

McNamara Says Reserve Forces May Be Called up

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said today new U.S. troops increases in South Viet Nam would make it necessary to consider calling up military reserves, extending tours of duty and enlarging draft calls.

200,000 Men Could Be Called to Duty

WASHINGTON (AP) — The armed services have submitted tentative estimates for Reserve and National Guard call-ups totaling more than 200,000 men, it was learned today. Informal sources stressed that the estimates were still for planning purposes in the event a decision should be made to order up Reservists and Guardsmen in the growing crisis over South Viet Nam. The Army listed possible needs for 120,000 Guardsmen and Reservists, including six independent brigades. Sources said the Navy came up with an estimate of need for about 40,000 individual Reservists. The Marine Corps was said to have listed a call-up of the 4th Marine Division and its air wing, which total about 44,000 men. The Air Force estimate involved National Guard and Reserve air transport units totaling 20,000 men. The secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force conferred early this week with Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus Vance to discuss the possibility of a Reserve guard call-up and planning that should be done to get ready for such an eventuality. McNamara declined to be pressed on how big a force of U.S. Regulars would have to be assigned to the war in South Viet Nam before the point of calling up Reservists and Guardsmen was reached.

Evidence in Murder Trial Is Introduced

Photographs, bullet slugs and a gun were admitted and marked as evidence Wednesday morning in Eleventh District Court during the third day of the trial of George Olson, who is charged with the Aug. 22, 1963, murder of Keith T. Gates, Boise. Judge Theron Ward heard testimony from L. L. Talkington and Tim Qualls, both Twin Falls detectives, and Kenneth Johnson and Vidtor Cummins, both Twin Falls policemen. James May, Twin Falls County prosecuting attorney, called Talkington to the stand to identify photographs he took the night of the homicide at 599 Lynwood Blvd.

Second Victim Of Drowning Is Located

The body of David Hatch, 71, Filer, was recovered Wednesday morning from the main canal, about five miles below Murtaugh Lake, where Hatch and Fred Knapp, whose body was found Tuesday morning, had gone fishing. The two elderly Filer men disappeared at the lake Saturday and a search was started for the men after their small boat was recovered from the water. Knapp, 71, was discovered Tuesday morning by a ditcher in the Lowline Canal, approximately three miles south of Buhl and some 30 miles from the lake.

German Attempts Escape to West

BERLIN (AP)—An East German trying to escape to the West apparently was hit by gunfire from East German border guards Tuesday night. West Berlin customs officials reported. They said that East German guards fired 10 times at the West Berlin's southern Marensfeld section and screams were heard about 300 yards inside Communist territory.

Search Is Formed for Eden Man

SHOSHONE—A search continued Wednesday afternoon, both from the air and on the ground, for Irving McDonald, about 50, Eden farmer and civic leader, who disappeared Tuesday while fishing in the Big Wood River below Magic Reservoir. Sheriffs officers from both Blaine and Lincoln counties, the Jerome sheriff's posse and Fish and Game Department personnel as well as volunteers with boats, were pressed into service Wednesday morning. Many Eden residents also are participating in the search. McDonald, who is well known throughout Magic Valley for his skill as a magician, left home for Magic Reservoir about noon Tuesday with Austin Matheny, Glenn Reed and Arnold Schauerman, all Eden. The men had agreed to meet at the car at 8 p.m. and when McDonald did not return his companions started to look for him. They continued searching into the night and at 3 a.m. Wednesday Legionnaires at Eden were contacted to organize a party at daybreak. A team of divers was expected Wednesday afternoon from the Mountain-Home Air-Force Base. Leon Grieve, manager of the Big Wood Canal Co., said equipment is being taken to the Magic Reservoir in preparation for shutting the reservoir gates Thursday to lower the water in the river. It was at first thought McDonald might have returned home with someone else, or perhaps stayed to fish by moonlight, according to Lincoln county sheriff's officers. State Patrolman Ronald Eggleston was called Tuesday night, but the full-scale search effort got under way early Wednesday morning. McDonald was seen last walking across the railroad bridge which crosses Big Wood River below Magic Reservoir. He is past district and commander of the Eden American Legion Post and currently is adjutant of Eden-Post No. 82. He belongs to the Twin Falls Elks Lodge, Eden Presbyterian Church and the Masonic Lodge.

Electronic Eye Locks On Mars

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Mariner 4's electronic eye has locked on Mars and aimed its camera to take later today historic pictures that could show whether life exists on the earth-like planet.

The pldorning action was the second communications success of this, the climactic day in the tiny spacecraft's nine-month flight to the mystery planet.

At 7:28 a.m. PDT scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory sent a signal across 134 million miles of space ordering warm-up of Mariner's instruments. Twenty-four minutes later an answer flashed back, signaling that Mariner was obeying.

At 5:20 p.m., if all goes well, the 575-pound craft will start making up to 21 photographs as it flies within 6,000 miles of the Martian surface. Thursday it is supposed to send the photos back to earth — perhaps shedding light on the ancient question of whether the mystery planet has life.

The warmup signal was sent with Mariner only 107,000 miles from Mars and traveling 9,970 miles per hour with relation to the planet. Its speed will increase to 11,000 m.p.h. by the time it flies by.

The earth command, first sent last Feb. 12, was transmitted from a tracking station at Johannesburg, South Africa. It started a light-sensitive scanner looking for the bright disk of Mars.

And shock as well as sorrow was evident in Congress. Johnson was notified of Stevenson's death by Secretary of State Dean Rusk who had received word by telephone from the U.S. Embassy in London.

Both the President and Rusk were at the White House for a luncheon honoring members of the joint United States-Japan committee on trade and economic affairs.

The President delivered a brief eulogy for Stevenson then asked his guests to stand for a silent tribute.

Rusk also relayed the word to congressional leaders. The death was announced to the House by Rep. Carl Albert, D-Okl.

Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., announced the death to the Senate, calling it "a great loss to the world and to the nation. Stevenson was a former governor of Illinois and longtime close friend of Douglas."

At the same time, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara was quoted as urging key members of Congress to delay such action until he completes estimates. He met with the Congress members at a breakfast conference.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., acting-chairman of the appropriations subcommittee now considering the defense money bill, told a public session that the time "for action is now."

Supporting him, Sen. A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., said Congress should add "one or two billion dollars" immediately to meet mounting-Viet Nam costs.

Several other senators backed the Stennis call upon McNamara for details now on added funds needed to support the mounting Viet Nam offensive and at the same time maintain strategic and reserve defense supplies.

Stevenson's Death Shock To Johnson

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, near tears over the death of Adlai E. Stevenson, said today that "America has lost its most eloquent spirit, its finest voice. The world of freedom and human dignity has lost its most articulate champion."

The President ordered the flags of the United States flown at half staff at all government buildings and installations and on naval ships, at home and abroad until after Stevenson's funeral.

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Adlai Stevenson Collapses, Dies on Visit to London

LONDON (AP) Adlai E. Stevenson died today, apparently of a heart attack. He was 65. The U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, twice Democratic candidate for president, collapsed outside the U.S. Embassy in Grosvenor Square. He was taken to St. George Hospital where he was pronounced dead. Stevenson was on a short visit to London and had just left the embassy when he was stricken. Earlier today Stevenson had conferred with Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart at the Foreign Office. On Sunday he lunched with Prime Minister Harold Wilson at Chequers, the country home of British prime ministers.

He had arrived here from Paris on Sunday and had been expected to return to the United States this weekend. During his trip to Europe Stevenson also attended the meeting of the U.S. Economic and Social Council.

The man who was the Democratic Presidential candidate in 1952 and 1956 did not appear to have been in poor health.

Monday night he was interviewed on British Broadcasting Corp. television about U.S. policy in Viet Nam. To viewers, he seemed his usual self-possessed articulate self.

He collapsed on a mild, sunny day, with the temperature in the 70s.

The embassy spokesman said Stevenson apparently died in the street and was certified dead on arrival at St. George's Hospital, about half a mile away at Hyde Park Corner.

He was walking with Mrs. Ronald Tree, who holds the rank of ambassador as U.S. representative on the U.N. Trusteeship Council. When he fell she got down on hands and knees and tried to revive him with mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

Neither the hospital nor the embassy could say immediately whether Stevenson had been the victim of a stroke or a heart attack. Shortly before, he had made a radio recording in the embassy and officials there said he seemed perfectly well.

His death occurred about 5:15 p.m. (11:15 a.m. EST). Stevenson, 65, former Governor of Illinois, was a frequent visitor to London and had numerous friends here.

He had gone direct to Geneva from the U. N. 20th anniversary observance in San Francisco.

He had consulted privately with Secretary-General U Thant in Geneva on the Viet Nam crisis.

Stevenson was engaged in a busy round of appointments when stricken. He was taken to St. George's Hospital at Hyde Park corner across from the garden of Buckingham Palace in the heart of the city.

Nora also won the district contest in 1964 in Salt Lake City and went to the national finals in Dallas, Tex., where he exceeded the time limit and was disqualified, although the judges unanimously voted for him. The district in which Nora competed includes Idaho and Utah.

The Twin Falls Kiwanis Club helped sponsor Nora's visit to New York City for the contest finals. The Key Club, a high school organization, is sponsored by Kiwanis International.

Mrs. Nora said Tuesday evening that when her son won the district title in 1964 she believed it was the first time a Twin Falls youth had received the award. Nora has also won superior ratings at both regional and district declamation contests in the past two years.

Nora, a 1965 graduate of Twin Falls High School, plans to attend Idaho State University at Pocatello this fall, where he will major in dramatics.

U. S. Bombers Penetrate Viet Nam

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. fighter-bombers made their deepest penetration of North Viet Nam today by attacking two trucks 37 miles north-northeast of Dien Bien Phu, a U. S. spokesman announced. The point appeared to be about an equal distance south of Red China's frontier.

The spokesman said four U.S. Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs heavily damaged the two trucks during a reconnaissance mission. The raid was one of a series staged by more than 70 U.S. and South Vietnamese planes, largely against barracks, staging areas and military depots.

Dien Bien Phu is 210 miles north-northwest of Hanoi. Ground and air action raged in the area of Da Nang, the air base center 380 miles northeast of Saigon. More than 150 planes attacked a suspected Viet Cong headquarters. Red guerillas overran a government outpost, killing 26 defenders.

SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY
High pressure at the surface is located over the Northern Great Plains States and the Northern Rockies and extends westward into the Intermountain Region. The southwest desert heat low extends northward into the Pacific Northwest and is bringing a continued rise in temperatures to the Northwestern States. Daytime temperatures yesterday in the valleys of Southern Idaho were from 6 to 14 degrees higher and further warming is in prospect today and Thursday.

Clear skies over Southern Idaho will continue as the air mass now over our valleys is quite dry. However, an increase in moisture in lower layers of the upper air over Utah could cause an increase in afternoon clouds over the southern hills of Idaho this afternoon and again Thursday afternoon.

Maximum temperatures today will range from the mid 80s to low 90s. Minimum temperatures tonight will be in the 40s to low 60s as warming at night continues.

FIVE-DAY FORECAST
High pressure both at the surface and aloft will persist over the Intermountain Region and Rocky Mountain States through much of the next five days. Sunny days and warmer weather will dominate the valleys of Southern Idaho with the possibility of some of the highest temperatures so far this summer being recorded during the next five days.

Temperatures over the valleys of Southern Idaho will average near normal Thursday through Monday with a warming trend in temperatures into the end of the week and only small day to day changes thereafter. Nighttime temperatures as well will move upward making ideal conditions for growth of warmer season crops. Some normal maximum and minimum temperatures are, Gooding, 83-59, Twin Falls, 83-53, and Burley, 91-53.

Precipitation is not expected in valley areas of Southern Idaho through Monday. Some influx of moisture working up from the south may produce some clouds over the southern mountains, but any isolated thundershowers brought on from this increase in moisture will remain in the mountains.

Sunshine will average greater than 80 per cent of possible through Monday with most days being sunny and warm. Winds will be light, making this period ideal for spraying and dusting operations. Soil temperatures at the three- and four-inch depth will rise into the upper 70s and 80s nearing the peak of their normal upward trend.

Continued dry weather will necessitate a strict irrigation schedule with a good deal of the time being spent in this activity. Haying will have good weather to make progress and many dry-land areas will be moving into the final stages during this period. Warmer weather will promote ripening of winter wheat and growth and development of sweet corn and beans. Application of irrigation water during the cooler hours to prevent scorching of crops such as peas may be necessary as daytime temperatures mount into the 90s.

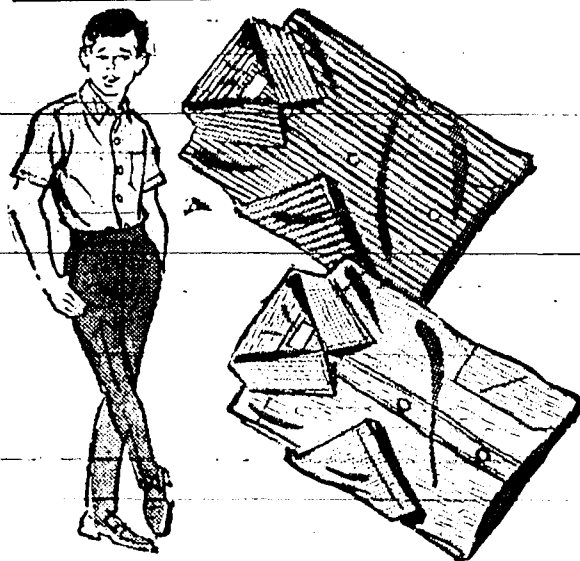

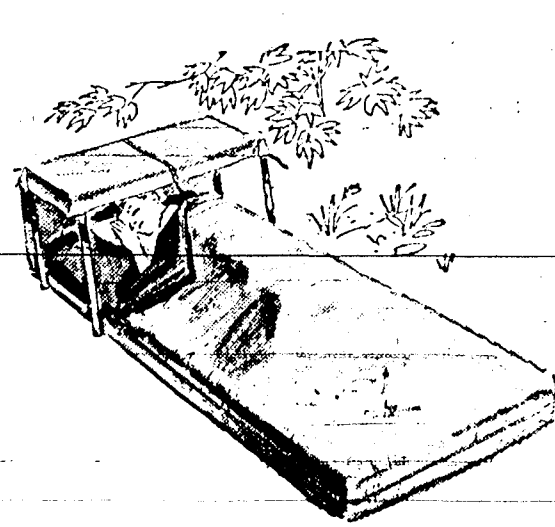

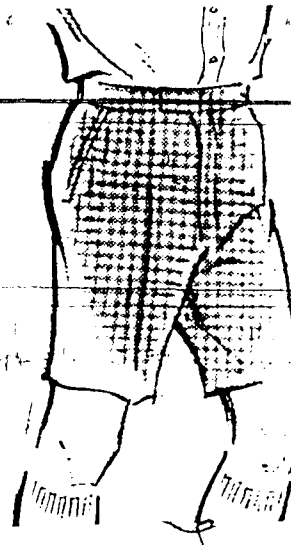

Time Runs Out

Twin Falls is fast approaching the time when the city must do something about Joslin Field if normal air traffic is to continue at the municipal airport. West Coast Airlines is scheduled to start taking delivery on new jet planes next year and the city was notified many months ago that present runways are not long enough to accommodate the jet liners. But that's only part of the problem because navigational aids at Joslin Field are practically non-existent. The city desperately needs an installation of the Federal Aviation Agency with trained personnel and adequate instrumentation to operate the airport and eliminate conditions that could be a hazard under the present setup.

Citizens might just as well face up to both problems at the same time. The value of longer runways would be reduced without proper navigational and operational devices and suitable instrumentation is of little use without the longer runways. Both are needed and the need is going to become more acute with each passing day.

Twin Falls cannot afford to mark time on airport improvements. Railroad passenger service just doesn't exist, to all intents and purposes. Twin Falls, which has been located at the intersection of two U.S. highways—30 and 93—is watching as that favorable position is eliminated. With completion of the Interstate system through this area, Twin Falls won't have east-west highway travel any more. If the city fails to meet minimum requirements for Joslin Field, Twin Falls will be removed from the airline maps, too. The city just can't afford to have that happen.

Everyone should resolve right now that the municipal airport will be improved to meet whatever requirements are necessary. Moreover, instead of striving to meet bare minimums, the city should set ambitious goals involving continuous expansion and improvement of Joslin Field. Many times, the local airport is operational while most other fields in the region are wrapped in fog or hidden below heavy banks of low clouds. Joslin Field should be built to the point where it can capitalize on this favorable condition.

But even if no expansion was contemplated, it's way past time to start screaming for navigational aids here. Traffic density has grown to the point where serious consideration must be given to construction of an air control tower. In addition, Twin Falls should have an FAA installation here to operate whatever instruments will be required for traffic control and to assist pilots in landing and taking off. The longer the FAA delays in starting a suitable installation manned by qualified, trained personnel, the greater chance there will be for an air tragedy. The FAA, dedicated to air safety, would not want to be blamed for being negligent in case of some air accident here.

It's no problem to demonstrate clearly that great concern is indicated for air safety at Joslin Field. At present, West Coast schedules seven flights daily into Twin Falls. That means seven landings and seven takeoffs of West Coast planes every day in addition to all the chartered flights, special airline service, private planes and such commercial planes as crop dusters. That all adds up to a whole lot of activity for a field that doesn't even have a control tower.

Twin Falls officials must meet the challenge of airport improvements. There should be no hesitation to lengthen runways or even to abandon the present field and construct an entirely new airport in a different location, if that's what is indicated. Likewise, there should be no further hesitation about pressing for suitable safety and operational devices. The Federal Aviation Agency should be advised immediately that any further delay on such an installation could be tragic.

HOODED HOODLUMS

Alabama Attorney General Richmond Flowers declares that fear of and sympathy for the Ku Klux Klan hampers his investigation of the organization. It's a sad state of affairs.

Perhaps Attorney General Flowers can explain why there's any need to "investigate" the Klan. By this time everyone is well aware of the Klan, its methods and what it stands for. The time for investigation is past. Now Alabama should be working on exposure and perhaps elimination.

The Klan is nothing more or less than a bunch of hooded hoodlums and no American should have either fear of or sympathy for such an organization. Attorney General Flowers has the authority and means of eliminating both fear and sympathy if he were to choose to do so.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

FENWICK ISLAND, Del.—This beach resort has been lucky so far. Nobody has been murdered or maimed for life by any gang of teen-agers, and no houses have been burned down in the spirit of good, clean, black-jacketed fun.

I say we have been lucky hereabouts because luck seems to be the only protection against that segment of slack-jawed American youth which is terrorizing much of the rest of the country. Every Monday morning, the newspapers devote a valuable white space to the guerrilla warfare waged by these cretinous punks over the previous weekend, and only a brave man armed with a submachinegun would take a moonlight stroll along certain beaches.

IF A RIOT, IT WAS MILD—It is a commentary on the situation that the poor cops by now have come to think of these senseless outbreaks as a way of life. Naturally, the social workers and other fringe-type psychiatrists have bravely tackled the crisis and have come up with their usual perceptive findings. It seems these kids are all underprivileged. Some are underprivileged because they have been deprived of the good things of life, and the rest are underprivileged because they have enjoyed all the good things of life.

SHOOTING FOR A SUSPECT—This must be a great consolation for that Los Angeles police lieutenant, whose daughter was raped by a hord of Hell's Angels, the trouble-making motorcycle club, and reduced to a gibbering lunatic. Presumably, it wouldn't have happened if some nice girl had recognized her duty to society and offered herself—to those bums. The lieutenant, not being a childless social worker, reacted by shooting in those bad—but safe—days when people didn't understand kids.

By now I suppose it is too late to apply parental discipline in most of those cases, because these kids have discovered what fun it is to beat up the citizenry and overturn automobiles. But if I could be a judge for one sweet day, I would sentence the lot to public spankings administered by their parents and then levy enough fines to pay for the damage inflicted.

As for police departments which can't handle kids, I have one simple suggestion. They should turn the job over to those traffic squad types who are so brave when handing out parking tickets.

THE WORD IS 'EXPLORATION'

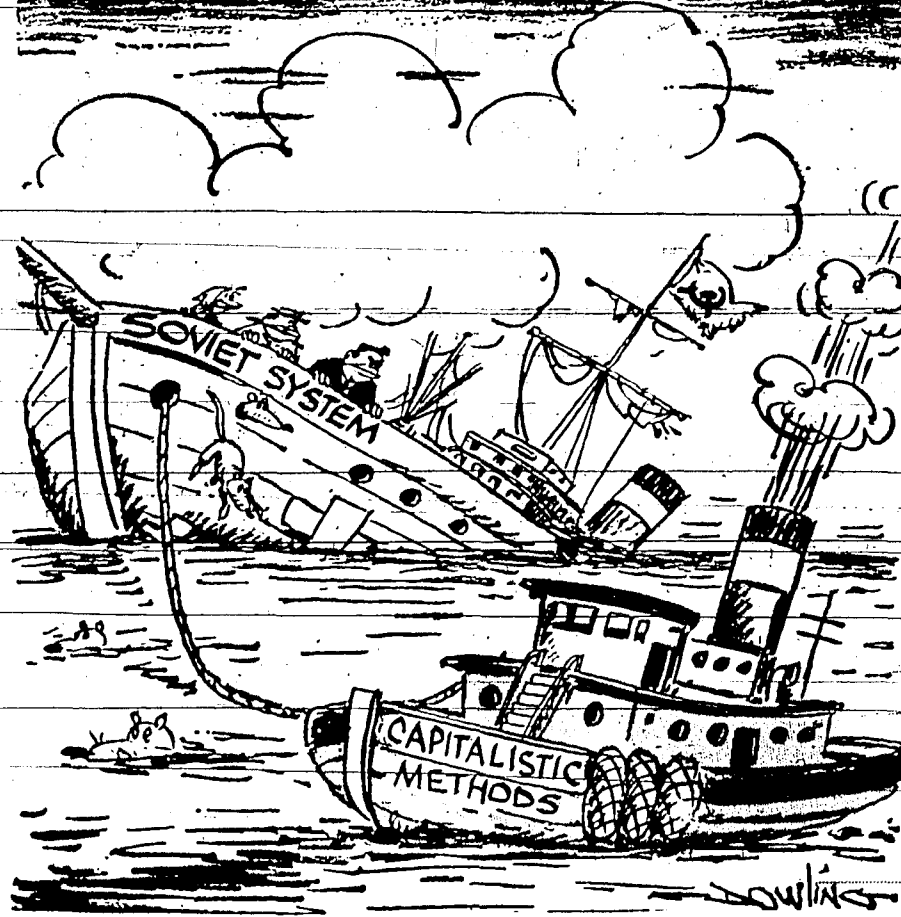

Religion In America

One of the greatest things Protestants and Catholics have in common is the Bible.

But its potential as a bond of unity was seriously diminished in the past by the existence of Protestant and Catholic Bibles.

In English-speaking countries, the Protestant Bible was usually the King James version.

translated in 1611. The Catholic Bible was the Douay translation, which dates back to 1582. They differed so greatly that a person accustomed to one version might hardly recognize a familiar verse of scripture when he came across it in the other translation.

In recent years, Biblical scholars of both faiths have been working hard on new translations, based on older manuscripts, better understanding of ancient languages and other fruits of modern scholarship.

As they worked separately toward the same goal of the most accurate possible translation, Catholic and Protestant scholars found themselves increasingly in agreement. It became possible to dream of a day when there would be a single "common Bible" for all Christians.

The dream has not yet come true. But it will come near reality Thursday with the publication of a Catholic edition of the Revised Standard Version (RSV) New Testament.

The RSV is the work of American Protestant scholars. It preserves the majestic literary cadences of the King James version, while correcting its textual errors and updating its English.—It has been widely used in Protestant churches since its introduction in 1941.

Catholic scholars in Great Britain, instead of starting a new translation of their own, went over the RSV word by word. They found only a handful of places—about 20 in all—

where they felt that changes should be made to conform to Catholic understanding of the scripture.

The U.S. National Council of Churches, which holds the copyright on the RSV, willingly consented to the publication of a Catholic edition including these changes. The apostolic delegate to Great Britain, Archbishop Ignazio Cardinali, gave the Vatican's blessing to the project, and placed his own imprimatur on the new edition.

It will be published simultaneously in all English-speaking countries and is authorized for use in Catholic churches of the United States as well as those in Britain, Canada, and Australia.

The U.S. edition carries a foreword by Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston predicting that it will "do much to promote a greater bond of unity and a more fraternal climate between Protestants and Catholics."

Signs of strain between reformers and conservative Communists in the Soviet Union suggest that Khrushchev's officialdom may be in for a new round of musical chairs.

Some of the signs: —The Communist leadership apparently has decided to put off the party congress. Theoretically the congress is the ruling body for nearly 12 million party members and meets every four years. The last congress was October, 1961.

—Four high-ranking government and Communist party leaders have been missing for five or six weeks from important official gatherings. All rose to prominence under Nikita S. Khrushchev.

—The absence of these persons may be connected with the downfall earlier this year of two other Khrushchev proteges. It could mean that powerful forces have undertaken a determined campaign to rid the party leadership of "the Ukrainians" and economic reformers who came up under Khrushchev's wing.

Almost from the day of Khrushchev's fall last October, there have been hints of a clash between the two who divided his powers. Party Chief Leonid I. Brezhnev and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin. The clash seems to stem from differences on economic reforms, the effect of such reforms on party leadership and the extent of party authority, which, in conservative opinion, should dominate every aspect of Soviet life even if it interferes with production.

Conservatives—those who distrust anything suggesting lessened central authority—have been restive in recent years.

The intrusion of other factors besides the division over economics makes it difficult to single out the members of the contending camps. But it seems likely that Brezhnev, despite his position as party chief, may be in the reformer group and Kosygin may represent the conservatives.

Identities of the four missing leaders bolsters a theory that "the Ukrainians" are in difficulties not necessarily connected with production.

July 14th, Bastille Day in France, may be a moment to enjoy our thoughts of this lovely land and forget political cross-purposes.

Frenchmen, French goods, French teachers and the French language were the world's true civilizers. From the 17th Century on, from Moscow to London, no man could call himself a gentleman who did not speak French. And French traders and missionaries carried the tongue—and carried Paris—at Magdeburg, from which he tried to escape, but failed.

The Peace of Bretigny had interrupted the British King's hundred years of war against France. But England's Methuen Treaty with Portugal gave British ships the free use of Lisbon and perpetuated England's threat to France in the Mediterranean. (By creating the exchange of English cloth for Portuguese detectables it also made port the great 18th Century British wine and condemned wellborn Englishmen to the gout.)

Napoleon came, and by 1802 he faced an American problem. The central third of the present continental United States belonged to his empire. On his maps in the Tuileries he called this awesome region "New France," and he did not propose to let it go to England. Further, he needed money to fight England in Europe. He sold us New France, approximately the size of today's India, for \$15 million.

Napoleon himself describes this act in words that are heavy with an Old World flavor: "The enlargement of its territory consolidates the power of the United States for all time. Perhaps people will reproach me when in two or three centuries the Americans become too powerful for Europe, but I cannot take so distant a possibility into my calculations in advance."

Prescience? The only large country in all of Western Europe with which the United States has never been at war is France. As for the French people themselves, the viewpoints and the shades of temperament that sometimes disturb American visitors to France—these are not peculiar to the French; they are human differences and all of us in our different ways are liable to them.

The French are a proud, brave, individualistic people with a deep love for freedom and justice. And we at this distance must somehow still cling to and hold, work for and cherish, the return to close and indivisible relations with France.

Lipscomb announced that remodeling will continue on the library and principal's office at the senior high with Sam Hawkins being added to the maintenance crew to supervise the work. Additional journeyman carpenters will be hired as necessary.

Resignations were accepted from Ted Deck, night custodian at the senior high school, and Amos Raymer, custodian at the

Washington school. Mrs. Lois Silvers, third grade teacher at Appleton, asked for a release from her contract for 1965-66 so that she can accept a full year scholarship for study at the Idaho State University in the area of mentally retarded children.

The board accepted, upon the recommendation of the superintendent, an addition of a vocational business education class. An experimental program in reading and mathematics was approved, upon the recommen-

ation of the superintendent, for grades three through six at Lincoln school.

Grades three through six will be grouped according to their own potentials and will be advanced as they progress. The program will be evaluated at the end of the semester as to its value.

U.S. Sailor Pushes Wrong Tap and Oils French Beach

CANNES, France, (UPI) — A U.S. Navy task force went ashore on the Riviera Tuesday to clean up the mess caused by a sailor who accidentally jettisoned 3,000 gallons of diesel oil into the jet set's favorite swimming hole.

The black diesel oil gushed ashore along a three-mile stretch of golden beach from the western edge of Cannes to La Napoule when the sailor landed on the wrong tap Monday and sent the oil cascading into the sea.

It was carried from the air-ship carrier Shangri-La by wind-whipped waves onto the beaches of this French Riviera playground. The accident brought Franco-American relations to a new low.

Hotel keepers, cafe owners and tourists sent angry messages to the 6th Fleet commander demanding rapid mop-up operations. Capt. R. L. Werner of the Shangri-La sent his jet fire into action.

The Navy flew 2,000 pounds of clean sand across the Mediterranean to replenish the beaches, a sticky mess. A bucket and spade brigade of 200 sailors went ashore to shovel up the paper sand.

Navy helicopters and launches began dumping chemicals into the Mediterranean to send the oil to the bottom. Another plane was dispatched to Marseille with orders to bring more sand. By early evening the Navy had restored the situation to

Rules Listed For Lincoln Fair Contest

SHOSHONE — All boys and girls enrolled in 4-H club work in Lincoln County in 1965 are eligible to compete for awards in different contests at the county fair Aug. 6-7, officers report.

Record books and stories must be turned in to the county agent's office on or before Aug. 2. No exhibit will be judged unless this requirement is fulfilled.

Livestock must be in place the evening of Aug. 5 at the fairgrounds barn. Except for some special reason, exhibits must not be moved before 5:30 p.m. Aug. 7.

Club members must provide both feed and straw and arrange for the animal's care while on exhibit. Each club will be expected to clean their section of the barn.

Animals will be judged on quality of animals by division and all animals will be judged on fitting and showing by year of members in club work, first, second and third year or over.

All breeds in the same project and in the same division will be judged at the same time. Two entries for each member will be allowed to each division. Members can enter as many divisions as they desire but cannot use the same animal in two divisions.

In fat animals class, a pen of five or less will be considered as one entry. Only one pen of animals will be allowed but a member can use one animal from the pen or another animal as the other entry.

In quality of animal contest in each division, 4-H members must show his own animal but someone may show another animal.

In fitting and showing, a 4-H member must show his own animal and only one animal in each project will be allowed.

All FFA exhibits will be governed by the same rules as for the 4-H.

Miscellaneous exhibits, except crops, garden and home grounds beautification, should be entered at the fair building by 6 p.m. Aug. 4. The crops, garden and home grounds beautification should be entered by 9 a.m. Aug. 6.

Don Ward is in charge of the livestock exhibits and Edward Griggs is in charge of the FFA.

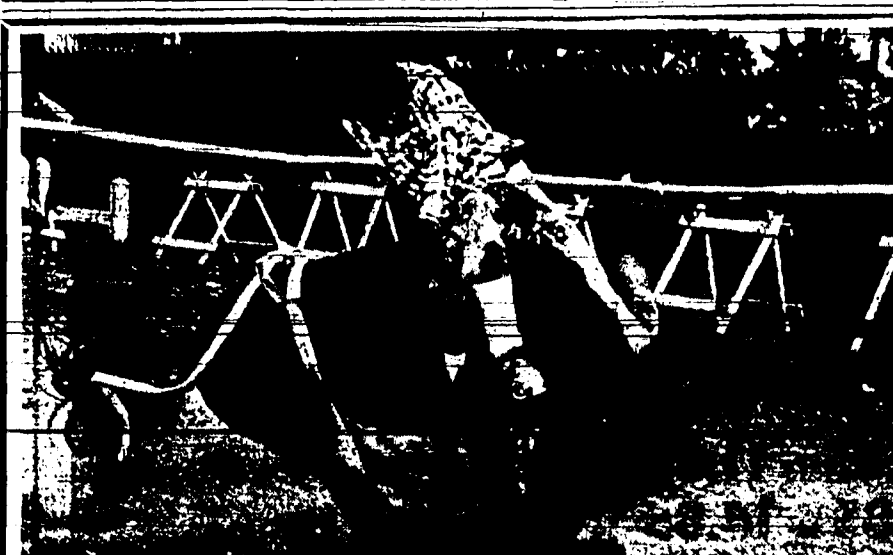

Many Vietnamese, including the Viet Cong, feel that men fight better with their women beside them, passing machine-gun ammunition belts, dressing wounds and even fighting themselves. Regional Viet Cong units often move with their women.

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Reversal in Employment Is Watched

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's top economic experts are closely watching what they view as a dramatic reversal of a five-year drop in the nation's production employment.

"It struck us as very important," said one White House source.

His comment followed a Labor Department report that the number of workers engaged in the production of goods has risen by 500,000 in the past year, boosting total manufacturing jobs to a near record of more than 18 million.

In the previous five years, said Assistant Commissioner Harold Goldstein of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, goods-producing employment had been dropping an average of 100,000 annually.

White House experts have said little about the development so far, but after viewing what one source described as "six months of solid data" they may soon cite the figures as important new evidence of the strength of the economy.

Goldstein first called attention to the figures in a routine Labor Department briefing Monday.

The Labor Department previously had been emphasizing the rapid growth in service jobs — such as finance, insurance, trade, utilities and government — while employment in the production of goods was declining.

Government economists now see evidence of a healthier balance in the economy with the recent rise in production jobs along with the continuing rise in service employment — up 1.4 million the past year.

The White House source said the production figures indicated a new surge of confidence coupled with rising consumer income. They are part of "the same phenomenon," he said. It also reflects "a big step up in investments," he added.

California Youths Attempt To Get Free Cases of Beer

JACUMBA, Calif. (AP) — Two motorcyclists roared into a train tunnel.

A few minutes later, having timed things badly, they roared back out. A few inches behind them was a train.

What was at the other end of the tunnel — and worth a confrontation with a diesel locomotive?

Beer. Thousands of cases of it — all there for the taking.

The only problem was getting it out.

Last May 5, 11 cars of a San Diego, Arizona and Eastern Railway derailed north of Jacumba, in eastern San Diego County near the Mexican border. Two truck vans loaded with beer tumbled off a flatcar into a 1,000-foot-deep Carriso Gorge.

The railroad figured the beer — 72,000 cans — was a complete loss.

Adventurous San Diego County youths figured otherwise. They heard about the beer, and headed for Carriso Gorge.

"It must be one of the most inaccessible places in the state," said a railroad official. "The only way to get there is over the railroad right-of-way, four miles in, four miles out, through two tunnels. It's all private property, of course, and there's a sheriff's deputy watching it like a hawk."

Sheriff's officer Alfred Dart has pounced, hawk-like, on 24 people. Dart seized all the beer they had risked their lives to recover. Four were prosecuted for trespassing, the other released.

Despite Dart and diesels, nearly all the beer has disappeared.

But railroaders say the big joke of Jacumba is in the beer drinking.

One railroad official explained: "The beer was in refrigerated vans. Once it gets warm it tastes terrible, even if you re-refrigerate it. There wasn't a beer in that gorge worth walking across the street for."

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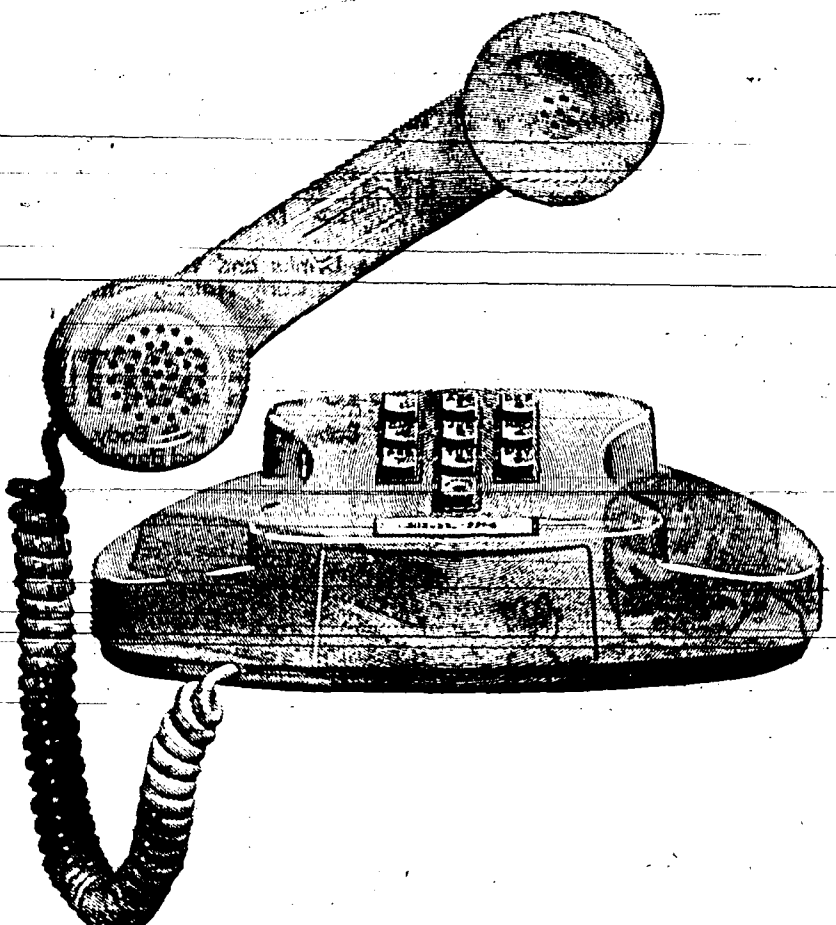
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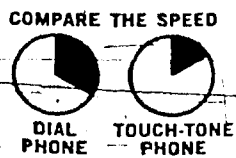

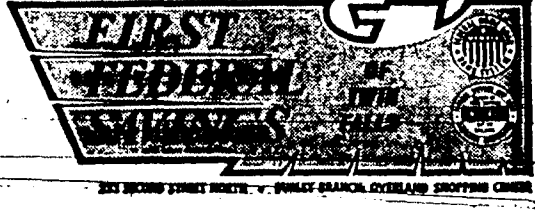

Gross National Product Rises

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Gross National Product rose to an adjusted annual rate of \$658 billion in the second quarter of this year, up \$9 billion from the first three months, the Department of Commerce reported today.

The preliminary estimate showed, however, that the April-June rise was below the \$14-billion gain registered in the first quarter. The government attributed that sharp increase to the unusual expansion of automobile production after the strike during the last three months of 1964.

The department said the April-June rise was the 17th successive increase in the Gross National Product since the recession-low in the first three months of 1961.

The college will receive \$14,000 which is matched by one-ninth of the total in local funds. The student has 10 years to pay back the loan, either after he graduates or leaves school.

The refugee, identified only as Karl O., was working with a group of farm laborers guarded by two soldiers on a field near the Communist barbed-wire fences, the police said.

He made a wild dash and dived into the drainage pipe which leads from Hungarian to Austrian territory near the town of Schuchendorf. Other guards began a search for the refugee and one of them stepped on a mine.

Savings Are Claimed by McNamara

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara claimed today his cost reduction program saved \$4.6 billion in the last fiscal year—more than double the \$2.1 billion saving he forecast a year ago.

McNamara said the program is going so well that savings of \$6.1 billion a year by fiscal 1969 and each year after that "have been set as our new long range goal."

McNamara stressed that "these savings are being accomplished without any adverse effect on our military strength and combat readiness."

His third annual progress report on his cost reduction program was prepared for a news conference.

McNamara said the program has three parts: "buying only what we need to achieve balanced readiness," "buying at the lowest sound price" and "reducing operating costs through termination of unnecessary operations, standardization and consolidation."

Among other things, McNamara said that his controversial base-closing program realized \$483 million in savings in the 1965 fiscal year.

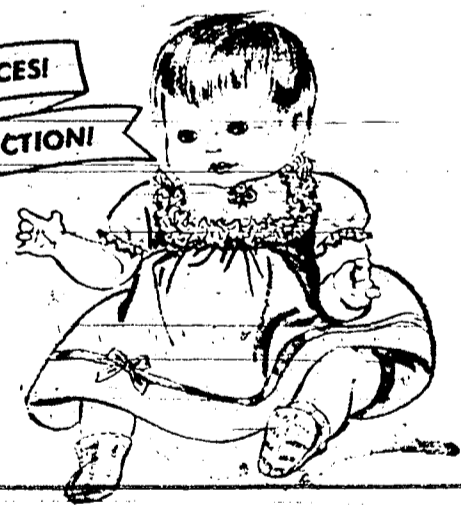

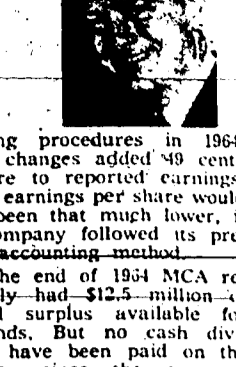

Santo's Scratch Single Lets NL Take All-Star Game by 6-5

MINNEAPOLIS-ST. PAUL (AP)—Ron Santo's scratch single in the seventh inning gave the National League a 6-5 victory over the American League Tuesday in an All-Star game slugfest dominated by five home runs. The National League, climaxing a long uphill struggle in which they once trailed 12 games to 4, finally took the series 1-4 for the first time, 18-17-1. Home runs by Willie Mays of San Francisco, Joe Torre of Milwaukee and Willie Stargell of Pittsburgh built up a 5-0 National League lead in the first two innings, stunning a sellout crowd of 46,706 at Metropolitan Stadium's first All-Star game.

But the underdog American League clawed back with one run in the fourth and tied the score in the fifth on a pair of booming two-run homers by Dick McAuliffe of Detroit and Harmon Killebrew, the home town hero of the league-leading Twins.

The Americans took it right down to the wire and threw a scare into the Nationals when Tony Oliva of the Twins opened the ninth with a double off Bob Gibson of St. Louis. However, Max Alvis of Cleveland popped up trying to bunt. Gibson, the World Series hero last fall, then struck out Killebrew and pinch hitter Joe Pepitone of the New York Yankees.

Mays, the Giants' center fielder, opened the game with a 398-foot home run and scored the winning run in the seventh after drawing his second walk.

Willie led off the seventh by working McDowell for a walk on a 3-2 pitch. Hank Aaron of Milwaukee singled to center, moving Mays to third. When Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh forced Aaron at second, Mays held third base.

But Willie was off and running with the big run of the hot, humid afternoon when Santo, the Chicago Cubs' third baseman, beat out a high bouncing single. Santo's hit hopped past Bobby Richardson of the Yanks and finally was taken back of second by Zoilo Versalles of the Twins. Santo beat Versalles' throw to first while Mays scored.

Sandy Koufax, the Los Angeles Dodgers' ace lefty, was credited with the decision over Sam McDowell of the Cleveland Indians.

But it was Juan Marichal of the Giants who really turned in the glittering pitching job. The high-kicking right-hander, who carried the game factor only nine men in the first three innings and allowed only one hit—bouncing single through the box by Vic Davallio of Cleveland leading off the third.

Mays slammed the second pitch by starter Milt Pappas of Baltimore into the lower-section of the new left-field pavilion seats. It was his third home run in All-Star play and the hit, his 21st, set an All-Star record. He had been tied with Stan Musial, the retired St. Louis Cardinal. This run and his winner in the seventh also boosted Willie's record total to 18 runs in 16 All-Star games.

Pappas, the fiery Oriole right-hander, steadied a bit and retired Aaron, but Stargell lashed a single to center. After Rich Allen of the Phillies popped up, Torre hit a 2-2 pitch into the left-field pavilion for two more runs.

It was Stargell's turn in the second. Jim (Mudcat) Grant of the Twins had taken over for the Americans after Pappas' d is a s t r o u s first. Stargell slammed a long home run into the bullpen in center field, scoring Marichal who had opened the inning with a single to center.

The 5-0 lead promised to become a rout. Press box Figure Filberts began thumbing through the record books trying to find the biggest score in history.

McAuliffe, a pesky hitter for the Americans all afternoon, opened the fourth with a single off big Jim Maloney of the Cincinnati Reds, who was destined to give up all five American runs. After a walk to Killebrew, Rocky Colavito of Cleveland singled to center, scoring McAuliffe.

It looked like a quiet fifth when the first two batters went down quickly. Then pinch hitter Jimmie Hall of the Twins walked on a 3-2 pitch and McAuliffe powered a long homer over the center-field wall. Mays went back as deep as he could and then tried to climb the fence, but the ball sailed into the bullpen.

Brooks Robinson of Baltimore beat out an infield single off Santo's glove. Then came Harmon Killebrew of the Minnesota. The Killebrew almost struck out but catcher Torre failed to hold a foul tip on the third strike. Given one more chance, Killebrew drove the ball deep into the stands in left field over 400 feet from the plate. Robinson and Killebrew trotted home with the tying runs.

Giles Congratulates Mauch; Players Happy After 6-5 Win

MINNEAPOLIS-ST. PAUL (AP)—National League President Warren Giles walked up to Manager Gene Mauch, pumped his hand and said quietly, with apparent emotion: "You played to win and did it." In another corner of the dressing room after the National League's 6-5 victory in Tuesday's All-Star game gave them the over-all lead in the series for the first time, Sandy Koufax was telling pitcher Bob Gibson he ought to be thinking about changing his profession. "Why don't you quit starting," quipped Koufax. "There's a heck of a future in relieving for you."

And so it went with Mauch, the manager who said he was going to play to win, and Gibson, the World Series hero and lone member of the world champion St. Louis Cardinals to make the team, surrounded by reporters and teammates.

"We played it to win, if we could," said Mauch. "If they (his players) hadn't won it the way they did, they would have thought of another way."

Asked if he had given any thought to walking Harmon Killebrew with the potential tying run on second and one out in the ninth, Mauch said sharply, "No."

Could Mauch elaborate? "Bob Gibson thinks he can get anybody in the world and I do too."

Gibson explained how he struck out Joe Pepitone for the final out.

"The first two sliders were up and in," he said. "They aren't going to do a darn thing with it if it goes in there. If it doesn't get in there, that's a different story. The last pitch was a fast ball."

"That was in there."

In another corner of the dressing room, Willie Mays talked to his usual entourage.

Mays, who ran into a gate in center field chasing Dick McAuliffe's homer in the fifth inning, said he hit the right side, he bruised in a game at Philadelphia last Saturday.

"I jarred it, and it hurt," Mays admitted. "I could feel it. But the game's over. It's all right now."

Mays said Mauch apparently was concerned earlier about the injury because he had asked in the fourth inning if Willie wanted to continue.

"I told him sure," said Mays. "I felt okay. I didn't have any hard chances."

Juan Marichal, who pitched the first three innings for the National League said, "I was pitching to corners and spots. I had good control and bore down because I knew I didn't have to go nine."

On the other hand, Koufax admitted having difficulty. "All my pitches were up."
