### Water-Land Vehicle Is Inaugurated

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Air travel comes down to earth in a new way in the U.S. in a well-ventilated, air-conditioned, comfortable, and safe mode today of commercial passenger service starting with a "squirt" machine that flies over water or land on a thin cushion of air.

Dubbed the ACV — air cushion vehicle — it carries up to 15 passengers and a pilot at speeds up to 80 miles an hour.

Operated by San Francisco-Oakland Helicopter Airlines, two machines will fly different daily routes between Oakland Airport, San Francisco and San Francisco International Airport at about 50 to 60 miles an hour.

Known as the "Hovercraft," the ACV is powered by a 1,000-horsepower marine turbine engine that creates the cushion of air on which the ACV rides.

The horizontally ducted fan is driven downward and the cushioned down draft is contained directly under the machine by a skirt. Another fan, a vertical propeller at the rear, pushes the ACV along. In service the ACV will cruise at 45 to 55 miles an hour.

The 70-foot craft hovers about four feet above the water or ground on the air cushion.

### Nevada Fire Believed Controlled

WENDOVER, Nev. (AP) — A grass and forest fire on 10,700-acre Pilot Peak, near the Utah border north of Wendover, was believed under control today, the Bureau of Land Management said.

Although the size of the fire was estimated at more than 1,000 acres, the area burned had not been accurately mapped.

Some crews probably would be relieved during the day while others would mop up remaining traces of fire, a bureau spokesman at fire headquarters in Elko said.

More than 225 men fought the blaze, which broke out Sunday afternoon on the north and northeast sides of the rugged mountain. Included were 130 Indians from Pocatello, Idaho and Owyhee, Nev.

### Steel Frame Of Building Collapses

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Tons of steel girders crashed to the ground as a section of a new federal building under construction in downtown Jacksonville collapsed during a severe thunderstorm and high winds Monday.

Some of the steel girders fell across Bay Street, blocking the major traffic artery.

A parked car and station wagon were crushed and three others damaged, but the only injury reported was to a bystander who had a cut on one hand from flying debris.

The 11-story \$7-million building was nearing the construction stage where the steel framework would have been complete.

The framework on the west end that fell was five stories high.

## 3 Charged in Shooting to Stand Trial

He is one of three members of the Ku Klux Klan indicted for murder in the slaying of Mrs. Luzzo, 39, who was ferrying people between Montgomery and Selma the night of March 25 following the end of the 50-mile Selma-to-Montgomery, civil rights march.

The other men accused are Eugene Thomas and William Orville Eaton, both of Bessemer.

Only Wilkins has been tried before. That trial ended May 8 in a hung jury.

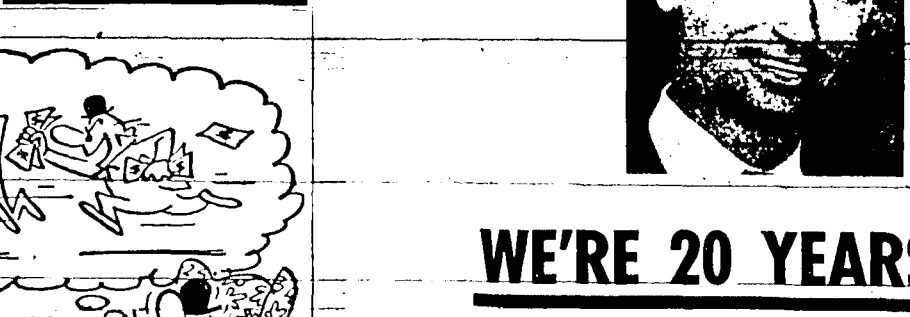

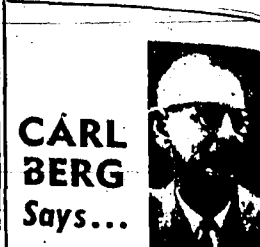

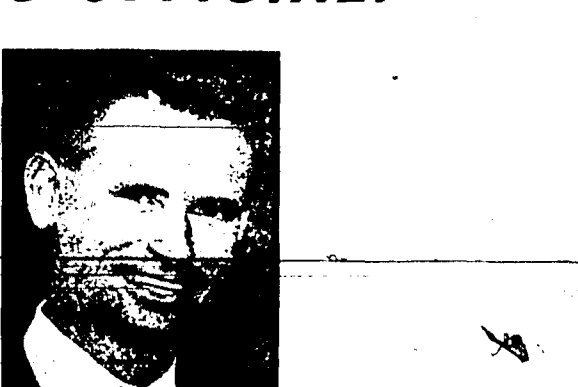

# U.S. Tops Britain For Wightman Cup

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., won a singles tennis victory over her British opponent Monday and clinched the Wightman Cup for the United States for the fifth straight year. The United States finished with a winning margin of 5 matches to 2. In last year's matches at Wimbledon, the U.S. team won by the same score.

It was the 31st time the U.S. has captured the silver cup, emblem of supremacy in women's tennis. Britain has won only six times since the series began in 1923. Its last triumph on U.S. soil was in 1925.

Miss Moffitt delivered the winning blow by downing 26-year-old Elizabeth Starkie of Yorkshire 6-3, 6-2.

In the other singles match Monday, Mrs. Ann Haydon Jones, Britain's southpaw ace, upset Miss Nancy Richey of Dallas 6-4, 9-7. The 26-year-old wife of a British paint company executive also scored the other point for the English team with an opening day singles triumph over Miss Moffitt.

Mrs. Jones, in her ninth Wightman competition, played a steady baseline game, forcing America's No. 1 player to make errors.

Miss Richey's ground game was not as crisp and authoritative as it was when she crushed Miss Starkie 6-1, 6-0 Saturday.

The United States took a 3-1 edge Sunday by sweeping singles and doubles matches. Both teams split Saturday, with each winning a singles match.

The final U.S. point came on a doubles win by Miss Moffitt and Mrs. Karen Susman of San Diego over the English team of Mrs. Jones and Miss Elizabeth Wade, 6-3, 8-6. The American girls were national U.S. doubles champs last year.

Surveying of Hatchery Is Set

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surveying for a \$1 million federal fish hatchery to produce salmon and steelhead trout for the Clearwater River basin in North Idaho is expected to begin in the next two weeks.

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# Retirement Pensions Under Bill Reported

"How much will I get when I retire?"

That's the question uppermost in the minds of millions of Americans who are working their way toward a Social Security pension.

The answer depends on your "average earnings"—how much you make on jobs covered by Social Security, averaged over a certain number of years.

You may average out your earnings from 1937 on (that's when the Social Security law took effect) or from 1951 on.

When you apply for your retirement benefit, the Social Security office helps determine which method gives you the better break. In most cases, averaging earnings from 1951 on results in higher benefits—because pay levels in recent years have

been higher.

In figuring your average, you may count only up to:

- \$3,000 a year earned from 1937 through 1950.
- \$3,600 a year from 1951 through 1954.
- \$4,200 a year from 1955 through 1958.
- 4,500 a year from 1959 through 1965.

Because that's all that has been taxed for Social Security purposes.)

Starting with 1966, you may count the first \$6,600 you earn each year.

You must count a certain number of years to figure your "average earnings." The number depends on when you were born, and whether you are a man or woman.

The minimum is five years. (The accompanying table shows exactly how many YOU must count.)

Your retirement benefit is based on your highest earning years. But if you haven't worked the number required for this purpose, some "zero earnings" years must be included in calculating your average earnings.

For example, take a man born in 1908. As explained in a previous article, he needs 20 "quarters of coverage" to qualify for some retirement benefit. That's five years. But in figuring how much he is to get, he must average out his earnings over 15 years.

Thus if he works only five years under Social Security, he must include 10 years of "zero earnings" to calculate his average. This pushes the average earnings down—and reduces his monthly benefit.

Social Security headquarters in Baltimore keeps a lifetime record of your earnings. You can find out how much is credited to your Social Security account, and how many "quarters of coverage" you have earned, by filling out a postcard form available at any Social Security office.

The smallest retirement benefit a worker may draw at age 65 is now \$44 a month. This is if yearly earnings under Social Security average \$804 or less.

The maximum monthly benefit at age 65 is \$135.90—for a worker with average yearly earnings of \$4,800. This will climb steadily until the year 2000 at which time some workers will qualify for the top retirement benefit of \$168.

You may claim your retire-

ment benefit at age 62. But in that case you get only 80 per cent of what you'd draw at age 65. If you wait until you're 63, you get 86 2/3 per cent. If you start collecting at age 64, you get 93 1/3 per cent.

In short, the sooner you begin drawing your benefit the less you get per month. That's because you'll be getting it for a longer time.

When you draw a retirement benefit, your wife and children also may qualify.

The wife must be at least 62. Or she must be caring for an unmarried child under 18 or a child incapable of self-support due to a disability incurred before age 18.

Such children also are eligible for monthly checks—plus any child under 22 who is still in school. (Coverage for students is retroactive to Jan. 1, 1965.)

The wife gets one-half of the husband's "primary insurance benefit"—what he'd be entitled to at age 65. (But her payment

is reduced, up to 25 per cent, if she claims her benefit before reaching 65 herself.) Each child also is entitled to one-half of the worker's basic benefit.

There is a ceiling, however, on what one family can draw. This now ranges from \$66 to \$309.20 a month, depending on the worker's average yearly earnings. The family maximum will rise in some cases to \$368 in 1967.

A special provision, effective Sept. 1, 1965, pertains to retired workers reaching 72 before 1969. Regardless of average earnings, such a person may draw a flat \$35 monthly benefit if he worked a specified number of months—in some cases, as few as nine—under Social Security at any time since Jan. 1, 1937. And his wife may collect an extra \$17.50 a month if she reaches 72 before 1969.

## Idaho County Included in Voting Bill

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP) — If Elmore County required literacy tests for voter registration, they would be suspended today under the new voting rights law signed by President Johnson last week.

But U. S. Attorney Sylvan Jeppesen said the Idaho county has never required literacy tests and said he doubts the county will be affected by the new voting law.

Elmore County was included with a number of Southern states and counties in Arizona and Maine in which fewer than half the eligible voters were registered Nov. 1, 1964.

The reason for the low registration, Elmore County officials say, is that servicemen at Mountain Home Air Force Base comprise the bulk of the county's population and the servicemen generally vote in home states.

"If the federal government wants to investigate, it's fine with me," said County Clerk Bill Trail. "But it will have to make a public apology afterward as far as I'm concerned."

Effective Sept. 1, 1965, this table need not apply to a retired worker reaching 72 before 1969. Such a person may draw a flat \$35-a-month retirement benefit simply if he has three to five "quarters of coverage"—nine to 15 months of work—credited to his Social Security account.
