

Dominican Junta Claims 'Absolute Control,' Asks Unconditional Surrender

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — The Dominican junta claimed "absolute control" of the country Wednesday night and called for unconditional surrender of the rebels. "We have absolute control of the Dominican Republic," the junta president, Brig. Gen. Antonio Imbert Barrera, told a rally of about 1,000 cheering middle and upper class followers inside the U.S.-occupied international zone of Santo Domingo.

NEW YORK (AP) — "All of a sudden, it was like a bomb fell down," says the meat-section manager who was serving customers when the roof of a Brooklyn supermarket collapsed and rained tons of concrete slabs and plaster debris onto customers and clerks. The manager, Sam Kinker, 61, and his four women customers fled through one of the broken windows. Twenty-three persons — mostly women shoppers — were injured. Most of them were treated at hospitals. Four were admitted.

Church Must Heal Break, Leader Says

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The retiring moderator of the nation's biggest Presbyterian body said today the church must heal the tragic divisions into which it has been led.

Dr. Edler G. Hawkins of New York, first Negro to head the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., said reconciliation should be the theme of the church.

He told the opening session of the 177th General Assembly of the church the reconciliation applies to "the cleavages between those who have and those who have not."

He said the civil rights song "We Shall Overcome" is "not just a song to accompany demonstrations." Instead, he said, it represents "the meaning of our faith that must overcome every barrier."

Dr. Hawkins told more than 2,000 Presbyterian leaders: "What we are beginning to see more clearly is that the so-called Negro problem will only be solved within the context of a way of life geared to the concerns of all people."

He called the Union of South Africa "still the scene for the most desperate plight imaginable for nearly eight million Africans."

The retiring moderator also requested a healing of divisions with the Jewish community and other religious bodies.

N.M. Senator Is Hospitalized

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M., was admitted to Bethesda Naval Hospital Thursday for treatment of an inner ear disorder.

Anderson has been troubled in the past by the disorder, called labyrinthitis.

U.S. Planes Blast Viet Cong Facilities

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP) — More than 100 U.S. warplanes attacked a North Vietnamese naval base and other targets today in a series of strikes punctuated by a propaganda leaflet raid only 55 miles south of Hanoi. All planes were reported to have returned safely. A U.S. spokesman announced 70 Navy planes, striking in two waves from the carriers Midway and Coral Sea, inflicted heavy damage on the navy base at Phouc Loi, 165 miles south of Hanoi, with 100 tons of explosives.

Senator Urges Gun Control Bill Passage

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., avoiding direct reference to the assassination of his brother, today urged immediate approval of a gun control bill to save lives and "spare thousands of families" grief and heartbreak.

The former attorney general, brother of the late President John F. Kennedy, charged that "a massive publicity campaign" against the legislation had distorted its purpose and was "doing the nation a great disservice."

He said he hoped a Senate subcommittee considering the measure also would examine ways to disarm private groups like the Ku Klux Klan, Black Muslims and Minutemen.

Kennedy said "private arsenals" should be curtailed and eliminated—at the least, their weapons should be registered.

The bill would curb mail-order sales of firearms and Kennedy said it would "sharply curtail the importation of foreign military surplus weapons which account for the bulk of the cheap mail-order trade, and the bulk of the large-caliber weapons sold in the United States."

A mail-order foreign rifle was used by Lee Harvey Oswald in the Kennedy assassination.

Pakistani Jetliner Crashes Near Cairo, 120 Persons Killed

CAIRO (AP) — A Pakistani jetliner inaugurating Karachi-to-London service crashed in desolate desert sands near Cairo Airport today, killed 120 of the 126 persons aboard. It was the fifth worst air crash in aviation history. Airline officials said one or more Americans perished in the flaming crash. Identification was not immediately available. The airline said that of the 115 passengers, 83 were listed as Pakistanis, 12 Chinese and 10 other foreigners, whose nationalities were listed as U.S., Canadian, Lebanese and Egyptian.

The American-built jetliner's 11 crewmen died in the crash. All six survivors were Pakistanis. Two were employees of the Pakistani International Airline and another was a Pakistani tourist official. Three of the men were reported in critical condition.

The flight was scheduled to pick up 52 additional passengers, all guests of the airline, at Cairo for the remainder of the flight to Geneva and London.

Capt. Akhtar Aly Khan, pilot of the four-engine jet, reported engine trouble and a fire in the landing gear minutes before the crash.

The plane, a Boeing 720B, was inaugurating the airline's new Karachi to London route. Among the passengers were 62 newsmen, airline officials and other invited guests. The same plane had made three preinaugural flights over the route.

The big jet ploughed into a sand hill in a heavy ground fog as it prepared to make its final approach to the Cairo Airport. It crashed at 2:50 a.m. A West German airliner first sighted the wreckage, and Egyptian air force helicopters landed at the wreckage at dawn to pick up the six survivors.

Heroin Sale Erupts Into Auto Chase

RENO (AP) — Reported sale of heroin to a police undercover agent erupted into a gunshot-filled auto chase early today as police and narcotics agents closed in on what they called one of the biggest narcotics rings ever to operate in Nevada.

No one was shot, and a man and wife were arrested on a secret grand jury indictment charging sale of narcotics. A third person was still being sought.

Officers said an undercover agent bought more than one pound of heroin, which they estimated worth \$250,000 in street sales, at a restaurant west of downtown Reno.

Agents arrested Jerry Quillian, 34, at the scene. Quillian's wife, Betty, and another man escaped in Quillian's car, registered in Boise.

Police emptied submachine guns and pistols at the fleeing car as it sped into southwest Reno. The Quillian auto skidded to a stop at a dead-end street. Mrs. Quillian was arrested there but the man escaped on foot.

An estimated 40 officers, some with dogs, scoured the Truckee River banks for the man, who was not identified.

The Quillians were booked on charges contained in the indictments. Bail was set at \$25,000 each.

Coffee Buying in Britain Increases

LONDON (UPI) — Instant coffee is threatening tea as Britain's favorite hot drink, a survey of housewife's buying habits showed today.

Tea buying dropped last year by six cents a week per person while instant coffee purchases increased three cents a week.

Red Bomb

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission said today Red China's latest nuclear weapons test did not involve an H-bomb type device, and that it is "implausible" that it was detonated from a missile.

The commission also reported that the detonation last Thursday employed uranium-235 as the fissionable explosive, as did the first test on Oct. 16.

There had been speculation the second test might have involved use of plutonium.

House Unit Okays Excise Tax Cut Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee has taken a long step beyond President Johnson's request and voted to repeal entirely the excise tax on passenger automobiles over the next four years.

The four major auto companies promptly announced they would pass any tax cuts on to buyers, which would mean an eventual price reduction on an average car of about \$20. The present excise tax on cars is 10 per cent, and Johnson asked that it be cut to 5 per cent.

Tuesday's Ways and Means Committee action — if upheld by Congress — would bring the eventual revenue reduction to nearly \$5 billion, \$900 million more than Johnson had recommended in a special message to Congress Monday. The cut in the first year would be about the \$1.75 billion urged by the President.

Swift congressional approval of excise tax cuts seems assured.

The House probably will vote on the measure the week of May 31, if leaders carry out present plans.

In the Senate, Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., said the Finance Committee hopes to take up the bill right after the House acts and will hear only one witness — Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler. Sen. Byrd said all potential witnesses favor the cuts.

The unusual speed is designed in large part to head off any slump in buying the many goods on which taxes would be eliminated July 1.

Following Johnson's recommendation, the House committee provides procedures by which people who bought autos or air conditioners before July 1 could get refunds.

In addition to these two items, a long list of goods, taxed for the most part at 10 per cent, would become tax free July 1 if the legislation is enacted by then.

General Fund Said in Black

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's general fund now is operating in the black and State Treasurer Marjorie R. Moon said today there is a chance it will continue that way the remainder of the fiscal year which ends June 30.

The general fund was overdrawn \$2,543,977 at the start of the month, Miss Moon said, but wiped out the deficit with income tax collections by May 12. The fund built up to \$1,164,579 as of the end of business May 18, the treasurer added.

Miss Moon said the monthly payroll of about \$1.5 million will have to be met early in June but she said the outlook "is encouraging."

"Civil War" Artillery Unit Winds Across Magic Valley

Sponsored by the Daughters of Union Veterans, 18 men, 22 horses, 1 wagon and 2 cannons are traveling across the West to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of the Civil War.

Headed by Maj. Rudy Marek, a former police officer, the men left Banks, Ore., on April 9 and are traveling as a Union Army artillery unit to Washington, D.C.

Marek, in a roadside interview, reminded Americans that the U.S. is a nation under one flag, that the American Civil War was fought to save that flag and the principles it represents.

The two cannons, each handmade by Marek, weigh 2,000 pounds each and are replicas of 1861 field pieces.

The cannons are fired in each city the unit visits and souvenirs are handed out.

The group will be stationed at Frontier Field, Twin Falls, Thursday and will fire the cannon at 7 p.m.

The unit will leave the city at 6:30 a.m. Friday en route to Burley and Rupert where stops also are planned.

Ceremonies are set for 10 a.m. Saturday in Burley and that evening the cannon will be fired in Rupert.

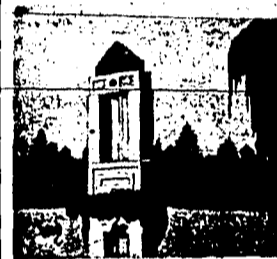

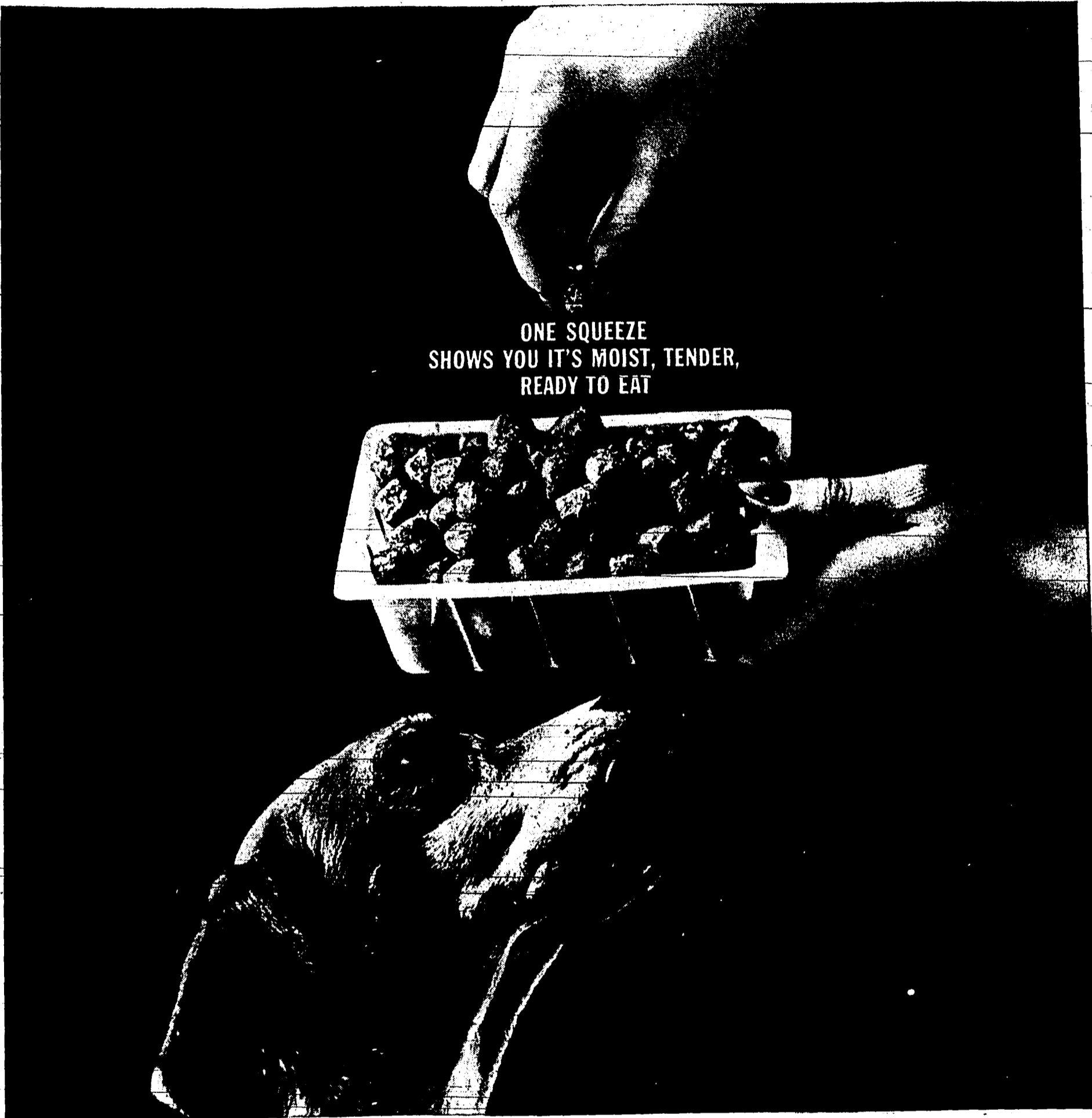

McDonald to Step Down as Steel Chief

PITTSBURGH (AP) — David McDonald will step down as president of the United Steelworkers Union next month with the right to be promised.

McDonald announced Wednesday that he was withdrawing his name from the union's Feb. 9 election in which he was narrowly defeated by Secretary-Treasurer I. W. Abel.

Although associates said he still believes he won, McDonald told newsmen he was bowing out to avoid a lengthy legal struggle that could weaken the union in its current contract talks with basic steel.

The negotiations, now facing a possible Sept. 1 strike date, were twice interrupted by the bitter Abel-McDonald struggle.

McDonald, 62, who once toiled for 22 cents an hour in mills where steelworkers now make more than \$3.60 an hour, guided his union to some of its best contracts and through its longest strike—118 days in 1959.

During his 12-year reign he negotiated the first comprehensive profit-sharing plan and won extended 13-week vacations for senior workers in first the aluminum, then the can and steel industries.

One of his abiding interests was the problems of older workers and those who had retired. It was an interest that came from seeing an illness kill his father who was still at work in the mills at 72.

McDonald was one of the first labor leaders to win pension increases for workers long retired. His own pension, when he steps out June 1, will be \$25,000 a year. As president he was paid \$50,000.

POLICE ENDS PROTEST

BOISE (AP)—What started out as a peaceful student demonstration in protest of city ordinances prohibiting skateboarding in Ann Morrison Park was broken up by police Wednesday night after several fights erupted.

Two teenagers were arrested and held for their parents. No one was injured in the demonstration staged by students from high schools and Boise Junior College.

The demonstration also interfered with the Borah High School autographing party at the park. Boise Police Capt. Gus Urresti said he had detailed cars to the park area to "protect the kids who were behaving themselves and acting like adults."

"These kids have specified skateboarding areas and their protests are not why we were there. We simply wanted to prevent a riot."

SETTLEMENT SOUGHT

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, called Wednesday for a negotiated settlement of the war in Viet Nam. He said to continue it would be "playing into the hands of Red China."

Speaking at a banquet in his honor at Sun Valley, Church, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, declared that the war is strengthening the hand of Red China over all of southeast Asia.

Church compared the Viet Nam war to the Korean conflict, which he said ended at the conference table "after terrible costs in both men and money." "The war in Viet Nam," he said, "must likewise end with a political settlement."

PROPOSAL OPPOSED

BOISE (AP)—A suggestion by Gov. Robert E. Smyke that a special agency be created to handle a capitol housekeeping duties has met with strong opposition from two Democratic members of the State Land Board.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams and Auditor Joe Williams both said they are opposed to the proposal. They said the State Land Board is capable of handling the housekeeping duties.

"I am opposed to any new agencies or commissions because they just create an added expense," said Secretary of State Williams.

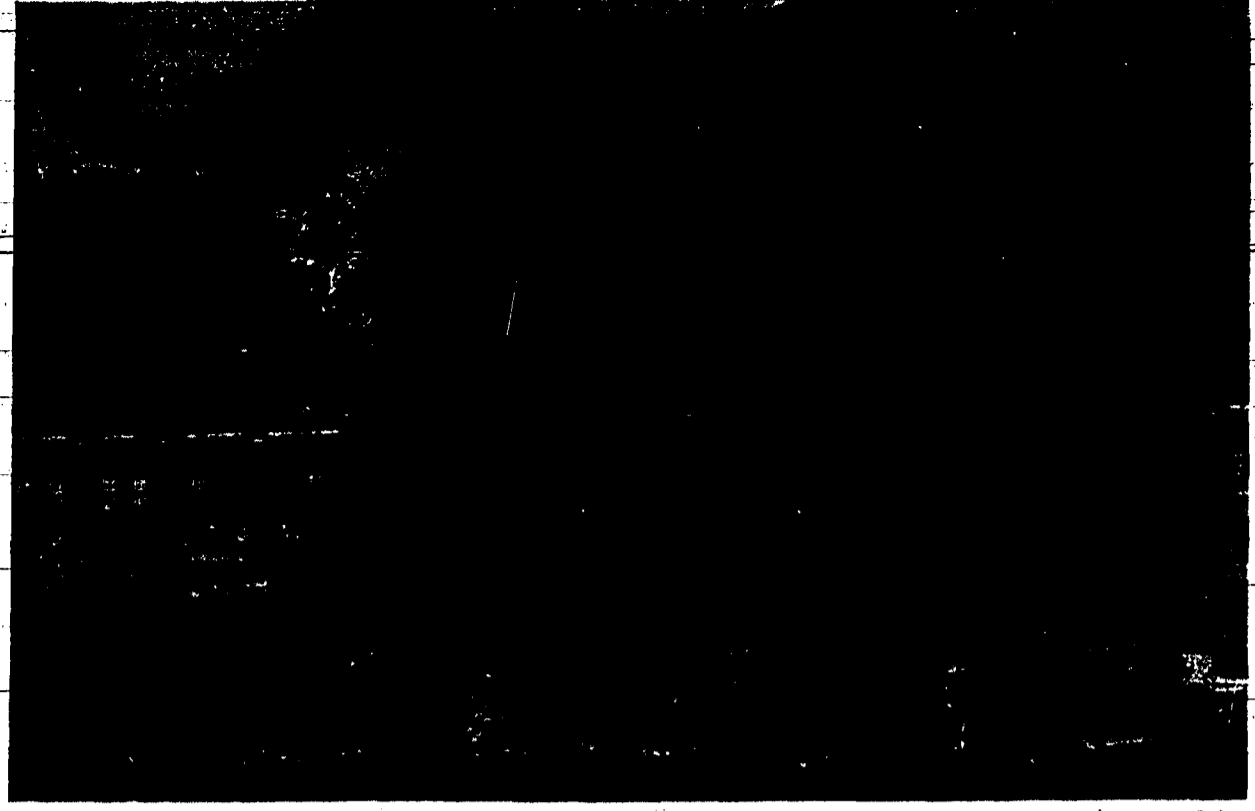
Smyke's suggestion stemmed from difficulties the board has had in allocating Statehouse office space and complaints of mismanagement in the Capitol custodial staff.

India Moves Closer to Nuclear Weapons Business

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—India has not yet launched the expensive and complicated job of building a "sophisticated nuclear weapon."

This requires, among other things, huge amounts of electricity and the experts can find no signs that India's nuclear establishment at Trombay on the west coast is diverting extra large portions.

In the context of modern weaponry, however, such a device probably would not qualify as a bomb. Competitive weaponry to match nuclear arsenals in the West, Soviet Union or even Communist China is far beyond India's reach.

Additionally, India has neither rockets nor planes with which to deliver substantial numbers of nuclear weapons—especially the cumbersome type it now is capable of producing.

The main fear among diplomats here is that India, for reasons of international prestige or internal politics, might go ahead with a crude device—thereby setting off a chain reaction of nuclear proliferation in such nations as Pakistan, Japan, Indonesia and the United Arab Republic.

Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri of India insists his country will not start such a dangerous arms race. But there is strong demand for a nuclear bang-to-match Communist China's—and Shastri shows it. Shortly after Peking's first nuclear explosion last year, Shastri declared unequivocally that India would not follow suit.

Now, he says this decision "stands for the present." But now that China, India's arch-enemy, has exploded a second nuclear device, pressure on Shastri will increase greatly. Neutral experts are certain

Also, experts say, making a sophisticated weapon based on uranium 235 demands large amounts of intricate machinery which India does not make and at present— isn't buying abroad.

There have been, however, substantial increases in budget outlays for nuclear energy development—\$93.5 million this year, compared with \$61.2 million last year.

Some experts feel this indicates India is improving its nuclear technology to a level just below bomb-making capability.

Training for Bible School Is Planned

RUPERT — Summer driver training will get under way June 2 in Minidoka county, according to Elmer Eddington, supervisor of the program at Minico High School.

Eddington reports classes will be held at the high school building from 8 to 10 a.m. Monday through Friday, and the classroom work will be finished June 25 with actual driver training to follow.

Buses will run from Paul, Heyburn and Rupert, but there will be no rural bus route. Transportation must be provided by individuals participating who live out of town.

Students are reminded that permits must be obtained from the sheriff's office, and should be turned in to either Eddington or the junior high school principals prior to May 27.

Anyone between the ages of 14 and 18 is eligible to register, but a student must be at least 14 at the time of registration.

Five or six classes are being planned, Eddington said, with 25 or 30 students expected for each class. Eight qualified instructors of driver training are available, including Leland Durfee, Harold Hurst, Grover Newman, Glen Maughan, Dan Zohner, Raymond Anderson and Bill Bowman in addition to Eddington.

Present plans include another class in driver training to commence early in July with the definite date to be announced later. All driver training classes must be taken outside of regular class time, according to the supervisor.

Air Force to Modernize Missile Units

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., (UPI) — The Air Force Wednesday announced a \$1 billion program for modernizing its entire force of Minuteman Intercontinental Missiles, to give them more range, greater nuclear payloads and increased accuracy.

It was announced at the Aviation Space Writers Association's annual news conference that all presently operational or planned Minuteman I missiles will be replaced with the bigger and more powerful Minuteman II models.

Thus the entire force of 1,000 eventually will be of the Minuteman II model.

It previously had been disclosed that there would be 200 Minuteman II models, 150 at Grand Forks AFB, N.D., where construction is underway, and 50 at Malmstrom AFB, Great Falls, Mont.

Wednesday's announcement meant that in addition to the original plan for 200 of the advanced versions the Air Force now will replace the 600 Minuteman I missiles already in operations and the 200 scheduled to go into operation at Warren AFB, Cheyenne, Wyo., this summer.

The Air Force did not say how long the modernization program will take but it obviously will be carried out on a schedule that will not reduce the readiness of the Strategic Air Command.

There has been no disclosure officially of how much greater the Minuteman II's range will be than 6,300 miles which a Minuteman I will travel.

However, the Aerojet-General Corp., which produces the second stage of the 3-stage rocket, said Wednesday that the Minuteman II will have a range of 7,000 miles.

There are two chief advances in the new weapon. One is the second stage which has 50 per cent more power than the second stage of the earlier Minuteman and will provide "a significant range increase," according to the Air Force.

The other advance is an improved guidance system which will enable the Minuteman II to deliver its warheads much closer to their aiming points.

Cyclone Toll in Pakistan Rises

DACCA, Pakistan (AP) — A cyclone that slashed across East Pakistan a week ago killed 12,033 persons, Gov. Abdul Monem Khan announced Wednesday night. He said 1,300 persons are still missing.

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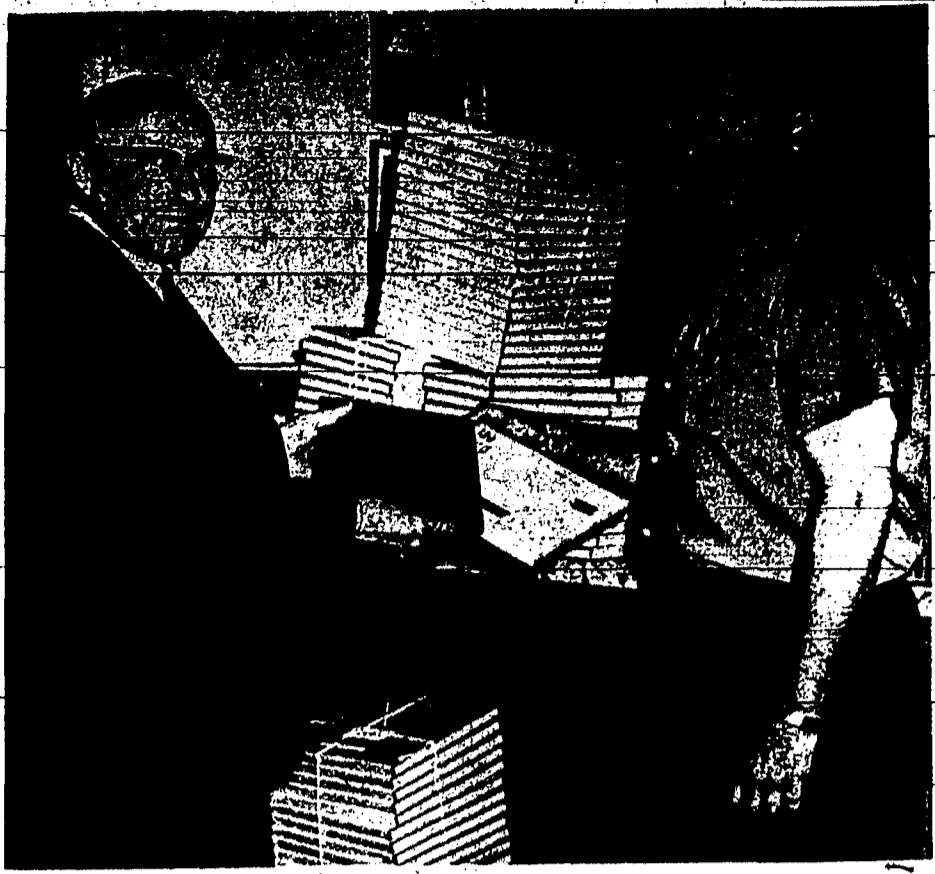

37 Days Adrift on Raft Recounted by Father, Son

CLARK AIR BASE, Philippines (AP) — "I was able to observe quite a lot," said a 20-year-old student of marine biology after 37 days adrift on a raft in the Pacific with his father. "It was extremely interesting."

"If it hadn't been for him I wouldn't be alive today," said the father, Frank Cushing, 63. A former stuntman, he lives on Guam with his wife and three of their four children.

His son, Frank Jr., is a student at the University of Guam. The two set out on their 23-foot raft April 10 to look for rare fish.

They anchored for the night outside a reef off Guam's Puto Point and went to sleep. When they awoke, a storm was blowing them westward, their anchor was gone and Guam was out of sight.

On Monday, 37 days later and 1,400 miles to the west of Guam, they landed their raft on Calayan Island, in the north Philippines. A few hours later the crew of the interisland steamer Jumar sighted the raft and found the two men sleeping in a cave.

They were flown to Clark Air Base Hospital Wednesday. Cushing had lost 50 pounds, his son 40, but otherwise their health was good and their spirits buoyant.

"We never lost hope," said Cushing, grinning through nearly six weeks of beard. "We were positive we would hit the Philippines. When I knew we couldn't

get back to Guam, I set a course for the Philippines. I knew it would be tough but it was our best course."

"Our top speed was about three knots, but I knew we would get some place sometime. I made a sextant out of a spear gun, a fishing line and some other things."

"We didn't have a compass but we had the sun. At night we had Polaris (the North Star) and the Southern Cross to navigate by."

The oil-drum raft was equipped with two outboard motors, but the Cushings improvised a sail to conserve their small supply of gas. Also aboard were a can of beans, a can of meat and a two-gallon tin of water.

"We were seasick for the first three days," said the father. "On the third day we got under a rain cloud. It was a heavy rain, and filled our water can. On the same day we caught a dolphin. We ate the raw flesh for moisture and hung the center part and sides out to dry. It was about a 14-pounder."

Frank Jr. said he worried for the first few days about missing school.

"I just took my midterm exams and wondered what my grade was," he added.

Cushing was hardly able to move much of the voyage, suffering from seasickness and exposure. But Frank Jr. looked after his father, and the raft, and provided a steady supply of fish by hunting underwater with

a spear gun, a rope around his waist attached to the raft. He also kept up his study of marine life.

"If the sea was calm, I would take the rope off and swim around examining the oil drums," said the youth.

"Sharks didn't bother us — in fact, I bothered them. I caught a couple, one 3 feet and another 6 feet long."

A second storm during the voyage refilled their water can. Otherwise they had to depend on the moisture they got from fish.

The U.S. Navy searched for them after Mrs. Cushing reported them missing but finally gave up. Cushing said planes passed over them many times.

"A military plane passed over us on the second day," he said. "I made a smoke pot — with bits of rubber hose and anything that would burn — but the plane never saw us."

Near the end of the voyage they were becalmed for seven days in sight of the distant peaks of the Philippines. They finally landed Sunday on an active volcanic island.

"There was nothing there but dead fish and birds," said Cushing. "My boy found two coconuts. One was rotten."

They shoved off and drifted north along the coast of Luzon. A stiff current carried them toward Calayan, and they used the last of their gasoline — about a gallon and a quarter — to enter the cove where they were found.

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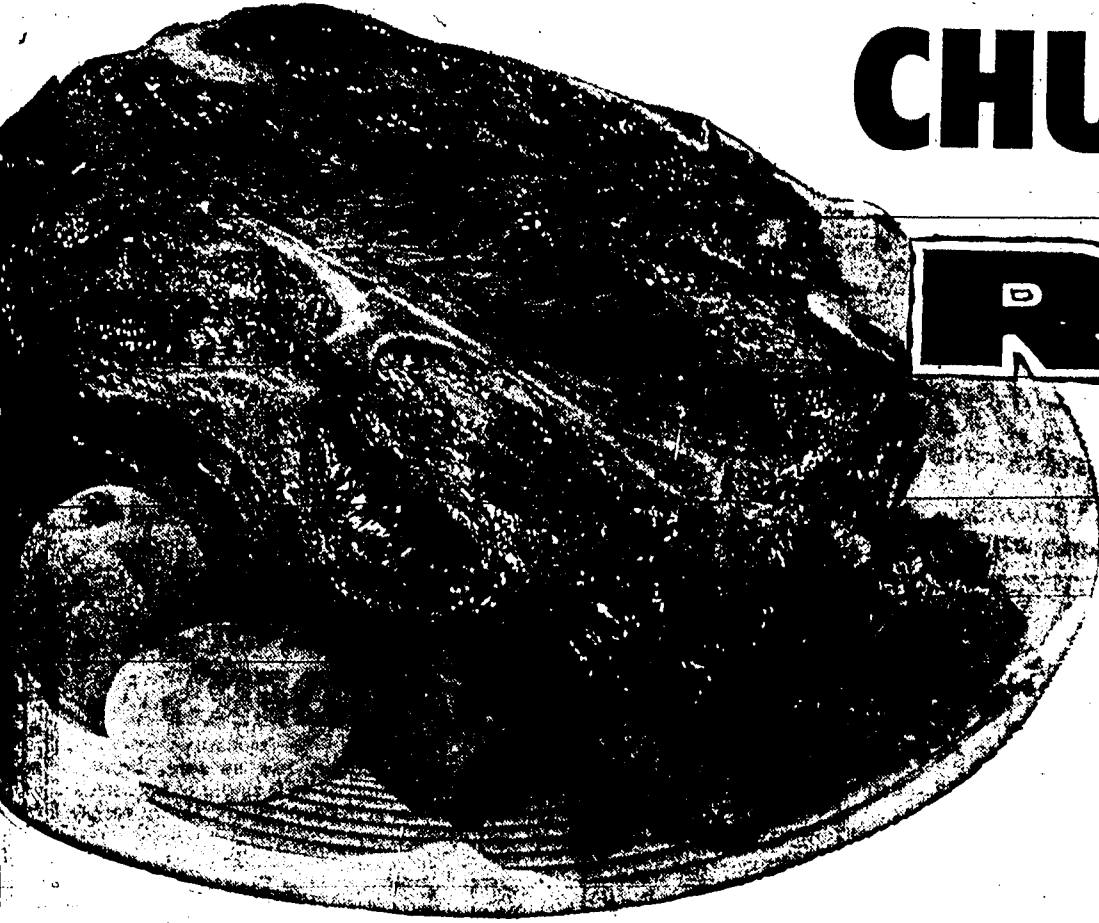


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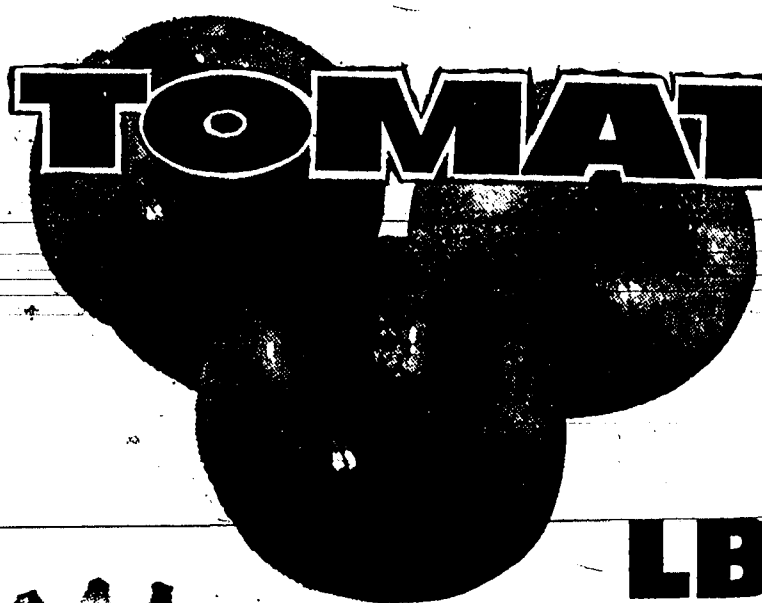

Any of those five men could pick up double wins although McGhee and Trenkle will be battling each other in the discus and shotput. Glenns Ferry looks strong enough to collect from 22 to 26 points while Shoshone could run from 10 to 25.

Either of the later figures could be enough to win the state crown so once again, as it has so often, this spring, the decisive factor might lie in the outcome of the McGhee-Trenkle field event duel. Shoshone will be seeking the 21 big points from Trenkle in his battle with McGhee, then counting on Bruce Everetts to outlast a closely comparable field of four for the mile title. Those things will be completed by 2 p.m. and from then on the median hopes will rest on the mile and mile relay clubs. McGhee should get four medals. He also anchors the two relay teams, the 880-yard and 440-yard foursome should be no worse than second. If Glenns Ferry is daring, it could make the 440-yard relay a winner by inserting Jim Schwager, but the gamble comes in when one considers Schwager will have to bounce right back in the next event—the grueling 440-yard dash. He looks good enough for second there. So it is a coaching decision—to gamble for the 10 points or play safe at eight.

Fowler is defending his half-mile champion and so far has the best time in the state, but others are close. It couldn't be much closer than last year when Fowler came from fifth in the final 40 yards to win. His 15.5 in the high hurdles makes him an easy favorite there. His competition comes from Stewart, Leader, who has a 2:02.5 to his credit at 880 yards.

Another man gunning for a pair of titles is Carey's Pat Briggs, who will be after his second 100-yard dash title, and will fight Fruitland's Heiderman for the 220-yard crown. The Larry Johnson-led fourth district two-mile crew also looks good for a one-two-three sweep. The Gooding State junior, who won the event last year, should win with Von Becker, Wendell, and Carey's Rick Roberts battling for second.

The low hurdles also were previewed in the local regional Larry Darrington. DeLoe won that one easily although Castleford's Gary West led until trying to run through a couple hurdles midway through the course. Parma's Mendoza is the possible spoiler. In the field events, Ward has or is tied for the best distances in both the high jump and broad jump. A consistent 6-foot high jumper, he could well improve there as the BIC high jump takeoff fan is asphalt and better than anything Ward has to use in this area.

In the other events, Shoshone's Bruce Everetts will be one of four men capable of winning the mile run and Mike Matthews, if he can hold his 12-foot plus edge, should battle for the polevault title.

Glenns Ferry and Shoshone's biggest battle appears to be against depth. Lapwal and Kamiah both have five individuals and three relay teams qualified to lead the northern teams while Soda Springs has six individuals and three relays. Since the state pays five places, the race should be tight.

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Mother of Four Breaks up Mobster-Run Gambling Operation

CHICAGO (AP) — For 10 days after her arrest and detention, Claire Stelmazek, 34, remained silent in the face of shocked disapproval from her friends and neighbors and taunting and harassment of her children.

But Wednesday there was generous praise from high officials for the courageous mother.

"A very courageous lady; one in a million," said Lt. Edward Berry, acting head of the Chicago police intelligence unit.

"I know of no undercover witness who's done as well as this young lady did," said Lester McCurrie of the state's attorney's office.

Police revealed that Mrs. Stelmazek, mother of four and

operator of a tavern on the South Side, pretended to cooperate with gangsters to help police.

Three crime syndicate hoodlums tried for two months to install crooked dice tables in a room behind her tavern before Mrs. Stelmazek went to police.

Berry said, "Seeing a chance to learn more

about crime syndicate techniques for invading legitimate business, and milking illegitimate profits from it, police asked Mrs. Stelmazek to play along with the hoodlums.

"She was a little apprehensive at first but she agreed," said Berry. Her husband, Raymond, gave his approval after being

assured his wife would be well protected.

Police planted recording devices in the tavern and taped threats made by the mobsters and details concerning the rigged gambling operation, which the gang began running the night of May 10.

When police moved in, they arrested Mrs. Stelmazek along with

18 other persons. This was done in order to keep her role a secret. She remained in jail for several hours, then was released on bond.

The truth about Mrs. Stelmazek was told after she spent five hours testifying before the grand jury, which is investigating results of her undercover work.

Regulations Of Reservoir Explained

CAREY — Filling of Little Wood Reservoir on Little Wood River is assured and increased outflow is being made to avoid premature filling and to provide space to control peak flows from the remaining snowpack, D. L. Crandall, Bureau of Reclamation, Minidoka Project superintendent, Burley, reports.

He said the reservoir now contains 29,200-acre feet of water and total capacity is 30,000 acre feet. On Monday the outflow was increased from 742 cubic feet to 1,000 cubic feet per second.

The increased outflow is being made to avoid premature filling of the reservoir and to provide space to control peak flows from melting of the remaining snowpack, Crandall said.

The inflow to the reservoir was 840 cubic feet per second. In the remaining weeks of the high altitude snowmelt, releases will be adjusted to assure the maximum amount for irrigation and to avoid, as far as possible, flood flows in excess of full channel capacity in the river downstream.

Diversions for irrigation below the dam soon will reach 400 cubic feet per second. This amount, deducted from the release at the reservoir, leaves a residual flow in the channel downstream from Carey well within channel capacities, Crandall added.

Still Running

WASHINGTON, (UPI) — The world's first atomic lighthouse began its second year of operation Thursday. The beacon, powered by radioactive strontium 90, went to work May 20, 1964, in the U.S. Coast Guard's Baltimore Light in Chesapeake Bay.

It is designed to operate, unattended, for 10 years without refueling. It has replaced batteries which had to be changed every year. The Coast Guard said its performance "has been completely reliable and generally excellent."

The 60-watt nuclear generator has no moving parts to wear out.

Veteran Idaho Newsman Recounts Rich Memories

BOISE (AP) — To a veteran Idaho newsman who is leaving the state, the contacts he had with public officials over the years provide rich memories.

William F. Johnston, for more than 15 years managing editor of the Lewiston Morning Tribune, is leaving that position this summer to become publisher of student publications at the University of Washington.

Recollections of his contacts with Idaho politicians and business leaders are recounted by Samuel H. Day Jr., in an article in the Idaho Observer, of which Day is editor. He formerly was a reporter under Johnston in Lewiston.

Ticking off the many important persons with whom he had contact over the years, Day's story quotes Johnston as saying:

"I have found that most of these people are very public spirited. I have found that these people appreciate and reciprocate a show of genuine curiosity on the part of a reporter, a sincere attempt to get at the facts."

Of Gov. Robert E. Smylie, Johnston said: "I had known him as attorney general, in the days when I was more partisan, and he was partisan, too. But that was a non-partisan office, and we worked well together."

"When he became governor the relationship continued and developed. We were able to be helpful to each other. He was helpful to us not just because these were our projects but because it was good politics to work for me. I have always been impressed by his knowledge of state government, his drive and ambition."

Johnston recalls a visit from the late U.S. Sen. Henry Dworshak, often the target of editorial criticism by the Lewiston Tribune. Dworshak handed Johnston a political statement, then voiced objection to a Tribune editorial.

"I asked him," Johnston said, "if he was all through with the news release and wanted to get into a discussion, because if that was the case I had a few observations of my own I wanted to make."

"He said yes, so we went at it. He began to raise his voice and so did I. Then he started to pound the desk, and I did, too. Pretty soon the newsroom staff and half the printers were gathered outside the door, wondering what would happen next and whether they should come in and break it up."

"Then Dworshak stopped and said, 'Say, you seem to have some pretty strong feelings about this.' And I said, 'I sure do.' Then we calmed down and discussed it some more."

Over the years he learned more from Dworshak than from almost anyone else, Johnston said, adding: "He taught me that despite the most vigorous disagreements there could be mutual understanding and respect."
