Planes Hit Near Red China

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U. S. military spokesmen announced today that American warplanes bombed a bridge 17 miles south of Red China's border with North Viet Nam. It was their closest penetration toward the Chinese frontier in the Vietnamese war.

The spokesman said four F105 Thunderchiefs damaged the railroad bridge at the raid Wednesday and "downed" two of them. The area, about 140 miles southwest of Hanoi, is an important transportation center leading to the North Vietnamese capital. U.S. planes are trying to disrupt a railroad in the area that last month bombed within 10 miles of Red China twice.

In the ground war, U.S. Marines and Vietnamese troops cleared their giant sweep from the Viet Cong from the Panagan peninsula. Reports from the three-day operation 20 miles south of the Laotian border said 148 Viet Cong had been killed, 38 captured and 100 suspects detained.

Although between 5,000 and 10,000 troops were taking part, American and Vietnamese troops were described as "light forces" reported, but a U.S. helicopter crashed in the Hlong Delta 100 miles south of Saigon, and all members of its crew were reported killed.

Premier Hits India Attack On Pakistan

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China's Premier Chou En-lai today condemned "India's massive armed attack on Pakistan" and said it could not be condoned without the consent and support of the United States.

Chou again declared Communist China's firm support for Pakistan and warned "the Indian government that it must bear full responsibility for all the consequences arising from its extended aggression."

Chou, however, stopped short of saying that China would provide any form of concrete assistance in Pakistan. His remarks were made at a reception in Peking at the North Korean Embassy and relayed by Peking Radio.

Vocational Classes Get Board Okay

BOISE (AP) — The State Board of Education gave its approval today to a schedule of vocational education classes planned at schools throughout the state.

Classes will be operated at area vocational schools established at Idaho State University, Boise College, North Idaho Junior-College at Coeur d'Alene and the new College of Southern Idaho at Twin Falls.

The board also approved a schedule of distributive education classes planned at a number of high schools throughout the state.

Hotel Cleanup in Progress as Insurance Men Check Damages

Cleanup work was in progress Thursday at the Rogerson Hotel as workers remove charred debris from the fire-ravaged third floor and owners of the business located on the first floor of the hotel surveyed damage to their shops.

Damage to the first floor of the hotel and the four business firms was surveyed by the owners and insurance adjusters Thursday morning in order to establish an estimate of the total damage. Inventory of the merchandise that remained in the shops was being carried out by several of the owners.

No estimate of the damage had been reached early Thursday, the owners noted, but was expected by Friday. The damage to the first floor was mainly from smoke and water.

Several of the owners were able to salvage some of the merchandise in the shops, but they indicated they weren't certain just how much of it could be reclaimed or how much was saleable.

Frank Cook, owner of the Mayfair Shop, noted that future plans for the shop were uncertain and would depend on what the future of the building was. He stated that he hoped to be open for business in time for Christmas.

Refugees Go Inland From Hurricane

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Thousands of refugees streamed inland today from Louisiana's exposed coastal areas as Hurricane Betsy, fresh from an attack on Florida, churned relentlessly closer.

The vanguard of 100,000 residents of southern Louisiana and eastern Texas packed cars and trailers and headed north away from possible killer tides and 140 mile an hour winds.

The New Orleans Weather Bureau urged them to evacuate quickly before rising tides cut off escape by land.

"Betsy is expected to continue moving about 18 miles per hour and turn to a northwesterly course today," a Weather Bureau advisory said. "Not much change in size or intensity is indicated."

Opening Day at T.F. Fair Draws Record Attendance

FILER — With the return of good weather Thursday, a record attendance is expected at Twin Falls day at the Twin Falls County Fair. Wednesday's rain and overcast skies had no effect on the opening day's crowd, officials said, with paid attendance for East End day reported at 9,229, nearly 1,000 more than last year's high of 8,388 for the same day, according to Warren Barry, fair board president.

U.S. Officials Eye Red Intervention

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials take seriously the possibility that Communist China may intervene in the India-Pakistan war to the extent of stirring up border trouble on India's northeast frontier. The Chinese purpose, it is believed here, would be to demonstrate support for Pakistan and thus encourage that country to break its alliances with the United States and other Western powers and move into the Red Chinese orbit.

Pakistanis Tear Down U.S. Flag

LAHORE, Pakistan (AP) — A crowd of young Pakistanis chanting "Yankos go home" ripped down the American flag from the U.S. consulate today, marched two blocks away and burned the flag in post office square.

No attempt was made to enter the consulate, but security guards quickly bolted its main steel doors.

One young man marched up to the building's step and led the group of approximately 50 in an anti-American chant and shouts of "Pakistan zindabad (long live)" and "Ayub (President Ayub Khan) zindabad."

A carload of police officers arrived at the consulate about 30 minutes after the group left. As the crowd walked from the consulate most Pakistanis on the sidewalk appeared disinterested.

Large numbers of American workers waiting for buses ignored the chants as youths set fire to the American flag.

Four Charged With Assault In Shooting

RUPERT — Charges of assault with intent to commit murder were filed Thursday against four Burley youths in connection with a shooting incident Saturday night outside Gary's Sugar Shack, located on the grounds of the old VFW armory property.

Larry Duff, Minidoka County prosecuting attorney, has filed charges against Charles Valdez, 20; Celestino Torrez, 19; Dan Alejandro, 16; and Gustavo Alejandro, 17, all Burley.

The attorney said the Alejandro brothers were remanded to Minidoka County Thursday morning to stand trial after a juvenile petition was filed in Cassia County to determine if the youths could be handled as adults and not under the Youth Rehabilitation Act.

The four are accused of wounding Loan Bremer, 32, Heyburn, and Frank Warr, 30, Hurley, at a dance in the former armory building. Bremer is still in Minidoka Memorial Hospital in good condition and Warr was released after emergency treatment.

City of T.F. Gets Urban Renewal Fund

WASHINGTON (Special) — A federal grant of \$25,106 to the city of Twin Falls was announced today by Sen. Frank Church, who said the funds would be used for comprehensive planning for the growth and development of Twin Falls.

The Idaho Democrat said the Urban Renewal funds are to be matched by \$12,553 in local funds. The combined money, Church said, would finance comprehensive planning work for the Magic Valley city for a 12-month period.

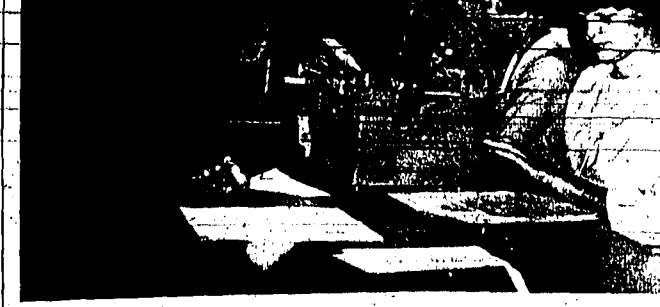

Bill Nationalizes Copper Holdings

SANTAGO, Chile (AP) — Preliminary approval by the Chilean Senate early today virtually assured passage of a bill engineering President Eduardo Frei to partially nationalize more than \$1 billion worth of U.S. copper holdings.

Frei's government will purchase 51 per cent of the stock of the Kennecott Company's Chilean subsidiary and 25 per cent of the stock of the subsidiaries of the Cerro and Andacollo companies. The companies also have agreed to an expansion program to make Chile the world's No. 1 producer by 1970.

Soviets Accuse U.S. of Blocking Ban of Tests

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union accused the United States today of blocking agreement on a treaty to ban underground nuclear tests in order to continue development of its own tactical nuclear arms.

Soviet delegate Semyon K. Tsvetkov told the 17-nation disarmament conference Western insistence on an inspection system to police, such a ban is "unwisely designed" to camouflage the United States, real intention — that is to bar any agreement in their field.

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Gemini 5 Is Described by Astronaut

MANNED SPACE CENTER, Houston, Tex. (AP) — Eight days of chaff hanging — that's the way Gemini 5 astronaut Gordon Cooper Jr. described his recraft flight, and today he tells about those exciting hours.

Cooper and his space partner, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Charles Conrad Jr. were recovered Aug. 29 from the West Atlantic after 190 hours, and 55 minutes orbiting the earth. Soon afterward the veteran space voyager told sailors aboard the USS Lake Champlain that the flight was "eight days of chaff hanging, not knowing what was going on or wrong next."

For 11 days since, Cooper and Conrad have been telling doctors, scientists and engineers what happened during the 120 orbits.

The astronauts' families have seen the two space heroes only once since they returned to Houston from Cape Kennedy a week ago.

Soon after recovery the space twins were shut out from the usual round of home town celebrations and parades accorded space heroes. Instead they were closeted with officials who wanted to know every detail of what happened on the history-making flight.

The round of celebrations and parades is expected to start next week. President Johnson told Cooper and Conrad he wanted them to become space ambassadors to foreign countries.

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MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—That restless, post-Labor Day feeling is already beginning to grip Congress just as the most conservative administration proposal is about to come up.

Recall pledged by President Johnson in his campaign a year ago charged with the deepest political emotions. Conservative groups throughout the country are laying down a barrage of propaganda.

Paper Mills Hit for River Pollution

PORTLAND (AP) — Pulp and paper mills were blamed Wednesday for pollution of the lower Columbia River.

T. C. Ferris of the U.S. Public Health Service said at a conference on pollution of the lower Columbia that the mills were the main offenders. He also said an abatement program established in a previous conference had not been fully successful.

L. Edward Perry, program director for the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries' Columbia Fisheries Program office, agreed with Ferris.

Pollution abatement has been "fairly slow," Perry said.

He added that the pulp and paper mill waste disposal has been a public issue for years.

But the abatement program got support from a state official. Deputy State Sanitary Engineer of the State Sanitary Authority said there is "ample evidence that the cities, industries and people of the Oregon and co-operating fully to inhibit and control pollution in the lower Columbia River."

The state has a program under way for keeping its rivers clean, Weathersbee said, "a very sound program," and neither Oregon nor Washington should be subject to federal abatement action.

Lt. Sonnenburg, Aquanaut Doctor, Says Underwater Crew Is Doing Well

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) — Taking a swim at 205 feet below the surface of the sea is much like strolling in his own back yard, says one of the aquanauts in Sealab 2.

Lt. Robert E. Sonnenburg, the doctor on the aquanaut team, gave this impression of underwater living Wednesday night in a telephone interview with The Associated Press.

"I think we are all feeling well, but some of us are getting cabin fever after 11 days down here, and we are getting ready to go up," Sonnenburg said.

Nine of the 10 aquanauts in the Navy's underwater living experiment are scheduled to surface Sunday when they will be replaced by another team.

Cmdr. Scott Carpenter, the astronaut turned aquanaut, plans to stay down another 15 days.

Sonnenburg said life in the 12x58-foot steel capsule was not much different from submarine duty and that the civilian members of the team had adjusted easily to the routine.

"The biggest thing for me was the original occupancy," he said. "There's no feeling of insecurity here. We never think about that."

The pressure of seven atmospheres in the Sealab gave Sonnenburg's voice the high pitch quality of a speeded-up phonograph record.

He said the ear infection that hit nine of the aquanauts was responding to antibiotic treatment.

Physicians had blamed microorganisms in the ocean water for the infections, the first physical trouble reported since the men went down Aug. 28.

The first team of aquanauts has spent much of its time getting the Sealab ready for occupancy and preparing the surrounding area for experiments.

Probe Asked for Terrorist Attacks

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — President Chung Il Park ordered a thorough investigation today into a series of terrorist attacks on opponents of his government.

An explosion early today shattered windows in the home of Yoo Ok-woo, chairman of the opposition Minjung party's central standing committee.

Tuesday night an explosion shattered the gate at the home of an editor of the opposition newspaper Donga Ilbo and four unidentified men beat up the production chief of a radio station run by the newspaper.

There had been some speculation that he would make passing reference to the question of his candidacy, but he bore out earlier predictions that he would not disclose his plans.

In a brief opening statement, de Gaulle said he thought for days' meeting with women would have a particular importance. He said the world is "troubled now by many disturbances," and that France is "undertaking a new stage in its internal and external program."

He noted also there was particular interest since his seven-year term as president is coming to a close.

Paratroop Divisions Geared For Underdeveloped Areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has streamlined its two paratrooper divisions and regeared them to fight chiefly in underdeveloped areas like Southeast Asia rather than against a "sophisticated" enemy in Europe.

The action came after Army experts reviewed the role of the 82nd Airborne and 101st Airborne divisions in the light of contemporary world conditions.

The slimmed-down divisions require only about half as many Air Force transports to carry them to trouble spots — 620 instead of 1,300 — and this gives the paratroopers what the Army

calls "greater strategic mobility." Stripped away from each division was a battalion of 47 self-propelled 80-millimeter guns, a battery of four Little John rockets and all heavy equipment not capable of being carried in the Air Force's C130 transport planes.

Each division was cut by 1,000 men, paring their strength to slightly under 13,000 men apiece.

In effect, the Army's combat developments command decided that airborne divisions would not be needed, at least at the outset, in any land battle against Communist armies in

Europe. However, it was stressed that in the event a need arose for the paratrooper units in Europe, they could be reinforced and fitted for action there.

Basically, the Army experts concluded that the most likely threats of the future will arise in areas like Asia, Africa and Latin America.

It was to meet these threats better that the airborne divisions were streamlined.

Johnson, Dirksen Have Exchange of Favors

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson appears to have traded Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen a rabbit for a horse in an exchange of political favors.

Johnson got the horse Wednesday when the Senate Judiciary Committee approved by a 14-2 vote a House-passed bill which would abolish over the next three years the 41-year-old national origins system of immigration.

From the President's viewpoint the horse may be somewhat spavined by a provision that would limit Western Hemisphere immigration to 120,000 individuals yearly. But otherwise Johnson is reported to believe the horse is satisfactorily sound.

Dirksen got what his best

friends and ardent supporters hesitate to describe other than as a rabbit — a proposed constitutional amendment on legislative reapportionment.

The Republican leader is credited with being a hard bargainer most of the time. His difficulty in this case was that he was in desperate straits to keep his proposal alive in the hope that he can inflate support for it on another day.

The Dirksen proposal would permit state voters to determine whether the house of their legislature should be apportioned on other than a population basis.

This would nullify in part the Supreme Court's one-man, one-vote decision.

because support for it was eight votes short of the required two-thirds majority.

Starting all over again, Dirksen got a Judiciary subcommittee to approve it. But he was up against an 8-8 tie vote by which the full committee previously had rejected the proposed amendment.

To change that lineup, the GOP leader moved in to block committee action on the immigration bill although he said he favored passage of the later measure.

Because Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., of the Judiciary Committee opposed the immigration measure, Dirksen was in a position to get recognition from the chair to talk as long as he chose to talk a committee vote.

Nobody had to draw the President a picture to demonstrate to him what could happen. It was a time for trading and he obviously didn't think he was giving away too much.

Dirksen got his proposal approved by a 9-7 vote when Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., reluctantly broke the deadlock.

Dodd explained he did this only because if he didn't, the immigration measure would have been "seriously jeopardized."

Sen. Joseph P. Tydings, D-Md., said the committee had been "blackmailed" and had been "forced to pay the ransom."

By that time so many state legislatures will have been reapportioned on a population basis that few of them seem likely to have much interest in ratifying a constitutional amendment on the question.

The requirement of two-thirds approval of both houses and ratification by three-fourths of the state legislatures thus presented a formidable barrier Dirksen will have to figure out how to surmount.

Governor Surveys Dam Situation

FONTENELLE, Wyo. (AP) — Gov. Cliff Hansen flew to Lusk today to see for himself the situation which has put the Wyoming National Guard on alert along the city of Green and prompted the city of Lusk to be prepared for flood waters.

Hansen left Jackson to meet with Bureau of Reclamation officials to discuss the problem at the Fontenelle Dam. He also met with Green River city officials to discuss measures for protecting the city from additional water retained from the dam.

Wyoming Adjutant Gen. Robert Dutton has been inspecting the Fontenelle area for several days. The state's National Guard has been alerted since the leak in the reservoir was termed serious.

Bureau of Reclamation officials said Wednesday night the reservoir level stood at 6,492 feet — about three and three fourths feet less than was measured at the same period Tuesday night.

Engineers said about 242,500 acre-feet remain in the reservoir, and that 114,200 acre-feet have been drawn out since the gates were opened last Saturday.

They say this is about one-third of the total water in the reservoir.

By LEIF ERICKSON — SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The investment "mistake" of Kern County Land Co. founders has turned out to be one of the most enormously profitable in California business enterprise.

With mining bonanza profits, bankers Lloyd Tevis and James Ben Ali Haggin — originally bought up San Joaquin Valley land with a plan to sell it to immigrant farmers — they hoped to lure from England.

Spurring Wild West ventures in the 1870s, England's farmers would not buy. Tevis and Haggin were stuck with their acres. They turned to cattle raising and incorporated in 1890.

The land the bankers couldn't unload produced \$416.6 million in oil royalty revenues through 1964.

President Dwight M. Cochran recently assured land company stockholders: "We will continue to have substantial income and pay you from oil royalty payments for many years."

Kern County land is celebrated this month its 75th corporate birthday with broadly diversified assets exceeding \$218 million. Newly acquired among these are controlling interests in J. I. Case Co., farm implement maker, and a partnership stake with Union Oil Co. in Australia.

1964's major oil discovery at Moabite field.

Kern County Land no longer is simply a land company nor is it confined to Kern County.

But it remains one of the country's biggest cattle raising operations, annually marketing about 20,000 head.

The best animals start as calves with six-month nurseries in California, New Mexico and Arizona with a total of 1.8 million acres of company-owned land.

They go to market from scientifically managed feed lots near Bakersfield, Calif., and Scottsbluff, Neb.

The company also is one of the nation's biggest corporate crop farmers. It has 118,000 acres of irrigated lands producing cotton, fruit, potatoes, and nuts. It operates only 100 acres on its own and leases the balance in big-scale crop sharing.

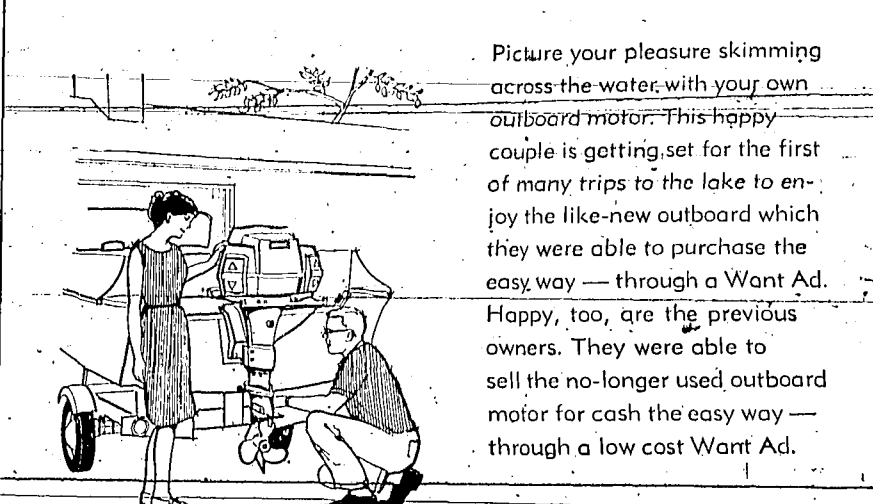

Once again it appears Magic Valley hunters can be thankful for being where they are. While the rest of the nation is severely cut back in number of ducks allowed...

While there have been some complaints from some areas, Magic Valley can come up smiling. The truth is this. The local production is considered outstanding—the best in many years. Also, Magic Valley can expect as many or more ducks as it has been wintering for the past few years.

Ducks Unlimited, the private sportsman's organization that can be credited with saving the North American flights, reported in its summer report that in many cases ducks nested before the high water mark was reached. When the spring rains continued pouring more water into the sloughs and potholes, the established nests were flooded out.

It is this point the Wildlife Service has jumped on. The game warden got the season and limit restrictions on a matter of simple arithmetic. If by reducing the bag the fall harvest is cut by 20 per cent, the production next year will be up 33 per cent. Or to break it down into points and gray figures, the production next year will be up 6,000,000 next year — and still have a surplus of brood stock to pyramid for 1967.

These figures are more applicable to other areas than here. Hence, Idahoans are involved in what bird biologists Charles Blake, Idaho Fish and Game Department, describes as a "synthetic cut."

"The Snake River area is what we call a migratory territory, or in other words—once the ducks get here they generally stay for the winter," Blake explains.

"Actually, we don't know exactly where our birds come from. Banding projects tell us that about 20 per cent of our wintering, non-humiliated duck population comes from Western Alberta. This is one area where it is to our benefit to go along with the cullback.

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Johnson Sees First Person In Medicare

Negro Film, Singing Star Found Dead

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The ill-starred career of Dorothy Dandridge, beautiful Negro singer, actress, ended Wednesday in death under circumstances not immediately explained.

Her body was found in her Sunset Strip-area apartment by Earl Mills, her manager for 14 years. Sheriff's homicide Lt. David Hamilton told news-

"No foul play so far has been indicated. It could have been accidental or natural. Naturally, the body has been taken to the coroner for a complete autopsy."

Miss Dandridge, 41, on stage almost as soon as she could talk, rose from band vocalist to stardom in such films as "Porgy and Bess" and "Carmen Jones." But in recent years she had suffered financial reverses although she continued working.

In 1962 she filed for bankruptcy, claiming she had debts of \$127,000. She had been earning \$50,000 a year previously.

Mills said he went to her apartment to admit fitters who were to measure her for costumes to be worn at an opening next week at Basin Street East, in New York City. Finding a chain on the door, Mills got a crowbar and broke in, he said. He found her dead, clad in a blue nightgown, on the bathroom floor. An hour later her mother arrived.

Mills said Miss Dandridge had been slightly ill but had been in good spirits. She returned from a Mexico vacation Tuesday, he said, and went to a doctor who told her a bone in her foot was broken.

In 1962, Miss Dandridge was divorced from her second husband, restaurant owner John Denison. They had no children. Miss Dandridge was born in Cleveland, the daughter of a minister. At an early age she and her sister Vivian toured the country in a singing, dancing and tumbling act.

She was educated by an aunt in theater dressing rooms. When she got to Los Angeles, the mother, Ruby, put the children in school and the mother went into pictures and radio.

The mother was best known for her roles with the late Hattie McDaniel on the old "Heulah" show.

Public Opinion in Favor of Death Penalty Is Declining

By HARRY FERGUSON

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States is moving slowly but relentlessly toward abolition of the death penalty. Nobody can say when it will happen because each state makes its own laws on the subject.

But public opinion is pushing the states. In 1953, 68 per cent of Americans favored the death penalty, according to the Gallup Poll. The figure dropped to 51 per cent in 1960 and to 45 per cent in 1965.

What is happening in the United States happened long ago in other parts of the world. Holland, Portugal, Belgium and Denmark abolished capital punishment in the 19th century. And those persons favoring the end of the death penalty in America have not enjoyed a steady record of success. Six states—Washington, Colorado, South Dakota, Kansas, Missouri and Tennessee—have abolished capital punishment and then restored it.

There are three principal arguments advanced by persons opposed to the death penalty:

—Fear of execution does not deter a man from committing murder. Clinton T. Duffy, former warden of San Quentin Prison, puts it this way: "Time after time I have asked men about to die, 'Before you killed did you stop to think of the consequences?' Invariably the answer was no. Men killed in anger or frustration or jealousy or hatred or cold blood. They killed on the spur of the moment because they happened to have weapons in their hands. They killed for money, for love, for revenge, for sex. If they thought of anything it was that they wouldn't be caught."

—The taking of human life, no matter who does it and for what reason, is in itself a crime. The state sinks to the same level of barbarism as a

murder when it executes a man.

—Experience and statistics show that there is no significant difference in the murder rates between states that do and do not have capital punishment.

Assuming that there will come a day when murders will not be executed in the United

States, then what will happen to them? There are almost as many plans as there are opponents of capital punishment, but some variation of a proposal made by Lewis E. Lawes, one-time warden of Sing Sing Prison, appears to be the most popular.

Here it is: A person convicted of murder in the first degree (premeditated murder) shall be sentenced to life imprisonment. After a prisoner has served 20 years, he shall become eligible for pardon or for commutation to a sentence less than life. If the sentence is commuted to a definite span of years, the prisoner shall be allowed to collect money for the work he does in prison. Some of this money shall be allocated to support his dependents, and the dependents of the person he murdered.

Friends Describe Dr. Schweitzer as Greatest Humanitarian of His Time

Dr. Albert Schweitzer was a gentle strong man with the bronzed face and arms of a peasant and the intellect and education of a 19th century scholar. He won the world's respect — and a Nobel Peace Prize — through love and optimism in an African hospital beyond the edge of civilization.

Friends of the doctor called him the greatest humanitarian of his time, a man who never refused help to any living being.

Love was the base on which Schweitzer built. But it was tempered with a toughness that enabled him to spend most of his life in conditions that broke lesser men in months. Despite world acclaim which culminated in the award of the 1952 Nobel Peace Prize, Schweitzer shunned publicity. He once told a friend he had not time for the trappings of civilization as he had so much to do in his hospital.

Schweitzer turned his back on a career as a theologian, musician and philosopher in 1913 to begin work with his young wife in a "strange leper colony" a few miles from the equator. He never really stopped his work until his death at 90. His wife, Helene, died in 1957 at 79.

Schweitzer had his critics. Some claimed his hospital was a disgrace, antiquated and dilatory. Others opposed him for failure to publicly denounce the apartheid policy of the South African government.

He also was criticized for his condemnation of the United Nations operation in the Congo. But this, as his South African statement, stemmed from his opposition to foreign intervention in most parts of Africa.

Frederick Franck, author of the book "The Days With Albert Schweitzer," replied to certain critics.

"Let us be fair and emphasize that few persons over 80 who have built their own institutions are willing to start streamlining them," he wrote.

"Other doctors have come and gone but Schweitzer has stayed. Even if he believes in certain old-fashioned medicines, he never prevents his doctors from treating patients as they see fit with the newest antibiotics."

Schweitzer's "Spirit" was founded in the "fundamental" Christian principles "beginning with love for fellow men. Its rejection accounted for the decline of civilization, as he saw it."

Schweitzer belonged to no formal denomination. His background was Calvinist; his religion "Christian."

He once was asked why he did not throw out patients who had recovered, from his crowded hospital, why he never got rid of the hangers-on who sought shelter from him.

"I never send anyone away," he said. "You cannot look into
