

Forces, Outlay to Be Raised

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Johnson administration disclosed plans today to increase the nation's fighting forces by 340,000 and asked for \$1.7 billion in additional emergency defense funds.

Both steps are primarily because of the Viet Nam situation. However, the increased manpower does not mean the prospective dispatch of that many additional men to Viet Nam.

President Johnson asked Congress for the \$1.7 billion "to increase our military strength in Viet Nam."

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara outlined the proposed manpower buildup in testimony to a closed Senate Appropriations subcommittee hearing.

McNamara told the senators that the Communist Viet Cong now hold the initiative in Viet Nam.

He predicted that South Viet Nam, with the aid of additional U.S. fighting forces, will win in the long, hard pull ahead.

Both the President and his defense secretary asked blanket authority for spending the new \$1.7-billion emergency funds. McNamara made it clear that much larger detailed requirements will be waiting for the new session of Congress in January.

The 340,000 increase in the armed forces proposed by McNamara would lift them to 2,850,000 men by the end of next June 30.

Regional Interest Can Impede Water Group, Smylie Says

BOISE (AP)—Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie expressed fears Tuesday that the Western Governors Water Committee may become a forum for a Southwest's campaign for the Northwest's water. "If the committee is to be for nothing more than to raid Northwest water," said Smylie, "it will not serve a very useful purpose."

Nevada Gov. Grant Sawyer, at the committee's organizing meeting at Lake Tahoe, renewed his proposal earlier Tuesday that Northwest water surpluses be transported to Southwestern states.

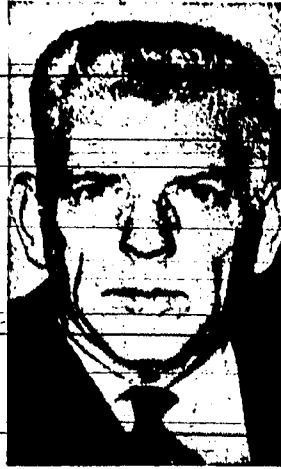

President to Be Briefed On Red Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roving Ambassador W. Averell Harriman reports to President Johnson today on his talks with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, the first such high-level contact since the new Kremlin regime took over last fall.

Harriman spent nearly five hours closeted with Kosygin in two meetings in Moscow about a fortnight ago.

U.S. sources said Harriman's soundings in Moscow and the other European capitals during his four-week trip do not significantly alter what is already known about the Viet Nam situation. He also saw leaders in Belgium, West Germany, Italy, Yugoslavia and Britain.

On his return here Tuesday night, Harriman told an airport news conference "I'm quite sure the Soviets want a peaceful solution in Viet Nam. But he added it's not in the hands of the Soviet Union in my opinion. It's in the hands of North Viet Nam." He said the Russians "don't appear to be ready to take the side of the non-Communist world" in efforts to bring the Hanoi regime to the conference table.

U.S. Planes Fly Near Red China Border on Bombing Mission

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. jet fighter-bombers flew within 30 miles of Red China today on a bombing mission over North Viet Nam, a U.S. military spokesman said. It was the closest announced strike ever to the Chinese mainland since the United States began bombing Communist targets in North Viet Nam last Feb. 7. Four U.S. Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs hit a group of railroad cars about 105 miles northwest of Hanoi near the town of Ba Ho, the spokesman said. He reported all planes returned safely.

Halt to Red Takeover in War Foreseen

HONOLULU, Hawaii (AP) — High American military officials believe the introduction of more U.S. ground forces coupled with continuous air strikes on North Viet Nam may prevent a Communist takeover of South Viet Nam.

While total victory may never be achieved, they suspect a milestone will have passed once the monsoon season, which favors guerrilla operations, ends about the middle of next month.

An expected Viet Cong monsoon offensive more or less fizzled out. And more American GI's will be in South Viet Nam and ready to take the offensive about the time the rainy season ends.

The officials believe Viet Cong momentum has been lost because of high casualty rates in recent months.

A factor, they say, is the continuous air offensive against supply targets and staging areas in North Viet Nam.

This veiled U.S. optimism follows a high-level Viet Nam conference in Honolulu, where top military men tackled details of the logistic problems involved in beefing up U.S. ground forces in Viet Nam.

405 Rams Sold by Noon at Filer Sale

FILER—A total of 405 head of rams had been sold by noon Wednesday at the 44th annual ram sale sponsored by the Idaho Wool Growers Association at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds here. Average price was \$142.02, according to Mel C. Claar, secretary of the association. The 68 lots that sold before noon compare with 48 lots sold before the noon recess at the sale last year. High sale for the morning session was a pen of two Suffolk yearling lambs consigned by the University of Idaho. They sold for \$500 each to W. H. Shulderberg, Terreton.

25 Fishermen Drown After Collision

ESPOSENDE, Portugal (UPI) — The 1,337-ton German freighter Apollo collided with and sank the Portuguese fishing boat Padre Cruz in thick fog near here early Wednesday drowning 25 fishermen and injuring 11.

The trawler was cut in two by the impact.

The Esposende fishing fleet sped to the scene to pick up bodies and search for possible survivors.

Esposende is a fishing town with a population of about 15,000, on Portugal's west coast about 40 miles north of the city of Oporto.

New Ways to Replenish Water Eyed

STATELINE, Nev. (AP) — Western officials looked with renewed interest today for ways of replenishing their vanishing resource — water.

The new Western States Water Council, formed to coordinate water planning in 11 western states, held its first meeting Tuesday at South Lake Tahoe.

Freeman Holmer of Oregon, who has been associated with Gov. Mark Hatfield's suggestion that surplus water now flowing in the sea be transported to water-poor states, was elected chairman.

Hoimer is director of finance and administration for Oregon and formerly headed the Oregon Commission on Interstate Cooperation. He said one of the council's first items of business would be to determine which areas — including portions of the northwest — need water.

Three cities are under consideration as headquarters — San Francisco, Salt Lake City and Portland. Three full-time staff members will be named about November, to work within a maximum \$150,000 budget.

Wyoming and New Mexico delegates said they might have trouble raising their membership fees until 1967, when their legislatures meet.

Many council members will attend the second Western Interstate Water Conference Thursday and Friday at Corvallis, Ore.

Among water transport proposals to be reviewed by the council are five plans to pipe water to the sprawling southwest — the fastest growing area in the country.

The most ambitious plan would divert enough water from Alaska and Canada each year to supply the projected needs of the west and Mexico until 2065. Members said they would invite Alaska to join the council.

Hail, Rain At Fairfield Hurt Crops

FAIRFIELD — Hail, rain and a heavy thunderstorm hit Fairfield Tuesday afternoon and some crop damage was reported by farmers in the Manard area near here.

About 12:15 p.m. a funnel-shaped cloud was sighted south of Fairfield. About 10 minutes later the cloud dipped to the ground over open fields, but no damage resulted. Heavy rain and hail as large as marbles followed, with some damage reported to alfalfa and ripening grain.

Fields along a mile and a half wide strip were flooded and Thomas Spackman said some of his grain was flattened and the alfalfa stripped.

About 6 p.m. a heavy thunderstorm hit Fairfield and water ran curb deep along the streets. Forest Ranger Gary Smuthey said one inch of precipitation fell in half an hour. The rain was mixed with some hail and some fields east of town were flooded.

Farmers in the Corral area reported a downpour. Monday night left fields flooded in some sections. Effect on winter wheat, about ready for combining, was not known. Some farmers remarked it was the heaviest rain they had ever seen.

Arrival of Negro Leader Is Delayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rev. Martin Luther King flew into Washington behind schedule today for a series of civil rights sessions, delayed in Philadelphia by a bomb scare which he attributed to pranksters.

Anonymous telephone calls reporting a bomb aboard his plane held him up so long he missed a breakfast gathering of civil rights leaders. No explosives were found in a search of the aircraft.

At a news conference the Negro leader, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, was asked how many bomb threats he has received.

"I really don't know — I don't keep up with all of them," he replied.

He made his reference to "the work of pranksters" in the same exchange.

King said this is the fourth day of the North he has visited on his current tour. He said it is a possibility that he will see President Johnson while he is here but "I'm not sure about this."

He will spend today and Thursday meeting with Washington civil rights leaders and appearing at rallies.

"Washington has about the same problem we have found in all the other communities," King said. He named them as housing, jobs and the whole school question.

Health Bill Signed by President

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson signed today another health bill, to help staff community mental health centers and train teachers for handicapped children, and called these programs "vital building blocks in the structure of our society."

The bill provides authorization for later appropriation of \$260 million over three years, \$224 million of that sum going to help staff mental health centers.

The signing took place in the White House rose garden in the presence of administration officials and members of Congress who helped with the legislation.

Draft Call Not Affecting T.F. Enlistments; More Predicted

Local Navy and Army recruiters and officials of National Guard and Army Reserve units Tuesday noted no increase in enlistment or in projected quotas since President Johnson's announcement last week concerning the draft.

Although there hasn't been an increase yet, the officials all anticipate a marked increase in enlistments within the next two or three weeks.

The recruiters noted that during the summer months it isn't difficult for young men to find employment in this agricultural area, and perhaps, in the next month, when employment opportunities drop, they will consider enlistment more seriously.

The Army recruiter said the draft statement by Johnson hasn't really had time to take effect, since the individuals need time to make personal preparations and arrangements before considering enlistment.

The selective service center has not received its orders for September, so officials there weren't able to say whether or not there will be a noticeable increase.

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Lord Dies

CHESTER-LE-STREET, England (AP) — Lord Lawson of Beamish, 83, a miner who rose to become army secretary and later a peer, died Tuesday.

Proposal Is Rejected by Legislators

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a first step toward a showdown on a constitutional amendment on legislative reapportionment, the Senate today rejected a proposal of Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., for "a measure of flexibility" to the Supreme Court's one-man, one-vote ruling.

Javits offered his proposal as a substitute for amendment by Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois to overcome the court's 1964 decision that both houses of state legislatures must be apportioned on the basis of population.

Javits' proposal lost 85-12 on roll call.

Leaders hoped for a vote later today on Dirksen's amendment. It has the backing of Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, but Dirksen predicted the outcome as "very doubtful."

It would permit geography and political subdivisions, if population to be taken into account in apportioning one of a state legislature, if the people approved in a referendum.

Javits' substitute also would permit these additional factors to be used as long as apportionment plan approved by the people bore "a reasonable relationship to the needs of the state."

\$100,000 Worth Of Gems Stolen

CLEVELAND, Ohio, (UPI) — Two bandits robbed a downtown jewelry store of more than \$100,000 worth of diamonds Wednesday in an apparently well-planned operation.

Police said the bandits, both of them armed with pistols, escaped with a briefcase full of diamond rings and jewelry. One gunman took \$150 in cash as he fled.

Sewer Bond Issue Okayed At Ketchum

KETCHUM — A \$105,000 sewer bond election was approved here Tuesday afternoon with 152 votes cast in favor of the issue and 66 against—five votes over the necessary two-thirds majority.

The bond issue will be used to construct sewerage treatment facilities estimated to handle projected growth of the city for the next 20 years.

Results of the two wards, with 109 votes cast in each, were: ward No. 1, 78 for and 31 against, and ward No. 2, 74 for and 35 against. Voters from both wards cast ballots from noon to 8 p.m. at the Ketchum City Hall.

A similar bond election was defeated last November.

Burley Mayor Defends City Against Union

BURLEY (UPI) — Mayor Mack Crouch of Burley Wednesday defended a city ordinance blocking collective bargaining with city employees from an attack by State AFL-CIO President Darrell Dorman.

Dorman accused the council of "flagrant violation" of Idaho labor laws through passage of an ordinance which refuses to recognize union representation sought by 39 of the city's 45 employees.

"There's an attorney general's ruling or opinion that municipalities do not have to bargain with labor unions," Crouch said. "On the strength of that we went ahead and passed an ordinance that we would not bargain with labor unions representing employees of the city."

Dorman indicated the AFL-CIO will not react favorably to the reported council action.

"Burley was selected as the convention site for our next convention," he said. "I don't think the executive board is going to look with favor on this action by the city council."

Albertson's Sets Work on Shop Center

An ordinance adopted Monday night at the Twin Falls City Commission meeting will enable Albertson's, Inc., to begin work on its shopping center along Washington Street North and Adams.

At present plans call for several buildings, including a drug store and dry goods store. The ordinance changes the zoning of lots 1 through 6, block 1, Lincoln School addition, and lots 1, 2 and 3, block 1, new school addition, from residential-medium density to commercial-general.

Safeway Stores, Inc., also was granted its zoning variance request for offstreet parking. The new arrangement will allow more parking in the area.

The trailer parking ordinance was amended to allow residents of R-1, R-M, R-P, C-1, C-C, and C-G districts to park trailer houses on the rear of lots for occupancy use.

In the industrial districts a trailer house will be permitted to be used for dwelling purposes provided it complies with all requirements of the zoning ordinance and building code requirements for dwellings.

A visitor may park his house trailer in front of his residence he is visiting for not more than five days.

Previously no district in the city has permitted people to dwell in trailers except in special areas designated as trailer parks.

Viet Nam War Report Given To President

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor made a final report to President Johnson today on Viet Nam and said he is far from discouraged. But he said he doesn't know whether the buildup to 125,000 U.S. troops in that Communist-battered country will be enough.

Taylor has had just a little more than a year's service as ambassador to Viet Nam, a post for which Johnson drafted him in comparison with a year ago, Taylor said there has been some deterioration and there have been some gains.

"The future," he said, "is certainly far more hopeful than it was a year ago."

But Taylor was making no predictions as to how or when the war will be won or ended.

The retiring Ambassador spent the better part of two hours with Johnson in the President's office making what he called his terminal report.

Examination Is Sought For German

BAMBERG, Germany (AP)—German officials said Tuesday they would seek a psychiatric examination for the young man held on suspicion of authoring a series of anti-semitic incidents in Bamberg.

State prosecutor Josef Ostheimer said 20-year-old Reinhard Woltzik doesn't appear to be quite in order.

Woltzik, son of a convicted Nazi war criminal, tried to commit suicide by slashing his wrist in his cell after his arrest last week.

Ostheimer and local police officials have said they believe a series of anti-semitic smearings over the past six weeks to be Woltzik's work.

Woltzik has denied any connection with the smearings.

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NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — Somebody, like maybe his office boy, should tell Dr. Joseph F. Sadusk Jr. the facts of Washington life. Dr. Sadusk, who is medical director of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), obviously has not been properly introduced to an institution called Congress.

Dr. Sadusk seems to believe that Congress is a nuisance and a timewaster and should stop interfering in his official affairs. He may have a case there, and yet it will do him no good because one of Congress' constitutional duties is to meddle in bureaucratic business in order that the citizenry may be informed of the goings-on in those carpeted dives.

STIRS UP A CONGRESSMAN — Recently, a House Intergovernmental Relations subcommittee has been inquiring into the FDA's policing of certain drugs and Dr. Sadusk doesn't like it. He told a reporter for the Drug Trade News that the hearings, conducted by Rep. L. H. Fountain (D., N. C.), were "more like an inquisition," and said FDA officials had been "harassed by tough, protracted questioning about many petty things." Then he waved the reddest of red flags in the face of the Congressman by saying he didn't believe the hearings were accomplishing anything useful.

As was expected, this was as the cry of "Yoicks, tally-ho!" to Rep. Fountain, who like most congressmen believes Congress accomplishes a great deal. Dr. Sadusk's comments said Fountain were "intemperate, ill-considered and grossly untrue." He suggested that Dr. Sadusk be given a good spanking by his top boss, Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Anthony Celebrezze, who has since quit, for saying such naughty things.

WHY THE DEAD! — This is an argument Dr. Sadusk can't win, and he should have known it before he shot off his mouth. Congress has an every desire to know what is going on here, and in the FDA's case, Fountain's subcommittee is wondering why certain drugs cleared by the FDA have killed so many patients. This is called, quite properly, protecting the public, an organization that may be more important even than Dr. Sadusk.

Fountain has also reminded Dr. Sadusk that when a private citizen enters the government he forgoes some of his privacy and is expected to account to the taxpayers for his activities. Fountain noted that he spends a lot of time answering questions from voters about how he meets his responsibilities and says Dr. Sadusk should be willing to do the same.

NO PLACE FOR SECRECY — Most citizens will buy that. The federal government's gravest fault is the average official's obsession with keeping his operations secret. It is the bureaucrat's premise that the taxpayer doesn't know won't hurt the bureaucrat, and Dr. Sadusk seems to have joined that school of thinking.

Well, he had better arrange a swift change of mind. Like most of his colleagues, Dr. Sadusk entered government service voluntarily and when he did so he agreed to abide by the rules which say any Congress has a right to satisfy its curiosity about his daily chores. If he finds this onerous, Rep. Fountain has offered an alternative. "Perhaps," says Rep. Fountain, "Dr. Sadusk would be happier outside government."

Washington cynics are laughing sardonically about a speech Jack Valenti, former Houston advertising executive and now aide to President Johnson, made in Boston last week about his boss. One commentator wrote that Mr. Valenti compared God favorably with LBJ. That was an exaggeration. But the President's right-hand man and good friend did line Mr. Johnson up with such stalwarts as Abraham Lincoln, Winston Churchill and "Antaeus, whose mother was Earth."

Speaking to the convention of the Advertising Federation of America, Mr. Valenti tried to picture "the full spirit of the man" that "never seems to be captured." His bold brush strokes appear to have been laid on with a trowel. Mr. Johnson, he said, is a "sensitive and a cultured man, a warm-hearted and extraordinary man" who came to the White House "possibly the most experienced and best trained of any chief executive."

Isaiah, according to Mr. Valenti, summed up the "cause of the President" when he said: "Learn to do well, seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow." Night and day, LBJ keeps watch over the nation and never tires because: "The President, thank the good Lord, has extra glands, I am persuaded, that give him energy that ordinary men simply don't have."

Every day the President uses courage, a sensitive intelligence and an instinct for rightness with "abundance and sanity," according to his aide. Sometimes at 10 or 11 p.m., before he goes to bed to read a large stack of official papers — later to wake at 4 a.m. — to check on the latest air strike in Viet Nam — Mr. Johnson will relax and tell stories to his staff. "He is probably the most skilled teller of stories since Lincoln," said Mr. Valenti, "and their humor is the same, extracted from the soil and the people of the land."

A faith akin to that expressed in the Twenty-third Psalm is revealed in the concluding paragraph of the Valenti speech: "I sleep each night a little better, a little more confidently because Lyndon Johnson is my President. For I know he lives and thinks and works to make sure that for all America and, indeed, the growing body of the free world, the morning shall always come."

No soap was ever peddled with more effusive language than that. Some think the panegyric was delivered to offset the sometimes unflattering picture of Mr. Johnson drawn by Theodore White in his new book, "The Making of the President 1964."

Whatever the reason, the public will not be convinced. A really great President must have some modesty. It would be naive to think that Mr. Valenti delivered the speech without Mr. Johnson's first having read and approved it. The President keeps too close tabs on everything for that. One must conclude, therefore, that Mr. Johnson shares his aide's views on LBJ. — The Oregonian.

The Doctor Says

The more we learn about diabetes the more we find we don't know. This disease affects about four million persons in this country, but half of them are not yet aware that they have it. Furthermore their number is increasing faster than the rate of increase in the population.

Diabetes is a disturbance in the body's internal chemistry that leads to high levels of glucose in the blood. When this level exceeds a certain point this sugar spills over through the kidneys into the urine.

There are two distinct types of diabetes. Juvenile diabetes develops before the age of 15 in children who are for the most part underweight. The pancreas in these diabetics produces little or no insulin and injections of this hormone must be given to control the disease.

The new oral antidiabetic drugs are of no avail. Regulating the insulin dosage is very difficult in these persons because the insulin demand, even on a carefully calculated diet, is apt to fluctuate from day to day.

About 20 per cent of diabetics are of this type.

In the rest, the disease develops over 40. These diabetics are usually overweight. Most of them could control their disease by bringing their weight down to

Interpreting The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — So long as man is alive on earth he can never forget two things that came, years apart, in the first week in August: A note and a flash.

Ever since he has known that if he is stupid enough there will be another flash some time, not to see by but to die by.

It was 26 years ago Monday—Aug. 2, 1939 — that the world's most famous scientist, Albert Einstein, wrote a note to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, saying: "It might be possible to make an atomic bomb."

Then the kindly Einstein, a pacifist, added a frightening note. He said the Nazis were already at work on the project. Roosevelt's response: "This requires action." It took six years to make the bomb.

Twenty years ago this week—Aug. 6, 1945 — a B29 superfortress flew over the Japanese city of Hiroshima at 9:15 a.m. and dropped a bomb called "The Lean Boy." The city went up in flash and smoke.

President Harry S. Truman got the word that day coming back from the Potsdam Conference on the heavy cruiser Augusta and he told a group of sailors around him: "This is the greatest thing in history."

The Japanese humbled about surrender and on Aug. 9, 1945, another bomb, this one called "The Fat Boy," was dropped on Nagasaki. The world has never been the same since.

Nearly 80,000 people were killed in Hiroshima, 35,000 in Nagasaki. Over 70,000 were injured in both cities, thousands were doomed to lingering, agonizing illness. Other thousands were missing.

The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano said "this incredible, destructive instrument remains a temptation for posterity." And it has been ever since.

Moscow is underplaying aspects of the Viet Nam war which might directly concern the Soviet Union, and Washington appears to be bending over backward to avoid provoking the Kremlin.

The appearance of delicate treatment of the situation in both capitals testifies to the depth of the Viet Nam crisis and the reluctance of the two great nuclear powers to generate dangerous tension between them.

Soviet skittishness has become obvious. The Soviet press paid scant attention to the dramatic news that U.S. planes attacked anti-aircraft missile sites in North Viet Nam.

Presumably placed there by the Russians and possibly manned by their technicians.

President Lyndon B. Johnson has said he knows of nothing the U.S. government has in mind which might excite Soviet distrust or provoke the Soviet Union. The whole tenor of his news conference was distinctly low key, and the picture he displayed of U.S. policy in Viet Nam was one of carefully measured steps.

If Russians were manning the missile sites in North Viet Nam, the Kremlin may have decided that they were expendable chips in this poker game. It is possible, of course, that no Russians were on the scene at all.

In any event, the Kremlin leadership shows no enthusiasm for heating up the atmosphere, despite strident scolding from the Red Chinese.

"What the Russians call support for Viet Nam and aid to Viet Nam are just for deceiving others," complained a Peking paper last week. "Their real aim is to bring the Viet Nam question into the orbit of Soviet-

TAYLOR'S VIEWS ON WORLD NEWS

It's not what Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said on his return from Viet Nam that worries so many of our high-ranking officers. It's what he doesn't say that profoundly concerns them.

In fact, some feel that either Mr. McNamara should put on five stars and fight the war in Viet Nam all by himself or not hold that responsible.

Mr. McNamara's famous cost-parring has been achieved chiefly in two ways: By stretching out procurement programs and by stripping equipment and inventories from our combat forces elsewhere to supply the needs in Viet Nam.

By dominating the strategic concepts in which the Whiz Kids and their computers alike are all untrained, the stretch-out system has shown up fine in the McNamara figures. But what happens if Mr. McNamara, his Whiz Kids and the computers are dead wrong in their timing?

The only defense that counts is the defense that exists—not a defense that is stretched out. This column recently pointed to Mr. McNamara's congressional testimony (repeatedly postponed) regarding the Khru-shev confrontation in which he all but said our great armed forces couldn't have invaded Cuba. He stated we were caught "terribly short" of fighter planes, transport vessels and escort war vessels "which we'd have needed to invade Cuba."

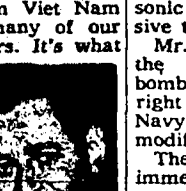
This should make us wonder where our billions went and we have a right to know where our billions are going now.

Are we better prepared to "think big" than we are prepared to go to actual war? Mr. McNamara has stated, for example, that the U.S. infantryman of the future will jump 30 feet in the air, aided by a jet-propelled belt. What he will do when he gets up there is not clear.

Meanwhile, the very practical Russian 14.5-mm. is probably the best heavy machinegun in the world and our light machinegun does not match their R. P. D. either.

The new RS-71 reconnaissance plane is specified to fly 2,500 miles per hour, the F-104 is greased lightning, and OV-10A lifts like an arrow, etc. But despite all the long talk about "building for anti-guerrilla warfare" we have no low-altitude jet suitable in Viet Nam—and that's where we're fighting.

About \$2 billion is involved in

the C-5A giant. It'll carry 200 men to battle areas at near-sonic speed. But this is expensive transportation.

Mr. McNamara insisted that the \$7 billion TXF fighter-bomber (now the F-111) was right for both the Air Force and Navy. Now a version must be modified for the Navy, after all.

The billions can also include immense sums that mean dead money consumed in obsolescence. Last June Mr. McNamara's office junked 14 missile complexes with 133 Atlas sites in 12 states, declaring obsolete the missiles they were built to launch. The sites alone cost \$856.9 million.

Oh, yes, the billions can circulate and the billions can go. But the sheer size of the spending can even confuse us.

Notice the secondary anxiety among high-officers: The cannibalizing of our combat forces elsewhere to supply the needs in Viet Nam.

The facts are ably expressed (July 29) by distinguished New York Times military author Hanson Baldwin: "Most military leaders believe the McNamara cost-parring and inventory reduction methods over the last four years, and particularly the failure to provide for the extraordinary needs for Viet Nam, have created serious shortages. The shortages are in personnel, modern arms and equipment, aircraft, spare parts, reserve stock and other items. . . . The services are worried about the state of the Seventh Army in Germany, the capabilities of the Atlantic fleet, the status of strategic reserve units in this country and the ability of the armed forces to meet other simultaneous emergencies."

He further reveals that the pentagon explained in its own "background briefing" after President Johnson's talk to the nation, that one reason the President didn't call up the reserves was their lack of equipment and training.

Mr. Baldwin is courageously helping to bring the facts out in the open.

Hospital Care Is Heart of New Medicare Program

Medicare is somewhat of a misnomer. The new Social Security health-care plan for the aged could be more aptly tagged "Hospicare." For hospital care is the heart of this benefit program.

Basically, Medicare will provide up to 90 days of hospital care for each "spell of illness" to a person 65 or older.

A "spell of illness" begins the day a patient is admitted to a hospital or nursing home. It ends once a patient has been outside a hospital and outside a nursing home for 60 straight days.

Medicare won't cover the full hospital bill. The patient will have to pay the first \$40. And if he stays longer than 60 days during any "spell of illness," he'll have to pay \$10 for each additional day he remains in the hospital.

The patient also will have to pay for the first three pints of blood he might receive—unless he gets donors to replace the blood. After the first three pints, transfusions will be paid for by Medicare.

Coverage will apply to patients in psychiatric and tuberculosis as well as general hospitals. But if a patient is already

in a mental or TB hospital when he becomes eligible for Medicare, the time he has spent there will be counted against the 90-day limit for a "spell of illness."

Further, no person will be able to draw, during his lifetime, more than a total of 190 days of care in a psychiatric hospital.

A special provision applies to Christian Science sanatoriums operated or certified by the

First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston. Medicare will cover up to 120 days of care for a single stay in such an institution, with the patient paying the first \$40, plus \$10 for each day after the first 60 and \$5 for each day after the first 90.

Medicare also will cover persons who go to a hospital on a nonovernight basis for X-rays and other diagnostic tests. Such "outpatients" will have to pay the first \$20 for services rendered in any 20-day period, plus one-fifth of the balance.

The initial "deductibles" will be in effect through 1968. After that, they may be raised each year if necessary to keep pace with increasing hospital costs.

Hospital benefits, which start July 1, 1966, include:

A semiprivate room (two to four beds), though a doctor may order a private room for "medical reasons."

Regular hospital nurses (but not private-duty nurses).

Services of the hospital's medical social workers.

Use of regular hospital equipment, supplies and appliances, such as oxygen tents, wheelchairs and crutches.

Prescribed drugs which are O.K.'d by the hospital's medical staff or approved by any one of four "medical-Bibles" specified in the law.

Services of hospital residents and interns—doctors—getting-on-the-job experience under ap-

proved training programs. Services of other physicians will not be covered by the basic Medicare plan.

For Social Security to pay anything, however, a physician must certify it was medically necessary to put the patient in a hospital. If the patient stays longer than 19 days, the doctor will have to recertify need for continued hospital care at intervals specified by the government.

Care in the psychiatric or tuberculosis hospital will be covered only if a doctor certifies the patient needs special treatment which can be "reasonably expected to improve" his condition—or, in the case of TB, render the disease "non-communicable."

This rules out Medicare coverage for ordinary custodial care in TB and mental institutions.

In an emergency, a patient could be treated in any hospital.

One Killed; Five Injured By Lightning

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Lightning hit a crane working on a Saturn-5 moon rocket launch pad Tuesday, killing one man and injuring five others.

The dead man was identified as A. Trieb, 33, of Mitchell, S.D. One construction worker was hospitalized and four others were treated and released at a base medical center.

A spokesman for the Army Corps of Engineers, overseer of the vast space construction underway here, said the men were pouring concrete on the 40-foot level of the launch complex when the lightning struck.

The lightning traveled down the crane cables to a bucket containing wet concrete. The workers were standing near the concrete and were burned and knocked down by the flash.

Grant Okayed For Training Of Children

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal approval was reported Tuesday of a grant of \$332,868 to finance training for children of migrant workers employed in western Idaho and eastern Oregon.

Sen. Frank Church and Rep. Compton I. White, Idaho Democrats, said the funds will be provided by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The program will be coordinated by Treasure Valley Community College at Ontario, Ore.

Attending will be children of migrant workers in the Weiser and Payette areas in Idaho and the Ontario, Nyssa and Adrian communities in Oregon.

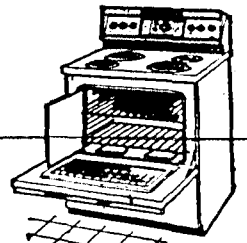

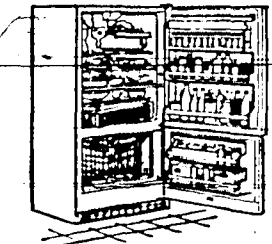

Four Israeli Guards Hurt In Explosion

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP)—Four Israeli border guards were wounded when their car hit a mine along the Israel-Jordan armistice line southwest of Jerusalem, an army spokesman said today.

Israeli authorities have complained to the Jordan-Israel Mixed Armistice Commission. It marked the latest of a series of incidents along the Israel-Jordan border in recent months. Each side has accused the other of aggressive acts.

Ex-Convicts To Appear in U. S. Court

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Two ex-convicts from Oregon who are charged with kidnapping California Finance Director Hale Champion, his wife and infant daughter, were to enter pleas today in U. S. District Court.

It will be the second California court appearance for Carl Cletus Bowles, 24, and Wilford Marion Gray, 30.

Bowles and Gray face a federal charge of kidnapping, which carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment. The two men were captured July 9 after a three-state crime spree that police said included a bank holdup, the fatal shooting of an Oregon deputy sheriff, and the kidnapping of six people in Oregon.

They later abducted Champion, his wife Marie and 19-month-old daughter Katherine Marie, and released them in Nevada.

Successful Test Flight Is Reported

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The Minuteman 2 intercontinental range missile scored its eighth straight test flight success without a miss Tuesday night, propelling a dummy warhead to a target area 5,000 miles away in the south Atlantic.

The Air Force reported the sleek, three-stage missile hit the bullseye near Ascension Island. The 7,000-mile-range pushbutton rocket is scheduled to become operational within a few weeks. It will replace the earlier Minuteman 1.

The "new phase" of the Viet Nam war is a year old today. Just a year ago, on Aug. 4, the United States for the first time bombed targets in North Viet Nam and began what the Pentagon would call an escalation process.

far? Big dangers seem nearer, the frustrations even greater. The path to solution appears as agonizingly elusive as it was before Red North Viet Nam tested the U.S. "paper tiger" and found it had sharp teeth.

A year ago the United States had 16,300 troops in South Viet Nam, technically advisers. Now there are 80,000 there, many in active combat. The conflict, in President Johnson's words, has become a real war.

This, actually, is the anniversary of U.S. retaliation against North Vietnamese mainland bases after Communist torpedo boats attacked U.S. warships in the Tonkin Gulf. That began the gradual process by which the United States became deeply committed to war on the Asian mainland.

The United States began regular air attacks on North Vietnam targets Feb. 7 in an avowed effort to convince the Communists they could not win and to persuade them to go to a conference table.

The year of the "new phase" has frayed world nerves. Red China exploded its way into the atomic weapons club. The Soviet Union lost its rambunctious leader, Nikita S. Khrushchev. South Viet Nam's generals turned on their strongman, Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, and evicted him. The elusive Viet Cong changed tactics and tempo.

Informed opinion has speculated that Peking masterminded the events which led to the turn in the Viet Nam crisis, that Red China prodded Hanoi into the

torpedoboat attacks. If Red China had a hand in the test of the U.S. "paper tiger," it could have been regarded as just as much a challenge to Moscow and Khrushchev as it was to the United States. Indeed, it may have been a factor in Khrushchev's fall two months later.

Soviet reaction was slow. Moscow seemed to do the minimum in support of Hanoi, obviously too little to avert Peking's caustic attacks on "the modern revisionists" of the Kremlin.

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Newsman Sighted in Sailing Boat

FALMOUTH, England (AP)—The Royal Air Force sighted an Ohio newspaperman Tuesday sailing a tiny boat across the Atlantic within 400 miles of his goal.

Squadron leader William Kirk reported that Robert Manry, of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, in his 13½-foot Tinkerbell was seen by Shackleton patrol planes south of Ireland. He appeared to be right on course on his lonely 3,000-mile voyage from Falmouth, Mass., to Falmouth, England.

The air force officer said Manry and his little boat, with a good tailwind, appeared to be doing about three knots (three nautical miles per hour). This would be a big improvement over the 39 miles a day Manry averaged on the first 2,000 miles of his remarkable trip, which started June 1 and for which he laid in 90 days' provisions.

The Royal Air Force patrol sent its information to the coast guard and between them they calculated that Manry might creep into Falmouth Harbor late Thursday night or Friday morning.

Texas Political Feud Renewed

EL PASO, Tex. (AP)—Democrat Ralph Yarborough leveled sharp criticism at Democrat Gov. John D. Connally and the governor replied in kind Tuesday.

Their blunt exchange signaled renewal of a Texas political feud that could put President Johnson in the middle, particularly if the two run for the same office in the next election as some expect.

Addressing the Texas AFL-CIO convention here, Yarborough said Connally vetoed a Farmers Union plan for an anti-poverty project in southwest Texas which promised to be one of the finest in the nation.

The senator also said the Labor Department holds such projects should pay a \$1.25 hourly wage "unless the community could present persuasive evidence that a lower wage was justified."

"Many Texas communities want to pay this \$1.25 minimum wage. The governor has done everything he can get away with to frustrate their wishes," Yarborough said.

measure before Congress to cancel the veto power of state governors over poverty programs.

Connally, who has said repeatedly the \$1.25 wage is too high for anti-poverty projects in Texas, told a news conference in Austin, he vetoed the Farmers Union project because the organization has a political purpose. "I would have done the same thing if it had been the Farm Bureau," he said.

The governor also told newsmen he had not reached a decision on his political future. He said many letter writers asked him to run for a third term as governor while others wanted him to seek the Senate seat now held by John Tower, Texas Republican.

Yarborough leads the liberal faction among Texas Democrats and Connally the conservative. Forces of the senator failed last year in an attempt to wrest control of the state Democratic convention from Connally.

Spokesmen for liberals have been quoted as urging Yarborough to make a race for gov-

ernor. Under Texas law he could run without resigning as senator. There has been no public comment from Yarborough.

During the 1950s, Yarborough ran for governor three times, losing to an opponent backed by conservatives in each case.

In 1961, Yarborough beat gubernatorial executive Gordon McLendon, a conservative, in a bitter Democratic primary campaign. Connally won handily over liberal Don Yarborough, no relation of the senator, for the nomination for governor.

Navy Starts First Draft In Decade

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy set out today to muster the first draftees it has used in a decade. It also is considering involuntary extensions of duty for skilled men whose enlistments are expiring.

The service is suggesting that its total manpower be increased by about 35,000, but this figure is still under scrutiny by both Navy and Defense Department officials.

A Pentagon call for the biggest Army draft quotas since midpoint in the Korean War called a provision for the Navy to get 4,600 draftees in October.

A Defense Department announcement Tuesday was the first official step putting into effect President Johnson's order to raise monthly draft quotas from the previous 17,000 level to as high as 35,000.

Red China Tour by French Culture Minister Spurs Diplomatic Reaction

PARIS (UPI) — The junket through Communist China by French Culture Minister Andre Malraux is producing a lot of diplomatic fallout.

Diplomats have been asking: Was he or wasn't he sent on a Viet Nam peace mission for President Charles de Gaulle?

The 63-year-old Malraux, a former Communist turned ardent Gaullist and now one of the French president's most trusted confidants, has been given red carpet treatment by Chinese Communist authorities.

He has hobnobbed with top officials in Peking.

But there is no warmth in the relationship.

France's ambassador in Peking, Lucien Pave, rarely gets to see top Chinese leaders and when he does see them they tell him little he does not know from reading the official Communist press.

It seems almost certain that the main purpose of Malraux's trip is to see whether some real warmth cannot be injected into the relationship between the two countries. Malraux, was a former Communist who helped the Chinese Communists in the early days of their struggle for power 40 years ago, and who knows many of the present day

leaders personally, seemed an ideal choice for such a mission.

It is doubtful he was instructed to do any specific negotiating on Viet Nam. But it obviously could not have failed to come up in his talks in Peking.

He has been making a pilgrimage to shrines of the Communist revolution in remote areas of the country.

Inevitably the impression has gone around that his mission is a top drawer one and that it can only concern the Viet Nam conflict, in which it is known De Gaulle sees himself ultimately in the role of mediator.

First official French explanations were less than convincing.

It was said Malraux was on a private cruise for his health, that his ship broke down at Hong Kong and that he took the opportunity to do some private touring in the footsteps of Marco Polo in the interior of China.

Later, French officials conceded there was more to it than this diplomatic cover-up story.

Basically, it seems, De Gaulle has been deeply disappointed by the results so far of his attempts to cultivate the Chinese Communists.

It was in January of last year that the French leader shook his allies by recognizing the Peking regime. A little over a year ago the two countries exchanged ambassadors.

But that's about as far as it has gone.

There have been visits by trade and cultural missions in the normal pattern of relations between the West and Communist countries, and the French are preparing to hold a trade exhibition in Peking.

Dogs Keep Postman From Mail Route

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — The unleashed dogs of Martha Street have accomplished what neither snow, nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night could do — stayed the postman from completion of his appointed rounds.

Dogs roaming the block have kept about 16 families from getting their mail at home for more than a week.

Eugene F. Housman, postal superintendent of delivery, said suspension will continue "until we're notified that the dog situation has been cleared up."

Meanwhile, those who want mail get it at a station many blocks away.

Some of the dogs belong to people in the neighborhood, others "just come," it was reported.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson has ordered Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara to determine why so few Negroes attend the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

The President Tuesday asked McNamara and Navy Secretary Paul H. Nitze to make an immediate check after Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), complained to Johnson that there were only nine Negroes among 4,000 academy midshipmen.

NEW YORK (AP) — The city signed 4,951 new voters during the first two weeks of its summer registration drive, a spokesman says.

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Solon Slams Draft Appeal As Insulting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Thomas G. Abernethy says a reported appeal to Negroes not to honor draft calls is treasonable and insulting to the President and people.

The Mississippi Democrat referred to a report that the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party, a predominantly Negro organization which is trying to unseat him and four other Mississippi representatives, had circulated such an appeal. Jackson, Miss., reports said the leaflet urged Negro mothers to keep their sons from honoring the draft and called on Negroes in the armed services to stage hunger strikes. Lawrence Guyat, executive secretary of the Freedom Democrats, said the statement was not an official policy statement of the group.

Abernethy protested in telegrams to Johnson and Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey and also spoke in the House.

Rail Union Members Talk To Committee

They repeated union requests that the Senate Commerce Committee look into the arbitration board ruling which ended a five-year dispute.

The arbitration award, which does not cover the Southern Railway, went into effect May 7, 1964, and expires March 7, 1966. It provides for the assignment of up to 90 per cent of the firemen's jobs on diesel freight and yard engines.

Harold G. Spencer, a Brotherhood official on the Boston & Maine Railroad, Glennis E. Downaway of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad and William Stephenson of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad each described what they called the firing of Brotherhood members.

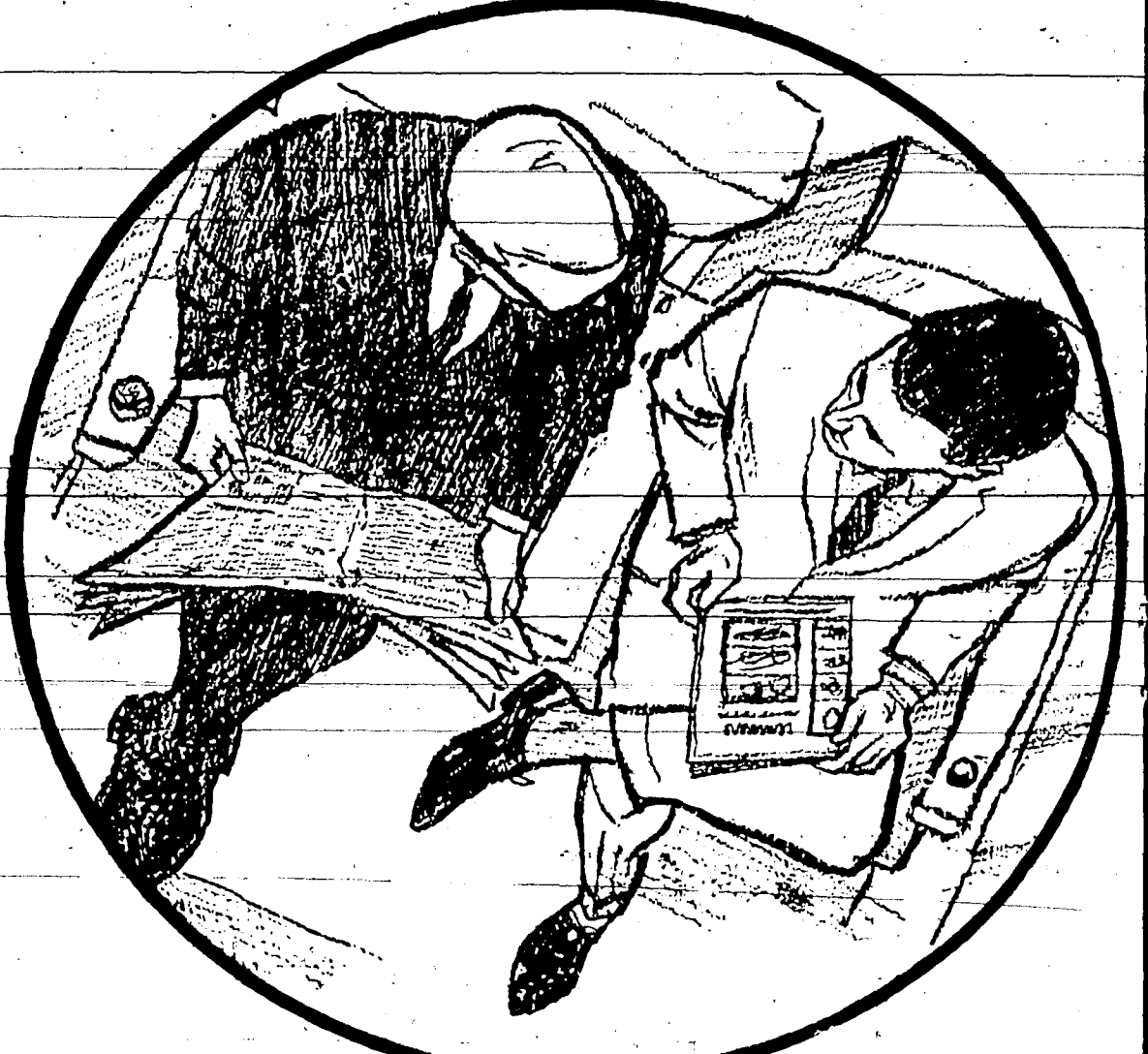

Spy Trial For German Is Under Way

CAIRO (AP)—A state security court trying West German horse breeder Johann Lotz in Cairo on charges of spying for Israel's intelligence services heard details Tuesday of Lotz's alleged acts of terrorism.

An Egyptian laborer told the court, on the fifth day of the trial, that his hand was blown off and his brother was blinded when he dug up a false-bottom suitcase from the desert near the pyramids of Giza.

Lotz, 44, admitted to the court last week that he buried the suitcase. He has pleaded guilty to six charges of spying for Israel, but denied terrorizing German aircraft and rocket experts working for the United Arab Republic.

A postmaster told the court of an explosive envelope which the prosecution claims Lotz mailed to one of the German experts.

Ragab Badran said the envelope was returned to his office unopened. When he tried to unfasten the envelope, it exploded, he testified.

Man in Jail After Leaving Area Hospital

HAILEY—A man who reportedly was a circus cook for many years was in Blaine County jail here Wednesday after "escaping" from the Blaine County Hospital where he did not like blood transfusions.

Sheriff Orville Drexler said Deputy Donald Green, Carey, found Leo Leon, 53, address unknown, lying along highway 93 Monday and brought him to the hospital where he was given blood transfusions.

Wednesday morning he somehow got out of the hospital unnoticed and Sheriff Drexler found him in front of the post office. He was put in jail since he is in serious physical condition, the sheriff said, and does not want to go back to the hospital.

Leon told the sheriff he had been a cook for the Cole Brothers Circus for years and was en route to Sun Valley to try to get a job as a cook. He said he has no family.

"We won't know for at least two weeks whether Joy caught chicken pox, but I desperately hope so," Mrs. Evans said. "We have tried everything, all the pills and injections the doctor prescribed, since I found out

Civil Rights Marchers Stage Parade

ALLENDALE, S.C. (AP) — Civil rights demonstrators, snubbing proposals by county officials to speed up the registration of Negro voters, marched again in Allendale today but their number had dwindled.

About 75 persons, including several white men and women, marched to the Allendale County Courthouse with their police escort also cut in half. They formed a circle in a clearing, sang hymns and said prayers. There were no incidents.

Meanwhile, 50 Negro and white civil rights workers remained in jail at Orangeburg, S.C., 35 miles north of here. They were arrested Tuesday after staging a sit-in in the Orangeburg County Courthouse to protest that Negro voters were being registered too slowly.

Plans for today's protest march at Allendale were mapped at a mass meeting of about 300 Negroes Tuesday night. They voted to turn down a four-point compromise set forth by voting officials to end the marches.

Salary Boost Approved by Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill that would boost salaries of 1.8 million federal employes by 4.5 per cent in October was approved 20-1 today by the House Civil Service Committee.

The bill, providing far more generous raises than recommended by President Johnson, would make possible an even larger increase in October, 1966, by closing what the Labor Department describes as the gap between government and private industry salaries.

Also included was a provision that would substantially increase the \$30,000 salaries of members of Congress starting in the next Congress.

The first-year cost of the bill was estimated at \$739 million. Johnson had asked for a flat 3 per cent increase for federal employes, costing \$400 million.

Awards Given To Men Hurt In Viet Nam

NHA TRANG, Viet Nam (AP) — The commander of the 1st Brigade of the U.S. Army's 101st Airborne Division awarded purple hearts today to the first of his men wounded in Viet Nam.

The brigade — which landed last Thursday — suffered its first casualties shortly after midnight when the Viet Cong opened up with small arms on defensive positions of the Americans near Cam Ranh Bay, 20 miles south of Nha Trang. The casualties were described as very light.

The brigade commander, Col. James S. Timothy, presented two purple hearts in a brief ceremony at the 8th Field Hospital in this coastal city, 200 miles northeast of Saigon.

They went to two medics who were wounded superficially by sniper fire in a battalion support area about 1 1/2 miles from the brigade command post.

Col. Timothy's wife lives in Ogden, Utah. He is the son of retired Gen. P. H. Timothy of New Orleans, La.

The forest service gives "initial attack" on fires on BLM land within a certain radius of the Forest Service, then turns it over to BLM crews.

Finding Place to Send Underworld's "Man Without Country" Is Problem

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Carlos Marcello is the underworld's equivalent of a man without a country.

The federal government has tried to kick him out of the country since 1950. The immigration service succeeded once, but he was back in Louisiana before you could bat an eye.

Finding a place to send him has posed a big problem for the government.

The Justice Department has tried unsuccessfully to send the 55-year-old Marcello to jail. Another attempt is now under way.

Marcello's trial on jury tampering charges went into its second day today before U.S.

District Judge Herbert W. Christenberry with efforts to select a jury. Marcello is accused of trying to fix the jury which set him free on fraud charges in 1963.

Marcello, who likes bright suits and dark glasses, claims he's a simple businessman.

The late Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., branded Marcello "one of the worst criminals in the country" when he held his racketeering hearings in the early 1950s.

It was established that Marcello was born Calogero Menacari in Tunis, North Africa, of Sicilian parents and entered the United States in October 1940. He had never become a naturalized citizen.

Marcello's father, Joseph, entered the shrimping business in South Louisiana.

In 1960, a birth certificate for Marcello popped up during an obscure Guatemala visit. A year later, immigration agents nabbed Marcello and whisked him off to Guatemala. He was back in the New Orleans area shortly.

Before that, the government tried to send him to France, Italy, Canada, Mexico or any place that would have him. Italy accepted once, then changed its

mind, with the Italian consulate here citing "the political situation."

Marcello once said he definitely didn't want to go to Italy. "I ain't never been there," he said. "And I don't want to go there. I wish they would deport me to Grand Isle where I could do some fishing."

Grand Isle is on the Louisiana coast south of New Orleans.

Marcello was tried in federal court here two years ago on charges of fraud in connection with the Guatemalan birth certificate. He was acquitted Nov. 22, 1963.

During World War II, Marcello and his brother, Anthony, by their own admission and police records, operated slot machines, juke boxes, horseshoe wires and gambling casinos in Louisiana.

Carlos Marcello served 4 years of a 9-14 year sentence for assault and armed robbery in connection with a bank holdup in 1929. In 1938, he was sentenced to a year and a day in a federal prison on narcotics charges.

Surviving, besides his widow, are a son, Jess Coats Jr., Portland; a daughter, Mrs. Evelyn Weisenman, Milford, Utah, and seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. Friday at Wiley Funeral Chapel, Jerome. Friends may call at the mortuary Thursday and until time of services Friday. Final rites will be held in Jerome Cemetery.

Pickets Lift Blockades so Sculptures Can Be Loaded

NEW YORK (AP) — A shipping strike was interrupted and a steamship line lost \$1,300 today as six pieces of sculpture were unloaded from a ship.

And all because of a petite Frenchwoman who went without food for six days.

It was the first unloading from an American ship in East or Gulf Coast ports since June 15, when a maritime strike began.

Jacqueline Fayet-Leroy, 39, waged a hunger strike at the pier until pickets became so

worried, they said they would lift their blockades long enough to let longshoremen get the welded metal artwork off the ship, American Ranger, which has been tied up for 47 days.

A spokesman for the ship's owner, U.S. Lines, said it cost the line \$1,500 to have the sculpture removed from American Ranger's hold, and the shipping bill on the art was only \$200.

The cost might have been higher were it not that the longshoremen were "all volunteers and will not be paid," according to John Bowers, president of Local 824 of the AFL-CIO International Longshoremen's Association and executive vice president of the international.

Bowers accompanied the dozen longshore volunteers to the ship where the MJARINE Engineers Beneficial Association and the Masters, Mates and Pilots, two of the striking AFL-CIO maritime unions, had agreed to let them pass.

Nearly two hours after the longshoremen arrived, the art was on its way to South Windham, Maine, where it will go on display first. As the truck pulled out, the pickets resumed their places.

Mme. Fayet-Leroy said she planned to resume eating today.

Two Unhurt As Explosion Ruins Home

COLUMBIA, Utah (AP) — A house was completely destroyed but its inhabitants lived — when a violent explosion believed caused by a defective water heater, shook this tiny coal mining community in east-central Utah early today.

Tony Pacheco, 49, and his wife Evelyn, 47, were asleep when the explosion occurred about 3:30 a.m. Police and neighbors pulled the couple from the ruins.

Officials at the Permanente Foundation Hospital in Drageron said Pacheco suffered shock, face cuts and possible internal injuries. He was listed in fair condition.

They said Mrs. Pacheco suffered a broken back, shock and a possible fractured ankle. She also was listed in fair condition.

Carbon County Sheriff Albert Passic said the blast was so violent that all four walls, ceiling and floor of the single-story house collapsed.

Mrs. Pacheco was found in a bed that had fallen through the floor. Her head was half submerged in water from the broken water tank. She was covered by plaster, boards and flooring.

Pacheco was found buried beneath the collapsed walls.

It was first believed that the explosion was caused by dynamite. Neighbors told the sheriff Pacheco kept dynamite around the house.

But Passic said investigation revealed no evidence of dynamite, only the exploded water heater.

Q. Way back in 1929 I bought some stock. I don't have to tell you what happened to the stock market in that year. My stock went way down in price. The company in which I owned stock was merged into another company and I received stock of the other company. The same thing happened a couple of times.

As a result of those mergers, I now own stock which has a much lower market value than the stock I originally bought. But I have no proof of my original investment.
If I sell the stock I now own, will I be permitted to claim a loss on my income tax return?

So, if you sell, the difference between the price you paid back in '29 and the proceeds you receive from the sale will be your capital loss. You report it as such on the income tax return you file for the year in which you sell.

Gosling Production Reported Down From Last Year in Idaho

BOISE — Gosling production is higher than the long-term average but down nine per cent from last year in all six goose production areas where annual nesting surveys are made to keep tabs on Idaho's important Canada goose populations, the Fish and Game Department reported Wednesday. Flood waters in two key goose areas destroyed nests before the hatch and reduced nesting success.

These were on the Payette River, where waters swamped many nests only about a week before the hatch was completed and at Dingle Marsh Reservoir in southeastern Idaho.

Elwood Bizeau, state bird supervisor, pointed out that a big bite was taken from prospective resident geese flocks this fall by the Payette floodwaters. Here production figures for nestlings in southwestern Idaho are down 18 per cent from 1964, but still 5 per cent above the long-term average. Resident geese are described as those flocks which breed and winter in the same home area.

Southeastern Idaho geese, even those hatched and reared in the state, follow the Colorado River into Arizona and Lower California. Bizeau added, however, that gosling production for southeastern Idaho, as a unit, was up 24 per cent from last year, but 7 per cent below the long-term average.

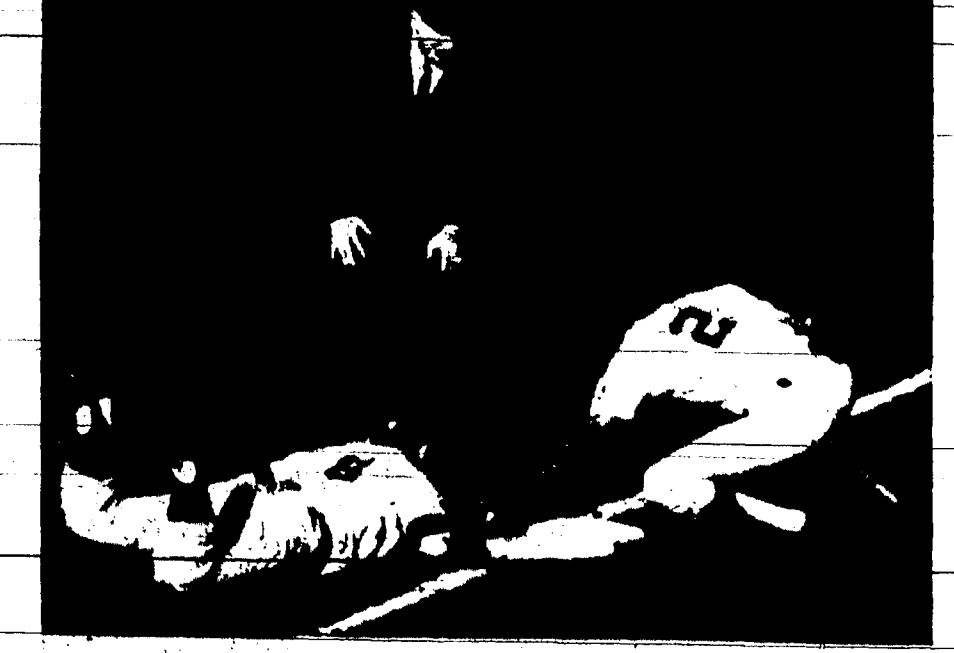

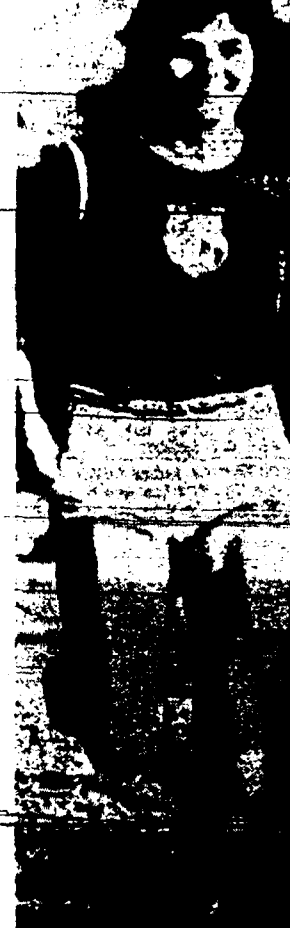

Detroit's Denny McLain didn't believe teammates Dave Wickersham and Hank Aguirre who complained after Sunday's doubleheader in Chicago that the balls were cold and heavy. Then McLain pitched Monday night in a 2-0 White Sox victory and announced solemnly afterwards, "The balls were cold and heavy."

Bragan, who said that his pitchers got away with throwing 75-to-80 spitters in a 9-2 loss against the Giants Friday night, accused Perry of throwing a super-splitter.

"He was throwing those spitters," said Bragan. "One of them rolled to the infield and Jo Jo (White, Braves' third base coach) picked it up. There was a spot of slick-um on it. Jo Jo

said the ball was almost sticking to his finger."

Bragan theorized that Perry may have had benzoin, a resin compound used to treat blisters, in his glove and was spitting into it to make it adhere to the ball.

Perry denied the charge "Bragan might say anything. You know how he is," the pitcher said.

Johnson, who pitched a six-hitter for his 12th victory and was at bat when White picked up the ball, was convinced that Perry was using a super-illegal pitch.

Pinch hitter Jesse Gonder delivered a bases-loaded double, driving in three runs as Milwaukee scored all its runs in the fourth inning. Willie Mays hit his 25th home run for the Giants.

Little Can Be Done in Cold Baseball Row

Joe Cronin dispatched his umpire-in-chief, Cal Hubbard, on an inspection tour to determine at what temperatures baseballs were being stored following complaints from several Tiger players that the White Sox were providing frozen baseballs in Sunday's doubleheader.

Umpire Ed Hurley admitted the baseballs were cold but dismissed the matter, saying they might have been stored near an air conditioner.

Berlin Mayor Welcomes U. S. Determination in Viet Nam

BONN, Germany (AP) — Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin, making his second bid to head West Germany's government, welcomed American determination to stay in Viet Nam as strengthening the guarantee for his divided city.

"President Johnson has said that an American withdrawal from Viet Nam would mean to all its friends that its security guarantees were not to be taken seriously," he said. "You know, I'm not one of those people who want the Americans to tell us every day that they will stand by us. I have faith in the statements of American presidents."

"The Federal Republic and

above all West Berlin are dependent for their free existence on the commitment of the United States."

Brandt voiced his view Tuesday in an interview with The Associated Press.

Brandt wants his country to take a bigger role in world affairs, but he says it is not yet ready to support that role with troops.

LAUNCHED
VANDENBERG AFB, Calif. (UPI)—A satellite employing an Atlas-Agena booster combination was launched Tuesday from this base by the Air Force.

"I think that the United States expects us to step forward politically in a more grownup way, and that is what we feel too. It's a self-contradiction that we, as the third-greatest industrial nation in the world, should always be peering around furtively to see if other people are looking kindly or mean. We can't keep on indefinitely being an economic giant and a political dwarf at the same time," Brandt said.

But when it comes to backing up this ambition with troops, Brandt, a Social Democrat, is as cautious as the government of Chancellor Ludwig Erhard that he wants to replace in the Sept.

election.

"As everybody in the world knows," he explained, "our contribution can only be a modest one. Because of the division of Germany we do not belong to the United Nations, but there can be no doubt of our moral support."

Brandt backed efforts to halt the spread of nuclear weapons. He also said something could be worked out to give his country say in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization nuclear strategy.

On other issues, Brandt made

these points:

Policy toward the United States — "We will never forget that it was the American government and the American people who first offered us the hand of reconciliation. Beyond that, Atlantic and European solidarity, especially in defense questions, would remain the central point of policy for a government led by Social Democrats."

Policy toward Moscow — "I have said that we would begin our foreign policy by working out the basis of a peace treaty, getting the agreement of our friends and then starting talks with all concerned, and without

illusions. We have diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union. They have to be used and that takes a certain readiness on both sides."

Raise Predicted
WASHINGTON (AP)—The \$3 monthly premium for the optional doctor-bill coverage in the new health care plan for the aged probably will have to be raised within a few years.

Undersecretary of Welfare Wilbur J. Cohen made that prediction Tuesday but added he would hope the increase will be small.
