The liquor by the drink issue, which was voted on Tuesday by local residents, passed by a majority vote of 312 yes and 183 no votes.

After official publication and adoption of the ordinance, applications for a liquor license can be obtained at the city hall.

Only three persons in Buhl will be allowed to obtain a liquor license as the law allows one license issued for every 1,500 population or fraction thereof.

Abandoned Rubber Raft Is Sighted

SALMON—A rubber raft floated the lower Middle Fork of the Salmon River and when last seen was attempting to float the Salmon River through that section of the Idaho Primitive Area.

The raft apparently was abandoned by its two Colorado occupants who made it from Indian Creek on the upper Middle Fork to the Flying B Ranch and had had enough of the turbulent stream.

George Austin, resort operator at the end of the Salmon River Road, sighted the raft near Cache Bar below the mouth of the Middle Fork and with a small boat overtook the craft downriver at Corn Creek Bar.

The raft, he said, was moving 20 miles an hour, and when the current caught it the rope snapped and on it went.

Austin said the raft still contained a box and other gear along with one oar trailing at the side. There was little water aboard.

Reports indicate the raft belonged to two Colorado college students who were attempting to float the Middle Fork but gave up because of high water.

The craft appeared to be a seven-man rubber raft and had high sidewalls.

Austin said the boat must have hung up someplace in the Middle Fork because of the speed of the water it should have come from the Flying B to the mouth of the river in a day.

Reports indicate the boat went into the Middle Fork May 28 and was seen on the Salmon River by Austin and his son-in-law, Andy Johnson, May 31.

No reports have been received of sighting the raft since. Most boats are out of the Salmon now because of the spring runoff reaching its peak.

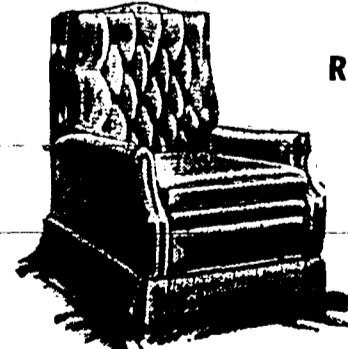

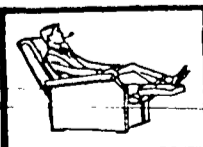

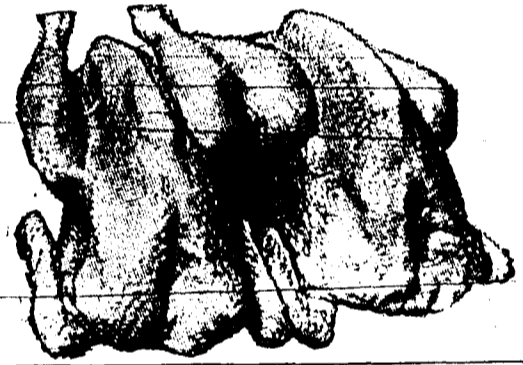

St. Bernard Starts Life Term in Jail

CHICAGO (AP) — Bernardo St. Bernard has begun his life term in prison with a splash.

St. Bernard at 15 months became the youngest convict of Cook County Jail Wednesday. He was given the routine prisoner treatment of mug shots and a physical examination and was assigned No. 000-065.

St. Bernard also was paw printed and given a bath.

That was before he held a news conference in a mud puddle.

St. Bernard is a dog sentenced to life in prison by Judge Daniel J. Ryan of Circuit Court on a charge of mopey with intent to gawk.

He began his life with the jail's 1,630 prisoners by emerging from a puddle and, with a swing of his shaggy tail, muddily doused the crowd. That really put BSB in the doghouse.

"The dog stands at least 6 feet tall on his hind legs," Warden Jack Johnson said. "And the part of him we could get on the scale weighed 150 pounds."

The dog, named for James Bernardo, jury supervisor for the criminal division of Circuit Court, became the prisoners' mascot because of domestic problems.

Henry Szura, owner of the Lazy H Ranch in suburban Fox Lake, told an assistant warden the St. Bernard and his doghouse mate, a Great Dane, couldn't get along.

Bernardo got the gate. Warden Johnson agreed to take him as a personal pet, but decided that Bernardo's size ruled that out. Johnson also might have considered the large amount of meat and table scraps Bernardo requires daily.

Thus big Bernardo — who had been described as a gentle mope — was charged, tried, convicted and sentenced to a life of contentment.

Border Guard Fails to Stop East German

BERLIN (UPI) — Communist border guards riddled a young East German with bullets Wednesday while he was making a dramatic swim to freedom across the River Spree. They failed to stop him.

West Berlin police, following a trail of blood, traced the fugitive to a hiding place on the western bank of the river. Unconscious, he was rushed to a hospital for surgery. He had been hit five times — in the lungs, legs, back and an arm.

Police said they heard at least 50 shots and later found bullet scars on the West Berlin embankment showing the Communists kept on firing after the refugee reached free Berlin.

The refugee, about 22, clad only in swim trunks, was found behind a wall on the American sector Kreuzberg district shore.

HONG KONG (UPI) — Communist Chinese militia units on Hainan Island off the North Vietnamese coast are undergoing intensive combat training, according to reports reaching here Wednesday.

Other reports said Chinese boys and girls on the mainland, fired up by anti-American slogans, also were undergoing rigorous compulsory military training.

Red Chinese authorities on Hainan Island in the Gulf of Tonkin apparently are fearful that the American air war against North Viet Nam might spread to the island, observers said.

They have given top priority to air defense under the stepped up training program.

The report carried by the New China News Agency said the militia units were using balloons for target practice during the anti-aircraft training.

The Communist militia is also getting heavy training in the use of machine guns, grenade throwing, mine laying, and war communications, the report said.

Another report dealing with the training of youth on the Communist Chinese mainland was carried Wednesday by the newspaper Tin Tin Yat.

It said the streets of Canton were festooned with posters designed to incite hatred against Americans.

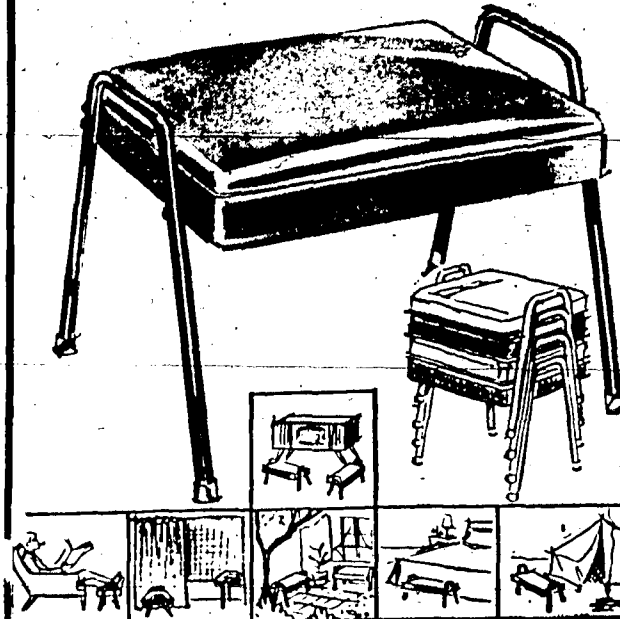

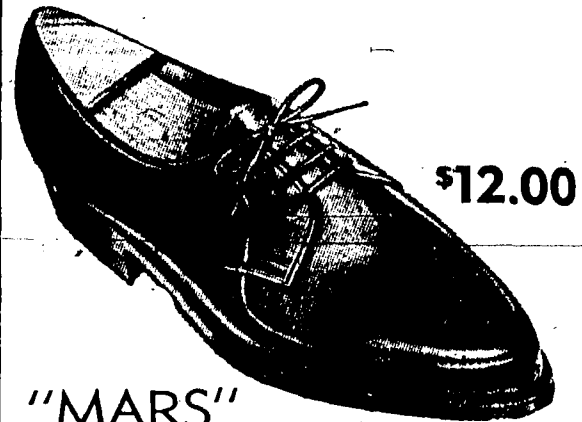

Lynda Bird Plans Apache Area Visit

GRASSHOPPER, Ariz. (AP) — Lynda Bird Johnson will be among 21 students making a peaceful invasion of this remote region in the heart of Apache country.

—Lynda Bird, 21, the President's daughter, will be the first person of her rank to visit the reservation, where Apache warriors in 1881 fought a bloody battle with U.S. cavalry.

She will be a guest student starting Friday at an archaeological digging conducted by the University of Arizona under the direction of Dr. Raymond H. Thompson.

The excavation is at the site of an ancient pueblo ruin of a now extinct tribe which dates back to 1400 A.D. In its shadow the Coyotero Apaches rose against U.S. troops.

It was at Cibola, to the north of Grasshopper that Col. Eugene Asa Carr led 79 troopers, six officers and 23 Indian scouts into the village to arrest a medicine man named Noday Delk.

They were opposed by 300 Apaches.

One officer and 10 enlisted men were killed and 47 Apaches taken prisoner before the battle ended.

During the battle the Indian scouts mutinied and three were hanged as a result. Three troop-

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — American servicemen in Saigon face a problem getting their beer cans open.

Solon Says Continue Use of Silver

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, told the Senate Banking and Currency Committee Wednesday that the U.S. has enough silver to continue using the precious metal in its coins in reduced amounts.

Church appeared before the committee to oppose President Johnson's request that a copper-nickel alloy be substituted for silver in the minting of dimes and quarters and that the silver content of the half-dollar be reduced.

Church told the committee the gap between supply and demand for silver is about half of the 335 million ounces reported by the Treasury Department. He said statistics indicate silver production will increase in the future.

"It is entirely possible that the silver crisis may soon pass," he said. "If it does, I have no doubt that we will regret eliminating silver from the dime and quarter.

"At the very least," Church said, "the President's recommendation to retain silver in the half-dollar should be upheld."

The rivers were also rising in the Province of Burgenland in Eastern Austria.

Q. I am 35, married and the father of three young children. My wife and I have a total of about \$10,000 in a savings account and U. S. Savings Bonds. We have enough insurance. Our \$14,000 home is paid for, as is our late-model car. My annual salary is \$8,000.

Several of our friends say that buying stocks is better than putting money in the bank or buying savings bonds. I know that you will not recommend what stocks I should buy. But will you give me your opinion on how a man in my position should invest?

A. I'll do that — gladly. And the answer is "slowly."

You already have a firm financial foundation in home ownership, insurance and a nice cushion of savings. If you have accomplished all that on your salary alone, you have done wonders.

All things considered, your family is in much better financial shape than most who write to this corner. And you're probably really on firmer financial ground than those friends who are so quick to pass out advice.

Your financial pond is placid. Don't make too many waves and upset the boat.

But you are in a position where you should consider a steady investment program in "equities"—such as individual common stocks or mutual fund shares.

Naturally, for you (and most other families) I advise my favorite investing method — dollar-averaging. That method of investing the same amount of money in the same equity security at fixed intervals remains the best way for a sensible investment program — especially for the average American family.

If you can use some of your current income to start such a program I would advise you (even urge you) to do so. You might even consider cutting back a bit (not too far) on that sizable savings cushion.

What you have now protects your family against any sudden emergency but not against inflation. Good equity investments have protected against and outpaced inflation in the past and should continue to do so in the future.

Q. Most insurance stocks are very high priced — too high for me. Now I have the opportunity to buy stock in an accident and casualty insurance company, because I have a policy with that company. I can buy it at only \$12 a share.

Doesn't this seem to be a good deal?

A. I don't know. I don't know the company. So, I can't tell whether the deal will be acc or deuces low.

But I'll tell you this. Any time you get an offer (proposition) might be a better word) that is made just to certain people and not to the general public, be careful. The deal might be off the bottom of the deck.

And it's usually a mistake to judge a stock by its price per share. Very often you're better off buying just one share of a very high-priced stock than a lot of shares of a low-priced stock.

Q. I was recently talking to a socialist who told me that a very well-known rich family owns more stock than all the people who work for a living. Is this true?

A. No, and stop listening to crackpots. They have been trying to peddle that pap for years. They ignore the fact that there are at least 20 million stockholders in these United States — all of whom are capitalists and most of whom are "working people" by any definition.

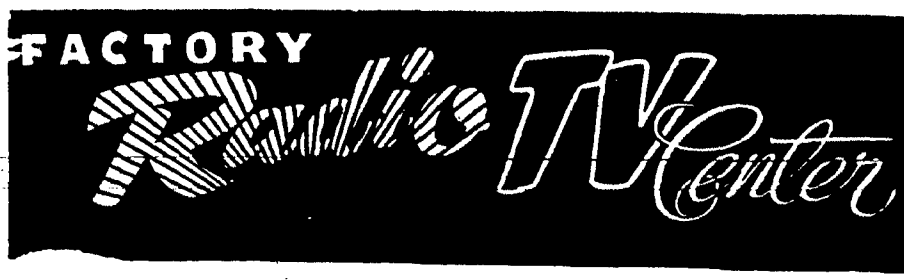

NBA Tables Growth, Eyes Gate Increase

BOSTON (UPI)—National Basketball Association club owners counted the spoils of a 12 per cent attendance increase Wednesday but accomplished little else in nearly seven hours of meetings at their annual business session.

The league's Board of Governors shortened between-period time-outs by 30 seconds and made minor adjustments in the NBA's college drafting procedure and the number of players under contract to each team.

Shelved during the first of two days of business meetings were such problems as expansion, scheduling and officiating.

League President J. Walter Kennedy said expansion had been "discussed during the meeting with no definitive progress made."

Kennedy earlier had identified Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Chicago and an unidentified city in the Southwest as the most likely sites for the league's proposed expansion from nine to ten teams for the 1966-67 season.

Kennedy said he had received 31 applications for franchises during his two years as NBA president. But he said many of them were from "publicity seekers" and declined to identify any of the other cities seeking the additional franchise.

However, Kansas City, Houston, New Orleans, Seattle, Portland, Ore., and San Diego were being mentioned as other possible sites.

An NBA official quoted unofficial figures showing that the league drew a record 2.8 million customers to regular season and playoff games last season for an increase of about 300,000 from the 1963-64 mark of 2.5 million.

Hyndman, a 49-year-old Philadelphia, made one great shot that gave him a 1-up victory over Colin Strachan, a young Scot. Gardner, a 44-year-old broker from Essex Falls, N. J., defeated Mike Barker of England 6 and 5, and Penrose, 51, of Philadelphia, beat Tony Howard of England 5 and 4.

The other American survivors were a pair of Rochester, N. Y., businessmen, Jim Campbell and Jack Thornton, and John Miles of New York City.

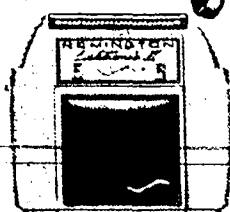

GOP Leaders Support Bliss As Chairman

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Key Republican leaders, with Barry Goldwater of Arizona absent, have pledged full support to their new party chairman in the hope he can unify them for another lunge at the White House in 1968.

Goldwater, the 1964 GOP presidential nominee, was not mentioned publicly Wednesday night as leading Republicans, guided by their best vote-getter of all time, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, urged the party to unite behind National Chairman Ray C. Bliss.

A party spokesman here said Goldwater was not invited to Wednesday night's series of dinners saluting Bliss in his home state.

Eisenhower and seven other Republicans, some of them presidential possibilities, sounded the call again and again, unity and Bliss.

"I salute this tireless, dedicated man on whose ability so much depends," said Eisenhower.

"Ray Bliss can lead the Republican party to victory across the nation in 1968 and 1968," declared former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

"He has full and complete support on anything he wants us to do," said Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania.

Kennedy Film Showing Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House approved, 311-75, Wednesday the showing in the United States of a movie about President John F. Kennedy. It was produced by the U. S. Information Agency for overseas use.

The resolution, which must be acted on by the Senate, provides that the 90-minute color film titled "John F. Kennedy, Years of Lightning, Day of Drums," be distributed commercially.

Republicans led the opposition, charging that commercial distribution might cheapen the film.

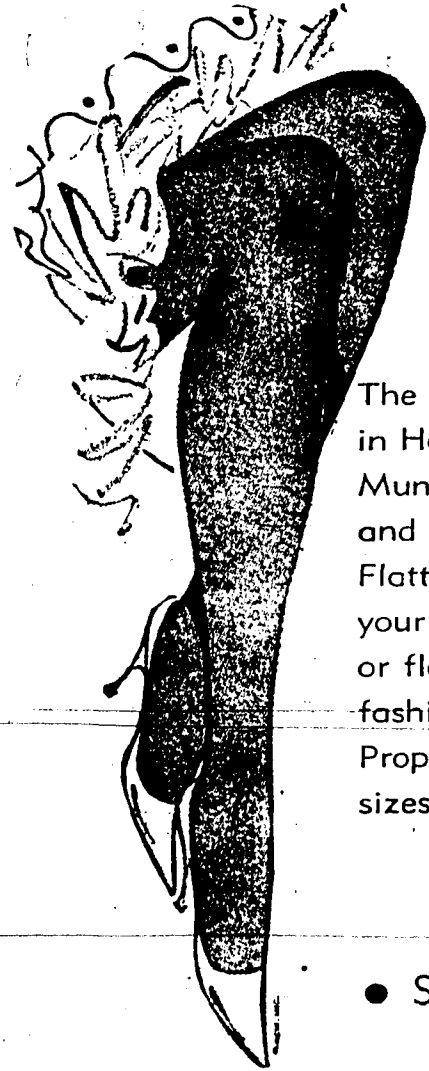

Jobs Listed For Youth Counselors

Application forms are available at the Twin Falls office of the Idaho Employment Security Agency for persons interested in applying for training this summer for careers as counselors in Youth Opportunity Centers.

R. S. Cutler, manager, said 187 of the proposed network of 200 such centers have been announced by W. Willard Wirtz, secretary of labor. The centers will act as focal points for all governmental and community services to aid unemployed youth and are a part of the anti-poverty program.

The urgent need to recruit more than 2,000 qualified men and women to serve in the centers' youth programs has been stressed by Wirtz. Those selected will be given special training in counseling, advising, recruiting and working with disadvantaged youth, Cutler said.

To qualify, an applicant must be over 21 and a college graduate. Candidates also must possess the interest, special aptitudes, motivation and dedication necessary for this type of work.

Applicants who are chosen will be given eight weeks of concentrated instructions and field work at major universities between July 6 and Sept. 3 and four weeks of on-the-job training at youth centers or local employment service offices. Board room and tuition will be provided while training, plus a modest living allowance.

Cutler said applicants must have master's or bachelor's degrees in such fields as counseling and guidance, psychology, sociology, education or related fields.

Besides studying piano for eight years, Miss Jones also has had two years of study on the violin.

Earth Has "Four Corners," Scientists Say

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The round Earth was actually pear-shaped. Later on it was smoothed out.

Over the oceans, the Applied Physics Laboratory said, the difference between lows and highs may be as much as 450 feet.

That high point which centers over Ireland sprawls northward toward the Pole. Another extends across the Equator from New Guinea toward Japan. A third is south of Africa, centered about half way to Antarctica. The fourth corner is west of South America with its apex off Peru.

At the center of each of these high points, the satellite data revealed, the pull of gravity is greater than normal for the latitude by more than two thousandths of one per cent. This

may not seem like much, but it is enough, the laboratory said, to pull the ANNA satellite downward a few hundred feet.

The satellite findings, a laboratory spokesman said, "proves scientifically that the Irish are right when they say their country is closer to heaven than many others."

By way of example, and not meaning to cast aspersions or make odious comparisons, he went on to note that Charleston, S.C., is 450 feet below Ireland. "To get from Charleston to the Emerald Isle," he said, "you have to go uphill all the way."

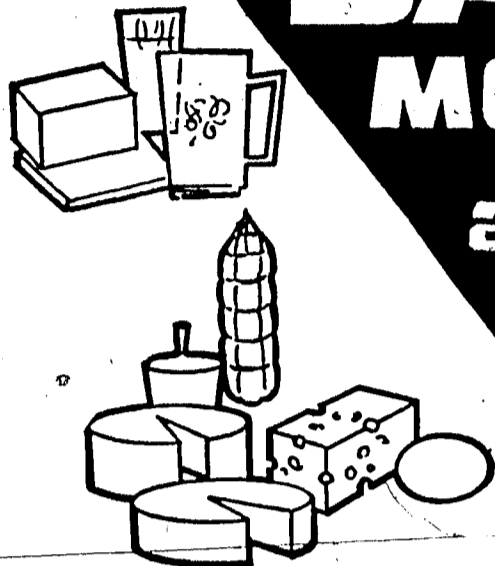

Russia Makes Payment on Estate Taxes

GLEN COVE, N. Y. (UPI)—It was from Russia — but not with love.

It was an envelope, for the city of Glen Cove, containing a check from the Soviet Union for more than \$38,000 as a part payment on the back taxes it owes for the 36-acre estate, Killenworth.

The Russians contend they should not have to pay taxes. The reason they give is diplomatic immunity.

But this Long Island community contends it should not have to subsidize the Russians and that their failure to pay taxes would put an extra burden on other residents.

The State Department several years ago sought to enter the dispute on behalf of the Russians, but eventually gave up. The city was adamant that the Soviet Union had to pay its taxes like everyone else.

Glen Cove Mayor Joseph Reilly said Wednesday the Russians still owe \$26,000 plus interest in taxes. However, Reilly added that the \$38,000 payment was sufficient for the time being and effectively avoids foreclosure on tax liens on the estate, which would have taken place at the end of the month.
