

## Second Try Seen On Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Everett M. Dirksen says he will try again for Senate approval of his constitutional amendment on legislative reapportionment, despite Wednesday's defeat.

The margin of defeat — seven votes short of the requisite two-thirds majority — was greater than had been expected. But when the Senate Republican leader was asked whether he was giving up, he replied, "A no."

He said his next attempt might be to substitute his amendment to the Supreme Court's ruling that reapportionment must be apportioned wholly by population, for an administration bill to repeal the anti-Sitz provision of the Hartley Act.

Dirksen's proposed amendment would permit apportionment of one house to take geographical and political subdivisions as well as population into account if the people of a state approved in a referendum.

Sens. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., Joseph D. Tydings, D-Md., and William Proxmire, D-Wis., all leaders of the opposition — predicted any effort to revive it would be beaten even more decisively.

On the showdown vote, after three weeks of debate, the tally was 57 for Dirksen's proposal and 39 against. Constitutional amendments require a two-thirds majority.

Voting for the amendment were 29 Republicans and 28 Democrats. Voting against it were 39 Democrats and 3 Republicans.

## Extended Life Span Is Goal Of Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson announced today a goal of adding five years to life expectancy of the average American within the next decade.

Signing into law a bill extending for three years federal grants for immunization against contagious diseases, Johnson said the administration is seeking "very ambitious but attainable and realistic goals" for improving the life of Americans.

He named one of them as the extension of life expectancy from 70 to 75 years.

The bill he signed will provide \$33 million in federal grants over four years for mass immunization programs against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and measles.

## Premier Is Asked to Keep Position

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Premier George Athanasiadis has resigned today after his defeat in a stormy parliamentary vote of confidence. In an expected move, King Constantine asked him to remain in office pending a solution of Greece's political crisis.

Most observers had thought the king would accept the resignation immediately and name a new premier. His request to Athanasiadis, however, to remain in office temporarily indicated the king was undecided on his next step.

Before his overthrow in Parliament early today, Athanasiadis suggested that Constantine call the leaders of all political parties together to discuss the crisis.

The outgoing premier said the king had decided not to call a council of the party leaders but to consult with them individually.

## Fallout Shelter West of T.F. To Undergo Final Inspection

An emergency electrical generator and fallout shelter unit, located at the KTFI transmitter site and one-half miles west of Twin Falls, will undergo final inspection at 7 p.m. Thursday by the Army Corps of Engineers.

The unit is one of a series of similar units being installed throughout the United States by radio stations with generators provided by the Corps of Engineers within budgets and specifications provided by the military.

The purpose of the installation is to provide instant communication in time of national emergency and units are being installed in all key areas, installations already having been completed in Boise and Pocatello

## Aviation Fuel Dump Hit by Reds

SAYGON, South Viet-Nam (AP) — A Viet Cong attack on a big aviation fuel dump near the Da Nang Air Base will not seriously affect U.S. air strikes, an American military spokesman said today.

Military authorities said the hit-and-run guerrillas destroyed two of the nine storage tanks in the complex early today and heavily damaged two others with an estimated loss of one million gallons of fuel.

All fuel for jets and propeller-driven planes operating from the big Da Nang base comes in by ocean-going tanker and is transferred to the harbor-side storage complex operated by Easoo Standard East. It is stored there until railroad cars transfer it to the base 10 miles to the southwest.

Large fuel dumps are located at the air base, however. The spokesman said it is believed they contain enough for immediate fuel needs.

An eyewitness said Viet Cong commandos opened their attack about 1 a.m., inflicting heavy casualties with mortar fire on a government outpost protecting the storage complex.

## Devastation Returns to 2-State Area

Devastation returned Wednesday to the Iowa-Illinois area that was hard hit by spring floods. This time it was wind, rain and hail that caused an estimated \$1 million crop damage.

The storm lashed the area of Davenport in Iowa and Rock Island, Moline and East Moline across the Mississippi River in Illinois. This was the same area that was ravaged by Mississippi River floods in spring.

Farm communities in Mercer County, Ill., particularly were hard hit and extensive crop loss also was reported in Warren, Rock Island, and Henderson counties. The \$1-million damage estimated was based on reports of farm advisers in the four counties. Damage was mostly to the corn and tomato crops. The hail — in some areas — was as large as hen's eggs. An Andalusia, Ill., farmer said the pelting hail cost him 1,000 bushels of tomatoes.

In Davenport, Iowa, Black Hawk Creek overflowed its banks and flooded homes in western sections of the city. Davenport measured almost four inches of rain which caused flash flooding in a 15-square-block area of the Garden Grove addition. Amphibious vehicles were sent to help evacuate several families. In some places the water rose to the tops of automobiles.

## Woman Is Appointed to High VA Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House announced today the appointment of Irene Parsons as assistant administrator for personnel of the Veterans Administration, and said she will assume the highest government personnel post held by a woman.

Press secretary Bill D. Moyers said Miss Parsons was chosen by Veteran's Administrator William S. Driver in response to President Johnson's call for the appointment of qualified women to top government positions.

In the \$22,000-a-year post, she will be the top-ranking woman in the VA, the government's third largest agency.

## Twin Falls School District To Get Youth Corps Project

Sen. Frank Church announced Wednesday the U.S. Department of Labor approved a neighborhood Youth Corps project sponsored by Twin Falls School District No. 411.

The project, which Supt. Ernest Ragland said was applied for about two months ago, will provide work experience opportunities for 35 in-school enrollees.

The federal government will provide \$24,080 of the \$28,487 project will cost, with the school district providing the balance.

The approved project will give students between 16 and 21 years of age an opportunity to part or full time work to enable them to remain in school and obtain work experience.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Two Northwest educators disagreed today at the Western Interstate Water Conference about whether the Columbia Basin has any surplus water for the arid Southwest. Marion E. Marts, vice provost and professor of geography at the University of Washington, said at the opening session of the two-day meeting that the Columbia Basin has enough water. But James H. Jensen, president of Oregon State University, said the states in the basin should study their future water needs before agreeing to any diversion proposal.

High price in the Suffolk-Hampshire yearling class was a pen of five consigned by T. B. Burton, Cambridge, sold to Bill Brockman, Murtaugh, for \$135 a head.

They'll be watching dances performed by their ancestors generations before the white man appeared on the scene and which are being reserved by the Smokis—a group composed entirely of whites.

## Residential Area Trailers May Be Used for Storage

Frank H. Feldman, a member of the Twin Falls City Commission, reported Wednesday night that the city's trailer parking ordinance has been amended to allow residents of six districts to park trailer houses on the rear of their lots for storage purposes, instead of occupancy purposes, as stated in an article in Wednesday's Times-News.

The ordinance refers to residents of R-L, R-M, R-P, C-L, C-C and C-G districts.

However, trailer houses located in industrial districts may be used as dwellings if zoning ordinance and building code requirements are met.

### Law Officers Beaten by Teen-Agers

CASPER, Wyo. (UPI)—An estimated 100 teen-agers beat three law enforcement officers unconscious with chains and hammers Wednesday night during a two-hour riot at the Central Wyoming Fair and Rodeo.

Undersheriff Bill Romer said the riot started at a dance pavilion called "Teensville" when Casper police Sgt. William Claxton, 35, tried to break up a fight between several youths.

Romer said Claxton was mobbed by up to 35 other teen-agers and knocked unconscious before Natrona County deputy Mike Johnson and state highway patrolman Gil Fletcher, both about 27, could rescue him.

The youths then turned on Johnson and Fletcher. They also were sent sprawling unconscious to the dance floor.

The three officers were taken to Natrona County Memorial Hospital. The extent of their injuries were not immediately determined.

Romer said the youths, using knives, hammers, chains and beer can openers as weapons, continued to riot until shortly after midnight when they were dispersed by more than 20 sheriff deputies, highway patrolmen and Casper policemen.

Romer said six youths were arrested and more arrests were expected during the morning. He said he was scheduled to meet with members of the board of the fair and rodeo at 11 a.m. to decide what further action would be taken.

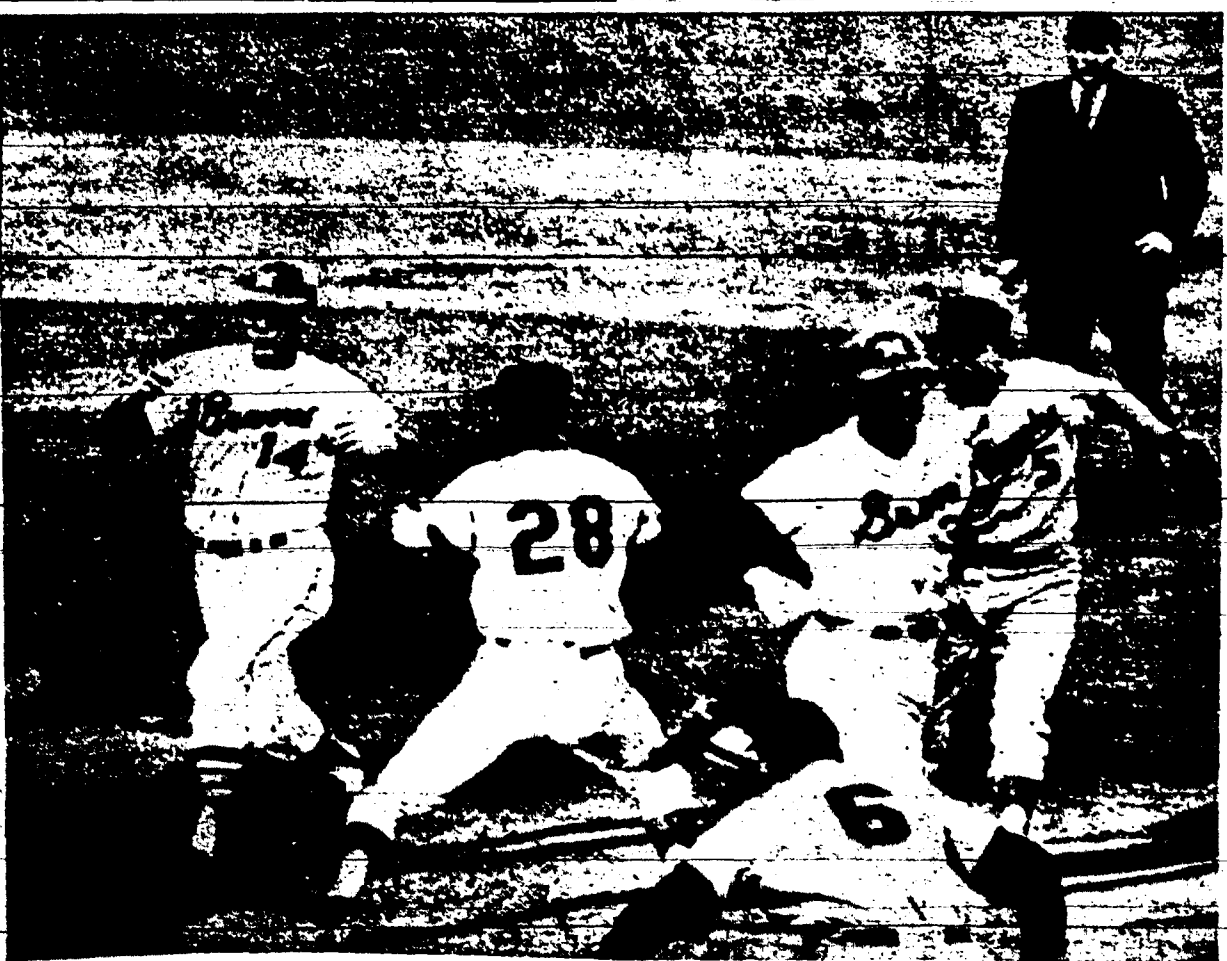

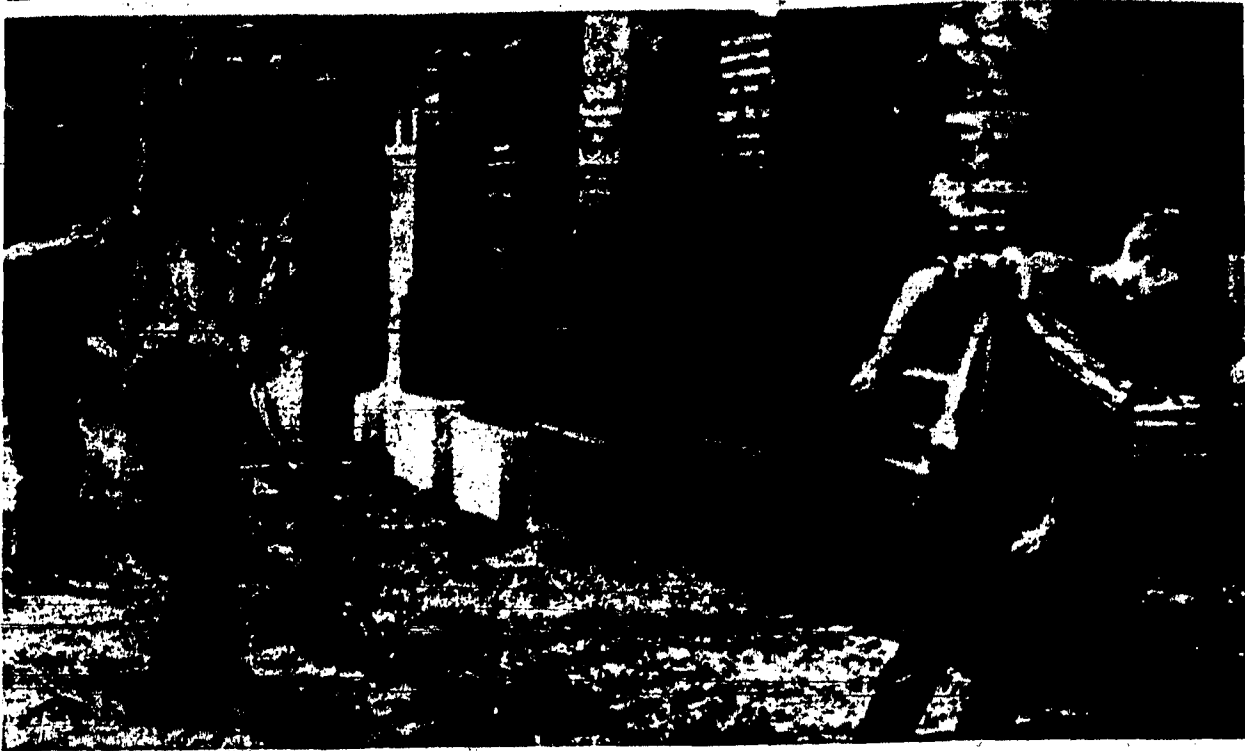

### Western Allies Watching for Barge Interference by Reds

BERLIN (UPI) — The West ern allies are watching carefully for further Communist interference with Berlin barge traffic.

They do not think the isolated city faces an East German campaign to harass supply links to the West.

But it always pays to be a bit wary here when anything happens on the city's lifeline. It might not mean anything but you never can be sure.

The East Germans off and on have been halting barge traffic to and from Berlin, at times for as long as 10 hours at a stretch.

They gave as a reason military maneuvers.

But the recent interruptions came on the heels of East German repudiation of barge permits issued under a Western allied — Soviet occupation agreement.

On July 1 the East Germans began to issue their own permits for barges traveling to and from Berlin and no longer

accepted the old occupation permits.

This in a sense represented an East German claim to control the traffic and a rejection of any Western allied say in the barge traffic that brings in one-third of West Berlin's supplies.

Some, taking the two actions together, considered the interruption of barge traffic a demonstration of East German's power to harass the city's lifelines.

They reasoned the Communists could halt traffic at any time under the pretext of maneuvers.

The city would be in a pretty fix indeed if the Communists used such a tactic.

But the Western allies were confident the East Germans had nothing up their sleeve and the city faced no immediate threat.

"Immediate" was the key word. It would be foolish to predict Berlin would stay quiet for long.

### Candidate List Looks Like Abridged Version of "Demo Party Who's Who"

BY RICHARD CHARNOCK

BOISE (UPI) — Listing of political candidates for governor is beginning to look like an abridged version of "Who's Who in the Democratic Party in Idaho."

So far at least 13 men have been mentioned at one time or another as possible candidates for the party nomination. They range from a former governor to party leaders, a labor leader, legislators and other office-holders, and also-rans of past elections.

To date, however, two have announced they will seek the party's blessing and another has indicated serious consideration of running for the nomination.

Officially off and running are State Sen. William J. Dee of Grangeville, a conservative, anti sales tax attorney, and former Atty. Gen. Frank L. Benson, now a Jerome school teacher.

At the starting line is State Sen. Cecil Andrus of Orofino, a 33-year-old insurance man who recently has been barnstorming the state talking to Democratic groups.

Others mentioned to date include J. Tim Brennan, Boise, managing director of the Idaho Retailers Association and unsuccessful party nominee for Congress in 1958; Darrell Dorman, Boise, state president of the AFL-CIO; State Democratic chairman Lloyd Walker, Twin Falls; State Sen. Ray Rigby, Rexburg; Interior Undersecretary John Carver Jr., formerly of Pocatello; John Walters, Boise, a former party chairman; H. Max Hanson, Boise, Idaho farmers' home administration

director; Charles Herndon, a Salmon attorney; Secretary of State Arnold Williams, and State Auditor Joe R. Williams.

Brennan, 34, is reported to have discussed the possibility of running for the nomination but says he has "no plans to do so at present."

Dorman admits he has considered the possibility but adds "not enough to announce" his candidacy. The sales tax controversy could rule him out, particularly because of organized labor's past stands against such taxation.

#### Farm's Value

#### To Hospital Is Questioned

IDAHO FALLS (AP)—Changing social conditions have caused the Idaho State Board of Health to take another look at the farming operation of State Hospital South in Blackfoot.

Dr. Cecil G. Stillinger, in a letter read during a board meeting in Idaho Falls Wednesday, said the therapeutic value of farming has diminished in the last several years.

He said that when the hospital was established in 1886 farming was a natural occupation of most of the patients. He said it helped by producing much of the food needed by the hospital.

But Dr. Stillinger said the patients no longer come from farm families and the therapy of farming was questionable. The board took no official action on his letter.

Walker's intentions still are unknown. Besides the governorship he also has been mentioned as a possible candidate for U.S. Senator next year. Former Congressman Ralph Harding, however, is trying to line up the senatorial nomination for himself and without opposition.

Rigby was considered one of the outstanding freshman legislators this year but some political observers believe he needs more seasoning and exposure to the public.

Friends of Carver say he has had a long-standing ambition to become governor of Idaho. He's been in Washington, D.C., for several years, however, and some sources doubt he will give up his Interior Dept. post to come home and run.

Walters tried unsuccessfully to win the nomination in 1962. He has a lot of friends, though, who would like to see him try again.

Hanson lost the nomination in 1958 by a narrow margin to A. M. Derr, then of Clark Fork. He nearly ran in 1962 and still might next year.

Herndon was the next highest vote-getter in the party primary last time to Vernon K. Smith, the Democratic nominee. He hasn't ruled himself out of next year's race.

Arnold Williams, 67, a former legislator and lieutenant governor, served for a year as governor in the mid 40's when Charles Gossett resigned to take a senatorial appointment. He's now finishing his second term as secretary of state. He's indicated interest in becoming governor again but a recent heart attack may have scuttled

that as well as a third-term bid for his present post.

Joe Williams, a former acting postmaster of Boise, is completing his second term as auditor. He's allowed his name to be mentioned for governor but those close to him say he intends to seek re-election to his present job.

Echoes — from the hustings: State Rep. Arvil Millar, R-Bingham, has changed his mind about running for the GOP nomination for governor. He's interested, however, in the lieutenant governorship. Friends of House Speaker Pete T. Carrara, R-Blaine, would like to see him try for lieutenant governor, too, while Sen. Arthur Murphy, D-Shoshone, has shown interest in the lieutenant governorship. If incumbent William Drevlow doesn't run again there's a move to get prison warden L. E. Clapp to try for the nomination.



# Medicare Provides Nursing Home Care

## Man Pleads Innocent to Faud Charge

TROY, N.Y. (AP) — Norman Briggs, Troy insurance man who disappeared five years ago after diving into a reservoir near here, pleaded innocent Wednesday to charges of child abandonment and insurance fraud.

The case was adjourned until Sept. 8.

Two motions by his lawyer to dismiss the charges were denied by Judge John T. Casey in Rensselaer County Court.

Briggs, 33, father of two, remained free in \$5,000 bail. Briggs' lawyer said, however, that he did not believe the defendant would return to Newcastle, Wyo., where he was working as a cowboy when it became known that he was alive.

His former wife collected approximately \$117,000 in insurance benefits after his disappearance. She later remarried. She has agreed to return the insurance benefits.

Under the Social Security Medicare program, you'll be able to get up to 100 days of care in a nursing home for each "spell of illness."

The first 20 days will be paid for by the government. After that, you must pick up part of the bill—by paying \$5 for each additional day you remain in the nursing home.

This means you can get 20 "free" days in a nursing home for a single illness, plus 80 "cut-rate" days.

Nursing-home benefits will start Jan. 1, 1967—six months after hospital and home-health benefits begin.

To qualify for nursing-home benefits, you must spend at least three days in a hospital and enter the nursing home within 14 days after leaving the hospital.

However, if you have to return to a nursing home after discharge you may do so without provided you re-enter the same nursing home, or get into another one, within 14 days.

In any event your doctor must certify (and recertify at intervals specified by the government) that you need skilled nursing care for the same condition which was being treated in the hospital.

(If a new ailment develops while you are in the nursing home, that will be covered by Medicare provided you still were being treated for the original illness at the time.)

As explained in the previous article, a "spell of illness" begins the day you enter a hospital or a nursing home and ends after you have been outside a hospital and nursing home for 60 days.

In the nursing home, you are entitled to:

Bed and board in a semi-private room limited to four patients (though a doctor may order a private room "for medical reasons").

Nursing care. Physical, occupational and speech therapy.

Services of medical social workers.

Drugs and appliances usually furnished at patients.

Services of interns and residents attached to hospitals that have a working agreement with the nursing home.

All nursing homes won't be covered.

In fact, most facilities now called nursing homes won't qualify unless they raise their standards or change their method of operation.

Actually, the law says you may go to an "extended-care facility"—not a plain "nursing home." Thus, institutions which offer only "custodial care" (such as old folks' homes) are excluded.

Under the law, the "facility" must be "primarily engaged" in providing "skilled nursing care and related services" or "rehabilitation services." This could be a nursing home, or a hospital wing, or a special section of an old folks' home.

(Christian Science Nursing Homes are excluded. On the other hand Christian Science sanitariums may give up to 120 days of care per stay, whereas the limit on regular hospital care is 90 days.)

Rules governing nursing home services must be drawn with the help of a professional medical group including at least one physician and one registered nurse. And a physician, registered nurse or medical staff must be responsible for carrying them out.

At least one registered nurse

must be employed full time (though not around the clock). And adequate nursing service (which may include practical nurses) must be provided at all times.

Every patient in the nursing home must be under a physician's supervision, and a doctor must always be "available" for

emergency care. The home also must keep proper records on all patients and have "appropriate" rules for dispensing drugs.

Generally, the home must be licensed or approved by the state. It also must have a written agreement, governing patient transfers, with at least one hospital that has signed up for the Medicare program (although a state may ask that this requirement be waived "in the public interest" if a home tried "in good faith" to negotiate such a "transfer agreement" but couldn't get a hospital to go along).

Above all, the nursing home must have a "utilization review plan" under which a physician-controlled committee must make sure patients aren't admitted needlessly, kept in longer than they should be or given unnecessary treatment.

The driver, Milford Lacy, 59, Indianapolis, was taken to Methodist Hospital, where he was reported in good condition.

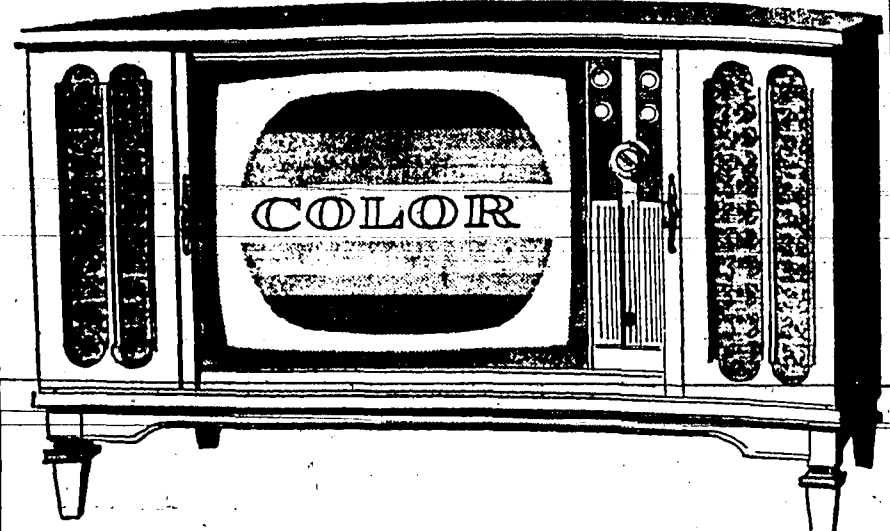
