### Band Concert Has Local Composition

The city band concert, scheduled for 8 p.m. Thursday in the Twin Falls City Park, will feature an original composition, "The Magnificence of a Roman Sun," by Larry Standley, 466 Maurice St. N.

Standley who is a sophomore at the University of Utah, majoring in music, originally wrote the piece for a symphony orchestra, but has made a special arrangement for the 35-piece municipal band.

"I prefer motion picture music over all other kinds, so I decided to write such a composition," Standley explained.

The young composer says he strived for simplicity and strength to depict the Roman times. He will conduct his work at the concert.

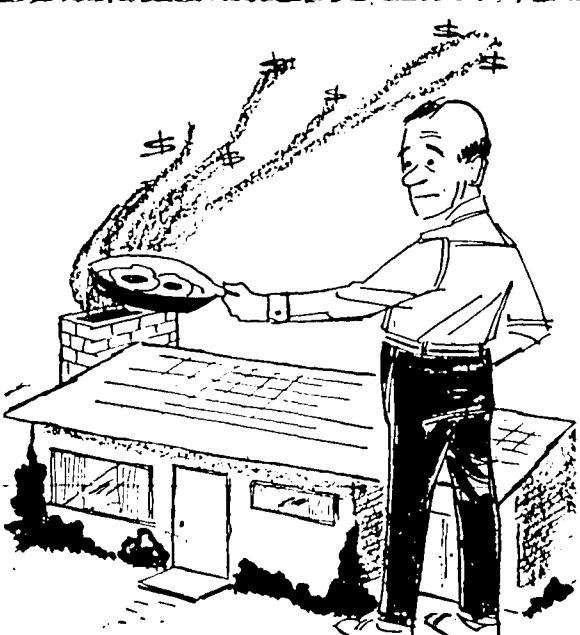
### Skeleton Is Found at Excavation

# Idaho News

**ANNUAL DISPUTE**  
**BOISE (UPI)**—Gov. Robert E. Smylie says he has an "annual dispute" with the state auditor over auditing of liquor dispensary funds.

Auditor Joe R. Williams charged last week the governor or has refused to allow him to audit the liquor books. Williams told the governor in a letter that state law requires that the books be audited by his office annually.

Smylie said the audits are made by the Bureau of Public Accounts.

**BOY SAVED**  
**CALDWELL (AP)**—A 12-year-old girl spotted a boy on the bottom of the Caldwell municipal swimming pool Tuesday and saved his life.

Kay Loonie pulled the boy to the surface in time for a life guard, Bill Givray to revive him by mouth to mouth resuscitation, police said.

The boy, 7-year-old Bodie Clayton, was later reported in good condition at a Caldwell hospital.

**MERIT SCHOLAR**  
**CALDWELL (AP)**—An Idaho student was announced Wednesday as a merit scholar by the National Merit Scholarship Corp., which last April listed more than 1,900 scholarship winners.

Added to the list was Ellen Jean Eldredge, Caldwell. She was awarded a four year scholarship and will attend the University of Washington, majoring in liberal arts.

**EXECUTIVES TO SPEAK**  
**WALLACE, Idaho (AP)**—Two northern Idaho mining executives are on the program for the 1965 Mining Show sponsored by the American Mining Congress in Las Vegas, Nev., Oct. 11-14.

William H. Love, vice president and general manager of Hecla Mining Co., of Wallace, Idaho, will address a meeting on Oct. 12. He is to discuss his firm's solution of an excess water problem at the Ruby Hill project in Eureka, Nev.

On Oct. 14, Charles E. Schwab, president of the Bunker Hill Co. of Kellogg, Idaho, will be a panelist during a mineral educational discussion.

**SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED**  
**CALDWELL (AP)**—Awarding of a scholarship to Steve Garman, Caldwell High School athlete, to the University of Idaho was announced Wednesday by the Boise chapter of the Idaho Vandal Boosters.

The scholarship is given annually in memory of Ralph Breshears, a former University of Idaho football player and Boise businessman. The formal presentation to Garman will be made during halftime ceremonies at the Idaho-Oregon State football game in Boise Oct. 16.

**DAMAGE REPORTED**  
**POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)**—Fire destroyed one apartment's interior and damaged two others in Pocatello's downtown area Monday night.

A pan of grease left on the stove apparently ignited the fire, officials said.

Firemen fought the blaze for about 30 minutes.

**COOPERATION URGED**  
**BONNERS FERRY (UPI)**—Gov. Robert E. Smylie told a convention of the Idaho Association of Commissioners and Clerks Wednesday there needs to be more cooperation between state and local governments.

Smylie said the major continuing job of all state governments may well be that of vigorous political communities at the county and city level.

He suggested a professional staff that could devote full time to fostering state and local cooperation.

"In spite of the pressing need for such staffs in every state in the union, I know of no state that has one that is adequately manned and financed," Smylie said.

**Visit to Saigon Slated by Nixon**  
**NEW YORK (AP)**—Richard M. Nixon will visit Viet Nam during a business trip to the Far East, said a spokesman for the former vice president.

Nixon, who said bombing raids should be stepped up against North Viet Nam, will stop at Saigon.

He was scheduled to leave today for Tokyo.

**LOW BID**  
**BOISE (UPI)**—Allied Paving Corp., Idaho Falls, has submitted the apparent low bid for surfacing more than 13 miles of Interstate 80N in Payette County.

Allied's bid of \$416,707 was the lowest of eight opened by the Idaho Department of Highways. The highway is to be surfaced from the Oregon State line to its junction with U.S. 30.

**NO PLANS**  
**COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)**—The village of Rathdrum told the State Health Department today it has no immediate plans for improvements of its domestic water supply despite evidence that the city reservoir is contaminated.

Village Board Chairman W.H. Howell told a hearing board at Coeur d'Alene that improvements will be made within five years but that the village lacks funds to take action this year.

Howell also submitted a petition signed by 174 Rathdrum residents opposing plans to chlorinate the village water supply.

**YOUTH KILLED**  
**CALDWELL (UPI)**—Larry N. Leavitt, 20, Marsing, was killed early Wednesday in a single car accident east of town.

Officers said Leavitt was a passenger in a car driven by Leo James Anderson, 20, when the car rolled off the road at the intersection of Kimball and Uslick roads.

Another passenger, James Sweeney, 19, also of Marsing, escaped injury.

**DISTRICT URGED**  
**POCATELLO (AP)**—Bannock County officials have invited citizens dissatisfied with governmental progress on flood control to form their own flood control district.

But the county commissioners and County Attorney James Green said they doubted such an independent district could make better progress than existing agencies have.

The invitation came into response to demands by some river residents, including some who have recently organized, for immediate action.

**ASSISTANT NAMED**  
**BOISE (UPI)**—Idaho State University assistant dean for women, Mrs. Janell Burke Jr., has been named to the new Idaho Commission of Status of Women.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie announced the appointment Tuesday. He announced the appointment of other commission members last week.

**Peace Talks On Viet Nam Are Granted**  
**UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)**—U. S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg has invited Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. to talk with him about peace in Viet Nam, a spokesman announced Tuesday.

Goldberg, new head of the American U.N. delegation, has also granted "peace interviews" for Thursday afternoon to Norman Thomas, New York City Socialist leader; and for Friday afternoon to a delegation from the National Council of Churches, the spokesman said.

King, Thomas and some churchmen have criticized U.S. Viet Nam policy.

"As you know," the spokesman said, "Dr. King expressed interest in Viet Nam and a possibility of his being useful in advancing the cause of peace and peace negotiations, so the ambassador is eager to see what's on his mind."

**\$10,000 Owed To Soldier As Back Pay**  
**EL PASO, Tex. (UPI)**—Sgt. Isaac Camacho, the only American soldier to escape Viet Cong captivity, went to the Ft. Bliss Finance Office Tuesday to check up on the \$10,000 or more the Army owes him for the 20 months he was a prisoner.

As a sergeant first class, Camacho has at least \$500 per month coming to him. But the figure varies upward according to pay grade and length of service.

That would mean Camacho earned at least \$10,000 during the 20 months he spent fighting off malaria behind bars as a prisoner of the Viet Cong.

Capt. J. Blackwell at the Ft. Bliss Finance Office said he was waiting for word from Department of Army headquarters before he could say exactly what the total amount of back pay would come to.

Camacho was in El Paso on a month's leave trying to regain the 45 pounds he lost during those malaria-racked months during which he received constant threats of death.

**Pantless Driver**  
**MILAN, Italy (UPI)** Bus driver Angelo Ferruzo splashed a group of people waiting at a stop on a rain-soaked street Tuesday.

The infuriated victims dragged him from the bus and pulled off his pants. The hapless driver returned to the terminal in his underwear.

**Accusations by Thailand Made**  
**BANGKOK (AP)**—Thailand's deputy premier accused the United States today of shipping World War II vintage equipment to his country while supplying South Viet Nam and Nationalist China with modern weapons.

Prapas Charusathien told newsmen that Maj. Gen. Richard G. Stilwell, new commander of the U.S. military assistance command in Thailand, had promised to look into the matter.

**China Problem Is Unmatched**  
**GENEVA (AP)**—Two U.S. experts say Red China faces a population problem "unmatched elsewhere on earth." They said China may have more than a billion people by 1980.

Irene B. Taeuber of Princeton University and Leo A. Orleans of the National Science Foundation made the report Tuesday to a meeting of 190 experts from 36 nations attending the first conference on family planning. It is sponsored by the Population Council and the Ford Foundation.

**Helicopter Crashes on Mountain**  
**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — A small helicopter under contract to the U.S. Forest Service crashed on 9,000-foot Bountiful Peak east of Bountiful Tuesday.

Forest Service officials said apparently none of the three persons aboard was injured seriously.

Henry Ketchie, deputy Wataatch National Forest supervisor, said the craft was piloted by Larry Daniels, a pilot for Aerial Applicators, a Salt Lake City firm.

Ketchie said others in the craft were Don Howell, assistant ranger of the Bountiful District, and Wayne Miller, a Forest Service helicopter foreman from Salt Lake City.

Ketchie said that the craft crashed near a road on the peak and the injured were taken to a hospital by ambulance. He said radio communication was maintained with the craft after the crash and that all men appeared able to walk.

The craft was used for Forest Service fire control operations, Ketchie said.

**Body Found in Tanker Wreck**  
**GENOA, Italy (AP)** — One body was found today in the 20,000-ton Italian liner Angelina Lauro, and firemen were searching through the still burning ship for six more technicians and workers missing and feared dead.

They were among 1,700 workers who were aboard, refitting the former Dutch liner Oranje Tuesday, when a gas container exploded and set flames raging through the holds.

## Polite War On Clothing Is Staged

QUEBEC (AP) — Quebec's city government is waging a polite war on women wearing shorts and other scanty attire in public places.

Police are passing out a pamphlet to underdressed females telling them: "Involuntarily you have committed an infraction of Bylaw 784 concerning decency and good morals. We ask you, as a way of giving our department your best collaboration, to observe our rules, and we thank you for obliging us."

The pamphlet was written with tourists in mind and tells them: "As a stranger to Quebec, it is possible that you are not aware of our municipal regulations." However, police say most of the 100 women warned so far have been natives, not visitors.

A few scanned the pamphlet, then tossed it away "as if they didn't think it important," said Police Chief Gerard Girard.

The chief said that while many citizens have been complaining about underdressed females, no one has been charged yet, "but we will certainly make some examples," he said.

## Doubt Shown In Yemen Peace Pact

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Some diplomats at the United Nations doubt that the Yemen peace pact signed by President Gamal Abdel Nasser and King Faisal will end the civil war in the Arabian peninsula country.

One diplomat recalled the 1963 agreement between the president of the United Arab Republic and Faisal which was supposed to end the Yemeni war but didn't. He predicted new quarrels between the rival Arab leaders.

Another diplomat questioned the ability of Nasser and Faisal to bring peace between the Egyptian-backed Republicans and the Saudi-backed Royalists. He said the three-year-old fighting has turned into tribal warfare and the Republicans are split into pro-Egyptian, pro-Syrian and religious factions.

Neither the Royalists nor the Republicans were represented at the talks between Nasser and Faisal in the Saudi Arabian port of Jidda. Observers in Cairo believed that the Republican government would go along with Nasser, but there was no clue to the reaction of the ousted ruler of Yemen, Imam (king) Mohammed Al-Badr, who is held up in the Yemeni Mountains with tribesmen loyal to his cause.

## Computer Used by New York Police to Spot Law Breakers

NEW YORK (AP) — New York police showed how they are using electronics to spot stolen cars and traffic violators Tuesday — and their computer promptly nailed a housewife.

A patrol car forced Gloria Placente of Jamaica, Queens, to the curb on the Grand Central Parkway.

Four busloads of officials and newsmen, invited to the demonstration by police officials, unloaded on the grassy shoulder to watch.

Mrs. Placente, 34, suddenly cast as the star in a premiere demonstration of Operation Corral, was not pleased. She served a summons for failure to pay a fine on a charge of running a stoplight on May 5, 1964.

"What am I — some kind of criminal?" she asked. "It's a good thing I have steady nerves. You can drop dead from a thing like this."

Mrs. Placente was on her way to the beach as police demonstrated Operation Corral — computer oriented retrieval of auto larcenists.

The system works this way: License numbers of stolen cars and cars of persons who have ignored traffic summonses are stored in the memory drum of a computer at the World's Fair. They number about 196,000.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, former ambassador to South Viet Nam, was picketed by about 100 demonstrators at his hotel Tuesday night and five were arrested.

The pickets immediately went limp and police, up to three to a body, hauled them out of the

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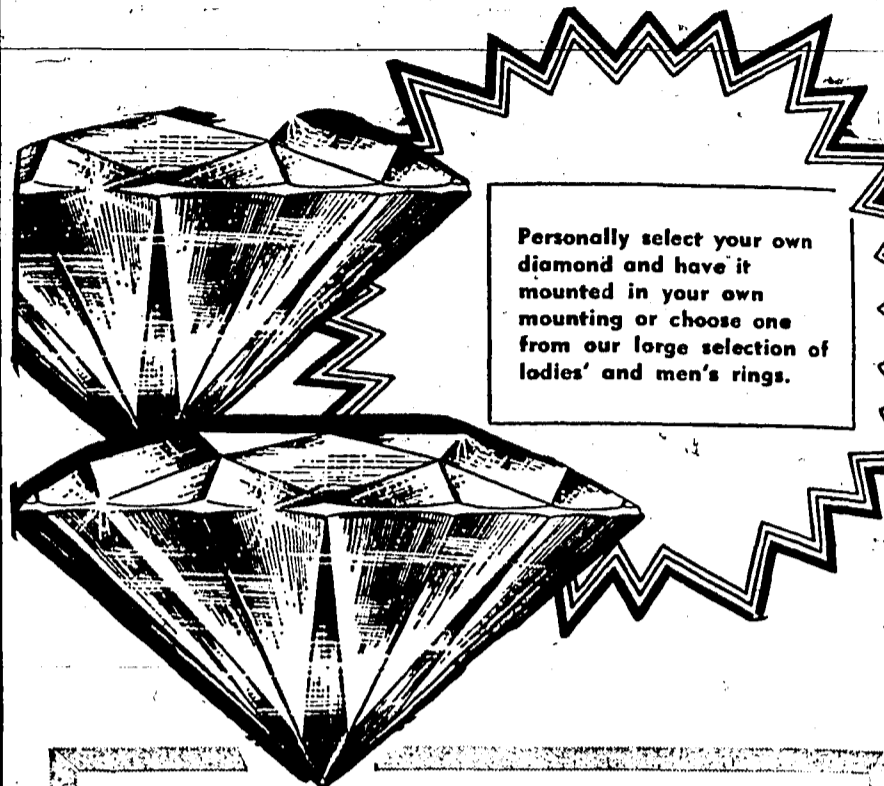
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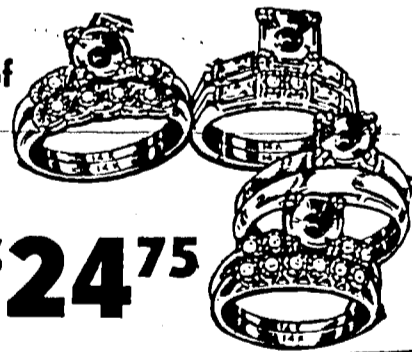

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# Test Plane Crashes, 2 Men Safe

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—The Curtiss-Wright X-19, tri-service aircraft, an experimental plane designed to rise vertically, hover and then fly forward at speeds up to 460 miles an hour, crashed today during its initial test flight at the National Aviation Experimental Facilities Center in nearby Pomona.

Chief test pilot James V. Ryan and project test pilot Bernard J. Hughes parachuted safely from the plane, which crashed in flames in a swamp on the federal reservation about 7:30 a.m. Officials would only say the plane had been in flight approximately 20 minutes and was on its way back to the landing strip when the accident occurred.

Sam Myers, former Associated Press photographer who was on the scene, said: "The plane circled and was ready to land but then it appeared to lose its right motor and then its left one. It was on fire when it crashed in the swamp about six miles from where it was to land."

# Problems in Sealab 2 Delay Test

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) — Safety checks of gear for Sealab 2 are taking far more time than planned, Navy officers say, and it may be Thursday or Friday before divers will be allowed to enter the 12 x 58-foot steel chamber which will be their underwater base for 45 days.

"There are no big problems — just a whole lot of minor ones that have to be solved before we can let the men begin residence at a depth of 210 feet," said Capt. Ray Spenser of the Engineering Applications Division of the Office of Naval Research.

Lowering of Sealab 2 to the bottom 1,000 yards off this Southern California resort, planned since Aug. 15, was delayed Tuesday afternoon by a series of problems that cropped up as piece after piece of auxiliary equipment was checked out.

First there were leaks in a diving bell which will take 10 men teams to and from Sealab for 15 day stays. These were repaired. Then came trouble with air-hose seals and other equipment.

Much of the day was spent practicing lifting the diving bell from the water and swinging it by crane to a decompression chamber on the mother ship, a tricky procedure on a rolling sea and one that must be performed with split-second precision.

# Second Utah Bank Robbed Of \$4,000

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Bank Manager C. G. White told his teller about a \$4,000 bank robbery a day earlier. He said he had never been held up, knocked on wood and felt a gun in his ribs. The gunman fled with \$4,000.

The gunman robbed the house-trailer Cottonwood — Holladay branch of the First Security Bank Tuesday, about 24 hours after two gunmen robbed Granite National Bank. Both are on South Highland Drive.

White, 70, told Salt Lake County deputy sheriffs and FBI

agents a nervous man came into the bank as he was repairing an adding machine and asked him for two blank checks.

White gave him the checks, told him how to fill them out, and the man said: "This is a stickup."

White, 70, told Salt Lake County deputy sheriffs and FBI

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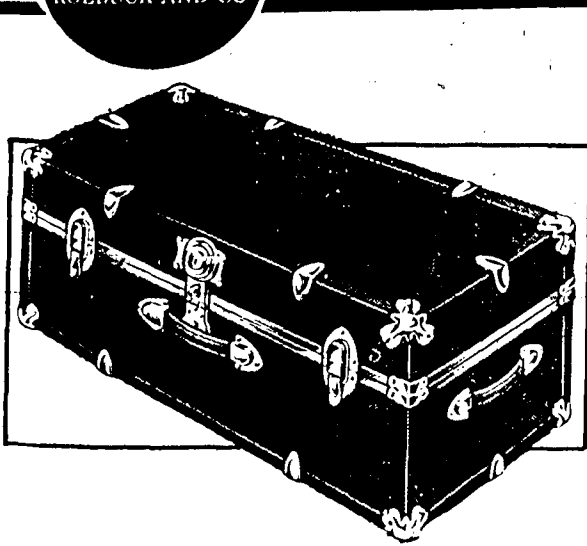
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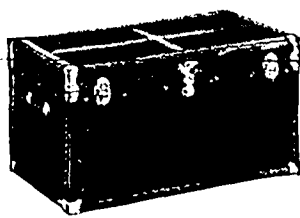

**Figures Given On Electrical Appliances**

By AILEEN SHERWOOD  
NEW YORK — This era of electrical appliance developments, including the toothbrush and knife, gives us all a false impression. Since there are so many new helping hands available, the assumption is that we all have them and know how to operate them.

This isn't true. Industry sales figures reveal millions of homes are without automatic dishwashers, for example (only 11.8 per cent saturation). If you are in the market this year for such a convenience, here are some tips to help you decide on a unit.

The first thing to consider before buying is whether the plumbing lines and electrical service in your house are equipped to handle it. Your local plumbing/electrical contractor can help you decide. Or the dealer or distributor may provide such a service as part of his sales approach.

Sylvia White, as director of consumer relations for Waste King, is as familiar with the workings of a dishwasher as the wash water. She offers these questions to consider when shopping for a dishwasher.

Is the water heater in your home adequate to provide 150 degrees minimum water temperature? If not, does the dishwasher have a booster heater to heat wash and final rinse water?

Is the water pressure supplied to the hose adequate to provide sufficient water to the dishwasher? Or is water pressure so great that a pressure reducer is necessary?

What is the water hardness in your area? Check your local water company for this. If excessively hard (20 grains or more), can it be softened? Are other minerals, such as iron, present in water to an extent that they would interfere with dishwashing results? Can they be treated or conditioned in some way?

What special cycles would you like to use on your dishwasher? Can the dishwasher be loaded easily with your type of dinnerware and utensils? Loading is related to the manner in which water is circulated. Check operating instructions, care and use manual.

Does the unit have a wetting agent dispenser; an automatic detergent cup? Are these easy to use?

Is each dishware rack independently accessible for loading?

How does the dishwasher handle residue left on dishes? Are filter screens, if any, accessible for cleaning?

If you consider a portable unit, should you purchase a true portable or a convertible-portable which can be built in at a later date?

## Russian Women Face Shopping Problems

By JOHN BEST

MOSCOW (AP)—A handsome piece of cloth, bearing distinctly Russian designs, hung on a rack at Moscow's House of Fabrics, eye-catching amidst an array of colorful fabrics.  
The price was forbiddingly high—the equivalent of \$7.02 for one meter, or 39.37 inches. Nevertheless, a Western housewife decided to buy a meter. The material would make a nice cushion cover or card-table cover.

"She was rudely disappointed. It's not possible to buy one meter," said a sales attendant in the cold-snap tones that are the hallmark of Moscow salesgirls. There is only a little less than three meters left so if you took just one meter, there wouldn't be enough for another customer who may wish to make a dress.

"You have to buy all of it or none."  
Obviously she had never heard of a remnant sale. The housewife went without her cover material.

Incidents such as this, repeated in one form or another many times daily, bring home to the observer here the great distance Russia has to travel before it achieves anything like a consumer economy.

Mighty efforts are being made to improve the standards of goods and services. Old Moscow hands say things are much better in this respect than ever before. But an economy that for decades took only the most grudging account of consumer preferences and demands can hardly be changed overnight into one that satisfies them.

The House of Fabrics both symbolizes the efforts that are being made and illustrates that they still leave much to be desired.

Spacious and well-appointed compared to the general run of Moscow retail outlets, it offers a bewildering variety of fabrics and fabric colors, nicely presented.

Muscovites swarm through the store relishing a long-denied opportunity to pick and choose. But the quality of goods in relation to the price is low.

A meter of flannel cotton costs \$2.16. In America it is possible to get the same material—only of better quality—for 49 cents a yard.

The materials bear no signs other than the price; no indication for instance of whether they are washable.

They run heavily to cotton. Most of the cloth is presented in a gaudy color design; true colors are few.

A Moscow housewife bought 2 1/5 meters of a synthetic red cotton for \$6.80 but promptly demanded and got her money back when the piece cut for her turned out to have creases in it.

(This little incident had its reassuring side. There was a time, say Moscow veterans, when consumers took what they were given and were thankful.)

Reflecting the slowly developing drive toward greater consumer satisfaction—is a pattern-cutting service offered by the House of Fabrics. For \$2 to \$3.65 you can get your blouse, skirt, dress or suit cut out at the store, then take the pieces home and sew them together.  
Alternatively, you can take them to the store's workshop, inconveniently located on the other side of Ulininsky Prospect. You go through an underground crosswalk to get there.

A few months ago a Moscow newspaper excitedly reported that as a result of technological innovations and a new incentive plan for tailors, it would be possible to have orders filled with unprecedented speed at the shop, in two to five days.

The result was a monumental run to the shop, which was not equipped to handle it. No contingency plans had been made to hire extra staff.  
The shop is finding it impossible to live up to its quick-work notices, though chief designer R. A. Zinger insisted in an interview that, where necessary, a job can be done in the publicized two days.

## Commission To Study Land Laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers soon will begin combing through thousands of laws and regulations governing the use of federal lands.

Then, 3½ years and \$4 million later, the Public Land Law Review Commission will submit to Congress recommendations for modernizing the mass of laws and regulations that deal with about 500 million acres, mostly in the West.

This mammoth review job will begin after organization of the commission, its professional staff and advisory groups.

The commission has been formed. The director of the project and a public advisory committee have been appointed. Governors of all states and heads of federal departments which deal with lands and resources have been invited to name liaison officers as contacts with the commission.

The project director, Milton A. Pearl, estimated that law books would be searched for an estimated 5,000 statutes, including some over a century old. Estimates of regulations and legal opinions by department lawyers run ever higher.

## High Cost Of War May Force Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John C. Stennis hinted today that the Johnson administration may be forced to cut down its "war on poverty" to help finance the steadily rising U.S. combat effort in the Viet Nam war.

The Mississippi Democrat introduced the administration's \$4.8 billion defense money bill Wednesday in a speech prepared for Senate delivery. He warned that the measure would not see the military through the current fiscal year and that more money would have to be apportioned later.

Previously, Stennis has forecast that before long the Viet Nam war might cost the United States as much as \$14 billion a year.

"In this light," Stennis said, "the Congress and the executive branch must realize that the war on poverty is not the only war in which we are engaged at this time.

"American boys are dying every day in Viet Nam for American ideals that are as important to us as raising the standard of living in local communities."

## \$100 Billion Needed for Mars Trip

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It will take at least \$100 billion to finance a manned U.S. expedition to Mars.

This was the estimate given the Senate Space Committee Tuesday by Dr. Donald F. Hornig, President Johnson's space adviser. He also said it would be at least 10 years before U.S. scientists had enough experience to "begin even to plan intelligently" for such a trip.

"If this estimate (\$100 billion) is anywhere in the right ballpark," Hornig said, "I can only conclude that at this moment there are a number of national objectives that seem more urgent."

## Need for Air Routes Is Described

HOUSTON (UPI)—A governor and a Dallas corporation executive described Tuesday the need for better air transportation between the Southwest and the Pacific Northwest.

Cecil Covington of Dallas, corporate manager of government relations for Texas Instruments, Inc., said his firm spent more than \$1 million in scheduled air transportation last year and was interested in better service.

He and Gov. Jack M. Campbell of New Mexico testified at a hearing of the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) on routes between the Southwest and the Pacific Northwest.

Hearings also have been held in Seattle and Denver, with an Aug. 31 hearing set for New Orleans. The hearing in Houston was expected to end Thursday.

The route question, the last big air route system in the nation in contention, involves competition between cities for approval of certain routes to the Northwest from the Southwest and the competition between 13 airlines for approval of their carriers and types of service.

The airlines will present their proposals in Washington Sept. 8.

## Atlantic Rowing Trip Considered

LONDON (UPI) — David Johnstone, a 37-year-old bachelor, wants to cross the Atlantic Ocean in a rowboat. He placed an ad in Wednesday's London Times for five willing oarsmen to help him.

"Will five forthright oarsmen over 28 join me to plan and engage in second- ever transatlantic rowing voyage?" Johnstone's ad asked.

Johnstone, who says he is a journalist, said that two men rowed the Atlantic in 1897, making the trip in 55 days.

"I want mature men to join me in this venture because it is likely to be physically and psychologically shattering," Johnstone said.

### T. F. School Enrollment Is Expected to Reach 6,184

A total of 6,184 students is expected to be in the classrooms of School District No. 411 Tuesday.

The school district, which is made up of six elementary schools, two junior high schools and one senior high school, will have a slightly increased enrollment over last year.

The breakdown of anticipated enrollments is as follows: Elementary schools, 3,099; junior high schools, 1,549; senior high schools, 1,496; cerebral palsy school, 8, and special education, 47.

Two hundred and forty-seven teaching positions have been filled and 252 persons are under contract, an increase of eight over last year. Assistant School Superintendent Arthur M. Kleinkopf pointed out that the district is short one counselor for grades nine through 12.

Kleinkopf explained the present experience requirements for counselors makes it extremely difficult to find qualified personnel. The requirements for a counselor are a master's degree, in addition to two years of teaching experience in any subject. Kleinkopf also pointed out that with the present accreditation requirements of one counselor

to every 400 students, Twin Falls High School is slowly falling short of the mark.

To alleviate this problem Kleinkopf suggested either raising the counselor-to-student ratio or lowering the counselor's requirements, whereby a bachelor's degree would be required along with the two years of experience.

"The counselor then could be working toward a master's degree while filling a position that is badly needed in today's educational system," said Kleinkopf.

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### Safeguard For Salmon Is Noted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Frank Church of Idaho told the Senate Interior Committee Wednesday passage of his Wild Rivers Bill would help safeguard Idaho salmon runs.

Church told the committee, which has the bill under consideration, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service this week said present runs of steelhead and chinook in the Salmon and Clearwater rivers were worth \$6 million to downstream fishermen.

"The service is confident," Church said; "that if no dams are built on these rivers, the next few years could see the greatly increased sports fishing on both the Salmon and Clearwater."

U. S. Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Clarence F. Pautzke, reported "low" runs during the past two years of salmon at Ice Harbor Dam on the Lower Snake River.

Segments of both the Salmon and Clearwater rivers are named in the bill to establish a National Wild Rivers System which bans the construction of dams and preserves them as "free-flowing" streams.

# Action Is Urged on Legislation

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson Wednesday reaffirmed his determination to push for passage this year of legislation to nullify state right-to-work laws and to overhaul U.S. immigration laws.

At his news conference, the president also called for prompt action by the House on the Senate-passed bill to give the rule to the District of Columbia. The Senate bill is set up in a House committee.

On repeal of section 14-B of the Taft-Hartley law, which permits states to ban the union, Johnson said he "certainly" still considered it was a major legislative goal. The House has passed the bill, but some senators have threatened an adjournment-delaying filibuster against it.

Legislation that would wipe out the old "national origins" system of admitting immigrants to this country has not passed either house of Congress but Johnson said he wants it acted on before this session adjourns.

# Dispute Reported Over Big Piece of Nevada Public Land

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Can the federal Bureau of Land Management, landlord of a huge chunk of Nevada public land, do without 80 acres of Red Rock Canyon?

Thailia Dondero and her Girl Scouts think it can — and that it should.

After nearly a decade of unraveling red tape, the girls claim the bureau has broken its word.

In 1956, Mrs. Donero's Frontier Girl Scout Council filed for 80 acres of grass and pine land in the canyon, 15 miles west of Las Vegas.

"It's beautiful," sighs Mrs. Dondero. "There is a little spring in a little cave, trees, and a big meadow. There's even water cress."

Mrs. Dondero is battling the bureau director for Nevada, J. R. Penny.

"We applied for the deed, paid our \$241, cleared the water rights and mineral rights," she said. "Twice we presented plans and a timetable for development — just like the bureau asked."

"We thought everything was going so well and then they changed their minds. Now we feel the bureau has a moral obligation to give the land to us."

But Penny says that since 1956, the value of the 80 acres has increased from the \$241 to \$80,000.

A bureau subcommittee decided general public interest overshadowed the Girl Scouts' need.

Penny contends the bureau never made a formal commitment to turn over the land to the scouts.

"Now we're appealing to the Department of Interior," says Mrs. Dondero.

The scouts have modest plans for the land.

"It may not sound important, but we have some nice nature trails in mind, some horseback trails, and an amphitheater for skits and plays," she says.

"Mostly, though, we want to teach the girls how to cook out of doors. We can't properly teach outdoor cooking in a crowded city park."

All apparently were trapped in the blast area. Police were unable to reach the buildings because of intense heat.

They had no exact figures on the number of injured from the series of blasts which rumbled throughout the West End section of the city. Explosions were occurring about once every three minutes.

Police ordered all families living within a mile of the plant to evacuate their homes, warning that more explosions could occur later.

H. E. Eaton, plant manager at Du Pont, said the explosions apparently occurred in a building that houses the first step in the neoprene process used at the plant. The process uses acetylene gas.

# Germans Placed

BONN (UPI)—The West German Development Corps, patterned on the American Peace Corps, has placed 178 volunteers in nine countries, it reported Tuesday.

Walter Scheel, minister for economic coordination, released the annual report of the development corps, and said it is considering proposals for a further 150 projects in 50 countries.

# Flying Object Spotted in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A flying saucer?

No, just another unidentified flying object floating along over Salt Lake City at 60,000 feet. But it flooded police telephones with curious calls about it.

The Weather Bureau at Salt Lake City Airport said the Air Force thought it was a weather balloon launched from Fallon, Nev., 500 miles west of here.

# Long Crisis Spreads Shadows Over Future of Monarchies in Greece

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The longer the Greek crisis remains unsolved, the darker the shadows that hover over the monarchy's future in this Mediterranean land with a history of political unrest.

Critics increasingly have been blaming the royal family for creating its own troubles—a typical fuss, which most Greeks love.

The crisis started July 15 and steadily has been turning against the Greek monarchy—just as King Constantine, 25, was attempting to build a more relaxed atmosphere around his palace.

The cause of the sudden turn of events against the young monarch and his Danish-born wife, Queen Anne-Marie, lies deep under the surface and goes back more than a century.

A Danish prince was installed as Greece's king by the 19th century European powers in an attempt to bring some measure of stability to the restless Greeks.

The present king has no Greek blood, and neither did his predecessors. All Greek kings marry foreigners. The 18-year-old Danish princess whom Constantine married last September brought hope of a bright new era for the royal family.

It almost erased memories of the past 17 years, when Constantine's mother, the controversial Queen Mother Frederika, reigned along with his father, the late King Paul.

She has long been a target of left wingers because of her German origin and membership in the Nazi youth movement as a young princess in Germany. She often was accused of mixing in Greek politics and using her personality and charm on politicians for the benefit of the throne.

Rightists accused Frederika of being responsible for creating the political crisis in May 1963 when King Paul forced Constantine Caramanlis to resign as premier. Eventually that crisis brought George Papandreu and his Center Union party into office.

Papandreu and King Constantine argued over armed forces control and the young king fired him.

Many liberals want a republican form of government for this country of 8.5 million population. They contend that a monarchy has no place in Greece in this day and age.

It is unlawful to criticize publicly the Greek royal family, but demonstrators in Athens and in key cities of the country since the Papandreu firing have shouted antiroyalty slogans.

# Church Order Is Defied

VICTORIA, B.C. (AP)—Mother Cecilia Mary has defied a second order from the Roman Catholic Church to abandon her animal shelter. Her bishop said this leaves the next move up to the Vatican.

"The Church has no authority to close the shelter," said Mother Cecilia, 76, who runs the shelter on a farm on the outskirts of Victoria. "They don't own the land and I will not give up un-

less I die."

Mother Cecilia, superior of a nursing home, set up the shelter in 1954 with money inherited from her father.

"It's just a bit of a bluff," she said of the order. "The bishop doesn't like the sisters doing the work and he wants to close it, but we will carry on because there isn't anybody else to do it." She was speaking of the Most Rev. Remi De Roo, bis-

hop of Victoria.

Monday two church officials delivered an order to Mother Cecilia and the five elderly nuns who help her. It was from the apostolic delegate in Ottawa, the Most Rev. Sergio Pignatelli.

The order said of the six: "If any one of them refuses to obey in this matter, then ecclesiastical authority will reconsider their official status in the

church as sisters."

This would not mean excommunication, Bishop De Roo said, but the six could continue operating the shelter only if they gave up their religious vows.

Mother Cecilia said: "I have been a sister for 56 years and will stay a sister till I die. Giving up my vows would require personal consent and I wouldn't give it."

Bishop De Roo said refusal to abandon the shelter and the more than 100 animals leaves the next move up to Rome.
