

2 Bridges Near Hanoi Plastered By Navy Planes

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U. S. Navy planes struck bridges 50 and 55 miles from Hanoi today and also hit other military targets in North Viet Nam. Officials also reported that over a 24-hour period ending at 6 a.m., 230 attacks were made on Viet Cong targets in South Viet Nam. In North Viet Nam, 19 U. S. Navy planes struck at a highway bridge 50 miles south of the Red capital, but there was no report whether the structure was damaged.

26 Believed Dead After Texas Flood

SANDERSON, Tex. (AP)—A search for 10 persons missing after Friday's flood ended Monday night. The missing were presumed dead, making the toll 26.

"There's no place left to search," said Terrell County Sheriff Bill Cooksey.

"More bodies are going to be found by chance from time to time, and others won't ever be found," he said.

Sixteen bodies have been recovered since a 15-foot wall of water swept down Sanderson Canyon early Friday.

Seven men on foot followed the canyon through rough country 20 miles south as far as the Rio Grande. An Army helicopter flew the same course and continued 30 miles down the Rio Grande.

Searchers found about a dozen cars, some as far as three miles downstream from the town.

Jet Crashes Near Ogden, Pilot Safe

OGDEN (AP)—An air force Voodoo RF-101 jet plane approaching Hill air force base in Ogden, Utah, crashed and burned today. Pilot Capt. Clyde O. LaPlante, Memphis, Tenn., parachuted and was reported bruised but otherwise unhurt.

LaPlante is stationed at the base with the flight test division.

The Ogden Fire Department said the plane crashed in an open area West of Ogden. It exploded upon impact and sent clouds of black smoke into the sky.

The pilot was picked up by a military ambulance.

Base officials said the plane, a reconnaissance version of the F-101 Fighter, caught fire as it came in for a landing after a test flight.

Johnson Says Economy in "Good Shape"

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson and Democratic congressional leaders agreed today that the nation's economy is in good shape.

The leaders reported this after a breakfast meeting with Johnson at the White House.

House Speaker John W. McCormack of Massachusetts said Johnson called attention to the latest figures on employment, at a record high in May, and average factory pay, also at a record high.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana was asked his opinion of the cause of the decline in stock market prices recently. He replied that nobody knows what causes Wall Street to react, adding: "The country is sound and that's what counts."

McCormack discounted criticism of administration policy in Viet Nam, saying, "The American people are overwhelmingly behind the President."

Disturbed

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Wilson, faced with spreading criticism of his pro-American policy on Viet Nam, said today his government is "deeply disturbed" about developments in that country during the past few weeks.

He intrigued the House of Commons by saying without elaboration: "Certain consultations are now going on."

U.S. Bomber Crashes Near Paris; 3 Die

PARIS (AP)—A U.S. Air Force B57 jet bomber crashed on landing at Le Bourget Airport today before thousands at an international air show. The Air Force said its three crew members were killed.

Air Force authorities at Le Bourget said it had arrived from the U.S. Air Force Base at Torrejon, Spain. First reports said the B57, America's fastest medium-range bomber, had come from the United States.

The plane had just completed a demonstration run over the field. Control tower employees said it appeared one of its engines fell off during the landing approach.

The plane crashed with a thunderous roar which shattered windows and fuselage and burst into flames. One engine, some distance from the aircraft, belched flames.

U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen was in the crowd that saw the crash.

The B57 is a strategic medium-range bomber with a speed in excess of 1,300 miles per hour.

It was the second B57 Hustler to crash during an international air show in Paris. In 1961 another B57 crashed shortly after it made a fly-past before thousands of spectators. All the crewmen were killed.

18 Killed in Crash of Two Helicopters

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP)—Two troop-carrying Army helicopters collided and crashed today killing at least 18 soldiers, possibly more, the Army said.

The big helicopters, each capable of carrying 14 men, smashed together over a swampy area of Ft. Benning and crashed, one in flames.

Taking off from an airstrip on the sprawling reservation of the Army Infantry Training Center, the helicopters collided within about two miles of the airstrip at 9:45 a.m. EST, the Army said.

Rescue teams continued searching for bodies at the crash scene in a remote area of the military base that spreads out south and east of Columbus.

The information center at Ft. Benning announced more than two hours after the collision that 18 soldiers perished. None bailed out.

The UH1B aircraft each is capable of carrying a squad of 11 and a crew of 3.

Rescue teams dug into the smoldering wreckage for bodies in an area inaccessible by vehicle.

The helicopters plummeted to earth about two miles from the airstrip where they took off on a training mission.

The aircraft were assigned to the 227th Assault Helicopter Battalion of the 11th Air Assault Division.

Stronger Law Is Urged for State Bank Dealings

SUN VALLEY (AP)—Idaho bankers were urged today to work for stronger state law dealing with regional banks at second day sessions of the annual meeting of the Idaho Banking Association at Sun Valley.

Archie Davis, Winston Salem, N.C., vice president, American Banking Association, told the bankers there is a move under way to centralize banking practices and that stronger local laws is the best way to combat it.

Contract Let For Lewiston Seaport Work

WASHINGTON (AP)—A \$172 million contract for one of four locks and dams on the Lower Snake River for a sea-going waterway to Lewiston was to be signed today.

The contract, the largest ever awarded by the U. S. Corps of Army Engineers, is for completion of the Little Goose Lock and Dam in Southeastern Washington, said Idaho's Democratic Congressman, Sen. Frank Church.

The day is drawing near, said Church, "when Idaho products and products from all parts of the intermountain west will funnel into Lewiston, to be shipped to every port in the world."

The Port of Lewiston will be connected to the Pacific by a 500-mile navigable channel with completion of the Little Goose, Ice Harbor, Lower Monumental and Granite Locks and dams. Ice Harbor is the only one completed.

The contract to be signed for Little Goose provides for construction of a navigation lock with a 101-foot lift, a fish ladder, a powerhouse capable of handling three 135,000-kilowatt turbines and an earthfill dam.

The successful bidder for the job is a combine, Vinnell-Mannix-Fuller-Dillingham, of Alhambra, Calif.

U.S., Rebel Forces Exchange Fire in Dominican Zone

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—U. S. paratroopers and rebel forces engaged in a violent exchange of gunfire today. Unverified reports said a paratrooper was killed and another wounded. Three civilians were known dead in the rebel zone and eight others were wounded. It was not immediately clear what touched off the shooting. Several homes and a business house on the rebel side were set afire. At least two rounds of 106mm recoilless rifle fire smashed into a burning building where Dominican firemen were trying to put out the flames.

The dead were a 13-year-old boy and a 2-year-old child.

Rebel sharpshooters were exchanging fire with the paratroopers, whose lines are on a slight rise looking down into the rebel-held zone of downtown Santo Domingo.

A towering column of black smoke rose from the customs house storage sheds in the southeast sector. Rebel sources said mortar and bazooka shells coming from U. S. 82nd Airborne Division positions at Sans Saucel Point across the Ozama River caused the fire.

Angry rebel soldiers screamed at American newsmen: "I look at your Yankee democracy."

Rebel presidential minister Hector Aristy told The Associated Press: "I don't know how you people can refer to that force as the inter-American peace force after this. They are invader forces."

The shooting broke out as Jose A. Mora, secretary-general of the Organization of American States, sped through the U. S.-controlled corridor to the airport. There he took a plane for Washington.

Mora told reporters his trip was of a personal nature and he would return in two or three days.

The city provides the band as an adult men's organization to provide park concerts for the public during the summer months.

Churchill's Widow Takes House Seat

LONDON (UPI)—Sir Winston Churchill's widow carried on the family tradition of lawmaking today by taking her seat in the House of Lords as Baroness Spencer-Churchill of Chartwell.

Sir Winston was a House of Commons man himself and even turned down a dukedom so he could remain an ordinary member of the legislature. But his widow is 80 and beyond the time of party politics.

So to preserve her many years of wisdom and experience for the nation Queen Elizabeth persuaded her to accept a peerage and become one of her "right trusty and well beloved" counselors of the upper house.

Lady Churchill accepted the title of baroness bestowed by the Queen, enabling her to sit in the House of Lords. She chose the title Baroness Spencer-Churchill of Chartwell.

School Office In Jerome to Be Moved

JEROME — Supt. William Lipscomb, Jerome School District No. 261, announced Tuesday that the location of the central offices for the next 12 to 15 months will be moved to the Hite Insurance Building at 211 South Lincoln St.

This move has been necessitated so that maintenance men may prepare for remodeling in the senior high building. The present office will be remodeled for use as the principal's office and the superintendent's office will be located in the new addition at the junior high building.

The Hite building, which has just undergone extensive remodeling, is 24 by 36 feet and Lipscomb will have an office which is 12 by 16.

The central offices will be located at this address until completion of the remodeling and addition of the junior high and senior high school.

Bill Passed for Flooded Areas

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The house passed and sent to the White House today a \$111 million relief bill for the flood-stricken Pacific Northwest.

A similar bill had been passed before and vetoed by the president. Today's version was shorn of the restrictive language to which the President objected. He was expected to sign the new version at once.

The bill on its second time around was cleared by the House by voice vote despite complaints that the President had no business vetoing the original version.

Rep. William C. Cramer, R., Fla., senior Republican of the Public Works Committee, had planned to offer an amendment today restoring the original language, under which house and senate Public Works Committees would have retained a final say-so as to what specific projects were approved under the bill.

Woman Caged 18 Years for Love Affair

COSENZA, Italy (UPI) — Police said Tuesday a 36-year-old woman has been found imprisoned in a tiny cage in the home of her parents, who locked her up 18 years ago after a teenage love affair.

Authorities identified the victim as Ida Burza and said she was undergoing medical treatment in hopes she can return to a normal life. They said she was emaciated and showed signs of mental disorder.

Officers said they received an anonymous telephone call from the nearby village of Maione telling them they would find the daughter of Francesco and Giovanna Burza caged in the attic of the family home.

Police said they discounted the story but decided to check it out Monday. They found the woman in a wooden cage, six feet long and almost as high.

The woman's parents said they locked up their daughter in March of 1947 when she showed signs of mental distress following an ill-fated love affair.

"We isolated her to keep her from doing something crazy and gave her just enough food to keep her from dying," police quoted her parents. "She would have gotten dangerous if we had let her get stronger."

The parents and a brother were being questioned by police. Officers said it appeared the woman had never been let out of the cage during the entire 18 years.

Officials Deny Pope's Plans For U.N. Trip

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Authorized officials said today the Vatican secretariat of state had no information that Pope Paul VI is planning a trip to the United Nations.

Asked about published reports outside Italy that the Roman Catholic pontiff might speak at U.N. headquarters in New York, Vatican press officials queried the secretariat of state and then reported this reply: "Nothing is known about such a trip."

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Noted Radio Commentator Dies, Age 86

NEW YORK (AP)—H. V. Kaltenborn, dean of radio commentators, died Monday at the age of 86.

Kaltenborn suffered a heart attack while visiting a son here. On his qualifications for broadcasting, Hans Von Kaltenborn once noted that the wife of the mayor of Fairbanks, Alaska, told him as they danced: "Boy, you're some speller."

Known for his ability to read a bulletin and quickly launch into an analysis of the story, he once said: "I would say whatever came into my head. However, I had my head trained so that I didn't get into too much trouble."

Kaltenborn never worked from a script. He said during an 80th birthday interview last July 9: "I always have to laugh at the boys now because they always have to get something written down before they go on the air."

Kaltenborn pioneered on-the-air news analyses in 1922.

In January 1949, a few months after his surprise election victory over Thomas E. Dewey, former President Harry S. Truman told a public dinner in Washington of a Kaltenborn broadcast he had heard on election night.

Mimicking Kaltenborn, Truman quoted the news commentator: "The President is one million popular votes ahead, but when the country vote comes in

Mr. Truman will be defeated by an overwhelming vote.

In an interview last year, Kaltenborn, said, "Truman has always been friendly to me ever since he and I exchanged quips about his imputation of me."

Kaltenborn, who quit school at 14 to become a lumberjack, ranked his coverage of Munich crisis in 1938 as his greatest professional achievement. It won him the personal compliments of former President Herbert Hoover.

Woman Sails Smoothly on Hawaii Trip

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sharon Sites, 34, heading alone for Hawaii in a 25-foot boat was "sailing beautifully in a choppy sea" when last seen Sunday, 75 miles from shore.

The report came Monday from Mrs. Sites' sailing instructor, Al Adams, who added: "She had changed from her pretty attire to sea boots, oilskins and sou'wester hat."

Adams and a group of Mrs. Sites' friends accompanied her 75 miles in another boat after she set out on her 2,300-mile voyage Saturday. Adams headed the escort boat, his 49-foot racing sloop Cotton Blossom II, back to shore at 3 p.m. Sunday.

"There isn't another girl in five million and there aren't many men — who would attempt this, who would alone," Adams said. "I tried to tell her what she'd be up against, but she wouldn't be discouraged."

Adams taught Mrs. Sites to sail five months ago. The dental secretary quit her job and invested her \$9,000 savings in the boat, the Sea Sharp, and the trip. The craft has no radio and she took no fuel for the auxiliary engine.

Mrs. Sites, who expected to reach Hawaii in 30 to 40 days, carried enough food for 65 days and water for 90.

MCCALL (AP) — The American Trucking Association urged Idaho and Oregon fruit and produce growers Monday to oppose a trucking tax rate proposed by the federal government.

Forning Rankin of Washington, D. C., director of farm relations for the trucking association, said at opening sessions of the Idaho-Oregon Fruit and Vegetable Association's third annual convention that the tax increase would raise shipping cost of produce and other goods.

Rankin said the government proposal would raise Pacific Northwest truckers' taxes as much as 20 per cent.

FBI TO PRESENT FINDINGS
LEWISTON (UPI) — The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced today it will present its findings in the death of Jess Tilden, 26, Lapwai, to a federal grand jury at Boise June 22.

Tilden died Saturday night of a brain hemorrhage after he was involved in a fight in a bar room at Lapwai on the Nez Perce Indian Reservation.

Touch-Tone Phoning Set Here June 18

Touch-Tone service, a method of push button telephone calling, will be available in Twin Falls beginning June 18, it was announced Monday by Leo C. Vogel, district manager for the Mountain States Telephone Co.

According to Vogel, major adjustments to telephone company equipment have now been completed, making it possible for the new service to be made available and for both push button and dial phones to be used on the same line.

Twin Falls is among the first cities in Idaho to have this new service. Touch-Tone telephones will be introduced throughout the state and in other parts of the county on a gradual, town-by-town basis.

"This makes calling easier and faster, plus paves the way for other advances in telephone technology," Vogel said.

The average time for tapping out a seven-digit number has been found to be only two to five seconds, whereas regular dialing takes up to 14 seconds.

Vogel said that Touch-Tone service may eventually lead to the day when a housewife will push buttons on her phone to place an order at the supermarket, or when a businessman out-of-town will activate a dictating machine in his office by sending a code over the phone.

Salmon River Drops With Cooler Weather, Rain, Snow

SALMON—The Salmon River dropped slightly here Monday with cooler temperatures accompanied by rain and snow.

The river hit 8.30 feet Sunday at 6 p.m. for an all-time record high but Monday was down to 8.10 feet. The 8.30 reading is the highest since records were begun in 1921.

Level of the river is expected to come up again with the return of warmer temperatures, however.

Tom Tate, Walla Walla, Wash., civil engineer with the Corps of Engineers, said Monday the river had dropped a foot at Challis. The peak flow here Sunday at 6 p.m. was 16,500 second feet, the same reading as the record high in 1956. High level that year was 8.24.

Idaho Highway Department crews worked all night Sunday 15 miles up the Lemhi River from Salmon hauling in rock to a 200-foot area along Idaho Highway 28 where the river began cutting into the road. Philip Marsh, Rigby, district highway engineer, said here that the river had cut three to four feet underneath the edge of the oil on Idaho Highway 28.

He said the situation appeared to be in hand Monday but

said additional trucks would be brought in to take care of emergencies arising at a half dozen places threatened by high waters on U. S. Highway 93 and Idaho Highway 28.

City crews continued to bolster the dike around the city swimming pool on Island Park after the west channel of the Salmon River flowed onto the upper end of the island. Lower end of the island has been under water for the past 10 days.

Bonalack squared the match at the 28th, took the lead at the 31st and went two up at the 33rd. Bonalack, finally won 2 and 1.

"The fact that we managed to get four players into the semifinals shows we have a lot of talent," Carr said.

"Clark is only 19; Rodney Foster, a semifinalist, is 23; Martin Christmas, another semifinalist, is 25, and Peter Townsend, another fine young player, is only 18."

Milwaukee Alters Stand On Ball Club

MILWAUKEE (AP) — John Doyne, Milwaukee county executive, changed his position Monday and said the county should seek legislative authority to operate a major league baseball team itself.

The county's top elected official who previously had taken the stand that running a sports team was not a proper function of government, also said the county should press its antitrust action on the Milwaukee Braves' moving to Atlanta after this season.

Doyne's proposal for legislative approval to operate a baseball club would include appropriation of money for a franchise and setting up of a non-profit corporation to run the club. Doyne proposes applications to both major leagues for a franchise.

Mauch Will Manage NL All-Stars

CINCINNATI (AP) — Gene Mauch, manager of the Philadelphia Phillies, was named Monday by National League President Warren C. Giles to manage the league's 1965 All-Star team.

The National League team will meet the American League in the All-Star game July 13 at Minneapolis-St. Paul.

Giles said the honor of managing the All-Star squad ordinarily goes to the manager whose team won the last pennant. However, Johnny Keane, who piloted the St. Louis Cardinals to the 1964 pennant, left the league at the end of the season to become manager of the New York Yankees in the American League.

Giles said he was informed the manager of the AL All-Stars will be named later this week.

The American League is in the same position as the National League. Yogi Berra managed the 1964 Yankees, but was fired at the end of the season and became a coach with the New York Mets in the NL.

Cards Swap Taylor for Woodshick

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals traded right-handed relief pitcher Ron Taylor to the Houston Astros for left-handed reliever Hal Woodshick Monday night.

Also involved in the trade was left-hander Mike Cuellar of Jacksonville of the International League who went to the Astros for right-hander Chuck Taylor of Houston's Amarillo farm club of the Texas League.

The trade was completed during Monday night's 5-2 Cardinal victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Taylor hurled 4-2-3 shutout innings for his second victory in three decisions and then learned of the trade after the game.

Cardinal Manager Red Schoendienst said he still would have made the trade even after Taylor's performance. "We needed a left-hander in the bullpen and Taylor was in demand," Schoendienst said.

Larry Cook, 37, Lewiston, told officers he was driving across the bridge when he noticed a pickup truck stopped. He said he offered to take its driver into Lewiston for gasoline.

Cook said the man, identified as Eslick, started to get into his car, then walked to the bridge railing, waved and jumped into the water.

A note found in the pickup truck was addressed to Eslick's wife, Vivian. It read, "I'm truly sorry for all the unhappiness I have caused you."

Eslick was co-owner of a large farm near Dayton and owned a bowling alley there.

Klan Leader Not Welcome In Britain

LONDON (UPI) — The government said Tuesday it will refuse to allow American Ku Klux Klan Imperial wizard Robert Shelton to enter Britain if he tries to come here.

Home Secretary Sir Frank Soskice said in a reply to a question in the House of Commons, "I have seen press reports about this projected visit. If Mr. Robert Shelton or any other foreigner identified as being engaged in the activities of the Ku Klux Klan arrives here he will be refused leave to land."

Shelton, of Tuscaloosa, Ala., was reported to have planned a trip to Britain within the next eight weeks.

A branch of Ku Klux Klan started up recently in Birmingham in the English Midlands, where several KKK-style crosses were burned outside colored immigrants' homes in the past week. A few have also been burned in the London area.

Pope Considers Trip to U.N.

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul VI is "seriously considering" a trip to United Nations headquarters in New York to dramatize the need for world peace, high-level Vatican sources said today.

The visit, sources said, would most likely take place next year and might balance a trip the pontiff is hoping to make to Communist-ruled Poland on the occasion of the 1,000th anniversary of the advent of Christianity there.

The sources did not say exactly when the American visit would take place. But it almost certainly would have to wait until the Ecumenical Council ends. The historic gathering is expected to complete its fourth and final session in mid-December.

New Respect

PUEBLO, Colo. AP — Three high school sophomores have received court sentences designed to teach them respect for the printed word.

The teen-agers pleaded guilty to smearing paint and linseed oil throughout Pueblo's newly constructed library. Damages were estimated at \$3,000.

District Court Judge Edward M. Yacklich sentenced the boys Monday to read and submit a written report on a book-a-month until they finish high school.

Fishing for Salmon Is Wiped Out

PORTLAND (UPI) — The entire summer commercial Salmon fishing season in the Columbia River was wiped out today by the Oregon Fish Commission and the Washington Department of Fisheries.

The action came after fish biologists predicted a small run and said adequate reproduction required that nearly all the fish reach the spawning grounds.

It was the first time in history the summer season has been abolished completely. It was restricted to just two days for Chinook and three days for Sockeye Salmon last year.

Commercial fishermen went along with the closure. Tod Bugas, Astoria, Ore., Secretary of the Columbia River Tuna Packers Association, said his organization "in good conscience" could not ask for a season.

However, the fishermen and cannery demanded that the Yakima Indian tribe also halt its commercial fishing in the stream. The Indians' season opened yesterday above Bonneville Dam.

Robert Jim, chairman, tribal council's fish and wildlife committee, said it would discuss the situation immediately and indicated an emergency closure would be passed in 48 hours.

The biologists predicted a summer run of only 50,000 Chinook and pointed out that continuation of the run is based on an escapement of 80,000 to 90,000 fish. Last year's run was estimated at 91,000.

The Sockeye run is expected to be 80,000, the number for escapement. That run has declined steadily from 300,000 in 1957.
