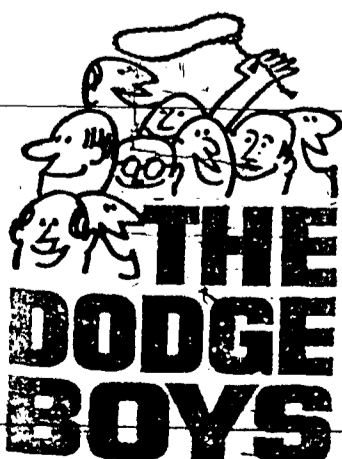

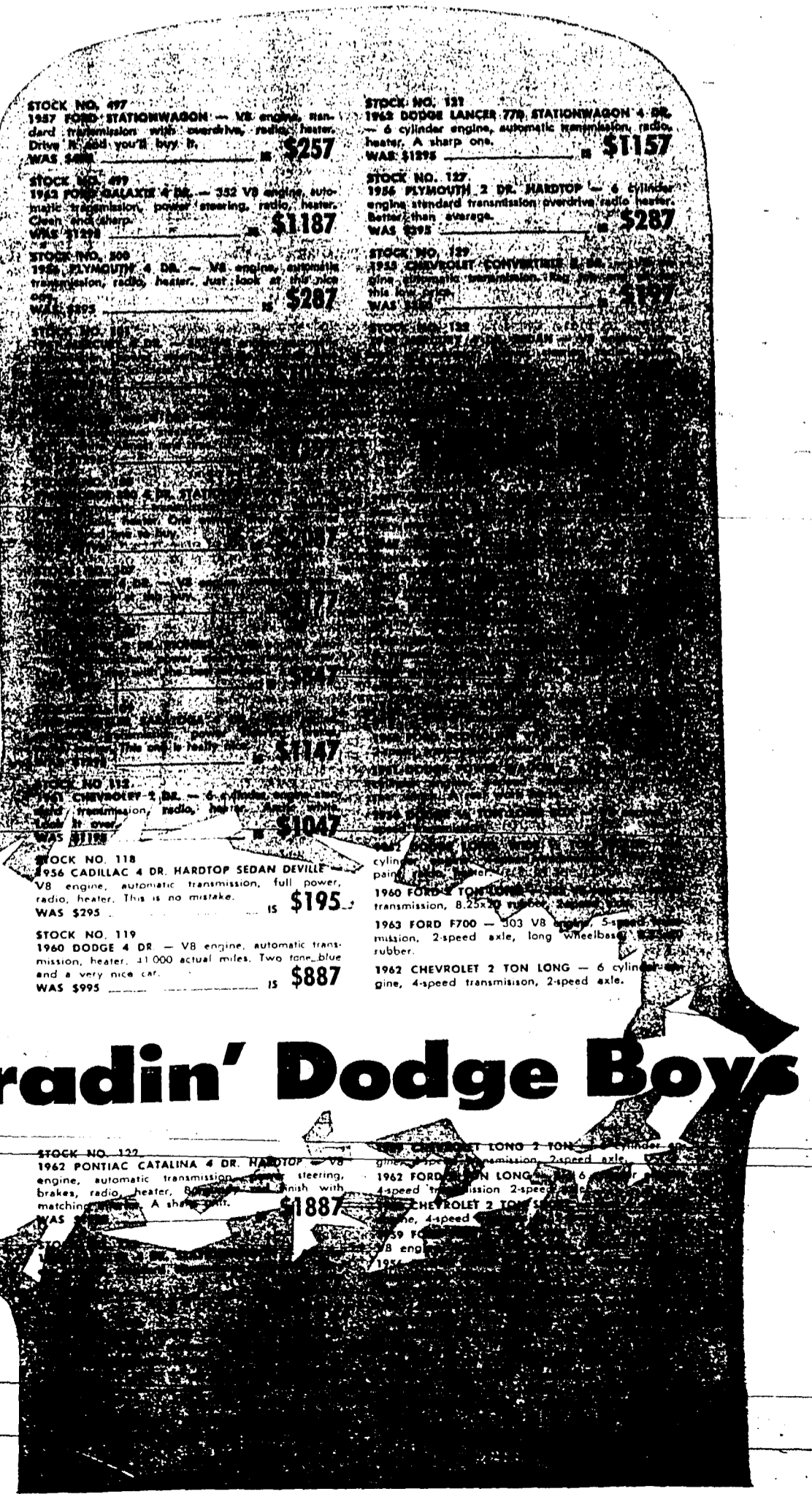

**Railroad Posts Limitations on Cargo Shipments**

OMAHA (AP) — The Union Pacific Railroad announced Wednesday sharp limitations on the handling of less-than-carload shipments of freight.

Starting Aug. 1, the railroad said, shipments of less than 4,000 pounds will not be handled in interstate traffic except between Los Angeles and Las Vegas, Nev., unless the smaller shipments accompany carload shipments. This limitation also will be effective on intrastate traffic in Oregon, Washington and Wyoming. The line plans to extend the limitation to intrastate traffic in other states later.

### Sting of New Levy Eased By Tax Cut

was 80 per cent, the smallest (except for the top bracket, which showed an adjusted gross income of \$19,695.42) was 34 per cent.

Another saving, not shown in these figures, is provided by a portion of the law providing that the amount of sales tax paid during the year may be deducted as an itemized deduction on both the federal and state tax return.

The amount of sales tax paid during the year is figured on the basis of a computation for ordinary living expenses, based on total income and number of exemptions, plus the tax paid on any major purchases.

The computation on how much was paid for ordinary living expenses will be available prior to time for figuring the income tax.

Major purchases would be such things as automobiles, refrigerators, stoves, television sets and other major appliances, furniture and other costly items.

This deduction would cut down the amount of taxable income and result in a tax decrease.

The table which follows was compiled by the office of the state tax collector. The (s) following the number of exemptions denotes single person filing return. The (j) denotes a joint return. Percentages of decrease are figured to nearest per cent.

FAIRFIELD — Two sets of scales are under construction in Camas Prairie. The large scales will be capable of weighing truckloads of hay and other produce.

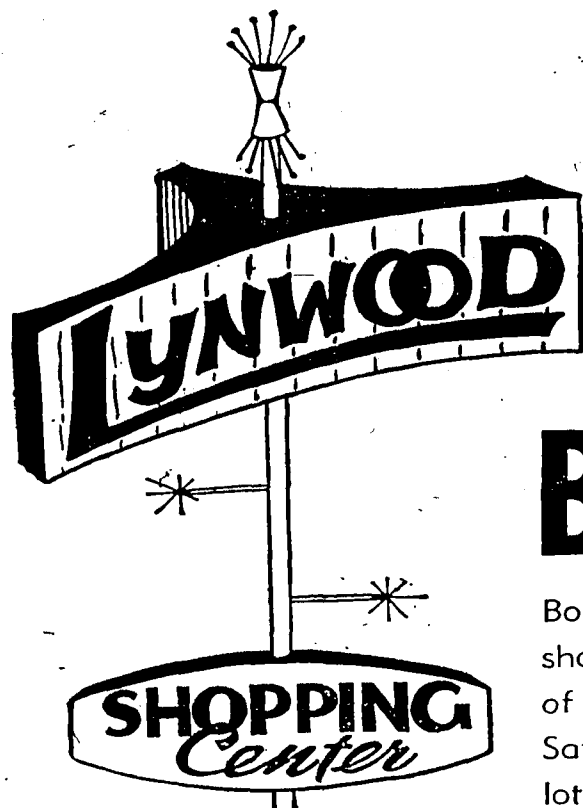

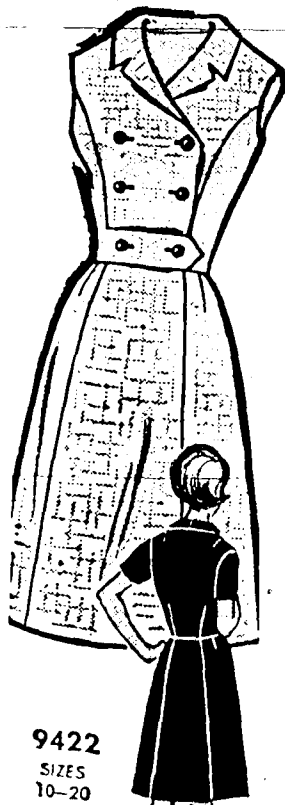

## Suit Filed To Test Wheat Laws

SPOKANE (AP) — A special three-judge panel will meet here Friday to hear testimony in a suit filed by a Benton County farmer to test the constitutionality of parts of the federal wheat program.

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court Feb. 3 by Shirley Moon, Prosser, Wash., as a test case to challenge the constitutionality of the 25-cent per bushel marketing certificate tax imposed on wheat exports. Moon contends the fee is a tax on exports and in violation of the U.S. Constitution which forbids assessment of a tax or duty on articles exported from any state.

The suit, filed against Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman, is supported financially by the State Farm Bureau, a spokesman said.

The special court will include Judge Frederick G. Hamley, Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, San Francisco; Judge John C. Bowen, U. S. District Court, Seattle, and Judge Charles L. Powell, U. S. District Court, Spokane.

Moon asks the court to declare the tax unconstitutional and order a refund of a certificate fee he paid Jan. 26 when he shipped 1,848 bushels of wheat from Portland to the Netherlands.

The patrol said the Utah Department of Financial Responsibility would determine if the death would be added to the state's 1965 traffic toll.

CAREY—The high water table in the Carey area has started to recede. It has been going down an inch or two every day.

Sunday was the last day water in the ground rose, according to most reports. This has been a big water year here and farmers have had no worry about lack of water.

However, the great amount of water has caused the water table or "sub" to raise very high.

W. C. Eldredge, who has lived in Carey nearly all his life, said, "This is the worst we have ever had. I can remember back to 1896 and I have seen the sub bad—up to two or two and one-half feet of the surface—but this year the sub has been higher than I have ever seen it."

Eldredge, who is watermaster for the Carey Valley Reservoir Co., which operates Fish Creek Reservoir, reported that the water table is so high in the area below Fish Creek Reservoir that water is standing on top of the ground in some places.

Eldredge said he shut water out of a ditch on the Jess Farnworth farm four miles northeast of town and in a one-half mile distance 25 inches of water seeped into the ditch.

The Lee Peterson farm, Gilbert Cross farm, Welsh place operated by Leon Peck, and Hot Springs Ranch are farms located from two miles to eight miles northeast of Carey where the sub has given farmers trouble. A tractor or vehicle cannot be driven over the saturated ground.

Water has seeped into a majority of the basements, with an average depth of four feet of water. Water was three feet deep in the basement of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Kelly's home.

This is the first time water has come in their basement since 1947 when the home was built. Some basements get some water in nearly every year and the owners expect it after years of experience.

Many inconveniences have been caused by the high water table. Water heaters, furnaces and other large appliances, furniture and many household articles have been damaged.

If not ruined the large appliances were unable to be operated because of the danger of a combination of electricity and water.

Some private wells in Carey were contaminated and water has had to be disinfected before being used.

Charley Haskell, one-half mile southwest of town, pumped all of the water out of his basement and then the water pressure underneath started to push up the cement floor until he shut the pump off and let water back in the basement to equalize the pressure.

Richard (Dick) Mallon, owner of the Carey Elevator, stated that he has had two submersible automatic pumps running two big streams since about May 17. The platform truck scales at the elevator will not work if water gets on the beams so water is continually pumped out of the scale pit.

Water would be nine feet deep in the grain dump pit if it was not pumped out. Mallon says the sub is highest since 1955 when the Carey Elevator was built.

Swimming in the big holes and gravel pits that have filled with water has been a delightful summer's pastime for many Carey youngsters, so there is a bright side to the "sub story."

## Government To Explore Sea Bottom

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Government announced Wednesday plans to explore a new use for nuclear technology — helping man recover minerals from the ocean floor by taking atomic "fingerprints" of the sea bottom.

The suggested plan is to explore likely spots with an advanced version of a device called a "Neutron Activation Analyzer," already widely used on land for a wide range of purposes — from analysis of coal to crime detection.

The instrument shoots neutrons — atomic rays — into a sample of unknown material. The rays make the atoms inside the material radioactive, and the atoms disintegrate, emitting high-energy rays of their own.

According to the kinds of chemicals in the material, the emitted rays produce a characteristic "fingerprint" of the stuff, allowing identification.

The device is so sensitive that a wiping taken from a suspect's hand can reveal whether he has fired a gun recently.

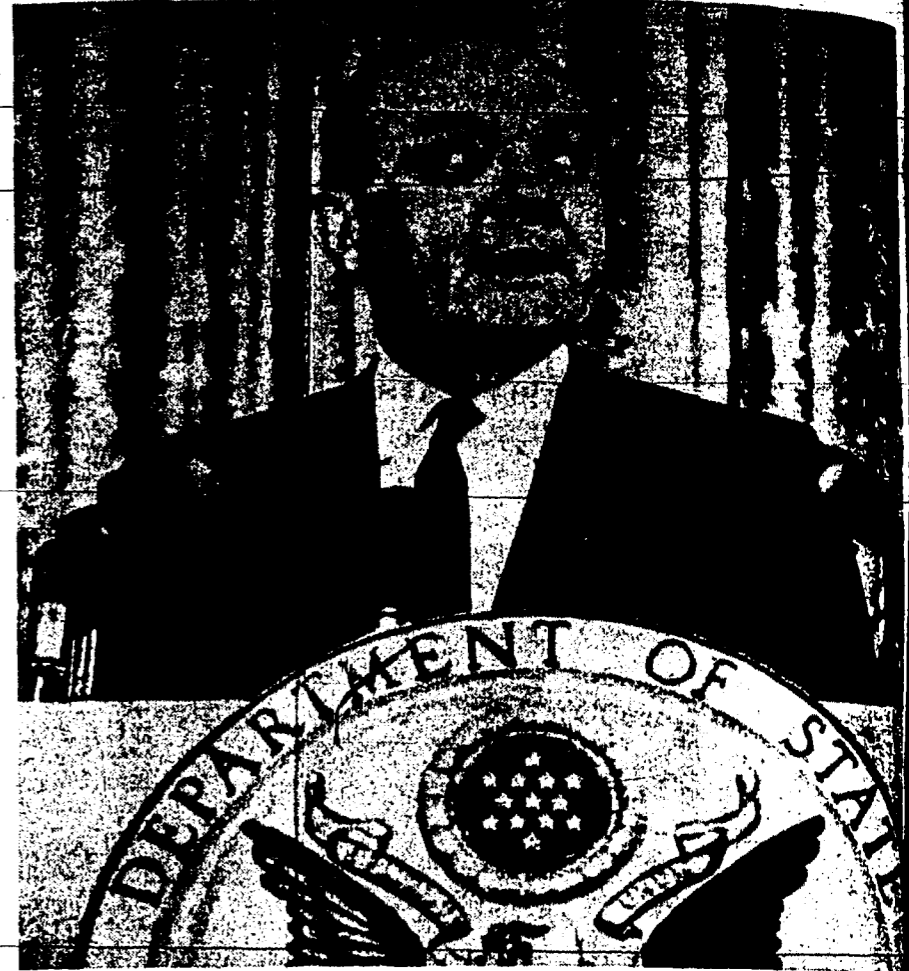
The method has even been used to help snag moonshiners by identifying the source of soil found on confiscated stills.

Efforts to develop a special variety of the gadget for use in uncharted mining explorations were outlined in a joint announcement of the Atomic Energy Commission and the Bureau of Mines.

## Jazy Beats Clarke, Lowers 2-Mile Mark

MELUN, France (UPI) — Michel Jazy of France, with an assist from Australia's Ron Clarke, continued his remarkable month-long assault on track records Wednesday night by lowering the world two-mile standard performance, Jazy also clipped 3.2 seconds off his world mark for 3,000 meters, whizzing past that way-station in 7:49.0.

Although Clarke finished far behind the "Flying Frenchman," he also eclipsed the listed world records for both events, being clocked in 7:51 for 3,000 meters and 8:24.8 for two miles.

Jazy's two-mile clocking clipped a remarkable seven seconds off his listed world record.

Jazy and Clarke hold every world record between one mile and 10 miles. Exactly two weeks ago, Jazy lowered the mile record to 3:53.6 at Rennes. The previous week he set European records for 5,000 meters (13:34.4) and the mile (3:55.3).

The 26-year-old Frenchman announced after setting the mile record that he would spend the next two months vacationing. However, he changed those plans when he was accused of ducking Clarke during the Aussie's current European tour.

Following Wednesday's race, Jazy thanked Clarke for pushing him to the records.

"Ron knew I was faster over this distance," he said, "but he still went as fast as he could to help me lower the records. Without him to pace me around the fifth and sixth laps, I might not have done it."

Said Clarke, who will meet Jazy again in Finland next Wednesday: "I am very pleased to have helped Michel set such fast times, but I am even more pleased to have gone so fast myself. I may have lost, but I still went much faster than ever before."

The weather was perfect for the much heralded meeting between the world's two greatest distance runners. Their fractional clockings were truly remarkable.

The first 400 meters were covered in 61 seconds and the 800 meters mark was passed in 2:03.3, with only Gamoudi of Tunisia staying with the leaders.

At the mile mark, covered in 4:11.1, Gamoudi dropped back. Jazy and Clarke alternated in the lead until two laps from the end.

Then Jazy sprinted away and held a lead of 10 yards upon reaching at the bell final lap.

Clarke tried to rally in the last 100 yards but the French-

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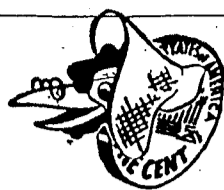

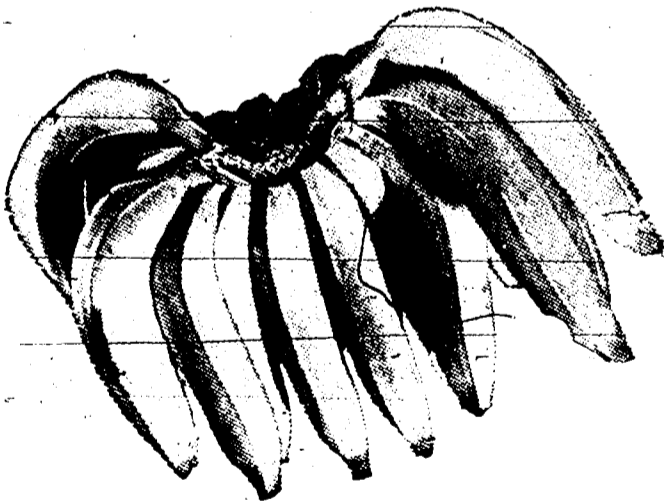

# Schools Are Being Built In New Shape

NEW YORK (AP) — School buildings, once little more than brick boxes with windows, are blossoming into hundreds of new shapes.

There are snail-shaped schools, circular schools and inside schools.

In New York's Harlem, a junior high school is being built without windows. The pupils in air-conditioned classrooms will be sealed off from the sights and sounds of one of the nation's worst slums. The building will sit on 14-foot stilts with a shaded play area underneath.

The nation is at the peak of a long school-building boom, spending for construction of elementary and secondary schools rose from \$111 million in 1945-46 to an estimated \$3.26 billion last year.

New ideas for school design seem to have the same aim: to provide the best learning environment for the least number of dollars and still leave room for future needs.

"I think we're serving no purpose if we are building something in 1965 that could have been built in 1955," says architect Walter J. Rooney Jr., who helped design the Harlem school. "We should be building schools that will be fresh and exciting 10 years from now."

An estimated 52.9 million students were enrolled in schools and colleges last year—more than one-fourth of the U.S. population. Pupils in elementary schools alone numbered 35.4 million.

While the growth of the bumper postwar baby crop to college age promises to shift the emphasis in the next few years to college construction, huge problems still face elementary and secondary school planners.

Most problems involve money. While enrollments are high and new teaching theories demand new concepts for schools, construction costs continue to rise.

With rising costs have come increasing demands to build school buildings for less money.

"It's not so much a question anymore of how good a school you can build, but how much school you can fit in a tight budget," says architect Robert Buchter of Garden City, N.Y.

Oil Station May Become Resort Site

HASSI MESSAOUD, Algeria (AP) — This is an oil-pumping station bang out in the middle of the Sahara Desert but the people here are talking half seriously of making it a tourist resort.

And they are right, but too many tourists might take away the charm.

Hassi Messaoud, 500 miles out in the desert, is one of the calmest places on earth unless you are right in the power station or the oil separation plant, where there is much noise. Even in summer it is not intolerably hot. In fall, winter and spring it is a delight.

It is sand-dune desert, and no mistake, but what has come up with the oil, from different depths, of course, is water. It has changed everything. It comes up in such quantity that there are vast areas of garden, blossoming oleander bushes and trees, swimming pools that would do credit to a big Florida hotel, green lawns and goldfish ponds.

But the silence is noticeable: no trains, no cars, no cackling motor bikes, no distant whistles, no church bells, no groups of students singing their way home. Nothing.

At present this is a man's city. There are about 5,000 French and Algerian engineers and workers, from senior geologists to sweepers, and about 40 women. Among the women are a few unattached secretaries, but most are wives.

"This is the greatest oasis in the desert," said an engineer strolling into the air-cooled bar of the S. N. Repal. This is one of the two French companies which discovered oil here, laid out the gardens and built the quarters, the movie theaters, the swimming pools, the stables, the tennis courts and the zoos.

# Americans Fighting in Viet Nam Only 12 Years After End of Korean War

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—If we ever get this blankety-blank war over, the United States will never get involved in another blankety-blank war like it again."

Those words were spoken off the record by Gen. Mark W. Clark as the fighting in Korea drew to an end. Inasmuch as Clark is retired from public life and there is no security involved, his remark is worth repeating now because of its irony.

Twelve years after the end of the Korean War, the United States is involved in a war in Viet Nam and there is every indication the fighting will be just as blankety-blank frustrating as it was in Korea.

Fifteen years ago, on the morning of June 25, 1950, North Korean Communist infantry, supported by Russian tanks and artillery, cracked a hole in the weak defenses along the 38th Parallel. It was the beginning of a war that lasted three years, claimed 60,000 American lives and 100,000 wounded.

But that wasn't the end. In the decade since, the American taxpayers have poured \$4.5 billion in various forms of aid and assistance to the citizenry of the Republic of Korea.

Mark Clark was driven to profanity over the situation in Korea for the same reason Gen. Douglas MacArthur was fired and Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway was happy to get a transfer to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Clark succeeded

Ridgway as supreme commander of United Nations forces in Korea.

The maddening thing about commanding troops in Korea was the limitation on maneuverability. By the time Gen. Clark finally affixed his signature to

an armistice, it took approval from the Pentagon to move a unit as large as a battalion along the purposely stalemated front. And everyone said the Pentagon couldn't give approval for ordering that battalion to attack without an okay from the State Department.

"If we ever get in a war here again we'll use all the weapons we've got," Clark also said off the record a decade ago.

Should the North Koreans strike again, they would get a hot reception, whether nuclear or not. There are 650,000 Republic of Korea and U.S. forces along the front today.

# Commercial Use of Early Bird Is Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal communications commission cleared the way Wednesday for a space age milestone — commercial operation of the Early Bird communications satellite beginning next week.

The FCC authorized the Communications Satellite Corp. to operate the satellite, hovering over the Atlantic Ocean, in conjunction with its earth sending and receiving station at Andover, Maine.

While ordering an investigation of the television rates proposed by Comsat — \$5,245 an hour during peak usage hours — the FCC allowed the rates to go into effect during the early life of the satellite. It directed, in line with a Comsat suggestion, that all income from television use be set aside in a special account until the rate problem is resolved.

# Beef Stew Again? Not Unless Hospital Computers Say So

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—A better day is dawning for hospital patients who might be willing to eat beef stew every six days but don't want to see a veal croquette with egg sauce more than once in two weeks.

Hospitals that use computers can ensure that the veal croquettes don't show up on the menu very often, if that's what the patients want, the nation's home economists were told Tuesday.

Computers will also free the dietician, he said, so that she will have more time to spend on the special nutritional problems of various groups of patients in her hospital, such as the very young and the very old, the long-term patient and other groups of therapeutic diets.

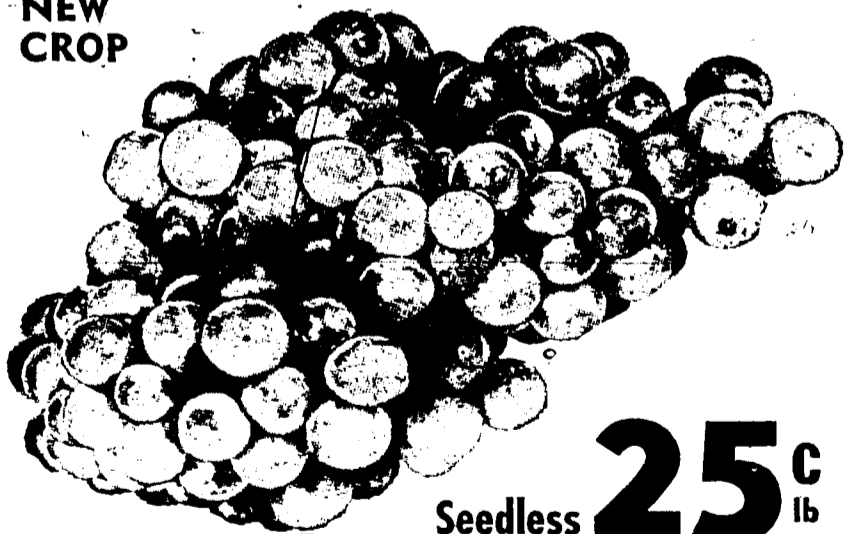

# Food Costs Down, Says Secretary

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said Wednesday food expenditures will go down this year in comparison to "take-home pay."

He told a news conference that while prices of some food commodities are higher currently than a year ago, over-all food expenditures in relation to income would continue to decline.

Freeman also discussed efforts of the department in eliminating racial discrimination. He said every agency in the department has responded to the call to eliminate discrimination.

He predicted farm exports in fiscal 1965 would reach a record \$6.1 billion. Agriculture exports were slightly above \$6 billion in fiscal 1964.

Freeman said that in 1964 an average family spent about 18.5 per cent of its income after taxes for food. He said this was an all-time low. In 1960, he said, the figure was about 20 per cent.

Freeman said the best estimates at this time indicate a further reduction to about 18.3 per cent.

"Food continues to be the best bargain available to the American consumer," he said.

Freeman said that prices for meat and vegetables are somewhat higher now than a year ago. Weather conditions have caused a temporarily higher price for some vegetables, but increased supplies have already started a down trend in retail prices, he said.

He said meat packers now reflect lower supplies as compared to a year ago.

Freeman predicted a strong demand for beef during the remainder of the year. With supplies of all beef short, he said, beef prices can be expected to be strong.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Securities and Exchange Commission Thursday slapped a 10-day ban on over-the-counter trading in capital stock of Idamont Oil and Mining Co. of Billings, Mont. The temporary suspension will run through July 2.

The commission also announced it has asked the U. S. District Court of Montana to join the company from further violation of the registration requirements and anti-fraud provisions of the Federal Securities Laws.

According to the SEC complaint, Idamont and nine other defendants have been selling the company's stock when no registration statement was filed with the commission. In addition, the public was given "untrue statements" concerning Idamont's possessions of inexhaustible gold-bearing ore reserves, its development of a secret process to extract gold, and company assays showing that gold worth \$2,800 or more could be extracted from each ton of ore.

The defendants failed to state that the company never has produced gold in commercial quantities, that is "secret process" has never successfully produced gold, and that Idamont and three of the defendants were enjoined on March 30, 1964 from selling the company's stock in violation of registration and anti-fraud provisions of the securities laws.

An SEC spokesman said that the Idamont stock had been sold in Billings, Mont., Platte, S.D., Bloomfield and Birmingham, Mich., and Lrrchmont, N.Y.

# Communists Sentenced to Prison Terms

JAKARTA (UPI) — Thirty-six Communists have been sentenced to prison terms in connection with the fatal beating of an army officer last May in Sumatra, it was reported Wednesday.

A court in Medan, North Sumatra, sentenced 36 members of Communist peasant and youth organizations to terms ranging from 5 to 15 years, the official news agency Antara said.

The Communists were sentenced last Friday and a protest was immediately filed by the Communist Party Peasant Association, the report said.

The army and the Ministry of Plantations charged that the group clubbed a Lt. Sudjono to death when he tried to clear a state-owned rubber plantation of squatters who had illegally planted other crops.

The case became a headline issue between the army and the Communist party.

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# Women to Get Antarctic Home

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (AP) — The United States will build a barracks for six women scientists at McMurdo Station, Cmdr. W. H. Withrow of the U.S. Navy Antarctic base reported. He told the Canterbury branch of the New Zealand Antarctic Society he had no idea when the women would arrive and he did not identify them.

## Residents Stock up on Tax Exemption Permits; Outsiders Could Care Less

OLYMPIA (AP) — Oregon and Idaho residents from smaller communities are flocking across the border to buy Washington sales tax exemption permits, but the outsiders from larger cities apparently could care less.

That was the report Wednesday from the State Tax Commission after three weeks of selling \$1 permits that allow outsiders to escape Washington's 4.2 per cent sales tax on items they use in their own states.

The commission said more than 2,600 permits have been sold so far, with most of them going along the Idaho border at Walla Walla and Longview on the Oregon line.

Idaho has become so alarmed that its state tax collector, Floyd West, told of possible plans to set up border check stations to make certain Idaho residents pay a 3 per cent use tax on items purchased in Washington.

Washington Tax Commission Chairman George Kinnear said Idaho officials "certainly have the right to enforce their laws."

The Washington commission said about 1,000 permits have been issued to Idaho residents, 350 to Oregonians at Walla Walla and 677 to Oregon residents at Longview.

But only 53 have been sold to Portland residents at the Vancouver office, 50 to Canadians at Bellingham, 56 to outsiders at Seattle and two or three to Canadians at Port Angeles.

Commission spokesmen said outsiders from the smaller communities probably want to buy in the larger shopping centers like Longview and Walla Walla, but those from larger cities like Portland would have less reason to cross the border.

Canadians probably aren't buying, they said, because they must wait 48 hours in the United States before they can take anything back from Washington.

The exemption likely is attractive to Idaho residents in view of the fact that state has a 3 per cent sales tax going into effect next July 1. They can escape the levy by coming to Washington if they can avoid paying the Idaho use tax.

Although Idaho officials said they hoped to enforce their use tax they conceded other states have found this difficult to do.

The Washington Tax Commission has been selling the exemption permits so far mostly from its offices in border towns, but soon will name 50 additional agents—the bulk of them in banks—to issue the certificates in smaller communities along the borders.

The exemption plan, officials said, has led to no reports yet of abuses or enforcement problems. They had expressed fear earlier that it would be difficult to make sure the permits and

exemptions were restricted to bona-fide non-residents.

The hottest permit sales were reported in Walla Walla, where merchants have been promoting the exemptions. Permits have been going at the rate of 20 to 25 a day. One large Oregon corporation was reported to have indicated plans to do its buying in that city.

The only opposition so far, officials said, has come from some residents in Longview complaining about outsiders escaping the sales tax.
