It was a good choice of words, for law-lessness is indeed all around us, like the atmosphere.

It is only on those fortunately rare occasions when it wells up into a destructive storm like the rioting in Los Angeles phenomenon, so much so that the great danger is that we may become accustomed to it and accept it as the normal way we discovered that fun could be invented.

It ranges all the way from overt acts of

the civil rights struggle, another justifi-girls. cation has become popular. This is that unjust laws are not laws at all, that in fact allegiance to true law and true jus-

ways of changing them other than violence or public or private disobedience.

The law is, basically, the body of rules derful happy truth. by which we attempt to regulate our daily activities in order to live together in the greatest harmony and to reach the best balance between community stability and individual freedom. In a democracy, the law is, ultimately, the consensus of the majority as to how to achieve this end.

Majority wisdom is not infallible. It is often wrong, and it changes slowly. But in a society operating in an atmosphere of growing contempt for the law, all law -good or bad-eventually loses its mean-

Commission To Study **Land Laws**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers soon will begin combing through thousands of laws and regulations governing the use of federal lands.

Then, 3½ years and \$4 million later, the Public Land Law Review Commission will submit to Congress recommendations for modernizing the mass of laws and regulations that deal with about 500 million acres, mostly in the West.

This mammoth review job will begin after organization of the commission, its professional staff and advisory groups.

The commission has been formed. The director of the project and a public advisory committee have been appointed. Governors of all states and heads of federal departments which deal with lands and resources have been invited for name liaison officers as contacts with the commission.

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

A Danish prince was installed as Greece's king by the 19th century European powers in an attempt to bring some measure of stability to the restless Greeks.

The present king has no Greek blood, and neither did his predecessors. All Greek kings marry foreigners. The 18-year-old Danish princess whom Constantine married last September brought hope of a bright new brought hope of a bright nev era for the royal family.

It almost crased memories of the past 17 years, when Con-stantine's mother, the contro-versial Queen Mother Frederi-ka, reigned along with his fa-ther, the late King Paul.
