## Agreement Ratifies Crisis End

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — The organization of American States secured a full agreement today terminating the 4-month-old Dominican crisis. The peace formula insured the installation of a provisional government Friday as a first step toward general elections in nine months. Rebel leaders cheered the peace plan. Heads of the armed forces taking over after the rival civilian-military junta stepped aside pledged full support to the provisional government. The peace proposal was signed first by the insurgent regime behind rebel lines Tuesday night. Then Dominican armed forces leaders, meeting at the headquarters of the junta, signed a declaration of support for the peace plan and the provisional government.

### Pakistani Shoots Down India Planes

(See picture on page 5) KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — The government claimed Pakistani air forces planes shot down six Indian planes supporting rebels. Indian ground forces in action today.

The official announcement said an air battle took place over Chamb area, which is inside the Indian sector of Pakistan. Earlier a government spokesman said Pakistani aircraft had crossed the ceasefire line in that area and had occupied two Indian posts.

The spokesman reported the sector was in southwest Pakistan. It confirmed this would be the crossing of the ceasefire line by Pakistani forces into the divided Indian side. India has crossed the line occupied some Pakistani posts.

The peacekeeping troops took over after the initial U.S. intervention in the rebellion, which erupted April 24 in an abortive effort to bring former President Juan D. Bosch back to power.

## Strike Mediators At Difficult Stage

WASHINGTON (AP) — Negotiators trying to avert a nation-wide steel strike were described today as having reached the stage of hard and tough bargaining. The characterization of the marathon sessions came from Bill D. Moyers, White House press secretary. "They are having straightforward confrontations on two main issues — that is, wages and pensions," Moyers told newsmen. The management and labor representatives are meeting in the Executive Office Building next door to the White House. "I have no indication of what progress is being made," Moyers said.

As talks entered their third day in Washington, negotiators reportedly were arguing at White House wage guidelines are too low.

President Johnson, continuing a non-inflationary policy, was joined by House and Democratic leaders in noting that a strike would hurt nation's economy and security. A strike deadline scheduled at 12:01 a.m. Sept. 8 at John's request.

### Group Picked to Plan for New Bridge

Thus far the two counties have not been able to agree to meet \$150,000 each in federal matching funds to build the bridge. Committee members said they would find their first meeting early after completion of the Twin Falls Fair.

## Only One Cure for Coin Shortage, T.F. Bankers Say - Keep Them Circulating

With the current coin shortage problem in Twin Falls, persons from the three Twin Falls banks agreed Wednesday that the problem would be greatly alleviated if people would simply keep coins in circulation.

They all emphasized that the coin shortage is caused by people holding back what coins they have in their possession and by the number of coin-operated machines in use.

The problem has been acute for approximately six months and first appeared when the new Kennedy half dollars were released.

The shortage has grown worse

as more and more people have started holding onto silver half dollars because of the now Kennedy half dollars recently minted.

As he explained, some people started saving Kennedy half dollar pieces because they felt with the issue of the new Kennedy silver coins the older coins would gain in value. Some people saved Kennedy half dollars because they felt the coins were of novelty value.

William H. Miller, assistant cashier at the First Security National Bank, also agreed that some of the people may have coins because they believe the coins will be of novelty value. He stressed that Midelity National Bank is very short of quarters and half dollars and that the Federal Reserve Bank in Salt Lake City has been unable to fill orders for the coins.

The Federal Reserve Bank is doing its best to fill these orders, Miller asserted, but the demand is exceeding the supply on hand. The reserve bank receives a certain quota of coins from the mints and these must be allocated to banks in its district.

Both the Denver and Philadelphia mints are working full time to supply these coins, but as Miller pointed out, "They are not making them fast enough to keep up."

Robert Coats, assistant vice president at First Security Bank, believes the average person doesn't notice the shortage.

"Retail people are the ones who notice the shortage," he stated, because they have to deal in large amounts of change each day.

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## Proposal Is Defeated In Gooding

GOODING — Gooding County residents voted overwhelmingly, 1,105-414, to turn down the proposed addition of their county to the College of Southern Idaho junior college district in balloting Tuesday. Robert Erklin, member of the Gooding County Junior College Committee, stated Wednesday morning, "Many Gooding County residents are, at present, not convinced or aware of the important need for a local college educational program. It should be remembered that the county of Twin Falls voted down its first election for a junior college, but later learned that there was a real need in southern Idaho for a program of vocational and higher academic education. I believe it

will take approximately two years, at the most before this need becomes clearly evident in Gooding County."

Robert Blodock Jr., chairman of the board of trustees of the College of Southern Idaho, said Wednesday, "Speaking for myself and other members of the board, we are deeply disappointed in the decisive vote in Gooding County.

More competition, better service and "probably lower rates" are expected through the merger, the chief executives of the two roads said Tuesday night.

Directors of the carriers announced their approval of the merger Tuesday. They also favored to include in their system five other Eastern railroads: Erie Lackawanna, Delaware & Hudson, Boston & Maine, Reading, and Central of New Jersey.

Presidents Walter J. Tychy of the C&O and Norman H. Peveler of the N.W. said the overriding reason for the merger proposal was an expected saving of \$30 million annually, which would come about between 3 and 10 years after the union.

Tychy and Peveler told a news conference here that they expected approval within two years from the Interstate Commerce Commission.

There has been no formal merger discussion with the other five roads involved.

## Astronauts Relive Flight For Experts

CAPITOL KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)

The medically sound Gemini 5 astronauts today continue the tedious task of reliving their historic eight-day space flight for technical and medical experts.

Hoarding Is Foolish, Says Coin Expert

Most experts agree that the hoarding of late mintage coins is foolish.

If you are holding coins with the idea of selling later at a profit, you are fooling yourself.

No coins have ever increased much in value unless they are short striplings.

Even though the combined Denver and Philadelphia mints have struck the following:

More than three billion Lincoln Pennies, almost two billion nickels, almost a billion dimes, more than 700 million quarters and more than 100 million half-dollars, and they are still turning them out, all dated 1964.

The San Francisco mint is to be reopened for the production of pennies and nickels. Incidentally, the Philadelphia mint struck the first of the new clad quarters (composite metals, face of copper-nickel alloy, bonded to a pure copper core) on Aug. 23.

The new quarters will be placed in circulation later this month.

## Racial Troubles Erupt Into Violence In Chicago and North Carolina

Racial troubles erupted into violence in both the North and South Tuesday night as two White men were wounded in a free-for-all fight in Plymouth, N.C., and three Negroes were hospitalized in Chicago.

Tensions in Plymouth had been so high that civil rights leaders called off a planned demonstration. But seven Negroes walking down Main Street in the eastern North Carolina town were confronted by a group of whites, including one who was injured and the fight in which another was stabbed.

Plymouth police said one of the Negroes had been beaten in the street and remained there until Mayor W. R. Flowers announced the demonstration postponed. The mob, led by at least two car owners, including Negroes, had gathered one with a bear cub.

Moments later the seven Negroes began moving up the street.

Elsewhere on the racial scene, school desegregation continued quietly in the South. In Alabama's rural Lowndes County, where two white civil rights workers have been shot to death this year, four Negroes calmly went to classes with white pupils at Maynerville High School.

Desegregation in other Southern towns and counties followed the pattern of peaceful acceptance under application of the 1964 Civil Rights Act to avert cutoff of federal money.

More than 300 persons had

gathered in the center of town, demonstrating to be turned down in the heavily traveled intersection of Sheridan Road and Bryn Mawr Ave. and police arrested 14, subduing some with tear gas.

## Buhl Couple Injured in Car Accident

BUHL—Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Click, Buhl, were reported in fair physical condition in Magic Valley Memorial Hospital Wednesday after a one-car accident that occurred at 12:45 a.m., one and a half miles east of Buhl on a country road.

## Congressmen Ask Aid for Gold Mining

WASHINGTON (AP)—A group of congressmen has asked President Johnson to help for the domestic gold mining industry.

Sen. Frank E. Moss, D-Utah, said Tuesday he was in a group of 14 congressmen which signed a joint letter asking the President to "rescue the now virtually extinct gold mining industry from its desperate straits almost the cause of the decline in directly the result of arbitrary action on the part of the executive branch (of the government)."

The group said the price of gold has been pegged at \$35 an ounce since 1934 while mining costs have increased continuously.

Moss, in a statement, said Utah miners have a marketable supply of gold, but miners were reluctant to embark on a known money-losing venture.

Moss said if the price of gold were higher, so would production.

In another statement, he said that he and Rep. David S. King, D-Utah, were assured that the Bureau of Mines metallurgy laboratory in Salt Lake City, would continue to play a significant role in development of mineral commodities of the west.

He said the assurance came Tuesday at a meeting with Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall.

The conference was held to discuss the future of Utah mining industry and of the metallurgy laboratory, Moss said.

### SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY

A warming trend over this district yesterday resulted in afternoon temperatures four to 10 degrees warmer than Monday. Clear skies and quiet air were again favorable for strong cooling overnight. Temperatures were a few degrees higher at most places this morning but still low enough to indicate scattered frost or freezing temperatures in some parts of Magic Valley. Temperatures, as measured in standard thermometer shelter five feet above ground, dropped below freezing to 31 at Aberdeen, 29° at the Atomic Energy Site and to 26 at Fairfield. Lows of 32 were reported in Wendell, Burley recorded 33, Rupert 34°.

The warming trend will continue over the district today and tonight further diminishing the chances of frost.

A few thunderstorms are expected to develop over Nevada this afternoon and some scattered high cloudiness is likely to extend over Southern Idaho. No important changes are indicated for Friday and Saturday.

Damage by freezing temperatures during the past few nights has been spotty due to varying stages of maturity of plants and to variations in temperatures near the ground over short distances. In many fields of immature beans in Magic Valley, the top leaves have been frozen and will likely result in puzzling reduction of yield. Considerable freeze injury to potatoes is apparent in eastern Magic Valley but effects on yield will depend largely on the stage of maturity already reached. Some corn fields also show spotty frost injury.

### FIVE-DAY FORECAST

High pressure will continue to dominate the northeastern Pacific Ocean during the next five days. Upper winds will be from the northwest to west and a cool front will move through Southern Idaho about the end of the week.

Temperatures Thursday through Monday will average two to six degrees below normal. The current warming trend will result in afternoon temperatures near or slightly above normal with early morning lows still a little below normal. Cooling of several degrees over the weekend will affect mainly daytime temperatures. Normal maximum and minimum temperatures for this period are Gooding 81-50, Twin Falls 85-47, and Burley 81-45.

No precipitation is expected during this period. Winds will be light most of this week with some increase in winds over the weekend.

The cooling trend over the weekend will be accompanied by moderate winds and scattered cloudiness which may be sufficient to prevent the recurrence of frosts at that time in the principal agricultural areas of Southern Idaho.

Thus, rather favorable conditions are indicated for continued growth and maturity of crops not seriously injured by recent frosts and harvesting activities can proceed without interruption by weather.

# WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON** — Admittedly, the country's busy mail service dates back to the cut-rate Eisenhower administration when Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield received "69 cents" for "overworking" by painting the mail boxes red, white and blue and crackling down on necessary overtime. But the labor unions are carrying on in the Summerfield tradition.

Two recent instances have illustrated again the sordid fact of life that postal policies are not dictated either by the postmaster general or even the Labor Department. In both cases, Postmaster General John Gronowski was trying to improve the service and still gave the taxpayers a buck or three.

**CARRIERS THWART \$20 MILLION SAVING** — Some time ago, Gronowski came up with the idea of leasing a fleet of automobiles for rural carriers instead of paying the current mileage for using their own cars. This, he discovered, would save the taxpayers about \$20 million a year because the department could lease cars for nine cents a mile compared to the 12 cents paid the carriers for their own cars. And since maintenance would be handled by the fleet owners, there would be fewer delays caused by breakdowns.

The idea seemed so straightforward and attractive that Gronowski took it to the Rural Letter Carriers Association. He reminded the labor bosses that the plan would provide carriers with better and safer cars which would be replaced every three years. But the union said "thank you, but no thanks." It seemed Gronowski was meddling in the carriers' private affairs, and besides the mail makes an occasional dime with the present arrangement.

**BALKED AGAIN!** — Gronowski also has come up with a plan to close 70 gateway terminals—mail redistribution centers—in major cities—and transfer mail service to trucks. He thinks the trucking industry can do a better, swifter job in some areas than the railroads. And again, the plan would save money.


This time Big Labor was heard from in the person of Charles Lunn, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Lunn cried that the plan could cost the country 40,000 to 50,000 railroad jobs, "massive dislocation among postal employees and economic losses of staggering proportions to many communities."

Lunn also called attention to a bill introduced in the House by Rep. Thaddeus Dulski, D-N.Y., which would pave the way for transfer—all which would pave the way for transfer—all mail service from railways to trucks. He urged the Association of American Railroads to join in protesting against the bill. Said Lunn, "If the railroads don't know what's good for them, then Congress had better tell them."

"**IN A SANE SOCIETY**" — There, of course, is the meat of the issue, exposed with a frightening candor. In the matter of mail delivery, it is not what is good for the country but what is good for the railroads. Big Labor and the other vested interests involved, Lunn's estimate of job losses, is outrageous hyperbole, but in a sane society plagued for the past 20 years by shockingly poor mail service it would be of secondary importance. In a sane society, a postmaster general who proved a new way was cheaper, and more efficient than the old way would be ordered to get cracking.

With Idaho's highway toll for this year running well ahead of the deaths last year, it would seem Idaho should be concerned about tougher laws to license drivers instead of reducing the process to one of merely purchasing a license. It's high time the driver's license should signify the holder is a competent person who is qualified to drive an automobile on the public streets and highways.

Instead, Idaho drivers use their licenses chiefly as a means of identification to cash checks or as proof they're old enough to purchase beer or liquor.

The Idaho law used to have a provision—which may still be in effect—that an examiner could insist on a physician's certificate that an applicant was qualified to drive a car from a medical standpoint. Did anyone ever hear of any examiner invoking that provision for any applicant aged, ailing or otherwise open to doubt?

About the only hard and fast qualification for getting an Idaho driver's license now is \$5 in cash. You can't send your driver's license to purchase your license for you because the law requires a photograph in color. But before that license expires in three years, the legislature might come up with a new law that would permit you to mail in your \$5 and then transfer the photo from your old license to the new permit. **THE HIKING MASAI**

It may be that significant results will flow from Prof. George Mann's African experiments with his walking machine, but we rather imagine a number of Masai warriors will continue shaking their heads over the antics of the crazy Americans. Prof. Mann and a team of Vanderbilt University researchers recently visited the Masai to make certain comparisons between the tall, lean Africans and American college students.

The purpose was to find out why the Masai never seem to get heart disease in spite of a meat-and-milk diet outrageously high in cholesterol. The Masai spend most of their time walking, but they walk only 50 to 60 miles a day without noticeable strain. As could be expected, they performed capably on Prof. Mann's portable treadmill, two of them walking it right off its maximum scale. Thirty-nine warriors averaged just a bit less in endurance than the record set by an American youth who had practiced on the machine for six months.

The studies showed the Masai had no hypertension, but we doubt whether that is related to their ambulatory prowess. If we were to guess, we might suggest that their high cholesterol is due to the fact they do not feel much pain when they are testing people on treadmills.

## U. S. District Court Takes Military Case

# Retired Persons Told of Medical Programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Beginning today, 2.3 million retired Americans are getting word from the government on two new medical programs available to them under the expanded Social Security System.

The information includes an application card for the voluntary program—the medical plan which provides protection against most doctor bills.

On a 50-year payout basis, revenues from the powerhouse would more than repay the cost, with interest, Foley said.

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## Immigration Bill Slowed In Power Play

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's immigration bill and Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen's reappor-tionment amendment were caught up today in a legislative power play.

Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., said that "some liberal Democrats would rather have a tactical victory over Dirksen" than to win passage of the immigration measure at this session of Congress.

But Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., another member of the Senate Judiciary Committee where the opposing forces met head-on Tuesday, said in a separate interview he does not expect the immigration bill to be killed.

Dirksen blocked committee action on the immigration measure after an 8-8 tie vote

symbolized his proposed constitutional amendment on redistricting of state legislatures.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet submarine operations have increased in the past year, Navy sources said today.

"We've been spotting them more often," one official said. "Where one or two used to show up, we're sighting three and four."

"They seem to be operating in greater numbers and more openly."

Navy officers said the wider-ranging Soviet submarine operations reflect the larger number of long-endurance craft, including atomic-powered vessels, now in the Soviet sub flotilla.

## Candy, Toys to Be Dropped To North Viet Nam Children

SAIGON (UPI) — A program is under way here to drop toys and candy over Communist North Viet Nam.

The first experimental toy drop was made this spring. It was secret.

Enough bugs showed up in the experiment to put the program under wraps until it could be made more practical and less dangerous.

Now, sources say, the toy drops are going to begin in earnest and candy will be showered over the north along with plastic dolls and rubber balls.

The object of the Santa Claus style raids will not be just to bring joy-to-the-hearts of young North Vietnamese. The main intention is to show the northerners that their southern compatriots enjoy a higher standard of living than is described by their Communist press.

Psychological-warfare experts say toys and candy are ideal for this purpose, because they are the kind of minor luxuries which are almost completely absent from the austere economy of the north.

The toys which land on North Viet Nam will be purchased from Vietnamese suppliers in Saigon and will be accompanied by leaflets pointing out how easily available they are in the non-Communist south.

But dropping this kind of psychological "wanton" is more difficult, expensive and dangerous than would be imagined at first sight.

Each little package will have to have its own little parachute,



Household Tasks  
Can Be Made  
Most Enjoyable  
By KAY SHERWOOD

NEW YORK (UPI) — When you find yourself sinking into the late summer doldrums and major housekeeping effort arouses only the widest yawn, immerse yourself with some of the smaller, pleasant tasks that are easily shoved aside.

Last week, I snapped my fingers at the streaky windows, sneered at the tacky kitchen floor and played a game of golf (health benefits) and spent some time trying the useful new cold-adhesive plastic coatings.

As an early discoverer of these plastic coverings I have used them for years to cover tabletops, softails, and walls. Now, new textures add new uses to this houseware item. One new texture is a nappy-felt surface, bonded to the same self-adhesive backing. Imaginative housewives will find many uses for it. For me, it is an easy answer to a minor—but nagging—irritation with pottery or metal pieces with rough-finished bases that scratch the plates or bookselves.

For about \$1 I bought a yard of the stuff and had enough to cover cache pots which hold household plants, vases and bowls. I simply outlined with a pencil the base on the paper side of the material.

Cut out, slightly inside of the outline, peel off the protective backing and smooth onto the surface. The rough edges of vase are effectively "buffed." This is, I might add, also a good treatment for domestic or imported tiles when you would like to use as trivets. Besides the traditional felt-green, there are a few other colors.

Another new texture has a quilted surface. It is made of two layers of plastic, fluffed with a filling and quilted to make a soft, padded surface. This comes in pastels and a simple pattern. The covering will be a help where you need a soft surface. We used it—my daughter and I—to line the two top dresser drawers in their bedroom chests. The padding is good antisnag protection for lingerie, scarves and stockings and a pretty background for cosmetics, gloves and the like.

A third newcomer to this group is only now becoming available but it will be a boom to some. This is the self-adhesive plastic wall tile. These are actually squares of tiled patterns with the adhesive backing and can be installed as easily as the larger rolls but they will be more maneuverable.

A friend of mine who cut up a roll of the plastic into tile shapes before covering her bath room wall in a marble pattern told me she hoped someday the makers of this material would make it tile-sized. Now they have.

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

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# Sports Antitrust Bill Is Approved by Senate, Now Faces Future in House

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Legislation to grant professional baseball, football, basketball and hockey limited antitrust law exemptions received Senate voice-vote approval Tuesday, but it faces a questionable future in the House. Baseball, alone among the big-time professional team sports holds a top-to-bottom antitrust exemption under a 1922 Supreme Court decision. The bill would exempt only baseball's sports aspects from antitrust and grant the same exemptions to the other three.



Somewhat similar bills have been introduced in the House, but such legislation never has sparked much enthusiasm in that branch. All concerned agree there is no prospect the House would act on antitrust exemptions for sports any earlier than next year.
