





# Himalayan Deer Challenges Taxidermists

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Funny thing happened to Paul Schwarz the other day. A man brought him a couple of four-horned deer.

Unlike most folks, Schwarz is used to having people dump defective moose, deer, ducks and other wildlife at his doorstep. He, his father, Paul Sr., and his uncle, Max, are among the nation's most skilled taxidermists. They have a worldwide reputation. They make a business of preserving game and fish trophies.

But, said the youngest Schwarz, "This deer was something of a challenge. I did all sorts of research and all I could find was that it was a small deer that lived only in the foothills of the Himalayan Mountains.

"I went to a museum in Chicago and after considerable investigation arrived at the conclusion that they knew no more about it than I did."

However, the Schwarzes have seldom been stumped, and they

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weren't this time. The Himalayan hunter now has a pair of four-horned deer that even close up appear to be alert and alive.

The Schwarz family believes its shop is the oldest in the nation. One shouldn't ask the Schwarz family how to "stuff" animals because that is considered a bad word in the taxidermy trade. They have a technique that young Paul calls the "jumping out of the skin" method.

When an animal or fish or bird is brought in, the taxidermists take careful measurements of its skull, then determine its body structure. Paul Sr. and his brother, Max, in their 70s, are graduates of Washington University in St. Louis, where they studied anatomy and art.

When the dimensions have been determined, artisans make a clay model of the specimen's body. "Just as though we are going to make a statue of it."

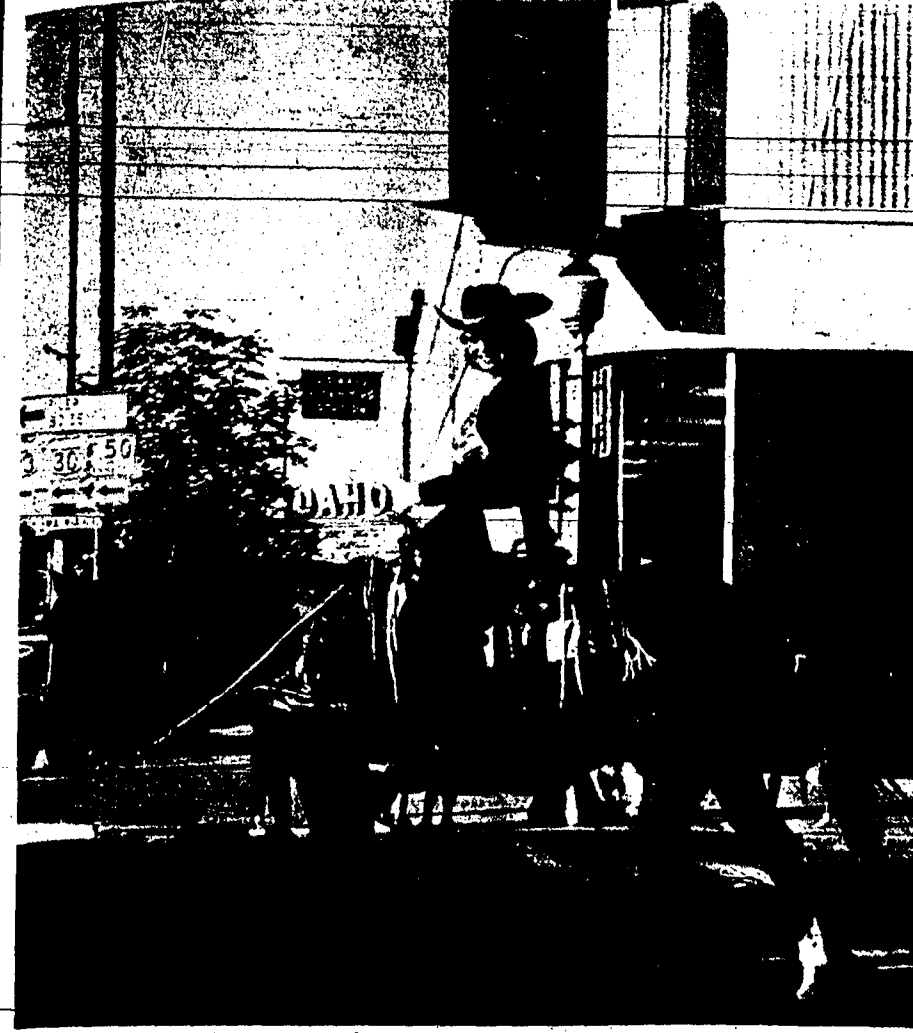
Then they make a "negative mold" over the clay model. Finally laminated paper is built up over a steel wire skeleton inside the "negative mold." Last, the specimen's skin is fitted over the final mold.

After the skin is fitted closely to the body, it is carefully stitched — the stitches hidden

by hair or feathers. In the case of brightly colored birds or fish some cosmetics work is done. "It's just as if the animal had jumped out of its skin," said Paul, "and then been perfectly preserved."

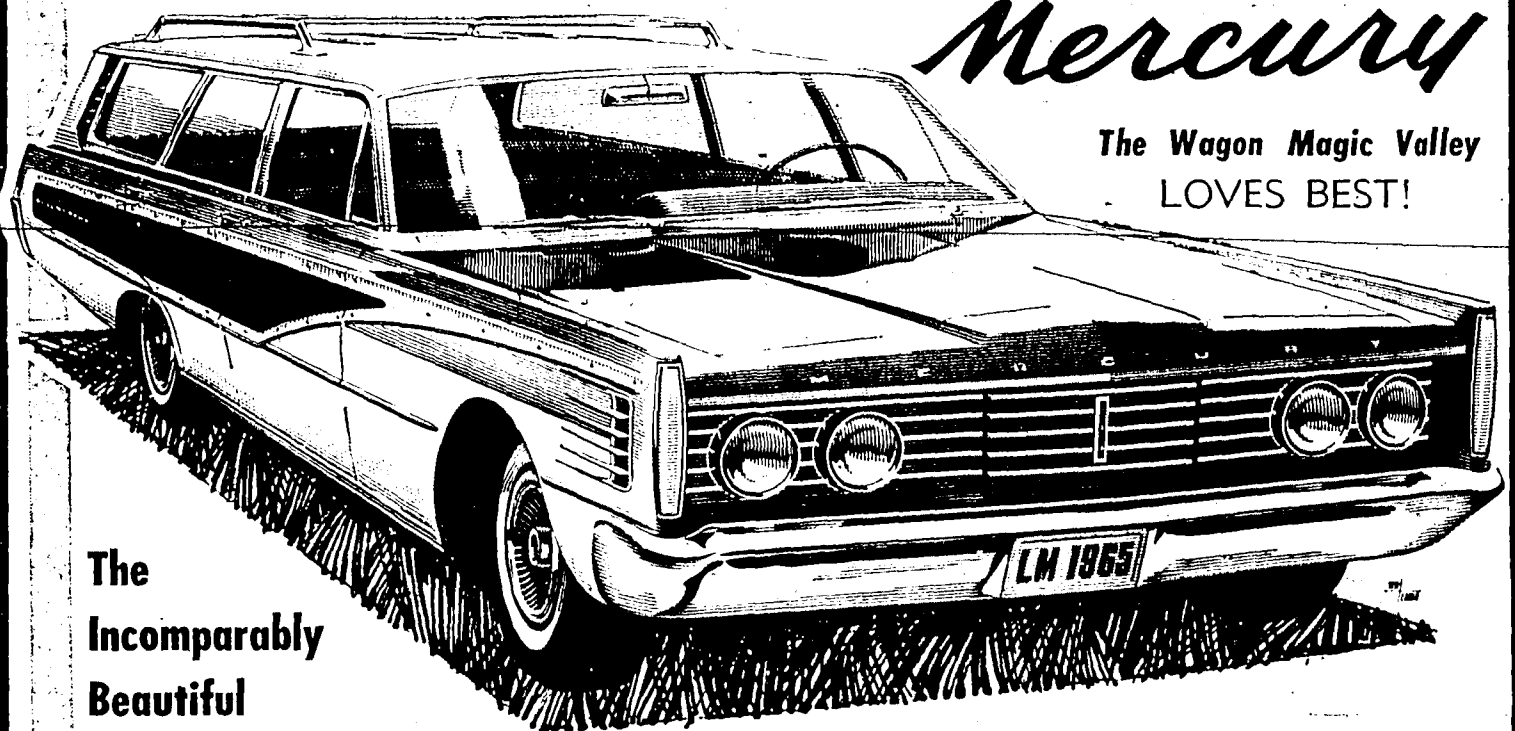
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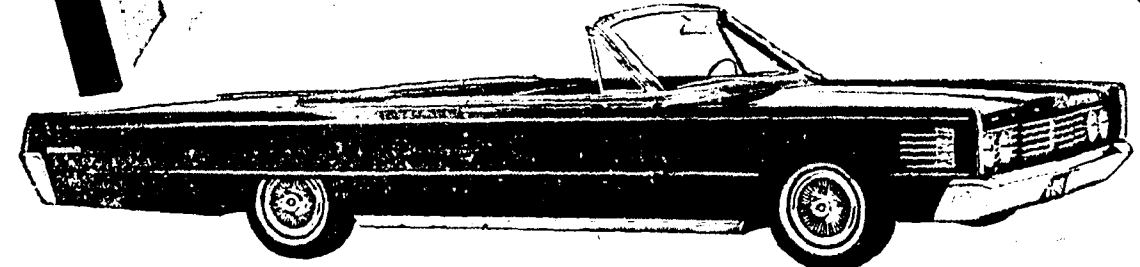
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### Employment Office Wins VFW Award

**Farm Girl's Angel Story Is Studied**

SAN SEBASTIAN DE GARABANDAL, Spain (AP) — Religious experts are studying claims of a farm girl who said the archangel St. Michael conversed with her for 10 minutes Friday midnight.

Conchita Gonzalez, 16, a pleasant-faced girl who claims to have held conversations with the Virgin Mary in the past, said the dragon-fighting archangel "gave me an important message which I shall impart at the proper time in writing."

Nearly 1,000 persons were crowded into the peaceful grove near the village during the period the girl said St. Michael conversed with her.

Witnesses said Conchita emerged from the simple home she shares with her widowed mother about 11 p.m., walked slowly to the nearby grove and stood silently.

Then she threw back her head and appeared to be conversing inaudibly with someone who could not be seen by those crowding around her.

During the 10 minutes, a physician emerged from the crowd and checked her pulse. He said she appeared not to notice his action.

Minutes later the young girl shook her head sharply, smiled, and told the crowd her conversation had been with St. Michael. Then she walked slowly home, promising to reveal the archangel's message later in writing.

The incident Friday is the latest of a series that began in 1961 in which Conchita and three other peasant girls of this mountain village claimed to have seen and talked not only with St. Michael, but also with the Virgin Mary.

## Arab Support Requested by Chou En-lai

CAIRO (AP) — Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai arrived Saturday for a four-day attempt to convince the Arab world to support Peking's policies at the Asian-African conference in Algiers.

Chou's plane landed just hours after a coup d'etat which ousted Algeria's President Ben Bella raised the possibility that the meeting of Asian-African heads of state may be canceled.

A smiling Chou and his foreign minister, Chen Yi, were greeted by the United Arab Republic's Premier Aly Sabry and government officials at an elaborate welcome.

At the airport were 40 members of an advance party of the Chinese delegation to the conference who had left Cairo for Algiers earlier in the day but were ordered to turn back because of the coup.

Neither Chou nor Egyptian officials gave any indication they were concerned over the upheaval in Algiers or the possibility of the conference not being held.

The overthrow of Ben Bella appeared to weaken Communist China's chances of dominating the conference, if it is held. The Algerian president had lent an attentive ear to Chinese overtures in China's attempts to move into Africa and was considered the Arab leader most influenced by Peking.

Chou is scheduled to meet Nasser five times. During the talks Chou is expected to press hard for Nasser — and other Arab leaders — to back Peking in keeping the Soviet Union away from the conference table.

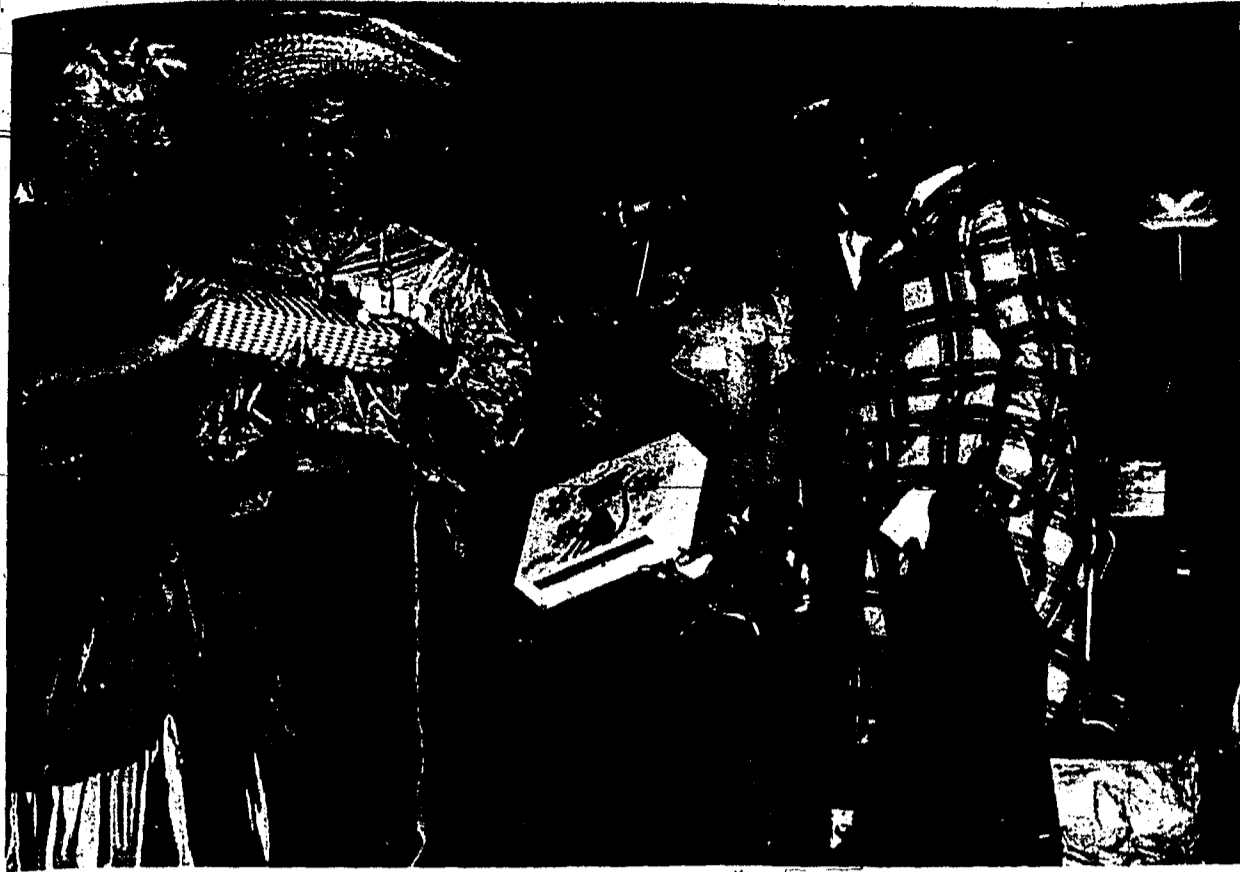

### Defense Says Strikes in Viet Nam OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — The defense high command was desirous Saturday as completely satisfied with the way the Strategic Air Command's B52 heavy jet bombers carried out the strike against a jungle target in South Viet Nam. The strike clearly demonstrated that strategic aircraft can be used effectively in an operation of this kind, a spokesman said in response to a question. "This reply could be interpreted as meaning that the Strategic Air Command — SAC — may be used in future tactical-type missions in South Viet Nam. The question involved primarily the point of whether the mission launched from Guam and supported by refueling tankers from Okinawa did the job it was assigned. Aside from that it is the controversy which has emerged over another point: Did the more than 500 tons of high explosive dropped into a rectangular area about one by two miles produce worthwhile results? The Pentagon stuck to its guns Saturday. There were results, including destruction of supplies, communication positions and other facilities; some Viet Cong killed and captured in mop-up operations, although first reported totals were slim; and forcing enemy evacuation of a region in which they were believed concentrating for an offensive.

Demand from overseas continues as high as ever, but the number of new applicants, which had climbed spectacularly each of the past three years, has been running behind 1964 for the first five months of this year. Officials express no concern, but say a reassessment is going on asking how many volunteers are going where, to do what, in the years ahead. This comes at a time when Director Sargent Shriver, who set up the Peace Corps, is struggling to get another new program off the ground—President Johnson's declared "war on poverty." There is persistent criticism from Congress and elsewhere about Shriver's two jobs, including a move by the Senate to force him out of one.

### Stricter Enforcement of Boating Laws Is Planned

While most fishermen, water-skiers and other boating enthusiasts have generally complied with Idaho boating laws, boating is on an increase and waterways are becoming more crowded, requiring stricter regulation, according to local law officers. Twin Falls County Sheriff James Benham and Blaine County Sheriff Orville Dexter announce that they and other state officials will be enforcing these regulations more strictly. More boat boardings and dockside inspections will be made to check with compliance of requirements. Sheriff Benham points out that vessels propelled by motors must comply with regulations, including homemade rafts and rubber boats when used with a motor. Boats will be checked for a current certificate of numbers and proper display in a contrasting color to the boat, on each side of the bow of the boat; county waterways license tags properly displayed in a prominent place; life preservers

aboard for all occupants of the boat properly tagged with a legible coast guard approval. Required horn or whistle and Coast Guard-approved fire extinguishers on all outboard motors 16 feet or more overall in length and on all inboards; carburetor flame arrestors and adequate ventilation on inboards; adequate mufflers on motors; adequate flotation to support boat when capsized, and required lights when operating at night. Boats satisfactorily passing may be issued a 1965 "Idaho Safety Inspected" decal. All boats not complying may be issued a notice of violation or citation which can carry penalties of up to \$300 fine or 30 days imprisonment. Observation also will be made by officers for violation of operating rules, which are very similar to those of automobiles. Many boating accidents have not been reported in the past, according to Sheriff Benham. All incidents which result in death, injury to persons or property loss or damage of \$100 or more should be reported to the sheriff's office.

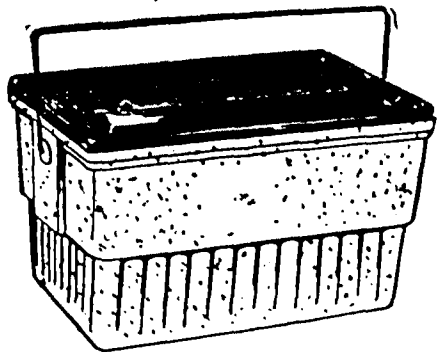

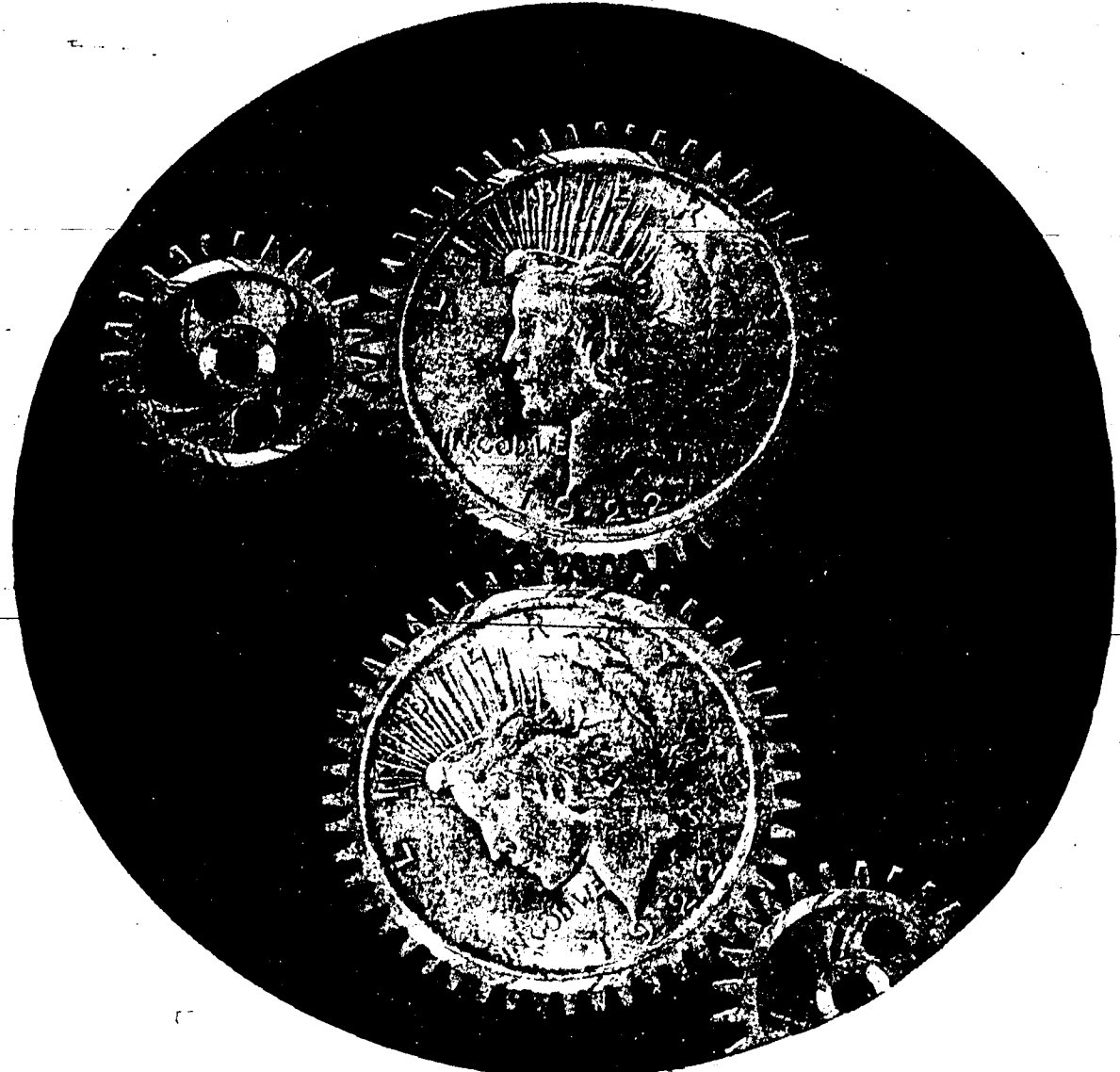

## Russian Home For Jews On Decline

**BIROBIDZHAN, U.S.S.R.**—The Jewish character of the "Jewish Autonomous Oblast" in the Soviet Far East seems to be disappearing. It never was very strong. Soviet Jews showed little interest in becoming pioneers in this rugged area bordering Manchuria, 3,750 miles across Siberia from the cities of European Russia that they knew best.

Now it is being filled with non-Jewish people being sent here by the Soviet government to develop the area economically without regard to any special Jewish nature.

This conclusion can be drawn from a train trip through the Jewish Oblast, a 13,825-square-mile district, and talks with Soviet spokesmen about it.

Correspondents are denied permission by the Soviet government to stop off in the district. Foreigners are rarely allowed to visit it and it is difficult even to obtain permission to make a train trip through it.

That was not so when the district was established in 1934, with great Communist fanfare, as a home for Jews.

Only about 50,000 moved here and many of them were Communist atheists or rarely allowed to visit it and it is difficult even to obtain permission to make a train trip through it.

At Budukan, in the western part of the district, and also on the northwestern outskirts of Birobidzhan are prison camps, surrounded by high wooden fences with guard towers and separate barbed wire fences. The Birobidzhan camp includes a lumber yard.

Such camps can be seen elsewhere along the railroad and do not necessarily have anything to do with the Jewish district. Prison labor is sent east from European Russia to help solve the manpower shortage here.

Railway stations along the way have their names posted in both Russian and Yiddish. It is the only Yiddish visible in the stations or parts of towns along the tracks. At a few stations English signs accompany the Russian ones.

During a 12-minute stop in Birobidzhan, no Yiddish signs could be seen in streets facing the station.

As a service to residents of Twin Falls, members of Twin Falls Grange 216 are preparing to test pressure cookers Tuesday.

According to Mrs. Kenneth Poe and Mrs. Reese Glick, members of the Grange, approximately 10 members will be helping. They stated that pressure cookers must be in proper condition before they are brought to the Grange.

They noted that the gaskets on the cookers must be pliable and not hardened, and that only large pressure cookers will be tested.

The method the members use in testing the cookers is to place about one-half inch of water in the cooker, suspend a thermometer in the cooker, replace the lid and then build up pressure by heating the water.

They will then check the pressure on the thermometer, compared to the pressure reading on the cooker gauge.

Persons wishing to have their cookers tested should bring them at 9 a.m. and must pick them up by 4 p.m. They will test for one day only.

The women also stressed the importance of bringing one rack with the pressure cooker.

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# PLAYER RETAINS LEAD IN NATIONAL OPEN

## Nagle and Beard Are Two Strokes Back With 213's

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Gary Player, the black knight from Johannesburg, stood off his challengers with a third-round 71 for a two-stroke lead at 211 Saturday and threatened to become the first foreigner in 45 years to win the U.S. Open Golf Championship. The little South African goes into Sunday's climactic round with a two-stroke edge over Kel Nagle, the Australian prototype of Sam Snead, and Frank Beard, a 26-year-old dark horse from Louisville.

## Stuart's Bat As Strange As His Glove

Dick (Dr. Strangelove) Stuart has added a new wrinkle to his act—a strange bat. His arsenal muffled by the rest of the league, Stuart continued to explode against Los Angeles pitching Friday night as he smashed a homer and a key seven-run single while leading Philadelphia to a 4-2 victory over the National League-leading Dodgers.

Stuart, who acquired the Dr. Strangelove tag because of the way he murders ground balls, may find his bat similarly muffled if he continues to hammer away at the most formidable pitching staff in the majors while running into considerable difficulty elsewhere.

His latest outburst gave him a .308 average with five homers and 14 runs batted in for 11 games against Dodger pitching. In 42 games against the rest of the league, he has managed only four homers and 18 RBI while hitting a meek .243.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Collection of Idaho's new sales and use tax begins July 1. This is one in a series of stories by The Associated Press on regulations, drafted by the state tax collector's office, governing payment and collection of the tax.

**BOISE (AP)** — The price of an article subject to sales tax is the total sales price, whether it is received in money or otherwise.

If property is purchased with trading stamps, a tax must be paid by the purchaser.

The purchase of trading stamps by a retailer for distribution to his customers, however, is not a taxable sale.

Discounts to customers are deductible in arriving at the taxable sales price. But such discounts must be shown on the invoices, records and accounts of the retailer.

The giving of trading stamps by the seller will be regarded as a promotional venture and their value will not be considered as a discount from the sales price in determining the tax due.

Credit given a purchaser for property traded-in is deductible from the sales price and tax is collected only on the difference between the sales price and the credit for the trade-in.

The sales tax applies to the selling of tangible personal property at retail whether such property is new or used.

The sales tax does not apply to federal excise taxes or to the federal tax on night clubs and other amusements.

The sales price subject to tax does not include charges for interest or carrying charges, if they are separately stated in the contract.

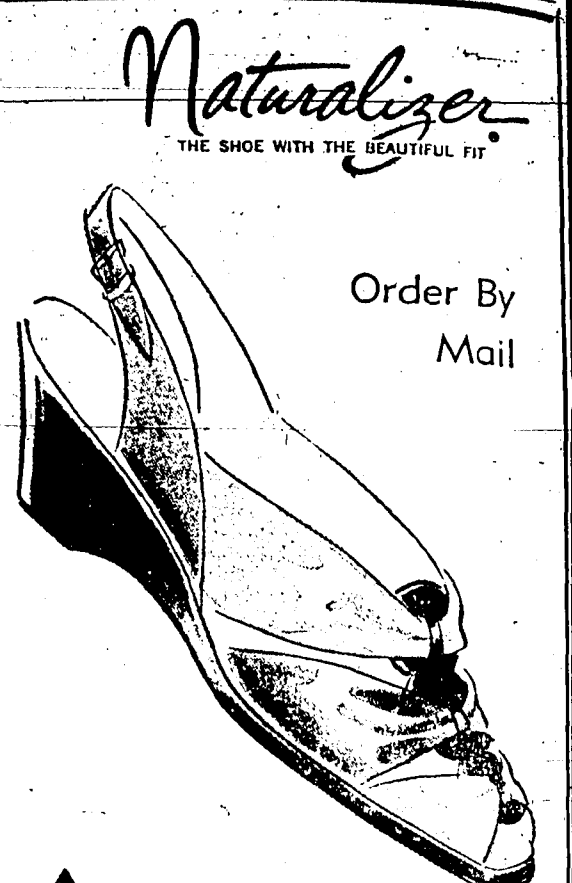

 You can go there anytime you want and you will find plenty of company—especially on weekends.

It is all a matter of practice. The trained eye sees what the untrained eye misses and what the trained eye sees is usually what is worth finding. Nice, balmy Sunday afternoons are usually the ones when

the roads to the various dumpgrounds become clogged with autos and parking space is sometimes hard to find. But then any day is as good as the next one if you are really a follower of this pastime. ### Experts Still Undecided on Effect Of Insecticides on Fish, Wildlife

BOISE—The late Rachel Carson's controversial book, "Silent Spring," crystallized American thinking and scattered research on the evils—as well as the good that came with the widespread use of those weed and insect killers called herbicides and insecticides.

Pros and cons on the subject are aired again recently at the Idaho Health Conference at Valley.

After a couple of days hearing out "pesticides, people and problems," the consensus seemed to be that the long-term effects of weed and bug control measures are not known. But out 450 million pounds of chemicals are being used annually in pesticide programs in the United States.

Meanwhile, extensive scientific investigations regarding pesticides are getting underway because studies are needed of pesticides through the food chain to concentrations in certain wild animals, birds and fish, as well as domestic livestock.

Director John R. Woodworth points out that the Idaho Fish and Game Department is not a land management agency. It does not have control over programs of plant and pest control. However, since fish and wildlife are property of the State of Idaho and are found on all public lands and waters, he believes the Department should be a coordinator in any program which may have an adverse effect on fish and wildlife.

"In recent years we have worked closely with the United States Forest Service in its program of spruce budworm control," he comments.

"In 1964 the Department monitored a part of the spray program on the Salmon National Forest, a highly controversial program which received considerable criticism.

"While our findings on the fish have not been completely talked," Woodworth explains, "it is safe to say that the immediate effects upon fish of the spray were negligible. Studies are going forward in an attempt to determine the long-range effects of the spray program on fish and wildlife of the area."

"It is significant to note," he stresses, "that there was a considerable increase in the amount of DDT in the fatty tissue of fish collected in the area following the spray program."

Before measures can be taken to warn the public whether or not they should eat deer and elk killed in an area sprayed with DDT, some agency in government must provide the information of the maximum amount of DDT that can be tolerated in the flesh of animals without being harmful to humans.

Woodworth concluded, "No attempt has been made by the Fish and Game Department to estimate the amount of DDT in the forested areas of Idaho sprayed with DDT with that of the animals fed farm crops which have been sprayed with DDT."

### MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT

## Burley Businessman Recalls Life in Hitler Youth Corps Before Escape

HEYBURN — George Forschler began his career in the military at the "ripe old age" of 5. But not because he wanted an early start at being a four-star general.

To the contrary, he was a citizen of Germany and it was customary to be "inducted" into the military academy for training when the children were 5 years of age.

Forschler was trained in the Hitler Youth Corps until the end of the European phase of World War II. His family lived under the Communist regime for two years, until they were able to escape to West Berlin and later to West Germany.

This is only a fraction of the life story of the little five-year-old soldier who came to America as an exchange student about 14 years ago and became a member of Uncle Sam's Army, Air Force and U. S. Intelligence.

Forschler, captain in the Air Force reserve and commander of the Idaho Air Force Association, is currently completing arrangements for the Idaho Aerospace Day June 25-27 at Burley. This event will feature the latest in missiles and aircraft and some of the country's outstanding test pilots.

Forschler was born at Gross Umstadt, Germany, in 1932. He was the middle child of a family of three sons and two daughters.

The family later moved to Teupitz, a section of what is now East Berlin. Instead of the American games of "cops and robbers" or "cowboys and Indians," the German children played "soldier."

Forschler became a soldier at 5 years of age when he was enrolled in the Hitler Youth Corps.

The biggest lesson he was taught at this academy was when a Col. Prof. Brown told him the blackboard was white. The little soldier looked at the blackboard and "informed" the professor it was black and NOT white.

The boy not only was slapped by the professor's hand, but was "struck" also with the German doctrine that something is so because your authority says it's so, while common reason tells differently.

The big lesson which taught him not to argue with authority also helped him get along with the American soldiers, who came later.

The predominant religion in Germany was Catholic and Lutheran and the Forschlers attended church every Sunday.

Forschler remembered the Nazis disapproved of the churches, apparently fearing any real opposition to them would come through the churches.

The church-goers were afraid of the Nazis, whose attitude seemed strange to Forschler, as they had a regular army chaplain and wore the emblem "God With Us" on their Army belts.

Persons agreeing with Nazi activity had better chance for advancement in country politics. Being a member of the Nazi army didn't necessarily mean the soldier was a "nazi."

"The first real air raid by the Eighth Air Force from England killed 36,000 people. I think that when this happened it started the German people to thinking just how wrong their war and belief really was.

"They began questioning their authority and all the promises that had been made to them.

"When the people started rebelling, the Nazis, who were becoming afraid of losing their power, placed many of the German people in concentration camps," he recalled.

The Russian army was advancing towards the Breslau (Germany) concentration camp, which contained many important German persons. The Nazis didn't want these people to fall into the Russian hands and conducted a 300-mile march back to Berlin.

Forschler saw this march when he was 11 years old and remembers the inadequacy of the prisoners clothing. Some had shoes and others walked barefoot in the snow.

The ones who couldn't walk were shot by the soldiers. Approximately 2,000 people were pushed on this big retreat.

The Forschlers escaped to West Berlin shortly afterwards. Forschler rode a bicycle 12 miles each day to attend school. He studied languages and became fluent in English, French and Russian, as well as German.

During vacations, he worked as an interpreter at the American-used Rhein-Main airport. He earned extra money by selling American cigarettes on the black market, which he had earned by washing cars for the American soldiers and officers. He found this to be more lucrative than pay in German currency.

When Forschler was 17 years old, clothing was scarce and he wore pants his mother sewed from U. S. Army blanket material. In fact, most of the clothing worn by him during his teenage years was American.

His sports included English soccer and skiing. His first pair of skis was made from a sauerkraut barrel. He later purchased a real pair which had been used by the German army in Finland during the war.

In 1951, Forschler, his brother and sister were sponsored by the Presbyterian church to come to America. Forschler came as an exchange student and the other two came on visas.

During his voyage to America, he realized that Jewish people were "actual people" instead of the monstrous devil-like persons he had been taught since his childhood days in Germany.

The very kind man who befriended him on the boat while coming to America later was discovered to be one of "those

## Broad New Policies Noted As Pope Starts Third Year

VATICAN CITY (AP) — On Monday Pope Paul VI enters the third year of his reign. Many at the Vatican think he will set a vigorous course for his pontificate during the year, possibly embarking on broad new policies.

Since the Roman Catholic cardinals elected Giovanni Battista Montini as their church's 262nd Pope on June 21, 1963, he has been largely occupied with the completion of projects initiated by his predecessor, John XXIII.

The major unfinished business, the Vatican Ecumenical Council, is expected to be completed by Christmas. The council's fourth and final session starts Sept. 14.

It is no secret at the Vatican that the continuing council has been a restraint on Pope Paul. Informants say he has hesitated to act in many fields to avoid giving the impression of trying to influence the council.

But there is no doubt he has put his own stamp on Roman Catholic policy, still in the ferment of the renewal — or Aggravamento — launched by Pope John.

Pope Paul has widened the Christian unity contacts started by John. In February, Paul gave a new dimension of internationality to the college of cardinals, giving it more than 100 members for the first time in history.

Travel has become an integral part of Pope Paul's policy, taking him outside Rome to other Italian cities and to the Holy Land and far-off India. Prelates say he is not traveling simply because he likes it, but because he feels it is his duty to show that he is not just an Italian Pope, but the spiritual leader of all the world's half billion Roman Catholics.

Many at the Vatican say he would travel even more if it were not for the council. He had wanted to go to the Philippines in April, but he turned down the invitation largely because of his work in preparing for the council's final session.

One of his first acts was to call for a reform of the Vatican Church, the centuries-old central church administration. But the reform has never been carried out, and the word has gone out that he is waiting for the council to end.

Unfinished documents before the council deal with the priest-hood and the duties of bishops. Clearly the Pope is withholding action on the Curia reform in time with his expressed desire to give the bishops the greatest measure of freedom of choice.

Birth control, and the possible approval of contraceptive pills, is another field in which the Pope may be waiting for the council to end. A secret commission is studying the matter for him. A council schema on modern world problems also takes up birth control in a general way.

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**COUGAR LOOKOUT** on the Challis National Forest is one of the few lookouts still standing in the Western section of the nation. They are gradually being torn down and the land returned to its original condition. Airplanes, with special and

very sensitive equipment, now can spot fires much faster and more accurately than humans. As a result the lookouts are no longer needed for this type of forest work. All lookouts will be eliminated in the near future.

## Forest Service Lookouts Giving Way To Airplanes in Fire Detection Job

**CHALLIS** — Cougar Lookout on the Challis National Forest was last used in 1942 and has since become a public safety hazard and a potential fire source.

Ranger Harold Wadley reports that the weakened sides and broken windows soon will be dismantled and the site restored to its original appearance of sagebrush, grass and an unobstructed skyline.

Many lookouts that were built in the early 1930's as Cougar Lookout was, are no longer needed for forest protection. They were built as secondary detection stations to be manned during critical fire weather periods.

Some, like Cougar Lookout, served as interforest switchboards for the National Forest phone lines. When a break occurred in the line due to wind or other factors, the lookout headed out afoot or on horseback to search out the trouble spot and restore communications.

With the advent of radios, more strategically located lookouts and the use of airplanes and helicopters, some of these once-important structures became obsolete.

The use of aerial detection craft resulted in a considerable savings since they could be dispatched while a lightning storm was in progress over the forest and carry a load of smokejumpers or other attack forces while locating the various fires.

These aircraft are equipped with radios which enable the pilot to relay information about the fire to attack personnel on the ground.

Before the use of aircraft to detect and suppress forest fires many acres of valuable watershed were burned before proper communications and information about the fire could be relayed to the ground crews.

Most of these changes in fire detection methods occurred during and after World War II.

## ISU Museum Crew Digging in Prehistoric Indian Village

**SALMON** — Idaho State University Museum is undertaking an investigation of what its director, Dr. Earl H. Swanson, calls a prehistoric Indian village at the end of the present Salmon River Road.

Dr. Swanson will direct digging at the Corn Creek Bar on the Salmon River with the assistance of Kent Wilkinson, an ISU student of Cedar City, Utah, along with eight other students.

F. E. Powers, Salmon National Forest supervisor, said that hogan type pit remains were discovered at Corn Creek Bar where the Forest Service is installing a "public" campground and picnic area along with an extension of the Salmon River Road into the area.

Powers noted that the hogan type rings are close to the river bank and apparently were a result of banking up around housing used by the Indians before the teepee.

Dr. Swanson said the project also will include the excavation of two large rock shelters along the river. Powers said one of the shelters, uncovered last year by a survey crew, is just above the Salmon River Road between Pine Creek and Panther Creek, and the other is along the road below Poverty Flat further down river which has been an attraction to visitors to the area for many years.

Swanson said that one of the rock shelters is known to be more than 7,000 years old and that it is believed that both of them may have been occupied almost constantly from 10,000

years ago up to historic times. The village at Corn Creek Bar, 17 miles down river from North Fork, is a few centuries old, he said.

The museum director said that the sites are in northern Shoshoni territory and may yield valuable information on the cultural relations of inhabitants of the Salmon River area and the Columbia Plateau.

Findings of the Salmon River dig, he said, will be compared with results of the earlier work done by the museum at Birch Creek near Blue Dome between Salmon and Idaho Falls with the hopes of drawing a more complete picture of the activities of Idaho's prehistoric inhabitants.

The project on the Salmon River is a cooperative venture of the museum and the U.S. Forest Service. Swanson said that soon all three sites will be at least partially destroyed by construction of new roads and campgrounds.

The two rock shelters contain Indian paintings, on the rock faces.

Powers noted that both the Salmon River and Middle Fork of the Salmon River have many areas indicating Indian habitation at one time.

## Nine Students Training Under Manpower Act

Nine students training under the auspices of the Manpower Training Act will complete their program at Twin Falls Business College on June 23, according to Karl Black, business administrator at the college.

Black indicated that 14 students have been placed in training since Dec. 1 and four have already entered employment for which they were trained.

Those remaining in training will be ready for employment by the end of June. Two are trained as stenographers and the others as clerk-typists.

Employers interested in interviewing any of these trainees for possible employment may contact them either through the college or through the Idaho Employment Security Agency, Black said.

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## Japan Tends To Discredit U.S. Efforts

**TOKYO (AP)** — A wave of comment that tends to discredit the Americans in Viet Nam and tarnish the U.S. image in Asia ripples across Japan today.

The movement, if it can be called such, is carried on through newspapers, magazines, radio, screen and television. It is spurred on by mass media which pride themselves on being non-Communist and on not being influenced or controlled by the Communists.

A steady flow of often biased or slanted reports has appeared in Japan.

The Japanese don't necessarily see eye to eye with Americans. That's to be expected. But there have been instances where Japanese editors preferred Chinese Communist or North Vietnamese versions over reports by correspondents of the Western world. Some editors contend that Americans don't understand Asians and the Asians should be allowed to iron out their own differences.

Thus, American bombings of North Viet Nam are repeatedly condemned. So were last spring's use of noxious gas and the U.S. military buildup in South Viet Nam.

There is seldom any condemnation of Viet Cong attacks, of North Viet Nam refusing to respond to U.S. offers proposing negotiations for peace talks, and of the possibility of the Communists escalating the war.

Few Japanese editors seem to have tried to present a clear-cut explanation on what brought about the conflict or give other background.

To the average Japanese, it appears, the Viet Cong is an underdog whose strength stems from its close ties with the land.

The V.C. is pictured a modern-day Aslan David battling, for the most part with captured U.S.-made arms, against a mighty Goliath armed with modern weapons.

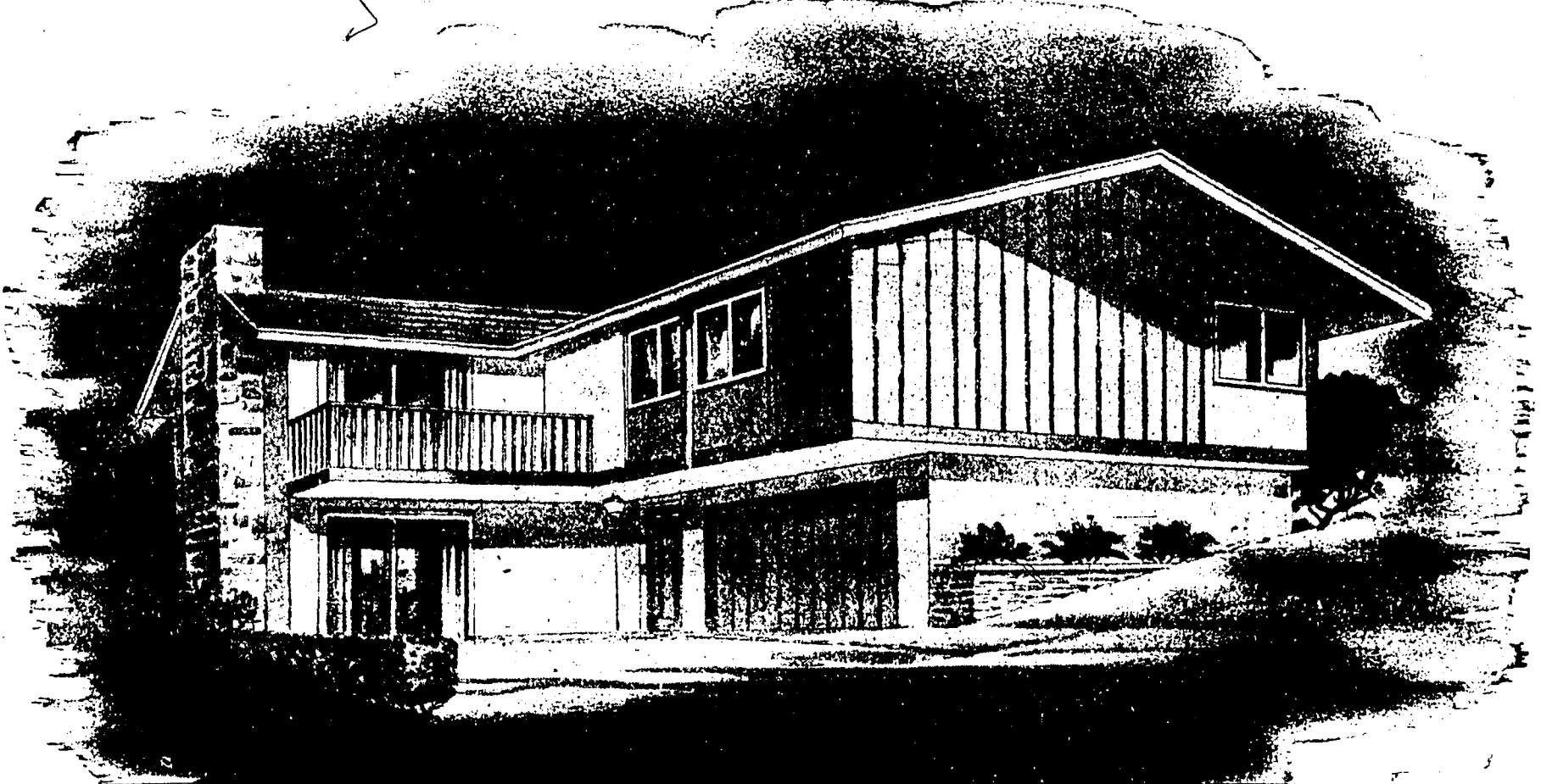

## Every Plant Can Be Put To Good Use

Every plant, every tree or shrub planted by the home owner should have a special purpose.

Beauty is the principal purpose for planting the home property, according to surveys, but there are many other reasons, as follows:

1. For shade — shade trees offer comfort and beauty in sizzling summer weather. When correctly placed they cool the home, or materially reduce air-conditioning costs.

Shade trees lower temperatures near the ground as the layer of hottest air is transferred to the tree tops. They also may provide autumn color.

Evergreens provide all-year color, particularly welcome green in winter.

2. Hedges provide family privacy — much needed in some housing developments. Hedges may provide flowers that are pleasing to neighbors as well as yourself.

3. Flowering trees, shrubs and annual plants offer the spring, summer and fall beauty of many types of blooms from roses to apple blossoms.

Trees and shrubs offer foods in the form of fruits and berries, according to the American Association of Nurserymen.

4. Where grass will not grow or is hard to mow as in shade areas, or areas of poor soil, or on steep slopes, ground covers of many types form a beautiful green carpet.

5. Windbreaks of trees and shrubs provide warmth in winter and coolness in summer. A government test showed that a perfectly placed windbreak sheltered a plain area home from cold north winds and reduced fuel costs 22 percent.

Most of all, however, trees and shrubs provide natural beauty and a feeling of better living for the family.

The National Paint, Varnish and Lacquer Association suggests two methods which help achieve a harmonious look.

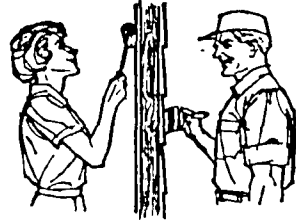
One method is to paint the walls of the two rooms the same color and to repeat the color of the floor covering of one room on the ceiling of the other.

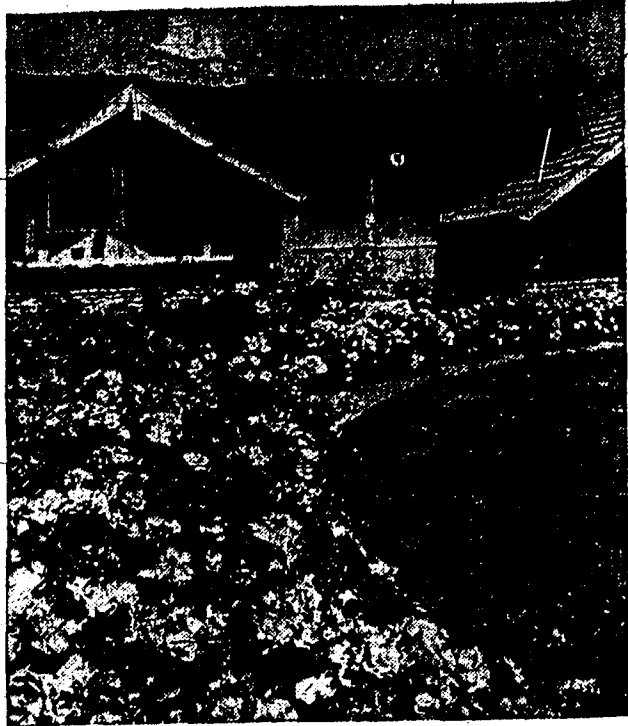

## Roses Require Little Work And Give Color for Season

Roses are a garden lover's must. Roses do for the garden what no other single plant can do: provide uninterrupted color all season long. And roses take considerably less work to maintain than other plants.

As for planting, there isn't a simpler flower to plant than a rose. Just find a sunny, reasonably well-drained spot, dig a hole, pop in the rose, cover up with soil mulched with peat, water generously and presto—everything's coming up roses.

Probably the greatest single advantage of the rose is the marvelous range of versatility.

First, consider how many different types of ever-blooming roses there are: tall, medium and low-growing bushes, ramblers, climbers, pillars and fence covers, and, even a new hybrid rose species for "living fences" border plantings and hedges.

Best evidence there is of roses' increasing popularity is the large number of home gardeners who are planting roses in their front yards rather than limiting them, as in the past, to formal back yard rose gardens.

By putting more and more roses up front, the home gardener is using these ever-blooming beauties in place of traditional foundation shrubs which either do not flower at all or flower sparingly only once for a relatively brief period.

Generously spotting colorful rose bushes in and around green shrubs adds more sparkle and color-appeal to the front yard's appearance.

Fences of colorful roses up to 5 or 6 feet, or low, compact border and hedge plantings of roses are, in an increasing number of cases, replacing conventional fencing materials such as board, wire and concrete block.

## New Covering Is House Saver

Aging and weathering of exterior surfaces often occur when a house still remains structurally sound.

This soundness can easily be retained by covering the house with a portland cement masonry coating on a metal lath base to create a brand new facing.

A great variety of finishes is available. For instance, marble or granite chips may be troweled on to provide a choice of textures and colors.

Metal lath makes it possible to use this technique over a variety of materials such as wood siding, brick, cinderblock and concrete resulting in a new exterior with any desired color.

Due to the versatility of metal lath, shapes may be changed at the same time.

## New Ductless Range Hood Is Introduced

A new ductless range hood for kitchens has just been introduced by the Puritron Corp., innovators of the concept of air purification by electronic tubes.

The remarkable hood works in two ways. It "inhales" kitchen grease and smoke particles before they can settle on ceilings and walls, and at the same time purifies the air.

It can be operated very inexpensively, using about the same amount of electricity as a 200-W light bulb.

The Puritron hood comes in stainless steel, white or shaded copper finishes. It is easy to install for it simply attaches to the wall above the range.

## Jumbo-Size Swatches Easy to Make

Few paint buyers can visualize the total color effect on a large wall surface from this little sample. Therefore, the complaint is often made that the color chip is not a "true" color.

According to Ruth Johnston, who heads the consumer color research program for Pittsburgh Paints, women may find the color chip aesthetically appealing in its small size, yet fail to be able to envision it magnified a thousand-fold when painted on a wall.

Also, since pastels have been used so extensively in the past decade, most women find it difficult to picture the total effect of the muted or deeper shades currently being shown.

It's important to remember that small areas of color appear less intense than large areas of the same color.

In the enclosed area of a room, light is scattered from one wall to another. Each time a reflection occurs, the color becomes more intense. So, brighter colors can be chosen for a large room, while delicate colors are ideal for small ones.

The average homemaker choosing new paint for home decor would like to see color samples made in "wall size" swatches.

Before applying paint, paint a large piece of paper and let it dry. Test it in the room where it will be used. If the color is too dark and strong, white can be added. If it is still too intense a bit of black or amber can be added.

Most paint stores can easily make such changes. All these little extras will help you achieve that just-right decorator look.

A pale pastel in a large room would look "washed out" while a bright color, such as red, could prove to be unbearable in a small one.

## Putting Antique Blonde Finish On Furniture Easy

The switch from dark to light is easily achieved these days. Instead of discarding the old but still-useful pieces, new and fashionable tones and hues with an antique finish can be applied to give them up-to-the-minute decorator smartness.

According to The O'Brien Corp., paint and hard coatings manufacturers, the antiquing process has been reduced to three very simple steps.

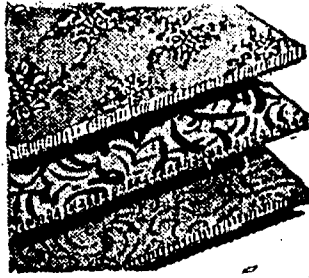
First—sand the old surfaces lightly to remove dirt, grease, wax and loose paint. Use a fine grade "wet or dry" sandpaper moistened with water for a smooth, fine finish. Use a tack cloth to pick up the sanding residue.

After the preparation, apply the base coat. Popular antiquing trend favor tones a bit deeper than blonde tones.

To antique: Apply a very thin coating of color grain over the base coat, then wipe it. Allow some to remain on the surface and recesses of the wood for a dual tone. Since the color grain sets slowly, there's ample time to achieve interesting effects.

Lint-free cheesecloth, herringbone, paper towels or tissues may be used for wiping and give texture.

Pins, nails and other sharp points may be used for "stress" marks to pick up the color grain during wiping and show as dark specks.



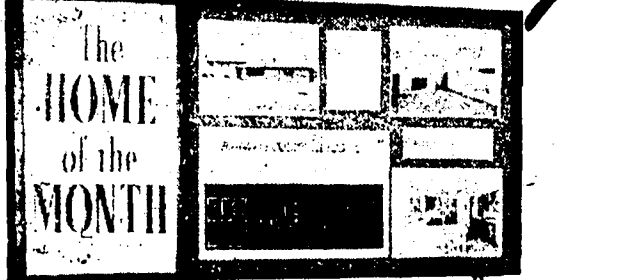

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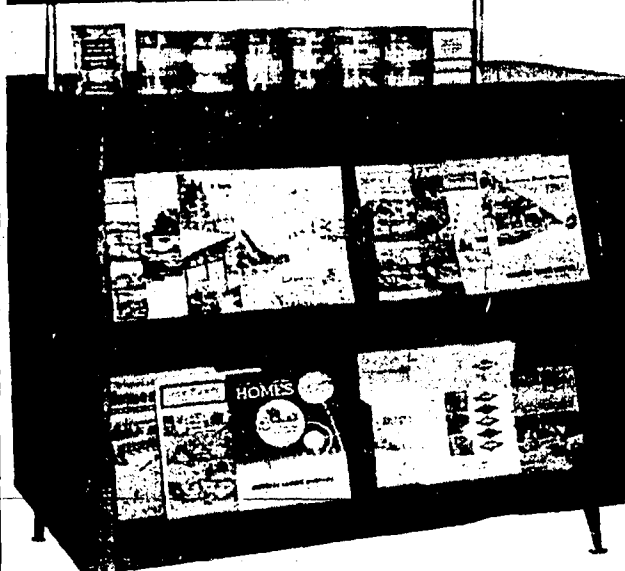

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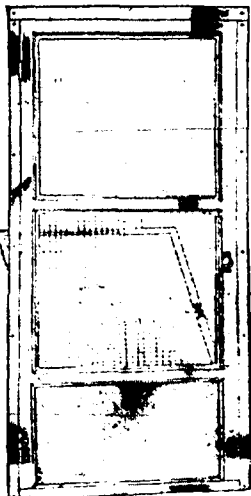

Anyone who enjoys living plants in the house or on the porch or patio will be particularly pleased with the interesting trailing kinds, so perfectly suited for display in hanging baskets.

There are many varieties of attractive trailing ivies, philodendrons and vines to select, as well as flowering plants like fuchsia and lantana.

All these plants are readily available in their clay pots and saucers and will fit nicely into a homemade basket or rolled clover-cut aluminum.

To make this metal basket, roll a 6" by 17 1/2" strip of clover-cut aluminum around a large jar to get a smooth curve, and form into a cylinder by overlapping the ends 1 1/2". Fit snugly below lip of clay flower pot. Make 1 1/2" deep cuts along bottom and bend back strips formed between each cut and lace together with wire.

A survey shows that 87 percent of all home owners believe landscaping adds more to the resale value of their property than the landscaping costs.

Apparently nine out of ten home owners want beautiful home grounds. It pays both in upping the resale value, as well as in living a healthier, more enjoyable family life.

Suppose you want landscaping. How do you finance it?

There are several ways the home owners can go about this. FHA home improvement loans are available from banks, up to \$3500 being allowed for landscaping.

For as little as five to 10 percent of the value of the home, a sound landscaping plan can be carried out.

Banks and savings and loan associations also will, in many cases, allow private loans to be made, or added to the mortgage.

Once the loan is arranged for, the home owner can then select a good landscape nurseryman to do the work.

In many cases, prominent nurserymen will arrange for the loans. Repayment must be made within five years.

Many landscape nurserymen also will prepare plans which can be carried out piecemeal until the whole job is completed.

For example, the foundation planting may be done first, a garden living room installed secondly and children's play areas or fruit garden third, or in any other order, depending on what is desired.

No finishing is necessary. Paints or varnish would seal in the wood's natural fragrance, which drives away moths.

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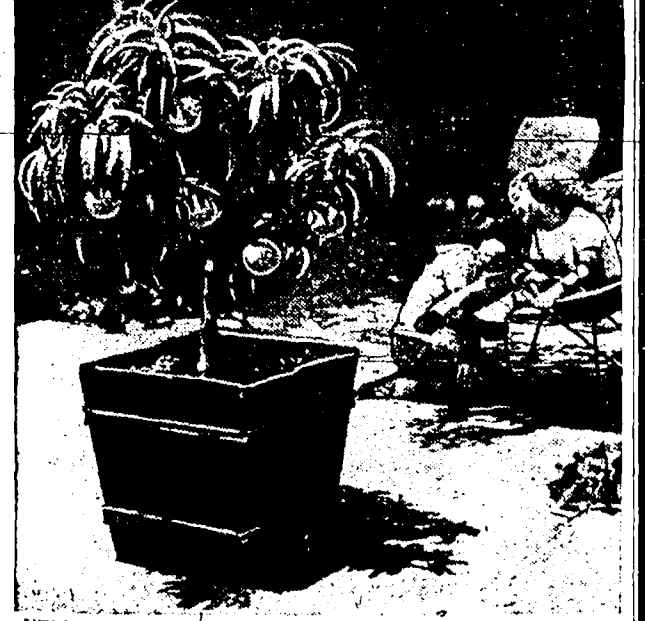

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### Ideas Given To Brighten Washdays

To speed the dull chore of doing the wash, an Idea Center advises at least three sorting baskets — for whites, colored items and "special." If space allows, add baskets for wash-and-wear, washable wool and decorator or brightly colored items.

An excellent arrangement is to have six plastic clothes baskets lined up on shelves, three on top and three on bottom. For a deluxe custom installation, you might consider installing built-in bins beneath a counter.

Another idea offered by the Center, supervised by laundry specialists at Maytag, is to use a set of bins or drawers to sort clean clothes after laundering. Just mark the bins with the names of family members — "Dad," "Mom," "Sis," etc. You might label one bin "Kitchen," to use when sorting out dish towels, table linens and aprons.

Then, make each member of your family responsible for getting his own clean clothes back to his room. Share the work!

Laundry really isn't a hobby as yet, but you'll find it can be less work if you let the other members of the family help organize it.

### Plywood Can Look Good Either Way

Plywood, particularly fir, can be made attractive whether its grain is covered with a solid paint or it is finished to show the natural look of the grain.

First, the surface must be sanded as smooth as possible and left completely clean.

To hide the surface completely, brush on a coat of pigmented penetrating sealer, and after it has dried, smooth with sandpaper and remove all sandings.

If the top coat is to be a gloss enamel, the second coat should consist of equal parts of enamel undercoat and the top coat.

If the top coat is to be a latex, apply a second coat of the resin sealer and sand lightly before applying final coat.

If a natural finish is desired, select a wood with an attractive grain and sand as much as possible.

Now brush on a coat of clear penetrating resin sealer. After this has dried, sand again with a fine paper.

To color the wood to some degree, apply a coat of wood stain, a coat of colored penetrating sealer or tint clear resin sealer with color in oil, reducing 25 per cent with paint thinner.

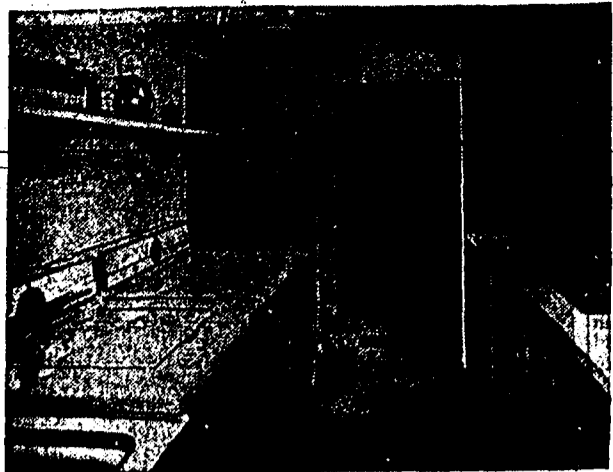
Whichever is used, it should stand for a few minutes and be wiped off to get the desired color.

This, too, should be sanded lightly when dry, and then one or two coats of varnish of the desired sheen brushed on.

For modern, blond effects this should be done after the first coat of sealer has dried. Thin white pigmented resin sealer or enamel undercoat 50-50 with odorless paint thinner and brush on the surface. After it has dried and been wiped off, the surface should be protected with one or two coats of varnish.

### Step-Saving Planning Is Needed in Laundry Center

Doing the family wash is a job that women spend hours on each week, making an efficient, step-saving laundry center an important part of home planning.

When space is at a premium, all possibilities should be considered to utilize the existing space to the best advantage.

For instance, in one home, corridor space, close to a bath that might have gone unused or become a cluttered storage area, is converted to a convenient, compact laundry center.

Washer, dryer and a pretreating sink were placed along the wall backing the bathroom, which provides the needed plumbing tie-ins.

A counter for folding clothes runs almost full length along the opposite wall, with cabinets and a divided canvas cart for sorting and storing soiled laundry directly beneath it.

Beyond the counter, a closet holds ironing board, iron and pull-out clothes rack for finished ironing and wash-and-wear garments just removed from the dryer.

An added convenience is a cabinet over the sink that catches clothes from an upstairs laundry chute. Shelves placed over the washer to hold detergents, good lighting, bright colors and decorative accessories contribute to efficiency and attractiveness.

### New Steels Complement Home Design

The variety and versatility of modern steels have made it possible to solve many home-design problems relating to the use of land, foundations, beams, studs, joists and plumbing fixtures.

Thanks to the new steels and the ingenuity of bridge-builders, homes are now being built on steeply sloped lots that were once called impossible. These sites are especially desirable because of their lower price and their beautiful views. Using steel framing, these houses cantilever out over the slopes, neatly solving a problem conventional construction cannot economically handle.

In conventional construction, too, steel is making important contributions. For instance, home building was once seasonal. But now there is an all-weather lightweight steel foundation system requiring very little excavation, thereby making it possible for building year-round.

### Wallpapers Help Dress Up Rooms

Kitchen ceiling too high? Wall areas broken by beams and soffits? It's time to remodel!

If the family budget doesn't call for a major remodeling job just now, there still is a solution. Try remodeling tricks with wallpaper.

The many new border patterns now available in wallpapers are designed just for such problem areas, in the kitchen or elsewhere.

To meet all decorative needs, there are border patterns of various depths, from two-inch width to use as moldings or trim to as deep as 18 to 20 inches.

Two-inch moldings are available in four-yard rolls, pre-pasted for easy handling and immediate use.

Several of the deeper patterns are ideal for disguising and dressing up broken wall areas.

One manufacturer has just presented a collection of 51 different wallpaper borders, plasticized for greater washability and pre-pasted for easy handling.

These borders range from eight to 18 inches deep and each pattern is designed so that it can be trimmed to fit specific areas.

Still another group of borders highlights bright primary colors, as well as black and white. These have been specially designed to contrast with a ticking stripe for walls.

New papers for kitchens feature such design themes as potted plants, fruits, vegetables, copper pots, antiques, bottles, mugs or herbs.

### New Colors Being Used In Kitchens

New colors in kitchen paints are being used to complement the natural wood cabinets and the popular copertone appliances now used so widely.

According to a 1965 forecast projected by Martin Senour Paint Co., colors most favored are golds, copper, browns, tan and orange.

Color to Unify . . . to bring together the seeming clutter of a variety of cabinets and appliances, match wall colors to cabinets or colored appliances, or appliances to cabinets, or cabinets, appliances and wall color. Paint everything to match.

Color for window exposure . . . the kitchen is mostly a daytime room, so use cool colors, blues, aquas, mint greens, for those on the warmer south side of the house and warm colors, pinks, yellows, apricots, for those on the cooler north side.

Color for good seeing . . . if natural light is limited, use pale, light-reflecting colors. Color for cheer . . . clear yellows, pinks and melons are spirit-lifting.

Color for size . . . If a kitchen is small, where the kitchen is plainly visible from the dining or living area, relate the kitchen with a paler tint of the larger room color.

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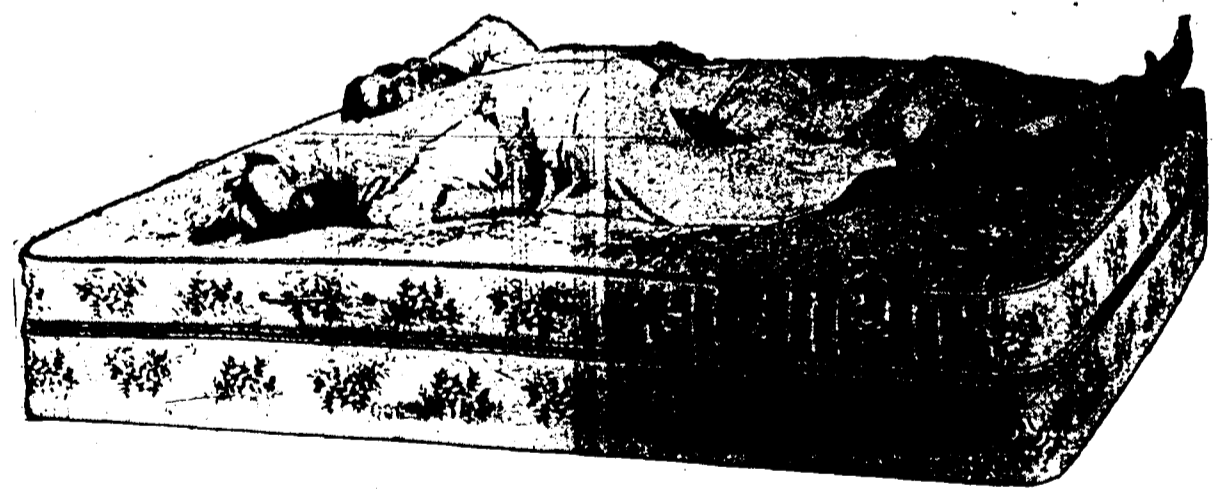
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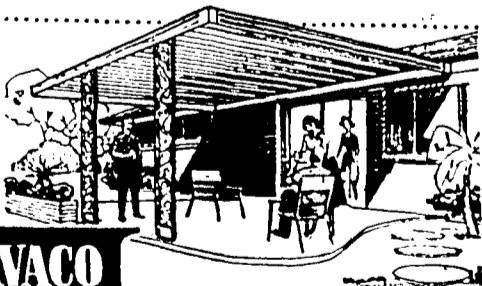
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## Tips Given On Care for Fiberglass

Have a vent for escape of warm air at the high point of the roof. Leave four inches to six inches space between the house wall and the fiberglass panels.

Sagger the panels over and under the beams with the top panels projecting four inches to six inches over the lower panels. This arrangement provides air-flow through spaces between the panels, and the lower panels keep rain and snow from coming into the patio area.

Recently, researchers for Filon Corporation, the world's largest manufacturer of the colorful panels, found that both ordinary "Q" steel wool, periodically soaking the steel wool pad in water. After another water rinse and allowing the panels to dry thoroughly, two coats of the clear refinisher complete the job, restore the beauty.

## Good Screens Aid Summer Enjoyment

Be sure to rescreen your outdoor room for more enjoyment this summer. You can do it yourself.

First determine the amount of screening needed to do the job. Next you'll want to rent or buy a gun-type stapler.

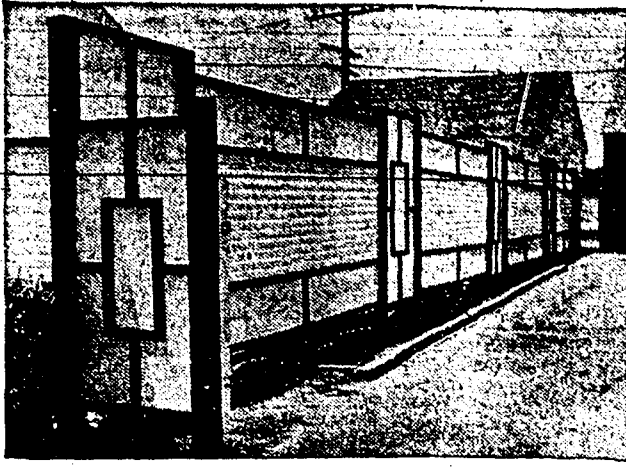
If your outdoor area was built with wood framing, carefully remove the thin batten strips and remove the staples that hold the screen in place.

To insert new screening be certain to start your stapling across the top at 1/2-inch intervals. Leave 1/2-inch overlap of screening and fold over and staple between previous staples. If you are using fiberglass screening, it cuts easily with an ordinary scissors.

Next, do sides, alternating between the two posts, keeping screening taut at all times. Leave a 6-inch margin on bottom to keep pressure on screening while stapling and cut off later.

For aluminum frame outdoor rooms first remove the vinyl splines which hold the screening in place. Align the screening and starting with the top framing member insert a 1-inch length of spline at each end of the groove. Next, remove one of the short pieces of spline and run the roller over the screen the length of the groove. Then roll the spline into the groove, removing the second short spline at the other end of the framing as you reach it.

## Easy-to-Build Backyard Jail Is Big Boon

Straight from the TV screen to the backyard is a playhouse that will make any child the envy of the gun totin' set.

It will also reduce the wear and tear on the home... and Mother's frazzled nerves. Western Pine Association calls it the "Dodge City Jail" and the resemblance is there, from the barred windows to the hitching rail out front.

Idaho White Pine, White Fir or any of the other eight easy-to-handle Western Pine Wood species is recommended.

After leveling the ground, set down the six concrete blocks that form the base for the structure and on this foundation place three four by four beams. Next install two by three's plus two short two by three's for the top and bottom of the rear window.

Once the framing has been completed the horizontal siding of Idaho White Pine paneling is installed and the rear wall is nailed into place.

The framing of the front wall consists of four two by three studs, one plate, two stills, four fire stops and a brace near the top of the wall.

The door is framed by the studs and requires only a two-foot two by three at the top. The opening for the door is two feet by 4 feet 6 inches.

After the framing is done the vertical siding is installed. The siding on the front wall is one by eight Idaho White Pine.

Now the front and rear walls are in place and the rafters of the shed roof are put in position. The shed roof are put in position. These are four two by four's of White Fir.

## New Styles of Fencing Are Examples of High Fashion

There's more to building a fence than just staking your ground.

It may interest you to know, air movement behind a solid fence is greater than behind a partially open fence, according to tests conducted by the Teax Engineering Experiment station.

The test-report observes that a solid fence will stop breezes, but currents set up behind the solid fence allowed for greater air circulation in the enclosed area.

Although solid fencing is highly desirable for privacy, some people have been reluctant to use it for fear of stopping air movement.

The tests also point up the fact that the use of fiberglass reinforced sheets as solid fencing will result in increased air movement in addition to the light transmission and decorative color advantages it has over

other types of fencing. Fences constructed with fiberglass reinforced sheet require a minimum of framing and the use of ordinary tools.

The sheets offer superior weathering characteristics, and require only a minimum amount of upkeep. No whitewashing is necessary, and the material is cleaned simply by occasional hosing.

The research further shows that although solid fences stop the breeze, they set up air currents which result in greater air movement behind the fence than with any of the screens permitting direct breeze penetration which were tested.

### Short Stint With Paint Brush Works Wonders With Basement "Dungeons"

If your basement looks like an overcrowded dungeon, there's no better time to bring it to life than early spring . . . all you need is a dash of imagination and a short stint with the paint brush!

Color can turn an unsightly dark basement into a cozy recreation room, a cheerful work shop, or a sparkling laundry room, says Ann Boyce, color styling director of the O'Brien Corp., paint manufacturers.

Unightly concrete blocks or poured raw concrete walls, exposed beams, heating ducts and pipes can all be camouflaged with color to turn a bleak, gray basement into a gay, useful room.

As Miss Boyce points out, the right colors cost no more than the wrong ones.

White walls painted all white are uninspiring, pastel shades reflect natural or artificial light and help erase gloom caused by limited light.

A contrasting color in the center part of the ceiling will even make a room seem higher than it really is.

And reflected light on pastel or beige-tone walls will not strike directly at the eyes as with white walls.

"Darker colors absorb heat and light colors reflect heat and light into the room," says Miss Boyce, also noting that colors have a psychological effect as well.

Rich and vibrant oranges and reds are dramatic and stimulating, whereas greens and blues are soothing and restful.

After choosing your color, prepare your surface properly. Clean surface thoroughly to remove dirt, grease, calcimine or white wash; wire brushing, scraping and sanding will remove loose, scaling paints.

If basement walls are mildewed, they should be washed with a solution of one and one-half cups of ordinary household bleach to one gallon of water.

Let the solution stand for about five minutes to allow for bleaching action, then rinse with clear water and dry thoroughly. Fill cracks in blocks or concrete wall with a concrete mixture or an epoxy patching compound.

Check heating ducts and pipes for rusting. New or rusted metal surfaces should be primed with a rust-inhibitive primer before painting.

Use a multi-purpose latex emulsion formulation for walls, ceilings and heating ducts; cover concrete floors with a high gloss floor enamel or low lustre latex floor enamel.

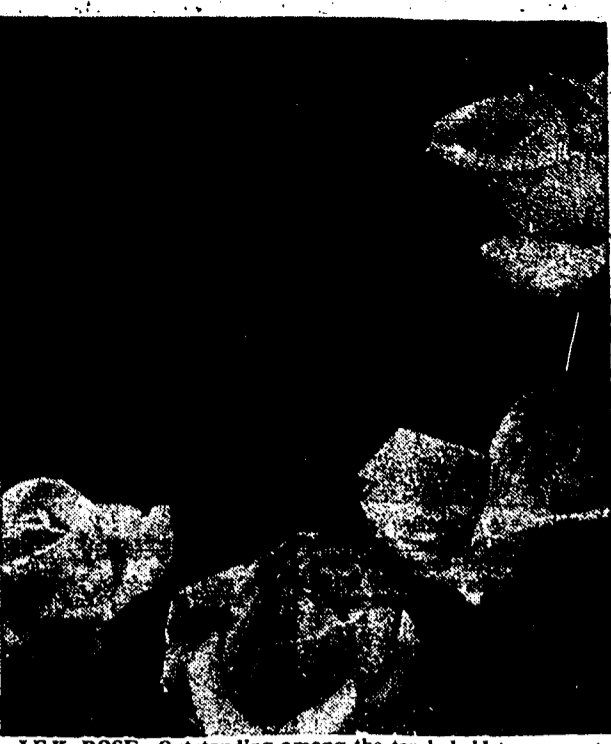

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## Many Older Homes Lend Themselves Especially Well to Modernization

Although it is possible to enlarge most homes, certain designs lend themselves especially well to modernization.

Three such styles are the rambler, the split-level and the two-story, all popular homes today.

For those who now own one of these designs and find themselves out-growing what originally seemed a spacious home, it's reassuring to know that the addition of extra rooms to their home is relatively simple.

The rambler style house is one of the easiest and least expensive houses to remodel.

Chances are that the owners of a soundly constructed rambler house can add a room to provide desirable living space and increase the value of their property by as much as, or more than, the cost of the remodeling project involved.

The design of the typical rambler home provides flexibility in floor plan and the simplicity of its rectangular shape permits a variety of exterior alterations.

For instance, the rectangle can easily become an L-shape with the addition of a room to the back or front of the house. Or the rectangle can be retained by adding space to one end of the home.

The structural shell of the one-story rambler involves relatively simple carpentry and alterations can be accomplished with equally straightforward and inexpensive building methods.

Split-level homes present a few more problems than the rambler or bungalow style residence in remodeling but the possibilities of adding space are just as great, and the design potential may be even greater.

A good rule to follow is to keep the addition at grade level for an obvious reason: it costs less to build on the ground than it does to build on a platform.

However, if a post-supported second level room is added, there is the possibility of creating a carport and sheltered patio under it.

If all three are desirable, then it would be best to build high instead of low.

The split-level can take a 16x20 room addition—very well, providing it is carefully thought out.

The first consideration should be traffic patterns in your home; a split-level house usual-

ly has a more sophisticated traffic flow than other homes, and care should be taken to maintain the traffic pattern.

Whatever you do, plan carefully to get the most room for your budget, selecting building ideas that keep costs of the structural shell as low as possible.

Two-story homes can often benefit from added space, too. Usually a new room in a two-story house is intended to function as a family room, or as a master bedroom that will free an upstairs bedroom for use as a playroom or recreation area for children.

The two-story home has some built-in structural advantages but can pose some knotty design problems. Structurally, the two-story house can take a new room with a minimum of complicated carpentry.

Whatever style of home you have, the advice and assistance of a qualified home modernizer is invaluable. Many modernizers offer design assistance as part of their service, and some of them have licensed staff architects or experienced design-

ers. When it's tooth-brushing time in the morning, will the face in the bathroom mirror look cheery and bright or haggard and wan? A lot depends on the color of the bathroom walls and trim. The right choice of hues in repainting the bathroom can make a big difference.

Walls painted in some yellows and greens reflect a most unflattering light.

Pink, rose, coral and peach tones reflect a warm, healthful glow that starts the day off right. Pure green and gold are good choices.

Blues with a touch of red are warmer and more flattering than pure or greenish blues.

Experts recommend semi-gloss or gloss enamel when painting bathroom walls for many reasons. Enamels keep moisture vapors from entering walls and damaging plaster.

Before applying enamel, dirt should be washed away to insure adhesion of the paint and prevent peeling. Glossy areas should be dulled with sandpaper or steel wool.

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### Early-Bird Tips on Rose Care Given

Have you ever marveled how your next door neighbor's roses do so well? Here are some early-bird planting and growing tips that will help you create a beautiful garden this year.

Select a well-drained site, one which receives full sun all or most of the day. Near coastal areas or where high velocity winds are common, select sheltered locations.

Soil should be prepared several months in advance, using well-aged manure. Do not attempt fertilizing prior to planting time. Using 25 per cent peat moss to 75 per cent soil ratio, mix this combination into the planting site.

In selecting a planting site, try to center it in shallow, circular depressions which serve to catch and hold rainwater for future irrigation.

Remember to make the holes wide enough to accommodate the root system in its natural spread-out form.

After plant has been secured, work loose top soil under and over the roots so there will be no air pockets. Then, add additional soil around the plant until holes is three-fourths full. Allow until the soil is thoroughly saturated.

### Domestic Noise Irks Husbands

According to news reports, more and more husbands are making a habit of stopping off from work at the local tavern before going home to wife and kiddies.

Sound engineers with psychological perception have made some inquiries on the situation and suggest this as the number-one reason: husband and father is postponing as long as possible confrontation with common domestic noises after a comparatively quiet session at the office.

Such "friends" as vacuum cleaners, garbage disposers, and furry ones such as Fido—to say nothing of his own active and outspoken children—produce so much noise that Father is loathe to hasten to his own fireside.

Is this your situation? Vacuum cleaner buzzing? T.V. set chattering away? Garbage disposer unit a-grinding? Wash machine a-whishing and gurgling?

Although the acoustical sciences have achieved great things for public, commercial and industrial noise and sound control, high noise-level continues to be a major problem in the home, itself.

In new home planning, provision should be made for separating "naturally-noisy" rooms from the "naturally-quiet" ones; for example, kitchens should be placed as far as possible from bedrooms, etc.

Older homes can gain some noise control by inexpensive, simple-to-do methods: silent light switches, caulking of window and door frames, weather-stripping of doors, windows and other outside openings, as well as by some of the techniques previously listed.

With research, development and testing of new materials we may reduce home noises so that Papa will hurry home and Mama will be even nicer to come home to. A "quiet" house may even replace the spirited "happy" hour!

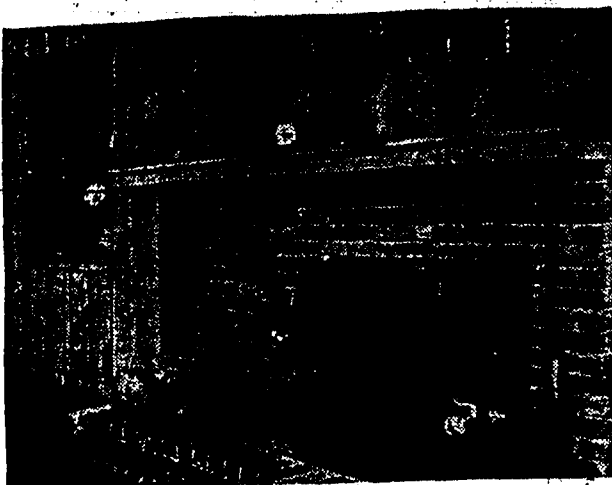

When lighting, avoid "white-washing" the entire garden in imitation of daylight contrasts of light and shadow, highlights and silhouette effects create the best effect. Place lights to illuminate a flower bed or other point of interest.

Conceal light sources by hiding bulbs in shrubbery and place bulbs and fixtures so that light is confined to your own premises. Shielding reflectors can be used to keep light source out of viewers' eyes.

As to color, it is best to use white light or blue-white projector bulbs on flowers. Colored lights can be used sparingly on white statuary, walls and trellises and are most effective in pools and fountains.

Those wishing to landscape with light on a temporary basis can use outdoor-type extension cords and plug in on existing circuits in the house or garage. Avoid overloading any one household circuit. Care should be taken to protect cords against damage from closing doors and windows.

Tape all plug connections outdoors to keep moisture out and keep connections above puddled level. Permanently installed lighting systems should be handled by an electrical contractor.

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## Outdoor Furniture Given New Life With Paint Job

Lawn furniture that has taken a beating from exposure to the elements last summer can be re-vitalized with a little paint and a minimum of elbow grease, says the National Paint, Varnish and Lacquer Association.

According to the association, there are three very important things to remember to restore a sparkling look to weather-beaten outdoor furniture. These are proper surface preparation; good application of a quality coating and effective color-styling.

In preparing the surface, be sure it is completely clean,

scrubbing it thoroughly to remove all dirt.

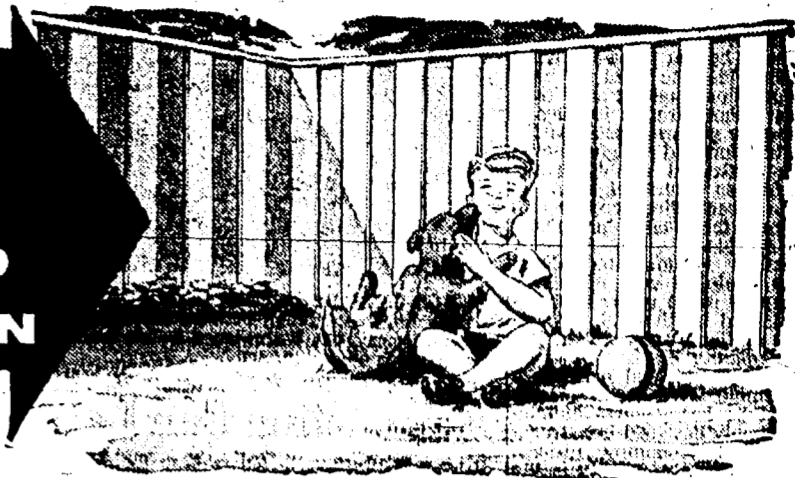
All loose or blistered paint from previous coats must be sanded away. Any glossy areas should be sanded to provide "tooth" for the new paint.

All rust must be removed from metal furniture or wooden furniture with metal attachments.

When the furniture is ready to be painted, a quality enamel may be brushed or sprayed on. With the brush method, allow the paint to flow on generously, cross-stroking to spread coating evenly and catch any excess. The spray method is more recommended for wicker furniture, but remember to cover the surrounding area with cloths or newspapers. It is a good idea to choose a calm day if the job is to be done outdoors, to make sure the least dust will be blown onto the wet paint.

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## Way to Check On Screens Is Outlined

Combination storm and screen windows contribute a lot to living comfort — and they contribute still more if they're carefully chosen for lasting performance.

When buying storms—and screens, test the units for ease of operation, making sure they work without frantic tugging. Examine cut-away sections for construction and design. Heavy-gauge extruded aluminum for the frames assures rigidity.

The insect wire screening is an important factor in trouble-free service.

Quality windows and doors come equipped with aluminum screening made under a standard issued by the U.S. Department of Commerce, which governs quality of the wire, its tensile strength and mesh size.

Examine the hardware. It should be heavy-gauge aluminum, simply designed but strong, free of skimpy fittings. One indication of quality is the use of substantial gussets (triangular metal reinforcements).

## Remodeling Can Let You Eat Elegantly in Kitchen

Like to give that kitchen breakfast nook, alcove or dining area a little more the air of a dining room by injecting warmth and giving it a "separate" feeling?

One of the best ways to do it is to keep the wall of the eating area different from the kitchen wall by means of wallpaper and painted or stained lumber paneling.

The dining area can do a lot more than simply serve as a nice corner in which to start the day, suggests the Western Wood Products Association.

Its walls may feature cupboards for storage, recessed shelves to show off some favorite china, or a plate rail for the same purpose.

It is fortunate if the eating area has a bowed or bay window. If not, then a picture window or casement window that let in plenty of light could be the focal point of the overall plan.

The two-toned effect of wallpaper and horizontal paneling may be used to draw a separate

alcove into the kitchen and yet will give it distinction that sets it apart.

Diagonal paneling can be very handsome, or use a herringbone-patterned paneling, if there is sufficient wall space to do the design justice.

Narrow-width paneling will create an illusion of greater size in a small alcove.

If there isn't enough room for movable furniture in the eating area, build in a table and benches.

These can be made to match the walls.

Even if the home does have a separate breakfast room, a well-planned eating booth makes the good use of wall area, opens the room and eliminates the clutter of an island formed by a table-and-chairs grouping.

Other suggestions include louvered shutters to dress up the windows and afford privacy. Casement molding can also add a touch of distinction to your eating area.

## Patience and Enthusiasm Needed to Plant Garden

You can make your garden a beautiful frame for your home with a little patience, a lot of enthusiasm and these few pointers.

1. Don't plant too deep. Small flower or vegetable seeds only need to be covered. When reseeded bare patches in your lawn, loosen two inches of soil and then fertilize and sow.

2. Using too much fertilizer is much worse than using too little. Follow the directions on the package of a reliable manufacturer.

3. Overwatering washes nutrients out of the soil and helps spread fungi. Let your turf dry almost to the wilting point between waterings, and then soak it to a depth of six inches.

4. You might consider a corrosion-resistant galvanized steel sprinkler, which will give you many years of service. Its advantage is that it furnishes water only as fast as the ground can absorb it.

5. Mow your lawn, but don't try to erase it. It's advisable to set your mower at one and a half inches high and then mow whenever the grass gets over two inches. If your mower blades get dull, they'll split the grass tops, causing them to turn brown.

The blades should be made of high carbon or alloy steel which makes them rugged — so they won't chip when they hit a rock — and hard, so that when the blades are sharpened, they will stay sharp for a long time.

Once a year have the blades removed, ground and balanced.

6. Buy good garden tools, so they won't have to be replaced periodically. A good basic set of tools includes: a spade or shovel, spading fork, rake, hoe, cultivator, shears, trowel, sprayer or duster for plant leaves, water can, cords and stakes for

vines, and a heavy and light pair of gloves.

7. Never leave lawn and garden tools outdoors. If you don't have a definite storage space for the smaller items, put up a cabinet in the garage and store them out of the way. And be sure to wash and dry your tools after using them. They'll not only look better, but they'll last longer.

8. Your war on weeds and insects should start before there is an invasion. All-purpose sprays and dusts will control most insects and diseases in flowers and vegetables if applied early and according to directions.

## Aerator Is Solution to Spray Woes

If you're tired of being constantly doused with water and even soap, at your sink, you should invest in a swivel aerator.

The Swivel Aerator is designed to eliminate sink-spashing by introducing air bubbles to water at the outlet of the tap.

But it does far more than that. By means of an attractive "satellite" ring surrounding the aerator, you can direct the stream of aerated water anywhere in the sink—and without getting hands wet or fingers burned when hot water is being used.

The ladies find it most convenient for washing unused salad makings, vegetables, dog food or other food waste into the disposer without having to wipe down the sink by hand or with a paper towel.

## Landscaping Should Be Up-to-Date

Much of the landscaping of home properties that was done 10 to 15 years ago is outmoded and should be re-done, according to the American Association of Nurserymen.

Neighbors can be very critical of overgrown landscaping, it is said, attributing it to careless housekeeping, or lack of appreciation of beauty.

How do you go about refurbishing your landscaping?

First you start with a survey of the property and the landscaping. Here you may wish to consult with a prominent nurseryman, or other authority, such as a landscape architect.

One thing you certainly don't want to do is to remove trees that may have taken years to grow and offer comfort, beauty or food in the form of shade, flowers and fruit, unless they are well past their maturity.

Some shrubs can be cut back, others cannot. Many new varieties of shrubs and trees have been introduced in recent years to bring far more beauty to the home property.

An outdoor garden-living area may be desired to take advantage of the pleasures of such an area for entertainment of friends and neighbors.

If you have bare spots under trees or elsewhere, ground covers may be planted to add a luxurious look. New rose plant developments have added ever-blooming (spring to fall) characteristics to rose gardens. In keeping with modern living plant screens may be needed for outdoor swim pools.

Today's landscaping calls for shrubs which will grow only to the height desired in the foundation planting and for hedges.

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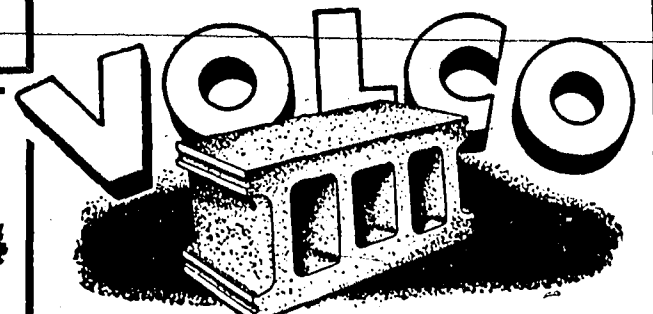
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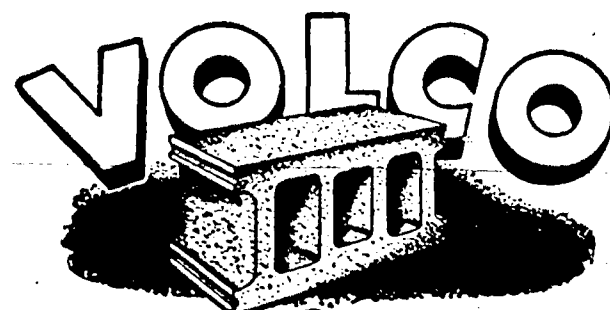

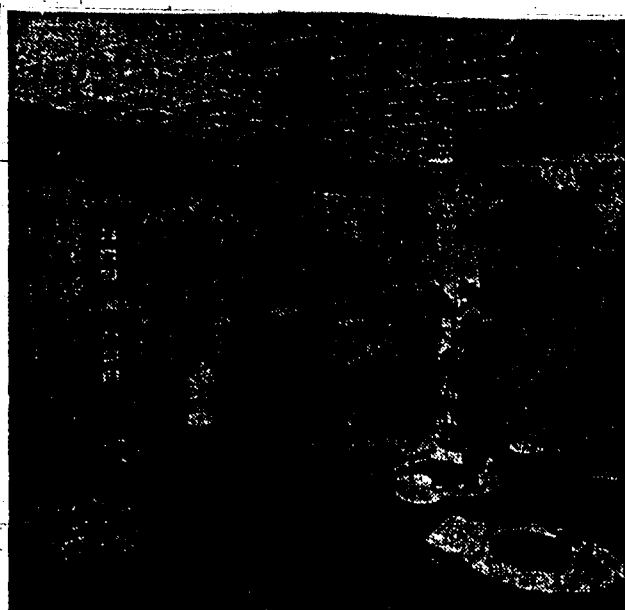

The new studs are faced with half-inch sound deadening insulation board with the nail heads implied. Half-inch gypsum wallboard is then applied vertically

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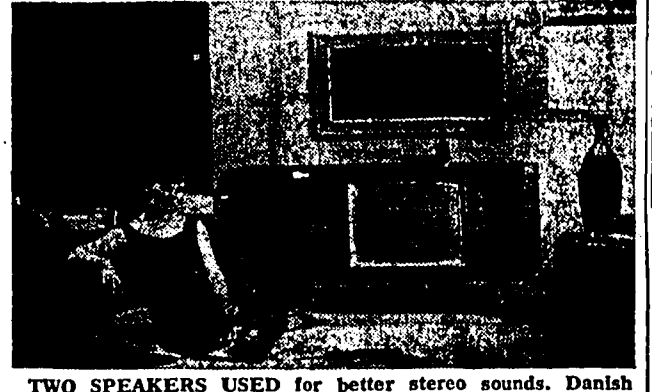

The entire folding door unit slips into the alcove opening and is in place through pre-drilled holes in the frame. All hardware is in place. The job is completed by clipping plastic molding trim onto hooks built into the frame.

There are no floor tracks to catch dirt, since all-control hardware is built in.

Durable polymer, (the same material used for making telephone) is the handsome finish used on these doors. In matte finish, oyster white, they need no other paint, or can be painted to match or contrast existing colors.

Patterns, in these ultra-modern doors, range from traditional stylings to contemporary.

Besides adding beauty and utility to kitchen corners, there are dozens of areas around the house where they will show off their practical good looks.

## Adding "Pouff" To Pillows Is Not Hard Job

Have you ever seen anything more pitiful looking than a feather pillow that's lost its "pouff and plumpness"? What to do about restoring that old fluff to those feathers can be a ticklish question.

Not so, say the experts at the Hotpoint Laundry Department; you can give the new "oomph" with practically no time and effort on your part.

Use your automatic washer and dryer and follow a few simple suggestions.

Make sure that all rips and tears are mended. If the ticking is torn or worn, place the pillow in an old pillow case and baste the open end closed.

Wash two pillows at a time; place one at each side of the agitator. Set the washer for regular cycle, warm wash and rinse, gentle action. Add a regular amount of detergent recommended for normal soil.

The models have from 24,000 to 36,000 BTU's, are easy to install and need no outdoor condensing unit.

The Skuttle Manufacturing Co. is marketing a permanent, washable filter media of "open-pore" polyurethane foam developed by Scott Paper Co.

It can be easily cut to fit any window type air-conditioner and lasts for the life of the unit, as well as being resistant to mildew, germs and fungus.

The simplest, most attractive and economically feasible method to add receptacles — electrical outlets — is with multi-outlet systems.

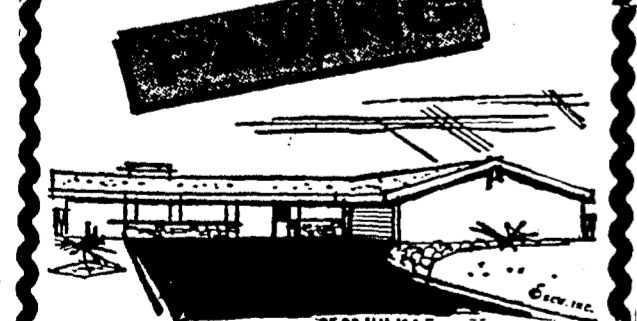

Proper cleaning measures will preserve a safe, clean home during redecoration, according to ServiceMaster, professional cleaning organization.

Keeping work areas clear will reduce household hazards, as well as dirt. Steps should also be taken to clear these areas of curious young observers.

If children are too small to heed "off-limits" signs or commands, a temporary barrier should be set up.

If yours are made of annealed glass, which is generally less than a quarter-inch in thickness and shatters easily, you can replace this with shatter-proof safety glass.

Safety glass can be cracked but it will not shatter and while it is somewhat more expensive than ordinary glass, it provides insurance against the common walk-through accident, with serious or fatal injuries.

In addition to insistence on safety glass, those who own homes with glass panels or doors should follow this safety rule: Never assume that a glass door is open!

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### 'Weedless' Garden Is Available

Now gardeners can achieve that happy goal — "weedless" gardening — with potted plants. No more last ditch efforts to fight off August's annual invasion of weeds with container gardening. Just sit back and watch the plants thrive, virtually without weeds.

And it's no trick at all for gardeners who are raising professionally-started plants in red clay pots.

Plant growers and nurserymen start seeds and bulbs and root cuttings in soil that has been sterilized by steam at high temperatures.

When the little plants are big enough to be transferred to larger pots and marketed, they are also re-potted in sterilized soil.

This sterilization process effectively knocks out stray weed seeds or latent bugs that might interfere with the healthy growth of the plant.

Porous clay pots enable the plants to utilize all the nutrients in the soil for maximum growth.

Porosity of the clay naturally leaches out any excess water through the sides and bottoms of the pots.

At the same time, the porous clay walls allow needed air to reach and nourish roots. This saves the added effort of cultivating the soil around the plants to insure adequate aeration.

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### Take Good Care of Tools For Grooming Lawn, Garden

It's a long way from the stone trowel to the rotary mower. But all implements, especially those used outdoors, require a great deal more care than those of the past.

To insure longer life and better service from your outdoor equipment, we suggest the following "green thumb" hints:

1. Annoying rust won't form on garden tools coated with petroleum jelly. Hoes, rakes and spades not made of stainless steel should be rinsed and dried after each use, then treated to a fresh coat of petroleum jelly.
2. Keep pruning and cutting shears in condition to clip neatly along by lubricating them often with petroleum jelly.
3. Check and repair rubber or plastic handles on mowers, wheelbarrows and cutting implements before initial use; loose grips are harder to use, may be dangerous.
4. Sprinklers or watering cans may rust if not thoroughly dried after each session. For added protection, coat the sprinkler with petroleum jelly.
5. Tools with blades should be sharpened not only at the first of the season, but as often as needed for maximum efficiency.
6. To eliminate misplacing or careless handling of small tools, hang them from a rack. The simplest rack can be made from peg board and a few dime-store hooks.
7. Even glove-wearing won't always protect the most basic tools — your hands — against chapping and roughness. Before beginning any outdoor work, treat them to a soothing film of petroleum jelly. Rub a little extra around cuticles and beneath nails to discourage hard-to-remove dirt deposits.
8. Petroleum jelly can be a great aid with many items around the house which are exposed to the elements, for example:
9. Outdoor light bulbs won't rust if the threads are lightly coated with petroleum jelly.

### Electric Outlets Needed Outdoors

Today's trend toward outdoor living has created a greater need for electrical outlets and switches located on or near the exterior of a house.

To give lasting service, it is therefore important that these outlets and switches be weatherproof. There are on the market today, weatherproof plates with metal, spring-hinged covers that protect outlets and switches from the elements when they're not in use. Covers with locking devices can also be installed to prevent unauthorized use. Most of these devices can be had at little extra cost.

If you putter around the garden, you'll be happy to know that a special moisture-resistant pencil can spare you the headache of trying to identify vegetable and flower beds with the seed packet. Just attach a tag marked with this pencil. It won't wash out, fade or rub off.

### Plan Before Plunging Is Best Rule for Home Pools

From fabled luxuries to increasingly popular backyard fixtures, swimming pools have become investments that pay off in increased family enjoyment.

Home owners who are ready to take the plunge and invest in a home swimming pool have many considerations before the actual construction begins.

Costs, materials, landscape and upkeep are just a few points that require careful planning.

Although pool construction costs are lower now, it is best not to skimp on quality work in a long-term investment such as this as any compromise may end up in costly repairs and increased upkeep.

In choosing the material of which the pool is to be constructed, type of soil and physical layout of the property are important considerations.

Often the best way to determine if the pool should be constructed of gunite, (pneumatically applied concrete), vinyl-liner, steel or some other material is to see which is the prevailing choice in the area. A good clue as to which is best suited to the region.

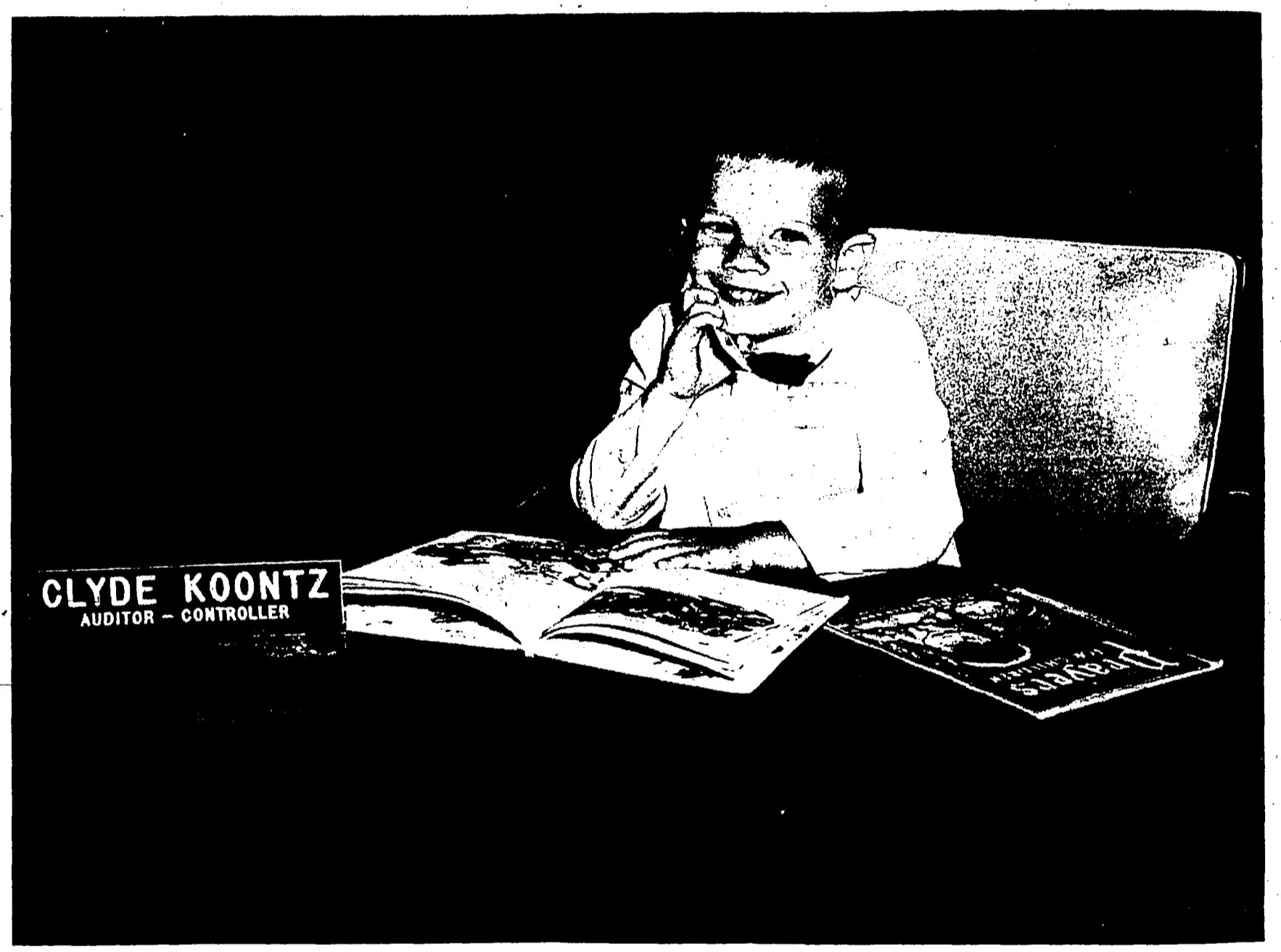
Before construction, check the property for underground rocks or man-made hindrances such as septic tanks or cables.

The shape of the pool is mostly a matter of personal preference, but there are several points to consider in choosing. First, a rectangular pool, though less imaginative in design than the many free-form pools for races and sports.

Also, the pool should have a few hidden corners as possible to avoid algae forming and eventually clogging the filter and to facilitate cleaning.

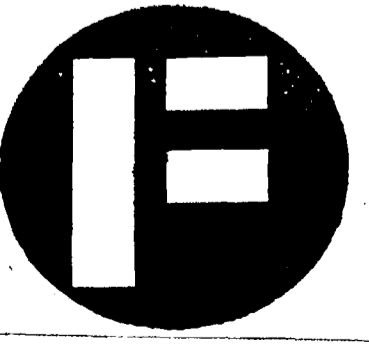
