Boeing Pickets Slow Space and Defense Program

SEATTLE (AP) — Work slowed on some of the nation's vital space and defense programs today as picket lines were established at Boeing Co. installations across the country. Pickets first appeared at Cape Kennedy at 7:30 a.m. EST when the company's contract with the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers expired. By morning more than 34,000 production workers from the Cape to Boeing's main plant here had been affected.

3 Incumbents In City Seek Re-Election

Three incumbent city commissioners have announced they intend to run for re-election in the Oct. 12 city election. Egon Kroll, Robert Warberg and John K. Angerbauer all have circulated petitions and filed them with the city clerk's office in the City Hall.

Kroll, chairman of the commission, stated his main reason for running for re-election is that the commission has started on plans for the water bond issue and would like to see the project through to completion.

He also voiced concern for the extension of the runway at the airport to accommodate larger and faster airliners in the future. Kroll has been chairman of the commission for the past two years and was on the South Central Health District Board and on the water and sanitation board before becoming chairman.

Warberg also gave the water bond issue as his main reason for running for a second term and said, "Since we are already familiar with the various aspects of the project, I think it would be nice if we could continue to work and see it through to reality."

Warberg also has been directly concerned with the airport expansion project and commented he would like to continue working with it.

Angerbauer, who has been executive director of the Parks and Recreation Department, voiced his opinion that "the overwhelming support of the water bond issue by the citizens of Twin Falls, seems to give us an indication that they are pleased with the job we have been doing on the commission and we see 3 INCUMBENTS, Pg. 2, Col. 4

Plane Crash In Viet Nam Kills 39

QUANG NGAI, South Viet Nam (AP) — Thirty-nine persons, including an American, were killed today when an Air Vietnam C-47 commercial airliner crashed shortly after take-off from Quang Ngai airfield. The American was Jerry Rose, described as a free lance writer who also was a civilian adviser to the South Vietnamese government. His wife lives in Hong Kong.

Among the dead was the South Vietnamese minister of rural pacification Nguyen Tat Ung. Gen. Nguyen Thi, commander of the South Vietnamese 1st army corps, said Ung and Rose were traveling together to installations in two provinces.

Earlier reports said 40 persons had been on the plane but authorities said only 39 were aboard.

Idaho to Receive Education Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nine school districts in eight states including Idaho, have been given federal funds totaling more than \$822,000, according to the U.S. Office of Education. The funds will be used in schools to educate children of federal employees who live on or work on tax exempt property.

In Idaho, \$115,020 was allocated for a one-story high school at Orofino, Clearwater County.

Postmaster Praises Work of Youths as Summer Help

Two Twin Falls youths were praised this summer at Twin Falls Post Office and their work was described as highly satisfactory. Postmaster Sangner, Twin Falls, said the two youths are Betty and John Feldman, students at Idaho State University and University of Puget Sound.

United Fund Campaign Is Off To Good Start in Twin Falls

The United Fund campaign in Twin Falls is off to a good start, C. E. (Bud) Wadsworth, campaign chairman and second vice president of United Fund of Twin Falls, stated Thursday afternoon. During a progress report meeting Thursday noon at the Boy Scout Auditorium, Wadsworth said 18 division leaders of the drive reported that about two-thirds of the initial contacts of businesses in Twin Falls have been made.

Wadsworth explained it is still too early to tell the amount of pledges and contributions that have been made. Goal of the campaign is \$75,000. There are eight participating agencies financed by the United Fund: John Peterson, advance gifts chairman, reported during the meeting that this phase of the campaign has just been completed.

The 18 division leaders at the meeting Thursday noon said all contacts made to date have been very successful, Wadsworth said. Wadsworth said it is hoped that the United Fund campaign will be completed by Wednesday with a victory luncheon to be held at the Boy Scout Auditorium.

Another progress report meeting will be held Friday noon at the Boy Scout Auditorium. The eight participating agencies, asked for the \$75,000 goal by each, are Red Cross, Twin Falls chapter, \$10,887; Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation, Twin Falls chapter, \$2,000; Boy Scouts of America, Snake River Area Council, \$20,033; Camp Fire Girls, \$8,007; Salvation Army, \$10,877; USO, \$200; Twin Falls YMCA, \$7,582; and Twin Falls YWCA, \$8,608.

Pope's Visit to Last 13 Hours

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul's Oct. 4 visit to New York will last about 13 hours, the Vatican announced today. After delivering a peace message to the U.N. General Assembly the Pope will meet with all delegates, spending nearly 2 1/2 hours in U.N. headquarters. The program made no mention of a meeting with President Johnson, who will be in New York at the same time. There has been speculation, however, that the two might meet informally.

U Thant Says Trip Not Failure

LONDON (AP) — U.S. Secretary-General U Thant said today his peace mission to India and Pakistan was not a failure. "You will discover this tomorrow when my report is made public," he told reporters at London airport.

Thant is heading back to New York to report to the U.N. Security Council on his mission. The secretary-general spoke to newsmen after talking with Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart during a stopover en route to New York from Bombay.

Snowstorm Halts Harvest; Killing Frost Predicted

Farming operations were halted Thursday throughout Magic Valley by snow and rain in one of the earliest "winter" storms in many years. The precipitation Thursday will not necessarily damage beans, grain and hay, but if the killing frost predicted for Thursday night occurs, farmers in the valley may face severe losses, according to county agents and warehouse officials. At Fairfield, where five and one-half inches of snow had fallen by 11:30 a.m., many farmers were preparing to combine their spring wheat, William Wilson, who has between 400 and 500 acres yet to combine, said if the snow melts soon the wheat may straighten up, but if it remains long on the ground it will be ruined. Some Prairie residents recalled such a heavy snow is unusual for this time of year, although light snow in August often falls there. It snowed in the mountains near Fairfield Wednesday afternoon and at Mt. City snow was reported even deeper than at Fairfield.

Two More Men Are Charged in Slaying

BURLEY — Two more men were charged Wednesday afternoon in the fatal stabbing Sunday morning of Augustin Ramirez and new charges were filed against the three men who have been implicated in the incident. Juan Ruiz, 40, Rupert, appeared Wednesday afternoon in Cassia County Probate Court, where a motion and order to dismiss an earlier first degree murder charge against him were entered. Judge Vern Carter granted the dismissal and a new complaint was immediately filed charging Ruiz, Alvin Molina and Ramon Cazarez jointly with first degree murder.

It was reported Wednesday further investigation and interrogation of additional witnesses implicated Molina and Cazarez in the stabbing. Ramirez was fatally stabbed early Sunday morning at the Rancho Florida Tavern, Burley, and was dead on arrival at 12:35 a.m. Sunday at Cassia Memorial Hospital.

During Wednesday afternoon's arraignment, Molina and Cazarez asked for court-appointed legal counsel. Ruiz earlier had asked for time to obtain his own attorney. All three men are being held without bond in Cassia County Jail.

Molina is from Rupert and Cazarez gave his address as the Paul Labor Camp. City police, who said Sunday the stabbing victim had only one wound near the heart, declined Wednesday to give details on the new arrests.

Warrants for the arrest of Molina and Cazarez were issued Wednesday morning. Ruiz was first charged with the slaying Monday afternoon.

Changes in Soviet Reign Are Rumored

MOSCOW (AP) — Rumors persisted today of impending changes in the Soviet hierarchy, but top Western diplomatic sources discounted reports of a power struggle.

One persistent rumor, widely credited in Western diplomatic circles, was that Anastas Mikoyan will retire as president on his 70th birthday Nov. 25. It was the earliest of the rumors to build up around the regime of Premier Alexei Kosygin and Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev which took over last Oct. 14 after the ouster of Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The Communist party Central Committee is scheduled to meet Sept. 27 and presumably any changes will be announced after it starts.

Among the rumors is one that Alexander Shelepin, a bright and ambitious leader, has been trying to engineer a takeover with the intention of seizing both the premiership and the party leadership. Khrushchev held both posts.

Space Twins Begin Tour In Athens

ATHENS (AP) — Spaceman L. Gordon Cooper predicted today that it would not be many years before the man in the street also is space traveler. Cooper and Charles Conrad Jr., whose eight-day trip in the Gemini 5 set a world record arrived in Athens to begin a four-nation goodwill tour.

A newsmen asked if they thought the man in the street would ever be able to travel in space. "Yes," replied Cooper. "The same question was asked 40 years ago about air travel. Now air transport has changed our way of life. In the next few years, before not too many years, space travel will also be commonplace."

Soviet cosmonauts Alexei Leonov and Pavel Belyayev also are in Athens. All four were invited here to attend the 10th International Astronautical Congress. They are expected to meet later this week.

Idaho Public Schools Get \$1.5 Million in Federal Aid

BOISE (AP) — More than \$1.5 million was reported today available for immediate distribution to Idaho public schools under provisions of the new federal aid to education program. D. F. Enkeling, state superintendent of public instruction, said it is likely some of it can be in the hands of local school districts within a month. The program is intended to improve the quality of education for children of so-called poor families. Actually, Enkeling said, it will improve the quality of education available to all students. It may be used in elementary and secondary schools.

U. S. Rejects Accusations By Soviets

GENEVA (AP) — The United States rejected in strong terms today a Soviet accusation that American international policies were frustrating efforts for world disarmament.

U.S. Ambassador William C. Foster accused the Russians of engaging in a propaganda attempt to discredit the work of the 17-nation disarmament commission.

The conference is informing the United Nations that it wants Geneva on July 27, "particularly valuable" progress has been made in clarifying the views of member governments. This clarification, the report continued, "may facilitate agreement" when the conference starts again, presumably in January.

The U.S. delegation took particular exception to Tsarapkin's remark that the disarmament conference "has achieved nothing" because of what he described as aggressive American policies in the Congo, the Dominican Republic and South Viet Nam.

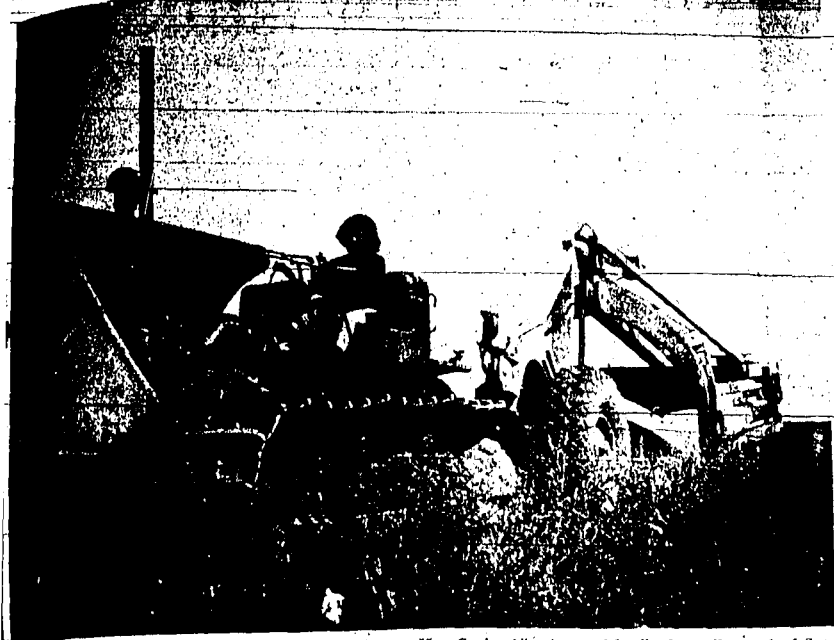

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) —Arizona authorities asked the Los Angeles Police Science Laboratory today to help prepare evidence against Donald M. Roggs, who faces two counts of first-degree murder.

Technicians will perform a ballistics test on the .22 caliber revolver officers believe was used to kill Robert D. Willis and Halvor Johnson, whose bodies were found Sept. 6 near Ash Fork, Ariz.

Roggs, 23, of Londonderry, Ohio, and his girl friend, Dixie Radcliff, 16, of Amesville, Ohio, were arrested last week in Flagstaff.

The girl also has been charged with murdering William H. Johnson, both of Newport, N. H.

Roggs is to be arraigned Friday in Flagstaff. Sheriff officers said he also orally admitted killing Warren Lenker of Elizabethtown, Pa., a Brigham Young University student, near Cedar City, Utah, and Harold B. Flory, 59, in Texas.

WASHINGTON — In the course of a quiet investigation of the faintly ridiculous Singapore bribery case, President Johnson has discovered that the Central Intelligence Agency was the victim of the bland machinations of an Oriental confidence man.

NO CASID NEGOTIATORS — Nevertheless, the case gives some support to a remark once made by Anthony Eden during his tenure as Great Britain's prime minister. The United States, said Eden, was too young to play polo in the Far East. CIA's operations in that area have ranged from the tragic to the idiotic, with the result that American prestige was at a new low when we decided to take over the war in Viet-Nam.

LOST TRIBES — When Chiang Kai-shek fled the mainland to Formosa after his defeat by the Chinese Communists, he was forced to leave behind several thousands of his followers. These troops moved across the Ganges border into Burma, taking with them considerable quantities of American arms and ammunition.

NATIVES UNHAPPY — The Burmese government understandably was annoyed by this situation, and Premier U Nu finally blew his top when Chiang's troops set up their own squatter government in the state of Kengtung. He reacted by halting their activities and threatened to sever diplomatic relations with the U.S.

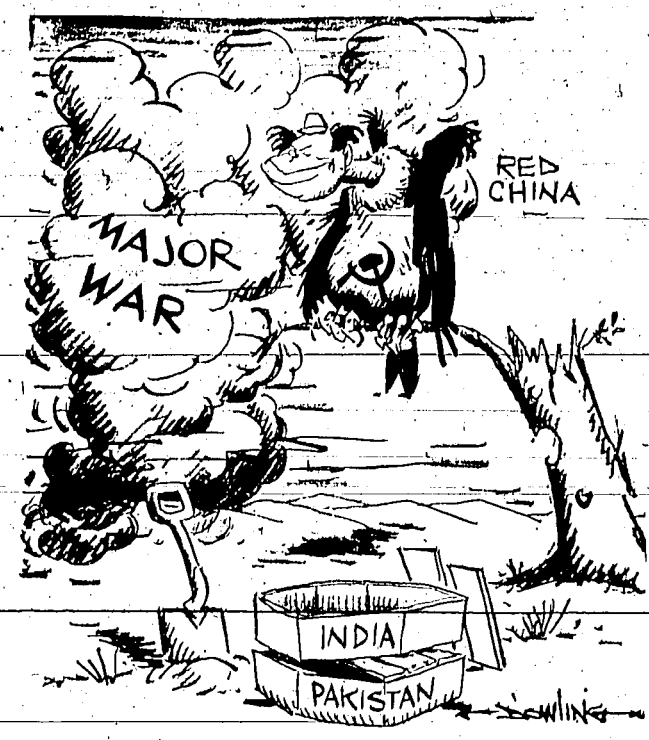

Freedom Camp Closes Until Summer

FREEDOM, N.H. (AP) — Inez Engleshead has returned to her reservation home on the Dakota plains. Eva Wolpers is back in Stockholm, Sweden. Betsy Lahti is running the 41-day "around-the-world" children, Switzerland. Denise Bruton is back in Washington.

The rambling old farmhouse where they and 28 other children spent the summer is deserted.

When next summer arrives, the house again will ring with the multitudinous cries of children at play. And Freedom International Camp will begin its sixth year of striving for "peace through understanding."

"We try to get children of as many different nationalities as we can," said Jurg Papritz, Swiss teacher who heads the camp. "This year, for example, we had 16."

The nonprofit camp is privately financed through tuition, donations and fund raising drives, but does not cater solely to a paying clientele.

Many of the youngsters come from the International Rescue Center in New York. Others are sent by local relief organizations.

While there, the children swim, study, play games much the children at any summer camp.

In 1919, a Wellesley college girl named Natalie Peterson, then a student at the University of Zurich, Switzerland, was dismissed by the suspicion and hatred most of Europe felt toward the German people after World War II.

Three years later, with money provided by her family and friends, she established in Holland the first international camp.

She later married a Swiss and Armin Leuthel and brought her idea of international camps to the United States in 1923.

In 1960 the Leuthels purchased a 100-acre farm-homestead and converted it into a residence for up to 40 children and counselors for the summer months.




NEW YORK (AP) — James Cash Penney, a farmer's son who founded a nationwide store chain, celebrated his 90th birthday Thursday.

Penney, alert and dapper despite falling sight and hearing, will be honored by major retailing executives at a birthday luncheon. Cakes also will be cut at 1,673 J. C. Penney department stores for the chain's 50,000 employees.

"I expect to live to be 100," said Penney in an interview, combed down his carefully combed white hair and smoothed his small brush-like mustache. "My doctor tells me I'm good for it."

Plans Given For World Education

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson announced today he will ask Congress next year to authorize a broad, long-range program to promote education in all parts of the world.

In an address prepared for a celebration of the birth 200 years ago of James Smithson, whose bequest led to the founding of the Smithsonian Institution, Johnson said:

"We mean to show that this nation's dream of a great society does not stop at the water's edge. It is not just an American dream. All are welcome to share in it. All are invited to contribute to it."

Johnson disclosed he already has created a special task force "to recommend a broad and long-range plan of worldwide educational endeavor." And he said leaders in both public and private enterprise will be invited to join in laying plans for what he described as "a new noble adventure."

In January, the President said, he will present to Congress a five-point program to —

- Help education efforts in the developing nations and regions.
- Help American schools increase their knowledge of the world and its peoples.
- Promote the exchange of students and teachers.
- Increase the free flow of books and ideas and art, and works of science and imagination.
- Assemble meetings of men and women from every discipline and every culture to ponder the common problems of mankind."

Tour Slated Of Museum In Hailey

HAILEY — A guided tour through the Blaine county museum in Hailey will be conducted by Joseph Fuld, longtime resident here, Sunday for the Twin Falls Historical Society.

Members will meet at 10 a.m. at the Blaine county courthouse, one block east of Main Street. After the tour a picnic lunch will be held on the lawn with members to bring their own food.

In the afternoon members may have their choice of several different trips to mines and other places of historical interest in the Wood River Valley. The trips will be described and those attending the tour may take anyone they wish, according to Elmer Annis, Twin Falls, society president.

Penney retired from active management in 1958 but still serves as an unpaid director. Associates say he appears almost daily at his 45th-floor office at Pennyc's Manhattan headquarters. The rest of his time is divided between his Park Avenue apartment, a dairy farm in New York's Dutchess County and a country home in Connecticut. Twice a widower, he is now married to the former Caroline Autenreith of New York.

Born in Hamilton, Mo., the son of a poor farmer who was also a Baptist preacher, Penney never smoked or drank and wouldn't hire a manager who did either.

He wears low-priced Penney suits and admonishes Penney employees to save money by turning off lights.

How did he feel looking back on his poverty-to-riches career from his skyscraper Manhattan office?

"Well, I guess I never wanted to be mediocre," said J. C. Penney.

It was 63 years ago that Penney scraped together \$2,000 and opened his first apparel and drygoods shop in the mining town of Kemmerer, Wyo., calling it the "Golden Rule Store." At a time when most small-town merchants aimed at big profits from small sales, Penney attracted a volume business by buying in bulk and selling cheaply. His success led to a chain of J. C. Penney stores.

For its 1964-65 fiscal year, J. C. Penney Inc. reported more than \$2 billion in sales, second only to Sears, Roebuck & Co. among national chains.

Students Must Make Changes In Appearance for Classes

NEW YORK (AP) — There up, bare-midriffs, off-the-shoulder dresses, open back, sandals are the tears shed by America's youth forced to cut their locks as the price of education.

Boys' Beatle-like trends grown long with the summer days fell into disfavor with the opening of schools across the country.

Bizarre makeup is being scrubbed from the faces of girls, and some school principals are carrying around rulers to see that hemlines don't show too much knee.

Among the taboos turned up in a nationwide survey by The Associated Press are:

- Beatle haircuts, tight pants, short skirts, high heels, metal cleats, ruffled jeans, flacks, shorts, Elvis chairs, and hair rattling, Diamond Lil make-

up der dresses, open back, sandals and bare-midriffs.

"We're advising a few of our boys we'd appreciate them getting to a barber, but we're not trying to cut it down their throats," said principal Herbert J. Bishop, principal of Manhattan High School in Kansas.

A less-casual attitude is taken by the private schools. "I say to him, 'I think you need a haircut,'" he says. "Yes, sir," and that's it," said Carl W. Andrews Jr. of Collegiate School in New York.

Principals say styles are a little more conventional this year.

The principal of a Little Rock, Ark., high school grabbed the problem by the forelock. Boys were told to abandon their Beatle cuts or show up for classes with hair ribbons. They got their hair cut.

After school officials in Fairfax County, Va., ruled that long hair was out, 20 students at Thomas Jefferson High School got haircuts before classes the next day.

Barbers at a shop near the school reported some of the boys cried when their hair was cut off.

But a dozen students picketed the school. One sign read, "Do you have to be bald for an education?" Said another: "At \$1.75 who can afford haircuts?"

Many of the problems of girls' dresses may be taken care of by the boys. Said Steve Seymour, 18, a senior at Raleigh, N.C., "some dresses are kinda sickening when they come above the knee."

Enrollment Is Expected to Be Record

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — Officials at the University of Idaho said today that this fall's enrollment could be the largest in the 76-year history of the institution.

It has been predicted that 5,500 will enroll, but school officials say it could go even higher. Last year's enrollment was 5,185.

Classes will begin Sept. 23, following two days of registration.

Meanwhile, the Moscow Hotel has been pressed into service to house an overflow of students. It is anticipated that about 60 men students will be unable to find housing elsewhere.

No Case

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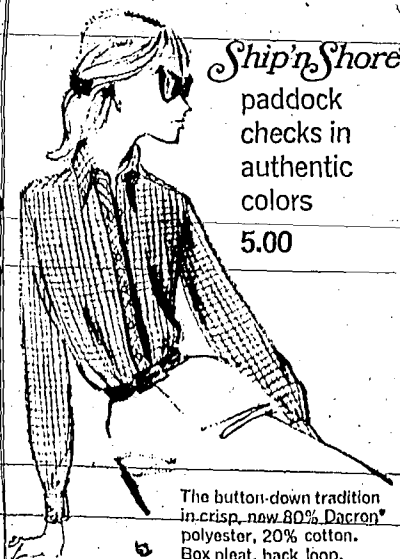

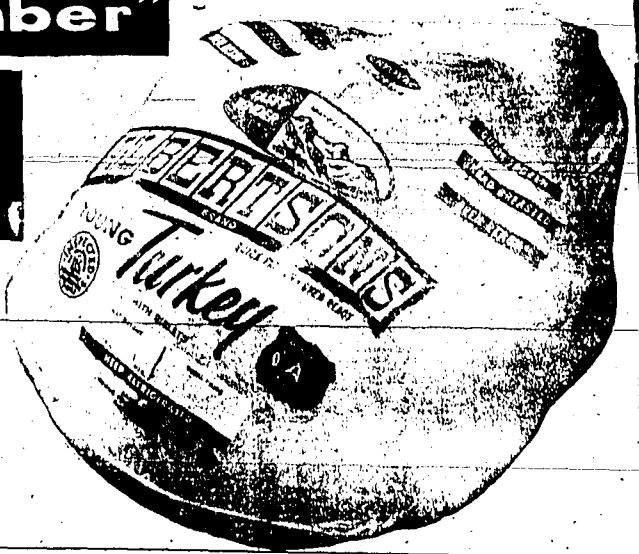

County Expenses Hike Tax Levy in Blaine

Blaine — The basic tax levy for Blaine county, which includes state, county and school, went up from \$6.765 per \$100 valuation to \$7.08 for the July 1, 1965 real and personal property taxes.

This is a raise of 31 1/2 cents per \$100 valuation. The ad valorem, teachers retirement and teachers social security levies were raised from the state levy, to be taken care of by sales tax. The state building fund levy rose from 2 1/2 to 3 cents per \$100 value.

State special levies for the sheep commission, livestock disease control, state brand inspection, and bee and honey advertising remained the same as last year.

School maintenance and operation remained at \$3 with the bond interest raising from 60 cents to \$1 per \$100 value.

In the county levies, current expense rose from \$1 to \$1.10; charity and indigent from 23 to 43 cents; road and bridge from 10 to 20 cents; county airport from 4 to 5 cents.

A county fair levy, which is being made for the first time in many years, was set at 5 cents.

The general school levy dropped from 77 cents to 73 cents and remaining constant were the weed control at 4 cents, county hospital bond 12 cents, Ketchum's levy went up 30 cents, with their street levy rate from 50 cents. The general fund remained at \$2.50 and the recreation at 30 cents.

Sun Valley's levy remained constant at \$2 per \$100 valuation, with \$1 for general fund and \$1 for hospital.

Halley, Carey and Ketchum county districts remained at 20 cents and Bellevue raised from 18 to 19 cents.

Carey fire protection remained at 40 cents and Ketchum rural fire district at 60 cents.

A levy of 20 cents per \$100 valuation was made for Carey school. The evening's events were under the direction of Supr. Harold Stroud and included the exchanging of autographs.

A Ketchum resident, with no special levy, will pay \$10.58 per \$100 valuation for his 1965 taxes. A Bellevue resident will pay \$9.77, a Halley resident \$11.23 and a Sun Valley resident \$9.08.

Carey, Gannett and Picaresque are unincorporated and will pay only the base rate of \$78.8 per \$100 valuation, plus any special levies.







Friends of this young law student from Emmett say he needs between \$5,000 and \$7,000 to carry forward his campaign for national president of the Young Democratic Clubs of America. EASTON, N.H. (AP)—The people are moving out of this small town on the edge of the White Mountains—and the moose are moving in.
Easton's population was never very big and it's getting smaller—down to 74 in 1960, half the number who lived there in 1940. On the other hand back in 1940 it was generally believed that moose, the largest of the deer family of animals, had long since departed for even more remote places.
But now a family of moose, mister, missus and their 300 pound calf, have not only taken up residence, but they're joining right in with the people.
They've created a traffic problem along Route 116 and at its junction with Route 112 which cuts into the mountains through Kinsman's Notch. The trouble is that motorists see the moose and stop to satisfy their curiosity.
The members of this moose family are just as curious as people—so they come out to the pavement to look them over. They nothing moves until the moose are satisfied, or get hungry and go back to graze along the roadside or in pastures or woods near town.
Dozens of people have made souvenir photographs for themselves, many of them "candid" shots made from 100 feet away.
Conservation officials say the moose, particularly if frightened, could be dangerous if handled or angered. Papa moose weighs about 1,500 pounds and if angered he could wreck an automobile.

Exemption on Sales Tax Said Misused

The sales tax exemption certificate, ST 104, provides for exempting from the sales tax the purchase of materials and supplies purchased for use directly in the production of tangible personal property. C. I. "Bus" Smith, field auditor in Twin Falls for the Sales Tax Division, announced Tuesday.

Apparently, many purchasers are misusing the exemption certificate ST 104 to avoid paying the sales tax on numerous purchases of materials, equipment, and supplies used in transportation activities, road construction, and building construction.

"While it is true that a building that houses machinery or animals is essential to the production process, and the process could not occur without the building, lumber and other materials purchased for use in the construction of buildings would be taxable.

Other items which cannot be exempt without regard to use: hand tools with a unit price of less than \$100; motor vehicles of less than 100 lbs.; office equipment and supplies; janitorial equipment and supplies; equipment and supplies used in selling and distributing activities; storage facilities, such as cellars, granaries, garages, fences, wire, traps and other fencing materials and neon and other signs.

Taxpayers having questions regarding the sales tax in general, and particularly the production exemption, are invited to phone the Sales Tax Office, 313-116, during office hours, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

West-Germany Dominates Chemical Exposition at Sokolniki Park

By HENRY SHAPIRO MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet relations with West Germany are worse than those with any other major western country. But West Germany dominates the current chemical exposition opened by Premier Alexei N. Kosygin at Sokolniki Park last week.

More than 150 major West German chemical firms led by the giant Krupp works occupy one quarter of the exposition area and dwarf the exhibits of East Germany, Italy, Japan, France and the United States. Only 10 American firms are participating.

The most impressive and dramatic single exhibit is the Krupp pavilion—a collapsible airfield plastic balloon which can be inflated or folded within 15 minutes. It is just the temptation of getting a major slice of expected fabulous Soviet orders for chemical machinery that brings Carstens and the German industrialists here? Diplomatic observers wonder.

The once considerable West German trade with Russia has shown signs of stagnation since Bonn has refused to go along with Paris, London and Tokyo in breaking the western embargo on long-term credits to the Soviet Union.

The impressive West German chemical exhibits indicate, according to foreign observers, that industry as well as the government is having second thoughts about long term credits. The West German total investment of 80 million marks in the exposition may trigger a more flexible Bonn line on such credits to Russia.

It is not trade alone that interests both the Germans and the Russians. To the realistic, hard-headed leaders of both nations trade may be a way of "waging politics" by other means. Bonn, a loyal ally of the United States, also is aware of changing attitudes in Washington on East European trade, attitudes which might have been more pronounced now were it not for the Viet Nam conflict.

Khrushchev's ouster served to postpone the Bonn-Moscow political dialogue which he was about to resume this year. Kosygin is still uncommitted, presumably awaiting the re-

turns of the German national elections. But irrespective of the outcome, comments made by leaders of the major German political parties recently reflected a clear desire for talks with Moscow.

It is understood that many of the German leaders, aware of the difficulties of a permanent German settlement, are now modestly aiming for a general improvement of the climate in their relations with Moscow.

This, it is argued, can be achieved by a substantial increase in trade and cultural relations while not immediately pressing for agreement on the now apparently unsolvable question of unifying the two Germans.
