

Squad Is Guarding Natchez

NATCHEZ, Miss. (AP) — A flying squad of National Guardsmen with fixed bayonets moved into the downtown area of Natchez this afternoon as city officials rejected desegregation demands made by Negroes.

City officials announced rejection of the Negroes' 12 demands following a two-hour meeting with representatives of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Gov. Paul Johnson ordered 50 Mississippi Guardsmen into Natchez earlier today, saying a riot was imminent.

The guardsmen, leaving a hastily set up camp at the edge of town, rode into the business district streets. The soldiers carried gas masks and rifles with bayonets.

In rejecting the Negroes' demands, city officials said many of them were beyond the city's jurisdiction to solve.

The Negro demands were made following the bomb-trap bombing last Friday of a Negro leader's car.

Repeal Bill Clears Labor Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — The largely controversial bill to repeal Section 14(b) of the National Labor Relations Act cleared the Senate Labor Committee by a 12-9 margin today. Senate sponsors say they have the votes to pass the bill but expect a two-week floor battle.

The White House said after the vote that President Johnson's final congressional act would be to sign the bill. The House passed the bill 221-203 in July.

Senate sponsors say they have the votes to pass the bill but expect a two-week floor battle. The big fight will be over the bill to restrict union activities.

Section 14(b) allows states to ban labor contracts that compel workers to join a union. Nineteen states have enacted such laws.

Taylor Named Special Aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has named Max D. Taylor as a special aide and said he will have an important role in support of the people and government of Viet Nam.

This role was not spelled out by President Taylor beside his name in the announcement Tuesday night. Nor did Johnson amplify other "special assignments" he said he will give former U.S. ambassador to Viet Nam.

Johnson said Taylor, a former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, will be charged with reviewing all government programs aimed at countering communist advances abroad.

He said Taylor will operate from Washington from the White House.

Johnson said Taylor "is in my mind" a kind of task force assignment.

College Enrollment Continuing to Rise

Second day of classes for College of Southern Idaho began Thursday morning for students at the Vocational Division building on Kimberly Road. Larry Rowe, vocational guidance director, said 81 registered students, four more than Wednesday, attended classes Thursday morning. Rowe added all vocational classes were operating well and no major problems have arisen. He said not all of the equipment for the classes has arrived, but there is enough on hand to continue with the classes.

A few openings still are available in the Peace Officer Training and in Management programs. Rowe reported, and a few more qualified applicants will be accepted. All other courses have been filled.

Second day classes for academic students began at 3:30 p.m. Thursday at Twin Falls High School.

Dr. James Taylor, college president, said "over 400" students have been registered. He said he wasn't sure how many students registered Wednesday, but was confident total enrollment had passed the 400 mark.

Dr. Taylor said there were some students registering Thursday morning.

Students of all ages were visible in the halls of the high school Wednesday night, and automobiles with out-of-county license plates were parked at the school during classes, indicating the interest of people from diversified backgrounds and locales.

Dr. Taylor said Wednesday night opening day classes were going very smoothly and everything was progressing according to schedule.

Several Gooding County students, who had previously registered for the first semester at College of Southern Idaho, paid their tuition fees Wednesday evening.

It was reported they were allowed to restore payment of fees until after Gooding County's election on addition of the county into the junior college district. Gooding County residents voted 1,105 to 423 Tuesday night to turn down the proposal.

Full-time students at CSI automatically participate in a health care plan, covering them from the beginning to the end of each semester. The program is paid for by students at registration time and provides for liberal hospitalization, laboratory fees and the major portion of medical and surgical fees.

Johnson Asks Early End to Steel Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, stepping personally into steel negotiations at a crucial moment, told industry and union representatives today he sees no reason why their dispute can't be settled—hopefully before Labor Day. Johnson, who would like to spend the holiday weekend with his family at his Texas ranch, spent 43 minutes with the negotiators. The President, who got a report last night from Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz and Secretary of Commerce John T. Connor, that indicated progress was being made obviously thought this was the best time to step personally into the picture.

Johnson emphasized the losses that would be experienced by both sides in the event of a nationwide strike.

Citing an array of statistics showing how well the companies and their workers have fared, and coupling these with other figures on the costly effects of the 116-day steel strike in 1959, Johnson said another strike could put as big a dent in the economy in a couple of months as would a recession lasting nine months.

Johnson told the negotiators he "had" not walked from his White House office to their conference room in the neighborhood executive office building to present a settlement proposal.

Shipping Begins After Costly Strike

NEW YORK (AP) — A tide of American ships again flowed out of Atlantic and Gulf Coast ports today, ending a costly 7-day strike.

Deck officers and radio operators from 100 strike-bound U.S. freighters by voting approval Wednesday of four-year contracts. They had removed picket lines Monday after government negotiators helped work out the settlements.

Ship owners immediately put the strike back into the water. One company sent 11 freighters to sea from Atlantic ports Wednesday night.

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Pakistan and India Fight In Skies

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Indian and Pakistani planes fought in the sky over southern Kashmir today, while around 500 miles inside India's position, Defense Ministry said, fighting raged for the second straight day.

A military spokesman said Indian air force planes were attacked by the Pakistani air force as they flew over Pakistani positions.

The fighter escort drove the Pakistani planes across the international frontier, the spokesman said. "All our aircraft returned to base."

Committee to Explain Bribe Backfire in Singapore

WASHINGTON (AP) — A State Department committee today called on the State Department and Central Intelligence Agency to explain why a formal denial of a \$3-million bribery incident that took place in Singapore in 1960 backfired to the embarrassment of the U.S. government.

Rep. Clement J. Zablocki, D-Wis., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on the Far East, said closed hearings will be held after the Labor Day recess to obtain an explanation from responsible officials on bribery allegations brought by Singapore Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew.

Lee threatened to name an American presidential intermediary of high rank who he said offered him the bribe in 1960. He would not reveal the name of a far American CIA agent (trapped trying to buy information from Singapore secret agents.

Air Force Bombers Attack Suspected Viet Cong Area

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Air Force B52 bombers attacked a suspected Viet Cong area today, a U.S. military spokesman said, with a raid that rattled windows in downtown Saigon, 20 miles from the target. The area hit was northwest of Saigon in the Ho Bo woods in Dinh Duong Province, the spokesman said. The spokesman, under security restrictions, said the Strategic Air Command bombers carried out the raid, the 17th reported B52 attack of the Viet Nam war.

The Guam-based B52s have stepped up their activity in recent weeks with indications this rate will be further increased. B52s made their first double-header attack of the war Tuesday, hitting targets 30 miles north and 320 miles northeast of Saigon.

In other air activity, the second U.S. helicopter to crash in two days went down 200 miles northeast of Saigon, landing on four American crewmen aboard. Military authorities said the crash occurred near An Khe, which is on Route 19 between Qui Nhon and Pleiku. The four men were evacuated to a field hospital at Nha Trang. Two were reported in serious condition.

The craft went down in what is considered a secure area. The crash was believed due to mechanical failure.

Another U.S. helicopter, this one apparently under heavy Viet Cong fire, crashed Wednesday 25 miles northwest of Saigon, killing four Americans and one Vietnamese.

In ground action, Vietnamese troops clashed with a Viet Cong company 12 miles south of Quang Nhai city early today. A U.S. military spokesman in Saigon said U.S. air support had been called in to aid the government troops. There was no immediate report on casualties. Quang Nhai is 530 miles north of Saigon.

In another action 12 miles southeast of Quang Nhai, it was reported that three Viet Cong were killed and 16 suspected Viet Cong captured in a one-day operation Wednesday. U.S. aviators confirmed the three Viet Cong killed.

Hurricane Turns and Storm Eases

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Betsy roared with increased fury today toward the southeastern Bahama Islands, but a gradual turn toward the northwest eased the storm's threat to the heavily populated southeast coast of Florida.

Late this morning, the Miami Weather Bureau reported that the hurricane's top winds had risen to 115 miles an hour, but no further intensification was indicated.

"Betsy is expected to remain a small hurricane," the advisory said, "and is forecast to move on a west-northwest course near 10 miles an hour during the next 12 to 24 hours, with a little more turning toward the northwest late Friday."

"We're not quite ready yet to take south Florida off the hook," said Gordon Dunn, chief storm forecaster in the Miami Weather Bureau, "but the threat certainly has decreased. The chance that it will affect this area is becoming rather remote."

But he cautioned that south Florida interests should continue to keep in touch with the hurricane advisories for another 24 hours.

Betsy was growing stronger by the hour as it whirled across the Atlantic.

The multimillion-dollar U.S. missile tracking station at Grand Turk Island, on the southern tip of the 750-mile Bahama chain, apparently was spared Betsy's punch.

Wednesday noon at Twin Falls, after reviewing the local club's activities during the last year and noting his satisfaction, he spoke on the training offered for Rotary district governors he attended recently at Lake Placid, N. Y.

Tuesday night he met with the chairman of all Twin Falls Rotary committees to discuss Rotary procedural advances and how to strengthen local clubs.

Wednesday afternoon, after the Twin Falls meeting, he and local Rotarians had an afternoon of golf at Blue-Lakes Country Club.

Erickson retired a year and a half ago after 36 years with J. C. Penney Co. and took on the job of district governor, with the aim of giving assistance to all Rotary clubs in the international area.

Erickson has been a Rotarian most of his adult life and is a past president of Rotary. He visits all clubs in his district once a year.

Fifth School Day Is Consumed by Utah Teacher Dispute

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Some 8,000 Box Elder County students stayed home for their fifth school day today as compromise efforts by Gov. Calvin R. Walton and Rep. Laurence E. Burton, R-Utah, failed to settle the county's teacher salary dispute.

Utah City school districts prepared their budgets including money from the bill. But the Box Elder County School Board said it could not commit money it does not have. "Am I to understand that you reject the proposal?" interrupted Rampton.

Box Elder Superintendent J.C. Haws said yes, and school-board members nodded. "I can't see why you have to be more cautious than the other districts," Rampton said. "We have been carrying around a deficit of \$154,000 because of a kind the board got into in 1963," Haws replied. "We think it is time to clean the slate and we have told our taxpayers we won't budget money we don't have."

"It doesn't appear to me the board is giving a bit," Rampton said. "You've not come one inch." Douglas Fife, board member, asked, "Do you think we are authorized to gamble with taxpayers' money?" "It's not a gamble," the governor said. "You would do as others have done and decide that if the funds did not come as expected that you would cut back

in other uncommitted funds." The board said it would go along with increasing the package by about \$10,000 in state funds. Rampton said this money was overlooked by the board in determining the amount the district had coming from Utah's school transportation program. But the board repeated it could not spend federal money

until members are sure it will arrive. "I do not feel the board has gone as far as it should in the light of what other districts are doing," Rampton said and went into closed session with the board. He emerged shaking his head. "They wouldn't change," he said. Board members left by another door and did not meet with teachers at the Capital following the conference.

Dr. Bell's proposal came after an ultimatum from the school board and subsequent sanctions by the Utah Teachers Association. John Evans, executive secretary of the UTEA, said the National Education Association was hold of developments.

Evans said NEA officials expected to arrive in Utah in a few days. Dr. Bell called moves by the school board and education agency "premature and damaging." "Personal and personal feelings are damaging chances for settlement... pressure moves such as sanctions and ultimatums only add to the problem."

Teacher representatives accepted the governor's compromise proposal during a special conference Wednesday. Capitol County School Board but it down. Dr. T. H. Bell, superintendent of public instruction, told the conference the proposal would add \$30,000 to the board's proposed salary package increase of \$103,000.

Members of the Box Elder Education Association originally asked for a \$163,000 package but then dropped the demand down to \$153,000. Dr. Bell said the extra \$30,000 would come from transportation funds in the Utah school program, plus about \$20,000 from the Federal Aid to Education Bill.

Dr. Bell telephoned from Washington moments before the conference and said the Senate Appropriations Committee had approved the bill. Burton said it would be passed by the full Senate in two weeks or less. The measure has already passed the House.

Dr. Bell said Ogden and Salt Lake City school districts prepared their budgets including money from the bill. But the Box Elder County School Board said it could not commit money it does not have.

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Desertion of Viet Nam Forces Down
WASHINGTON (AP) — The rate of desertions from South Viet Nam's armed forces has dropped by more than half from a high point early this year, Pentagon sources disclosed today.

This is considered a hopeful sign, possibly indicating an upswing in South Vietnamese morale and a rising confidence in the non-Communist cause. The Pentagon refused to discuss the desertion rate. But knowledgeable sources said it is now down below 5,000 a month. About 10,000 more a month were pulling out of the South Vietnamese armed forces for about three months early this year.

Although the desertion rate has been cut by more than half, it still represents a heavy drain on a force already stretched to the limit. U.S. troop commitment in Viet Nam has had to be increased heavily. The desertion problem makes much tougher the job of building the South Vietnamese armed forces by another 100,000 men. The present strength stands at about 546,000.

U.S. authorities are hopeful at higher pay and reforms aimed at improving the lot of soldiers and their families will lower the desertion rate further. Also, the national police are being strengthened, in part, to cope with the desertions from the armed forces.

U.S. officials said most desertions have been from part-time regional and home guard elements, rather than from the regular army.

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Year-Round Idaho School System Eyed
BOISE (AP) — Idaho's top school official said Wednesday he hopes the state eventually will aid in the financial support of summer school sessions operated by the public school system.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction D. F. Engelking agreed with a statement by the Idaho Education Association predicting the state will begin operating a year-round school system in the near future. The IEA based its prediction on figures showing enrollment in summer school classes this year was more than 2½ times that of only three years ago.

If the trend continues and if financing is available, the IEA said, "year-round schools via the summer-class route may not be too far removed." Duvaan Douglas, IEA director of research, said enrollment during the past summer reached an all-time high of nearly 5,000. Nearly 3,000 students were enrolled in elementary and high school classes in 13 districts, Douglas said, with an additional 1,695 five-year-olds attending pre-school kindergarten classes in 16 districts.

The classes are operated on a fee basis with each student paying the full cost of his classes.

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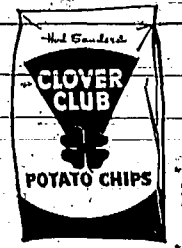

HEARING SCHEDULED
IDAHO FALLS (AP)—A hearing on the omitted land problem has been scheduled for 10 a.m. Sept. 15, at the Bonneville County Courthouse.

Justice Kirk, district manager of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, announced Wednesday.

Kirk said the hearing here is primarily concerned with some two dozen property owners or their heirs whose title to land along the Snake River, mostly in the John's Hole area, is questioned because of survey discrepancies.

4 Men Die in Faulty Elevator
HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Four workmen died in an outside elevator fell 20 floors at a downtown construction project Wednesday. A fifth suffered critical injuries.

The accident was at a 33-story high rise apartment building. All of the victims were residents of Houston.

They had delivered plumbing fixtures to the 22nd floor of the building and were descending to ground level when the elevator cable snapped.

DEAD IN TRUCK
BLACKFOOT (AP)—Tom E. Isaacks, 24, Aberdeen, was found dead in his pickup truck Tuesday just north of the city limits.

The pickup was stopped against a fence, but the ignition was turned off and the transmission was in neutral.

Bingham County Coroner Carl Staley said an autopsy would be performed to determine the cause of death.

The body is at the Davis Mortuary in American Falls. Funeral arrangements are pending.

KILLED IN CRASH
IDAHO CITY, Idaho (AP)—A 31-year-old Idaho City man was fatally injured Wednesday in a one-car smashup on State Highway 21 about three miles north of here.

Osa G. Parker died in a Boise hospital several hours after the accident.

Boise County Sheriff Jack Williams said Parker was a passenger in a car driven by James R. Walker, 24, of Boise. He said the car apparently spun out of control on a curve and overturned.

Walker sustained multiple cuts and bruises but was reported in good condition at a Boise hospital.

POLICY CLAIMED UNFAIR
IDAHO FALLS (AP)—The oil, chemical and atomic workers union, Local No. 2-852, Wednesday said a new transportation policy of the Phillips Petroleum Co. forced employees to reside in Idaho Falls and was unfair to employees.

But Phillips Petroleum Co. officials said Wednesday in response to the statement that "we have issued no directive requiring employees to live in Idaho Falls."

Their choice of residence is and always has been up to each employee. The union has been no recent significant changes in the bus schedules and none is expected in the near future," officials of Phillips Petroleum said.

RAIN HURTS CROPS
BOISE (AP)—Rains were feared Wednesday as a potential threat to production of a number of farm crops in Idaho.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, in its weekly crop summary, said some alfalfa seed producers were fearful the rains may decrease yields.

"Blight is showing up heavily in some potatoes due to the higher humidity," the department said, "and while many are fleeing the dry heat crop, severe rust damage was reported in Boundary County."

LACKING FUNDS
POCATELLO (AP)—Pocatello city officials say they fear they may not be able to start this year on the proposed \$5 million Portneuf River Flood Control Project.

The city officials, who met earlier in the week with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at Colfax, Wash., said unexpected expenses that have come to light during the past few months may make it impossible for them to raise the required \$100,000.

Col. Frank McElwee, district engineer for the corps, said the matter of finances will have to be resolved soon or the project delayed at least a year.

MAYOR DIES
BLACKFOOT (UPI)—Blackfoot Mayor Louis F. Haller, 59, died at Bingham Memorial Hospital Tuesday after a short illness.

Services for the first-term mayor here have been set for 2 p.m. Saturday in Blackfoot.

Attending physicians said death was due to a combination of exhaustion, uremic poisoning and a heart attack.

Richard-Nixon Is Visiting Saigon
SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon arrived in Saigon today for what he called a "first hand appraisal of the situation in South Viet Nam."

Nixon reiterated that he supports President Johnson's policy in Viet Nam. There is no choice but to "punish aggression" he said.

Rites Conducted

Democrats Jump in Political Pond Before Ice Is Broken

NOISE (UPI)—Democrats are so anxious to send Gov. Robert E. Smylie back to Caldwell their gubernatorial candidates are jumping in the political pond before the ice has broken. It is more than a year before the 1968 state elections. Yet, Democrats have thrown and a half candidates eager to tie into Smylie and his three terms as the Idaho chief executive.

To Democrats, Smylie appears beatable just because he has been in office so long—more than 10 years, which makes him the senior governor in the United States.

Another reason Smylie appears beatable to Democrats is that he has not had formidable opposition from Democrats in past elections. Democrats have not had a gubernatorial candidate challenged on government issues in the past elections. The issues then were gambling and backwoods conservatism.

The announced Democratic gubernatorial candidates are state Sens. William Dee of Grangeville and Cecil Andrew of Orofino, former Atty. Gen. Frank Benson of Jerome has announced. And State Democratic Party Chairman Lloyd Walker of Twin Falls has all but announced. There are more to come.

Walker is the more eager of the candidates to do battle with Smylie. He has said the party will have a ticket to announce by late fall. And he said it was "reasonably accurate" to place him at the head of the ticket.

Walker's proposed ticket, which has met some objections from statehouse Democrats, would carry Lt. Gov. William E. Drevlow in that spot, or Andrew as the lieutenant governor candidate. There could be former State Chairman John Walters as secretary of state candidate, and incumbents Joe R.

Williams, auditor, and D. F. Enpelling, public instruction superintendent. Drevlow and Williams said, however, they would campaign on no one's ticket.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams may be forced out of active politics on doctor's orders; he suffered a heart attack in June and for the past two weeks has been confined to his home.

The dangers of being too early with political announcements doesn't worry Walker. The 1968 elections are the most important in the history of the party, he said.

"If we don't win the governor's office then, well..." and Walker, the half-announced candidate, went "off the record."

Man Returns From Try to Find Brother

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Don Dawson, who searched the jungles of South Viet Nam in vain for 10 months to find his brother dead or alive, returned home to a dry-eyed reunion, saying he just wants "to go back to work to support my family."

Dawson, 28, was met at the airport Wednesday night by his wife, Jeanne, 27. They had only a moment's privacy before facing newsmen. They obliged cameramen with a long kiss.

Dawson, skipper of an oil survey ship before he left for Asia last year, said he spent \$1,000 in the search, but failed to find his brother, Army Lt. Daniel Dawson, 27, a spotter-plane pilot who disappeared over enemy territory last Nov. 6.

During his search, Dawson was held for four months in a Viet Cong prison camp, was stricken with malaria, then finally released after the Communists told him his brother was dead.

"I finally convinced them that my one wish was to have my brother's remains with me when I left. It was hell, but it was worthwhile. My brother would have done the same thing for me, and I would do it again," Dawson said.

His wife agreed: "I feel it was worthwhile, but added: "I'm glad that he is home."

On his failure to return with his brother's remains, Dawson said: "I don't consider that this is a finished story. When the war is over, I've got to go back and they (the guerrillas) will take me to my brother's grave."

Demonstrations May Spread Throughout North Carolina

A national civil rights leader says demonstrations may spread from violence-stricken Plymouth into other sections of North Carolina, a Southern state with a record of good-race relations.

Massed police made more arrests Wednesday in Plymouth as they sought to relieve racial tensions which city authorities blamed on the Ku Klux Klan and out-of-town thrill seekers.

Officers have arrested six persons since two white men were wounded in a street clash between whites and Negroes Tuesday night. "The tensions grew out of Negro voter registration demonstrations which began more than two weeks ago in the fishing and paper mill town of 5,000 in eastern North Carolina."

Violence was touched off Tuesday night for the second time in a week when a group of Negroes walked past a crowd of whites on the main street. A few minutes earlier, Negro leaders, fearing trouble, had called off a protest march.

In Durham, Mayor McFishek, national chairman of the Council of Racial Equality, said, "When Plymouth stops, it's going to be another town — you pick it. There are dozens of Plymouths in North Carolina."

Elsewhere on the racial scene, there were these developments:

An aide to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. announced in Atlanta that King will go to Chicago and Los Angeles this fall in an effort to interest civil rights, ghetto and gang leaders in those cities in his nonviolent movement. King called the effort a "pilot project on problems facing Negroes in Northern ghettos."

In Natchez, Miss., city officials called off a scheduled Wednesday night meeting with representatives of the local Negro community and reset it for today.

One spokesman, who asked that his name be withheld, said the officials thought it best not to hold this type of meeting at night. Negro leaders were to meet with city officials to hear them answer the 12 desegregation demands drawn last Saturday at a Negro mass meeting. A Negro leader said there may be a street demonstration if the results of today's meeting are not acceptable to Negroes.

After a summer of violent racial turmoil, public schools in the troubled southeast Louisiana mill town of Bogalusa integrated quietly and peacefully.

Philippines Attract More Tourists

MANILA (UPI) — For years now, the Philippine Islands have been "out" as a tourist attraction. Pretty soon, however, they may be "in."

Japan, with its ancient Oriental culture and grace-blended with a raucous night life and 20 years of American influence, has been "in." So has Hong Kong with its incomparable shopping facilities.

Exotic Thailand has been "in" with a more limited number of tourists. Singapore, some insiders will tell you, is an even better place to shop than Hong Kong.

But the Philippines — tourists have managed to avoid the islands in droves. Hundreds of thousands of tourists flock to Asia each year; but only a sprinkling stop in Manila.

Now, however, the Philippines may at last be on the verge of becoming a tourist attraction. The big difference is that this time, the Philippines, for the first time, are really going to be trying. Results are already beginning to show. Tourist traffic was up by 16 per cent for the first half of this year.

Four big hotels — the Sheraton, the Manila Hilton, the Riviera and the Continental Manila — are under construction and are slated to be absolutely first class.

This will overcome a major objection to the islands around the world often have avoided suggesting the Philippines to their clients because of insufficient first class hotel space.

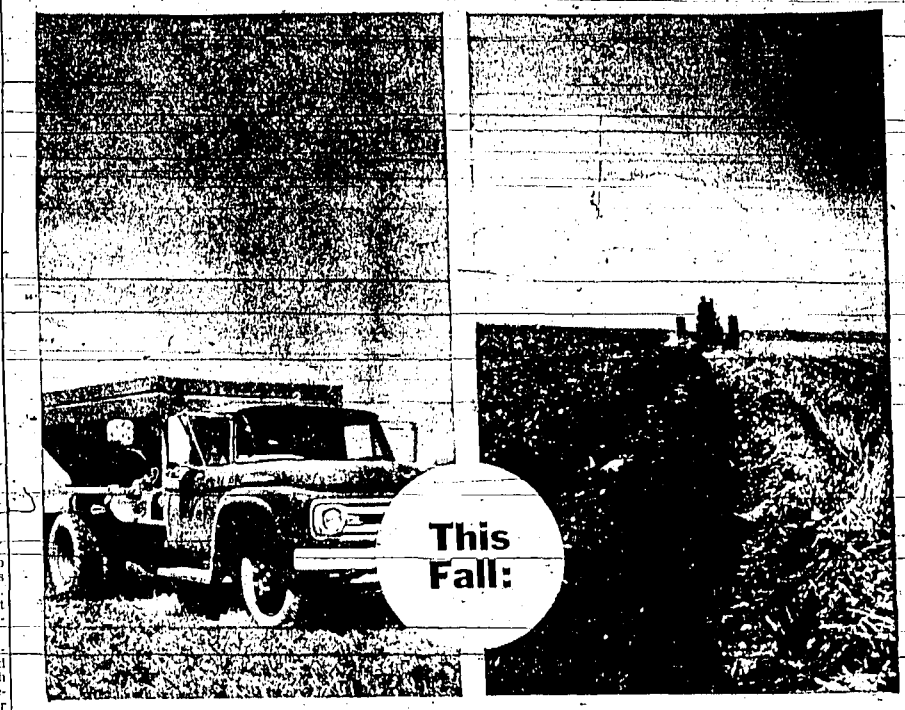
The ranch covers 25 townships, but only 277 acres are deeded land. As with most large western ranches, the title is held in trust in a federal government.

The price tag for all this land is indefinite until sealed bids are opened in private sale Sept. 7 in Carson City.

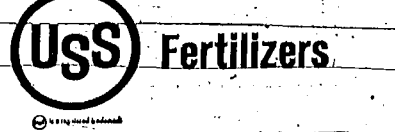

Polio Victim Swims Mile At Age of 12

SEATTLE (AP) — Wayne Hatcher can't walk a foot but he can swim a mile.

He did it Wednesday in a pool to celebrate his 12th birthday. It took 3 hours and 55 minutes for the 72 laps, but for a lad who's been a polio victim since he was 10 months old it was an Olympian feat.

Wayne labored through the pool, swimming almost entirely with his arms. Sometimes he swam on his back and sometimes did a sort of underwater crawl.

Wayne's mother, Mrs. Jack G. Hatcher, said the boy had no voice and could move only his fingers when first stricken with polio. Now he plays the piano.

When the Hatchers moved here June 20 from Wichita, Kan., where the father was a Boeing Co. engineer, Wayne could swim only a pool-length. He's been taking lessons every weekday, and his teacher said "the mile was a challenge to him."

Some doctors have said Wayne never will walk, but his mother disagrees.

"He will walk," she said. "Maybe not like you and I. But he will walk."

Nkrumah In Charge of Ghana Army

ACCRA, Ghana (AP)—President Kwame Nkrumah has taken direct command of Ghana's army following widespread rumors that some generals wanted to depose him.

Sources said two generals ousted from their posts and fired in a surprise move last month suggested Ghana would be better off without Nkrumah. There was no indication, however, the general actually plotted against the Ghanaian president.

Nkrumah took over command of the army Tuesday.

By taking direct command of the 10,000-man army, Nkrumah left Defense Minister Kofi Banko with only the jobs of civil defense, the veterans organization and administrative work.

Nkrumah previously had taken direct command of his personal security battalion which acts as his household guard.

Ghana's special security police are Russian-advised. All other police have been disarmed since a young constable attempted to shoot Nkrumah in January 1964.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Residents of St. Louis are being solicited by police to join a Citizens Against Crime program.

Some 500,000 wallet-size cards are being given out, instructing citizens to call the police department if they see a crime committed or a suspicious person, vehicle or object.

All the words uttered this summer on the abundance of salmon—from the commercial fishermen and Oregon and Washington fish committees—suddenly turn to a warning.



It should be nice for Idahoans to have this official vindication that perhaps there weren't many fish left over for the Salmon and Clearwater rivers. The situation is such that Idahoans could allow themselves a very self-satisfied smile, but the gravity of the situation precludes anything resembling a smile.

The Times-News sports department did get a little tick out of hearing the headline that read "Commercial Interests Remain Poor Salmon Run." The story started out quoting West Coast, Canadian and U.S. union officials as citing this the second year on record.

"...a lot of our boys are going to lose their shirts," a union official said. And if we expected that to raise a sympathy pain or to give an Idaho Steadfast and Salmon areas particularly, he couldn't have missed any farther.

It is interesting to note the difference a month or two can make. It wasn't long ago that the plight of Idaho didn't receive as much as a tsk-tsk from the big boys on the coast. They evidently never heard about the buffalo and passenger pigeon.

Blake Campbell, chief of the Federal Fisheries Department economic branch, said "We have no explanation for the poor catch that is general from southeast Alaska to Oregon. We could suggest till nets for a start, we mean, if Mr. Blake is really in that much of a quandary about where to put an exploring finger."

The salmon take through July was down \$3 million and August started out worse. The pink salmon, which Idaho doesn't have to worry about, was down 75 per cent. Sockeye was down 30 per cent.

The worst year on record was 1960 when the pink catch was a meager 630,000 cases. Last year it was 250,000, not considered low. It seems odd that there can't be an explanation for that—above the cry of Japanese and Russian trawlers invading the river outlets and the "injuans" taking millions more.

Since the coast boys didn't worry about the small Idaho merchandisers who picked up a few bucks a year selling equipment and supplies for the salmon, we guess it would be all right for Idahoans to hope that enough coast commercial fishermen go bankrupt this year. Maybe they wouldn't be back next season and a couple more hockey salmon can get into Idaho.

He was ordained at St. Mary's Cathedral, June 7, 1942, by Bishop Patrick Collier.

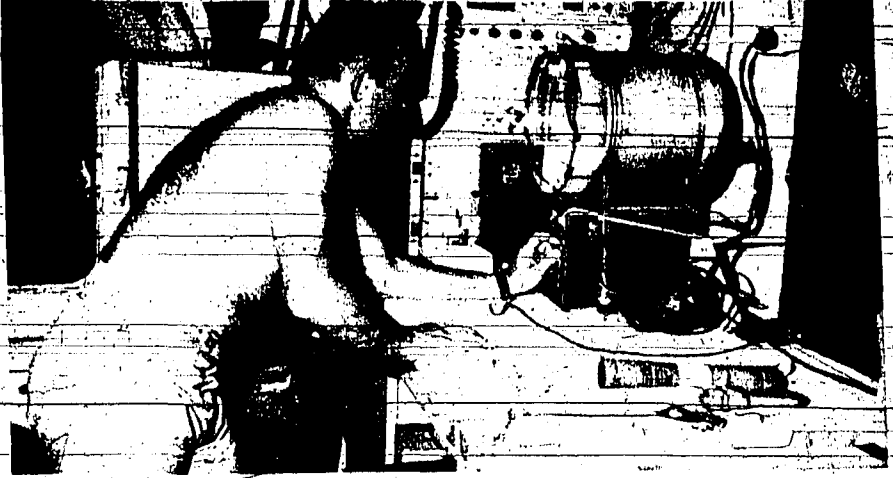

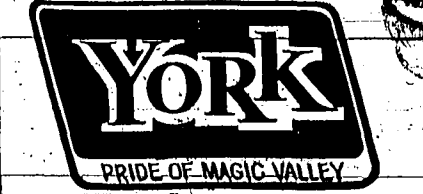

Feuders of Egypt Bury Hatchets

ASSIUT, U. A. R. (UPI) — Vendetta killings, for which this "Sicily of Egypt" has held the country's "uncontested" lead, have "dropped" by 25 per cent over the last 10 years.

Biannual figures on crime in the province, published by the weekly Sabah El-Khair, showed 282 vendetta murders were committed in 1963, against 442 in 1953.

If the trend continues, 1965 is expected to have an all-time low record of less than 300 such murders in the province.

The Assiut province in southern Egypt is famed for family feuds which continue for gen-

erations. In some villages (conditions require that a slain man's family remain in mourning until his death is avenged and "the disgrace is wiped away"). A vendetta murder is sometimes suspended for scores of years until the original killer serves his prison term and is released from jail, or until the victim's son grows old enough to kill.

The government has launched a drive aimed at bringing peace between feuding families through the mediation of village councils, social service workers and local officials and dignitaries.

It was paid promptly and in full, and why not? Wasn't the claimant a highly respected businessman and civic leader?

"That doctor's a big crook," complained the businessman to a company when the medical claim of 50 per cent of the settlement for his part in the deal.

A few years later the successful claimant, who had inflated his own son into "crippledness" in the insurance fraud, was bewildered when his boy was caught cheating in a school examination. "I did everything possible to teach him to be honest," moaned the father.

Involvement of children in insurance fraud is not unusual. Just recently a young boy was wheel-chaired into court in California after being "crippled" in an automobile accident. A fire engine went past the courthouse, with siren wailing. The youngster jumped up from his wheel chair and ran to the window to see the apparatus. Case dismissed.

"It is probable that the most important single factor in the steady rise of insurance costs is 'padded' claims," says E. Wayne Covert, vice president of an underwriting firm. "Submit that padded claim and you can be sure of a dishonest and over-bleat or highway robbery."

Insurance companies estimate that 10 per cent of all claims are phony — one way or another. This 10 per cent gives a big hike to the cost of your car insurance.

"The 'injury industry' goes beyond padding," adds Covert. "It embraces a wide range of unethical, illegal, fraudulent, foolish or dishonest stratagems by which claimants are unjustly enriched at the expense of insurance carriers — and ultimately of their policyholders."

Padded or completely fraudulent claims can be collected only with the cooperation of crooked or shady lawyers, doctors and sometimes even the insurance company's own adjuster.

"A lawyer cannot usually settle a case without a doctor's report or try a case without a doctor's testimony," reported Jacob Burns, a New York attorney, who headed that state's coordination committee for a Bar Assn. Burns reported a number of cases that were similar to the one involving the 8-year-old boy, with no injuries, no medical treatment — yet a doctor's report showing extensive bodily damage and a whopping fee.

"The last decade has seen a growing 'claim consciousness' on the part of the American people," says Covert, "coupled with the notion that if something happens to injure a person or his property, somebody else should pay for it, regardless of whether the injured party might have caused the damage himself."

This attitude has been cultivated by an organization known as the National Association of Claimants' Counsel of America (now called the American Trial Lawyers Assn.). It advocates what it calls "the more adequate award" and it velgels against "paltry verdicts in the atomic age."

The organization sends "caravans" of prominent lawyers around the country to instruct plaintiffs' attorneys on how to handle damage cases.

"The word headache should not be used," says their material, "because of the simplicity with which they are cured on

Writers Aid in Ousting Of Erhard

DONN (UPI)—Germany's so-called intellectual writers have signed themselves to help oust Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt from office. Only the Sept. 19 election will show whether they helped oust Erhard.

A dozen well-known authors are volunteering Brandt their services as speech and public relations advisers. They have added their names to a list of writers who have presented Brandt with a letter of protest to Erhard and his friends.

Stars of the Brandt intellectual circle are "Tin Drum" and "Do Not Bury My Heart in Wreath" author Günter Grass, "Yearning" writer Peter Weiss and "The Deputy" playwright Rolf Hochhuth.

A large postwar writers whose works are controversial on grounds of taste. They share a dislike of Erhard and his pro-capitalist program which they consider petty bourgeois and undemocratic.

Erhard has reacted angrily, referring to writers who criticized him as "Philistines" and "narrow-minded fellows." He describes their books as "debased art," a phrase invented by the Nazi book burners but rarely heard in the last 20 years.
