

2 U.S. Planes Downed by Communist Antiaircraft Fire in North Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Communist antiaircraft fire shot down two U. S. Navy planes during raids on North Viet Nam today. A rescue pilot said there was no chance the five American crewmen could have survived. Two more Americans—an officer and an enlisted man—were reported killed in a Viet Cong triple ambush near Pleiku, 220 miles northeast of Saigon. Two American enlisted men were reported wounded, one seriously, and more than 80 South Vietnamese troops were killed or missing.

The total of U. S. dead in combat in Viet Nam rose to 401.

The two planes were both from the 7th Fleet carrier Midway. They were lost in an attack on a radar installation on the coast about 70 miles south of Hanoi.

An A-1 Skyhawk with one pilot aboard plunged into the sea about a mile off the coast. No parachute was observed.

A few minutes later a second plane—a modified A-1 Skyraider with four crewmen aboard—was hit and crashed about half a mile inland, a military spokesman said. It had been diverted to the area to search for the plane downed at sea.

There was no report of results of the raid on the radar installation.

It was the heaviest loss of American air crews since the raids on North Viet Nam began in February.

In other strikes against North Viet Nam today: Five Skyriders from the Midway reported knocking down a span of a bridge about 65 miles south of Vinh.

Four Skyhawks from the Midway reported destroying two boxcars, battering the approach to a concrete bridge and damaging a wooden bridge 55 miles south of Thanh Hoa.

Four Thunderchiefs destroyed a ferry landing and a barge and damaged three railroad cars at Vinh Kan.

House Okays Tax Cut Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed today a \$4.8-billion excise tax cut bill, including a quick slash averaging \$75 in the tax on an automobile.

The roll-call vote was 401 to 8. The bill now goes to the Senate, which is set to give it quick handling.

If the Senate passes the legislation, a number of excise taxes would be repealed outright July 1, including those on jewelry, luggage, and toilet preparations. The automobile tax would be cut three percentage points.

Free World Meet On Viet Nam Urged

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republicans called today for a free world conference on Viet Nam and announced they are sending a team of congressmen to find out what is wrong with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

At the same time, House Republicans declared they have moved to implement 45 of the pledges made by the GOP platform. The broadside of GOP policy statements, plans and proposals came from the Republican Coordinating Committee and from the House Republican Conference.

GOP policymakers avoided advocating the use of nuclear weapons in urging President Johnson to employ "whatever measures are necessary" to win the war in Viet Nam.

The GOP Policy Coordinating Committee said in a statement made available at a news conference that Johnson should call a conference of "such nations as will join us in battling communism in Viet Nam."

Questioned about the call for all-out use of power to curb the Viet Cong, Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said the matter of nuclear weapon use was not discussed by the policy group.

"We tried to avoid meticulous specifics, if I may put it that way," he said.

The same kind of avoidance of specifics appeared in a policy committee's report on job opportunities, which did not mention Johnson's recommendation for repeal of a Taft-Hartley Act provision under which states can ban compulsory union membership.

Walker Raps Appointments By Governor

State Chairman Lloyd Walker, Twin Falls, said Tuesday his Democratic party will bring action against Gov. Robert E. Smylie if Smylie fails to consult the party on appointments to three new and critical state boards.

Walker said he has appointed attorney Tony Park, Boise, to head up a legal investigation on the party's chance to tie up Smylie's appointments if they are not suitable to the Democratic party.

Walker said he doubted if the law would allow restraining action against Smylie prior to the appointments, but was sure the appointments could be contested in court.

"We're very serious about this," Walker said.

The laws creating the new parks, water and merit boards say membership must come from both political parties.

Walker has charged Smylie with ignoring the Democratic party in considering Democratic appointees to the commissions.

Since the appointments must be made by July 1, Walker said it was now too late to restrain the governor in a court in order that the Democratic party be consulted.

"We will probably have to let him make the appointments, then contest the makeup of the commissions in court," he said.

3 Trustees Are Elected At Richfield

RICHFIELD—Three trustees were elected for three-year terms Tuesday in Richfield School District No. 316.

This is the second school vote held this spring, as the May 17 election was declared illegal because of discrepancies in counting and the fact that polls were closed one hour early by mistake.

Burl Akins was elected trustee in zone one with 15 votes. In zone two incumbent Clifford Conner received 61 votes to retain the post. Bishop Jay Ward received 24 votes.

In zone three incumbent Grant Flavel received 16 votes.

Dinner Is Given For Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson gave a White House dinner Tuesday night for one of his predecessors—former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower was in the capital for a meeting of the Republican Coordinating Committee. A White House source said the dinner was an impromptu affair arranged shortly before it was held. There were no details.

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Stockpiling

PARIS (AP)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara says the U.S. nuclear stockpile in Europe will be twice its 1961 size by this time next year.

"We are now shipping such substantial amounts of nuclear warheads that within 12 months the stockpile will be 100 per cent greater than in 1961," McNamara told newsmen after the meeting of defense ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization ended Tuesday.

236 Feared Dead in Coal Mine Blast

TOKYO (AP) — A total of 236 men are feared dead in Japan's second-worst postwar coal-mine disaster.

Rescue workers recovered 219 bodies from the Yamano mine, on Kyushu Island, where a gas explosion occurred nearly 2,000 feet underground Tuesday.

Police said hope was virtually abandoned for 17 other miners believed buried under piles of coal and rock. Of the 552 miners and other employees working in the pits when the explosion occurred, 316 escaped. Thirty-nine were hospitalized, most of them with carbon monoxide poisoning.

Watts and Bud Miser worked Monday clearing debris from the spillway of the Hiawatha Canal, five miles north of Hailey, to take pressure off headgates.

Tuesday ditcher Martin Young and a crew of men worked to remove a large cottonwood tree and sandbagged to keep water from taking out the spillway on the Hiawatha, which is a diversion canal from the river.

Bill Wallace, who operates a ranch on the west side of the river, took out three truckloads of cattle Tuesday and took another seven loads out Wednesday. Timberland on his ranch is under water and the situation threatens to worsen. Wallace is moving the cattle to another piece of property he owns.

Big Wood River Crest Is Expected

HAILEY — Big Wood River measured 4.68 feet Wednesday, down a little from the five-foot mark reported Monday, but Woodrow Watts, watermaster, said the peak of high water is not expected for 10 days to two weeks.

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Astronauts Given Green Signal for Epic Space Flight

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—America's first space-walker and the man who will pilot him into the heavens were given a bright green light today for their epic flight Thursday in the Gemini 4. Conditions are "as good as we can hope for them to be at this stage of the countdown," said mission director Christopher C. Kraft Jr. "The weather, craft, launch vehicle, communications network and everything looks in green condition." Blastoff is scheduled at 9 a.m. EST.

Kraft echoed an earlier, optimistic statement by command pilot James A. McDivitt.

"We've got a good spacecraft and it looks like we're going to have a good mission," McDivitt said. "We're ready."

"We" are McDivitt and fellow Air Force Maj. Edward H. White II — the man who will step out of the Gemini 4 spacecraft and waltz in weightlessness on their second orbit of the earth.

There was the chance, too, that these two rookie American astronauts would get close enough to their booster rocket on their maneuvering early orbits to enable White to touch the booster during his weightless walk.

The space agency had said earlier that they might get as close as 20 feet to the booster. But mission director Christopher C. Kraft said that "there is nothing holy about 20 feet."

Would the mission last four days as intended? Kraft said that the decision would be made sometime after the first 24 hours of flight — when the astronauts had a chance to evaluate their fuel supply for their maneuvering jets, and experts looked at the decay of the orbit.

It was a demonstration of the flexibility of the flight plan.

There was no hurry about the decision, Kraft indicated, partly because space-flight officials wanted the astronauts to recover from the space-walk maneuver.

The prospect for their nearly 98-hour, 62-orbit flight were put in glowing terms Tuesday by a mission review panel of experts.

"We couldn't look better," said Kraft.

These men are "in as high a state of readiness as any crew I have ever seen," said Dr. Charles A. Berry, chief flight physician who has watched over the health of Mercury and Gemini astronauts.

"In general, the launch-day weather presents the best situation I've ever seen," said Ernie Amman of the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Idaho Official Is Reported in Fair Condition

BOISE (AP) — Secretary of State Arnold Williams, 68, remained in fair condition today in a Boise hospital, where he is being treated for a heart ailment.

He was stricken while at work at his desk in the statehouse Tuesday and was taken to the hospital in an ambulance.

Hospital attendants said he "rested fairly well" during the night. They said the heart ailment is one that has bothered him in the past.

President Johnson Explains Aim of U. S. Policy in Dominican Republic

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson says the aim of U.S. policy in the Dominican Republic is the establishment of a broadly based government — one that represents the people and does not include extremists.

To accomplish this end, the President told a news conference Tuesday, the United States is looking to the Organization of American States while keeping in touch with Dominican leaders.

"We have no desire to insist on our particular brand of military solution or political solution," Johnson said. "We think it is an inter-American matter, and we want to cooperate fully with them (the OAS)."

The Dominican revolt and U.S. policy toward it dominated Johnson's first nationally broadcast question-and-answer session with newsmen since April 27.

The President defended his policy, including his decision to intervene with more than 21,000 Army paratroopers, Marines and Marines. He said he is bringing another 2,000 leathernecks home and cautioned that a Communist threat remains.

He touched on other matters also, saying: — He is asking Congress to authorize use of \$39 million for a Southeast Asia economic and social development program. — The recent flare-up of fighting in Viet Nam was anticipated, Washington is concerned and he will know more about it when Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor returns from Saigon in the next few days. — He plans to address the U.N. General Assembly when it meets in San Francisco June 24-26 to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the organization's founding in the city.

T. C. Bacon, Noted Stockman, Dies Here

T. Clyde Bacon, 80, longtime area stockman, died at his home Tuesday of an apparent heart attack. Mr. Bacon had served as president of the Idaho Wool Growers' Association and vice president of the National Wool Growers. He was born Nov. 10, 1884, in Boise and attended schools there, graduating from Boise High School. He was graduated from Baker University in Kansas in 1908. He moved to Twin Falls following his marriage June 1, 1909, at Rosville, Kan., to Alice Reid, and had resided here since. He was one of the founders of the Reliance Credit Corp. and served as president from 1959 retiring at the May 19, 1965 meeting. He served as head of the Production Credit Association from its inception until 1964.

Mr. Bacon was chairman of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce at one time and was chairman of the Twin Falls Hospital Board at the time Magic Valley Memorial Hospital was constructed.

He was in the sheep and cattle business during the time he resided in Twin Falls and was named to the Livestock Hall of Fame. He was also active in Republican party affairs.

Surviving are his widow; two sons, Clyde R. Bacon and J. Robert Bacon, both Jerome; two daughters, Mrs. Katherine Howsman, Phoenix, Ariz., and Mrs. Cecil Jones, Palm Springs, Calif.; one sister, Ruby Bacon, Boise, and 14 grandchildren.

Soviet Envoy Ordered to Leave U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department declared a Soviet diplomat, person non grata — an unwelcome person — "for activities incompatible with his diplomatic status," it was announced today.

The Soviet diplomat is Stefan M. Kirsanov, a first secretary at the embassy in Washington.

David Henry, director of the State Department's Office of Soviet Affairs, summoned the Soviet embassy counselor, Alexander I. Zinzuk, to the department Tuesday and told him Kirsanov must leave the country as soon as practicable, Robert J. McCloskey, press officer, told a news conference.

McCloskey declined to go into details when asked the specific charges against Kirsanov. He said no deadline was set for the diplomat's departure.

McCloskey had a "no comment" when asked whether Kirsanov's expulsion was in connection with the expulsion from Moscow on May 11 of Norris D. Garnett, cultural attache of the U.S. Embassy in the Soviet capital.

Invasion of U. S. Mission Is Protested

HEIDELBERG, Germany (AP)—The U.S. Army today sharply protested the invasion of the U.S. military mission in East Germany by 300 Communist demonstrators, who tore down the American flag and damaged the mission building Tuesday.

Gen. Andrew P. O'Meara, commander in chief of the U.S. Army in Europe, sent the written protest to his Soviet counterpart, Gen. Petr K. Koshevoy. He demanded that the Russians "take immediate action to prevent any further incidents of this nature."

An earlier U.S. Army statement said that East German police were present "but took no effective action."

The U.S. Army statement said a "flag pole was broken, two U.S. flags desecrated and U.S. vehicles overturned or damaged. All windows on the first floor were broken, the kitchen was damaged and paint splattered on the building."

The official East German news agency ADN said the crowd marched on the mission building after attending a rally in downtown Potsdam where North Vietnamese diplomats spoke.

With more sunshine in most sections, temperatures will be a few degrees warmer this afternoon and generally fair weather is indicated for tonight and Thursday, with an important change in temperatures. A weak Pacific front approaching the Canadian coast is not expected to have much effect this far south so that the outlook for Friday calls for no significant change in weather for southern Idaho.

Most of this district was warmer and drier yesterday. Highs were in the 70s in Magic Valley.

Lows last night ranged through the 40s in all sections except for 39 at Aberdeen and 34 at Fairfield.

Soil temperatures are rising according to all available reports, with gains of five degrees in 24 hours in Magic Valley.

Judge Jails Chicago Area Crime Boss

CHICAGO (UPI) — A federal judge jailed reputed Chicago crime boss Momo Salvatore (Moe) Giancana for contempt of court Tuesday and Giancana's former traveling companion, songstress Phyllis McGuire, took a surprise curtain call before a grand jury.

Chief Judge William J. Campbell of U. S. District Court ordered Giancana jailed indefinitely when he balked at answering questions before the grand jury after the judge granted him immunity from prosecution.

Almost within an hour, Miss McGuire—one of the singing McGuire sisters of television, night club and recording fame—was shipped before the same grand jury.

Federal authorities refused to say why she was returned for her second appearance before the grand jury. She remained about one hour before the jury, which has been delving into Giancana's alleged connections with interstate racketeering, the narcotics trade and other crime syndicate operations.

The "baby sister" of the McGuire trio, who accompanied Giancana on numerous jaunts to resorts in Europe, the Caribbean and the United States, appeared before the grand jury May 19.

Giancana promised Campbell during a forenoon court appearance that he would answer the grand jury's questions. But U.S. Atty. Edward V. Hanrahan said that when Giancana was taken before the investigative body he wouldn't give the group his telephone number.

WASHINGTON—The more pedestrian among you red-blooded Americans can keep right on worrying about Santo Domingo and the high cost of new's eyebrows under glass—I'm too full right now of a blessing called June.

With me, James Russell Lowell's challenge goes unanswered; there is no day so rare as the June variety. There are those who are partial to April's series of sweet shocks and October's aroma of vintage wine, and they may go in peace. But it is time to, daily with June, this leafy month as spring melts into summer when as Lowell sang, heaven has its ear to the ground, "trying the earth if it be in tune."

OF WEDDING AND GRADUATIONS—Naturally, June contains the longest day in the year, for what other month has so much to offer? In a world too much preoccupied with juvenile delinquency and college sit-ins, it is the month of the sweet girl graduate. It is the month when the fresh-faced bride crowds the divorce news out of the newspapers. June, bless its perfumed presence, is also the month that brings summer vacation for those uncombed and book-bedeviled males, driven almost to anarchy by the long winter in the classroom.

Girls are prettier in June, perhaps because they have doffed the heavy swaddling clothes of winter; suddenly they have legs, and bare arms turning bronze. A sunrise is more glorious because it brings a warm day without any of the stifling humidity of July. In June, the grass has reached its greenest, and it is very nearly a pleasure to mow it. As for the scenery, we have it on Brown's authority that "June reared that bunch of flowers you carry."

VACATION AT LAST—It is all very well to plan vacations in January, but with snow flakes tumbling and slush underfoot a man begins to fear that summer may have been outlawed—or ruled unconstitutional by the Warren court. But now that June is here, with its sights and smells and youthful airs, a holiday at the beach is in a man's grasp.

June, it may be deplored, brushes away the last debris of winter and gives promise that July and August inexorably will follow. It is the first of three glorious summer months, and the nicest, just as the first day of a holiday is the nicest. Man can enjoy the present while anticipating the future, even though it contains too many wilted salads and not enough meat and potatoes.

TIME TO STROLL AND SNOOZE—To be sure, there is Viet Nam and Red China's atomic bomb. The butcher still demands your right arm for a couple of lamb chops, and a man can't get a word in edgewise with all those professors thinking out loud about the state of the world. But is it treasonable to sneak away for a stroll down a woody lane while the world is "kneedeep in June"? Will Castro annex Staten Island while man snoozes for an hour on a grassy hillside or takes off the afternoon to improve the breed with a handful of two-dollar tickets?

I think not. I prefer to go along with Emily Dickinson in greeting June as an "innocent in-temperance," and since it has only 30 days I join with another poet in pleading:
"Slower, sweet June,
Each step more slow,
"Linger and loiter as you go."

Views of Others

STATISTICS MAY BE MISLEADING
The crime figures gathered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation—figures suggesting that major offenses have increased five times faster since 1958 than the population—are coming under renewed challenge from sociologists and criminologists. Interviewed by the New York Times, several leaders in these fields agreed that the volume of crime unquestionably was up. But they said they were convinced the situation is not as serious as the FBI statistics indicate.

The FBI concedes that most crimes of violence are committed by persons 20 to 24 years old and most serious property offenses by those 15 to 19. The "power baby boom" has produced a tremendous increase of persons in these age groups. An increase in the amount of crime is therefore not surprising. But the FBI's crime rate—offenses per 100,000 persons—does not take this youth explosion into account. A properly weighted rate would.

The crime totals that cover murder, rape, aggravated assault, auto theft and larceny of \$50 or more fail to disclose that rape and murder rates have not increased very substantially since 1955.

The totals are also distorted by the unduly high number of auto thefts and larcenies reported. As for auto thefts, most cars are taken by youngsters for joy rides and 92 per cent are recovered. The \$50 larceny level puts an expanding number of thefts into the reportable category. In our increasingly affluent society, a stolen bicycle can qualify.

Reports to the FBI are only as accurate as reporting police departments make them. Until 1952 New York city figures were considered so unreliable the FBI wouldn't accept them. Many departments scaled down their totals so as not to give their communities a "bad name." Accuracy has greatly improved, but this very fact balloons comparisons made with earlier years.

The nation needs to know the exact dimensions of its crime problem. The statistical techniques the FBI uses should therefore be overhauled. With accurate and properly evaluated data, American can act intelligently against crime.—Milwaukee Journal.

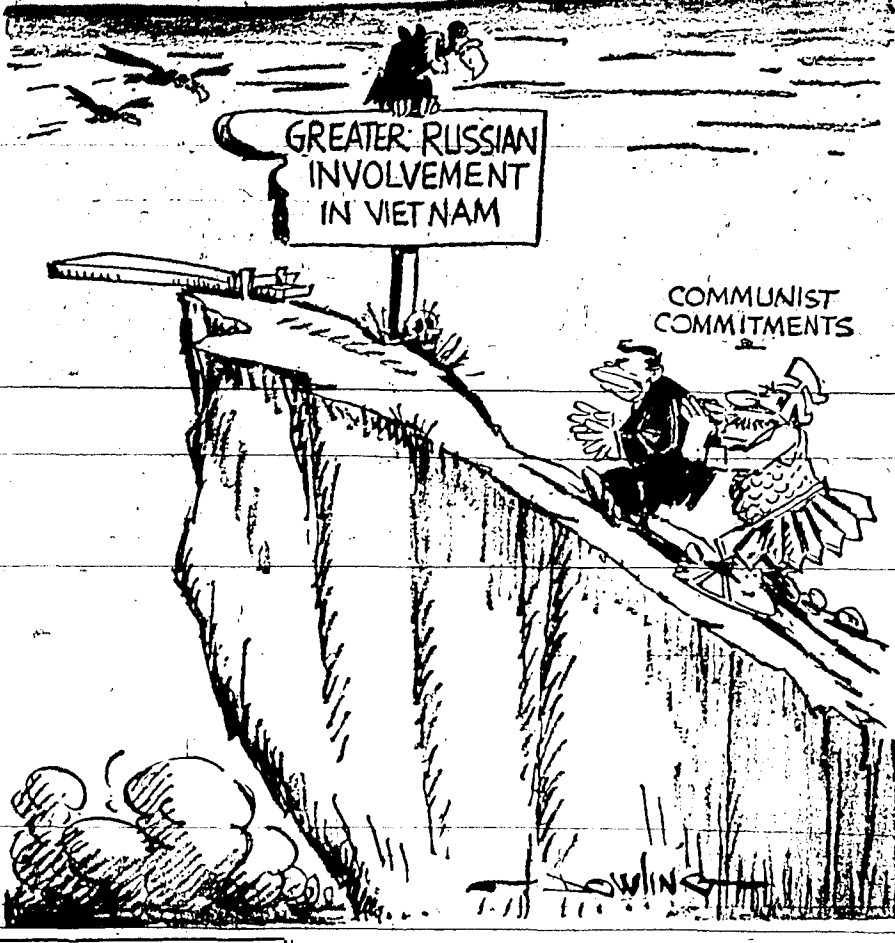
DENATURED HISTORY
The nation, and above all those of its children who attend primary and secondary schools, owe Adm. Samuel Eliot Morison a hearty vote of thanks. This most famous of living American historians, who has twice won Pulitzer Prizes for his works, criticizes the teaching of American history in primary and secondary schools as a "dismal shambles."

Admiral Morison's attack is directed specifically at the bland, dull, boring character of school textbooks, which he describes as "written by third-grade hacks" whose main concern—and that of too many publishers—seems to be to avoid annoying pressure groups, whether ethnically, socially, politically or otherwise motivated. Spiritless American history texts, he warns, are destroying the idealism of American youth.

"The dean of the nation's historians is everlastingly right in his insistence that American history should be an exhilarating adventure in discovery, not only of facts but equally of judgment and opinion. That is its real excuse for being.—The Boston Globe.

The Doctor Says

The misuse of valuable drugs is becoming a serious problem. This applies particularly to the widespread current use of barbiturates ("goo-balls") and amphetamines ("pep pills"). Both types of drug can be obtained legally only with a doctor's prescription but bootleg suppliers are all too common.

The amphetamines are abused by persons who can't bear to rest when they are tired. They burn the candle at both ends and stay awake long hours to the detriment of their health. Although these drugs will mask feelings of exhaustion and drowsiness, the result of their improper use is a depletion of energy reserves. Amphetamines are taken legitimately by persons who suffer from narcolepsy (a sudden uncontrollable urge to sleep when engaged in a normal waking activity), palsy, alcoholism, certain forms of depression and barbiturate poisoning. Barbiturates are depressants. Because they are habit-forming they should not be taken for prolonged periods but they are of great value in breaking a vicious cycle of nervous tension causing insomnia and insomnia aggravating the nervous tension. They are also used in combination in many preparations for lowering the blood pressure. When drugs of either of these

President Johnson is dosing the gullible citizens with soothing syrup about his triumphs as a careful custodian of the public funds. LBJ saves the citizen's tax dollars like a sailor saves his month's pay on a Saturday night shore leave.

In press conferences, FDR would brandish that long cigarette holder, smile his most charming smile and respond to questions about deficits and the public debt by declaring:

"Don't worry. We owe it to ourselves."
By that, FDR meant that most of the government bonds floated to pay the deficit spending bill were held by American citizens. So we owe it to ourselves. The sordid implication of FDR's airy complacency was that maybe we wouldn't need to worry about paying the debt. If that wasn't the implication then the remark had no meaning at all.

When Nikita Khrushchev broke up the 1960 summit conference in Paris, this is the man I saw rush up to Khrushchev at Orly Field to wring his hand in congratulation.

Eaton, holder of the Kremlin's Lenin Peace Prize (it figures), has insisted that the threat of nuclear war is primarily America's fault, has disparaged the forces indispensable to our security and has heaped contempt on our global battle to check the totalitarian forces he champions.

That's Eaton, and President Johnson's appeal for more trade with the Iron Curtain countries was, of course, never needed by him. But, inevitably and alas, Mr. Johnson has sent visions of sugarplums dancing in many another businessman's head.

They want the feast without the stomach-ache. But they're not going to get it. They're not, that is, if history—past and present—means anything.

The interest burden must ultimately become too heavy to bear. The wretched choice will be retire or repudiate. The big-spending politicians have created most of this enormous debt. They buy votes with promises of benefits and services for which they are afraid to tax the voters. They pay the resultant deficits by floating bonds, passing on to your grandchildren and mine the cost of government services rendered to us.

That is the way the politicians get themselves elected and re-elected. The fat-headed voters are too witless to realize that they are being flimflammed.

Ten years ago, in fiscal year 1955, the government spent \$64.3 billion and ran up a \$4.1 billion deficit. Under the 1965 Johnson-Humphrey administration economy program, spending in this fiscal year will be \$97 billion for a \$5.3 billion deficit.

This is economy? I have known Swiss sellers who could never find again the signer of their contract or a single person who ever signed a letter to them—all of which adds up to another reason why the hardheaded Swiss do practically no business with the Iron Curtain countries.

The payment backlash is hurting severely right now in West Germany. West Germany exported more than a billion dollars' worth of goods and capital to Communist Europe last year. Although the German leaders are loath to admit it, a large slice of this is turning out to be as uncollectable as a mortgage on a moonbeam.

France and Italy face similar write-offs. If captains of American industry merely reply to Mr. Johnson, "We'll leave it all to the Eatons," they will not lose a nickel in profits in the long run and sleep a lot better every night besides.

Offices Still Unoccupied In Building

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's state government Tuesday continued to pay \$330 a month rent for offices in the Bank of Idaho building in Boise it is not using. The space was vacated Feb. 27 this year by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. State officials have been trying to decide what to do with the space, which was rented on terms that require it to be paid for whether it is used or not.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie has said filling the space in the bank building first requires the State Land Board to decide on several proposed moves in the statehouse. The land board has no jurisdiction over the space in the bank building but has authority over capitol building moves.

The land board appointed a subcommittee which recommended the agriculture and insurance departments move out of the capitol to leave more room for constitutional offices. After hearing the report, Smylie said he would attempt to "shoe-horn" the agriculture and insurance departments into the bank building.

The governor was out of the state Tuesday. Other land board members indicated nothing further could be done until the governor has completed his study of the problem on the offices has been paid, the public works department said in compliance with the lease agreement.

Johnson Calls Meeting On Education

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson Tuesday called a White House conference on education July 21. He wants a "lively exchange of views on the major problems confronting our schools and colleges."

The Chief Executive selected as conference chairman John W. Gardner, president of the Carnegie Corporation of New York and the Carnegie Foundation for Advancement of Teaching.

He also named four governors to be vice chairmen-at-large: Edmund G. Pat Brown of California, John B. Connally of Texas, New Jersey's Richard J. Hughes and John H. Reed of Maine.

The White House said about 500 persons from government, education, business, organized labor and other groups were expected to attend the two-day meeting.

"Education is the key to opportunity in our society and equality of educational opportunity must be the birthright of every citizen," the President said in a statement.

"None is of greater importance to the American people. . . . All of us can benefit from a lively exchange of views on the major problem confronting our schools and colleges. We need to pool our best ideas about how to stimulate and to enrich the nation's adventure in learning."

Logan Drops Claim by Estes' Folks

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — The Logan City Commission decided Tuesday to reject a claim of \$271,500 filed against the city by the parents of Wayne Estes, Utah State University basketball star electrocuted last February.

The commission acted on advice of City Attorney Preston Thomas, who said the city had no legal responsibility for the death of the 6-foot-6 All-American.

Estes was killed Feb. 8, just hours after he had become the first USU basketball player to score more than 2,000 points. He walked into a high tension line at the scene of an automobile accident.

"Even if Logan city were legally liable for the Estes death," Thomas told the commission, "the amount of damages claimed are greatly excessive."

"Estes' parents would not have a valid legal claim on his future earnings and they would probably not have received substantial financial gain from his continued life," Thomas said.

Estes' parents, who live at Anaconda, Mont., filed the claim charging the city was negligent in not removing the wire from the accident scene. Estes stopped at the scene on his way home from a basketball game.

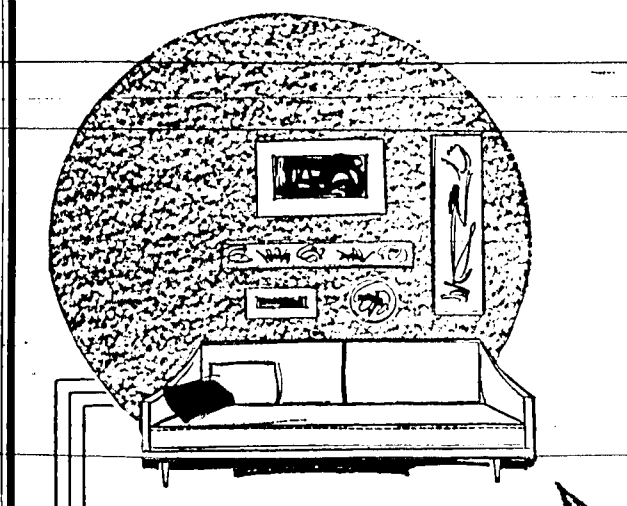
A source close to the judges said they called the jury today because some felt the Brady acquittal had shaken public confidence in the investigation.

30 Cubans Sentenced for Spy Activity

HAVANA (AP) — The Havana military court sentenced 30 Cubans Tuesday to terms of 2 to 30 years on charges of spying for the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency and dealing in black market currency.

Most of them are Baptist ministers. They were tried May 14 with two Baptist missionaries from the United States who were convicted of illegal currency deals and sentenced last week.

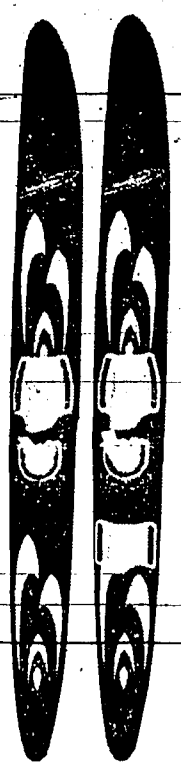

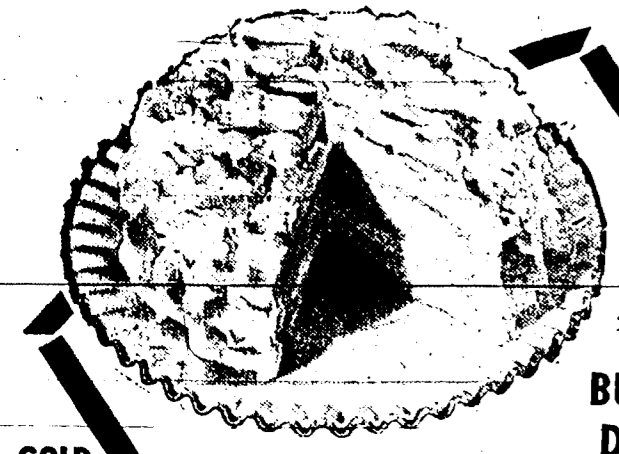

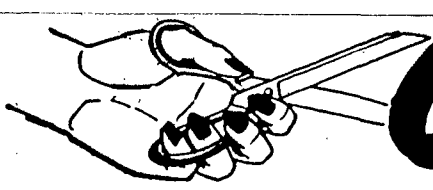

Roosevelt, a business consultant, moved to Florida from California. He was in business in Texas, Arizona and Iowa previously.

Mrs. Johnson, her brother, Tony Taylor of Sante Fe, N.M.; his wife, and the First Lady's social secretary, Bess Abell, held reservations, tourist class, aboard a commercial plane for a four-hour flight to the islands.

By evening they hoped to be lolling in a beachside cottage, previously used by vacationing Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

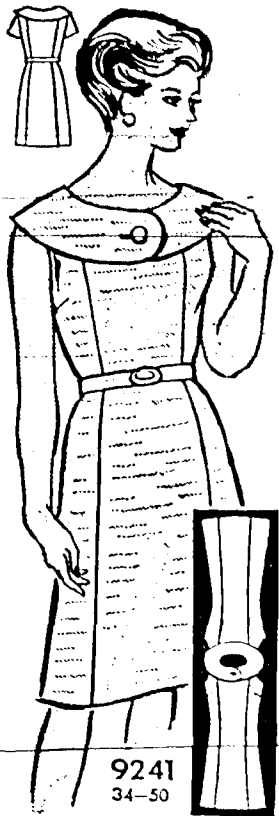

Transplanted 'Rim Rock' Lambs Are Sighted in Owyhee Desert

BOISE—Aerial observation of one yearling and a new-born lamb among ten California "Rim Rock" sheep, a subspecies of the Rocky Mountain bighorn, was reported recently in Battle Creek Canyon in the Owyhee desert of southwestern Idaho, the Fish and Game Department reported Wednesday. This gives some hope that the transplant of 19 of these trophy animals from British Columbia in the fall of 1964 will be successful, according to Roger Williams, state big game supervisor. The sheep were observed between 5-15 miles up Battle Creek from the release site in the East Fork of the Owyhee River Canyon. Jagged canyon walls, coloration of the rocks and the remoteness of the area make observation difficult.

"This is just a short distance upstream from the release site 1 1/2 years ago on the East Fork of the Owyhee River," Williams added.

Type locality collections show that California bighorns roamed eastern Oregon adjacent to the Owyhee crags and deep canyons where the Department plans to transplant up to 100 bighorns from British Columbia. However, the Rocky Mountain species is believed to have been present in the Owyhees many years ago. Trapping conditions last fall and winter were poor and the expected second shipment was postponed until late this year.

A relative of the Rocky Mountain bighorn, native to Idaho's remote central and northern primitive areas, the California

subspecies formerly ranged from the Sierra Nevada mountains north through the Cascades and into British Columbia.

This is the first bighorn sheep transplant into Idaho, but several trapping projects in British Columbia have made the animals available to Oregon, Washington and North Dakota.

Angels Trade Lee to Astros For Spangler

BOSTON (UPI)—The Los Angeles Angels acquired Al Spangler, a lefthanded hitting outfielder, from the Houston Astros Tuesday in exchange for Don Lee, a relief pitcher used sparingly in the first several weeks of the season.

Spangler, 31, batted .214 in 35 Astro games this season while Lee, also 31, had an 0-1 record and a 6.43 earned run average in 10 Los Angeles games.

Angel manager Bill Rigney said the trade, involving player waived on by all the other clubs in their respective leagues, was designed primarily to "give me some lefthanded pinch-hitting strength which have my other lefthanded hitters in the lineup."

Rigney said Spangler, expected to join the Angels in Los Angeles, Wednesday night, was not scheduled for regular field duties although "he may be a good one in our park. It's a big park and he may hit his around."

Lee will be used as a starter by Houston, according to Astros general manager Paul Richards.

Spangler's departure left three of the original Colts on the Houston roster, pitcher Dick Farrell and infielders Willis and Bob Aspromonte.

High Cost of Vandalism to Highway Signs Is Reported

SHOSHONE—The cooperation of all highway users in preserving highway signs was asked here today by B. E. Sessions, engineer for State Highway District No. 2.

During 1964, Sessions reported, some 600 signs were destroyed in district 2 alone, at a replacement cost in excess of \$15,000 for the signs alone. This does not include wages and salaries of the personnel employed, equipment rentals, fuel and oil costs. The damage totaled approximately \$55,000, statewide, for signs alone.

Vandalism, Sessions added, takes many forms. Signs are shot full of holes, the sign plate is removed from its support and thrown away, delineators are pulled and destroyed, directional and routing signs are altered to indicate erroneous information, traffic lights are blasted by shotgun pellets, warning signs are spray-painted so the legend cannot be read and structures, even before completion and acceptance by the department, are painted with numerals and letters.

Repair and replacement of all these items is reflected back to the taxpayer in increased maintenance costs and higher bid prices.

The highway department realizes, said Sessions, that the vast majority of people respect all public property and would not consciously damage or destroy any of it. For the benefit of the few individuals who commit acts of vandalism, however, Sessions pointed out that the destruction of a sign that warns of a dangerous situation ahead, such as a sharp curve, narrow bridge or rough road, can cause injury or even death, as well as placing unnecessary expense upon the public.

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North Vietnamese President May Not Be in Control of Hanoi Government

TOKYO (UPI)—North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh, beset by U. S. bombing raids and internal political strife, may no longer be in effective control of the Hanoi government, Western observers speculated today.

Ho, the 75-year-old veteran of western jails and decades of party fights, may be in greater trouble now than in all his previous years of crisis and war.

The old revolutionary faces increasing difficulties on every front — economic, military and political.

Western experts who try to see behind the Manoi regime's bamboo curtain have detected a decline in morale among North Viet Nam's population of 18 million people. The causes are not hard to find.

A U. S. agriculture department study this month pointed out that North Viet Nam's mismanaged agriculture is undermining its attempts to industrialize.

The result is a food shortage and a lack of foreign exchange. The cost of maintaining a 250,000-man army and aiding the Viet Cong adds to the strain.

The bombing raids have crippled the nation's supply system, knocking out 23 of 25 major bridges in the southern area and 10 to 15 per cent of the country's fuel stocks.

The raids resumed after a six-day lull last week when Hanoi made it clear that it was not interested in President Johnson's proposal for peace talks.

Yet Patrick J. Honey, an expert on Viet Nam at London university, said recently there were definite indications that some of the North Vietnamese leaders—those belonging to a

conciliatory pro-Soviet faction under Ho were in favor of negotiations.

The failure to negotiate, he said, suggests "there may be some truth in the rumors that Ho Chi Minh has become senile and has been removed from effective leadership."

Speculation that Ho was losing his mental acuteness first arose three years ago. A French journalist who interviewed Ho found

him healthier than he had been in the 1930's, but mentally "rather vague, talking only of the past, rambling on about this and that, like someone in his dotage."

Whatever the state of Ho's health and mind, it is no secret that the hard-line, pro-Chinese wing of the Communist Party has gained much influence in recent years—at the expense of Ho's supremacy.
