

Organism Is Blamed for Coast Illness

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—A month ago Sunday county health officials spotted a marked increase in reports of intestinal disorders.

The increase was the first evidence of a wave of sickness and death carried by a water-borne organism that has struck 18,000 persons to date. Three persons have died.

The organism — a bacterium called *Salmonella Typhimurium* — enters through the city's water system, hits the human intestinal tract causing severe vomiting.

"This now appears to be the biggest thing to hit the nation in almost 30 years, in terms of the number of persons affected within a given area," said Dr. Louis Hertz, regional director of the California Department of Public Health.

"I believe now that the epidemic stage — hard to define — has passed," Hertz. "The disease, communicable, now lingers on in the secondary stages, passed from one person to another."

Public health investigators are trying to find the source of infection and finish the job they started May 27.

Guide Urged For Student Discontent

NEW YORK (AP) — Much of the student unrest and discontent sweeping college campuses is an encouraging phenomenon, but it must be guided and controlled by the faculties, a Harvard professor said today.

Dr. Dana L. Farnsworth, director of Harvard University's health services, said "impatience with injustice" is an attribute which we should try to develop and encourage in our students. But such impatience should not be so impulsive as to be destructive of individuals or ideas.

Farnsworth, in an address prepared for the annual convention of the National Education Association, said student rebellion can be channeled into constructive lines if the college administration and faculty treat students with scrupulous fairness and consistency and listen to their complaints, no matter how trivial.

Another speaker, President E. K. Fretwell of the Association for Higher Education, suggested that student leaders be given a greater role in helping to run the colleges and universities.

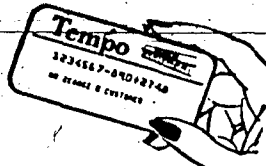

Arson Eyed As Cause of Utah Blaze

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Fire Marshal's Office investigated today the possibility of arson in a fire that destroyed downtown Salt Lake City's abandoned First Congregational Church early Sunday.

The blaze shot flames 300 feet into the air and blew sparks as high as 500 feet — over nearby apartment houses and Salt Lake City Board of Education offices next door.

Firemen kept the two-alarm fire from spreading. It attracted thousands of spectators.

Battalion Chief F. E. McKinnon said there were indications the fire was started by an arsonist "who planned it to be a fast spreading fire."

McKinnon said there was no chance to save the building after firemen arrived. He said he

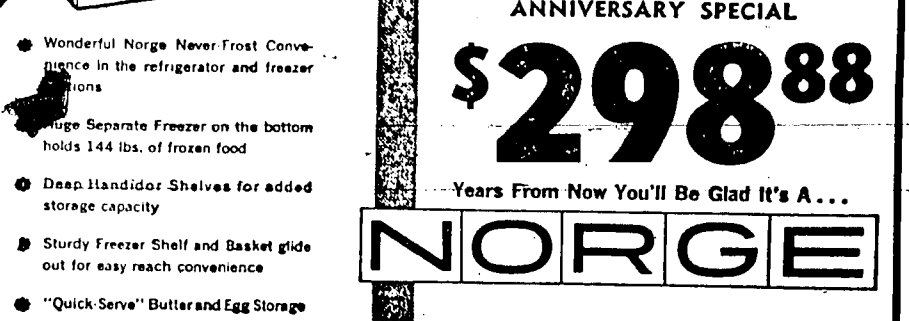

Truckers in Philadelphia Back on Job

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — All truck traffic was normal again today as teamsters, back from an unauthorized week-long strike, delivered tons of food and other merchandise throughout the Greater Philadelphia area.

About 13,000 members of Teamsters Local 107 manned trucks and freight platforms to move mountains of piled-up goods to factories and retail stores.

Supermarkets and small grocery stores, their supplies exhausted because of the teamster "holdup," had replenished their shelves.

U.P. Officials Probe Wreck In Wyoming

PINE BLUFFS, Wyo. (AP) — Union Pacific Railroad officials were still attempting today to estimate damage caused late Saturday when two freight trains collided on the outskirts of Pine Bluffs.

A freak automobile accident caused one locomotive and 33 cars to overturn. Large sections of double tracks were ripped out and cargo scattered. But there were no injuries.

Deputy Sheriff Charles Stephens said an auto driven by Richard Behrends, 16, of Pine Bluffs stalled on a private crossing and the boy abandoned it to seek help.

While he was gone, an east-bound freight train slammed into the car and threw it against a switch. This apparently diverted the train onto another set of tracks and it rammed a west-bound freight train.

The westbound gas-turbine powered locomotive was dumped on its side and nine cars were derailed. Twenty-four cars loaded with lumber were derailed on the eastbound train.

BPA Report Puts Oregon County First

PORTLAND (UPI) — Bonneville Power Administration Monday issued a report on estimated personal income of all Pacific Northwest counties for the 1950-61 period that showed an Eastern Oregon county with the highest per capita income in the four-state region.

Sherman County, which borders the Columbia River, had a per capita income of \$3,847 in 1960. Nine of the 10 counties with highest per capita income in Oregon were east of the Cascades.

Idaho personal income in 1961 amounted to \$1.2 billion, 63 per cent over the 1950 level. Ada County, where Boise is located, accounted for 16.7 per cent of the state total in 1961. On a per capita basis, Power County led all others in 1960 with \$2,870. Elmore County ranked second in 1960 with \$2,554.

Two Killed as Trainer Crashes

RAYMOND, Colo. (UPI) — A U. S. Air Force T-33 jet trainer crashed in a ball of orange flame Sunday night, killing the two pilots aboard.

A spokesman at Flight Test Center at Edwards Air Force Base in California tentatively identified the two victims as the pilot Maj. Jay E. Currie, 39, and 1st Lt. Donald Darby, 25 or 26. Both hometowns of the airmen were unknown.

Three unidentified eye-witnesses saw the plane go down in light rain over the Rocky Mountains in Colorado. They told authorities the plane was still burning when they reached the scene.

LOANS REPORTED

BOISE (AP) — In the first five months of 1965 the Prudential Insurance Co. made \$2,221,508 in real estate loans in Idaho, the company reported today.

Of the total \$1,251,151 was in farm loans, \$948,357 financed residential properties and \$22,000 was for commercial and industrial uses.

Capping their training are 39 smoke-jumping prospects who have studied map-reading, fire-fighting and taken physical fitness drills.

KELLOGG (UPI) — The drowning of Mary Carolyn Elston, 23, Smelterville, Idaho, was an accidental death, a coroner's jury ruled here.

Shoshone County Prosecutor Richard Magnuson said the jury of seven men heard testimony of nine witnesses before ruling on the matter. The girl's body was found June 18 on a sandbar in the south fork of the Coeur d'Alene River near Kellogg. She had failed to return from a baby sitting job 12 days earlier.

Hatfield, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Hatfield, was swimming in the indoor pool at Givens Hot Springs south of here when the boys saw him at the bottom of the deep end.

They brought him to the surface and then administered mouth to mouth respiration until an ambulance arrived to take Hatfield to a Nampa hospital.

ALASKA TRIP SET

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho unit is among army reserve units which will take part in a training maneuver in Alaska, Capt. Richard L. Maus, information officer, said Monday.

Maj. Oscar D. Peterson is commander of the Boise unit, which is part of the 17th Special Forces Group, Airborne. The exercises will test the reserve unit's ability to infiltrate enemy-held territory.

PARENTS WARNED

BOISE (AP) — Dr. Fritz R. Dixon, director of the city-county health department, warned parents to caution their children against touching bats, either alive or dead, which may be found near their homes.

He said three rabid bats have been reported this year in the Lewiston area of North Central Idaho and another was listed at Clarkston, across the Snake River in Washington.

Efforts Set To Put Out Coal Blaze

DENVER (AP) — The U.S. Bureau of Mines says it will try to extinguish an underground coal fire a mile long and 500 yards wide in Emery County, Utah.

The bureau announced over the weekend that Clyde Morris of Malta, Mont., has been awarded a \$70,000 contract for the task. He is expected to begin July 13 and has 105 days to finish the job.

Bureau spokesman Leslie Johnson said about 140,000 cubic yards of dirt would be hauled to cover the surface of the ground in the fire area to smother the blaze.

He said shallow cracks in the ground's surface would be filled by hand. Bulldozers will be used to fill deep crevices.

After the cracks are filled, the entire area will be covered with a layer of dirt — two feet thick in cold areas and six-feet thick in hot spots.

Then, Johnson said, holes will be drilled into the fire area for the next four to five years to make sure the fire is actually smothering.

The fire began several years ago from unknown causes. It extends from a cliff's edge in the Quitchumpah area.

Marines Return To Base in U.S.

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) — The first U.S. Marines dispatched to the Dominican Republic returned to Camp Lejeune Marine base today after two months of duty in the Caribbean country.

Helicopters and trucks, operating from transports off Onslow Beach and the Morehead City docking area, began airlifting 1,500 members of the 6th Marine Expeditionary Unit to the North Carolina base shortly after daybreak.

Idaho's Liquor Profits Divided On Old Formula

Hereafter the 42.5 per cent of the profits which have gone to the state's general fund will go instead to municipalities. That will increase the latter's share to 50 per cent with the other half going to counties and junior college districts.

In the current distribution three junior college districts share in the funds. Boise College gets \$13,744. North Idaho Junior College at Coeur d'Alene, \$13,843, and College of Southern Idaho at Twin Falls, \$19,598.

BURLEY—Two non-commissioned officers, two Air Force Commanders and two civilians received trophies Saturday evening at the awards banquet of the Idaho Air Force Assn. in conjunction with the first Aerospace Day of Idaho at the Ponderosa Inn.

Jess Larson, president of the National Air Force Assn., was dinner speaker.

Sgt. James E. Laurick, Mt. Home Air Force Base, was awarded a trophy as the outstanding NCO of the 9th Aerospace Wing and Sgt. Marion W. Carpenter of the Idaho Air Guard received a like award.

Maj. Gen. Irving L. Branch, commander of the Flight Test Center, Edwards Air Force Base, and Col. William L. Smith, commander of the 9th Aerospace Wing, were honored for their contributions to the Air Force and the Idaho Air Force Assn. Col. Smith was transferred to the Pentagon earlier this month, so his award was accepted by Col. Walter T. Lucas, the present commander at Mt. Home Air Force Base.

Jack Stoltz of the MacDougal Chapter, Pocatello, received the trophy award to the member of the Idaho Air Force Assn. who contributed most to the efforts of the state organization.

The awards were made by George Forschler, president of the Idaho Air Force Assn.

A previously unannounced award was made at the close of the banquet by Joe Higgins, movie and television actor who served as master of ceremonies to Forschler. Larson, in his address, pointed to the revolution in aeronautics. He reviewed the program in recent years and its accelerated pace of the last decade.

Larson explained how the plywood industry, aluminum use and plastics have become important segments in the industrial economy by virtue of first being developed for use by the military in aeronautics.

Propulsion is the big exploratory function today, said Larson. The DC-3 was long the ultimate in commercial air transportation. The total power output of that plane isn't even adequate to pump the fuel of the X-15, the present-day experimental vehicle which aeronautical people tell us is the catalyst for aerospace craft with a broad range of utilization in military and commercial transport fields.

Citing several public utterances in the past against money and efforts spent on research and development on progress in a number of fields, Larson concluded by saying, "With these in mind, I'm hesitant in opposing exploration as such, including exploratory vehicles like the aerospace plane."

During the three-day event an estimated 5,000 people visited the display of missiles sent to Burley from Norton Air Force Base.

The three-day event concluded Sunday with retreat at the Ponderosa Inn by a color guard

from Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The Black Hills Air Force 35-piece band from Ellsworth AFB, Rapid City, S.D., presented a concert at Budge Stadium as the final event of the celebration.

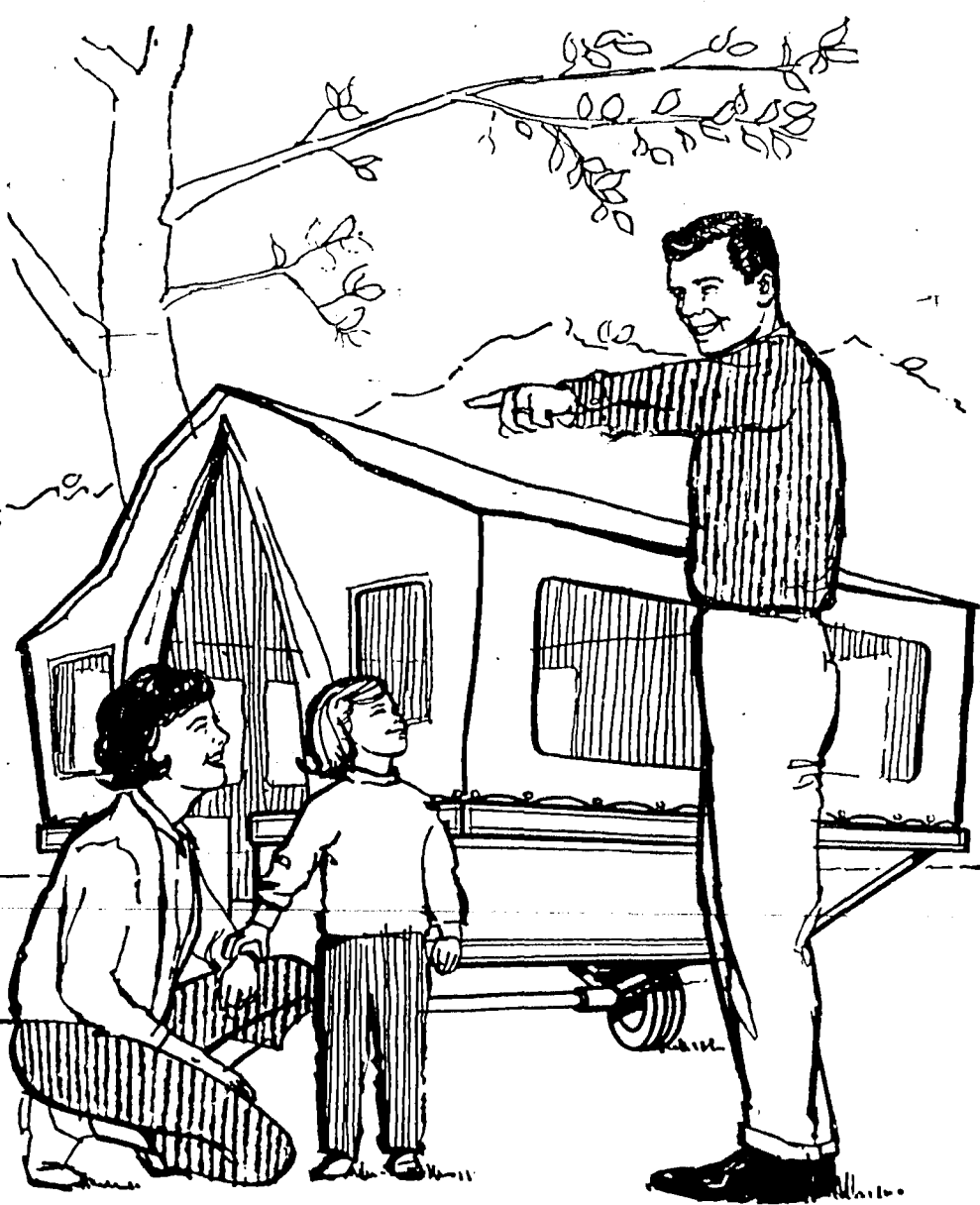

Not long ago, Roman Catholics followed a general rule against joining in services with other Christians.

Similarly, the latter rarely ventured into the precincts of Roman Catholic worship.

Today, that policy is changing greatly on both sides. And last week, an official advisory went out to the country's 149 Roman Catholic dioceses for furthering mutual devotions.

The new guidelines for common worship and prayer were issued by the Bishops' Commission for Ecumenical Affairs, a recently formed body headed by Lawrence Cardinal Shehan, archbishop of Baltimore.

That means kneeling together with other Christians in prayer — and sharing in sermons and hymns of praise.

Similar advice is offered regarding Catholic participation in the official worship of other churches. Catholics may attend, particularly on special occasions, but should not take official roles or partake of communion.

Atom Bomb, Industry Are China's Top Status Symbols, Canadian Writer Says

SHANGHAI (AP) — The atom bomb and Red China's top status symbol at the moment, but running it a close second is a piece of machinery standing in a big hangar-like building amid wheatfields outside Shanghai.

To the Chinese government, this big hunk of steel symbolizes China's leap into the mainstream of 20th century industrial development; it is China's answer to Cape Canaveral and the Soviet cosmonauts.

After this buildup, you may be disappointed to hear that what the building contains is a hydraulic press. Normally, there is nothing very attractive about a hydraulic press, but this one can exert pressure of 12,000 tons.

Exerting pressure of 12,000 tons, in Chinese terms, is like it used to be with breaking through the sound barrier or running the four-minute mile. In the world of pressure, 12,000 tons represents the big league.

So there it stands, like a metal altar in a towering glass-and-brick cathedral of Communist industry, and a constant stream of inhabitants and foreign visitors file past it, displaying various degrees of awe and respect.

The 12,000-ton hydraulic press, announced with great fanfare late last year — two years after its completion — doesn't seem to have any particular job to do. They keep it moving up and down to demonstrate it for the visitors, but industrial utilization is stated to be only 10 per cent of its capacity, and that figure may be high.

The backup facilities needed to harness its potential are nowhere in evidence. There is no sign of a furnace that could heat an ingot of the 200-ton size the press is capable of handling. And work has only begun on the building to house facilities for machining the kind of forgings the press can turn out.

The building in which it is housed is more than 100 yards long, and contains virtually no machinery except the press. It must be the most spotless heavy machinery factory in the world.

The uses to which it can be put, according to Wu Wai-chung of the Shanghai heavy machinery works, are to turn out heavy components for the metallurgical, power, shipbuilding, machinery and defense industries of Red China. Up to now, it has handled ingots of only 60 tons in weight.

The story of the press, as Wu tells it, assumes the proportions of an epic, including the chapter about welder Tang Yuen Ping who worked inside the tie rods and cross beams for nine days and nine nights, having his food passed in to him through various holes, thus becoming a national hero.

The thing was lifted into place by using a series of jacks and wooden beams for support — there was no crane capable of handling it. Thanks to the press, there is no limit to what industrial China can make today — but when you ask what plans there are for such production, the answer is cautious. If the state orders it, the state will get it.

Statistics of a nonsensitive nature abound — only eight countries possess such a press, and only five countries can manufacture one. There are only 20 such presses in the world, and as Wu puts it with a flourish, "This is number 21."

Standing in the middle of the wheat fields, which are being worked by oxen pulling wooden plows, the press and the building that houses it make quite a sight.

Viewing this piece of machinery, and hearing how the works of Chairman Mao inspired its construction, one cannot escape the feeling that the first requirement was to build the press, get it working, and then send out the news — a sequence that required six years in all. The next requirement, which is now being faced, is to figure out what to do with it, apart from the not-unimportant business of running tours around its exterior and even through its vitals.

It is one of the wonders of modern China, if not of the modern world.

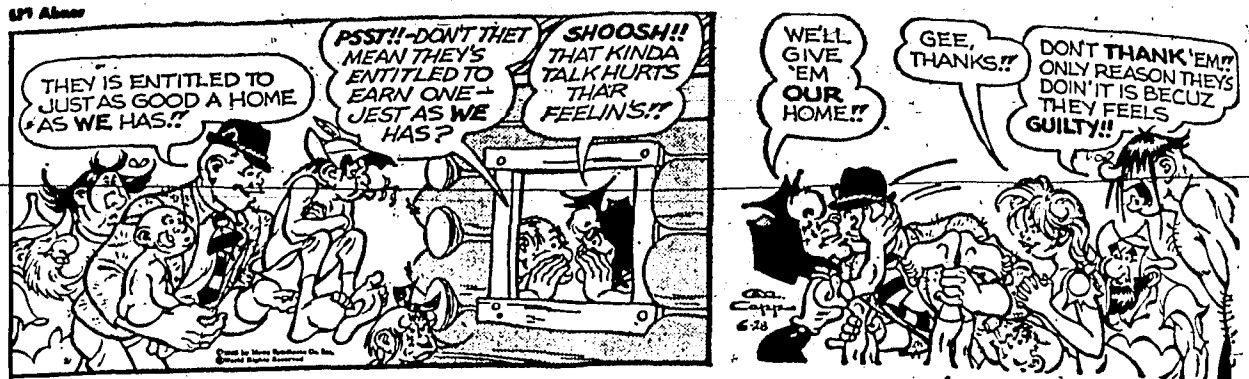

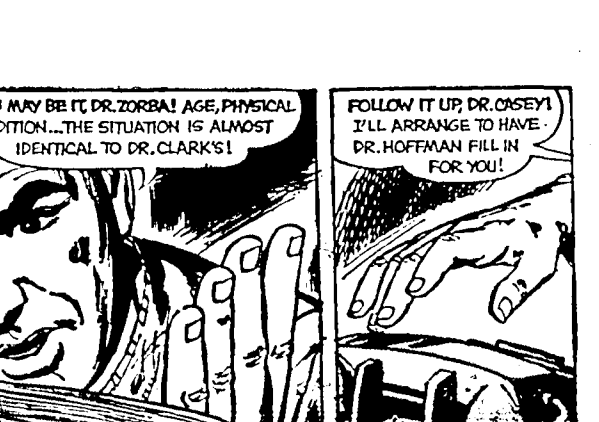
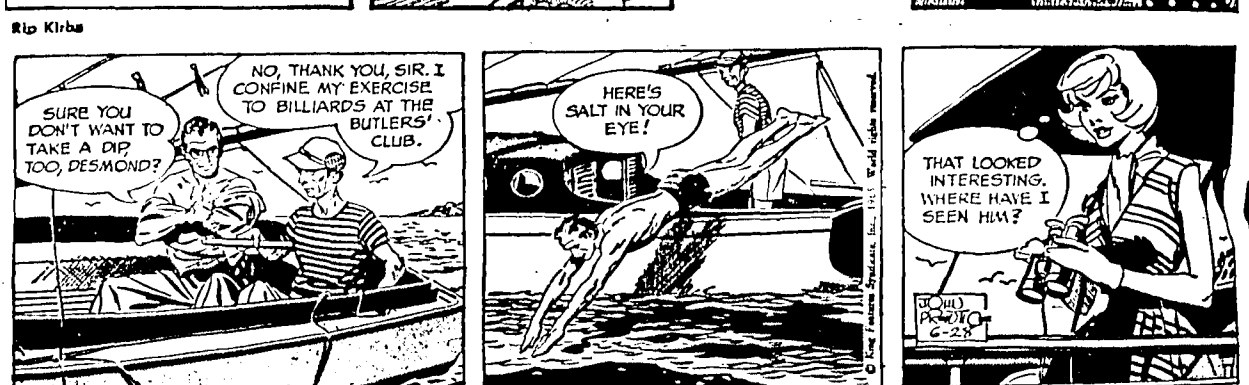
