

Scientists Set to Warm Cameras On Mariner 4

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Jet Propulsion Laboratory scientists are set to rouse Mariner 4 from a month-long sleep at 7:30 a.m. (PDT) Wednesday with a command to warm up its camera for history's first closeup pictures of Mars. If all goes well, 21 pictures will be taken some 10 hours later as the U.S. spacecraft flies within 6,000 miles of the planet believed most likely to shelter extraterrestrial life.

U.S. Agency Director Is Appointed

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson today named Leonard H. Marks to succeed Carl T. Rowan as director of the U.S. Information Agency. Marks, a lawyer, has been serving as a board member of the Communications Satellite Corp. Rowan resigned over the weekend to return to newspaper work. The U.S. Information Agency is the government's overseas propaganda agency. It includes the Voice of America Radio. Johnson, in announcing Marks' appointment at a news conference, praised his "long record as a teacher, lawyer and public servant" and noted that he had served on a number of U.S. delegations abroad dealing with communications matters. A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Marks, 49, had worked for the Federal Communications Commission and taught law earlier in his career.

The body of one of two elderly Filer men who disappeared at Murtaugh Lake Saturday was recovered Tuesday morning in the lowline canal south of Buhl. The body of Fred Knapp, 71, was discovered about 10 a.m. by Earl McRoberts, a ditch rider for the canal company, in the Lowline Canal, approximately three miles south of Buhl and 30 miles from the lake. The body apparently had caught on a rock. McRoberts waded out into the canal, which was about knee deep, and secured the body with a rope to prevent it from drifting further.

Valor Award To Be Given To Area Man

WASHINGTON (AP)—Granting of one of the nation's highest awards to civilians was announced today for an Idaho man. Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said the Department of Interior Award for Valor will be presented to George L. Presley, Fairfield, now an employee of the Sawtooth National Forest in Idaho. He was an employee of the Bureau of Land Management when the incident, on which his award is based, took place Aug. 3, 1963. He rescued a man trapped in a helicopter fire. Two helicopters were being loaded with firefighters at Shoshone, preparatory to a flight to a fire two miles east of Bellevue. The first aircraft took off, hit a power line and crashed. One firefighter was unconscious outside the wreckage, another was trapped inside. Presley, the citation said, ran to the wreckage, pulled one man to safety, then crawled under the overturned helicopter to reach the second man. He freed the man from his seat harness and pulled him clear just as the wreckage exploded. The award will be presented to Presley in Washington Thursday, Church said.

Negro Named To Federal Court Post

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson announced today he will nominate federal Judge Thurgood Marshall, a Negro and a long-time legal battler for civil rights, to be Solicitor General of the United States. Marshall, who was present as the President held a news conference broadcast to the nation, will succeed Archibald Cox. The President said Cox is retiring to return to Massachusetts. The Solicitor General argues the federal government's cases before the Supreme Court. Marshall, when confirmed, will become the 33rd man to hold the post. Johnson noted that Marshall has served on the 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals since 1962 and said that before that Marshall was a legal "champion of equal rights" for a quarter century. Marshall is a former legal counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. In that capacity he successfully prosecuted the NAACP's case against school segregation before the Supreme Court, in the case that resulted in the high tribunal's 1954 ruling that segregation is unconstitutional.

Wisconsin Is First State to Ratify Proposal

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Wisconsin today became the first state to approve the proposed presidential disability amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The 25th Amendment must be ratified by the legislatures of 38 states—three-fourth of the nation's 50 states. Final rites will be held at Sunset Memorial Park. The family suggests memorials to the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital.

Ex-Wife Is Witness At Trial of Olson

The murder trial of George Olson, charged with the Aug. 22, 1963, killing of Keith T. Gates, Boise, got under way Tuesday morning in Eleventh District Court, Twin Falls, before Judge Theron Ward. The last juror was selected and the panel was sworn in at 8:15 p.m. Monday. More than 50 persons were called and questioned before 12 jurors were approved. Mrs. Anna Lou McKinnon, 599 Lynwood Blvd., Olson's ex-wife, was the only witness to testify Tuesday morning. Mrs. McKinnon testified about events which occurred between May 24, 1963, the time of the couple's divorce, and until Aug. 22, 1963, when Gates was killed.

Rioters and Police Clash In Ecuador

QUITO, Ecuador (AP)—Demonstrations against Ecuador's ruling military junta flared anew Monday night in Quito and Guayaquil. At least one person was reported killed and a number wounded in clashes between rioters and police. Police used tear gas to quell demonstrators in Quito, the capital, and Guayaquil, the nation's biggest city, where student, labor and political organizations have been trying to force the junta to hold national elections. Troops were called out last Friday to deal with demonstrators in the two cities. Junta Secretary-General Heron Donoso said one policeman was killed Monday night and two wounded in street fighting in Quito. Student sources said one of their group received a bullet wound in the thigh. During the testimony given by Mrs. McKinnon, Vernon K. Smith, Boise, defense attorney, interrupted 19 times to the line of testimony given. When Mrs. McKinnon started to relate a conversation between Olson and herself, Smith objected because there was no time or place given in the testimony. Judge Theron Ward overruled eight objections by Smith and sustained seven. Mrs. McKinnon said Olson had threatened her and anyone else who might be with her. While Mrs. McKinnon was testifying, Olson sat calmly in a chair beside his attorney, Smith. Most of the time Olson leaned back in the chair with his hands under his chin. At other times he would write something on a piece of paper or thumb through a sheaf of papers. Mrs. McKinnon also related the events of the night of Aug. 22, 1963, when her cousin, Gates, was killed. She testified she was shot several times and at one time during the shooting she saw Olson with a gun in his hand. James J. May, prosecuting attorney, presented four photographs to Mrs. McKinnon to identify. Two of the photographs were of Mrs. McKinnon's family room, one was of the kitchen and the other was of Gates. More Action Reported in Viet Nam War

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Five U.S. Marines were killed and 17 wounded in two bloody engagements near the key U.S. air base at Da Nang, a U.S. military spokesman reported today. He said 22 Viet Cong were killed in one action Monday, and unconfirmed reports said 26 guerrillas died under Marine fire in the second. In the biggest of the two Marine actions Monday, Leatherns on a sweep operation only three miles southwest of Da Nang ran into a determined Viet Cong band. The spokesman said two Marine F4B Phantoms supported the foot soldiers as they pushed through rice paddies and hamlets where a Viet Cong force of about 200 had been reported earlier. Communist marksmen killed four Marines and wounded 14 others in this fighting, the spokesman said. The Marine claim of 22 dead Viet Cong included six hit by rocket fire from the Phantoms, the spokesman reported.

Preparations for 1965 Scout Roundup At Farragut Park Nearly Completed

FARRAGUT STATE PARK, Idaho (AP)—With less than 48 hours until the beginning of the 1965 International Senior Girl Scout Roundup here, preparations for the invasion of 9,000 girls from all over the nation and from 40 foreign countries have nearly been completed. The girls, along with 2,000 adult staff members, will conduct their Roundup July 15-28 at this park on the shores of Lake Pend Oreille, the site of a World War II naval training center. Gov. Robert E. Smylie estimated the state spent more than \$2 million preparing the old training center for the girls. But North Idaho merchants plan to make up for this with businesses for the campers, staff, and an estimated 70,000 visitors expected to spend time at the Roundup. Girls at the Roundup will be well-protected, with 500 soldiers from the U.S. Sixth Army providing security, supply, and medical support. Tight security was to start today, with special passes needed for admission to the Roundup area. Special arrangements will be made later for visitors. Army patrols were to ring the perimeter of the Farragut park 24 hours a day, and were also to keep watch on hiking trails in the area. The Coast Guard was to be on hand to patrol the lake front section of the roundup site, and by a 15 member WAC detachment arrived Monday to provide liaison between the masculine See GIRL SCOUTS, pg. 2, col. 7

OAS Reports 17 Bodies Found in Dominican Area

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Organization of American States has reported that 17 bodies of persons who died mysteriously have been found in Dominican Republic areas controlled by the forces of Gen. Antonio Imbert Barrera. An OAS spokesman said Monday that atrocities attributed to rebel forces in areas controlled by Co. Francisco Caamano Deno would be covered in a later report by the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights.

U.S. Forces to Increase Fight In Viet Nam War

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson said today U.S. forces will be engaging in more active combat in South Viet Nam and "new and serious decisions" on the war may be necessary in the near future. Johnson left open the possibility of calling up military reserves and increasing draft quotas as the conflict expands. He said the Communists have increased their aggression against the south. The President also announced at a news conference that the Soviet Union had accepted a U.S. proposal to resume disarmament talks in a 17-nation conference at Geneva by July 27. He called this encouraging. Of general relations with the Soviet Union—which have been hit by the Vietnamese war, the President said: "We'd like to improve relations any way we can."

T.F. Woman Wins U.S. Speech Award

Mrs. Sterling Vaughn, Twin Falls, won Toastmistress International's most coveted award Monday night during the club's national convention in New Orleans, La. Mrs. Vaughn, a member of the Magic Toastmistress Club for about two years, won first place with her extemporaneous speech on "Knowledge." She competed against eight regional finalists from the United States and parts of Canada for the first place trophy. Before reaching national competition, Mrs. Vaughn spoke in 12 area meets. She was chosen from the three local local clubs to represent the Twin Falls area in Council No. 9 competition and Inter-council competition at Boise. Four clubs comprise this council. As winner of the council competition, Mrs. Vaughn was eligible to compete in the Northern Regional contest at Calgary, Alberta, Canada, which is made up of 13 councils from the Northern United States and Canada. Mrs. Vaughn and eight other regional finalists were given 24-hour notice in which to pick a speech subject from a choice of three. Their talks were given before a panel of judges the final evening of the convention. Mrs. LaVern Strong, immediate past president of the local club and Mrs. Vaughn's sponsor in the club, said Monday night she believed Mrs. Vaughn was the first Idaho woman to reach the national finals.

Urban Renewal Unit For T.F. Requested

Representatives of the Twin Falls study group asked the city commission Monday night to adopt a resolution to appoint an urban renewal agency. Joe Cilek and Voy Hudson presented facts relating to the loss of tax revenues, amounting to two mills annually during the last four years, to the city of Twin Falls. This, it was pointed out, is due to the deterioration of the central city area. They discussed information regarding certain substandard residential areas and noted that economically they are not paying for services the city renders them. The study group was appointed in October, 1963, by the city commission to investigate problems of the city. John Baldwin, San Francisco, who has been studying the city's problems, explained the workings of the urban renewal administration and specifically pointed out the increase in tax revenues. Establishment of an urban renewal agency is the first step under Idaho law that can be taken in any survey and planning investigation of blighted areas. The local agency, with the approval of the city commission, may or may not apply for federal assistance for planning of this type. Lloyd Walker advised the committee he has learned from Sen. Frank Church that funds for the 701 study of Twin Falls will be forthcoming shortly. At the city commission's extended meeting from July 6, which preceded the Twin Falls study group's report, three bids were accepted. Larry Fairbanks Construction Co., Twin Falls, was awarded a contract for the installation of storm sewer sidewalks, curbs and gutters along Locust Street North. His bid was \$11,737, while the other bids included \$16,922 from Empire Construction Co., Pocatello, and \$11,939 from Neilsen and Miller, Twin Falls. Bob Reese Motor Co. was awarded the contract for a half-ton pickup truck for the sanitation department. His bid was \$1,789, while the bid from McVey's, Inc., was \$1,910. The Burroughs Corp. was given the contract for an accounting machine for \$3,276.40 for use in the city water works department. There were no other bidders. Twin Falls merchants were granted a request to display merchandise on the sidewalks during Crazy Daze, July 23 and 24. They were represented by Robert Harvey. Arnold F. Cross, district manager; American Automobile Association, presented a plaque to the city for two years—1963 and 1964—without a pedestrian fatality.

Los Angeles Man Dies of Crash Hurts

Vincent Lloyd Harder, 21, Los Angeles, Calif., died in Magio Valley Memorial Hospital about 7:30 a.m. Tuesday of injuries he received about 8:50 p.m. Monday when the MG convertible he was driving went out of control and overturned about eight miles north of the Idaho-Nevada border. Idaho State Patrolman S. D. (Scotty) Luckert said Harder was found in the middle of the road, near the foot of the Union Pacific underpass. He said the car apparently hit the shoulder at the foot of the 27th traffic death of 1965 occurred Tuesday as result of an accident Monday in Twin Falls county.

Search for Bank Robber Continues

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The search continued today for a man who asked a suburban Salt Lake City bank for a loan Monday afternoon, and then robbed it at gunpoint of more than \$17,000.

Officers who set up roadblocks and alerted neighboring states, said the bandit might have had an accomplice who drove him from a branch office of Walker Bank and Trust Co. A white sedan, three to seven years old, was seen by passers-by leaving the office about the time of the robbery.

The bank's assistant manager, Stephen B. Harrison, told officers the stocky man entered the office about 4 p. m. and asked to apply for a loan. Harrison said the man told him he was a heavy equipment operator and a contractor.

The man had almost completed the application form, Harrison said, when he left a desk, walked to the side of a teller's cage, and produced a long-barreled small caliber pistol.

A bank teller, Mrs. Joy Dean Thurmond, said he cocked the pistol, and ordered her to put "all the money" in a brown satchel he carried.

Psychologist Describes Therapy

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—A 30-hour journey into the "inner space" of the mind and emotions was described Monday by a psychologist and six persons who recently took part in an experiment in group therapy.

The head-shrinking marathon was held in the living room of Dr. George S. Bach, a psychologist who believes that a full day or more in an intense encounter with others exerts a pressure to change behavior.

Not all who start a marathon finish it, says Bach.

"These are some of our doctors, actresses, politicians who are so imbued with their role or professional symbol that they can't drop their veils," Bach said in an interview.

"It is extremely difficult to switch from the marketing stance of role-playing and image making which they must practice in the workaday world and to feel free to come out straight, strong and transparent."

Those who stick it out are usually helped, he says.

Here are examples from a recent marathon session:

Gertrude was a woman who had always played a role of agreeing with people because she wanted to avoid conflict.

During the session she realized "there can be constructive fighting."

Since then, Bach said, she has sorted out her friends and discarded those she couldn't level with.

One couple, Herman and Lydia, had separated after 24 years of marriage because of a communication problem — all one-sided, from Lydia.

Once during the marathon, Bach says, it took five participants to make Lydia shut up. Eventually Herman and Lydia both saw the imbalance in their output of words. Before it ended, Herman got started talking and didn't stop for two hours.

Now, says Bach, they are reunited.

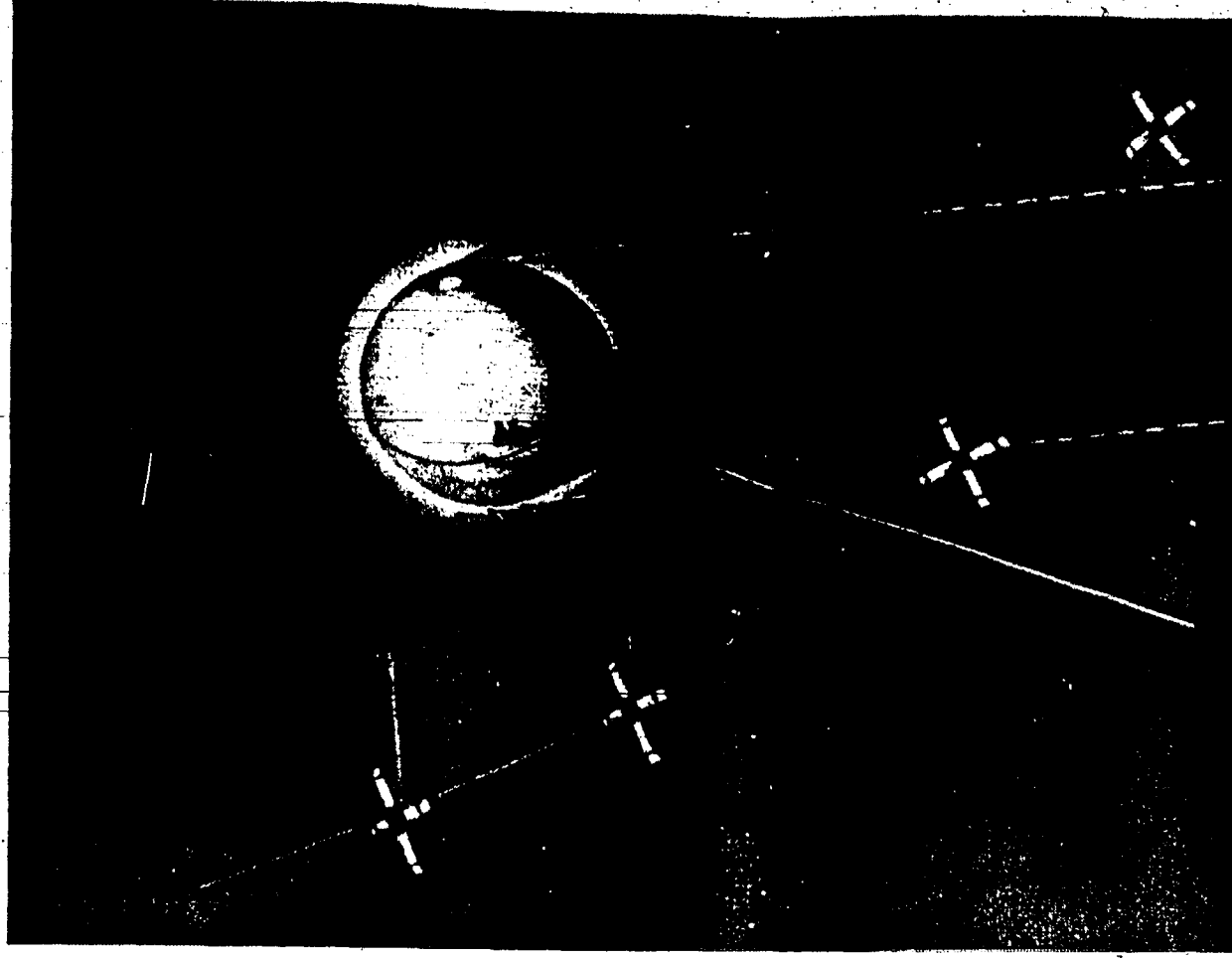
Talks for New Canal Zone Are Highlighted

Lower asks the \$75,000 for permanent injuries he received in the crash.

RULES HEARING SET
BOISE (AP) — A public hearing on rules and regulations for testing newborn babies for Phenylketonuria (PKU) and other metabolic defects that can cause mental retardation is scheduled Wednesday.

The tests have been mandatory since July 1 under a measure adopted by the 1965 Legislature. The hearing begins at 10 a. m. at Statehouse chambers.

HANGS SELF

MALAD (UPI) — A Malad mechanic hanged himself in his county jail cell Tuesday following his arrest for terrorizing patrons of a cafe with a shotgun.

Onelda County Sheriff Ken Wharton identified the dead man as Jim Van Leuven, about 30, the father of five small children.

Wharton said Van Leuven fired a half dozen shots in the Chat-N-Chew Cafe about 1 a. m. while employees covered on the floor in a locked rest room. The sheriff said Van Leuven also shot at a young man in the parking lot outside the restaurant and lounge but missed him.

BIDS CALLED FOR
BOISE (AP) — The state highway department today called for bids on a section of Interstate highway 80N from the interchange with state highway 25 to the interchange with State Highway 27 in Minidoka County.

The work was split into two projects. One covers construction of the roadway, drainage structures, a plantmix bituminous stabilized base and a plantmix bituminous surface on 7.550 miles of roadway.

The other involves construction of four 114-foot concrete overpasses, two 150-foot concrete bridges and one 220-foot concrete underpass.

Bids on both projects will be opened Aug. 3. Bids will be opened Aug. 10 on constructing the roadway, drainage structures and a plantmix bituminous surface on 1,153 miles of the Bogus Basin road north from Boise in Ada County.

Trouble in Gemini 4 Is Not Known

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Officials were about ready to blame "space gremlins" Monday for the failure of a computer on the Gemini 4 mission June 3-7.

Charles Mathews, Gemini program manager, told a news conference the trouble hasn't been found, and it is his opinion that it won't be.

The computer failed during the latter part of the four-day mission causing astronauts Edward H. White and James A. McDivitt to re-enter the earth's atmosphere in a ballistic path.

Engineers have subjected the IBM-made computer to all sorts of torture tests in an effort to duplicate the trouble, but it has withstood them all and is running perfectly.

"We have frozen it, baked it, in temperatures way beyond those encountered on the flight and the computer keeps running perfectly," a puzzled Mathews said.

A backup system of the astronaut manually switching to an auxiliary power supply has been added for the remaining Gemini flights. This was done in case the computer fails again, Mathews said.

A fire bomb with a burning fuse was hurled from a passing automobile into the parking lot of the Continental Air Transport Co. on the near West Side Monday night. It burst into flames near one of the 90 parked buses but was extinguished quickly. There was no damage.

Continental operates buses plying between downtown hotels and O'Hare and Midway airports.


Police expressed doubt there was any connection between the fire missiles and the black powder bombs that have caused heavy damage to buildings in the last six days.

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Marichal Faces Pappas in All-Star Game; Mays Is Still Doubtful

ST. PAUL-MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Juan Marichal, the high-kicking ace pitcher of the San Francisco Giants, will face fiery Milt Pappas of Baltimore in Tuesday's 36th All-Star baseball game before 47,000 fans at enlarged Metropolitan Stadium. Although Willie Mays still is aching from a home-plate collision with Pat Corrales Saturday and may see only limited action, the National League remained a 7-5 favorite over the American League team.

The National League, which once trailed 12-4 in the series dating back to 1933, pulled even at 17-17 last year by winning at New York's Shea Stadium on Johnny Callison's three-run homer in the ninth.

Gene Mauch, Philadelphia manager who got the NL All-Star managerial job because St. Louis' Johnny Keane shifted to the New York Yankees, named Marichal as his starter.

Mauch got a close-up look at the 14-game winner Saturday night when he shut out the Phillies 7-0 on two hits. The 26-year-old right-hander has a fantastic 1.55 earned run average and has completed 15 of 20 starts.

Mauch lusted Cincinnati's Jim Maloney, who has a 10-4 record, would be his second pitcher and said all eight might work if needed. No pitcher can work more than three innings unless the game goes into overtime.

Al Lopez of the Chicago White Sox, filling in as American League manager because Yogi Berra was fired after winning the 1964 pennant with the New York Yankees, didn't make the noon news conference but sent word that Pappas would be his pitcher.

Pappas, a 26-year-old right-hander, has a 9-3 record with a 1.74 ERA for the Orioles. He shut out the White Sox with four hits Friday night. Jim Grant of the home town Minnesota Twins and Mel Stottlemyre of the New York Yankees might follow up.

Mauch surprised many by putting Mays in the leadoff position. "If there is a chance for anybody to be up five times, I'd like to have it be Willie," said Mauch.

However, Mays still has a sore hip as a result of his collision in Philadelphia. He undoubtedly will start but might not go all the way.

Mauch spotted second baseman Pete Rose of Cincinnati No. 7 in the order and fleet shortstop Maury Wills of Los Angeles in the No. 8 position.

"I would like them to be on base when Willie comes up," he explained. "But if it's tied in the late innings I want Willie or Hank Aaron coming up because they could win it with one swing of the bat."

The statistics give the National League a 12-point edge in batting with a composite average of .296 to the American's .254. National League sluggers have hit 200 homers in 178 by the Americans, who used to dominate in this department.

Mauch has long-ball power in left fielder Willie Stargell of Pittsburgh, center fielder Mays, right fielder Aaron of Milwaukee, first baseman Ernie Banks of Chicago, third baseman Richie Allen of the Phils and catcher Joe Torre of Milwaukee. Rose is a hustling consistent hitter and Wills already has stolen 55 bases in a drive on his own record.

The American League moved Harmon Killebrew of the Twins into the starting line-up at first base when Chicago's Bill Skowron had to give way because of an injury. The Killer beat the Yankees Sunday with a dramatic ninth-inning homer.

Other power men in the American starting line-up include left fielder Willie Horton of Detroit, right fielder Rocky Colavito of Cleveland, second baseman Felix Mantilla of Boston and shortstop Dick McAuliffe of Detroit.

Third baseman Brooks Robinson of Baltimore and catcher Earl Battey of the Twins can hit the long one occasionally, and center fielder Vic Davalillo of Cleveland is hitting .321.

All starters, except the pitchers, were picked by the players, coaches and managers. They must play at least the first three innings.

This is the first time since 1943 that no New York Yankees are in the starting line-up, although four are on the squad since first baseman Joe Pepitone has been named as a reserve.

Trial Starts For Browns' Jim Brown

CLEVELAND (AP) — Eight jurors — most of whom are not football fans — were questioned Monday in the opening day of the trial of professional fullback Jim Brown.

Five women and three men were seated tentatively after careful questioning by Police Prosecutor Al Corsi and Defense Atty. Norman Minor.

Brown, 29-year-old All-Pro fullback of the National Football League champion Cleveland Browns, is charged with assault and battery against Miss Brenda Ayres, 18.

Tentative seating of the jury continues in Municipal Court Tuesday at 9 a.m., EDT. Then lawyers for both sides may exercise challenges and replace some jurors.

Both Corsi and Minor took special note to point out the meaning of circumstantial evidence. Brown has pleaded innocent and declined to make preliminary comment to the charge by Miss Ayres that he slapped her in an East Side Motel on the night of June 19.

Neither side has indicated it knows of any witnesses to the alleged incident. Conviction on the assault and battery charge carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$200 fine.

Brown, married since 1958 and father of three, has led the NFL in rushing in seven of the eight years he's played in it.

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Salmon and Tributaries Are Closed to All Chinook Fishing

BOISE (AP) — All fishing for Idaho's Chinook salmon this summer was halted Monday with emergency closure of the Salmon River and all its tributaries to summer-run Chinook fishing. The order, which includes the South Fork of the Salmon, was announced by Robert L. Salter, assistant director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. "Based on information now at hand," said Salter, "there may be no

more sport fishing for summer Chinook in Idaho for several years unless present trends change."

The river was closed to spring-run Chinook June 25, Salter said, but the department had hoped to keep portions of the river open for the summer-run fish.

Cancellation of all Chinook salmon fishing, he said, was required by a record low count of the fish swimming toward spawning beds.

Salter said only 11,253 summer-run Chinook had been counted at Ice Harbor, the first dam on the Snake River, by July 10. He said this is not enough for both spawning and sport fishing.

He said the production rate of Idaho salmon is declining sharply. Where one Chinook on the spawning bed returned four or five adult fish prior to 1957, he said, the rate now seems to be about one returning adult for each spawner.

"By giving up sport fishing for these big ocean fish this year," said Salter, "we hope to prevent a further decline in the run that will be produced by this year's spawners."

13,000-Year-Old Human Skull Is Found In Southern Egypt by American Party

CAIRO (UPI)—An American expedition has unearthed part of the skull of a human who lived about 13,000 years ago in southern Egypt.

Dr. Charles A. Reed, director of the Yale University Prehistoric Expedition to Nubia, said he believed this was the oldest human remain ever discovered in Egypt.

The frontal bone was found by expedition member Dr. Martin Baumhoff of the University of California in 1963 near Kom Ombo, the resettlement area for nearly 50,000 Nubians whose ancestral land will be flooded by the backwaters of the Aswan High Dam.

The find represents part of the forehead with the complete upper curve of the right eye socket and much of the upper curve of the left eye socket. Red said the thick bone and heavy ridges indicated it belonged to "a very rugged male."

The bone and a few associated fragments were the only human remains found by the 19-member expedition, sponsored by Yale University's Peabody Museum of Natural History, in about 13 months of field work spread over three winter seasons.

But the group has discovered hundreds of tons of stone and animal-bone tools dating back 60,000 to 70,000 years.

The expedition has completed its field work, which cost about \$315,000. Reed said it has brought back to Cairo only about five tons of the more interesting finds. A U.A.R. committee of experts has decided which are to remain here and which are to be taken home by the expedition.

The expedition first came to Egypt in September, 1962, under the UNESCO program for saving Nubian antiquities.

After working the Kom Ombo area, it scoured the eastern bank of the Nile from the Sudanese border to the High Dam

COEUR D'ALENE, IDAHO (AP)—A North-Idaho couple is accused in a grand jury indictment of selling advertising to at least 43 western banks on false pretenses.

The indictment against Edward William Norden and Mary Norden on 23 counts of using the mails to defraud, using fictitious names and conspiracy was revealed Monday after their arrest in Texas.

and also part of the western bank in central Nubia. It purchased a houseboat which served as a floating laboratory and dormitory for expedition members. The boat, named "Hathor" after an ancient Egyptian goddess, was given to the U.A.R. Antiquities Department after the group completed its work.

Reed said the expedition was concerned almost entirely with Paleolithic old stone age relics. Its finds included crudely chipped stone handaxes believed to be 60,000 or 70,000 years old, more refined blades and scrapers reflecting progress in craftsmanship and culture, and 15,000-year-old "Venus figurines" which are very small stone tools in geometric shapes believed to have been used together in groups to make composite tools.

U.S. Atty. Sylvan Jeppesen said the advertisements were placed in the Masonic Tribune in Seattle, Wash., and the Labor News in Houston, Texas, as routine advertisements.

The Nordens were arrested in Laredo, Texas, and released on \$500 bond each for proceedings in U. S. District Court in Coeur d'Alene.

In a small valley leading down to the Nile from the Red Sea hills, Dr. Reed said the expedition found about 20 "fish spears" made of animal bone in a deposit accumulated where people had probably camped to fish. One of the spears was nearly intact and it represented a 15-centimeter-long slightly curved bone tool with one edge barbed for effective holding of a speared fish.

The spears, Reed said, were the first discovery of the kind in Nubia. He said it was difficult to date them at present but the likeliest guess was 6,000 to 8,000 years ago.

The expedition found no traces of prehistoric houses, Reed said, and the older objects discovered were all on or near the surface. He attributed this to erosion and said the absence of stratified layers made the determination of age difficult.

Third Man Is Arrested for Bank Robbery

PORTLAND (AP)—A third man has been arrested and charged in a bank robbery which police believe led to the murder of a Lane County deputy sheriff and kidnaping of nine persons in Oregon and California.

James Richard Berry, 22, Hubbard, Ore., was arrested Monday by FBI agents in Portland and charged with aiding in a \$12,000 robbery in Portland last week.

Meeting by Utah Grand Jury on Complaints Set

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Salt Lake County Grand Jury scheduled a meeting today with Atty. Gen. Phil I. Hansen after postponing hearings for public complaints of alleged irregularities in county government.

A jury spokesman said the public complaint hearings were postponed so jurors could probe rumored wrongdoings a 1 1/2 days studied by a special team of county investigators.

France Making Atomic Bombs As Warheads

PARIS (AP)—The French Atomic Energy Commission says France has begun making a more efficient atomic bomb for use as a warhead for missiles.

A report Monday night said researchers concentrated last year on developing a warhead for ground-to-ground missiles designed to serve as the intermediary between atomic bombs carried by Mirage IV jet fighter-bombers and the Polaris-type missiles planned for French submarines.

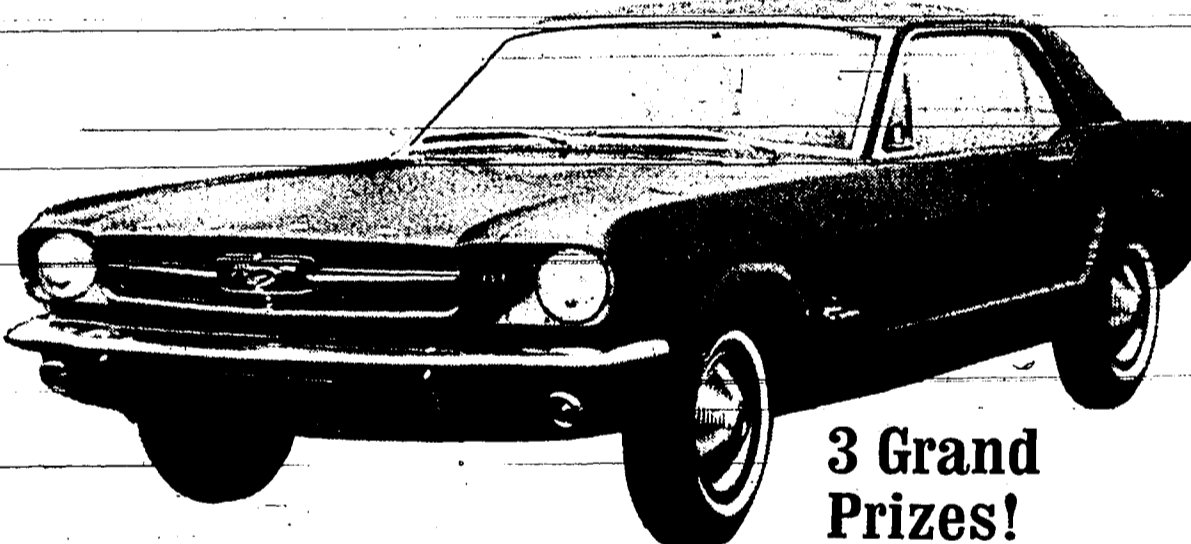

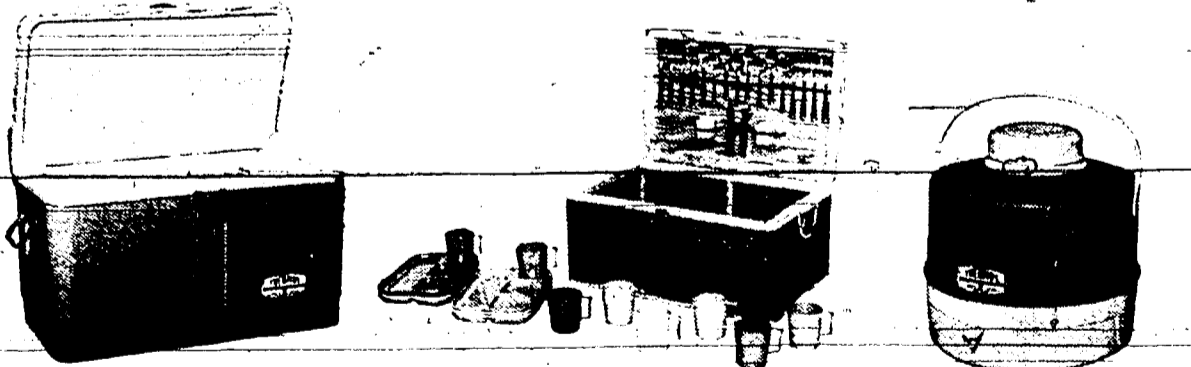

Flood Damage High Along Lost River

ARCO (UPI)—Officials along the Big Lost River totaled this year's flood damage and found it the worst in the river's history.

Butte County Civil Defense Director Ed Ramshaw set "a rough estimate" at half a million dollars.

The Bureau of Reclamation figures \$90,000 damage to the irrigation system in Butte County and \$40,000 in Custer County. Damage to Butte County roads have been estimated at \$100,000.

Farmers have suffered the worst from the flooding river, especially from damage to hay and pasture lands.

Soil conservation officials, who were still estimating the damage, said the federal government will approve long-term low-interest loans. Assistance also will be forthcoming from the Farmer's Home Administration, officials said.

Three of six families forced to evacuate their homes have yet to return. Their biggest problem has been flood waters in wells and sewage systems.

Ramshaw said Butte County will ask the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to help prevent future flooding.
