

Tax Cut Bill to Be Discussed by Senate Leaders

WASHINGTON (UP)—Senate leaders hoped to get started today on a Senate-House conference to complete congressional action on the \$4.7-billion excise tax cut bill. "There is a strong push to get this bill to the White House as soon as possible," said Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., floor manager of the bill the Senate passed 84 to 3 Tuesday night. It was to get the bill on President Johnson's desk by Friday.

Both Senate and House must approve the recommendations of the conference committee. Long said he hoped the first stage excise cuts would go into effect about 10 days before July 1. This assumes the House will go along with the Senate on this date. The House bill specifies July 1 as the effective date for the first stage.

This is one of the major differences in the two bills, and Senate sources said they understood House conferees would accept their version.

Another major difference is in the treatment of the excise tax on autos, the biggest item in the bill amounting to \$1.9 billion a year.

Johnson asked for a cut of half of the present 10 per cent auto tax to 5 per cent. The House voted for repeal of the entire 10 per cent tax in stages ending in 1969.

The Senate also refused to go along with the President on this. But it voted to retain 1 per cent of the tax, yielding about \$190 million a year, to get rid of unprofitable roadside auto graveyards.

Then the Senate adopted an amendment eliminating the remaining 4 per cent conditioned on the agreement of auto makers to build the same safety devices into their cars which the federal government requires on autos it buys.

Both houses agreed that two items, the repeal of the first 3 per cent of the auto tax and 10 per cent of the tax on air conditioners, would be retroactive to May 15, when Johnson first announced his recommendations.

A second series of cuts would go into effect next Dec. 31 or Jan. 1, and a third series would be scheduled in 1967, 1968 and 1969.

After enactment of the bill, the only major excises left will be those on cigarettes, liquor, wine, beer, air travel, gasoline and other highway-related items.

Officers Probe Mishap Report

Deputy Sheriff Curtis Pryor said damage was estimated at \$500 to a car owned by Larry Roy, 19, Buhl. It was reported the windows were broken in the car.

The fighting among the youths reportedly began about 10 p.m. in Twin Falls and continued after the group traveled toward Buhl.

A passing motorist reported the fighting at Cedar Crossing to the state police. Patrolman Richard Burns and the deputy sheriff were called at 1 a.m. Wednesday. James Louder, Buhl policeman, assisted in the investigation.

21 Killed in Dominican, U. S. Fire

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—Sharp explosions and gunfire echoed today in the heart of Santo Domingo, where a daylong battle Tuesday between rebels and U.S. troops left 21 Dominicans dead and 24 American paratroopers wounded.

The gunfire, however, was described as moderate to light. During the night, mortar shells landed in the rebel sector at intervals of 15 to 30 minutes after a cease-fire ended the big battle.

The rebels suggested that the mortar fire came from troops of the military-civilian junta in the northern sector of the capital, on the far side of the international safety zone occupied by the Inter-American Force.

Rebel leaders claimed U.S. troops began the firing near a power plant just below the eastern tip of the international safety zone. The plant had been under attack almost nightly from raiding parties from within the rebel lines.

The firing was the heaviest involving U.S. troops since American forces were sent to the Dominican Republic April 28. A cease-fire was arranged at 8:30 p.m. by Brazilian Gen. Hugo Panasco Alvim, commander of the Inter-American Force, and Col. Francisco Caamano Dero, the rebel chief-in-charge.

Charges are pending Wednesday against some half-dozen youths who were involved in an incident Tuesday night two and a quarter miles east of Buhl at Cedar Crossing.

At noon Thursday, a Flag Day ceremony will be held in the Twin Falls City Park, where the Twin Falls Municipal band, under the direction of Charles L. Ratchiff, will present a concert. Flag Day services will be conducted by officers of the Twin Falls Lodge.

Golf tournaments for both men and women will be held Thursday at Blue Lakes Country Club at 1:30 p.m. and a trapshoot will be held at the same time at the Twin Falls Gun Club.

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Burley Man Killed In Highway Mishap

BURLEY — Daniel R. King, 701 E. Hilland Drive, Burley, was killed instantly about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday when the westbound 1963 Ford panel truck he was driving struck the back of a highway repair truck on Interstate 80N about 10 miles east of here. Idaho State Patrolman Charles Peugh said King's vehicle hit the back of an Idaho Highway Department roadway patching truck working in the right lane. He said adequate signs had been posted around the truck and amber and red blinking lights also were being used to warn motorists of the repair work being done on a section of the highway.

William E. Satchwell, 32, Rupert, was in the back of the dump bed of the highway

department's 1964 International truck, but was uninjured. Peugh said skid marks indicated Mr. King had attempted to stop the car, which hit the See FATALITY, Page 2, Col. 6

Elmore Holds Runoff Vote On Road Plan

GLENN'S FERRY — A runoff election Tuesday in Elmore county on administration of the county's secondary road system showed support for Proposal No. 3, which would divide the county into highway districts independent of the county commission.

With four of the 18 precincts still to report, 461 votes were cast for the third proposal and 408 votes were cast for Proposal No. 1, which would place administration of all secondary roads with the county commission.

In an election held May 18 three proposals were on the ballot, but none of them received a majority vote. The runoff election was held on the first and third proposals, which gained the most support in the earlier balloting.

The second proposal, which would have placed the system in one highway district independent of the county commission, received only 180 votes on May 18 and was not included on the ballot in Tuesday's election.

Votes from the four remaining small, outlying precincts are not expected to change the outcome.

RUNS AGAIN LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (AP)—Congo's president Joseph Kasavubu will run for a second term, the government news agency announced today. Presidential elections are tentatively scheduled for December.

Astronauts Welcomed in Home Towns

JACKSON, Mich. (AP)—Jackson gave a spectacular "conquering hero" welcome home today to its astronaut, James McDivitt, back from space 13 days.

His home town of 55,000 was jammed by an estimated 125,000 persons, most of whom lined a parade route.

While the Gemini 4 pilot was being welcomed here, his space-walking twin, Edward H. White II, from whom he was separated Tuesday night, was receiving a similar reception at his native San Antonio, Tex., home.

Together since their splash-down in the Atlantic a week ago Monday, McDivitt and White received honorary doctor of astronautical science degrees from their alma mater, the University of Michigan at nearby Ann Arbor Tuesday.

They parted at Jackson's airport, where some 15,000 turned out Tuesday night to greet them. The two will be reunited Thursday at the White House.

Government Convoy Hit In Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A large Viet Cong force ambushed a government convoy 15 miles southwest of Saigon today, apparently captured the American adviser with the unit and shot down a helicopter sent in to relieve the convoy, U.S. spokesmen announced. One of the American crewmen aboard the helicopter was killed and the other three were seriously wounded, the spokesman said. The helicopter reportedly exploded in the air and crashed. In another part of Viet Nam, two U.S. Air Force fighters collided and crashed, the spokesman announced. They said one pilot parachuted to safety and was picked up but may have been wounded.

No one was seen parachuting from the other plane before it crashed, the spokesman reported. Both planes were A1 propeller-driven fighters, which normally carry two persons.

A terrorist bomb exploded in the civilian terminal building of the Saigon airport, injuring 34 Americans and at least 12 other persons, but 120 U.S. troops waiting a short distance away to board two jet transports for the United States were not harmed.

None of the Americans was reported seriously injured. In the convoy ambush southwest of Saigon, an estimated several hundred guerrillas attacked a unit of about 40 Vietnamese militia led by a district chief and his U.S. Army adviser.

The district chief escaped during the fight, but the American was reported missing and it was not immediately known if any of the militiamen escaped.

The helicopter apparently was hit in a fuel tank by an incendiary bullet. Another helicopter evacuated the surviving crewmen and the body of the dead American.

In addition to the 34 Americans wounded in the airport blast, 9 Vietnamese, 2 Indians and 1 French national were reported injured, a U.S. spokesman said. Other reports said two French citizens were hurt.

All the injured Americans were reported working in the terminal building or on business there. Military spokesmen said 17 were Army personnel, 15 were Air Force men and 2 were Navy.

The majority were released after treatment, the spokesman said, and the most seriously injured person appeared to be a Vietnamese who suffered a broken leg.

Security officials said the bomb was a plastic explosive weighing between 10 and 20 pounds. It exploded in an Air France freight office overlooking the main waiting room.

The concrete terminal was showered with debris and broken glass. Every window in the building was blown out and a section of the roof collapsed.

The airport was closed to commercial traffic. Officials said it probably would not reopen before Thursday morning.

All ballots should be returned to the Chamber of Commerce by 4 p.m. June 25. The new board of directors will meet June 29 to elect officers for the coming year.

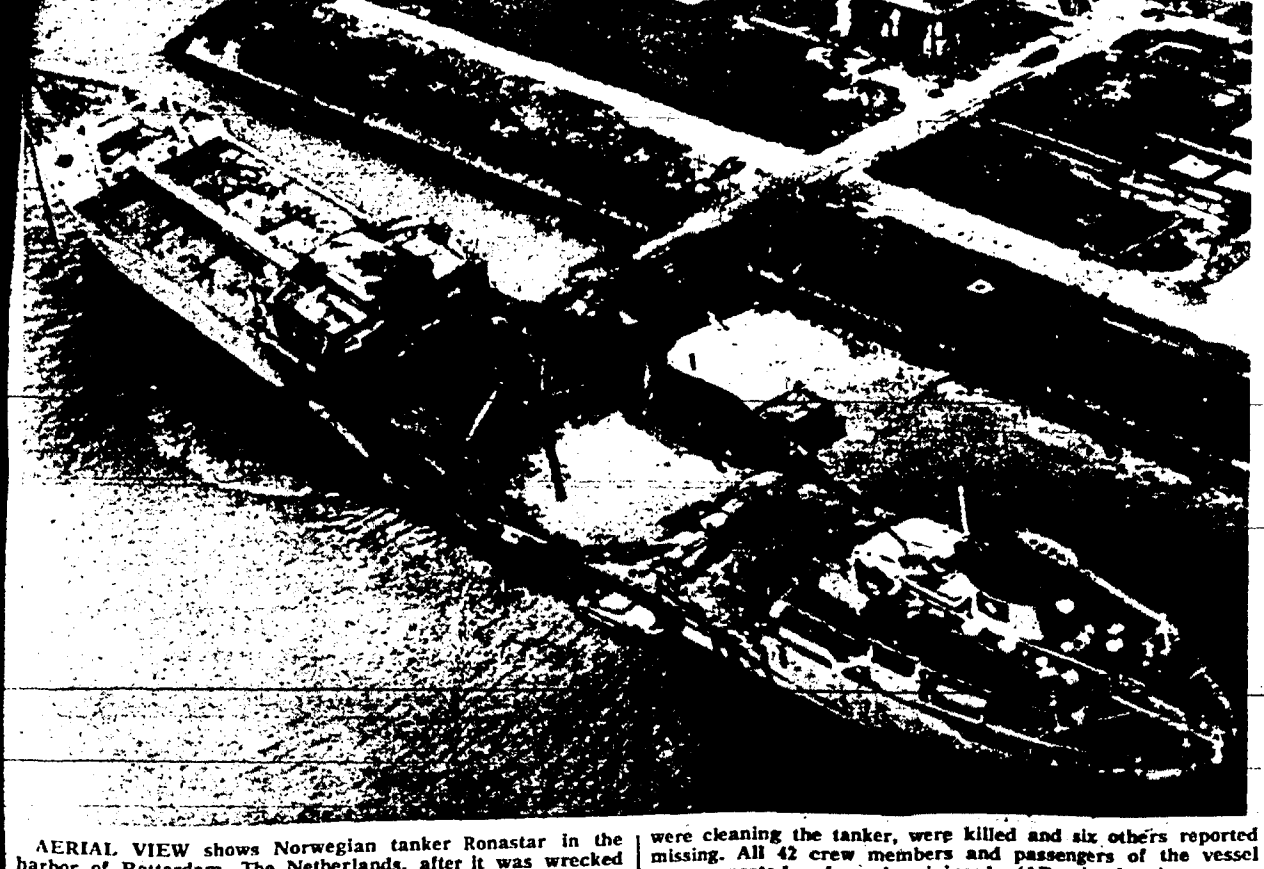

Maritime Engineers Call Strike

NEW YORK (UPI)—Maritime engineers struck 12 major shipping companies including the country's major passenger lines today when negotiators failed to reach agreements for new contracts.

The Marine Engineers Beneficial Association MEBA issued the strike order to its 10,000 members at midnight, expiration date for the current contracts.

MEBA members in Eastern and Gulf ports were ordered to picket ships of the 12 shipping firms represented by the American Merchant Marine Institute (AMMI) management group.

This includes the United States Lines, Moore-McCormack Lines, Grace Line, Farrell Lines, Lykes Bros. Shipping Co., and seven other companies which operate a total of about 190 ships.

Pickets were immediately ordered out in New York, but officials in Houston, Norfolk, Va., Morehead City, N. C., and other ports said early today they had received no official word of the strike. They said union members stood ready to begin picketing on orders from union officials.

Since the strike affects only those ships currently in port, its full effect probably will not be felt for several days.

But a prolonged walk-out could tie up lines engaged in the lucrative summer tourist trade and seriously hamper cargo shipments from all Eastern and Gulf ports.

Idaho Collecting Ahead of 1964

BOISE (AP) — With Idaho tax collections running nearly \$5 million ahead of last year, Gov. Robert E. Smylie was optimistic Tuesday that state spending over the last two years will balance at the end of June.

The current biennium ends June 30, at which time the constitution requires a balanced budget. Smylie told newsmen the state tax collector's latest monthly report indicates Idaho will achieve one.

The report says general tax fund collections in May brought the total for the year to \$39,639,438, compared to \$34,780,259 during the same period in 1964.

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NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Along about mid-November, kindly forward my mail to that third desert isle to the left out Galapagos way. Meg and Tony will be in town about then, and I refuse to suffer from the nausea induced by the sight, sound—and smell—of Americans bowing and scraping to jokers who beat the immigration laws by giving their occupation a "royalty."

Their formal names are Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon, and although they have worked hard only at earning a reputation as a couple of international beatniks, they will be received by a certain preposterous segment of this Republic as folks of high distinction. It says in some small print somewhere that they are God's elect, elevated to their imposing status by divine right.

NEAT, GAUDY COUP—This is a device invented many centuries ago by a passel of loafers who wished to perpetuate their idleness and secure for themselves six square meals a day and exemption from good manners. They got together, lapped up some hooch, and announced heaven had decreed that henceforth they should run the world, and off with the heads of citizens who refused to buy their gold brick.

Happily, several were persuaded the masses that kings and their equally useless kin were human, after all, and one the whole a vicious lot. So they started liquidating rulers named Louis and Otto and Franz Joseph and Alfonso, until today there are only a few royal houses left, including those penny-dreadful establishments in Greece and Monaco. Out of sheer boredom, British royalty periodically pays state visits to happier countries which set a good table and whose citizens can be counted on to tolerate the outlandish flummery these dead-beats peddle.

FRESH FROM MAYFAIR—Apparently Buckingham palace has drawn lots and decided it is Meg's and Tony's turn to tease the animals. They will come here fresh—if that is the word—from the dives of Mayfair and Soho, a royal couple which has shown its contempt for its subjects by a kind of sordid extravagance and by providing the daily meat and potatoes for juicy gossip.

Both, of course, are imposters even in the strange realm of royalty. Snowdon is an exquisite dilettante who has loitered on the untidy fringes of what passes these days for the world of arts and letters. He's a photographer on the odd St. Swithin's Days when he works.

NOT EVEN ENGLISH—Meg, like her sister Queen Elizabeth and her surly brother-in-law, Phillip, is not even English, but the descendant of some crazy and incestuous German kings imported in his hundred years ago to keep the Englishman in his place. The family name was Sax-Coburg-Gotha until Meg's grand p.a.w. George V changed it to Windsor during that bit of deadly nonsense known as World War I. But she still waves that old divine right, although Mama was a commoner and therefore, possibly, not quite as phony as royalty's run of the mill.

I do not know what Meg and Tony expect to unearth in their investigation of the American scene, but it's a shame they will be exposed to the usual gaggle of sympering tea-party females and wrist-dangling males who always clutter up any royal visit. I know some folks in Texas and Massachusetts who could persuade them that an occasional day's work is good for the blood. It might even change it from blue to red.

Views of Others

TAXES GO UP
The Minnesota Taxpayers Association compiled statistics showing real estate taxes in Minnesota have gone up about seven per cent in the past year. They will cost a total of \$489 million in 1965, up some \$32,500,000 from a year ago.

Only five of Minnesota's 87 counties will pay a lower mill rate than in 1964. Two of these counties are in Southern Minnesota, Olmstead, where Rochester is the county seat, and Waseca where the city of Waseca is the county seat. Both will have an increase total tax bill in dollars but, because of a growth in taxable property, will have a lower mill rate.

An overwhelming percentage of the counties, therefore, will find the taxpayers handing over a greater number of dollars than a year ago. All of which means the value of taxable property hasn't grown as fast as the cost of maintaining government. Blue Earth county, with Mankato as the county seat, is about as close to the average as can be found in the state. Last year the state wide average tax rate was 235.22 mills, in Blue Earth county it was 239.87 mills. This year the average for the state is 244.80 mills, in Blue Earth county it is 243.38 mills. Yet there are as many protests in Blue Earth county about the increasing tax rate as in any county in Minnesota.

The point this demonstrates is that the entire state is having difficulty adding taxable property at a rate equal to the climbing expenditures. This means we either must get more industry to add to our real estate property tax base or we must broaden our taxes. Under the present setup, with the mounting costs of education and the maintenance of mental hospitals, there is no relief in the future from the amount of money needed for public expenditures.—Mankato (Minn.) Free Press.

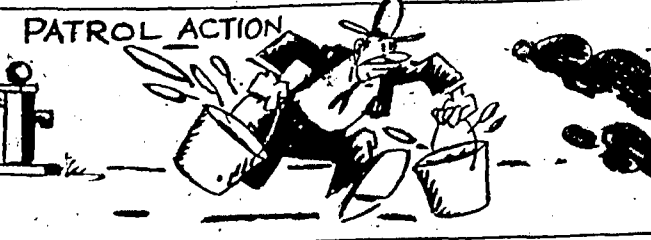
DOUBLE PUNISHMENT
In this dolorous season of the year, many millions of taxpayers must go through the arduous exercise of making out their income tax forms not merely once but twice. They must answer to both Federal and State authorities, by totally different computations, different rules, different sets of exclusions and deductions. In the District of Columbia alone the waste of energy runs to many hundreds of thousands of man hours each year, and the District Government deserves great public gratitude for its proposal to end this devastating nuisance.

After four years of labor, the District's financial specialists have devised a bill to bring the F.I.T.'s income tax law into conformity with the Federal code. The citizen will be able to take the taxable income figure from his Federal return, apply it to the District's tax table and, at a single stroke of the pen, finish his return.

Paying an income tax is never an undiluted pleasure, but the egregious consumption of evenings and weekends in bungling accountancy is grounds for real resentment. One is forced to go back over all of the extravagances of the past year, all of the injudicious investments, all of the money that somehow leaked away without leaving a trace. It is like walking through a graveyard. The trip is painful enough to perform once; having to do it twice is intolerable. If Congress acts promptly to pass the legislation, it will be in effect when the 1965 taxes fall due. Common humanity urges Congress to make haste.—Washington Post.

Interpreting The News

WASHINGTON (AP)—This is switch time in American history when the President and the Supreme Court wear the big shoulders and the usually cantankerous Congress trots meekly behind President Johnson.

It wasn't always like this, may not be like this for long as Johnson gets deeper into his four-year term, deeper into the Vietnamese war, deeper into what he calls the "Great Society."

His November landslide victory, carrying his Democrats into crushing control of Congress, got him off to a good start unmatched since President Franklin D. Roosevelt's first term.

Technician Johnson has cajoled and cornered members of House and Senate into shouting "amen" to his programs. But this is an unnatural condition, for President and Congress, the natural condition is tooth and claw.

This Supreme Court under Chief Justice Earl Warren, strongest and most alive since the first 35 years of the 19th century when the captain was Chief Justice John Marshall, plunges in where Congress fears to tread.

In sweeping thrusts, one after the other, it has given motion to civil rights, new meaning to separation of church and state with its bans on compulsory school prayers, new protections to individuals, new political equality for voters with its rulings on reapportionment.

In the truest sense it is a contemporary tribunal, in contrast with the court which barricaded Roosevelt's first four years.

He had to watch those unforgettable nine old men of the early 1930s, whose reasoning in most cases had not advanced beyond the last quarter of the 19th century, embalm his New Deal legislation so necessary in a new and tragic era.

In desperation he called for court-packing and failed, but in one sense only. His purpose was achieved while his plan was ignored.

TAYLOR'S VIEWS ON WORLD NEWS

The kindness that the Johnson administration is killing us with is our own money. The politicians do the talking and then ascend us the bill—inflation. The average American family spends about a third of its income for food. Undoubtedly you've heard of the couple who said they were once so broke they ate hamburgers for a week and are broke. Debt? We drink about 440 million cups of coffee a day. If a dollar it would take us about two years to drink up the national debt.

It would take us nearly a month each year to drink up just the interest on the national debt. Yet all that President Johnson offers is to borrow more and more to pay for tax reductions.

As one result, the Washington spenders are whirling inflation through our whole centrifugal structure like a economic pump and the effect on the housewife's pocketbook and budget is a race to nowhere.

The declining value of a currency follows the rule of a dropping weight. It accelerates. Price indexes have been quite steady, edging upward for a long time, but in April living costs rose at an annual rate of 3.8 per cent, according to official figures.

In May the rise continued and the June estimates are even higher. The up-rate this year is nearly three times as great as in 1964.

The Washington canyons where the computers chug-chug also tick out the prices of "sensitive commodities" and report them officially each business day. These prices now average

10.7 per cent higher than last year. But when you cut loose from the government statistics and get out into the stores, as an Associated Press survey did recently, the wound bleeds even worse.

The survey showed that most food prices are about 15 per cent above a year ago. Washington statistics notwithstanding, and even Mr. Johnson's own White House economists estimate that his 1964 farm bill will boost the housewife's food bill another \$300 million this year and send bread up another cent a loaf.

Prime steaks are winning the race in rising meat costs. Steaks now cost more per pound than an automobile. Restaurants are paying up to \$4.50 a pound for prime boneless cuts, about double the price of a year ago.

The Great Society barred migratory Mexican workers from farm work in California and elsewhere at the immediate expense of every housewife in the country.

With fruit and vegetable crops instantly reduced—yes, the effect in many places was actually that fast—prices in many areas have skyrocketed.

Meanwhile, our wheat exports have fallen to an estimated \$50 million for this crop year compared to about \$600 million in 1964, and this also leaves our public holding the bag.

Yet the politicians themselves never had it so good. In not a single major instance are our spenders sacrificing anything whatever in their comforts and extravagances, their free-loading, their empire-building or the political tomph in their programs to stop the dwindling purchasing power of our money.

Can't we please, please blow the whistle on their spending game while their game is on? If they're to be rewarded by our cheers of support in their shoddy charade merely because they talk of economy all the time, we must be as dumb as they think we are—or dumber.

Total Sale Determines Sales Tax

(Editor's Note: Collection of Idaho's new sales and use tax begins July 1. This is one in a series of stories by The Associated Press on regulations, drafted by the Idaho tax collector's office, governing payment and collection of the tax.)

BOISE (AP) — The amount of sales tax to be collected on any purchase is determined by the total sale.

If five items are sold, each with a difference in price but totaling \$5, a tax of 15 cents is collected.

To aid the retailer in determining the tax under the bracket system, the Idaho tax collector's office has available a printed card showing tax due on purchases up to \$50.

The use of this bracket system is optional but most retailers are expected to use it because of its convenience.

Although tax must be collected on the basis of each transaction, the retailer is required to report and pay tax to the state measured by his gross receipts.

He pays to the state 3 per cent of those gross receipts. If, by use of the bracket system, he has collected more than the amount due the state, he keeps the excess as his compensation.

Each retailer must obtain a seller's permit. It will be issued by the tax collector's office and application forms are available from the state tax collector's office in Boise or from field offices in Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Nampa, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

Civic organizations which sell tangible personal property or which sponsor events for which admissions are charged also must have the seller's permits.

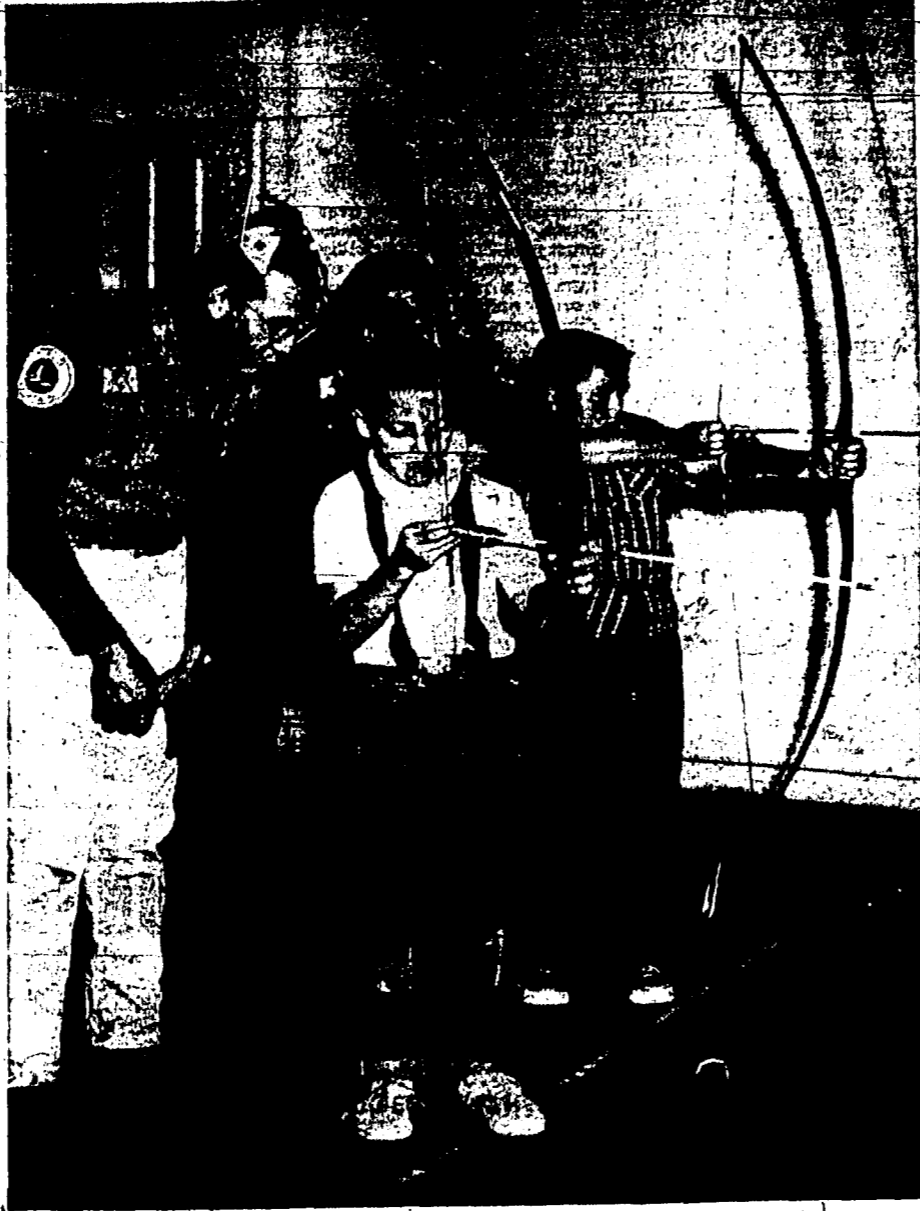

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Watch for an old rivalry between the Air Force and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to flare anew if the upcoming first launch of a giant rocket called Titan 3C is successful.

Titan 3C, most powerful yet tested, is standing on Pad 40 at Cape Kennedy, Fla., waiting for a go-ahead.

The 2 1/2-million-pound-thrust booster has been rejected by NASA as a manned vehicle.

The Air Force, however, insists it will do military jobs much better than the Saturn vehicles being developed by NASA.

Titan 3C could easily become the most controversial rocket in U.S. space history, especially if success gives Air Force friends in Congress and the Department of Defense new ammunition for undercover sharp shooting at the Saturn family of boosters scheduled to take men to the moon by 1970.

National policy decisions so far have been consistently relegated to the Air Force to a secondary role in manned space plans — the United States is pledged to peaceful, nonmilitary, exploitation of space.

Officially, the Air Force has yielded gracefully. In corridors and cloak rooms, however, there are many who insist the United States is falling behind in capability to spy and counter-spy from space.

As one source close to the Air Force says, "We were good boys for years. It was all right with us for NASA to conduct all the manned shots, so long as they let us simultaneously develop a manned capability against the time when we would need it."

"But about 18 months ago the NASA people started touting Saturns as an all-around universal space booster. That was get-

Floods, Tornado Plague Colorado After Drought

Areas of northeastern Colorado which were baked dry in three years of drought Wednesday prepared for an onslaught of continued rainfall which already has sent rivers spilling over their banks and inundated at least two small communities.

Funnel clouds were sighted late Tuesday afternoon near Fort Collins and 35 miles east of Denver. Neither one apparently touched down.

At Loveland where a tornado struck Monday, residents and state and county officials were trying to clear up the debris.

Red Cross chapters from north central Colorado and southeastern Wyoming were at the scene, feeding and providing shelter for 350 storm victims and emergency workers.

They also are working at Security, Colo., near Colorado Springs, where 125 homes were reported affected by heavy winds and rain. Red Cross officials also were sent to Glendo, Wyo., to assist victims there.

About 10,000 acres of rich farm land near the Pawnee Creek in Logan County were under water and numerous homes were reported flooding in areas surrounding Sterling.

Water was lapping at the Sterling city limits early Wednesday morning, but it was reported receding U.S. 6, between Atwood and Sterling, was under more than a foot of water for more than three miles.

Sterling officials said they believed there was no danger to the city. Some livestock was reported lost, but there was no estimate of damage.

Nearly 250 residents of Atwood were evacuated Tuesday when the Pawnee Creek splashed over its banks.

A flash flood swamped the small town of Galeson, 15 miles northeast of Greeley, late Monday. The Colorado State Patrol evacuated four carloads of residents before roads into the community were closed.

Residents of the Colorado Springs suburbs of Security and Stratmoor Hills spent much of Tuesday, mopping up after a cloudburst and hailstorm sent water through the communities.

Damage was estimated at close to half a million dollars.

Hills said a culvert on a hill near his home gave way, forcing piles of hail through a single basement window until it piled up to the nine-foot ceiling — and then up the basement stairs.

"It's unbelievable," said a Ft. Carson soldier helping to mop up the area. "We've been working on this for hours and there's still more than a foot of hail in here."

The Colorado State Patrol was busy handling traffic on the state highways. Several roads were reported under water and highway officials were rerouting traffic where possible.

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Tourists Like Africa Despite Turmoil

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — It isn't all chaos and tumult in Africa.

Despite political maneuvering, revolts, coups and mutinies, the tourists have never stopped visiting Africa.

Big-game hunters went on shooting and taking pictures throughout army mutinies in Kenya and Tanzania last year. At the height of an army mutiny in the Congo, a party of 18 American tourists arrived in Leopoldville. They made their pictures, looked over the museum, the shops and the local life and continued the tour.

Communist Chinese weapons and ammunition are arriving regularly in Tanzania for a possible showdown with the remaining white rulers in southern Africa. The rate of tourist arrivals in Tanzania is up 30 per cent this year, a government official said.

In Mozambique, where the "freedom fighters" already are at work, hotel rooms at resorts are hard to find.

Where else can you take a taxi, ride 10 minutes and find yourself watching zebras, giraffe and ostriches at play and lions sleeping under a bush? They do it every day in Nairobi.

Colonialism is now a dirty word in Africa, but life hasn't changed much for the visitor. You can expect almost anything in Africa.

For example: The drinking water in Beira, Mozambique, comes from the Pungwe River. The Pungwe River also is full of crocodiles and hunters are having a field day, since crocodile skin is selling for a dollar a square inch in France.

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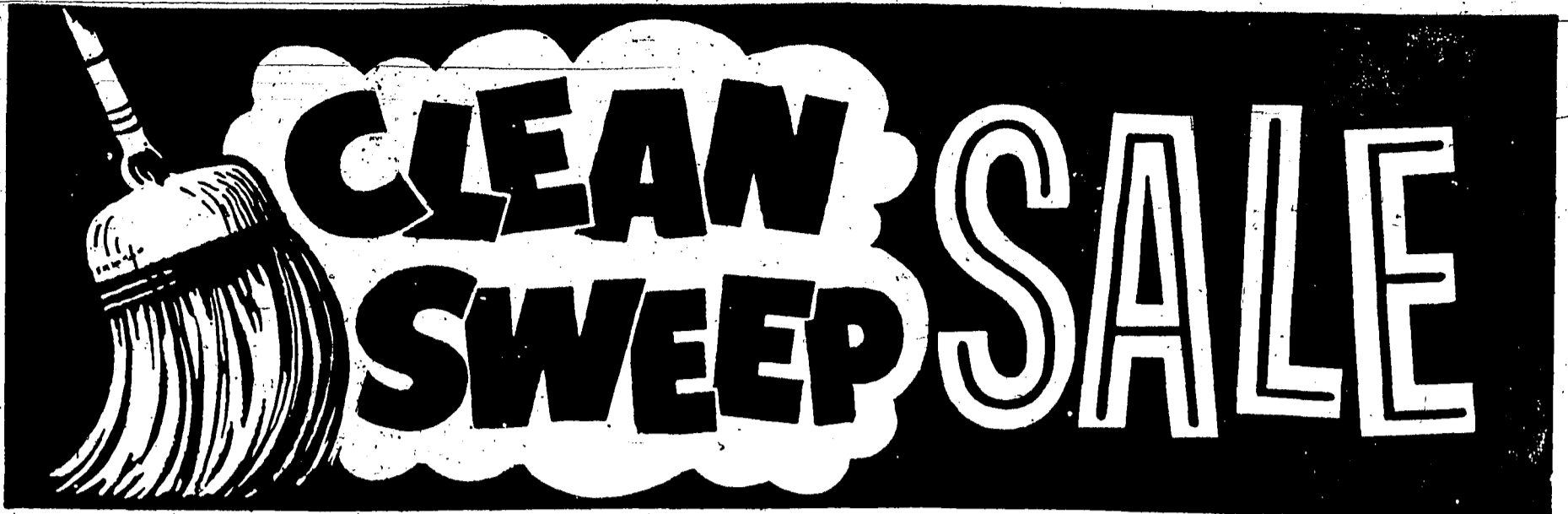

New Balance Is Called for By De Gaulle

SAINT-GERMAINE - EN-LAYE, France (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle today urged the nations of the continent to join France in establishing "a balance from one end of Europe to the other."

He said this would lead them to become "the champions of peace."

De Gaulle made his remarks at the beginning of another "grassroot" tour of the suburban Paris area. The tour started under some of the strictest security precautions of

the president's long and eventful regime.

De Gaulle said the United States and Russia gained power because of Europe's temporary weakness "and because these two great states have a semi-monopoly of atomic weapons and space resources."

De Gaulle long has been a proponent of an independent nuclear force for France. He continued:

"So each of them seeks—and that is only human—to extend its hegemony well beyond its frontiers. One does so by imposing a totalitarian regime on its satellites. The other one does so by different means, admittedly less troublesome and less severe, consisting of offering its protection and its help—and of intervening when necessary with military forces, as

Equalization Of Taxes Set Here June 28

Taxpayers wishing to contest tax assessments levied on their real property by the County Assessor's office may do so on June 28 when the County Commissioners will meet as the County Board of Equalization, it was announced Tuesday.

"If a real property taxpayer feels the assessment on his property is unequal with the assessment on other real property he should visit with his assessor to get adjustments.

If the taxpayer still feels he is being unequally taxed he may then appeal to the Board of Equalization.

Personal property taxpayers must wait until July 5 to appeal the assessment on personal property.

The commission, while sitting as Board of Equalization, also will hear application for exemption from payment of taxes.

The law provides all applicants for exemption, who are making their first application, must appear before the board and testify under oath, before June 21.

New Refuge Is Approved For Wildlife

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new 13,000-acre national wildlife refuge in Idaho and additions totaling 9,507 acres for five existing refuges were authorized Tuesday by the Migratory Bird Conservation Commission.

Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall, who also heads the commission, said the newly authorized Grays Lake National Wildlife Refuge, 26 miles north of Soda Springs in Southeastern Idaho, was once one of the most productive natural water fowl areas in the Western United States.

The refuges to be enlarged are: Eastern Neck National Wildlife Refuge in Maryland; Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge in Tennessee; Ravalli National Wildlife Refuge in Montana; Okfenokee National Wildlife Refuge in Georgia and Moosehorn National Wildlife Refuge in Maine.

The Grays Lake area has been under a public land withdrawal since 1907 to supply irrigation water for the Fort Hall Indian Reservation. A dense bullrush growth has filled in much of the lake as a result of fluctuating water levels and its value to waterfowl and other wildlife has dropped.

The fish and wildlife service said no acquisition costs are involved. The 21 land owners abutting the new refuge claim riparian rights to portions of the lake bed, but all 21 have signed 99-year agreements that will permit establishment of the refuge, officials said.

RENO, Nev. (AP) — An attorney for three Idahoans charged with selling heroin asked the court Tuesday to permit a change of venue.

The request was made on behalf of Jerry Quillian, 34, and his wife, Betty, 28, both of Idaho Falls and David Fenton, 36, of Boise.

Each Quillian is charged on three separate counts with selling illicit narcotics to undercover agents. Fenton is charged in one indictment.

The Quillians were arrested in Reno May 19 and Fenton in Boise May 22.

A hearing is scheduled Wednesday afternoon on the motion to move the case to another area.

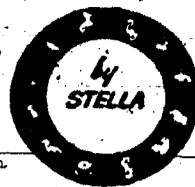

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Man Indicted For Threat To President

BUTTE (UPI) — A federal grand jury Tuesday indicted William Earl Clark, 29, on a charge of mailing a threat to kill President Johnson.

The jury also returned a kidnaping indictment against Jesse Bert Bishop Jr., who was accused of forcing two Montanans at gunpoint to drive him to Spokane, Wash., after robbing a Butte tavern.

Clark, a former Butte television station engineer, was charged in one count with mailing a letter to the President May 23 which used these words: "I am given (sic) you the chance to come here and I will kill you . . ."

The second count refers to a separate threat allegedly made in the letter saying, "I would rather kill you than anything in the world."

U.S. Dist. Atty. Moody Britt and his chief assistant, R. T. O'Leary, declined to reveal the full text of the letter or the nature of the grievance they said Clark appeared to hold against the President.

Clark was arrested June 4 on a complaint filed by a Secret Service agent.

Bishop, a 21-year-old transient from Florida, was charged with kidnaping Joseph M. Fogarty and a customer, Arthur Ellingson of Great Falls, into Fogarty's car for the drive to Spokane. The indictment said the kidnaping was "for the purpose of preventing Fogarty and Ellingson from reporting to law enforcement officials the fact of the robbery . . ."

Fogarty, 57, and Ellingson, 49, were released unharmed in Spokane by an abductor who held them at gunpoint during the ride from Butte across northern Idaho into eastern Washington.

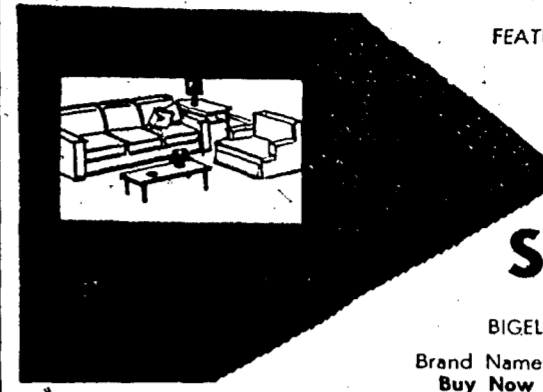

Beatles Are Almost Sorry For Award

LONDON (AP)—"It almost makes us wish we'd never got it," said Beatle John Lennon today of the fuss over Queen Elizabeth's award of royal citations to him and his three mop-top partners.

They were made members of the Order of the British Empire last week. This entitles the Beatles to add an "esquire" to their names and wear a medal.

"I can understand a few people saying they don't think much of it," Lennon said, "but for people actually to send back their MBE's to the queen—well, there must be something wrong with them."

Lennon's comment was the first from the Beatles since a howl of protest arose because the queen decorated the entertainers. British war heroes are returning their own royal awards in protest.

"I reckon we got it for exports, and the citation should have said that," Lennon said. The Beatles' personal appearances and record sales abroad have earned Britain several millions in various foreign currencies.

The award traditionally has been given for long and faithful service to Britain or for outstanding performance in the arts or professions. All such royal honors are made in the name of the monarch, but they are made on the recommendation of the prime minister.

Youth Builds Sub Following Tiff With Girl

DELMAR, Md. (AP)—A dispute with his girl friend has prompted Luther W. Mitchell Jr., 19, to build a bigger submarine.

"There was a controversy as to who was going to ride inside and who was going to ride outside with skin-diving gear," he said.

So Mitchell scrapped the submarine he had fashioned from a jet fuel pod and is building one from a larger fuel pod to accommodate two persons.

"I put the first one together in a hurry to get ready for a science fair and I knew then I'd have to take it apart again anyway," he said, explaining that it had to be dismantled and sealed to make it seaworthy.

"So I figured that as long as I was going to take it apart anyway, I might just as well use this larger pod."

"If everything goes right, it shouldn't take me more than a month."

Mitchell, who enters the Wallops Island branch of the University of Virginia this fall to study electrical engineering, has built almost all of the parts for the submarine himself, from the radios to the pressure tanks.

"I'm having problems getting the fuel tank," he said. "But I've got the motors and radios and everything. I've got all the parts now so it won't be a big job."

"I have a four-cycle Jeep engine that will operate a turbo-jet propulsion unit."

The turbo-jet motor will propel the sub by shooting a stream of water from the rear of the craft. By angling the stream, Mitchell says he can steer the vessel.

He hopes to use the submarine to explore the floor of the Atlantic Ocean off Cape Henlopen, Del., looking for wrecks.

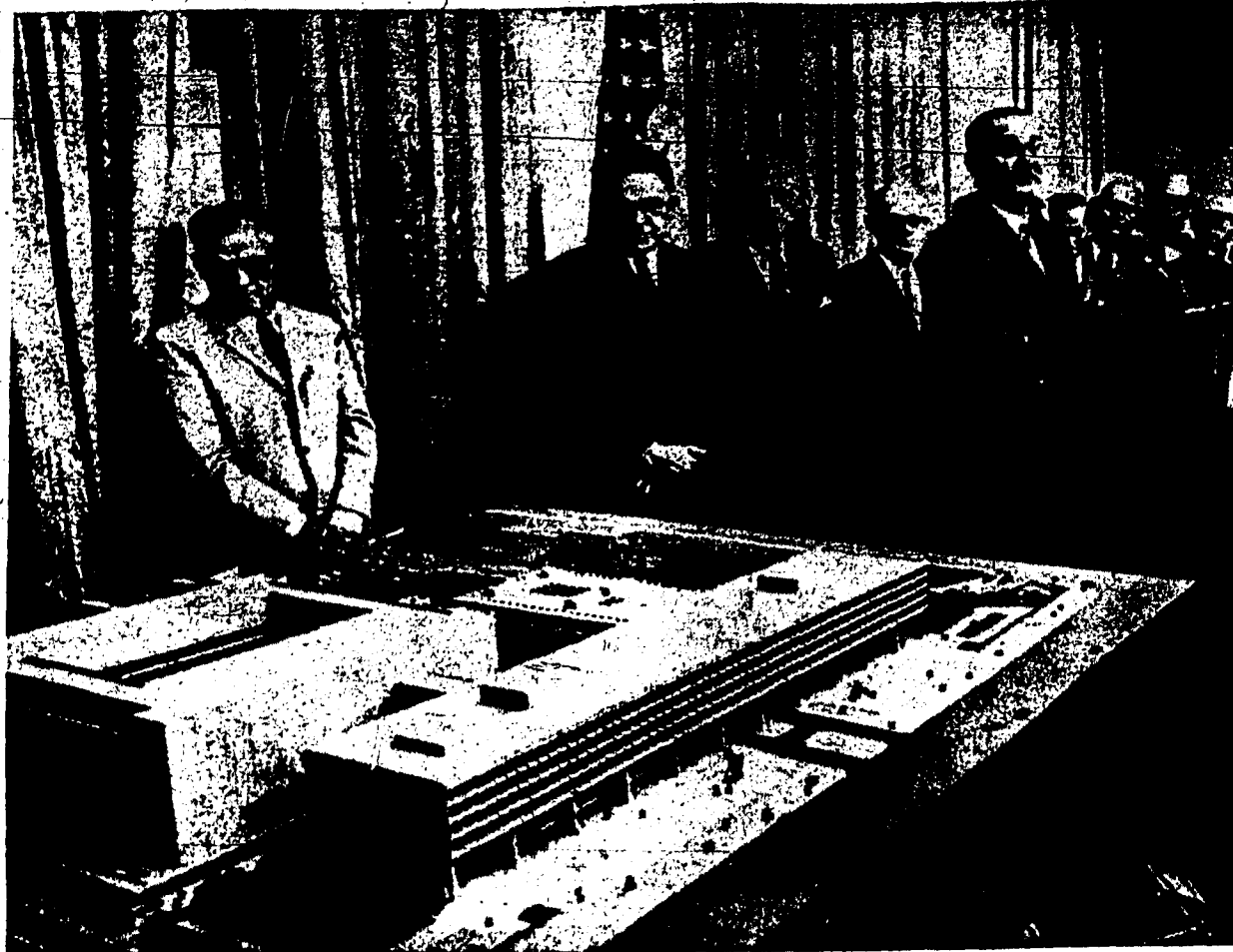

Poor, Good Students to Receive Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new effort to help poor but potentially brilliant students reach college was announced today by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

It will contribute \$2,194,640 to 16 colleges for the summer program, in which 2,370 students will be enrolled.

OEO director Sargent Shriver said the program is designed to cut what he called "America's greatest waste—the loss of skill and exceptional minds of those young people who are capable of going to college, but cannot do so because of the psychological, social and physical conditions of poverty."

The summer programs are expected to point the way toward year-round courses needed to prepare low-income youngsters for college admission. The efforts would be coordinated with other parts of what the administration calls its war on poverty.

A special committee of educators, headed by Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, former secretary of welfare in the Cabinet of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, will help organize a broad long-range program. Committee members will be named later.

The program follows efforts tested last year when a number of colleges planned special programs with financial help from the Carnegie Foundation.

Job Discrimination Law Gives Women Major Step

WASHINGTON (AP)—Women take a major step forward in the battle of the sexes July 2 when a new federal law bans job discrimination based on—among other things—sex.

Or, in some cases, it could be a step backward. If the law is interpreted strictly, the ladies may not always like it. It could wipe out state laws designed to protect them from dangerous work, and it might mean the end to special concessions like extra rest periods, earlier retirement and—yes, even maternity leave.

On the other hand, a lady with muscles who has always wanted to be, say, a jackham-

mer operator, may finally get her chance to overcome traditional male resistance.

Lawyers aren't too sure just what the law will do to traditional job lines between men and women. Asst. Atty. Gen. Norbert A. Schlei puts it this way: "It could become one of those lawyers' nightmares."

How did it all come about? When Congress wrote the 1964 Civil Rights Act, some Southern opponents threw the word "sex" into the equal employment opportunity section which also bans job discrimination based on race, color, religion and national origin.

Justice Department lawyers believe it was a move to gum up the bill. If it was, it may have succeeded.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, who was Senate floor leader when the bill was passed, said the sex provision would not wipe out laws in 43 states and the District of Columbia designed to protect women.

It is generally believed—although by no means certain—that the courts will not disturb most existing laws and practices.

"I am sure they won't rule that if someone refuses to hire a woman as a jackhammer operator that this is discrimination in violation of the law," says Donald Slaiman, director of the AFL-CIO civil rights department.

There is an exception in the law allowing hiring on the basis of sex if it is "a bona fide occupational qualification reasonably necessary to the normal operation of that particular business or enterprise."

That would seem to cover a job in a ladies'—or men's—locker room. But other areas are more shadowy.

Does the law mean a restaurant cannot advertise for a "waiter," because a waiter is a man?

"I think that advertising for waiters may be a violation; it may not be," said Slaiman. But as to state laws that protect women from certain dangerous work, limit the number of hours they can work and, in

some cases, how much they lift or carry, Schlei warned: "That is the area that is going to create a great deal of trouble. There is no way of knowing what attitude" the courts are going to take.

Richard K. Berg, Justice Department lawyer, sees trouble where state law or a labor contract gives women benefits denied to men, "such as rest periods, maternity benefits, and earlier retirement privileges."

Where it all will end, nobody is quite sure. Congress may have to amend the law later to keep the battle of the sexes from breaking out into open warfare.

"We'll just have to wait and see," sighed Schlei.

Bill Would Take Silver Out of Coins

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., introduced legislation Tuesday to eliminate silver from 50 cent pieces, as well as from dimes and quarters.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., promptly said he will fight the proposal.

"I don't think silver should be taken out of the quarter and dime, either," Magnuson said. "There is plenty of silver but they can't mine it at present prices."

Pastore offered his legislation as an amendment to a pending bill to eliminate silver from dimes and quarters, but allow 40 per cent of silver content in half dollars.

He said the bill in that form would only aggravate both the current coin and silver shortages. He insisted there just is not enough silver in the free world.

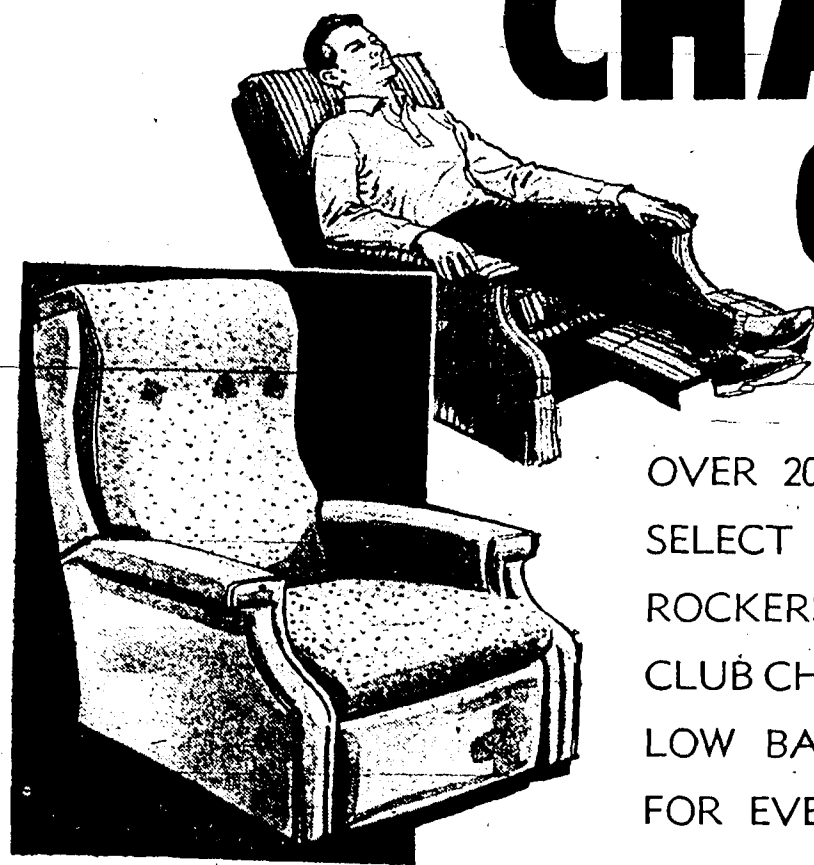

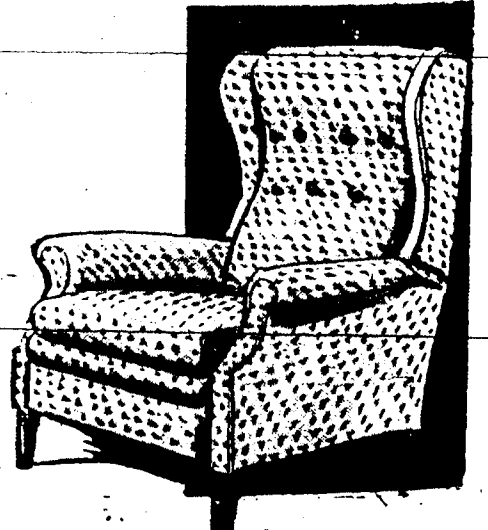

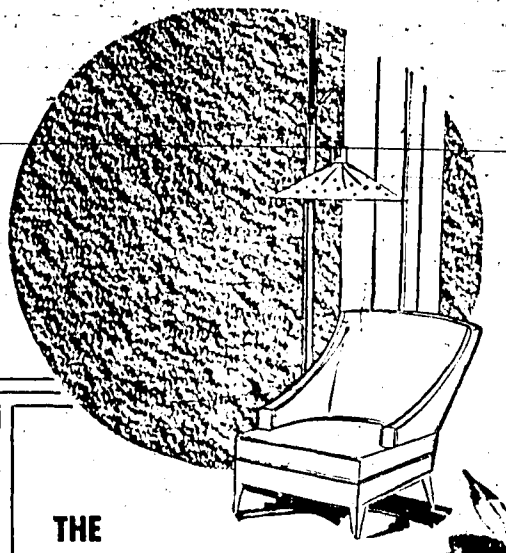

Crisis Could Change Latin America Life

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Dominican crisis has produced paradoxes which can mean something dramatically new for Latin America.

It has also produced dangers. There are a number of Latin American nations facing critical internal situations, politically and economically. One more explosion like that in the Dominican Republic, or one more military intervention, could have dire results for the hemisphere. And in at least one nation — Guatemala — there is a possibility of an internal explosion not unlike that in the Dominican Republic.

What has been the overall result of the Dominican crisis thus far? The answer must be a complex one, dealing with the paradoxes it has produced.

Even the United States' friends see the Dominican action as a mistake, not because they feel it was unnecessary, but because of the way the job was done — or not done, in the estimation of some.

Latin Americans who agree that the U.S. action in Santo Domingo may have averted a Castro-like takeover complain that something just as bad can result any way. Washington is criticized in these circles for failing to go all the way to end Col. Francisco Caamaño Domo's rebellion.

The initial impact of the Dominican crisis in Latin America was shock. Still, those who govern and belong to middle and upper classes seemed to recover fairly quickly. Worry about the results remains, but there is a broad body of opinion that it may prove healthy in the long run, not as the result of U.S. planning so much as because of reaction to shock treatment.

Few deny the crisis damaged the U.S. image, raised the ghost of the "big stick" and memories of past interventions. Few deny the crisis badly damaged the OAS, already ailing. Few deny the Caribbean events aroused feelings of insecurity in the hemisphere. Yet there have been oblique results which are being carefully weighed.

— There are indications that where governments publicly denounced the U.S. action, they strengthened themselves against attack from the extreme left on that score.

— There are signs that the Communist threat in Latin America is less menacing than had been expected when the Dominican crisis began. Communists and Castroists, plagued by their own divisions and confusions, seemed to lose support among young people. There are indications now that a majority of young people are weary of being led about by the noses by organizations of hoodlums whose only real ideology is violence.

Mayor Is Fair After Sleeping Pill Overdose

BUFFALO (UPI) — Republican Mayor Chester D. Kowal, indicted Tuesday on bribery charges, was found unconscious in his office this morning, apparently the victim of an overdose of sleeping pills.

Kowal was rushed to Columbus Hospital where he was reported in fair condition. A doctor at the hospital said the 60-year-old mayor had suffered "some sort of collapse," but Police Commissioner William H. Schneider said "there were signs the mayor consumed some pills."

Mrs. Kowal said her husband failed to return home Tuesday night. During the day he was arraigned in Erie County Court after hearing a reading of two holdover grand jury indictments charging him with six felonies and seven misdemeanors involving conspiracy, perjury and accepting illegal fees in connection with a city garbage disposal scandal.

AEC Plans Nuclear Test In Colorado

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Atomic Energy Commission has proposed detonating an underground nuclear explosive in Colorado's San Juan Basin to determine whether such a blast would increase the natural gas output in the Rocky Mountain region.

The proposal, made in an AEC study, was revealed Tuesday by U. S. Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo.

Allott said the nuclear device would be used to fracture tight gas-bearing formations at a site about 55 miles east of Farmington, N.M., near the Colorado border.

The senator said nuclear blasts might also be employed elsewhere in the Rockies if the experiment proved successful. He said other areas in which such explosives might be used would be the Wind and Green River basins in Wyoming and Colorado, the Piceance Basin in Colorado and the Paradox Basin in Utah.

If approved, it would represent the first government-industry use of a nuclear explosive for industrial purposes. El Paso Natural Gas Co. helped conduct the study.

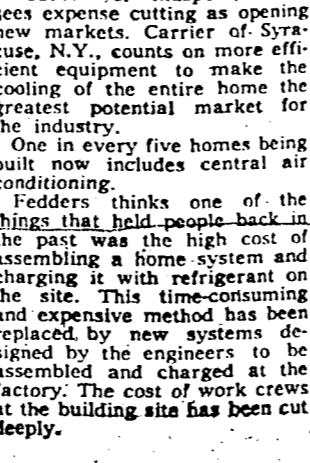

Q. You insist that "real investors are those who buy good stocks and keep them and who don't try to make a quick dollar through hot-shot, in-and-out trading."

I am one of those who held on to Procter & Gamble common stock in the 1962 stock market break and have suffered ever since.

These are the things that make an investment worthwhile. Believe me, lots of other people would like to "suffer" as you have.

Like many other well-regarded growth stocks, P&G ran way up in market price in 1961 and '62.

Anyone who gets uiclers when stock prices go into a tumble (as they have just recently) should never own stocks in the first place.

Q. Could you tell me the pros and cons of having stocks in one name or in joint ownership? I know there is an income tax advantage in joint ownership.

A. Yes, there can be a Federal income tax advantage. Each taxpayer is entitled to a \$100 "dividend exclusion."

For a husband and wife, filing a joint Federal income tax return, the exclusion becomes \$200 if the stocks on which the dividends are paid are jointly owned.

But the same thing can be accomplished, if the husband and wife own stocks individually and each receives (and excludes) \$100 of dividends.

Joint ownership can open a real can of worms, when one of the joint owners dies. It does not (repeat, NOT) always automatically go to the survivor—without inheritance and/or estate tax bites.

This is why I urge any family considering joint ownership to consult a good lawyer (one who knows taxes) on the individual family financial and tax situation.

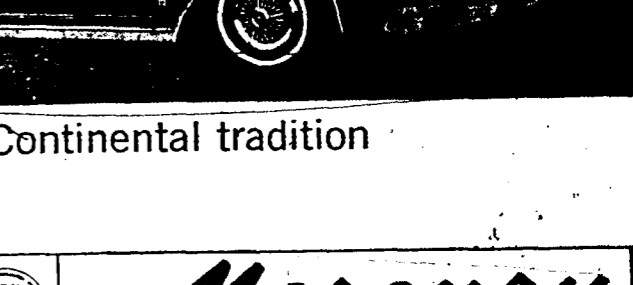

BERLIN (UPI) — The United States protested to Russia today against the wanton shooting of a West Berliner and his fiancee by East Berlin border guards. It warned it would take action to protect West Berliners from the trigger happy guards.
