

## Red-Ink Federal Budget Embarks On Sixth Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government entered its sixth straight year of red-ink financing today but pointed with some pride to a sharply reduced deficit in the fiscal year just ended. Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler announced that the fiscal 1965 deficit, which he books closed at midnight, was an estimated \$9.5 billion. That compared with President Johnson's January forecast of a \$6.3 billion deficit. The secretary foresaw a \$4.2-billion deficit for the new fiscal year that implies a \$1.1-billion improvement since January.

### Wages up

BOISE (UPI)—A higher average wage in Idaho will boost unemployment compensation for the next year. Gov. Robert E. Smylie said Wednesday the maximum weekly benefit amount for 1965-66 was computed under a provision enacted with his support by the 1961 Legislature. The maximum unemployment compensation will be raised to \$48 from \$45 starting next week.

### Police Gird For Heavy July 4 Traffic

Due to an expected heavy traffic volume during the July 4 holiday, a full law enforcement vigil will be maintained by the Idaho State Police, the Twin Falls County sheriff's office and Twin Falls city police. A. E. Perkins, state police superintendent, stated in a letter: "We are prepared to do everything in our power to see that it is a safe holiday for everyone traveling our highways during the holiday period."

### Columnist Robert Ruark Dies at 49

LONDON (UPI)—Robert C. Ruark, 49, best-selling author and syndicated newspaper columnist, died here today after failing to respond to treatment for internal bleeding. A statement issued by Middlesex hospital where Ruark was admitted two days ago said: "Mr. Robert Ruark was admitted to the hospital on Tuesday with internal bleeding. This did not respond to treatment and he died early this morning."

### India Denies Report by Pakistani

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Indian officials today denied Pakistani President Mohammed Ayub Khan's report that the cease-fire agreement for the Rann of Kutch had been accompanied by a second agreement for a general withdrawal of troops all along the Indian-Pakistani frontier. Ayub Khan announced in Karachi that he and Indian Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri had agreed in London to order the immediate withdrawal along the entire India-Pakistan border.

### Horse Racing Opens Friday at Rupert Annual Rodeo and July 4 Celebration

RUPERT—Preparations are complete for Rupert's 39th annual rodeo and Fourth of July celebration, according to Chamber of Commerce officials. Activities scheduled include night rodeo, pari-mutuel racing, parade and carnival. Linda Montgomery, rodeo queen for 1965, will reign over the celebration, assisted by Kitty Allen and Melva Doran, attendants elected Saturday night during the annual chuckwagon jamboree which is the kick-off for the annual event. Past winners were named 1966 rodeo queen. Pari-mutuel horse racing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, with 10 races scheduled each day.

"If they want something, they'll buy it," commented Mrs. Iris Jones, owner of a dress shop. "I've made three mistakes this morning," said Kathy Jackson, a flower shop clerk, "but I guess I'll get used to it." The reaction of Twin Falls residents to the sales tax, which went into effect Thursday morning, seemed to be more concern with the nuisance effect of the tax than resentment or worry about their pocketbooks.

### Heavy Rainstorms in Valley Douse Fires

Severe electric storms, accompanied by heavy rain, awakened many Magic Valley residents Wednesday night and early Thursday morning. The rain doused five range fires, started Wednesday afternoon by lightning, in the Shoshone Bureau of Land Management district. Oldtimers in Hailey said Thursday morning's storm was one of the worst electric storms they could recall. The Big Wood River raised .14 of a foot, from 4 to 4.14 feet, with the additional moisture caused by .23 of an inch of precipitation.

### 3 Witnesses Are Called In Area Trial

BURLEY—Third witness for the state testified Thursday morning in the jury trial of two Birmingham men charged with armed robbery. Judge Tom Felton, Moscow, is conducting the trial, which began in district court here Monday. Mrs. Norma Newcomb, who was shot last Aug. 14 when the Parish Motel in Burley was robbed, began her testimony Wednesday afternoon and continued Thursday morning. She was questioned by Richard K. Smith, Cassia county prosecuting attorney. James Annett, defense attorney for Robert Mueller, 23, and David J. Cypher, 25, requested that cross examination on Mrs. Newcomb be withheld and she be recalled to the stand later. Judge Felton approved the request.

### Doctors Fined

PALERMO, Sicily (AP)—Fifteen Palermo doctors were fined \$6.50 each Wednesday for collecting funds to build a hospital in North Viet Nam. All were convicted of unauthorized fund solicitation.

### Housing Bill to Have Easy Going

WASHINGTON (AP)—A housing bill containing a modified version of President Johnson's rent supplement plan headed for comparatively easy going in the Senate today after one of the closest votes in the House on any Johnson administration proposal. The controversial portion of the \$5.3-billion measure—the provision for subsidizing rent of low income families—survived a 208-202 vote in the House Wednesday only after the Democrats handling it had drastically modified it from the original administration conception of a program for families above the actual needy level.

## Three U.S. Planes Destroyed, Airman Killed in Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The Viet Cong killed one American, destroyed three planes and damaged three others in a hit-and-run attack on the Da Nang air base today. But U.S. Air Force and Navy planes struck at North Viet Nam during the day without letup. Bridges, barracks and radar installations were among the prime targets, and more propaganda leaflets were dropped over populated areas, a U.S. spokesman said. He said all planes returned safely.

### Prison Escapees Believed in Boise

BOISE (AP)—Officers searched a foothill area not far from the Idaho State Penitentiary today in a so-far futile hunt for a trace of three convicts who escaped from the prison Tuesday night. Roadblocks were in place for a time during the night on the assumption the three might still be in the area and attempt to leave. But the roadblocks were removed again shortly after dawn and authorities said there wasn't much that could be done except maintain vigilance.

### Glenns Ferry Grade School Merger Set

GLENN'S FERRY—All elementary students in Glenns Ferry School District No. 192 will begin school this fall in the new combination high school and elementary building now nearing completion, Supt. Clinton Bugg announced Thursday. At a special meeting of the school board it was voted to close the grade schools at Hammett, Glenns Ferry and King Hill. The Hammett school building has been condemned for years, Bugg said.

### Ethics Group Set by Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate leaders for many submitted today their recommendations for the appointment of a permanent bipartisan committee on senatorial ethics, but withheld an announcement of its makeup. The selections were turned over to Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the presiding officer, as a sequel to the politically charged Bobby Baker investigation.

### Worker Dies Of Injuries In Accident

RUPERT—Darrell Davis, 62, New Plymouth, died about 11 a.m. Thursday in Minidoka Memorial Hospital of injuries received when he fell from a scaffold while on construction work at the Paul Amalgamated Sugar Co. plant Wednesday. He received severe skull fractures in the accident, which occurred at 10:25 a.m. Wednesday, officials said.

### Johnson Orders Transport Plane

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson gave definite orders today for development of a supersonic transport plane. He said at the swearing-in of the new administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency, retired Gen. William McKee, that the administrator will have charge of the program. Until the President made his announcement, plans for further development of a U.S. supersonic transport had been on a tentative basis, subject to evaluation of preliminary work.

# Red Viet Nam May Receive Peace Envoy

LONDON (AP) — Informed sources said Wednesday Communist North Viet Nam seemed to be hinting it may receive the British Commonwealth's peace mission despite Hanoi radio and newspaper denunciations of it as a pro-American plot. Thousands crowded meanwhile into the lobbies of the House of Commons to protest British and American policy in Viet Nam. The informed sources reported the Hanoi government had called in the British consul general there for a talk on the subject. A left-wing Labor member of Parliament, William Warley, said he had private information from Hanoi that an Commonwealth prime minister would be welcome provided his government gave diplomatic recognition to North Viet Nam.

# State Forces Alerted to Keep Order

BOISE (AP) — Mobilization of all available state troops, including the National Guard, was promised today if necessary to maintain order in Idaho during summer weekend periods. Gov. Robert E. Smylie, a Democrat, specifically, in a response to a request for aid from officials at Coeur d'Alene, units of the National Guard will be on active duty in the north Idaho city for the Fourth of July weekend and the Diamond hydroplane Cup races which follow one week later. In the past the race weekend has been marked by considerable disorder.

"The State of Idaho," Smylie said in a statement, "wants national notice, but we do not want national notoriety based on breaches of the peace." He told his news conference that the state will not lend assistance to any community asking it. So far the only request has come from Coeur d'Alene. That community, Smylie said, "will have a tremendous traffic problem" before, during and after the International Girl Scout Roundup at Farragut State Park this month.

"We are," Smylie said, "entering the silly season when occasional groups of irresponsible citizens sometimes gather at various resorts with the intent to create public disorders and attempt to organize a sort of mob rule bent on destruction of public or private property. The State of Idaho cannot and will not tolerate such disturbances."

Temperatures during June averaged from near normal to as much as 4.4 degrees below normal at Burley. Daytime temperatures averaged below normal while nighttime temperatures averaged near to above normal at all reporting stations in the valley. Average temperatures for the month ranged from 59.8 degrees at Burley to 63.7 degrees at King Hill. Maximum temperatures in the low 90s were recorded at all stations on June 23 and lowest minimum temperatures occurred the morning of June 28 with most readings in the 30s. Wendell and King Hill reported 31 and 32 degrees respectively on that morning. Precipitation was rather varied in amounts during June as is typical in showers and thundershowers. Buhl precipitation during the month .25 of an inch above normal, but other stations with long term normals were all below normal. Total amounts for the month ranged from .37 of an inch at Gooding to 1.71 inches at Castleford.

A wet, cool period around the middle of June caused the longest delays to farming activities in Magic Valley, but heavy showers in local areas at times during the month were a cause for delays in local areas. Most planting was completed by the end of the month with the first cutting of hay going into final stages. Cultivation of sugar beets and some irrigation were the main activities at month's end. Grain crops were mostly in the heading stage. Range feed was considered in good condition the end of June.

Twin Falls entomology laboratory data: Average maximum temperature 75.8, 5.3 degrees below normal; average minimum temperature 48.5, 0.6 of a degree above normal; mean monthly temperature 62.1, 2.3 degrees below normal; highest maximum temperature 95 on June 23; lowest minimum temperature 38 on June 28; temperature of 90 degrees or above recorded on two days. A temperature of 32 degrees or lower was not recorded this month. Total monthly precipitation 0.64 of an inch, 15 of an inch below normal; eight days with .01 of an inch or more; no days with .25 of an inch or more; 19 clear days, six partly cloudy, five cloudy days. Prevailing wind was from the west.

# SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY

Rather moist and unstable air which moved into Southern Idaho yesterday and last night produced widespread thundershowers in Southern Idaho during the late afternoon and last night. Some thundershower activity will continue today in the southwest and will spread to Southeastern Idaho this afternoon and tonight. This shower activity will move on eastward Friday with showers and thundershowers most likely in eastern sections of Southern Idaho, and very sparse if any activity in the west. Temperatures will be cooler this afternoon in Magic Valley. For Saturday the outlook is fair and moderately warm weather. The general warming trend over Southern Idaho continued yesterday and most places were warmer last night, except where some of the heaviest thundershowers occurred. Afternoon temperatures were mostly in the 80s in Magic Valley. Burley, Rupert, Jerome and Twin Falls reached 90. The warmest temperature was 97 at King Hill. Overnight lows were mostly in the 50s. Practically all of the shower activity during the past 24 hours occurred in the central part of Southern Idaho, from western and central Magic Valley northward to Camas Prairie. During this period .41 of an inch fell at Wendell, .30 of an inch at Jerome and Castleford, .26 of an inch at Buhl, .27 of an inch at Gooding, .20 of an inch at Twin Falls, .13 of an inch at Kimberly and .17 of an inch at Fairfield.

## Idaho Silver Producers Predict Greater Demand

WALLACE, Idaho (AP) — Regardless of what Congress does about silver in the nation's precious metal in the North Idaho Coeur d'Alene mining district continues at an accelerated pace.

Nearly half of the U.S. silver output comes from mines deep beneath the timber-covered mountains of this area and spokesmen for major silver producers here predict this week a greater demand and high prices for the metal.

They see mounting world demands for silver eventually bringing a price substantially higher than the current government-fixed price of \$1.29 an ounce.

A 40 per cent advance in the price of silver in the 1961-63 period stimulated the search for new deposits and possibly more in old workings.

"There'll never be enough silver to satisfy world demand," said Thomas F. McManus, general manager and vice president of Sunshine Mining Co., the nation's biggest silver producer.

"The Treasury's stockpile will last only about three more years."

"The answer is higher production," he said. "Sunshine is intensifying its production efforts and will spend more money in the Coeur d'Alenes on explorations."

"The government eventually will have to allow the price of silver to rise to encourage greater production in the face of rising demand," he said.

American Smelting's intensive development program at the Galena Mine, which ranks No. 2 nationally among silver-producing mines, is proceeding at a maximum rate under the present hoisting capacity and will continue at that rate for the foreseeable future, Vissness said.

American Smelting is going ahead with two other projects.

H. E. Harper, chief geologist for Hecla Mining Co., which owns the Lucky Friday Mine, the district's third largest silver producer said:

"The outlook for silver from the producer's standpoint is very good — both short term

and long range. We still are interested in finding new silver deposits and believe silver prices eventually will go up.

"Hecla," he said, "will continue its expanded development program in the silver summit mine and its other operations."

Charles E. Schwab, president of the Bunker Hill Co., a major lead-zinc producer and fourth ranked in the Coeur d'Alene District's silver producing mines, said there will be no let-down in the company's silver development projects from workings of the Bunker Hill and Crescent mines.

"There has been too much loose thinking on silver by non-producing people," Schwab said. "I always thought the U.S. Treasury would have to come up with some formula to protect the \$1.29 price of silver through the transition period to new coinage."

## NAACP Asks Betterment Of Housing

DENVER (AP) — Plans for a drive against racial discrimination in housing are emerging from the 56th annual convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Jack E. Wood Jr., codirector of the National Committee against Discrimination in Housing, said today he anticipated the drive would be "at least of the same magnitude" as the voter rights drive in the South.

"Unlike voter discrimination, housing bias takes place all over the country—not just in the South," he said.

Wood is a former housing director for the New York City Commission of Human Rights and the former housing secretary of the NAACP.

He said the NAACP will urge the federal government to withhold urban renewal funds from entire cities allegedly permitting housing discrimination and not just from specific projects.

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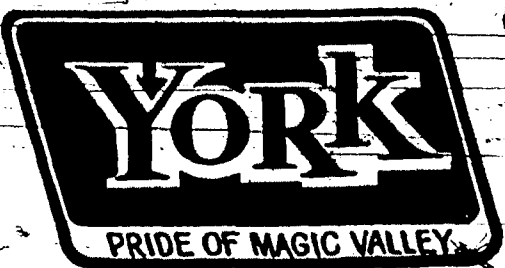

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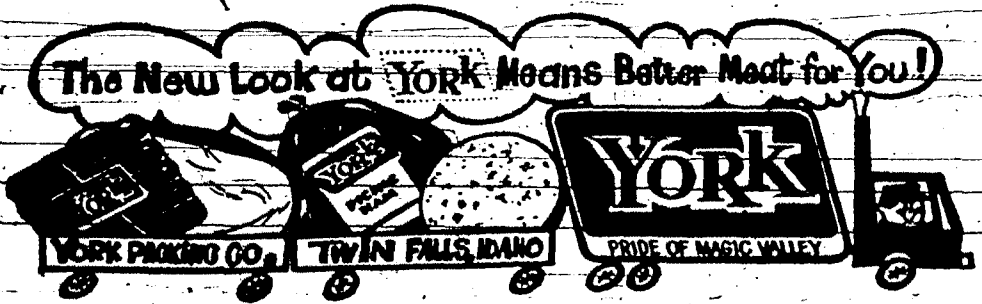

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## NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—In their indefatigable search for footnotes to history, the chroniclers of the 20th Century should latch on to what happened in Washington on June 22, 1964. On that date, long last, birth control became respectable, a subject deemed proper for discussion even by gun-shy politicians.  
In a chaotic hearing room on Capitol Hill, the nation's Father Image, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, came out for birth control in a letter to a Senate Government Operations Subcommittee considering means of controlling the world's population explosion. And seven House and Senate witnesses came out for a bill sponsored by Sen. Ernest Gruening (D., Alaska), which would put the government in the birth control business.

**POLITICIANS UNSCATHED** Sen. Joe Clark (D., Pa.) who has a gift for plain talk, summed up the significance of the day from the politician's point of view. "I did not have the courage to speak out on this subject until I was re-elected in 1962," said Clark with a grin.  
Yet there is evidence that the people once again are ahead of the politicians. Clark noted that, despite his fear, his position has been largely ignored by his constituents although Pennsylvania has a large Catholic population. And Rep. Morris Udall (D., Ariz.), said he had suffered no political repercussions from the approximately 25 per cent of his constituency which is Catholic.

This figures. No citizenry has ever belabored its politicians for growing up to the facts of life. And today's facts about the population explosion are frightening enough to stir even the most timid poll-watcher. The population of the world is now 3.3 billion people and it is expected to double by the year 2000. Already there are shortages of water, even in such advanced areas as New York City, and millions of human beings throughout the rest of the world are not getting enough to eat.

**"CAN'T STRETCH WORLD"** General Eisenhower, whose after-thoughts often are more trenchant than his original positions, gave a nutshell analysis of the situation. "It is still quite clear," he wrote, "that in spite of great technical progress in production of the necessities of life, we are scarcely keeping up, in over-all production and distribution, with the requirements of burgeoning and underfed populations." And he added, in fancier language, that since the world is only so big it can't feed or otherwise accommodate more than a certain number of people.

"From here in, the usual collection of hatchet-faced and frustrated females and purse-tipped males can be expected to holler that the federal government seeks to destroy the national morality by coming out against children. Nothing of that sort is proposed, of course. Gruening's bill and eight others introduced in the House in effect seeks only to permit the government to take the lead in discussing birth control.

**HOW IT WOULD WORK** Gruening for example, would create an office of population affairs in both the State and the Health, Education, and Welfare Departments, convene a White House conference on population, and provide federal funds to states for their own birth control conferences.

No one, including the miserable beggars of India, will be ordered to stop having babies or even be told that birth control is chic. Eventually, however, the bill's sponsors hope that information on birth control can be made available to every parent so that parent can decide how many children he wants. Hopefully, too, the foreign aid program will be amended to permit the distribution of birth control devices to people who ask for them.

Because of ignorance, unwanted babies are being brought into a life of daily misery. In effect, birth control seeks to save the lives of these babies by preventing their birth.

## Views of Others

**DON'T HAVE TO BE INDIAN**  
We have been glad to see the "invisibility" of nonwhite Americans reduced by their growing appearance in advertising as a proportional part of the public. The trend is properly to deemphasize differences in color not by pretending they are not there, but by showing them as they naturally occur in society.  
Yet it would be a pity if sensitivities became so raw that the differences between people could not be appreciated and even used for humor, assuming the humor does not have divisiveness as its object. The world of advertising would have been a little less cheerful without those ads showing an American Indian, for example, enjoying a sandwich with the slogan: "You don't have to be Jewish" to like So-and-so's Jewish rye bread.  
So it is on other grounds that we deplore a whisky ad with a picture of an Indian bravo and text suggesting that the present brand is better than the "bravo" of the past. When the ad appeared in the New York subway, the Association on American Indian Affairs rightly protested to the transit authority: "These ads further mock what was and is today a profound human tragedy begun generations ago, through the use of whisky. Today, alcoholism is an acute social problem among the tribes, as among other segments of the population."  
The transit authority agreed. Now the whisky company has canceled its callous campaign. You don't have to be Indian to approve. Christian Science Monitor.

**NEW LIGHT ON PARKING METERS**  
We contend—and have for some time—that removal of parking meters in Caldwell would increase our retail sales volume and bring Caldwell a large amount of favorable publicity.  
In addition to the belief that meters are illegal, we think they are a nuisance and do not good. Some officials and businessmen think they keep traffic moving, open parking spaces and reduce parking hogs.  
The American Automobile Ass'n. says a number of cities throughout the country have removed meters in recent years, and so far none has returned to them. The big idea, the AAA says, was to revitalize the downtown shopping areas.  
With new shopping centers readily available in our area and more to come, it might be well for the merchants here to think about taking out the double taxers.  
Incidentally, the AAA says that some cities have found that the parking turnover actually has increased after the meters were removed. St. Petersburg, Fla., a large city, found each parking space in the central business district accommodated 11.9 vehicles daily, compared with 10.2 under the meter system.

President Johnson, for example, was widely reported when he first entered the White House to have one favorite drink—Cutty Sark Scotch and water served as a highball, with plenty of water.  
In recent months, however, he has been watching his weight and for the most part laying off alcoholic drinks in any form.  
Without too many Washington hosts and hostesses knowing it, he developed a passionate taste for a soft drink—root beer made with an artificial sweetener.  
When other people are having highballs in the late afternoon or brandy after dinner, Johnson drinks root beer. This is true in Texas, as well as in the White House. His favorite brand is carried chilled aboard his helicopters and jet transports.  
For the White House or an Air Force plane bearing the President to run out of his beloved root beer would be a calamity for the staff member who had to tell him, "Sorry, Mr. President, we're all out."

## Poor Man's Plato

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP)—Heroes often don't look like heroes.  
Airman I.C. Jon H. Young, 24, of Portland, Ore., is an example. He is a boyish-looking fellow who on his days off likes to walk around the streets with a medical kit and treat Vietnamese civilians.  
"If I see a kid with a sore or a bad infection, I try to patch him up on the spot," he said. "Some of them will simply die if nobody does anything for them."  
It takes considerable prodding to get Jon to tell how he won his Silver Star. He got it in an action last March in which he became the first American airman to land intentionally in the enemy's lair in North Viet Nam.  
Young is a pararescue team member, one of the flying daredevils whose mission it is to try to bring back alive U.S. flyers who have bailed out at sea or been shot down in enemy territory.  
He spent 13 months learning his job. He studied emergency medicine. He can perform a tracheotomy if necessary. He made 22 parachute jumps, became a skilled scuba diver, proved he could survive in the jungle, swim 1,500 yards and run five miles. He melted down from 155 pounds to a lean 135.  
Of the 250 missions he has flown so far, the one Jon remembers with most mixed emotions is the one that won him his medal.  
Two rescue helicopters were at a forward base.  
The other members of his crew were the pilot, Lt. Joe Phelan, 27, of Stamford, Conn., whose wife lives in Charlotte, N.C.; the copilot, Capt. Clyde Lemke, 30, of Utica, Mich., and Sgt. John H. Regan Jr. of Tampa, Fla.  
"Both helicopters scrambled when we got word an F100 fighter plane had been hit north of the 17th Parallel, and the pilot had ejected," said Jon.  
On the way they were told that an F105 pilot also had bailed out in the same area. That gave them two to go after. Then they sighted a flare in the sea.

## The Doctor Says

Q—If my urine shows no sugar is it possible to have diabetes which requires medication?  
A—You may have a normal blood sugar level and no sugar in the urine and still have a condition known as prediabetes. If so you will eventually get diabetes and your doctor may want to start you right away on small doses of insulin or tolbutamide. It is, however, of greater importance not to allow yourself to be overweight and to avoid cortisone and all related drugs.  
On the other hand you may have a rarer form of diabetes, diabetes insipidus which is in no way related to sugar diabetes. In this disease there is no sugar in the urine but there is an abnormal thirst and large quantities of urine are passed every day. If you have this disease your doctor may want to give you injections of vasopressin and doses of chlorothiazide by mouth.  
Q—Because thyroid tablets sometimes cause me to be nervous and irritable wouldn't help tablets in the proper amount without other medication control my thyroid deficiency?  
A—For a thyroid deficiency there is nothing better than the thyroid extract. If this causes nervousness or other undesirable symptoms the dose should be reduced. Kelp, a seaweed, is rich in iodine. Iodine in small doses is a help in preventing simple goiters but is of no value in treatment after a goiter has formed.

## MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The rush of world events threatens to obscure the bitter lesson of Algeria. It is, above all, the lesson of a leadership neglecting the grave social and economic problems of a young nation.  
In recent years food supplies for the most part by the United States has fed up to one-third of the Algerian population. Without it there would have been mass hunger and perhaps even famine. This help through PL 480, the law covering the disposal of American surplus products for local consumption, went on which Ben Bella was trying to establish his leadership in Africa by delivering arms to the Congolese rebels.  
France through these same years has been providing aid at a rate of about \$100,000,000 annually. Of that amount roughly half has been provided without strings so that it could go to make up budgetary deficits or for any purpose.  
In assessing the failure of Ben Bella the background of independence achieved in 1962 must be taken into account. Independence came after a seven-year Moslem revolt against French rule with fierce fighting against French forces at one time numbering more than a half-million. The horror of what was, in effect, a civil war, torture, violence, widespread sabotage were perpetrated by both sides.  
Once a truce had been signed and the Algerians voted for independence, Ben Bella as head of the new government moved rapidly to replace French managers and technicians. This was understandable in light of intense nationalistic feeling and the hatreds growing out of the war. But, unfortunately, Algerians lacked the skills and the discipline to take over. That was true on farms as well as in industry.  
The number of French in Algeria has dropped from about 1,000,000 to less than 100,000. With this more or less forced migration—the French were made to understand they were virtually all the trained personnel that had kept the country running.  
Granted this great handicap, the fact remains that Ben Bella never faced up to the reality of beginning again with training programs as part of a determined effort to build the country on a new basis. Those who know best say that he spent about 70 per cent of his time on the attempt to make himself a world leader and the balance on Algerian problems which he scarcely comprehended.  
Despite the country's desperate needs, he spent large sums on grandiose ventures. According to one estimate, he put \$25,000,000 into preparation for the Asian-African conference. This included new hotels, a whole colony of luxurious seaside villas and a big conference hall. This was also an investment for tourism and they were to be used for a communist-dominated International Youth Festival in July. But they took scarce resources and skills at a time when the country's economy was rapidly slipping.  
The estimate of the specialists here is that Ben Bella's overthrow by Col. Houari Boumediene had little to do with the crisis of food and employment. It was a power struggle. Boumediene, having taken power, was himself removed. Like so many other newly arrived leaders, Ben Bella apparently believed there was a kind of magic in words—the slogans of nationalism and the incantations of Marxism-Leninism. They were of no avail against the stern realities.

UPPERCUT RUFF IS POINT MAKER  
Most of the mixed pairs in the Mid-South Regionals at Memphis arrived in four spare contracts after North doubled West's opening club bid.  
The contract was not a good one because South had to lose two club tricks to start and was left with an unsatisfactory trump holding, but after West continued with the jack of clubs and East discarded, declarer always managed to make his contract.  
The play was quite simple. South would ruff and lead a low trump toward dummy. West would duck and dummy's king would hold the trick. Back would come the six of trumps and it wouldn't make any difference whether East played the jack of the ten. South would make the obligatory finesse play of a small trump and West would have to win the trick with the ace. Later, South would pick up East's last trump and claim the balance.  
When Paul Leavitt and Shirley Lazarus of New Orleans founded the hand, there was a different result.  
Paul led the douse of clubs, trick three. He had reason to believe there was no way to beat the hand unless the defect could collect two trump tricks. East would hold exactly the right trumps for a double uppercut.  
Shirley had a fine chance to chuck the hand. She might have ruffed with her deuce, but Shirley saw no reason not to play a high spade and ruffed with the ten.  
South overruffed and led a trump, but Paul was ready to handle his case. He won with his ace and led a fourth club whereupon there was no way for South to keep Shirley from making her jack of trumps.

### Walker Indicates Smylie Might Seek His Fourth Term in Office

BOISE (UPI)—Even a fourth term bid for governor by Republican Robert E. Smylie should not be taken lightly by Democrats, a top Democratic spokesman indicated Thursday.

"I think that the Democratic Party has gotten over the idea that he is a pushover," State Chairman Lloyd Walker said.

"We all know, and it's generally accepted throughout the state, that he's been a weak governor."

"He's always waited until the problem has arisen as a crisis before he's ever made an effort to do anything. He's in no sense a leader, he's definitely a follower."

"But, nevertheless, he's been a good campaigner," Walker, a Twin Falls attorney, said.

"We're going to have to work hard to beat him if he runs."

Although Smylie has not disclosed what his plans may be for the forthcoming election campaign he has said he intends to keep up his "crocodile" in the GOP. There has been increasing speculation he may run for another term as governor.

Walker believes it will take a Democrat who has broad support and who is an effective campaigner to beat Smylie, if a governor runs again.

Some political professionals have suggested that such a candidate also should bring a "new" to the Democratic ticket, someone who has not run for the office before.

"I don't think you can necessarily limit it in that fashion," Walker said. "There are some who have run good races in the past and haven't been hurt and some who have been hurt."

So far, only State Sen. William J. Dee of Grangeville has announced intentions to seek the Democratic nomination for governor next year. A number of other persons have been suggested as possible candidates, Walker among them.

Walker said he is uncertain right now just what he might do. He also has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the U. S. Senate.

However, he did confirm talk of political circles that many Democrats want to get behind the good man for governor and cut out the party-in-fighting next time out.

## Profit Sharing Plan Working

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The plan are union members in urban areas. Mexico's labor force is composed of something over 11 million persons, of which about six million are agricultural workers.

The profit-sharing is required by national law and affects about 80 per cent of the business and financial organizations in Mexico, both Mexican and foreign-owned. The largest foreign investment in Mexico comes from the United States, with a total of more than a billion dollars.

Mexican officials point with pride to figures which they say show that compulsory profit-sharing caused no cutback in economic activity. Business in general was so good last year that Mexico's gross national product increased 10 per cent, the biggest increase in a decade.

Under the profit-sharing plan, an estimated average of 14 per cent of total company profits are distributed among employees.

The plan works like this: Each company figures its profits for the year, then deducts 30 per cent for dividends to investors and reinvestment and a variable percentage based on a sliding scale. This scale allows deductions of from 10 to 80 per cent based on a relationship between total investment, number of employees and production.

The amounts received by the workers vary widely. Employees at some companies which enjoyed good years are collecting between \$240 and \$320. Others are getting only a few dollars.

Profit-sharing was provided for in Mexico's 1917 constitution, but it remained only an ideal until President Adolfo Lopez Mateos pushed enabling legislation through Congress in 1961.

Most of those who take part in the plan are union members in urban areas. Mexico's labor force is composed of something over 11 million persons, of which about six million are agricultural workers.

## Pope May Go To Assembly Meet in Fall

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The Vatican's United Nations observer said today he expected Pope Paul VI to attend the next session of the U.N. General Assembly to start in September.

# Jet Stopped 40 Feet From River Levee

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—A Continental Airlines pilot stopped his huge Boeing 707 jet within 40 feet of the Missouri River today on landing at the Municipal Airport during a thunderstorm.

Three persons were injured. They were taken to hospitals, but police said neither was believed seriously injured.

Capt. Lee R. Zerba of Los Angeles, the pilot, said when the plane, carrying 59 passengers and 7 crew members, hit the runway he "couldn't get any braking action, probably because of the heavy water on the slab."

"There was only one way to stop," he said. "I threw the plane into a ground loop and it skidded sideways for several hundred feet before stopping near the river levee."

The dike protecting the south of the airport is only 40 feet from the Missouri River at that point.

Passengers scrambled out of the plane via emergency exits into a torrential rain.

H. T. Anderson, the co-pilot, said "everyone was as calm as possible and there was no panic in getting out."

Most of the passengers were military personnel on leave.

### Aircraft Readied for Fire Season

SALMON — Aircraft, men and equipment are being readied for another fire season expected to get under way the July 4 weekend on the Salmon National Forest.

First lookout of 14 was manned Monday with a helicopter lifting George McDonald, Shoup, to Stormy Peak Lookout on the Salmon Ranger District. The others will be manned as soon as snow drifts blocking forest roads melt.

Three TBW aircraft from Reeder Flying Service, Twin Falls, are scheduled to arrive here Thursday to be stationed at the Salmon Air-aid fire duty at the Salmon airport. A helicopter for fire control work has arrived and will be assigned to Swamp Camp, north of the Salmon River.

Joe Denny, fire 31 forest employees who will be engaged in fire guard work or as lookouts underwent training during the annual fire school the forest conducted the past week at Granite Mountain on the North Fork District.

Instructions included locating and extinguishing actual fires set in the area below Granite Mountain Lookout.

The forest has had three fires so far, two man-caused, and one lightning blaze last Thursday along the Stormy Peak Road.

The forest plans to switch from bentonite to phoscheck, a retardant with considerably longer fire holding capabilities. Denny said the change would be made later in the summer when the present supply of bentonite is exhausted.

The forest's bentonite plant at the airport now is in operation. It is to fly the three fire fighters planes will be the same as last year, Sam Menzies, Fred Porter and Tom White.
