

U.S., Viet Nam Forces Spread Out Near Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Thousands of U.S. paratroopers and Vietnamese soldiers fanned out today on Viet Cong territory about 30 miles north of Saigon, U.S. spokesmen said. Elements of the U.S. Army's 1st Airborne Division are taking part in the joint operation launched Tuesday in an effort to establish a base for forces in an area long under guerrilla control. The spokesman said no major contact had been made but that the allied forces drew sporadic sniper fire. He reported no U.S. casualties and said Australian and New Zealand troops on the operation took light losses. The area being cleared was the district town of Ben Cat, 20 miles north of Saigon in the Quang Province.

U.S. paratroopers parachuted today with 1,100 Vietnamese troops on Viet Cong territory near the town of Ben Cat in one of the operations. In another part, U.S. paratroopers and New Zealand troops on the operation reached Ben Cat by air along Highway 13 on the Viet Cong, have pulled out of the area. The Viet Cong truck in the convoy blew up after striking a mine and killed the casualties on the New Zealanders. The parachute jump was made in driving rain and was the first by Vietnamese paratroopers since last year. In the air war, another flight of 82 bombers from Guam hit a suspected Viet Cong installation in Zone D 30 miles north of Saigon in Bien Hoa Province. It was the 24th air strike by the big planes of the U.S. Strategic Air Command. A U.S. Navy plane on a strike on South Viet Nam crashed at sea 145 miles southwest of Saigon and the pilot was presumed dead. Seventeen Americans were killed in action during the week ending Sept. 11, a military spokesman said. Fifty-eight others were wounded. U.S. and Vietnamese war planes shot 291 missions against Viet Cong positions in South Viet Nam in the 24-hour period ending Wednesday.

Peking Told to Stay Out of War
WARSAW, Poland (AP)—U.S. Ambassador John Moors Cabot indicated today after his first and last meeting with the Chinese Communist envoy here that he warned Peking to stay out of the India-Pakistan war. "It might be a good assumption," Cabot told reporters who asked him if he had repeated to Ambassador Wang Kang-chun, Secretary of State Dean Rusk's chargé, "Peking Monday. Rusk said: 'There are those who feel the Communist Chinese are trying to fish in troubled waters. Our own advice is that they stay out.'"

582 Evacuated From Pakistan
TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)—The U.S. Air Force evacuated 582 Americans from war-threatened Lahore in West Pakistan today. They included nine pregnant women, 23 members of the peace corps and 182 dependents of U.S. government personnel. The U.S. air office, the U.S. Information Service, and the consulate in Lahore were remaining open. There were about 900 Americans in Lahore and only those who wanted to leave were evacuated. A spokesman said the operation went off like clockwork.

Senate Interior Committee Approves Wild Rivers Bill
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Interior Committee approved today a bill to create a national system of wild rivers for the preservation in their natural state of stretches of some of the nation's more scenic streams. The measure would prohibit dams and commercial developments on the portions of rivers placed in the system.

Illinois Has Mop-up After Tornado
PEORIA, Ill. (UPI)—Workers labored to mop up a million dollars' worth of tornado damage in Peoria today following an attack of late summer storms which struck the Midwest. Two storm-related deaths were reported in central Illinois and at least 30 persons were injured in Peoria when a twister carved a mile-long path into the city's industrialized south side near the Illinois River. The storms swept eastward today, causing extensive damage at Erie, Pa. Wind gusts up to 84 miles an hour downed power lines, uprooted trees and smashed windows. No injuries were reported. The storms, which started in Iowa, did heavy crop damage with pounding hail across Illinois and into Indiana. A man in Danforth, Ill., died of a heart attack while running to a barn from the storm, and a Springfield, Ill., man was ejected to his death from a second story porch in the state capital. The Peoria-Union Stockyards, seventh largest hog market in the nation, was reduced to what one reporter called "match sticks." A huge cooperage plant of Hiram Walker distillery was shattered, with pieces of broken whiskey barrels scattered for blocks. A soft drink bottling works was also destroyed. Illinois Gov. Otto Kerner arrived to view the damage today. He walked through the broken remains of Norwood School where 40 children huddled in the basement during the tornado. All of the pupils escaped injury. Hotels and motels in the Peoria area were jammed with refugees.

Counties Get Tuition Bills From College

Dr. James L. Taylor, president of the College of Southern Idaho, announced Tuesday that tuition bills have been sent out to six counties in Southern Idaho. Each county outside the junior college district is required to pay \$225 to the College of Southern Idaho for each student attending from its county. Figures are as of last Thursday and are expected to increase between now and closing of enrollment on Sept. 21. The amounts billed and number of students attending from each county are, Minidoka, \$2,717.50 and 14 students; Power County, \$225 and one student; Blaine County, \$742.50 and five students; Cassia County, \$1,125 and four students; Gooding County, \$2,925 and 15 students; and Lincoln County, \$2,475 and 12 students.

Smylie Backs Wild Rivers Legislation

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie said today he disagrees with Idaho's Republican United States senator regarding the proposed Wild Rivers legislation pending in Congress. But he said his disagreement should not be construed as an indication of any feud between the two. He said he has made his position known to Sen. Len Jordan.

Idaho's other senator, Democrat Frank Church, is sponsor of the Wild Rivers Bill, which would preserve Idaho's Salmon and Clearwater Rivers largely in their present state. Jordan has urged amending the bill to put the two streams on a standby basis, but not include them now in the "wild" status.

He is reluctant to disagree with Senator Jordan," Smylie told his news conference, "but in this instance I do." He said preservation of the two streams, including their fish resources, is "of extreme importance" to Idaho. He said there are safeguards in the bill which would "protect the people who live along the rivers."

Smylie said his views on the legislation were based on recommendations by state agencies dealing with natural resources in Idaho.

The governor told his news conference he will go to Montreal, Canada, next Monday to make the keynote address at a convention of the International City Managers Association. He said it will be the first time he has been keynote speaker for an international organization.

Sunday evening the governor will speak at a freshmen convocation at the University of Idaho. Following the Montreal address he will return to Boise Tuesday.

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New Appeal Made By Johnson to End Kashmir Conflict

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson, responding to a surprising move by President Mohammed Ayub Kahn of Pakistan, made a new appeal today for Pakistan and India to cooperate with the United Nations in the search for an end to their conflict. The White House said Johnson is willing to do everything he can to promote peace but that he "very strongly hopes" that U. N. Secretary-General U Thant will be given every opportunity to resolve the problem of the undeclared war over Kashmir.

Pope Establishes Synod of Bishops

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI issued an official document today setting up a worldwide synod of bishops and spelling out how it will help him govern the Roman Catholic Church. The document was read to the approximately 2,500 prelates in St. Peter's Basilica at their first working meeting of the fourth and final session of the Vatican Ecumenical Council. The Pope announced Tuesday that he would create the synod. The document stated that the synod answers the Pope's need for a central organization to bring him into closer contact with his bishops around the world.

8 Nations Call Halt on Nuclear Tests

GENEVA (AP)—Eight non-aligned nations called today for an immediate halt of underground nuclear tests, but the United States promptly rejected the idea saying such a ban must contain policing arrangements. The same eight countries—Brazil, Burma, Ethiopia, India, Mexico, Nigeria, Sweden and the United Arab Emirates—also urged new efforts to reduce and eventually eliminate the world's supplies of nuclear weapons.

Their position was defined in two memorandums presented to the 17-nation disarmament conference at Geneva. The official name of the body will be "Synod of the Bishops." It will meet in ordinary, extraordinary or special meetings wherever and whenever the Pope sees fit. Most of the members, whose total number was not specified, will be bishops actively in charge of dioceses and archdioceses.

One bishop will be chosen from each national bishops conference that has 25 members or fewer; two from each conference with 50 or under; three from each conference with 100 or under; four from each conference with more than 100 bishops. The United States, Italy, Brazil and nearly a dozen other countries have more than 100 bishops and will thus have four members of the synod.

After the reading of the papal document, bishops of the council began debate on the religious liberty document which has caused one of the widest controversies in the 3-year-old council. The religious liberty topic says every man has a right to conscience in religious belief and cannot be hindered from doing so.

Tax Details Reported for Minidoka

RUPERT—The total state and county tax levy in Minidoka county has decreased by \$1.55 per \$100 assessed valuation because of the three per cent sales tax, commissioners said Wednesday. Total state and county tax is \$1.93 compared to \$3.48 last year. Minidoka county levy is down 39 cents, with the total county levy being \$1.30 compared to \$2.89 last year.

A breakdown of the county levy includes 85 cents for the general school fund compared to \$1.05 last year; 18 cents for school emergency fund compared to 29 cents for last year; current expense fund is 85 cents last year and the county indigent fund increased 10 cents to 45 cents compared to 35 cents last year. The health service levy remained the same at 10 cents.

The hospital bond decreased three cents from 20 cents last year, for 17 cents this year. The county fire department remained at 15 cents, also the West End Fire district and the Minidoka County Fire Department at 30 cents each. City and village levy remained the same except for Heyburn and Minidoka. Rupert remained at \$2.60 per \$100 assessed valuation. Heyburn decreased 20 cents to \$3.50, compared to \$3.70 last year. Paul remained at \$3 and Acquia at \$1 and Burley at \$2.60. A decrease from \$2.50 to \$1.50 was noted in Minidoka.

The general school fund decreased from \$4.60 to \$4.20 with the general fund dropping \$3.60 last year to \$3. Plan levy of 20 cents and bond levy at \$1 remained the same. Highway district levy remained consistent at \$1 per \$100 assessed valuation. Cemetery tax levy remained the same except for the village of Heyburn which levied 20 cents last year and 15 cents this year. The Report, Acquia, Minidoka and Paul levies remain at 20 cents.

Radio Command Robot May Be First to Visit Planet Mars

ATHENS (AP)—One of earth's first visitors to Mars may be a robot that can scan the Martian landscape with television eyes and roam over the red planet on radio command. Plans for such a robot, to land on Mars within 10 years were placed today before the 16th International Astronomical Congress.

The project was based on a study sponsored by the General Electric Co. of the United States. C. E. Anderson and G. R. Baul of General Electric's Missiles and Space Division in Philadelphia, Pa., presented the paper. Anderson and Baul proposed that a Saturn 5 rocket, the same model that will launch the manned Apollo flight to the moon, could carry the robot to Mars in 1973 or 1975. Both are years when the earth and Mars will be in relatively good positions for such a space shot. Manned space flight to Mars is not likely to be possible before the mid-1980s. This was the proposal by Anderson and Baul. A capsule would carry the robot to a parachute-aided landing on Mars. Philadelphia, Pa., described in the paper. See ROBOT, Page 2, Column 4.

8 Nations Call Halt on Nuclear Tests

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Compromise Predicted for Farm Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—House and Senate managers of the Johnson administration's farm bill predicted today that a final compromise on the two versions of the legislation will be worked out satisfactorily.

The Senate cleared the four-year measure Tuesday by a 72-22 vote after revising it in four days of floor debate to conform more closely to the administration's views.

The final version won support of 56 Democrats and 16 Republicans while 14 Republicans and 8 Democrats voted against it.

The bill had cleared the House 221 to 172 on Aug. 19. Opponents and backers of the Senate and House bills have never agreed on specific costs of the multibillion-dollar measures.

The wheat provisions lead the list of major differences in the two versions. There also are significant variances on cotton, dairy and rice sections.

Senate sponsors said they believe the bill as finally passed in their branch is balanced as carefully as possible without boosting farmers' income and restricting production so that present surpluses can be cut back.

2 Key Aides Resign From White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House announced today the resignation of two of President Johnson's key assistants—speech writer Richard N. Goodwin and Cabinet Secretary George Bushy Jr.

Both will return to private life—Goodwin to join the staff of the Center for Advanced Studies at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn., and Bushy a management consultant in Washington.

Press secretary Bill D. Moyers said Johnson accepted the resignations "reluctantly and regretfully."

Goodwin, 34, once was a White House assistant to President John F. Kennedy and became a special assistant to Johnson early last year. Bushy became a special assistant shortly after Johnson assumed the presidency. A resident of Austin, Tex., Bushy worked for Johnson on and off for nearly 18 years.

PLANS ON STANDBY
BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—Six U.S. military C130s, remained on standby in Bangkok today for possible use in evacuating Americans from East Pakistan. U.S. officials said they were still waiting orders from Washington to begin evacuation flights to Dacca, East Pakistan capital.

SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY

A cold front is located from northwest Washington across northern Idaho, dipping as far south as the northwest corner of Wyoming before turning northeastward into a low pressure center in southern Canada. A weak front at the surface is moving into Southern Idaho and variable cloudiness is being reported from valley stations of Southern Idaho.

FIVE-DAY FORECAST

Low pressure aloft will continue to dominate much of the United States with high pressure remaining in the eastern Pacific through most of this five-day period. Another surge of colder air is expected to move down from the north.

As a result, temperatures over the valleys of Southern Idaho will average more than six degrees below normal Thursday through Monday. Cooling is expected to begin on Thursday and remain much below normal through the period. Chances for a hard general freeze are probable during this period with about one inch of snow possible at night when it occurs. Latest indications show Thursday night as being a time when partial clearing may occur and daily forecasts should be watched carefully for this occurrence. Some normal maximum and minimum temperatures are: Gooding, 75-48; Twin Falls, 78-47; and Burley, 76-41.

Precipitation during this period will occur as light showers on Thursday with some rain again possible into the weekend. With colder air coming down from the north the mountain areas will receive most Thursday precipitation in the form of snow or snowdrifts. Precipitation amounts will generally be less than 0.5 of an inch.

Sunshine will average around 70 per cent of possible. Winds will be stronger at times into the weekend with lighter winds into the first of the week.

With the threat of general freezing temperatures during this period all efforts should be made to adjust any available means of protection as well as to protect any crops on a rush basis. Lowest nighttime temperatures are liable to be too low to expect much benefit from protection by irrigation water and also wetting the field so near harvest may possibly do more harm than good.

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No Hasty Action

Disquieting developments involving the College of Southern Idaho tax levy may upset some residents but everyone should avoid any hasty action that may be regretted later.

It should be manifestly obvious that the people of Jerome County don't want or expect a free ride. In their election last Aug. 27, Jerome County residents voted almost 80 per cent in favor of joining the junior college district, along with Twin Falls County which established the district by only a 68 per cent majority.

In the light of that overwhelming majority, it should behoove all concerned—and most especially Jerome County commissioners—to work out some means of sharing the financial responsibility. That obligation was clearly indicated and accepted in the Jerome County election.

Twin Falls residents must avoid being stampeded into any criticism in the meantime. Some solution can be worked out before and sooner if there is no undue pressure from this city. It's best to remember that right up to this moment there has been absolutely no open indication of any ulterior purpose or scheming of any sort in the situation that has developed.

Above all, everyone concerned should keep in mind that the College of Southern Idaho has been established; it's a going concern. The now junior college should be considered first and held far above any inter-county jealousy or petty differences. No one should do anything that might endanger the future of the college.

CUT IN TAXES

Another benefit from the sales tax law becomes evident now that Idaho counties have determined property tax levies for the year. The last session of the Idaho Legislature, in approving the sales tax, specified some 25 million dollars in property and income tax relief. Until taxpayers reach that time when they must pay these taxes, the extent of the relief isn't apparent.

In Magic Valley, a Times-News survey showed property taxes will be less in at least half of the counties. Other counties plan small increases because of expansion of county services. However, if the state property taxes hadn't been canceled, those small increases would have looked considerably larger.

Relief from income taxes will be much longer in taking shape. When Idaho workers pay their income tax bill prior to next April 15, they will be looking at only half of the reduction. Not until taxpayers pay their taxes on 1966 income will they be able to see the full extent of the income tax reduction resulting from the sales tax law.

On the other hand, it will be a few weeks yet before Idahoans get a good look at what can be expected in the way of revenue from the sales tax. Sometime after the end of September, sales tax receipts will be flooding into the state tax collector's office. If receipts live up to expectations, Idaho will be receiving a whole lot of tax money with no hardship other than annoyance. It's a small price to pay for the opportunity to finance the state adequately.

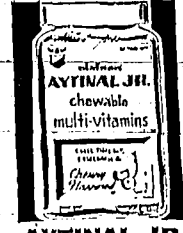

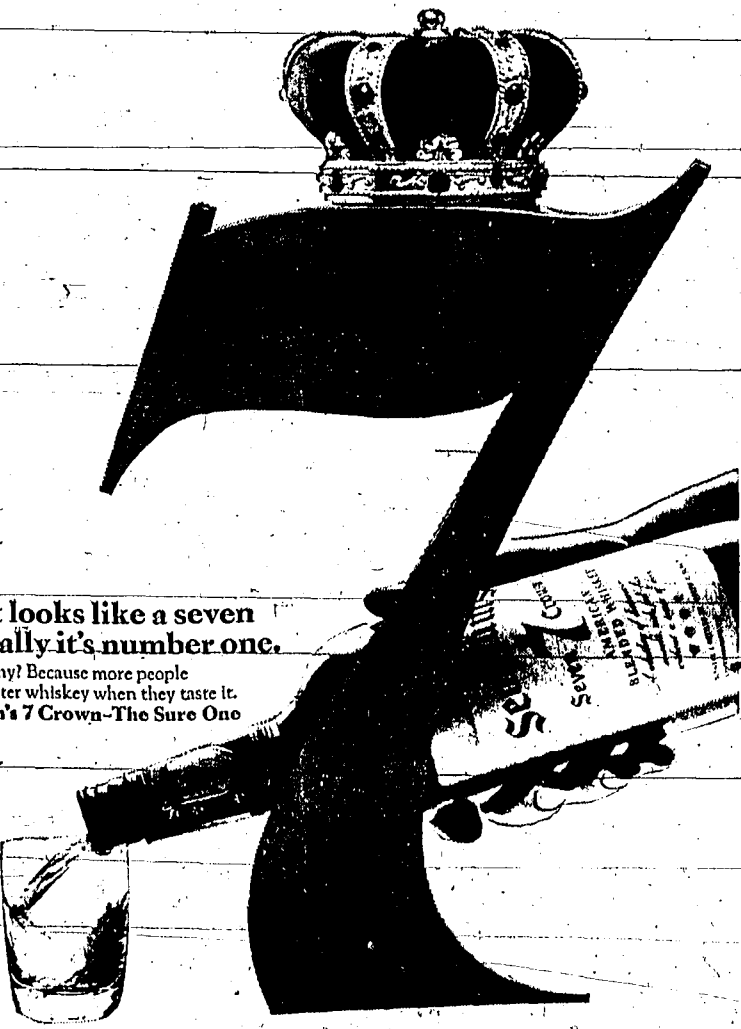

Scientists, Scholars Gather To Honor James Smithson

WASHINGTON (AP)—Scientists and scholars from around the globe are gathering to celebrate Saturday, ceremonies will be held, attended by learned men from 80 countries, including Communists.

Chief Justice Earl Warren will speak. Seminars will range from physics to changing trends in art.

Born as an illegitimate baby, James Smithson was the son of Hugh Smithson, an English gentleman who became the first Duke of Northumberland, and Elizabeth Macie, wealthy widow descended from kings.

On discovering that she was pregnant, the mother discreetly retired from fashionable Bath to Paris, where the boy was born in 1765, exact date unknown.

He grew up to be a geologist-chemist, a man of insatiable curiosity, a fellow of the Royal Society at the age of 22. He discovered a mineral now called smithsonite; he invented a method of brewing coffee akin to the modern vacuum-drip system.

Once, when he saw a young lady weeping, his science overcame his sympathy. He collected the tears in a vial, analyzed them, and announced they contained four salts.

In his latter years, he alternated between collecting minerals and hocking the gaming tables of Montmartre.

Though his friends worried, he was far from broke when he died at Genoa on June 27, 1829. His will left his fortune to a nephew, with the proviso that if

Nixon Hopes For 1966 GOP Success

WASHINGTON (AP)—GOP leaders today backed optimistic forecasts by former Vice President Richard M. Nixon that Republicans will bounce back with substantial gains in the House in next year's elections.

Leader of the Senate Republican, Everett M. Dirksen, said he believes his party not only will gain the 40 seats in the House, two in the Senate and two governor's posts in 1966 that Nixon predicted but will give a good account of itself in 1968.

Victor A. Johnston, field director for the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, said in a separate interview he thinks the GOP may gain as many as four Senate seats. He listed Tennessee, Alabama, Montana and Oregon as prime possibilities.

Nixon told a news conference Tuesday he believes Republicans will regain more than the 20 House seats they lost in 1964 because the quarrel between conservatives and liberals which he said had caused their decisive defeat will be substantially patched up.

Such increases in GOP strength as he forecasts would leave the Democrats in control of both houses.

"But if we can win back 40 seats, we can regain a position of effective position in Congress," Nixon said.

The former vice president said that if President Johnson were to stub his toe in some international encounter and doesn't run into economic difficulties at home, he may be even stronger politically in 1968 than he is now.

Declining to discuss the possibility that he might bid for the Republican presidential nomination again three years from now, Nixon insisted that Johnson hasn't really been tested in any international disaster, despite the eruption in the Dominican Republic and the fighting in Viet Nam.

"At the present time," Jensen said, "there is legislation being introduced in Congress that has a major effect on the food business. Recent changes in the federal wage and hour law also are of interest."

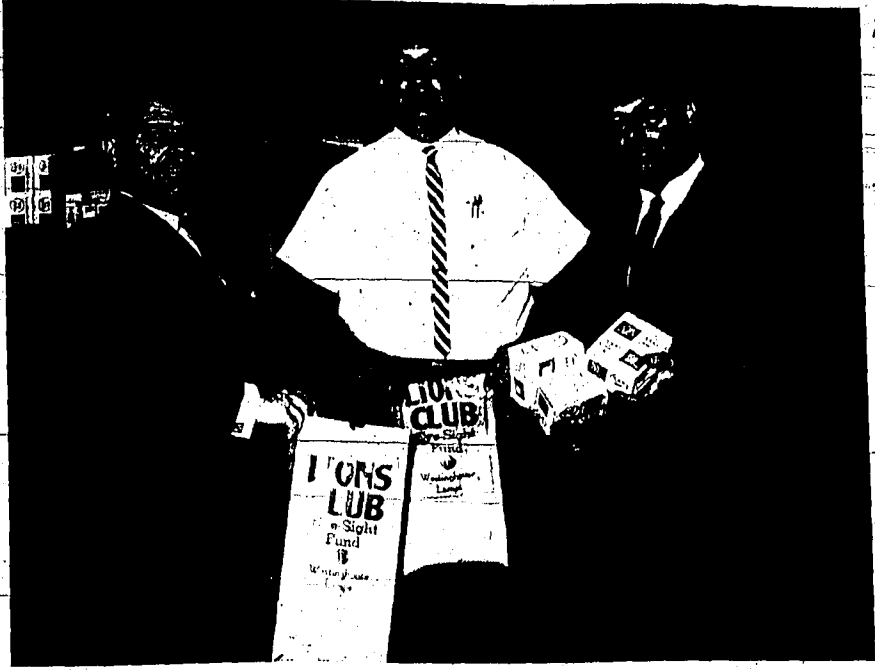

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Idaho Is in Running for Accelerator

BOISE (AP)—Idaho and five other bidders are still in the running for a \$300 million, 200-million volt proton accelerator.

The field was narrowed to 85 by the Atomic Energy Commission Monday from more than 200 bids from 43 states.

"We've survived the first round in a hot competition," commented Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

The accelerator, to be used by scientists around the country for experiments in high energy physics, will have a permanent staff of nearly 2,000 persons, according to the AEC.

Its proton synchrotron will have a ring subject nearly a mile in diameter.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said the Idaho site—near the National Reactor Testing station in southeast Idaho—still is in the running because of its access to abundant water and cheap power.

Church said availability of Bonneville Power Administration electricity gave Idaho the lowest power rate offering of any of the 200 original proposals.

He said nearness to Idaho State University in Pocatello was also a factor in Idaho's favor.

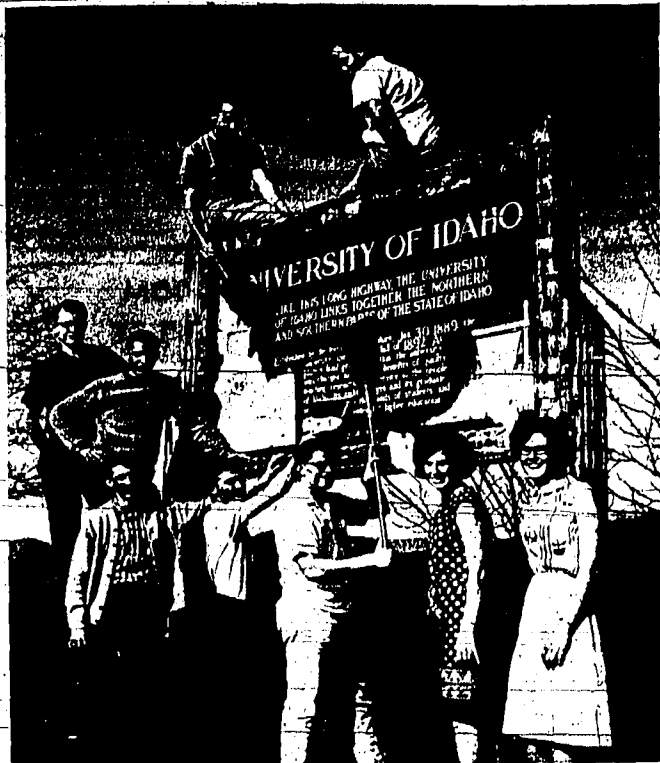

Justifiable Homicide Is Ruled in Riot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An inquest jury, launching the coroner's probe of last month's disastrous Negro riot, has ruled justifiable homicide in the shooting of two looting suspects by peace officers.

While a governor's commission and state and city bodies continued separate investigations of the Aug. 11-15 holocaust, stage-setting testimony by detectives at the inquest depicted a "frightful five days."

An "uncountable" number of emergency calls, property damage of \$45 million from fires, a heart attack, the other in a car crash — had been believed at the time to be riot-caused. But the coroner, in announcing his list of deaths to be investigated at inquests, limited the total to 34.

The inquest — to determine how each victim met death — will continue, two a day, through Oct. 19.

Betsy Worst Storm on Record

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Giant Hurricane Betsy, which once seemed destined to blow itself out over the open Atlantic off the coast of Louisiana, apparently was the most destructive tropical storm since records have been kept.

Gov. John J. McKeithen said Louisiana has "suffered a disaster comparable to an earthquake" and President Johnson provided federal disaster relief to state leaders "without regard to red tape or technicalities at the inquest depicted hours."

Military divers near Baton Rouge still searched for a state's largest ship, the USS *Albatross*, which was blown off the coast of Louisiana, causing a tidal wave 30 feet high to spill from the Mississippi River.

The known death toll has reached 74—62 in Louisiana, 7 in Florida, 4 in Arkansas and 1 in Mississippi.

"There is no question but that we will find many more bodies after flood waters recede," McKeithen said Tuesday at a New Orleans news conference.

Upriver near Baton Rouge,

military rescue teams were to begin dredging today along a 37-mile-long segment of Mississippi River channel to find out if the potentially dangerous barge is in the channel.

Coast Guard Capt. Russell Waeache said late Tuesday night that if the chlorine barge is not in the channel, river traffic stacked up for miles due to search operations can resume.

He said divers would continue to search alongside the channel for the sunken vessel with all equipment at hand, including sophisticated sonar gear.

The hurricane's winds ripped the barge from its mooring Friday day and it foundered, along with scores of others.

Gov. McKeithen made a shirt-

leeve tour of the stricken portion of the state from New Orleans to the Gulf Tuesday and then told reporters: "I expect that the damage to this state will exceed a billion dollars."

Daily Bathing for Children Unnecessary, Often Harmful

NEW YORK (AP) — Rub-a-dub-dub, you don't have to bathe all that time in the tub. For the harried mother who sometimes finds that cleanliness next to impossible and for the child herded daily into the tub, New Orleans pediatrician says, "Most of us are bathed too often."

Such a statement ought to ease Dr. Ralph V. Platou man's heart with the wet set, but random sampling around the country drew mixed reaction. "I love baths," said Thomas Cronson, 8, of Albany, N.Y. "I especially like to take them because I like to clean."

"I don't like to take baths — unless mommy lets me take a bubble bath," said Beth-Hall, 7, Atlanta, Ga.

Dr. Platou, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics at Tulane Medical School, said in Memphis, Tenn., Tuesday that a bath a day is not only unnecessary, but often harmful.

"Bathing — strong soaps — can remove many of the natural skin secretions which are beneficial. We should be bathed where we are dirty and only when needed," he said. "Otherwise, our skin should be left alone."

Mrs. Robert Huber of Daly City, Calif., said, "I don't think my kids bathe every day. She has three children and 'of course I see that they wash their hands and faces.'"

Switching roles in the traditional parent-child view of daily baths are Mary Rigby and her daughter, Laurie, 12, of Louisville, Ky.

Mrs. Rigby said she agrees with Dr. Platou regarding children. Laurie said, "I don't bathe. I think you should bathe

once a day when necessary or at least every other day."

Emmett Corrigan, a Louisville father of six, is inclined to scoff at the suggestion. "I know a couple of kids around here that would really go for that. He must work for those people who make deodorants."

Negotiators Work Against Boeing Strike

SEATTLE (AP) — Negotiators faced with a midnight strike deadline worked with federal mediators today in an effort to avert a work stoppage at vital Boeing Co. installations throughout the nation.

Mechanists union officials said Tuesday's tabulation of votes taken earlier showed its members had rejected the aerospace firm's contract offer by an 85 per cent majority. No breakdown was given on the vote, which included balloting in Ogden, Utah.

It was the second time a vote had been taken on the contract which covers 34,300 production workers. It was rejected Aug. 20 by a 90 per cent margin.

Since the rejection gave union negotiators strike sanction, William E. Simkin, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, flew in to try to prevent a strike scheduled for midnight today.

Also here is P. L. Siemiller, head of the International Aero Mechanics and Aerospace Workers.

Assisting Simkin are Walter A. Maggioni, his top aide, and Seattle federal mediator Albin L. Peterson.

A strike would affect installations at Cape Kennedy, Fla.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legal leaders of 100 nations meet at the St. Francis Church today to discuss the most-for-peace-through-law which Chief Justice Earl Warren has declared "must succeed if mankind is to survive."

One group devotes its attention to investment and what it calls "transnational trade," the other is focusing on settling arguments over trade, commerce and investments.
