Casual Seller **Need Not** Collect Tax

of Idaho's sales tax law a cas-ual or occasional seller is not a retailer — and need not collect tax on his sales.

A person making not more than two sales during a 12 month casional seller and sales by him are not subject to tax.

If, however, he holds a sell-

If, nowever, ne notes a self-ers permit or is regularly en-gaged in making sales of this or any kind, he will be regarded as a retailer without regard to the number of sales made in a calendar year and must collect

Here are examples: -Farmer sells ten dozen eggs to purchaser for \$5. This is the only sale at retail made during the calendar year. It would no be subject to sales tax.

-Farmer agrees to sell entire output of his poultry flock to a sorority house for one year for a fixed price. He makes no other sales at retail during the year. Without regard to the method

used to establish a price, this will not be regarded as a single sale and is subject to sales tax.

-Executor sells all the personal effects of decedent to buyer for \$3,000.
