

South Vietnamese Outpost Strafed By 4 Jet Planes

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Jet planes strafed a South Vietnamese outpost five miles from the 17th Parallel today and U. S. spokesmen disagreed among themselves as to whether the raiders were Communist MIGs or straying American fighters. Four planes hit the outpost at Gia Linh in a single pass, two shooting and two flying top cover, and then sped out to sea. Five Vietnamese were wounded, a truck was destroyed and a bulldozer was set afire.

Cease-Fire Is Okayed In Bolivia

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Bolivia's military junta and its tin miners agreed Monday night to a cease-fire calling for an end to the miners' eight-day-old strike and withdrawal of troops from the mines.

The truce was signed after a battle between government forces and workers in the industrial suburbs of La Paz which continued into Monday night. At least 19 persons were killed and more than 70 wounded.

Heavy casualties were reported in mining centers south of the capital where miners tried to repel troops under government orders to occupy the state-owned mines.

The cease-fire agreement was signed by Gen. Alfredo Ovando Candia, the armed forces commander, and leaders of the Bolivian Drivers Union who have been mediating the dispute between the junta and the leftist miners union.

Rescuers Dig For Trapped Coal Miners

ROBBINS, Tenn. (AP) — Rescue operations were resumed in a gas-polluted mine today for four men trapped by a violent explosion. The body of a fifth miner was found earlier.

The recovery work was halted several hours as officials sought to clear the air inside the mountainside mine. Two large fans were to suck methane gas and coal dust from the pit.

The rescue operations were stopped temporarily after four men had been overcome by gas. Three were sent to a hospital.

Federal and state mine inspectors said there was little doubt the trapped men were dead.

The blast, which ripped through the shaft Monday, was so strong it leveled grass and weeds for several feet outside the mouth of the east Tennessee mine.

Pockets of gas, which apparently caused the explosion, remained in the Cumberland plateau pit and posed the threat of another blast.

Takeover of Power Firms Is Hinted

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) — Nationalizing private power systems in the United States was described Monday as a possibility unless they are closely regulated.

"The survival of the investor-owned segment of the power industry," said Clyde T. Ellis of Washington, D.C., general manager of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, "depends on regulations vigorous enough to bring an end to abuse and exploitation by the companies."

"Where competition is imperfect or virtually non-existent, as in the electric utility industry, vigorous regulation and an effective rate and service yardstick provided by the publicly and consumer-owned segment of the electric industry are basic needs if we are to avoid the end result at which most other countries have arrived—the nationalization of the power business."

Ellis spoke at the Western Conference of Public Service Commissioners.

Senate OK's Plan Limiting Debate on Voting Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate clamped a tight time limit today on further debate on the voting rights bill urged by President Johnson. The action was regarded as assuring the measure's early passage. The vote to put the Senate's cloture or debating-closing time into effect was 70 for and 30 against. This was three more than the required two-thirds majority. Voting to limit debate were 47 Democrats and 23 Republicans. Voting against it were 21 Democrats and 9 Republicans.

He will continue the series Wednesday and Thursday. Highlight of a report by Rev. Charles Easley, Eastern District superintendent, Tuesday morning was announcement of the retirement of Rev. Floyd E. White, Paul, after 32 years in the conference. Rev. Joseph Coulter, who has served as conference treasurer since 1952, has resigned the post. He retired from the ministry in 1960 but had retained the conference post.

Thomas Mahan, Jerome, was elected new conference treasurer. Tuesday afternoon Gerald L. Painter, Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, Calif., spoke and a report on the Woman's Society of Christian Service was given by Mrs. Earle Jester, Boise, conference president.

Dr. Bucke spoke Monday night on "Unsound Assumptions."

Dr. Bucke, book editor for the Methodist Church, told the group that there are three basic relations in society outside the orbit of the churchman's concern. The first is production. "Human needs can be met by modern production in industry," he said. "Second is weaponry which keeps us from a hot war, not because of religion, but because of the fear to fight."

"The last is human rights which we are letting go by us from local levels on up."

Rupert Keeps 2 Incumbents As Trustees

RUPERT—Two Rupert incumbents retained their positions as school board trustees during Monday's election which showed one of the largest voter turnouts in the district's history and, according to Rupert school officials, the largest number of candidates ever to run from one district.

Harold Peterson, incumbent from zone three, the Rupert rural area, which had four candidates running for the trustee post, received 153 votes. David Spreier, Pioneer district, received 135 votes; Mrs. Ann Jones, 23 votes, and Clarence Bellem, 49 votes.

In zone two, the Paul area, incumbent Leonard Martin, who is presently filling the unexpired term vacated by Russell Adams, defeated his opponent, Tom Felton, 156 votes to 27 votes.

Voting was held at the Lincoln school in Rupert and the Paul Elementary School.

U.S. Orbits "Space Bird" Satellite

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Saturn 1 super-rocket thundered to its ninth straight successful test flight today and drilled into orbit a mammoth "space bird" satellite to climax a spectacular early morning launching.

The satellite, Pegasus 2, unfolded two giant wings to a span of 96 feet—greater than most four-engine airliners — and began swooping through space like a great bird.

It was to measure tiny meteoroids and the hazard they pose to astronauts making lengthy space trips.

Each time the thin, metallic skin of Pegasus 2 is penetrated by one of the streaking cosmic bullets, the satellite is to emit an electronic squawk to be recorded in a memory device and radioed to earth on command.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has reversed itself and decided against issuing 45 million silver dollars.

The decision announced Monday night came just as the first silver dollars in more than 30 years were set to roll from the Denver Mint.

The Treasury is reluctant to mint silver dollars because both silver and minting facilities are needed to meet a continuing shortage of other coins and because government supplies of silver are running short.

President Johnson announced May 15 that substantial progress had been made in reducing the coin shortage and that he therefore was ordering minting of the cartwheels authorized last year by Congress.

Civilian Agencies Savings Reported

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson says civilian agencies saved \$217 million the first three months of 1965 by reducing costs and improving operations.

He said this brings savings by the agencies to \$500 million in the first nine months of fiscal 1965, which ends June 30. This is in addition to Defense Department savings estimated at \$2.5 billion.

"The record is clear," he said, "that customers have been and are being adequately served and further that ample provision is made for load growth and expansion. This responsibility to provide for future demand requires long-range planning and the investment of capital well in advance of actual need. Moreover, these utilities pay local, state and federal taxes in substantial amounts so much that state and local governments are very dependent on this tax source."

Jordan Urges Unit to Deny BPA Request

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, urged a Senate Appropriations Subcommittee Tuesday to deny funds for a federal power line in Idaho.

He testified at a hearing on a \$1 million request by the Bonneville Power Administration to plan a line in southern Idaho.

BPA seeks authority to construct a line extending to southern Idaho either from federal projects in Oregon or northern Idaho. It would cost between \$73.5 million and \$80 million.

Jordan termed such an expenditure unwarranted and unnecessary.

"The federal line, he said, 'would duplicate and compete with existing transmission lines provided by investor owned utilities which are required as a condition of their license from the Federal Power Commission to serve present and future customers.'"

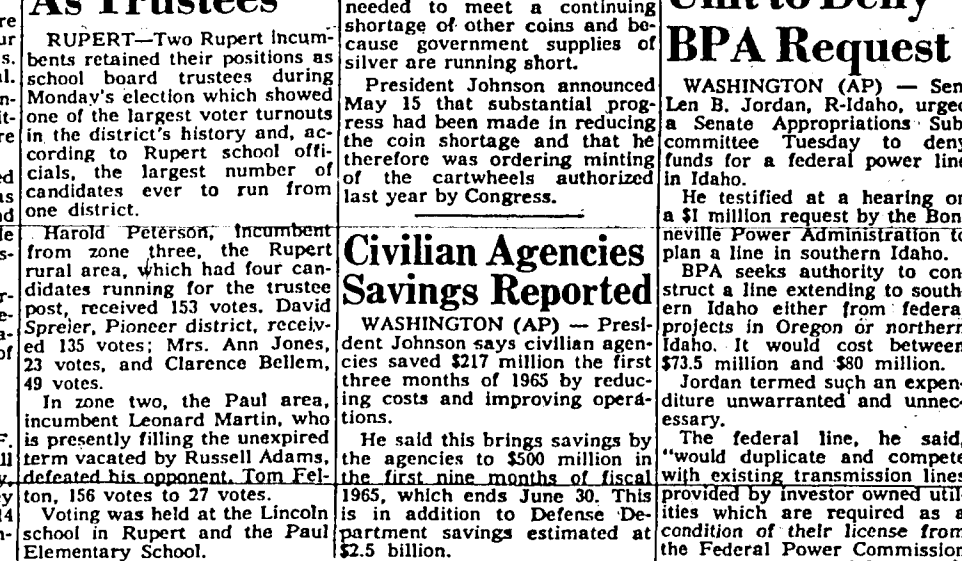
Jordan asked the committee to direct BPA to "bargain fairly and openly" for a wheeling agreement with the Idaho Power Co. and Utah Power & Light Co.

Congressional committees last year denied an earlier fund request by BPA and ordered negotiations aimed at making agreements for delivery by the utilities of federal power to southern Idaho customers.

Jordan said BPA negotiators had insisted on an "unreasonable set of terms."

California Solon Eyes Metric Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housewives, start thinking of butter at so much a kilogram and dress goods at so much a meter.

Husbands, try to picture vital dimensions of 91-66-91. This advice comes from Chairman George P. Miller of the House Committee on Science and Astronautics.

The California Democrat is one American who reacted with absolute delight to Britain's announcement that gradually it will institute the metric system of weights and measures.

"This passes our bill," Miller exulted to a reporter.

Like some others in Congress, Miller has been calling for years for a study by the National Bureau of Standards of the problems that would be involved in putting the United States on the metric system. They say use the metric system would make it easier to relate U.S. technology to that of other nations.

So far the bill has moved hardly a millimeter in the face of opposition by members who don't think the results of such a study would be worth its cost, estimated by Miller at \$200,000 to \$300,000.

"When Britain goes through with this, we will be absolutely alone with our complicated, outdated system of measurements," Miller said. "Our competitive position will be horrible. Have you noticed that our food packages already carry a label giving the contents in grams?"

Miller, a spry 74, said he would waste no time pushing for the study that could lead to the substitution of meters, kilograms and liters for feet, pounds and quarts.

"We'll have hearings next month," he said. "This has got to come, and the sooner we get started, the sooner the confusion will be over."

The British government announcement suggested a 10-year change-over period. Miller is willing to allow even more time here. "Some estimates say a generation would be required for the full change to be absorbed."

"Behind every small business that succeeds there is always some dedicated, untiring individual," Johnson said in presenting the award—a bronze plaque—to Dominic Donatello, 46, of Anchorage. He is the son of an Italian immigrant.

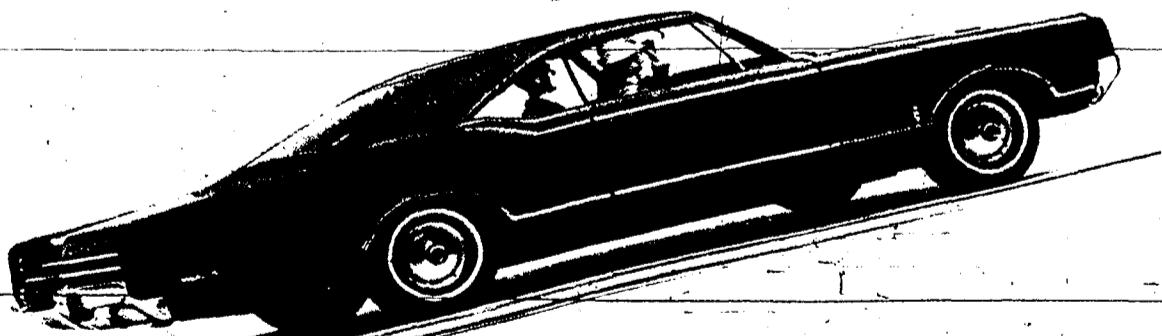
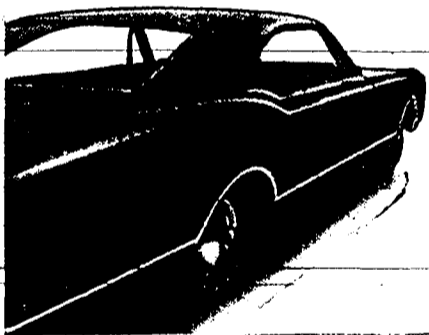

Hearing on Wild Rivers Bill Reported

WENDELL—John Sanborn, Eagerman, discussed the high points of the senatorial hearing on the Wild Rivers Bill, which was held in Boise May 18, when the Gooding County Farm Bureau met Friday evening at the Wendell Civic Club rooms.

Sanborn said that in evaluating this kind of legislation one should keep in mind that approximately two-thirds of the area of the state is federally owned and when the state-owned land is added, only approximately 25 per cent of the state is left to support Idaho's state government.

He added that if Idaho is to grow and prosper along with the rest of the country, more of this federal land must pass to private ownership for development and use rather than enlarging or freezing federal ownership.

This is especially true of the vast areas of desert land which could be reclaimed, thus adding greatly to the state's wealth and also its hold on water by putting it to beneficial use, he said.

Train Hits Stalled Car, 5 Are Killed

LINCOLN, Ala. (AP) — A train slammed into a stalled car at a crossing, killing five persons — three of them children who were trapped inside the vehicle.

Coroner Clinton Perkins called the Monday night wreck one of the worst he had seen.

Killed were Clendon Groce, 33; Sarah Groce, 28; Rhetta Groce, 18 months; Harriet Groce, 3; and Dolly Mae Cunningham, 2, all of Lincoln.

The coroner said Mr. and Mrs. Groce apparently were trying to take the children out of the car as the 16-car Southern Railway train struck the car.

Four other children, who had gotten out to try to help push the car off the tracks, witnessed the grinding crash.

Presbyterians Widen Attack On Problems

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — United Presbyterians widened their attack on sociological problems today after pushing aside criticism against the church for past actions in such matters.

A plea to enlarge the 3 1/2-million-member denomination's ministry outside the church came as the 177th General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. moved into its sixth day of weeklong sessions.

A committee of 100 placed a proposal before the church's governing body calling for "bold and creative new forms of ministry."

The Rev. John W. Melster, of Fort Wayne, Ind., told newsmen the proposal was a challenge to each of the denomination's 9,100 churches "to renew and extend the church's ministry." He said each presbytery and church can chart its own course.

Tied to the emphasis on problems outside the church is the assembly's coming test of a new confession of faith which, some observers said, would indicate doctrinal backing of sociological projects already practiced by the church.

A vote on the historic confession was scheduled tonight.

In overwhelming votes Monday, the assembly's 835 delegates shouted down a proposal to quit the National Council of Churches and brushed aside petitions on sexual morality.

The Birmingham, Ala., Presbytery had asked the church to withdraw from the council and disassociate itself from demonstrations and "freedom marches" in support of the civil rights movement.

The assembly pushed away the resolutions on sexual morality by approving, instead, a brief motion saying the church "does indeed reaffirm its adherence to our historic moral standards."

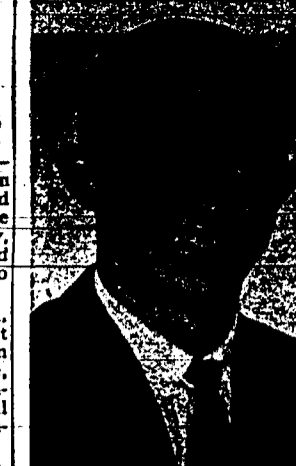

Gail Winters, Gooding, missionary to the former Belgian Congo, spoke at the May meeting of the General Association of United Presbyterian Church Women.

Miss Winters related the events of the 1964 Congolese rebel uprising against the National government which led to the death of Dr. Tucker of her mission and the massacre of thousands in her city.

After Dr. Tucker was killed last Nov. 24, the next day planes were heard, she related, and Belgian paratroopers rescued Mrs. Tucker, her children and Miss Winters. They were flown to Stanleyville and cared for at the American embassy.

On Dec. 3, 1964, 25 years and one day after her first arrival in the Congo, Miss Winters returned to New York and her home in Gooding. Her return to the Congo, or another post awaits favorable conditions.

Test Papers Kept in Safes At Academy

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Air Force Academy instructors now keep examinations in locked safes until they are ready to test cadets, officials said today.

This appears to be the chief way in which security at the academy has been tightened in the wake of a cheating scandal which led to the resignation of 109 cadets earlier this year.

The cadet wing of about 2,500 has not been subjected to any special surveillance, it was indicated.

Officers on the faculty said in interviews that while there can be no ironclad assurance that some cheating will not recur, they believe the cadets themselves will try to make certain scandal never again is brought to the 11-year-old service academy.

An investigation of nearly two years of cheating showed that ringleaders found ways to penetrate offices in the academic building and steal advance copies of examinations. These exams then were sold to other cadets for up to \$25.

Officials said instructors formerly kept advance copies of examinations in their desks but that exams now are stored in safes.

Any substantive changes in administration of the academy apparently await specific instructions from Washington and a new command due to be installed July 1.

Mrs. Jenkins, Bate and Black disappeared in the river while searching for Miss Lindskog.

They were attempting to cross the river in a little used cable car when the cable broke, plunging them into the swift flowing water.

Three other persons in the cable car were able to swim to shore.

Clay in Different Frame of Mind on Eve of Bout; Considers Possible Loss

LEWISTON, Maine (UPI)—Cassius Clay, heretofore considered the most positive thinker in sports, was in an entirely different frame of mind Monday night on the eve of his first defense of the world heavyweight title. The garrulous Cassius actually was considering the possibility that he might lose his rematch against Sonny Liston Tuesday night at Central Maine Youth Center, a local high school hockey rink.

Liston Is Hit With Court Order

LEWISTON, Maine (UPI)—Challenger Sonny Liston was walloped with a court order Monday that will hold up his 50 per cent share of the "live gate" receipts in the title fight Tuesday night with champion Cassius Clay.

Maine Supreme Court Justice Walter M. Tapley issued a restraining order to hold Liston's share of an expected \$150,000 share of a paying customers purse from the fight in the Central Maine Youth Center until he appears on a request for a temporary injunction Friday.

The request for the injunction by Associated Booking Corp. of New York City was filed in the County Superior Court where the bout will be staged.

The booking agency, in its action against Liston, Intercontinental Promotions of Chester, Pa., and Samuel Michael, promoter of the fight and a head of the arena, claimed it had been owed \$69,850 because Liston had failed to make fight appearances in four British cities in 1963.

Nancy Richey Wins Net Match

PARIS (UPI)—Little Nancy Richey of Dallas, Tex., displayed power tennis Monday in reaching the singles quarterfinals of the French International Championships along with six other seeded women.

Miss Richey, sole American survivor in singles competition, ousted Elizabeth Starkie of England, 6-2, 6-3 with a big serve and fierce volleys.

During a poolside interview at an inn in nearby Auburn, Clay was asked if any thoughts had crossed his mind about losing the scheduled 15-rounder for boxing's richest prize.

"I know I can get beat—that's why I have trained so hard for this fight," the 23-year-old undefeated champion said.

This surprised his interviewers, who have grown used to Cassius proclaiming himself "The Greatest" since he won the crown from Liston on a seventh round TKO at Miami Beach, Fla., 15 months ago.

Only Sunday, after checking in from his Chicopee, Mass., training camp, Clay expressed dismay that Liston remained the 13-10 favorite for the return bout.

"The people are being fooled," he shouted. "I should be favored by at least 7 to 1."

Throughout this final pre-fight interview, a surprising negative attitude kept creeping into Clay's rambling conversation.

"Whatever happens, I have plans about what I'm going to do . . . something I like better than boxing," the muscular six-foot-three champion said.

"To me, boxing is a stranger's game. An easy way to make money, sure. But I have another mission in life."

Clay would not expand on that last statement, but the possibility exists he might retire if he loses.

Close associates insisted they had never seen Clay so subdued. Asked if he still was planning a surprise for the weigh-

in Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. as he had hinted several times in the past, Clay said: "Yup, I'll have a big surprise . . . Complete silence."

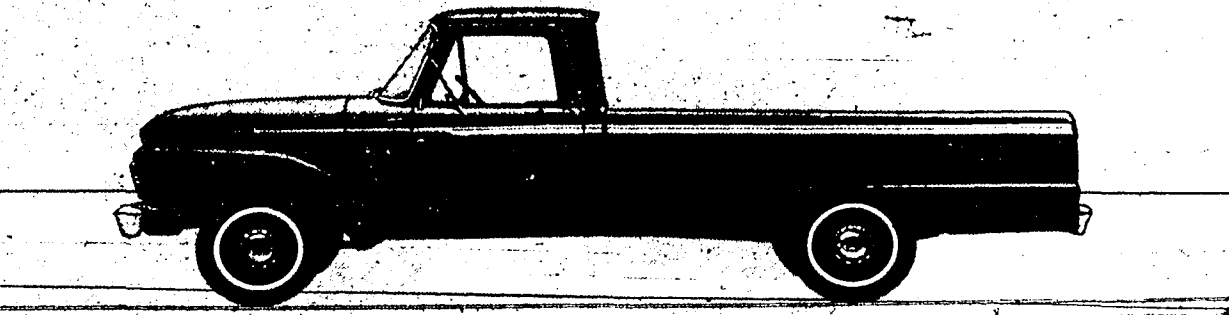
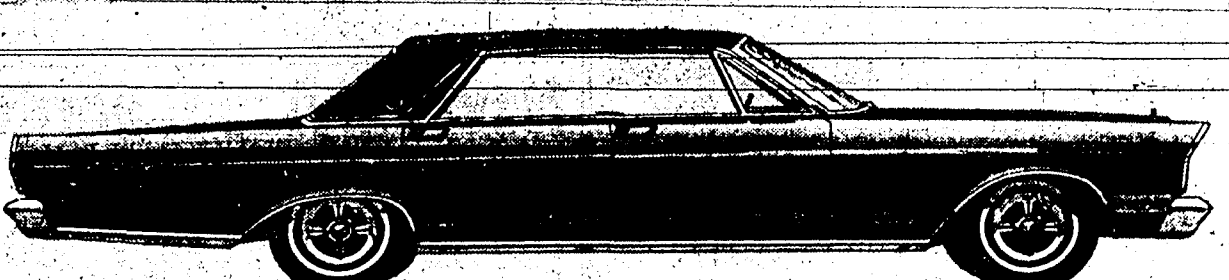

Minnow Bait Rules Given For Anglers

BOISE — Recent clarification of regulations for the taking of minnows for anglers who like to use them as bait, specify that they must be dead and give specifications for minnow nets, seines or traps, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reported Tuesday.

The only exception to the "dead minnow" regulation is in the Kootenai River of Boundary County where live minnows are permitted as bait for ling and sturgeon fishing.

The regulations require that seines and nets used to catch minnows shall not exceed 2x4 feet and the traps shall not exceed 18 inches in length or 12 inches in diameter or width.

It is unlawful to transport live minnows or fish taken under the provisions of this regulation, according to Hawley Hill, chief of conservation enforcement. Only non-game fish may be taken with nets or traps. Minnow buckets, wet towels or any other means of keeping non-game fish alive are illegal.

He added that the important thing for minnow fishermen to remember is that the 1965 fishing regulations as they pertain to the use, possession and transportation of minnows, remain unchanged and are still in full force and effect.

Boisean Held In Nevada's Heroin Case

BOISE (AP)—A man Reno police said led them on an auto chase filled with submachine gun fire last week was being held today in Ada County Jail.

He is David Fenton, 36, arrested Saturday night after sheriff's officers and Reno detectives surrounded his Boise home and closed in with guns drawn.

Fenton was charged in Reno with illegal sale of narcotics in one of the largest narcotics rings to operate there. He denied the charge.

Ada County Sheriff Paul Bright said the ring may have been supplying narcotics to Idaho.

Reno police said Fenton is the man they saw flee in a car with Mrs. Jerry Quillian when her husband was arrested allegedly while selling heroin valued at \$250,000 to undercover agents.

Police pursued with submachine guns and pistols blazing and arrested Mrs. Quillian when the car skidded to a halt at a dead end near the Truckee River.

The man dived into the river and managed to escape. Officers and dogs searched the banks.

Sheriff Bright said he suspected Fenton was the man they were looking for and invited Reno police to participate in the arrest and make the identification.

Fenton, arrested on a fugitive warrant, was being held on \$15,000 bail for an extradition hearing June 28. His attorney, Vernon K. Smith, said he will fight extradition to Nevada.

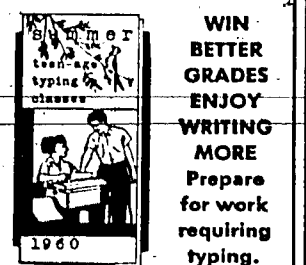

Congo's Economy Is Showing Signs of Recovery

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—In spite of the savage internal strife and periods of anarchy that have bedeviled the Congo in the nearly five years of its independence, its economy is showing surprising signs of recovery.

Largely this is due to massive foreign support by the United States, Belgium, West Germany and the European Common Market in general. But not entirely, tight financial control and strict austerity enforced by Premier Moise Tshombe and his predecessor, Cyrille Adoula, also have been effective.

Warning signals still fly—and the economic improvement has yet to do much for the Congolese man in the street, or the

housewife is likely to judge the state of affairs by how much manioc there is in the larder—and what it costs.

Manioc is the native staple. It is crushed corn, a sort of coarse corn flour. It is to the Congolese what bread and potatoes are to the white man.

A year ago, a working man's family had to spend about half a month's salary for its manioc. Today it takes about a quarter of a worker's income. So to that extent the man in the street is better off than he was last year.

But the white man's food is still out of reach to most Congolese. An American frozen chicken, imported as part of the United States aid program, costs at the least about five per cent of a Congolese working

man's monthly pay. Translated into other terms, an American worker earning \$400 a month would pay \$20 for such a chicken.

How they are paid for—the going rates starting at somewhere around 500,000 francs—is one of the mysteries of the Congo.

Yet with all its anomalies, contradictions and existing dangers, the Congolese economy has been strengthening.
