

Parks Board Meets With O. J. Buxton

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's new state parks board and state land commissioner O. J. Buxton pledged mutual cooperation today in developing the state's resources.

Buxton told the board it has been "and will be" a policy not to sell any land which had a future potential for public recreational use.

State Rep. William Frome, R-Idaho, St. Anthony, board chairman, said members of the board "want to work with you in harmony in the best interests of Idaho."

"I see no reason," Buxton replied, "why we can't have the fullest cooperation."

Jon Soderblom, who has been parks director under Buxton and was named acting director by the new board, called attention to the constitutional duty of the state land board's responsibility, he said, to produce as much revenue as possible for the state.

"The land which is owned by the state and administered by the state land board," Soderblom said, "is the same land we, as parks people, are going to be looking at. It behooves us to work as closely as we can with the land board."

Sen. J. C. Sandberg, D-Bingham, a member of the parks board, asked Buxton if the latter had in mind any areas which should be developed for park purposes.

Ernest Day, Boise, another member of the board, said it was his concern that Idaho's "beautiful and unique" recreational resources be kept in state ownership for development for public use.

Rep. Emery E. Hedlund, D-Benewah, another board member, asked Buxton if the state was selling beach front cottage sites and Buxton replied that there were no such sales.

He said at the summer home site subdivision being developed in Stanley Basin, an area along the Salmon river was being retained for public use.

The parks board reaffirmed its organization action taken at a meeting last month, prior to the time it formally came into existence July 1.

The board also met with Howard R. Alden, assistant professor of outdoor recreation in the College of Forestry at the University of Idaho. Alden explained provisions of the new federal outdoor recreation law, which makes federal money available to states on a matching basis for development of parks and other resources.

White Favors Repeal of Statutes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Compton I. White Jr., D-Idaho, said Tuesday he favors repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act section which permits state "right-to-work" statutes.

"These laws, existing in 19 states, allow parties in a labor negotiation to disregard other provisions of the National Labor Relations Act," White said.

White said he also favors repeal of the section because a person "should be willing to participate in and pay for the operation of organizations from which he directly derives benefits and which a majority of his fellow workers have selected as their representative."

The congressman said Idaho residents have demonstrated opposition to right-to-work legislation.

He was arrested for disturbing the peace during the annual Jackson-Dubois Union "Pass Rendezvous."

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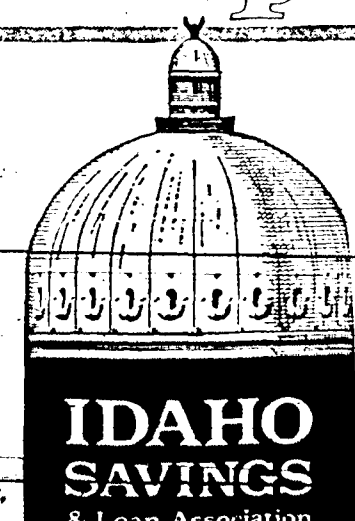
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Charges of Murder Filed In Shooting

SALMON, Idaho (AP) — First degree murder charges have been filed against Major Burnett, about 70, of Salmon.

Burnett, operator of rock quarry along the Salmon River, was taken into custody Sunday after the fatal shooting of Joseph Enos, about 24, Saturday night.

Lemhi County Sheriff Bill Baker said the shooting looked like an ambush, and might have been the culmination of a feud between Burnett and Enos.

Enos was apparently killed instantly as he drove along the Salmon River Road about five miles west of North Fork near the Montana border, Baker said. With him was David Lanier, 23, who was injured when the car careened into a tree. Lanier was in fair condition Monday at a Salmon hospital.

Burnett was arraigned Monday afternoon before Lemhi County Probate Judge Irvin Robertson at Salmon. Burnett asked for an attorney but entered no plea.

Judge Robertson said District Judge Ezra Monson of Blackfoot would probably appoint an attorney to defend Burnett Tuesday.

Baker said the two youths once worked for Burnett.

Killer of 2 Is Shot Down In Manhunt

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A young man armed with a repeating rifle killed a policeman and the father of his girl friend today and wounded two other officers. He was shot to death at dawn after a massive manhunt.

The rifleman was identified as Leroy Francis Scott, about 24, a Negro hot-rodder enthusiast with blondish hair and a record of minor arrests.

Two patrolmen surprised him in a wooded area where he had hidden for five hours, nursing an apparently serious gunshot wound in an earlier exchange with police.

They shot him as he raised his rifle. He died en route to a hospital.

"We knew he was wounded but he didn't look too hurt to me when he raised that rifle," said patrolman James Hintemeyer, 35.

Killed in the earlier exchange of gunfire with Scott were patrolman Coleman McDonough, a former pro football player, and Aaron Godfrey.

McDonough and officers Leo Miacin, 37, and Joseph Laffey, 32, who were wounded, had been called to the Godfrey home, a two-story frame house in a low-rent section of the city's Hazelwood section.

Police said there apparently had been an argument over Scott's attentions to Godfrey's 16-year-old daughter, Ruth. The Godfreys also are Negroes.

Mexican Mother Endures 2 Months of Pain Before Aided

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For two months a young Mexican mother, burned over 70 per cent of her body, took aspirin, sat through 115-degree heat in her mud hut in a remote village, and waited for help to come.

It did, in the form of five doctors who spent the Independence Day weekend flying mercy missions into Mexican villages where there is no medical aid.

Now Ramona Franco de Portola, who spent those two months in an upright position, is lying down — here at White Memorial Hospital where doctors give her a 50-60 chance of surviving.

Dr. Robert Lawson, an Upland, Calif., dentist who helped bring her north, described her suffering from third-degree burns as "a living hell."

"Since a stove set her clothes afire May 5, she lived in an upright position in unbelievable pain in the hut where temperatures rose to 115 degrees," said Lawson.

"It's a real miracle she's alive."

Dr. Lawson and four other doctors found Mrs. de Portola

year-old child, Mrs. de Portola postponed her departure a day until her husband, Humberto, 25, convinced her it was for the best, Lawson said.

The woman was burned on the Mexican Cinco de Mayo holiday when she tried to light her primitive stove for her family's holiday meal.

Alone when her clothes caught fire, she rolled on the hut's dirt floor to extinguish the flames. Her husband found her unconscious.

"She was propped on the bed, and she apparently moved very little until we found her," said Lawson. "Any movement of her body brought excruciating pain. Only a very brave woman with a strong will to live could have survived it."

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Debate Begins on Health Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate opens debate today on the historic bill which would establish broad health programs for 19 million Americans 65 or older and increase all present Social Security benefits.

The plan would cost an estimated 6.8 billion a year. It would be financed primarily by an increase in Social Security taxes, both to the employer and employee.

Sponsors said they would push for passage by the end of this week, and forecast as many as 80 favorable votes out of the 100-man Senate.

Last year, the Senate narrowly adopted an amendment to a House-passed bill adding health care for the aged to Social Security. The measure died in conference between the two branches.

This year, however, the House passed a health care-Social Security bill. The margin in the April 8 vote was a solid 313-115.

The Senate Finance Committee made numerous changes in the House bill but preserved all of its essential provisions. Its vote was 12-5 with Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., among the dissenters.

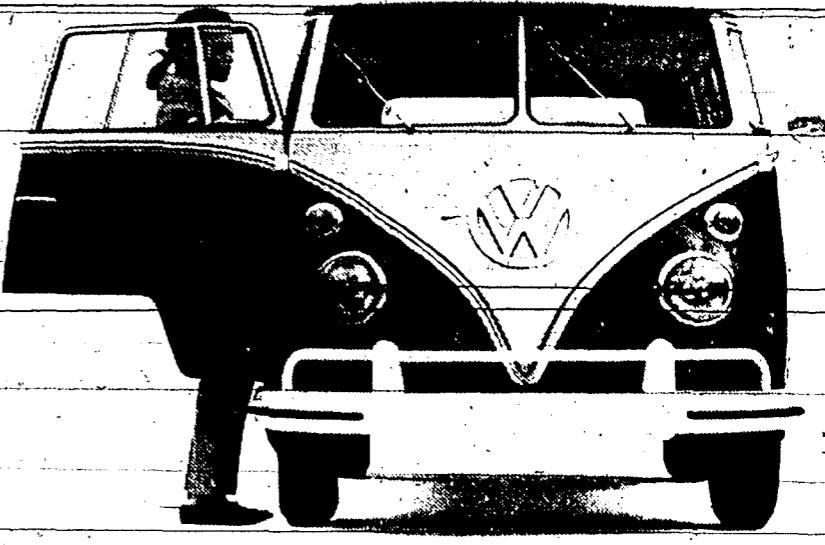
The provisions include a 7 per cent increase in Social Security retirement, survivor and disability benefits, retroactive to last Jan. 1, and these two new health programs:

—A basic plan financed under

Social Security covering hospitalization, posthospital nursing, home care, outpatient hospital diagnostic services, and posthospital home health visits.

—A voluntary, supplemental plan covering doctors' fees and some additional health services. The bill also revises and beefs up the Kerr-Mills program of aid for old persons too poor to pay heavy medical expenses; increases federal grants for needy, old, blind and disabled; and authorizes new U.S. funds for child health programs.

It makes numerous changes in the Social Security law in addition to the increased benefits and the new hospitalization plan.



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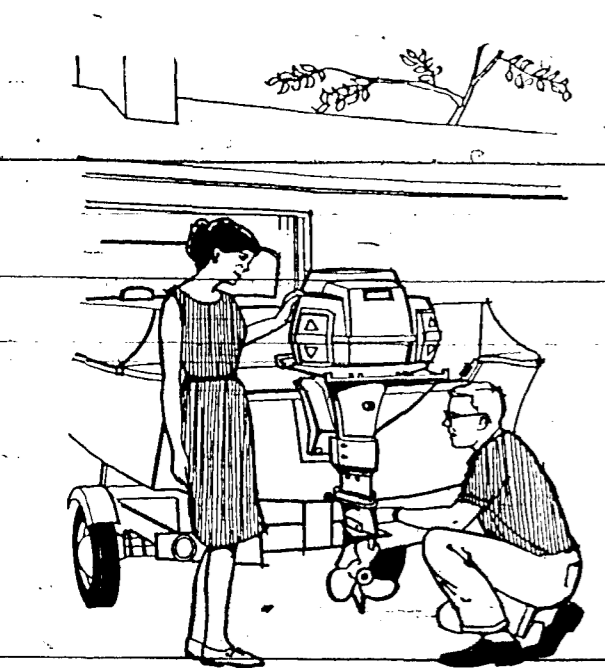
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Former T. F. Resident Weds In California

"He always said it is better to cry now so I can be happy tomorrow—in the years when I would be mature enough for romance."

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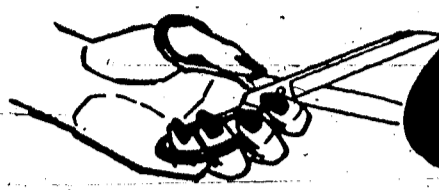

Five-Man Team Probes Explosion Cause at Atomic Research Complex

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) — A five-man team of Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) experts today began probing the cause of a hydrogen explosion and fire that ripped through a block long atomic research complex, injuring eight researchers and two firemen.

The blast occurred Monday in an experimental bubble chamber of the \$12 million Cambridge electronics accelerator, which is jointly operated by Harvard University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in conjunction with the AEC. Damage was estimated at \$1 million.

Three of the researchers injured in the blast were reported in critical condition today at Massachusetts General Hospital: Arthur C. Reid, 20, of Avon, Frank Feinberg, 20, of Providence, R.I., and John Schivell, 22, of Twinsburg, Ohio, remain-

ed on the danger list. Admitted to hospitals with less serious injuries were Donald Golaski, 27, of Somerville; Dr.

Sophia Loren's Bigamy Trial Is Postponed

ROME (AP) — Italy brought Academy Award winning actress Sophia Loren and movie producer Carlo Ponti to trial today in a Rome criminal court on bigamy charges.

The court formally opened the case and then, after a 30-minute session, granted the movie couple's request for a postponement. The next session was set for Oct. 21.

Neither Miss Loren nor Ponti were in court. They are doing film work outside Italy. Their attorneys represented them.

Japan's Head Party Holds Most Seats

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's ruling conservatives lost four seats in the upper house of Parliament but still held a majority of 30, returns today from Sunday's election show.

Prime Minister Eisaku Sato's pro-Western Liberal Democratic party retained 140 seats in the 250-member upper house of the Diet despite opposition attacks against rising consumer prices and the government's support of U.S. policy in Viet Nam.

The Socialists gained 8 seats, boosting their total to 73. A gain of 7 was scored by the Sakagakki, Buddhist Lay party, which pegged its campaign to demands for a Viet Nam peace conference in Tokyo with the Communist Viet Cong taking part. The party, which claims 10 million members, raised its total in the house to 20.

600,000 View Circus March In Wisconsin

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — Milwaukee turned its streets to tanbark Monday as a record throng of 600,000 relived the color and pageantry of a circus parade.

Seven persons were hurt when a runaway Roman chariot swerved into the packed crowd near the start of the annual parade. Most of the spectators were unaware of the mishap.

The million-dollar treasure of lavishly colored, delicately carved circus wagons from the Circus World Museum at Baraboo, Wis., was augmented in the five-mile-long parade by 31 bands and drum and bugle corps and 500 animals.

The oldest of the 40 wagons was built in 1879. Eighteen elephants and a 1903 steam calliope trailed marching units which came from as far away as Toronto and Philadelphia.

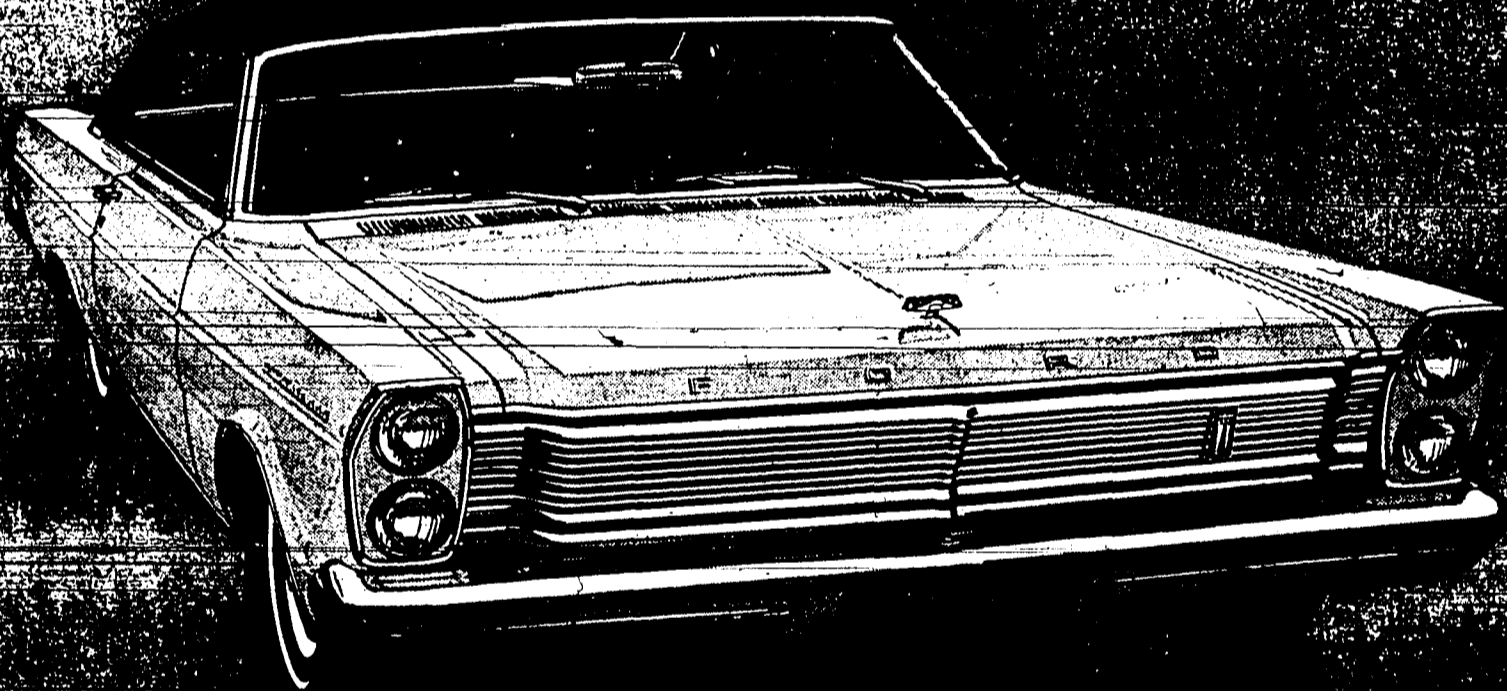
Tests Set for Military Schools

Thirty boys will take the exams under his sponsorship. Church said. He said his nominations will be made after the first of next year, based on the results of the examination this month and one to be given in November.

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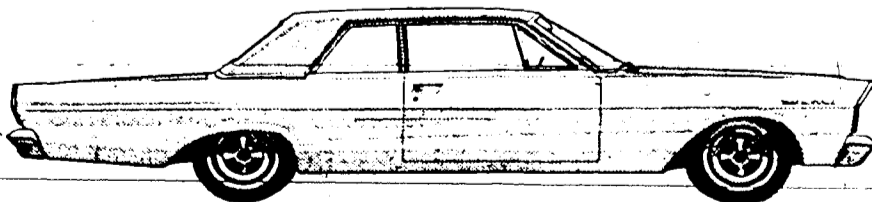

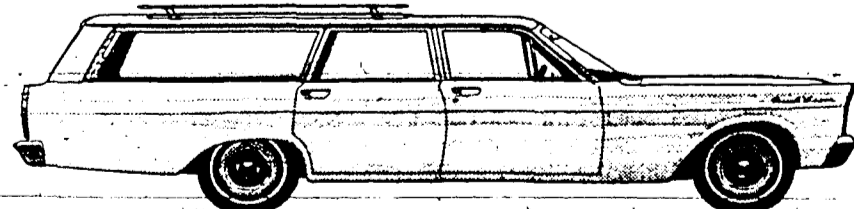
