Ford Refuses to Debate Charges From President

WASHINGTON (AP)—House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan said today he would not "be baited into a verbal donnybrook" with President Johnson over the latter's accusation of violation of a confidence. To do so, Ford said in a statement, "would play into the hands of Hanoi, Peiping and Moscow." Ford referred to a statement Sunday by the President saying a top Republican had violated his confidence and publicized "perhaps malicious untruths" about deliberations in the Viet Nam war.

Flash Storm Hurts Grain Near Oakley

OAKLEY — A 45-minute rain and wind storm Sunday south-west of Oakley resulted in considerable damage to grain crops in the area. The storm began about 4 p. m. and moved to the northeast toward Burley, covering an area about one and one-half miles wide. There was also a power failure. Potatoes, beets and corn were not struck as seriously as grain fields which were just about ready to be harvested. The heavy rain and wind knocked grain to the ground. A large stream of water was running from a corn field west of Oakley onto the Marion Road, as well as the east and west roads near the Harvey Mills and Joel Rasmussen farms. Houses on the upper section of Marion Road were flooded to the doorsteps.

The President named no names but the conclusion of a number of newspapers was that he had Ford in mind. "Communist leaders all over the world would be happy to see a bitter, name-calling contest develop between President Johnson and Congressional leaders at this crucial time," Ford said. "Mr. Johnson's remarks made during his Sunday press conference in Texas, if he was referring to me, are the possible result of a misunderstanding which I trust the White House will correct. "I support the President's firmness against Communist aggression in Viet Nam. Regrettably, the principal opposition to the President's military decisions comes from Democrats in the Senate. "The nation faces a critical future. The President has the responsibility of making additional important military decisions. For the national interest and our security, I urge that we get on with the awesome tasks ahead without further delay and without splitting the nation's unity."

Top Cowboys Win Awards At T. F. Rodeo

Harold Tews, Mountain Home, won the all-around trophy at the Frontier Rodeo Sunday night at Frontier Field. Winners of all events were presented belt buckles during the last night of the two-day show. Saddle bronc winner was Larry Robinson, Twin Falls, who rode Bingo, the horse that has been voted top saddle bronc in the Idaho Cowboy Association for the past several years. Tied for second and third in the event were Dick Seal, Wells, Nev., and Dick Henson, Lander, Wyo., and Jan Agee, Wells, Nev., was fourth.

U. S. Waives Immunity for Accused Man

SAIGON (UPI)—The United States waived diplomatic immunity for Robert V. Kimball, the U. S. aide official charged with slaying his American boss and a Vietnamese woman in a "crime of passion." The decision set a precedent in South Viet Nam and will permit Kimball, 36, to be tried by a Vietnamese court. Kimball was charged with shooting to death July 23 Jack Ryan, 44, chief of the public safety division of the U. S. Operations Mission (USOM), and Mrs. Nguyen Thi Hai, 25, a USOM employe. The bodies of Ryan and the woman were found on the lawn of Ryan's home. Kimball was picked up later by Vietnamese authorities. Kimball could receive a maximum term of life at hard labor if convicted. The minimum prison sentence is five years. There is no death penalty for such a crime in South Viet Nam.

U.S. Has Power To Launch War, Says Official

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Rep. Hale Boggs, D-La., said today the United States has the power to launch all-out war against North Viet Nam. But, he said, we couldn't foresee the consequences. "Let no one doubt we have such a capacity to go all-out," the House majority whip told the opening session of the Disabled American Veterans National Convention.

Jury Considers Two Indictments

AMERICUS, Ga. (AP)—A grand jury considers indictments today against two young Negroes charged with the mid-night slaying of a white Marine enlistee. The jury was called into special session as Negro leaders promised demonstrators they would be joined by hundreds of reinforcements. Charged with murder are Ed Hopkins and Charles Lee Lee Hopkins, both in their early 20s and both of Americus.

Ministers Confer

TOKYO (AP)—French State Minister Andre Malraux conferred today with Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-lai in Peking. New China News Agency reported in Tokyo.

Communist Guerrillas Fire on 15 Posts; Casualties Moderate

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Communist guerrillas opened fire Sunday on 15 government positions south of Saigon, including two provincial capitals. A U.S. military spokesman said casualties were moderate. Three miles south of Da Nang air base, other Viet Cong sniped at a small U.S. Marine patrol inflicting heavy casualties for the number of Leathernecks involved. The capitals under fire by the Communist guerrillas were Long An, 20 miles south of Saigon, and Go Cong. The latter is 35 miles south of Saigon. The Communists shelled Go Cong with 60mm mortars. Light casualties were inflicted and one American was among the wounded.

Union Aide Fights for Rail Workers

WASHINGTON (AP)—A union spokesman opened a fight before the Senate Commerce Committee today to force railroads to resume negotiations on the use of firemen on diesel freight and yard locomotives. H. E. Gilbert, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, charged that since a compulsory arbitration board decision in 1963 this word has gone out from "the top" of most railroads.

Park Studied To Prepare For Jamboree

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie reported today a survey is under way to determine what improvements will be needed to prepare Farragut State Park for the 1967 World Boy Scout Jamboree. Already underway is planning for creation of a beach area at Button Hook Bay on Lake Pend Oreille adjacent to the park. Scout officials said the jamboree will stress water activities and that proximity of Pend Oreille guided their selection of the North Idaho site. Smylie said the state probably will build a temporary breakwater at the bay to provide a swimming beach and an area for canoeing and boating. Also planned for the park is a second amphitheater with a 30,000 seating capacity. A 12,000 seat theater with a 12,000-seat theater was built for the Girl Scout Roundup which concluded a week ago. Smylie said all planning will be done in cooperation with the State Parks Board and with the help of the professional staff of the Boy Scouts of America, host for the jamboree.

Reports Say Red Chinese City Armed

HONG KONG (AP)—Chinese arriving from Canton say the southern city's rooftops are bristling with anti-aircraft guns and that new anti-aircraft batteries have been set up at key points. It was reported today batteries have been or are being installed to guard key road and rail routes leading north to Hankow and west to Yunnan. Trenches are being dug in the city and basements and interior corridors of major buildings are being outfitted air-raid shelters, the travelers reported. The stories are more detailed than previous reports and are being given more credence by Western government experts in Hong Kong.

Mars Pictures Show Snooper Technique

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—10,000 miles, the pictures prompt an unavoidable question: What secrets can nations gain from spacecraft constantly circling the earth at a distance of a few hundred miles? The photographs also show another once-classified ability: snoopers. With the aid of computers, electronics experts can make even a poor photograph—which to the naked eye is little but a mass of streaks and smudges—tell them just about anything they want to know. They can penetrate the natural camouflage of haze and the manmade camouflage of smoke or confusing colors. A few stray anomalies—dots of darker or lighter gray which don't seem to belong there—can betray the rectangular outline of a launching pad hidden by tree limbs, or a concentration of vehicles which could be tanks hidden under netting dyed to resemble vegetation. Big Jet Bombers Go Farther North In Seventh Mission

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. bombers made their seventh reported strike in South Viet Nam today, dropping their bombs in the northernmost raid so far announced for the jet bombers. A U.S. spokesman said 30 of the Strategic Air Command's eight-jet bombers dropped 500 tons of bombs during a 45-minute raid on "Viet Cong installations in Quang Tin Province, approximately 350 miles north-northwest of Saigon." The raid was carried out at the request of the South Vietnamese government "against a suspected Viet Cong base near the Doxa," the spokesman said.

Johnson Orders All Unneeded Jobs Cut

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson ordered the Pentagon Sunday to trim away every unneeded military job to ease the manpower drain of the U.S. troop buildup in South Viet Nam. With troop needs mounting, he told Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, "I want you to be absolutely certain that there is no waste or misapplication of America's manpower in the Department of Defense." Meeting newsmen at his LBJ ranch, the President also: "Harshly criticized a man he identified only as a prominent Republican, saying he broke a presidential confidence on deliberations about Viet Nam and put out untrue information. Johnson said this man was the source of published reports that the opposition of Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana led him to decide against calling to active service U. S. military reservists. Johnson announced last Wednesday the draft will be more than doubled, and 50,000 new American troops will be sent to Viet Nam immediately to boost U. S. forces there to 125,000. The President said the story that Mansfield had urged him not to call reservists was politically motivated and added: "I would brand it untrue and perhaps malicious." Named Robert W. Akers, a retired Texas newsmen and old friend, to become deputy director of the U.S. Information Agency, succeeding Donald Wilson.

Merger for Reserve and Guard Asked

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department told Congress today that despite the Viet Nam crisis, the Army Reserves should be merged with the National Guard "as soon as possible." Deputy Defense Secretary Cyrus Vance, testifying before a House armed services subcommittee, said the reorganization would not significantly affect the ability of the Reserves to respond quickly in event of a call-up. The realignment would be carried out in such a way, Vance said, that at least five high priority divisions and six independent brigades would be available for mobilization at all times. Vance also announced that starting in September, training would be stepped up for three reserve divisions, six independent brigades and selected combat and service support units. The acceleration will mean six drills a month instead of the present four. Consideration also is being given to advancing field training rather than waiting until next summer, he said. Vance did not identify the units that would be affected nor did he specify whether they would come from the Army Reserves or the National Guard.

Area Man Is Dead in Coast Shooting

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—Two men—one of them from Burley, Idaho—were dead today, and a woman and another man were in a hospital, the result of what police said was a shooting by a jealous man. Police said the shooting began when Ralph Bowling, 44, a ranch worker, drove up to a home in a borrowed pickup truck and found Afton McLaws, 52, of Burley, talking to McLaws' former wife, Mrs. Montez Richardson, 49, and her son-in-law, Paul Wilson, 37. Sheriff's Capt. Robert L. Saum said Bowling started shooting without warning from the cab of the truck. He killed McLaws and wounded Mrs. Richardson and Wilson. Then he killed himself with a bullet in the head. Mrs. Richardson and Wilson were in a hospital today, in serious and good condition, respectively.

Four Die in Auto Crash Near Downey

DOWNEY, Idaho (AP)—Four persons including a three-month old boy were killed today in a head-on collision on U.S. 191 near Downey, in southern Idaho. Killed were Brent T. Johnson, 25, driver of one of the cars, his wife, Barbara, 25, and their three-month-old son, all of Salt Lake City, and 13-year-old Curtice C. Peterson of Idaho Falls. The Peterson youth was a passenger in the other car. Officers said the boy and Peterson were killed instantly and Johnson and his wife died several hours later in Marsh Valley Hospital. The driver of the second car was identified as Owen Gene Johnson of Logan, Utah. State Patrolman Arlo Larsen said the cars collided near the center line. He said it appeared one of the drivers had gone to sleep at the wheel. Johnson and Owen Gene Johnson apparently were not related. The deaths increased Idaho's traffic fatality total for the year to 146, compared with 137 to the corresponding date last year.

Police Nab Nine Mafia Members

PALERMO, Sicily (AP)—Italian police in a series of pre-dawn raids today arrested nine men described as links between the Sicilian Mafia and the American Cosa Nostra. Among them were the reputed head of the Mafia and an Italian-American once reported to be the successor of Charles "Lucky" Luciano.

University Gets Building Loan

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—A \$1.3 million federal loan for new student dining and housing facilities at the University of Idaho was announced Monday by Sen. Frank S. Church, D-Idaho. The Housing and Home Finance Agency loan, to be supplemented with \$400,000 in University funds, will be used to construct a six-story dormitory wing in the Wallace Residence Center and add to the center's kitchen and cafe facilities.

TOULON, France (AP) — Raging fires whipped by a dry sirocco wind from North Africa destroyed at least 25,000 acres of pine forests along the French Riviera early today, officials reported. Shortly after dawn the south wind died, and officials said the fires were brought under control in all areas. They said the flames could be extinguished completely if the wind did not rise again. Five persons were reported injured, and at least 20,000 vacationers and homeowners were evacuated.
