

"We went into a tight turn at about 60 miles per hour and the centrifugal force gently robed us over," said John Cunningham, vice president of San Francisco-Oakland Helicopter Airlines.

"We won't be doing maneuvers like that on any commercial trips," said Cunningham. "In the tests we're finding out the limits."

Student Riots In Arizona To Be Probed

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 13 (AP)—An Arizona senate committee was to begin a probe today into student riots and other disturbances at the state's two universities.

A summons issued yesterday by the senate institutions committee was directed at administrators of the University of Arizona in Tucson and Arizona State university at nearby Tempe.

It followed nearly a week of spasmodic riots, a teach-in at the Tucson school and a recent speech at Arizona state critical of the administration's Viet Nam policy.

In Tucson, university officials said they were without clues to wave of "prankish pyromania" that followed student rioting last week.

Security chief Doug Paxton said 15 to 20 fire bombs have been found on the campus since last Wednesday when the trouble began.

Crowds Disrupt Bombing Practice

MELBOURNE, May 13 (AP)—Crowds of mushroom pickers swarmed over the lush Australian airforce bombing range outside Melbourne yesterday and disrupted a bombing practice for a squadron of Canberra bombers.

The pickers, including children, waved their loaded bags at the bombers swooping overhead. The practice had to be called off while air force trucks chased the intruders away.

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., May 13 (AP)—The air force disclosed yesterday that the F111A—its version of the controversial TFX supersonic jet fighter—flew for the first time in a "smooth," successful test far short of its maximum potential.

The announcement coincided with the navy unveiling at Patuxent, N.Y., of its TFX, the F-11B.

The TFX program was expected to cost seven billion dollars.

The F111A was flown yesterday at a speed of 760 miles an hour and an altitude of 30,000 feet. Capt. James W. Wood was at the controls during the 75-minute flight, which ended with "touch and go" landing.

The plane was designed to fly at twice the speed of sound, or 1,500 miles per hour.

Two more flights are scheduled later this week as part of the two-year test program at this base, home of the X15 and XB70.

MISSOULA, May 13 (AP)—An apparent low bid of \$46,187 for repair work on two flood-damaged sections of a road in the St. Joe national forest east of Avery, Ida., was submitted to the U. S. forest service here yesterday.

The Lieutenant Governor Is King of Past; He Works Now

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Once a time the office of lieutenant governor was much like that of vice president—it carried the prestige but little of the power. Now it has become a position of real importance.

At this time, the federal government is in the throes of a bitter struggle for the state and the importance of the number two position in the executive branch of both has become apparent.

A shocked nation rediscovered the office on Nov. 22, 1962. A frustrated governor has known it in Idaho ever since he's general election of 1958.

Since that 1958 election, the Idaho statehouse has been divided politically, with the Republican government of the table and a Democratic administration sitting on the sidelines.

In some states, this situation has led to governmental chaos. In Idaho, the governor, regardless of his political affiliation, has been in the state temporarily as a lieutenant governor of the state.

Fortunately, most observers agree this has not been the case in Idaho where Republican Gov. Albert E. Smyley the past 6½ years has been succeeded periodically by Democratic Lieut. Gov. William E. Drevlow.

So confident is Smyley of his position, that he has in the past a total of 307 days of leave from the office of lieutenant governor in charge.

Smyley tried to intercept the messages to Drevlow this out of state, has either in complain about the arrangement.

Yet, the fact that Smyley and Drevlow are of different political faiths has served to keep them on their toes. It also has made Smyley a captive in the statehouse the past two years.

When opportunities both for a general election and for a seat in the United States Senate presented themselves, Smyley had to reject them. To do otherwise would be to turn the capitol over to the Democrats.

There was a time, three years ago, when Drevlow, now 76, considered running for governor himself. Later, he withdrew from nomination race and ran again for the number two spot which he won.

Drevlow says now that he has no intention of running for governor in the 1968 general election. But he's keeping open his mind on whether to seek a second term.

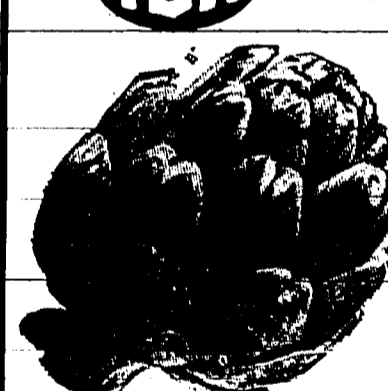
