

# Algeria Reveals Plans for New Constitution

ALGIERS (AP) — Col. Houari Boumedienne said today Algeria's ruling Revolutionary Council plans to convene a congress of "the healthy forces in the nation" to draft a new constitution. In a nationwide radio address of Algeria's independence, Boumedienne said the new constitution eventually will replace that of 1963, molded by deposed President Ahmed Ben Bella and then set aside by Ben Bella.

# 700 Holiday Arrests Come From Riots

Beer-drinking, carousing youths staged riots and disturbances in five resort towns in Ohio, Missouri, Iowa and New York this Fourth of July weekend, resulting in more than 700 arrests with heavy property damage and a number of minor injuries.

The 26 council members are nearly all top-ranking army officers or former members of Boumedienne's military staff.

At Geneva-on-the-Lake, Ohio, a second straight night of rioting was put down early today by local police before the arrival of National Guardsmen ordered out by Ohio Gov. James A. Rhodes.

At Arnold Park, Iowa, the National Guard stood ready to move in at the request of local authorities.

Early Sunday at the north Iowa lakes resort, more than 500 beer-drinking youths rioted. At least 60 were arrested. A city ban was placed on the sale of alcoholic beverages through Monday evening.

# Sato Retains Position in House of Diet

TOKYO (AP) — Prime Minister Eisaku Sato's pro-Western Liberal-Democrats have retained their dominant position in the upper house of the Diet.

Asked Sunday about a report that the department is cold-shouldering the Alabama official, a spokesman said, "We have been deferring to the House until their investigation is done."

Rep. Edwin E. Willis, D-La., chairman of the House committee on Un-American Activities, announced on March 30 that the committee would investigate the Klan and propose legislation to control it. No date for committee operations has been announced.

Flowers announced his own Klan investigation April 22 but has been publicly silent on the subject since then.

The state attorney general, a political opponent of Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, was one of the few officeholders in the state who supported the Democratic ticket of Lyndon B. Johnson and Hubert H. Humphrey in 1964.

# 25 Jet Bombers From SAC Take Part in Viet Cong Raid

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. officials said that "about 25" B52 jet bombers from the Strategic Air Command took part in the raid today on Viet Cong positions. They came from Guam 2,200 miles away. The raid was staggered, with three planes in each flight and with each flight moving over the target at intervals of 10 minutes, a spokesman said.

# Congress Still Faces Big Battles on Domestic Bills Amid Foreign Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — With a full six months of work behind it, Congress still faces some of its biggest battles on domestic legislation amid the continued debate on U.S. policies in the Viet Nam war.

### U. S. Site In London Is Hit by Bomb

LONDON (AP) — Scotland Yard placed heavy police guards around U.S. government buildings in London today after the explosion of a mystery bomb at the American Express Company.

The blast occurred Sunday night in the heart of London's West End. The building frequently is used as a meeting place by American tourists. There were no injuries.

Police ringed U.S. Ambassador David Bruce's Regent Park residence as the envoy gave a morning Independence Day reception.

Sunday night's bomb — believed to have been a gas pipe packed with explosives — blasted the back door of the express company's office.

Scotland Yard spokesmen speculated the bombing probably was done by extremists who have a grudge against the United States.

### Closing of Murder Case Awaits Report

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Closing of the Tanya Weber murder case awaits a report from the Federal Bureau of Investigation concerning evidence in the case, the Logan police said Monday.

Dist. Atty. David R. Daines said the report is due by the middle of the week. He and other Logan police officers declined to say what evidence was sent to the FBI.

Owen Kimball, 27, of Logan, whom police said was the "prime suspect" was found Sunday afternoon. The body was found in the cab of a truck about three miles up a hollow.

Kimball had been missing since late Tuesday when he told his wife he was going up the canyon to look for fish bait.

Capt. Ray Jones of the Logan Police Department said Kimball had been dead for three or four days when found Saturday.

An autopsy is scheduled today.

Jones said Kimball's truck was searched Sunday, but no suitable note or possible hose hook-up for poisoning was found.

A Salt Lake City pilot first reported the pickup Wednesday.

Tanya Weber's partially nude body was found half hidden in a hedge about a block from her home June 27.

### Five-Day Spraying Project to Start Thursday on Creek Drainage at Salmon

SALMON (Special) — Spraying is scheduled to start Thursday on an 8,000-acre area in the Iron Creek drainage of the Salmon National Forest.

The project, to run five days depending on weather, will test effectiveness of 9- and 13-ounce applications of malathion from fixed wing aircraft against the spruce budworm.

Bob Patee, Ogden, project leader, said three spray aircraft from Reeder Flying Service, Twin Falls, will arrive here Wednesday and the spray equipment will be calibrated.

Spraying will begin Thursday morning in the North Fork of Iron Creek south and west of Salmon.

Patee said a 27-man crew is organized to handle the project. Fish have been placed in holding cages in streams in the area to test the effects of the malathion.

Pre-spray collection of the spruce budworm to determine population will begin Tuesday. Collection of aquatic insect samples also will begin Tuesday. Comparisons will be made between pre-spray and during actual spraying.

The Forest Service project seeks to find an effective substitute for DDT for use against the spruce budworm which is reported at epidemic stage on nearly a million acres in the Salmon River drainage.

A year ago, 520,000 acres of the Salmon Forest were sprayed with DDT in what was to have been the opening phase of a general control program. Forest officials announced that spray funds were earmarked this year for more urgent control projects against the bark beetle and tussock moth on other western forests.

Test projects also are scheduled this week on the Bitterroot and Lewis and Clark forests in Montana, testing effectiveness of malathion against the spruce budworm.

His presentation will deal with vocational research programs to be conducted at the local school level to support vocational education programs.

Prior to his tenure in the U.S. Office of Education, Dr. Strong was head of the curriculum laboratory, at Ohio State University.

All sessions will be held in the Student Union Building. A dinner for the administrators will be held Thursday evening in the Student Union, with Arthur Brown, superintendent of schools at Troy, as main speaker. Brown will talk on his recent trip to Russia as an observer of the Russian system of education.

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# The Daily Investor

Q. I have never invested in a stock or a bond but I have a few hundred dollars to invest now. I would like to get a stock that runs from \$1 to \$5 a share. If I lose the entire amount, I wouldn't be hurt. I would rather take a chance of making something or not. I wouldn't like to hold only two or three shares of some high-priced, blue-chip stock. Bank accounts pay more in interest than those blue chips do in dividends. What are my chances of going broke with a low-priced stock? Do you have any advice? But I doubt that you will take it. The advice is to forget your notion about buying only low-priced stocks. There are good prices and bad stocks in all price ranges. But, as a general rule of thumb, it must be said that when you get down into the really low-price area such as you are considering, you must tread carefully. You're walking among the "cats and dogs" the really risky situations. If you are bound and determined to try your luck in that area, try to be careful. The risks involved with low-priced stocks are generally greater than the risks involved with higher-priced stocks. And, believe me, the possibility of reward (through growth in value) is not that much greater. You mention that "blue chips" (well-regarded, investment-grade, generally higher-priced stocks) don't pay fat dividends. But they do have the capability of increasing dividends in the future. Most low-priced stocks don't pay any dividends at all. That

should wash out your argument on that point. Finally, yes, your chances of going broke usually are much greater with low-priced stocks. Q. My late husband carried a very large amount of life insurance. I was named the beneficiary of all his insurance. He took out those policies in order to "protect" me. It was our understanding that I would get the insurance money, free and clear, in the event of his death. We were always told that insurance was not subject to taxes. But, after he passed away, I was shocked to learn that the value of insurance would be considered as part of his estate and would be subject to state inheritance taxes and Federal estate taxes. I am now told that this is because my husband was the "owner" of the policies—even though I am the beneficiary. Can this be right? A. Sorry to say, the answer is yes. This usually comes as an awful shock to many beneficiaries of life insurance policies—particularly widows. You see, there is a difference between being the beneficiary of a life insurance policy and being the owner of the policy. Most people are surprised to learn that there is a difference or even that there is such a thing as "ownership" of a life insurance policy. If you were the owner of your husband's policies (a relatively easy thing to arrange through any sensible insurance agent or broker) the value of those policies would not have counted as part of his estate. If that had been done, it would have saved the tax bite. For many families, transfer-

## 5 Young Scientists Injured In Accelerator Explosion

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Five young scientists were badly burned early today when an explosion rocked a building housing an electron accelerator operated by Harvard and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Police said they had been informed no radioactivity had been unleashed by the blast that ignited a two-alarm fire in the building on Oxford Street. Arthur C. Reid, 19, of Avon suffered third-degree burns over most of his body and was on the danger list at Massachusetts General Hospital. Deputy Fire Chief Timothy O'Donnell quoted one accelerator as saying a hydrogen purifier in the machine was responsible. The roof was blown off and the windows shattered by the impact, and O'Donnell said the building sustained heavy damage. He said the structure cost \$11 million to build in 1955. Police said the researchers were conducting tests with hydrogen and were using a bubble chamber. They said Asst. Prof. Joseph Szymanski of Harvard noticed the hydrogen levels had dropped on the control panel's pressure gauges. The blast occurred as Szymanski turned off the gauges, police said. Szymanski, 30, of Arlington, suffered a leg injury and abrasions. Also receiving third-degree burns were Frank Feinberg, 20; Louis Hand, 31, of Cambridge; and Dennis Ehm, 25. Further information on the injured was unavailable.

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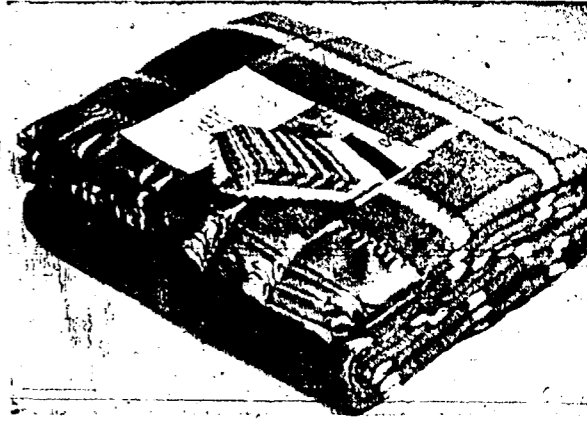
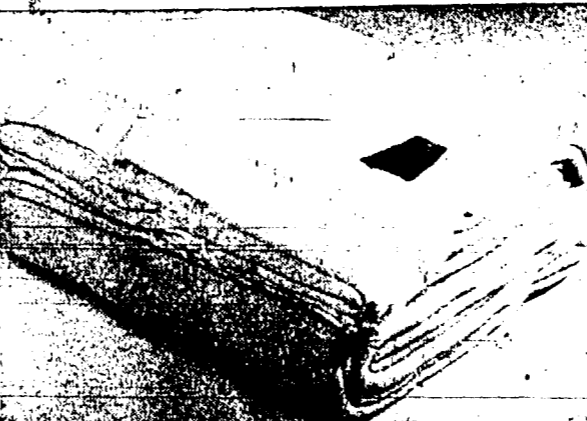
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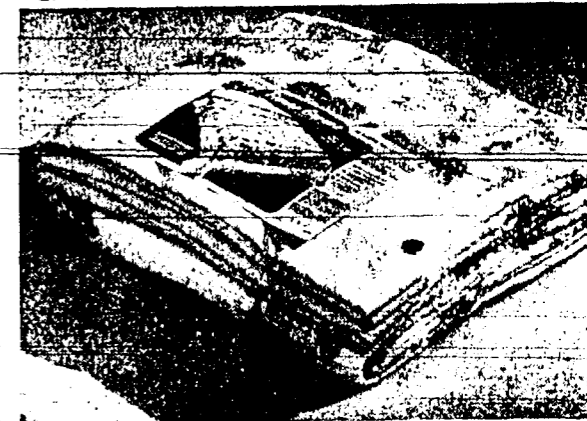
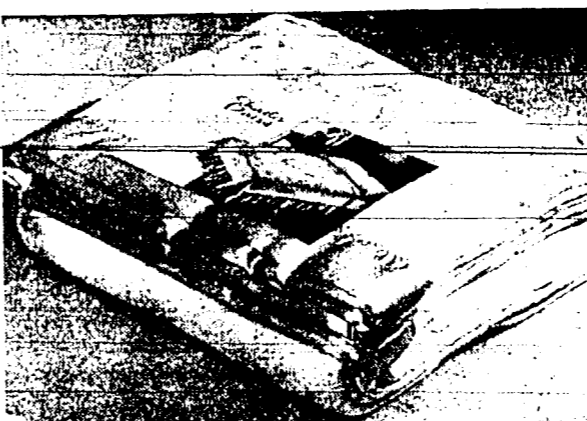
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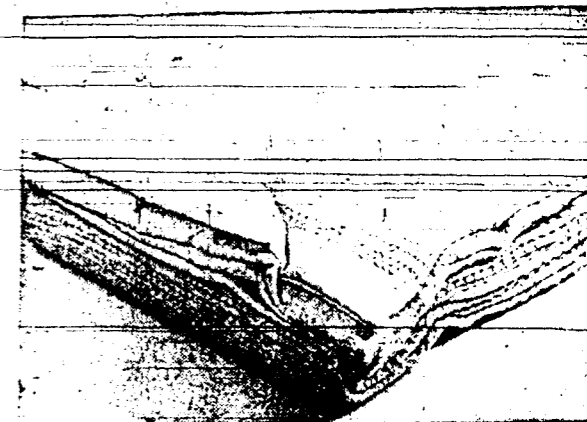
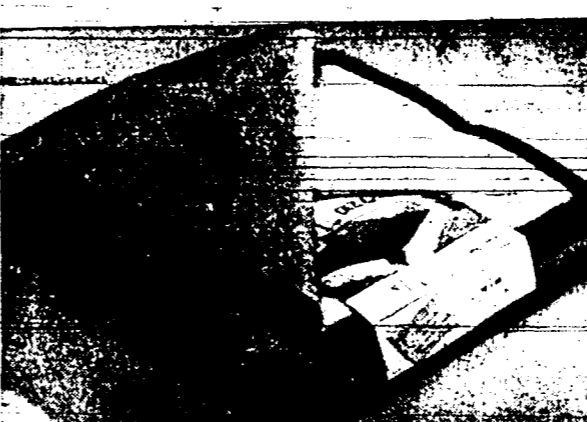
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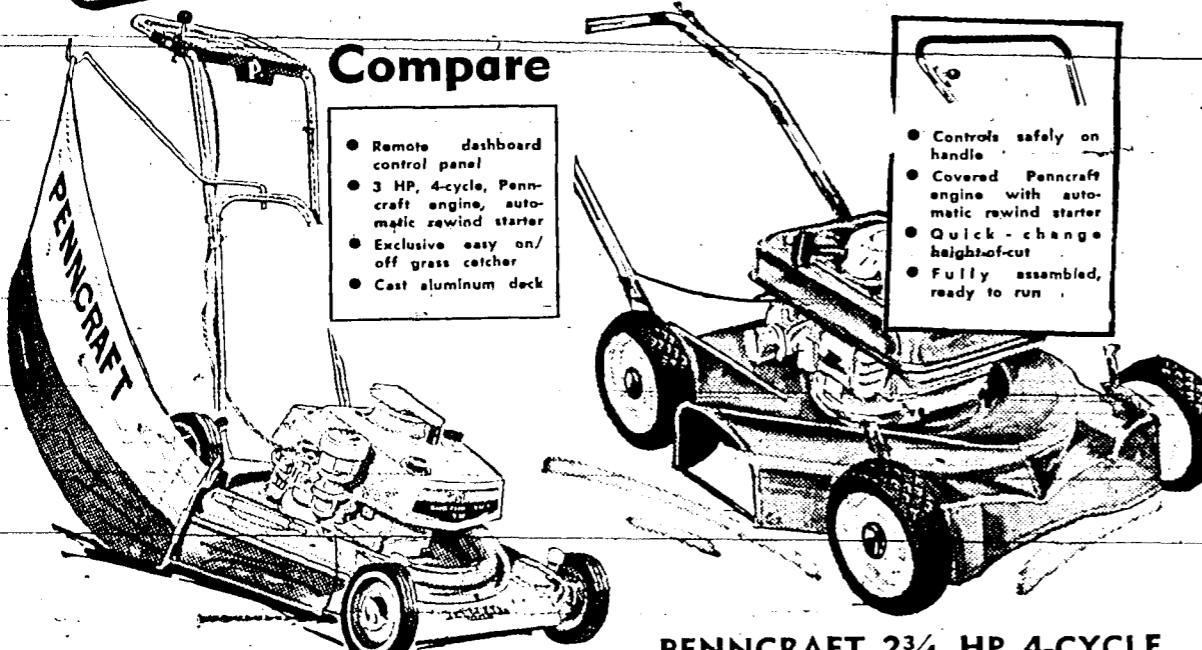

Johnson's  
Intervention**

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (UPI)—French Ambassador Horve Alphand Monday took an "aren't" swipe at President Johnson's intervention in the Dominican Republic. "One can say, so as to justify intervention in the affairs of another country that it is necessary in order to fight against what one calls 'international communism,'" Alphand said. "He was delivering an Independence Day address at the Jefferson Memorial Foundation here today.

"As far as we are concerned," he continued, "we do not approve of Marx's doctrine, or of any totalitarian regime," he said.

"However, how could we not recognize that communism has no longer a universal and monolithic character, that the young nationalism of under-developed countries resorts to state capitalism under very diversified forms which they consider, rightly or wrongly, as being the only solution to their economic problems?" Alphand said.

"We do not see why or by what virtue of what principle or interest we should not accept the firm that they wish to give to their own institutions," he added.

Alphand said that newly independent countries must be left to themselves to "undergo the harsh experience of newly acquired freedom."

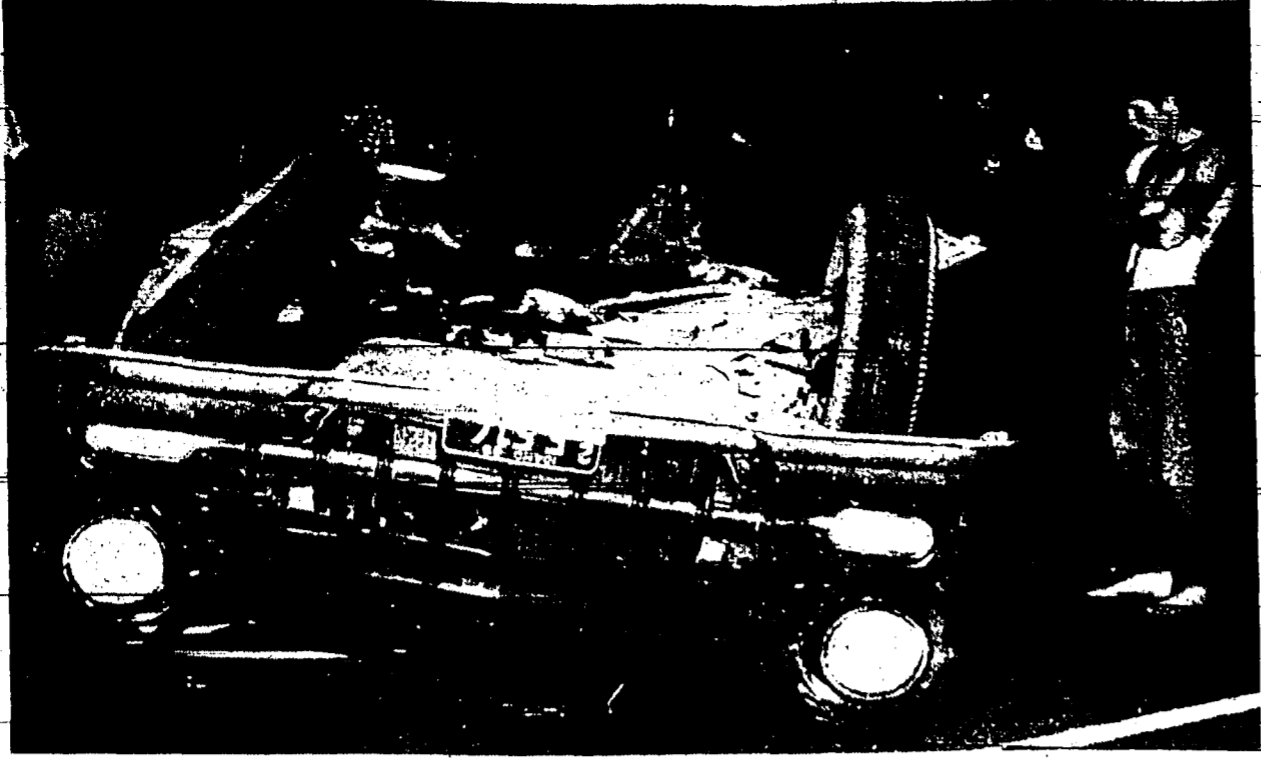
"Any interference cannot but delay the time of maturity for the developing nations, extend the evils it claims to remove or cure, and create parallel interferences," he added.

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# Indians Are Attacked at White Rally

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—Four dark-skinned students from India were attacked Sunday by a crowd at a "We, the White People" rally as they toured the Capitol.

Two of the Indians were beaten by David Kyser, police chief, and all four wore said that although all four wore the distinctive turbans of their homeland the crowd mistook them for Negroes.

Seven Louisiana State University students who attended the rally on the Capitol lawn to pass out leaflets were roughed up, also LSU students were being conducted on an official tour of the Capitol when they were attacked. They fled down a side street. One was taken to a hospital for a laceration.

No arrests were made. The Indians had passed to listen to a speech by former Army Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker of Dallas when they were set upon.

Identities of the four were withheld.

The rally, held in front of the 34-story Capitol, drew from 4,500 to 6,500 persons, by police estimate. They waved Confederate flags, wore rebel hats, held placards criticizing President Johnson and Gov. John J. McKeithen, and stood through about three hours of oratory.

Walker told the crowd that President Johnson has in effect a segregationist policy because "Negroes are becoming wards of the state and it's just an out-and-out segregation program."

The Warren Committee report on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was false propaganda, Walker added.

# Experiments of Atomic Energy No Longer Secret

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP)—Reactors to propel spacecraft to distant planets, perhaps at speeds approaching the velocity of light, instead of using conventional chemical boosters, are being secretly made in this mountain hideaway, one of the rumors in distant towns concerning what the scientists were up to was this:

"They're making windshield wipers for submarines."

Today, the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory of the Atomic Energy Commission makes no secret of the fact that it, and another laboratory at Livermore, are the places where all the nation's bombs, missiles and other nuclear arms are created.

Even so, some pretty unusual nonweapons activities are going on at both laboratories.

These include:

1. The quest to harness the fearsome hydrogen bomb reaction for peacetime electricity production—a quest which was pioneered at Los Alamos in a machine dubbed the "perhapsatron."

2. The "Rover Project"—The dream of using nuclear

opposed to calling off atmospheric nuclear tests.

He argued, in testimony before congressional committees, that the elimination of atmospheric tests would disadvantage the United States more than Russia.

He says his fears have been eased somewhat by the relatively rapid pace of America's underground testing and by what he terms clear evidence that the laboratories have continued to maintain top people and vigorous programs.

Foster also says that the treaty—which stipulates that radioactivity from underground tests be kept within the territorial limits of the testing country—is preventing us from proceeding as vigorously as we otherwise might" with canal-digging and kindred potential applications of the Plowshare program.

"We're doing our best," he said. "To 'clean up' nuclear explosives so that the radioactivity will be lessened."

"But, as for exploding, say, 100 kilotons—the equivalent of 100,000 tons of TNT—to produce craters for something like the Panama Canal, we can't do this today without violating the treaty—at least as it's being interpreted by the United States."

However, Foster and other AEC "Plowshare" experts make clear that even under strictest interpretation of the treaty, many valuable lessons can be learned from cratering experiments of more modest explosive yields.

They also point out that deep-underground Plowshare tests—the ones involving no cratering at all—offer rich potential for yielding other peacetime benefits for man. These would include such possibilities as releasing oil from shale deposits difficult to tap by conventional techniques.

# Ocean Object Is Detected By Scientist

FORT PIERCE, Fla. (AP)—A marine scientist planning to explore the Gulf Stream's depths says he detected and may have photographed a fast-moving, unidentified object on the bottom of the warm-water stream that flows from the Florida Keys north to Newfoundland and thence to northern Europe.

Capt. L. Jacques Nicholas, project coordinator, said Dr. Dmitri Rebikoff of Chicago conducted one-man submarine operations for 10 days gathering data at 90 to 100 foot depths for Dr. Jacques Piccard's projected cruise under the Gulf stream.

Nicholas said Rebikoff told him:

"Beneath the various schools of fish moving at approximately the same speed as the stream (3 1/2 knots) there loomed a pear-shaped object.

"At first from its size we thought it to be some form of shark. However its direction and speed were too constant. It may have been running on a robot pilot. We received no signal (from it) and therefore do not know what it was."

Efforts were made to take pictures. The film was not processed immediately.

Nicholas said Rebikoff told him he was aware the area was a frequent route of heavily-instrumented Russian fishing and hydrographic vessels.

# Interview Is Set by Board For New Head

BOISE (AP)—Dr. Glenn Leggett, University of Washington Provost, was to be interviewed by Idaho Board of Education members here Tuesday as a candidate for Idaho State University president.

Board President Curtis Eaton of Twin Falls confirmed that the meeting was scheduled after two board members discussed the appointment with the Washington educator.

Eaton said no decision has been made by the board on the appointment. He said four Utah educators were interviewed recently and at least three still are under consideration.

"Dr. Leggett is certainly high on the list," said Curtis. "The man comes highly recommended."

Eaton indicated a decision might be made after the session with Leggett but he said its announcement probably would be delayed for review by board committees.

He said the announcement should be made soon to give the new president time to get established before the fall semester begins.

Idaho State University has been without a president since the resignation of Dr. Donald E. Walker last summer.

# Europe Sees Neither War nor Peace, Just Slight Breathing Spell

NEW YORK (NEA)—Despite some anxieties over United States policy in Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic, a majority of Europeans interviewed by this writer are impressed by President Johnson's determination to check Red aggression in Viet Nam and Communist subversion in Latin America.

There is not a single member-nation of NATO that backs French President de Gaulle's anti-American policies. Nor is there a single European leader, except de Gaulle, who wants the United States to pull out of Europe and NATO or to negotiate with Russia the question of German unity or other European problems without United States participation.

The global conflict between Russia and Red China, which has split the Communist world into two hostile camps has considerably reduced the Red Army's immediate military threat to Europe.

These are highlight impressions gained from a tour of western Europe.

Americans who read The New York Times or Walter Lippmann's columns will be surprised to learn that the United States suffered little loss in prestige because of President Johnson's policies in Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic.

Americans were never liked in some countries of Europe, especially in France. They are still not liked. But today the United States is respected by the European man-in-the-street.

Also, for the first time since the Korean War, Europe's diplomats, politicians and intellectuals, are awakening to the fact that the United States is, after all, not a paper tiger.

I found this to be true of all NATO countries, including France. But it is especially true of West Germany, the strongest nation in the Western alliance.

Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, a Christian Democrat, and Socialist Willy Brandt, Mayor of West Berlin, will run in West Germany's general elections in September as friends and supporters of the United States—and not of President de Gaulle.

All major German parties are convinced that no progress can be more in any negotiations with Russia on German unity unless the United States supports the Western initiative.

In fact, because of President Johnson's unambiguous foreign policy, NATO, after a period of dissension and uncertainty, appears to be closing ranks again.

Even President de Gaulle, despite his anti-American obsession and antideluvian ideas of national grandeur, is realistic enough to know on which side his bread is buttered.

He makes his overtures to Russia and Red China confident that should any serious crisis arise the United States will always come to help, out of American self-interest. But the French president, according to

some of his closest associates, has a healthy respect, if little admiration, for President Johnson. He regards him as the first pragmatic and tough politician to occupy the White House since Franklin D. Roosevelt.

De Gaulle also knows that Western military leaders are convinced that NATO countries can defend themselves even without France.

The French president will thus pursue a go-it-alone policy and play follow-the-leader as long as he has the protection of the American nuclear umbrella. But he understands only too well that without the power of the United States France will merely be a sitting duck for Russia's Red Army.

In the view of some of de Gaulle's associates, the French president is waiting for a face-saving gesture from President Johnson before adopting a more conciliatory policy toward NATO and the United States.

Perhaps the most significant fact in Europe today is the marked decline in Soviet prestige. The Red Army's threat is still present. Nor is there any doubt that the Russians and their East German puppets will continue to make trouble in Berlin which they always exploited for purposes of political blackmail.

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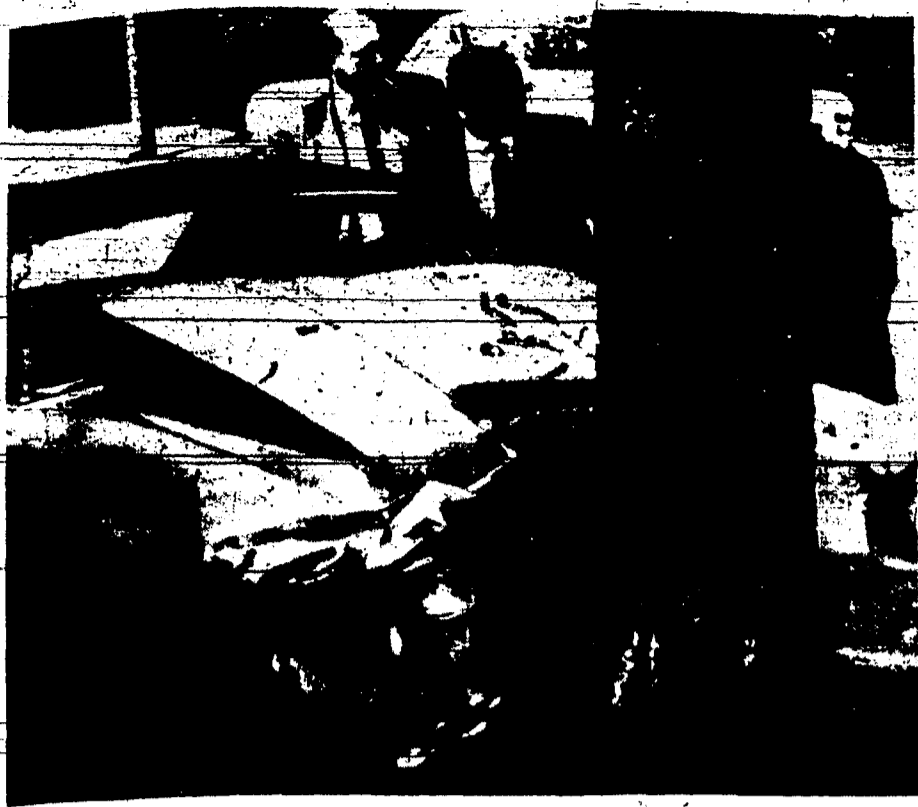

### P. Rubirosa, Diplomat and Playboy, Dies

PARIS (AP)—Porfirio Rubirosa, former Dominican diplomat and international playboy, was fatally injured this morning in an automobile accident.

Police said Rubirosa died while being taken to a hospital. The accident occurred in the Bois de Boulogne on the western edge of Paris.

Police reported that the Ferrari automobile he was driving left the road and crashed into a tree after colliding with another car.

Police said Rubirosa's car struck a parked vehicle and then careened into a tree along Hippodrome Way in the Bois de Boulogne. They said they understood he had suffered severe head injuries.

Rubirosa was long a familiar figure in the night life of Paris, but recently had not frequented night spots as much as in former years. He was a polo devotee and played frequently with teams at the Bagatelle polo grounds in the Bois de Boulogne.

Rubirosa was the former husband of Flor de Oro Trujillo, daughter of the assassinated President Trujillo; Woolworth heiress Barbara Hutton; Doris Duke and French actress Danielle Darrieux.

Rubirosa married Odette Rodin Oct. 27, 1956. They made their home outside Paris.

### Swim Pool Is New Target of Race Protest

CAMBRIDGE, Md. (AP) — A swimming pool described by the Justice Department as a private club and by integrationists as "the city's only safe swimming area" has become the target of new demonstrations.

Seven demonstrators were jailed on disorderly conduct and trespassing charges Sunday after being arrested at the pool.

Asst. Police Chief James C. Leonard said the biracial group of three women and four men, most of them in their 20s, had refused to leave the swimming pool property after being told their applications for membership would not be accepted.

The pool is operated by the Cambridge Rescue Fire Company, a volunteer, all-white organization.

After the arrests two demonstrations were staged, about an hour apart, outside the jail without incident.

The first was staged by about a dozen persons. About 25 took part in the second. Several carloads of white persons followed the group and jeered as it marched back to the predominantly Negro section of the city.

There have been several outbreaks of racial violence in Cambridge in recent years.

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### Episcopalian Critical of Rebaptism

The head of the Episcopal Diocese of California, covering 10 west-central California counties, the bishop termed the second baptism a "direct slap at our church" and "totally void of any sacramental effect and thus sacrilegious."

### Sniper, 23, Surrenders In Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP) — A shy, soft-spoken youth trapped in dense underbrush near a lookout point in the mountains behind Honolulu is charged with first-degree murder in the slaying of a policeman and accused of wounding three bus-riding tourists from a perch on a ridge.

He is Michael Patrick Moeller, 23, a television repairman released from Hawaii's mental hospital four months ago. He had been committed after his indictment by grand jury in connection with a sniping incident last December in which one person was wounded.

Saturday a tour bus carrying 45 passengers was fired on as it made a hairpin turn in mountainous country near the famed Pali lookout point in the Koolau Mountains five miles northeast of Honolulu.

Mrs. Peter Montoya, 51, of Denver, Colo., was wounded in the abdomen. Her husband, also 51, suffered a thigh wound. He said he believed he was hit by the bullet that passed through his wife's body.

Forty minutes later a bus carrying 31 was shot at. This time the victim was Edith Hendrick, 65, of South Weymouth, Mass., wounded in a leg.

Soon at least 100 policemen had converged at the scene, a sharp curve in the highway.

As they worked upward through brush and trees more shots rang out and Patrolman Bradley Kaanana, 25, fell with bullet wounds in his chest and his left leg. He lived 40 minutes.

As the police pressed on, Moeller rose from the brush waving a rifle to which he had tied his white T-shirt as a surrender flag.

"It's certainly a big Fourth of July for us," said his wife, Shirley.

Entering the last round, Casper and five others followed from runners Jack McGowan and Al Geiberger by two strokes, but as the others fell back, Casper came on strong.

"Just think," said Casper. "Several months ago I was a basket case with aches all over and constant head colds. Then the allergist fixed me up. 'He found I was allergic to apples, oranges, wheat, eggs, pork, lamb, peas, beans, chocolate and beet sugar. Now I eat such things as wild game, turtle steaks and buffalo meat. The guys are starting to call me Buffalo Bill."

"Before today's round, I had breakfast of pheasant and sliced peaches. The other day I had avocado and salmon when I got up."

Of the group of challengers, only McGowan, the leathery 142-pound pro from Largo, Fla., whose only victory was the Mountain View Open in Corona, Calif., just fall, and defending champion Chi Chi Rodriguez, made a run for it in Casper's district.

Chi Chi closed with a 68 and McGowan with a 68 to share second, \$5,900, and third, \$4,000, places with 272. Geiberger, seldom a winner but usually in the money, blew to a 73 for 277.

# Secret Service Notes Birthday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Secret Service, a little less secret now than it would like, quietly noted its 100th birthday today.

The duties of this unit of the Treasury Department have often made anonymity impossible. Its agents, particularly those assigned to the White House, frequently must work in front of thousands of people.

Established in July, 1865, the agency was assigned to stop the counterfeiting of paper money, government checks and bonds.

The assassination of three Presidents — Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley — in 37 years alarmed Congress. Shortly after the turn of the century, the secret service was given the added statutory responsibility of protecting the life of the President and his family. This recently was expanded to include the vice president and his family.

It was not a glamour job when the first White House de-

tail of four agents was assigned to President Theodore Roosevelt. He was not overly fond of his escorts and on occasion made them trail on foot through Washington's Rock Creek Park while he rode horseback.

Today's counterparts have their troubles, too. They sometimes must trot for miles beside the President's car when a parade moves slowly through crowded city streets.

Under Chief James Rowley, a veteran of many years on the White House detail, the Secret Service is modernizing its techniques and boosting manpower as fast as Congress permits. From a small beginning, the service has grown to a complement of about 920, most of them agents.

The first agents assigned to Teddy Roosevelt were expected to be sound of wind and limb and little more. Today's agent must be a combination cop, lawyer, psychologist and athlete and have a working knowledge of chemical, biological and nuclear warfare, electronics and highly sophisticated communications.

President John F. Kennedy's assassination in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, brought the service under heavy criticism. Rowley and his agents, who still are shocked over the sniper's success, realized that protective efforts of

their agency have reduced the incidence of assassination appreciably.

Kennedy was the only President to lose his life in 62 years. There have been attempts on other chief executives which were quickly dealt with by the service and its companion organization, the uniformed White House police.
