

## Senate Approves Health Care Bill; Awaits Signature

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to President Johnson today the Social Security-health care bill establishing broad health protection as a matter of right for all Americans over 65. The Senate passage, by a vote of 69 to 24, completed congressional action on the measure. Its final passage climaxes a fight that began in 1935, with the writing of the original law, to include health care for the elderly benefits under Social Security. The House passed Tuesday, 307 to 116, the compromise version of legislation embodying the greatest single expansion of Social Security ever voted.

### Action on Voting Bill Bugged Down

WASHINGTON (AP)—Efforts of Senate-House conferees to reach agreement on a voting rights bill and hasten final congressional action have bogged down in dispute over two key issues.

"The next move is up to the House," Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said, after reporting House conferees had balked at what he called "a very acceptable compromise" between the versions of the bill passed by the Senate and House.

No date for another meeting of the conference committee was set after a fifth session Tuesday broke up in disagreement.

Sanders, Georgia Democrat, to support the President's position, immediately after Johnson's televised report to the nation on decisions he has made in regard to Viet Nam.

Johnson told a news conference: 1. The monthly draft call will jump from 17,000 to 35,000. 2. U.S. military forces in South Viet Nam will increase from 75,000 to 125,000.

## Utah Missile Site Nears Completion

**HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (AP)**—A multi-million dollar missile test complex here is 60 per cent complete and expected to begin operations this winter.

Gen. T. Alan Bennett, Ogden Air Materiel Area commander, said the complex, being constructed by Okland Construction Co. of Salt Lake City, will test Minuteman missiles.

It will house an instrumented launch silo and launch control center, the general said. However, he said there will be no firings of any kind in the complex.

The 80-foot deep silo will be fitted with an 80-ton lid and will be almost identical to a launch facility at an actual site.

The tests will isolate and correct any engineering deficiencies that might appear during the life of the Minuteman weapon system.

# Schedule Readied for Gooding County Fair

**GOODING**—Plans for the Gooding County Fair and Rodeo are progressing, with a full schedule for each of the three days.

The first event will be the 4-H home economics demonstration contest, to be held Aug. 4 at the Gooding High School home economics room. This is the first time this contest will be held ahead of the fair, but Mrs. Ruth Shane, home agent, says the girls will have better facilities for demonstrations. The contest will begin at 9 a.m.

On Aug. 10 all 4-H clothing, food preservation and miscellaneous projects, except gardening exhibits, are to be entered from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. These exhibits will be judged starting at 1 p.m. Women's open class division exhibits will be accepted from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Aug. 10.

Starting at 9 a.m. Aug. 11, all women's division exhibits are to be entered and judged. All food exhibits are to be in, including divisions 1 through 5 and outdoor cookery. Starting at 10 a.m. all 4-H homemaking exhibits will be judged, and judging of farm produce and booths will get under way at 1 p.m. The 4-H style revue will be held at 8 p.m. at the grade school auditorium.

All 4-H livestock is to be in at 9 a.m.

**Boycott of Europe's Common  
Market Concerns U.S., World**

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle's boycott of meetings of the European Common Market is slowing down developments of deep concern to the United States and the rest of the world, including the Kennedy Round of tariff talks.

De Gaulle is unfriendly to most of these developments.

The other five members of the Common Market are discussing a proposal designed to end his boycott. The plan would settle the financing of farm subsidies in the six-nation area for the next five years, which De Gaulle wants. It would postpone putting the money under control of the European Parliament, which he opposes.

It may be months before the French president can be persuaded to send his delegates back to major Common Market meetings.

Experts working on the Kennedy Round at Geneva have gone on an extended vacation. They would have taken some time off anyhow. But there is no chance now that the Common Market delegates can present their proposals on trade in important farm products that had been expected in mid-September.

The delegates can go on talking about tariffs on industrial products and about an international grain agreement. But the French representative is no longer sitting on the committee that supervises them.

The French government has been one of the countries that was least enthusiastic for the Kennedy Round aim — to cut tariffs on industrial goods as much as 50 per cent.

The French are very much interested, though, in coming to a world agreement on the grain trade.

With the future of the Common Market itself uncertain, little can be done about improving its contacts with Britain and other members of the European Free Trade Association.

Mrs. Osterman rushed down to a rowboat but its oars were gone. She took the tow line between her teeth and swam out to the motor boat. Mrs. Osterman helped the eight into the rowboat, which was paddled ashore by hand.

"I never felt tired," said Mrs. Osterman.

American Is  
In Captivity**

SAIGON (AP) — An unconfirmed report reached Saigon today that Donald Dawson, the American sailor who came to Viet Nam to trace his missing brother, was seen in Viet Cong captivity early this month.

Dawson, 25, of Astoria, Calif., came to Viet Nam in January after his older brother, Lt. Daniel Dawson, a U.S. Army pilot, was shot down in the jungle in November.

Dawson spent several dangerous months trying to trace his brother. Then, finally believing that he was dead, he determined to find the body.

He decided to go into the Viet Cong-controlled D Zone north of Saigon to meet guerrilla leaders who were reported to have said they would take him to his brother's grave.

The Viet Cong demanded that Dawson bring his own interpreter. Collette Emberger, 21, a Vietnamese citizen, agreed to accompany him.

A source close to the Emberger family said today the family had received a report in the past few days that the two were seen being taken through a village in D Zone early in July.

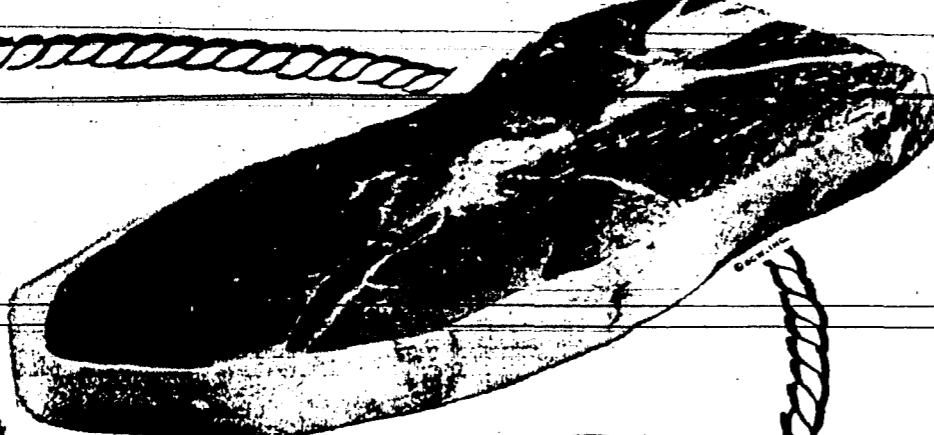

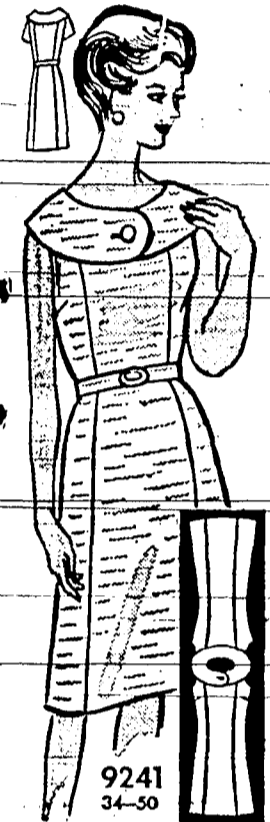

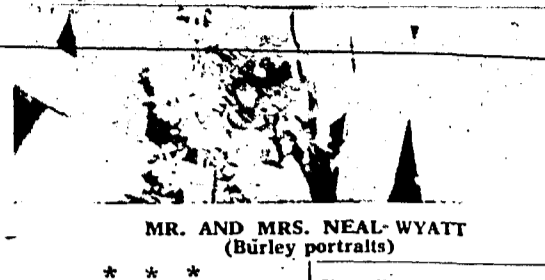

### West Berlin Airport Said To Be Menace

BERLIN (AP) — The East German regime claims that Tempelhof Airport in the heart of West Berlin is a menace to persons living around the field, a key terminal in the 1948-49 airlift.

The Communists contend that the main runway is only about 5,300 feet long and that, because of the houses crowding around it, "the landing angle is unfavorable."

About 40,000 persons live around Tempelhof, about two miles from the Communist wall dividing the city. In the 17 years since the Allied airlift to the Communist-encircled city there has been no major accident. Jet service will be introduced at the airport next spring.

The Communist complaint re-emphasized that Tempelhof is a thorn in East Germany's side. Thousands of East German refugees have been flown to the West from the airport.

The continuous drone of commercial planes that has made Tempelhof the third biggest passenger terminal in Europe is a reassuring sound to the West Berliners.

A section of the field is reserved for the U.S. Air Force and there are about 500 military flights a month.

By agreement of the Big Four World War II Allies, air traffic over Berlin is restricted to U.S., British, French and Soviet planes. The three Western Allies each have one commercial airline serving the city along three corridors linking West Berlin with the Federal Republic of Germany.

The East Germans claim the space over the city is theirs. Recently helicopters with East German markings flew along the city's east-west dividing line, crossing it in some cases.

# Anniversary of New York City Air Disaster Is Recalled

**By JEAN HELLER**  
NEW YORK (AP) — It was just before 10 a.m. exactly 2 years ago that an Army B2 bomber, groping its way through a fog, smashed into the 7th floor of the Empire State Building in one of New York City's strangest air disasters. It left 14 persons dead: three were the crew of the aircraft and 11 were in an office in the 1,02-foot tower, the world's tallest building.

The death toll might have been much higher except for the fact that the crash occurred on a Saturday when most of the building was unoccupied. There were only 1,500 in the building at the time compared to the usual 15,000.

But those who lived through it may never forget: The explosions as the plane sheared through the stone exterior of the 102-story building;

the flaming gasoline spreading through offices and corridors; down elevator shafts and the outside of the building; the screams of those trapped by fire and debris; the skyscraper swaying like a tree in a gale.

One of those who remember is Miss Catherine O'Connor, 57, who was in the headquarters of the War Relief Services, the 79th floor office that bore the brunt of the inferno where the 11 civilians either died or were fatally injured.

"There were 17 of us in the office," Miss O'Connor recalled. "Suddenly something hit the building. We had no idea what it was. The building shook violently, and five or six seconds later there was an explosion that consumed about three-fourths of the office. From the floor to the ceiling there was nothing but a sheet of orange flame.

"Ten people died instantly.

Another person, Joseph Fountain, was right in the middle of the explosion. We could see him behind the fire.

"I called to him, 'Come on, Joe!' and he walked out of the fire just like Superman, but he was burned over 60 per cent of his body. There was nothing we could do for him." Fountain died on Tuesday.

The six eventual survivors and Fountain took refuge in another office. Miss O'Connor said, and within minutes "all the smoke got black and poured through the transom into our office."

"We got a south window open," she added, "and arranged ourselves in two layers trying to breathe.

"But there was no panic and no one got terribly excited.

"We were in that office for an hour. We were completely surrounded by fire. I'm sure hell

could never be any hotter than that room was."

She continued: "We couldn't figure out why no one came for us. I found out later that the fire chief didn't think anyone could have survived and wouldn't let his men near our office out of fear for their safety.

"But I heard glass breaking and saw a man in a window not far from us stick his head out. I called out to him, 'Where are the firemen?' He told me they were all around. And I said to tell them that there were seven people trapped in our office, one of them badly hurt.

"Then a fire lieutenant volunteered to come in and burst through with his men playing

hoses on him. Later he got a medal for bravery."

Miss O'Connor was in and out of hospitals for four years after the crash. Her burns were minor, but she suffered severe smoke poisoning.

# Romania Keeps Communist Theory Without Kremlin Control

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP)—Romania is scoring points in its policy of maintaining a national communism free of Kremlin control. When Leonid I. Brezhnev, the Soviet party chief, endorsed the policy before the Romanian party congress, he formally put an end to Soviet efforts to make Romania toe the Moscow line. The action left the impression that such countries as Poland, Hungary and Bulgaria also might break loose and get away with it. The Soviet endorsement was a personal triumph for Romanian party leader Nicolae Ceausescu, 47, a Communist intellectual. He was the right-hand man of former president and party leader Gheorghe Gheorgiu-Dej. When Gheorgiu-Dej died last March, Ceausescu took his place at the head of the party. Under his guidance, Romania is following in the path of Marshal Tito's Yugoslavia without leaving the Soviet bloc or abandoning the ruthless application of Communist theory. The Communist party statutes and the national constitution have been amended to stress Romania's sovereignty and independence. All reference to the "guiding role" of the Soviet party organization has been removed and the party organization has been remodeled on the Yugoslav pattern. Compulsory military service has been cut from two years to 16 months. The army command has been purged of its Moscow-trained leadership. A relatively young and hitherto inconspicuous officer, Gen. Ion Gheorghe, was promoted over the heads of

higher-ranking men to chief of staff and deputy defense minister. Gheorghe is close to Ceausescu. Unlike some of his colleagues, he resisted when Moscow proposed integration of the military commands of the Warsaw Pact nations. Unlike Yugoslavia, Romania remains a member of the Warsaw Pact, the Communist coun-

terpart of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. But no longer can the Russians count on the Romanian army in all circumstances. The constitution says Romania will go to war alongside its Warsaw Pact allies only when "a situation has arisen for which an obligation to declare a state of war has been laid down."

## Astronauts En Route to Planets May Stop for Gas

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Within 15 years or so, astronauts headed outward for the planets Mars or Venus may stop by orbiting "service stations" to gas up for the long trip, a U.S. space engineer suggested today. L. L. Morgan, staff engineer for Lockheed Missiles and Space Co., Sunnyvale, Calif., said space-going tankers carrying huge quantities of rocket fuel "may be a requirement of future interplanetary missions." Morgan put his idea before more than 5,000 U.S. scientists and engineers at today's second session of the four-day annual meeting of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA). Earlier, the group was told that in the race to shoot heavy-weight satellites into earth orbit, the United States can still do better than the Soviet Union by at least 100 pounds. Morgan said orbiting tankers, or service stations, filled with propellants such as liquid oxygen, hydrogen and high-grade kerosene "appears to be a feasible method of operation." Under this arrangement, astronauts could use their initial fuel supply simply to get into orbit. There, they would gas up again for the hop across interplanetary space. The technique
