

## Fighting On Island Continues

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Tanks spearheading the way, forces of the Dominican military-civilian junta today stepped up their offensive against outnumbered rebel fighters in the eastern Santo Domingo.

The three-day-old battle picked up new tempo after the junta rejected peacemaking efforts of a White House team sent here yesterday.

President Johnson said the junta forces are pushing the rebels eastward, where the battle had raged through Saturday night, then diminished Sunday, only to flare up again Sunday night.

Residents who fled the area north of the east-west supply corridor reported heavy military and civilian casualties. U.S. troops were not involved in the action, but three U.S. paratroopers were wounded Saturday night during a heavy exchange of fire between rebels and the 22nd U.S. Airborne Brigade.

A U.S. spokesman said the heaviest action recorded in a 24-hour period since U.S. forces arrived.

The American troops control the river's west bank and the rebels the east. The rebels have been using mortars and heavy weapons against the Americans. The U.S. troops have been firing back with 106mm recoilless 106mm tank weapons.

A high-level White House mission which came from Washington Sunday met with junta president Gen. Antonio Imbert Barrera and reportedly pressed the junta to resign. Junta forces said Imbert refused. A meeting between Imbert and Undersecretary of State Thomas C. Mann was scheduled today.

Junta sources said the U.S. government was trying to get the junta to step aside so "that understanding could be reached with rebel constitutional forces for a peaceful solution to the Dominican conflict. The White House mission also includes McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to the President for national security affairs; Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus Vance, and Jack H. Vaughn, assistant secretary of state for American affairs.

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## China's Bomb Carried by Missile

SEOUL (UPI) — The Japanese newspaper Asahi Shimbun said today a Communist nuclear bomb was carried aloft by a missile launched from the air.

An Asahi correspondent in Beijing said he obtained the report from "authoritative sources not otherwise identified."

The bomb was exploded last week over western China, according to the official Red China account. It made no mention of the means of detonation but the use of the word "detonated" off speculation that the device was possibly dropped from an airplane.

A cable from Peking to Moscow said the missile was launched from a military base in the air after an undisclosed disclosure.

## Negro Diplomat Leaves Russia

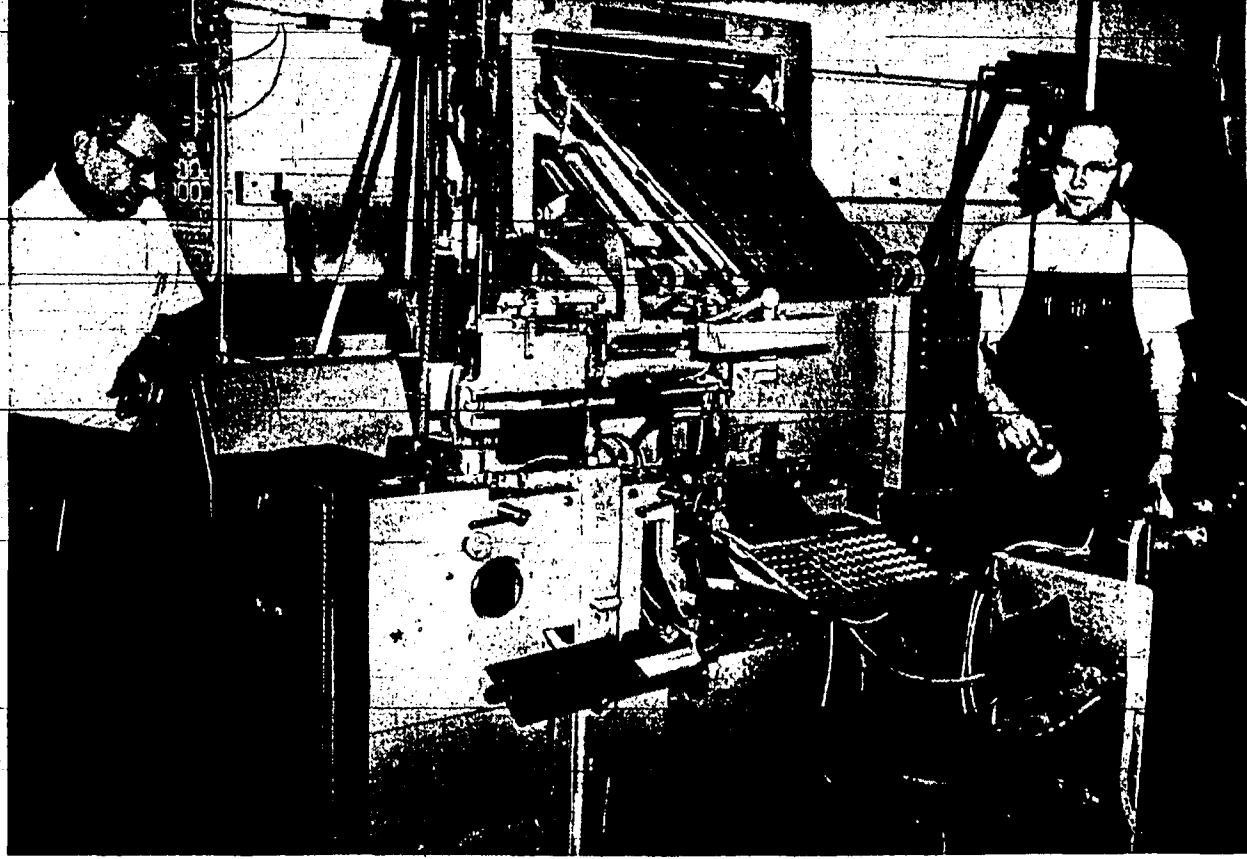
MOSCOW (UPI) — An American Negro diplomat, ordered expelled by the Soviet Union for charges of dispensing "anti-Soviet propaganda" among American students in Moscow, left by plane Monday for London.

## Automatic Typesetting System Now Being Used by Times-News

Easier reading and automation come to the Times-News with today's issue. All of the news content is printed with new type and wire service news is being set by a new, automatic typesetting machine, an Intertype Monarch. This first major step in automation by the Times-News is taken with the intention of utilizing latest production methods to insure its subscribers the best product available. The new type face is Imperial cleaner appearing and easier to read. Headline and advertising type faces will remain the same for the present.

The new automatic typesetting machine is operated by punched tape, which comes into the newspaper simultaneously with teletype copy of state, national and international news.

The punched tape comes on a machine installed near the Monarch in the composing room of the paper. News stories punched on the tape are numbered to correspond to the monitor copy, which comes in on teletype machines installed in the news room.

Selection of stories to go into the Times-News will be made by the wire editor from the monitor copy. Matching tape then will be selected and fed into the autoserter attachment which operates the Monarch.

The automatic machine sets 14 lines of type a minute, compared to six or seven lines a minute generally set by hand. Elimination of human error, reducing number of lines which must be reset to correct typographical errors, will further increase the output of the autoserter. See AUTOMATION, Pg. 5, C. 1

## Johnson Inks Nez Perce Park Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson signed today a bill to preserve historical areas in Idaho by making them a part of a Nez Perce National Historical Park.

The measure authorizes the secretary of the Interior to designate the park to "commemorate, preserve and interpret the rich and varied history of an area significant in the development of the American West."

The park would involve 22 separate sites in the North Idaho Panhandle, together with scenic easements around them. The area containing the sites has an average north-south width of 60 miles and an average east-west length of 110 miles.

The sites to be included relate to the early Nez Perce Indian culture, the Lewis and Clark expedition through the area, the fur trade, missionaries, gold mining and logging, the Nez Perce War of 1877 and other such sites as depict the westward expansion of the nation.

The bill authorizes appropriations up to \$630,000 for the acquisition of land and other expenses.

## No Confidence

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Robert E. Smylie said today he believes Democratic members of the State Land Board have given State Land Commissioner O. J. Buxton a vote of "no confidence."

He referred to adoption by the Democrats last Friday of a set of rules and regulations governing the statehouse custodial staff and an ultimatum to Buxton to carry them out or be replaced.

Buxton declined comment on Smylie's assertions and also refused to discuss rumors that he is planning to resign his post.

## 28 Miners Are Killed by Gas Explosion

TONYPANDY, Wales (AP) — A gas explosion ripped through the depths of a coal mine today and officials said at least 28 miners were killed. The mine had been destined for closing soon.

About 80 men were in the mine when the blast occurred in this Rhondda Valley town. The 28 bodies were found in a collapsed gallery a few hours after the blast.

The pit is a fairly small one, operated by the Cambrian colliery, 18 miles north of the Welsh capital of Cardiff, in the Rhondda Valley.

A total of 838 men are employed on the day shift at the mine, but only 80 were underground when the explosion took place, at a depth of 300 feet. The mine's maximum depth is 600 feet.

# Time Bombs at Air Base Are Set Off; 27 Dead or Missing

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Demolition experts, working with special time charges, today blew up four 500-pound bombs strewn across the Bien Hoa Air Base by the chain explosion Sunday that left 27 Americans dead or missing and 103 wounded. Another 500-pound bomb buried in the smoldering wreckage of some of the 40 planes destroyed or damaged went off by itself. No one was hurt, but hazards remained from the rest of the 10 such bombs, rated as unstable.

## Congress Asked to Cut Excise Taxes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson formally submitted to Congress today his bid to cut excise taxes by nearly \$4 billion, and gave assurances he sees no indication that spending for defense of the free world would upset the planned reduction. The President filled in the checks in a program he already had announced Saturday. And he said that the recommendations "will accomplish, prudently and responsibly, a major reform of the excise tax structure."

## Excise Taxes Planned to Be Cut Listed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The excise taxes of 10 per cent collected on retail sales would be eliminated July 1 on handbags, luggage, toilet articles and jewelry.

Excise taxes levied on the manufacturer, ranging from 5 to 10 per cent, would be eliminated by July 1 on business machines, sporting goods, radios, television sets, phonographs, records, musical instruments, cameras, film, photo equipment, photo projectors, refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners; electric, gas and oil appliances; fountain pens, mechanical pencils, lighters, matches and playing cards.

The present 10 per cent passenger auto would drop to 7 per cent July 1, and to 6 per cent in 1966, then 5 per cent Jan. 1, 1967.

The direct retail excise taxes also would be ended July 1 on safe deposit boxes, coin-operated amusement devices, bowling alleys, pool tables, documentary stamp tax; admissions to movies, theaters, concerts and athletic events; cabarets, racing, club dues and initiation fees.

Other manufacturers' taxes to be eliminated by July 1 would be on light bulbs and auto accessories except tires and tubes. The telephone tax, now 10 per cent, would be cut to 3 per cent in 1966 and ended Jan. 1, 1969.

Admission taxes — Complete repeal, including the tax on admissions to certain movies, theaters, concerts, racing and athletic events, cabarets and club dues.

Repeat of manufacturer's taxes on lubricating oil and electric light bulbs, and repeat of the tax on auto parts and accessories except those primarily for truck use.

Repeat of the documentary stamp taxes on stocks and bonds and deeds.

A cut in local and long-distance telephone taxes from 10 to 3 per cent, with teletypewriter service included, and with a further reduction of 1 per cent a year each Jan. 1 until the tax is wiped out entirely by 1969.

## Rusty Hand Grenade Fails To Explode

HEYBURN — Seven-year-old Michael Morris entered his home Sunday evening, said "look what I've found, Mother," and dropped a World War II hand grenade in his mother's hands — with the pin pulled.

Young Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Morris, and his cousin, Gary McClaws, 13, were playing in a field near the Morris home when they found the rusted fragmentation type grenade lying partially buried in the dirt.

The two boys picked up the grenade, pulled the pin, stuck the pin back in and pulled it again. It failed to go off.

They went to the Morris residence where young Morris handed the grenade to his mother. Mr. and Mrs. Morris loaded their five children into the family car and, along with the grenade headed for the home of a church acquaintance who is a regular Army staff sergeant.

Butterfield told Mr. and Mrs. Morris that rust and corrosion on the grenade prevented it from going off.

He theorized that the device had come from the World War II prisoner of war camp at Hanoi. How it got to the field near the Morris home was not known.

Butterfield placed the grenade in an isolated area until it could be disposed of by sheriff's officers.

WASHINGTON (AP) — An officer formerly from Hill Air Force Base in Utah is among those listed as missing in a series of explosions at Bien Hoa Air Base in South Viet Nam.

And a sergeant from Sterling, Idaho, is among those seriously injured.

The Defense Department listed today as missing 1st Lt. Lee C. Wagner Jr., who wife, Mrs. Jean Ann Wagner, lives at Clearfield, Utah.

Lt. Wagner formerly was stationed at Hill AFB where he was assigned to the 467th Defense Systems Evaluation Squadron as an electronics warfare officer on B57 bombers. He left in January on a transfer to Viet Nam.

Listed as very seriously injured was M. Sgt. Leon E. Adamson, whose mother, Mrs. Merle C. Adamson, lives at Sterling, Idaho. Sgt. Adamson's wife, Mrs. Adrienne Adamson, lives at Clark Air Force Base, the Philippines.

# 11 Trucks With Red Arms Seized

 NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — The Kenya government seized Sunday a convoy of 11 trucks loaded with Communist-made small arms enroute from Tanzania to Uganda.

The trucks were intercepted on a back road by Kenya police in western Kenya near the village of Kisii 60 miles from the Tanzania frontier and placed under armed escort.

"They were in transit and we thought it best to take care of them while they were passing through Kenya," said Njoroge Mungai, defense and internal security minister. "What is most important is that these arms were not being smuggled to any individuals or any group in Kenya."

He refused to say whether his government would release the arms shipment.

The trucks were ordered taken under armed escort to a Kenya army barracks near Nairobi in the Rift valley.

Mungai said the trucks carried Uganda number plates. The convoy was accompanied by a senior Uganda army officer.

Kenya, Tanzania—a union of Tanganyika and Zanzibar—and Uganda are former British East Africa territories which have received their independence in the past few years.

# TV Debate on Viet Nam Sought With U.S. Aide

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The organizers of the nationwide "teach-in" on Viet Nam called on McGee Bundy for a nationally televised debate between the White House security adviser backed out at the last minute from Saturday's confrontation.

Bundy, an architect of U.S. foreign policy under fire from some members of the academic profession, canceled his scheduled appearance at the national teach-in because of what he called "other duties."

The White House would not elaborate. It was learned, however, that he led a high-level U.S. mission to Santo Domingo Sunday to confer secretly with the American ambassador and a Latin-American peace delegation on the Dominican crisis.

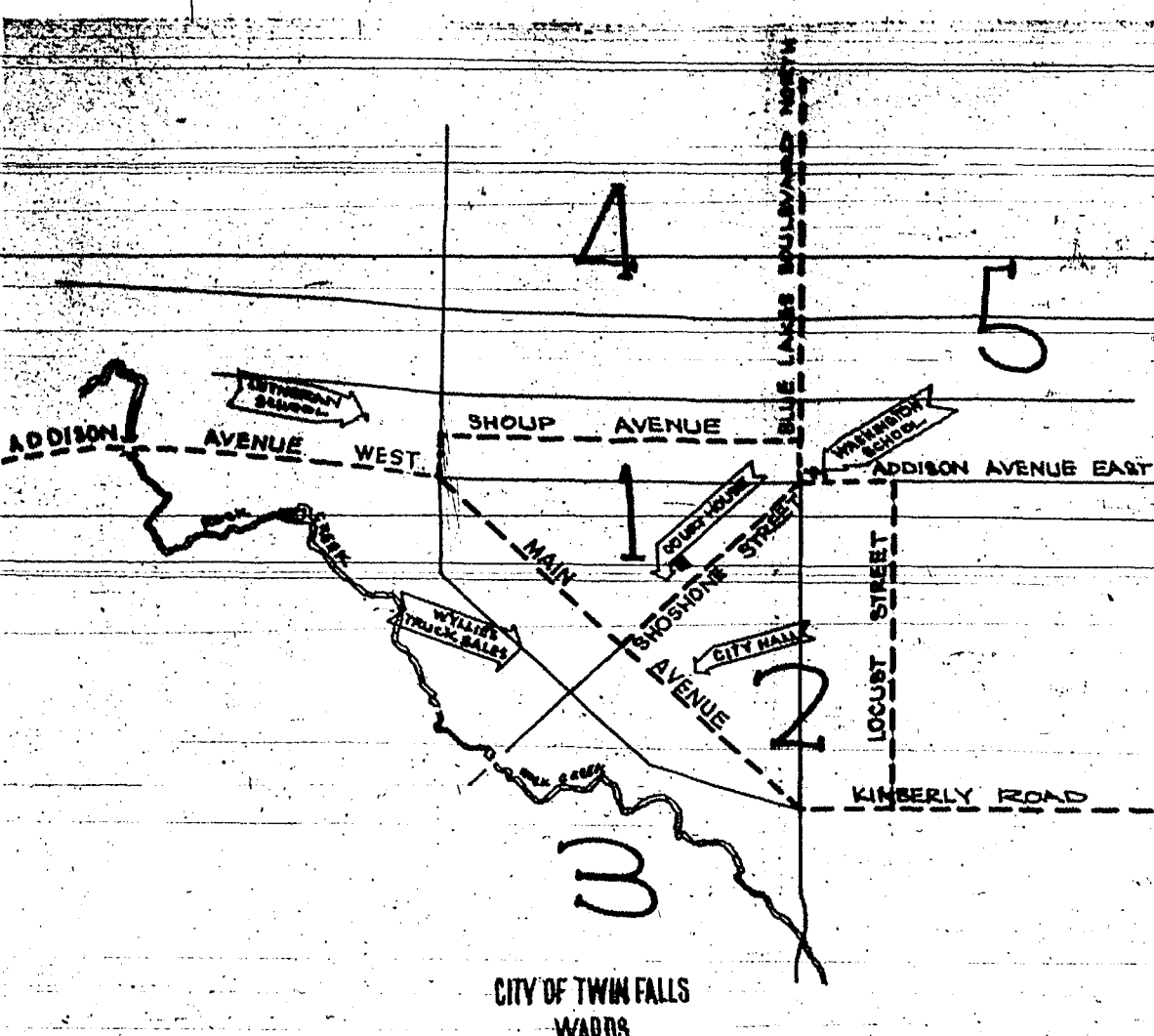

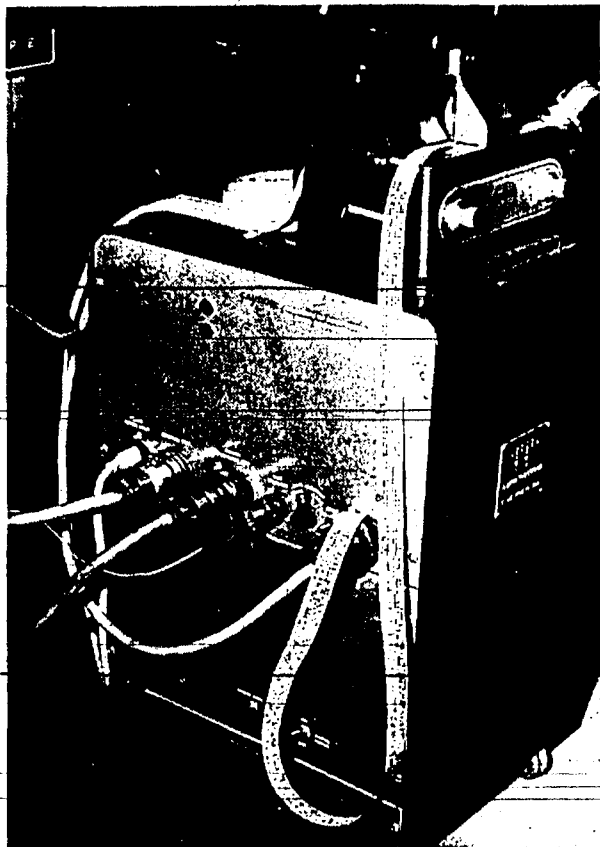

# PTA Members Urged to Back Civil Rights

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The president of the national PTA urged the organization's 12 million members today to throw themselves into the battle for civil rights and equal educational opportunity for all children.

Jennel Moorhead of Eugene, Ore., said, "The cause of civil rights and liberties is our cause. We must uphold the rights of all citizens, especially the right of all children and youth to quality education, and the right of all adults to register and vote."

Mrs. Moorhead officially opened the 69th annual convention of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers by presenting an 11-point, 3-year action program for PTA members in 47,000 local units.

In her prepared keynote address, Mrs. Moorhead said these are the 11 most critical issues affecting children and youth, as determined by the PTA membership:

Financing public education; equalizing educational opportunity; educating for a changing society; clarifying the responsibilities for education decision-making; extending and strengthening community services; combatting moral, spiritual and civic apathy; safeguarding individual rights and liberties; coping with the responsibilities of parenthood, including sex education; providing special services for disadvantaged children; eliminating certain hazards to health and safety; and waging peace in the '60s.

The 2,000 convention delegates from 50 states and Europe will discuss the action program the next two days and take final action Wednesday.

Mrs. Moorhead said the issue of financing public education remains critical despite passage of President Johnson's \$1.3-billion program.

"There is danger," she said, "that states and communities may relax their fiscal efforts now that aid from Washington is in sight. We shall need to see that our state and local school districts make maximum efforts to provide necessary increases in school funds."

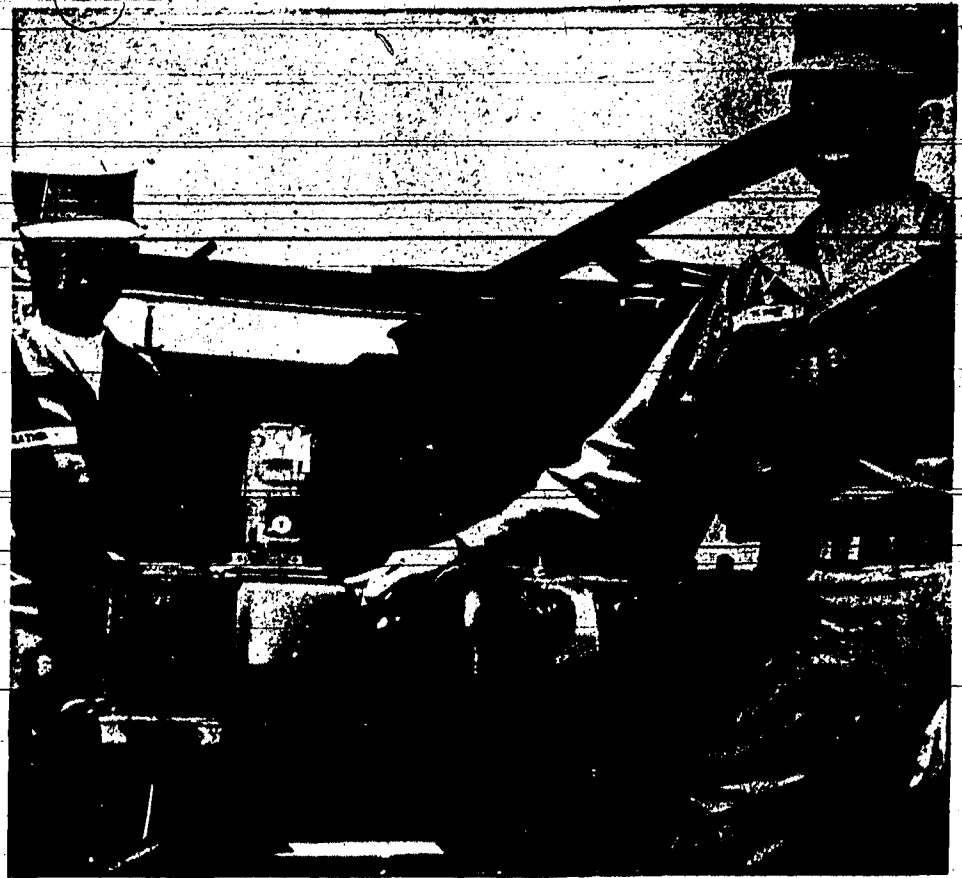

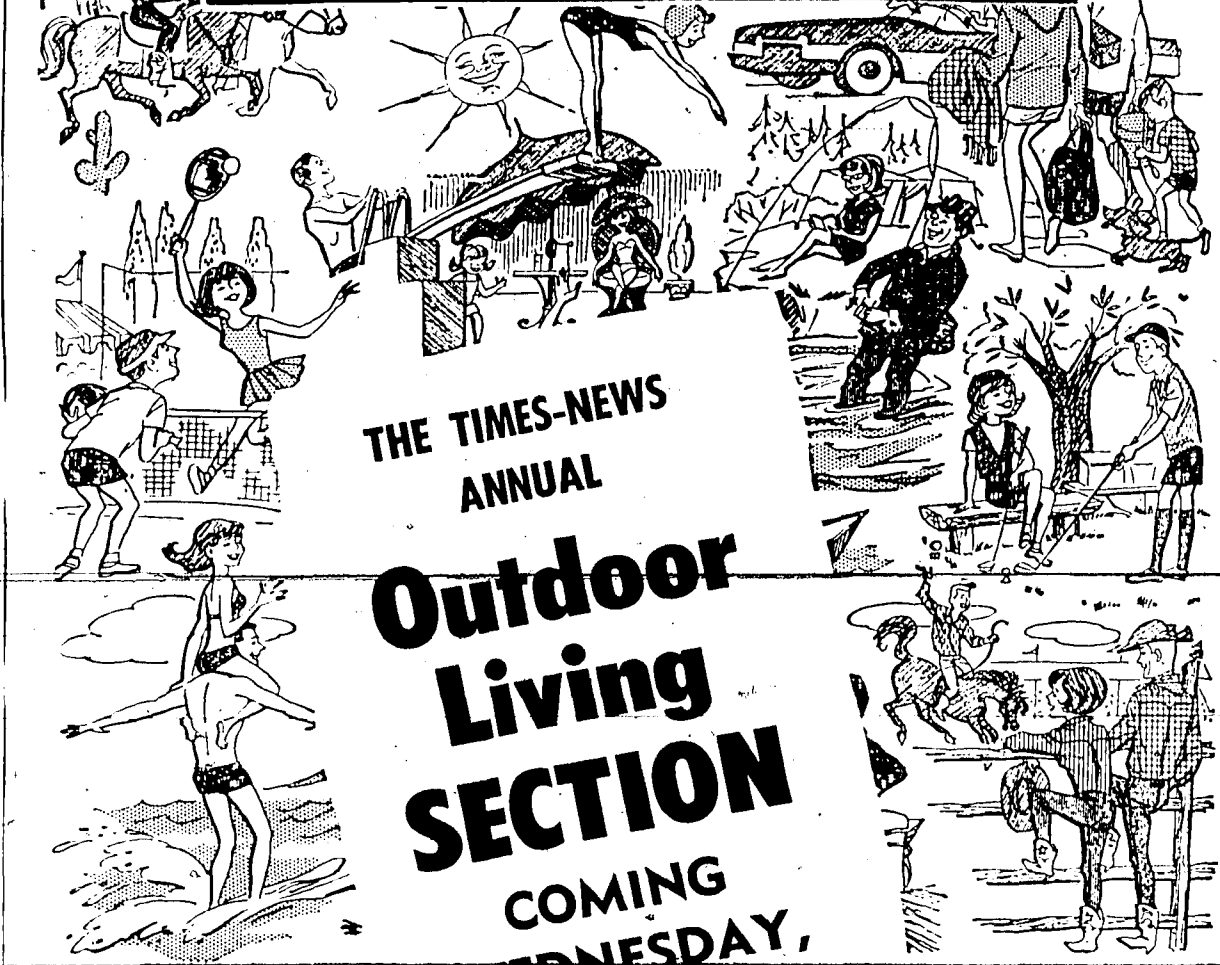
Both students have held undergraduate research appointments supported by the National Science Foundation this year, according to Dr. Malcolm M. Renfrew, head of physical sciences.

**South to Desegregate**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thirty southern school districts are planning to completely desegregate their school systems by the fall of 1967 or earlier, the U.S. Office of Education said.

The 14th southern district to submit an acceptable plan for desegregation was the Selma plan for desegregating four grades in 1967 and four more in 1968. The Selma plan was approved today by the U.S. Office of Education.

The plan is under a court order to desegregate. It has been approved by the U.S. District Court in Selma, Ala., and is being followed by other districts in Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

The plan is the first time any school district in Alabama has accepted desegregation plans. It was previously accepted in Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.

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**Rockville Centre, N.Y.**

The man in the White House has gotten Lord Geoffrey of the dog house.

Lord Geoffrey, a beagle owned by Mr. and Mrs. Rocco Ruggerio of Rockville Centre, has distinguished and varied basketable items—the U.S. Treasury's finest greenbacks.

Lord Geoffrey chewed a \$10 bill into sections last month. The Ruggerios taped the remaining pieces together and sent it to the Treasury Department.

Mrs. Ruggerio, however, went to the nation's number one beagle owner, Lyndon B. Johnson.

The circumstances which led to this bill to its present condition are such that only "I and others like us could understand," she said in a letter to the President.

Johnson, through an aide, returned Sunday with a full presidential pardon for Lord Geoffrey for "having chewed up a property of the U.S. government, namely a \$10 bill."

The White House noted with pleasure that Lord Geoffrey was his bit to maintain the national economy by providing employment for "rugg cleaners, discolor gardeners, upholsterers and the like."
