

Early Sugar Beet Harvest Urgent, Says Plant Aide

PAUL — Concern that last week's frost may curtail sugar production if Magic Valley's harvest is delayed was voiced Tuesday night by Ernest Blauer, district manager for Amalgamated Sugar Co., who announced cancellation of plans for an open house Saturday which was to have climaxed a two-year expansion program at the Paul factory. He explained the planned open house would have held up construction at the plant for at least three days and said he received instructions late Monday afternoon to survey area farmers to determine if beet harvest operations could get under way early next week.

Blauer pointed out that urgency of getting beets out of the ground earlier than usual is due to last week's frost. The frost stopped beet growth temporarily, he explained, adding that sugar content will decrease if they are left in the ground long enough to begin growing again. He said dead leaves observed on plants indicate the beets have stopped growing.

Blauer noted the situation is critical because, although there is not much growing time left, enough time remains to lose some sugar content. He said the company also is concerned by the variety of weather and if another frost occurs, expressed fear that "we could lose beets from being frozen into the ground."

Another factor in cancellation of Saturday's open house, according to Blauer, was that personnel from the Nyon, Ore., and Twin Falls plants are helping in construction at the Paul plant and will be needed at those two plants if harvesting gets under way next week. At Twin Falls, Robert Day, district manager, said Tuesday evening he had not been notified of the survey, but anticipated harvesting would probably begin a week earlier than usual.

Blauer said beets in the Minidoka area probably will be up to the Twin Falls plant, and these plants are only half-way through harvesting.

Construction at the Paul plant during the past two years has expanded the factory to become the second largest in the United States and the third largest in the world. Wayne Bachman, Paul plant manager, said Monday the project was completed in a matter of "building of a whole new factory."

But construction is not yet completed and Blauer noted Monday night that some work is working around the clock and others are working 10-hour days in order to get a plant ready for operation the first of October.

"We'll have to push real fast to be ready by the first of October," said Blauer, adding "BET HARVEST, P. 2, C. 7."

Negotiators Return to Strike Talks

NEW YORK (AP) — Negotiators went back to the bargaining table in New York's seven-day newspaper strike, reportedly with a threatened strike of a second union into the picture.

Negotiators meet with the AFL-CIO New York Newspaper Guild and the New York Times Union.

They scheduled a later session at the AFL-CIO Mallers' Union, which served notice Tuesday that it would join the 875 members at seven newspapers in a second strike if the guild strike against the Times is settled.

The masters dispute is with Publishers Association of New York, of which the Times and other metropolitan dailies are members. The other publishers have suspended publication in support of the Times, but publishing daily, threatened by the New York Post. The Times is not an association member.

Youth Corps Projects OK'd In Idaho

BOISE (AP)—Approval of two neighborhood youth corps projects at Lewiston and Lapwai, to provide parttime jobs for 81 high school students, was announced today by Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

Smylie said the new projects bring to 700 the number of Idaho students parttime work under the federal-local program so they can continue their educations.

The Lewiston project, to employ 32 boys and 14 girls, will receive funds totaling \$34,675 under the Economic Opportunity Act.

The Lapwai project will employ 35 boys and girls, nearly half of them Nez Perce Indians, the governor said. The project will receive federal funds totaling \$21,950.

Proving Time Needed for New Bus Law

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Robert E. Smylie said today he had the same doubts about Idaho's new school bus law as the Idaho Transportation Association, but he believes the state needs more experience with the law.

The new law does not require drivers to stop for school buses unless a stop sign appears. It indicates students will be crossing the roadway.

The magistrates said the lives of students will be endangered as drivers become accustomed to passing stopped school buses.

"The same thought occurred to me," Smylie told newsmen today, "but the safety engineers thought otherwise. The bill was backed by most safety people in education."

The magistrates asked for a special session of the Legislature to revert to the old law. Smylie said he will consider the request.

Solon Asks War On Lawlessness

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Len Jordan, R-Idaho, called Tuesday for stepped-up governmental action to combat what he termed "increased lawlessness" in the United States.

"Our society," said Jordan, "is threatened with breakdown if we don't put our programs and social betterment crime rates continue to grow."

Hurricane Carol Still In Midocean

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Carol, thrashing around in midocean, is expected to west toward the northwest or west today. Forecasters say there is no reason for any part of the United States to be jittery.

"It will make several waves before we can tell for sure what it's going to do," said forecaster Raymond Kraft of the Miami Weather Bureau. "It's just too far out to make a valuable prediction at this time."

The Weather Bureau's 5 a.m. advisory centered the storm at approximately 1,400 miles east southeast of Bermuda. Carol was moving toward the north at about 18 miles per hour.

Bolivia Tin Miners Kill 3 Detectives

LA PAZ, Bolivia (UPI)—Rebellious tin miners holding four detectives as hostages at Lilaquia in southwest Bolivia killed three of them early today and threw their bodies into the pits, the government reported.

There was no report on the fate of the fourth official.

More than 1,000 heavily armed troops, security forces and detectives patrolled the tin mining belt of Catavi-Lilaquia-Siglo Vento where street battles in the past four days have taken a toll of 32 lives. More than 105 persons have been wounded.

Travelers from the area arrived in the La Paz said the government forces were armed with bazookas and mortars as well as heavy machineguns. They were posted on house tops and in trenches in a semi-circle flanking miners' posts.

Bombs Explode in Stock Exchange

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—Two bombs exploded on the crowded floor of the Rio de Janeiro stock exchange today.

Officials at the exchange said about 500 persons were in the room at the time. They said five or six persons were taken to a hospital for emergency treatment.

Jewelry Robbers Have Hard Time on Getaway

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The robbery went off without a hitch — well, almost.

Two gun-waving bandits stepped coolly into a downtown jewelry store Tuesday afternoon and held the co-owner, Harry Kagan, at gunpoint while they scooped up cash and gems valued at more than \$5,000.

Then they ran outside to their waiting getaway car, an old convertible. It wouldn't start.

At the bandits desperately tried to start the motor, things began to happen. Kagan called police. In a camera store two doors away, Donald L. Adams, a shipping clerk and amateur photographer, saw the men with guns get into the car and rushed out, camera in hand.

"The back window of the convertible was out, so I stuck the camera inside and snapped some pictures," he said.

One of the bandits turned and aimed his gun at Adams.

"It won't click," Adams said, "but I got out of the way."

The bandits did, too.

They leaped from their car and headed toward a sports car being parked nearby. The driver saw them coming and fled with the keys.

The bandits then commanded another car. The driver, Ruth Schrupf, tried to get out with her poodle, lucky. Her husband, Al Schrupf, appeared on the scene and rescued both wife and dog.

The Schrupfs roared off in Schrupf car — for about 100 feet. Then it stalled.

They leaped out and separated. One of them tried to commandeer another auto, but the driver wouldn't budge.

Immigration Bill Passage Is Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate passage of a bill to scrap immigration quotas based on national origins and to put a ceiling on immigration from the Western Hemisphere.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy D-Mass., floor manager of the bill, said the only amendment he expects to be brought up is one designed to bar the deportation of Dominican Gen. Elias Wessin y Wessin.

Wessin has protested that U.S. Army personnel forced him to leave the Dominican Republic after rebel forces refused to surrender their weapons to a new provisional government unless he were removed.

Kennedy predicted defeat of the amendment.

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, after a discussion of Thurmond's proposal by the Senate GOP Policy Committee, said there is fear that Wessin might be assassinated if he is sent back to the Dominican Republic.

But he said the amendment might cause difficulty in the future. For example, he said, it might prevent deportation of someone who committed a felony.

No Action Taken On Wage Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress apparently will take no action this year on a bill which would increase the minimum wage to \$1.75 an hour and extend coverage to 7.9 million more workers.

Speaker John W. McCormack D-Mass., said today the bill would not be taken up next Monday, when it would be in order under a House procedure designed to get around a Rules Committee blockade.

Johnson Supports United Nations in Cease-Fire Accord

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson talked by telephone today with President Mohammed Ayub Khan of Pakistan and promised the United States would fully support with words and deeds efforts by the United Nations to achieve final settlement of the Pakistan-India war. Johnson also read to Ayub a statement made public later in which Johnson said acceptance by Pakistan and India of a cease-fire call from the U.N. Security Council "takes us a long step away from the terrible danger which have threatened the sub-continent of Asia."

Command Asks Tear Gas Policy Review

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP)—The U.S. military command in Saigon has asked Washington to re-examine U.S. policy against using nonlethal tear gas under certain conditions in the war in Viet Nam, it was learned in Saigon today. In the field, Viet Cong guerrillas attacked in the Mekong delta and B52 bombers from Guam hit suspected Viet Cong positions for the 30th time in the war. Saigon informants said the request on tear gas, made two weeks ago, asks that field commanders be permitted to use it in special instances.

A Marine field commander earlier this month used tear gas to rout Viet Cong guerrillas from a tunnel where they had taken refuge among civilians. The commander was said to feel it was the best way to rout the guerrillas with the least harm to civilians.

The tear gas request came as Viet Cong guerrillas launched wide-ranging attacks in the Mekong delta south of Saigon and U.S. forces exchanged shots with Communist units in the central highlands of South Viet Nam.

The Viet Cong lobbed mortar shells at two towns in Binh Duong Province 50 miles southwest of Saigon, killing or wounding 26 civilians, a U.S. military spokesman said.

The Communists overran an outpost in the same province last week, heavy losses on the defenders. They attacked another, causing light casualties.

NAACP Won't Picket at LDS Conclave

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The president of the Salt Lake chapter of the NAACP, John Driver, said today his group has no plans to picket or demonstrate at the coming conference of the LDS church.

There have been rumors that demonstrators planned for the conference Oct. 1-3, weekend after next, by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People or other civil rights groups.

But Driver said in reply to a question: "No, there are no demonstrations planned. At least we are not two hard groups of out-of-state groups coming in, but I doubt it, and I don't know of any."

Bishops Will Debate New Declaration

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council's controversial declaration on modern world problems was clearly headed today for several weeks of spirited debate between bishops of the conservative and progressive camps.

The two groups are divided on whether the document goes too far or not far enough in trying to give answers on such pressing modern issues as birth control, world peace, nuclear warfare and social justice.

Five cardinals and archbishops took the floor in St. Peter's Basilica Tuesday when debate began on the 26-page text, longest of this fourth and final council session.

All approved the idea of a document, unique in the history of Roman Catholicism's 21 councils, that goes into such present-day global problems.

But some prelates said its 30,000 words made it too long, that it was needlessly repetitious in content, that its Latin was faulty.

Montana Missile Workers Are Idle

CONRAD, Mont. (AP) — An estimated 1,600 missile site construction workers were idle Wednesday as workers honored picket lines established by members of the striking Machinists' Union.

The machinists struck the Boeing Co. a week ago.

The work shutdown at the 50th new Minuteman sites in the central Montana began at noon Tuesday, according to Tom Randall, project manager for Morrison-Knudsen and Associates.

Planes Stage 30th Strike In Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. B52 jet bombers staged their 30th strike of the Vietnam war today, bombing suspected Viet Cong targets in Binh Duong Province, a U.S. military spokesman said.

No assessment was made of the effectiveness of the raid 25 miles north of Saigon by the Guam-based Strategic Air Command bombers.

Elements of the U.S. Army 173rd Airborne Brigade uncovered a "big Viet Cong" hospital hidden in dense jungle northwest of Saigon, a U.S. spokesman said.

The paratroopers discovered the medical facility Tuesday while combing a Communist-infested area near the district capital of Ben Cat, 40 miles north of Saigon, the spokesman said.

Nine guerrillas were reported killed and 48 suspects seized in the sweep. The U.S. soldiers suffered light casualties.

The spokesman said the abandoned hospital of 25 beds, which was capable of handling 2,000 patients.

The paratroopers destroyed the complex and seized large quantities of medical supplies. An intricate system of underground tunnels also was destroyed.

Flood Threats Ease in Midsection

Flood threats eased somewhat in Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma today, but the nation's midsection remained soggy.

On the last day of summer part of the flooded area got some respite from the torrential rains, but the central Great Lakes region still took a soaking.

The Weather Bureau forecast more rain for the troubled areas of Missouri and Kansas tonight, but residents hoped the streams might be able to carry off excess water before new rains fell.

Residents of Smithville, Mo., still were jittery as they were threatened with a second flood in two months. However, the Little Plate River receded today after rising into the lower part of the town. About 300 persons were evacuated before the water began to fall.

Another surge of cold air moved through Montana into the central Rockies and light showers accompanied the cold. Forecasters said the rain would be mixed with or turn to snow.

Arrows rolled over their banks in Iowa, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas Tuesday, thousands of homes were driven from their homes and crop and property damage was widespread.

Pakistan and India Agree To End War

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Pakistan and India agreed early today to end their undeclared war, but Pakistan threatened to withdraw from the United Nations if it does not find a way to handle the settlement of the Kashmir dispute.

Pakistan's acceptance of the Security Council's cease-fire order came at a dramatic pre-dawn meeting of the council headed precisely at 3 a.m. The meeting set by the president, India previously had notified the United Nations it would stop shooting if Pakistan would do so. In view of Pakistan's late acceptance, India requested an extension of the deadline to permit orders to go out to the field commanders.

The council agreed to move the cease-fire hour forward to 6 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time today, a 15-hour delay.

U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg, presiding, hailed the agreement as a great day for the United Nations.

"This is an important day in U.N. history," he said, "and the history of the world. The council has addressed itself to perhaps the gravest problem in U.N. history."

The break came after Pakistani Foreign Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto received last-minute instructions from President Mohammed Ayub Khan. The meeting of the council was delayed until the early morning hours, first while awaiting Bhutto's arrival from Pakistan and then while private talks finally produced the agreement.

Lower Water Level Reveals Community

WILMINGTON, Vt. (AP)—New relics of a small town that once lived in the lake's bottom, it is now the site of a ghost town. The lake was formed in 1924 by the New England Power Co. to generate power for New England and part of New York state. It is the first time in memory that water levels have fallen enough during the summer to reveal the flooded community.

Attracting the most attention are the water-damaged and the remains of what was once the backbone industry for Whittingham, the Mountain Mills Paper & Pulp Co. The mill opened in the early 1800s and provided employment for 200 men. Between 30 and 40 employees grew up around it. Emerging are pieces of a former highway between Whittingham and Reidsboro, ties and spikes from a narrow-gauge railway, broken pottery and tin kettles.

The Hoosac Tunnel & Wilmington Railroad, known locally as the "Hoat, Toot and Whis" once ran through the abandoned town. Now it joins the Boston & Maine Railroad at Hoosac Tunnel and serves only Reidsboro and Monroe Bridge. The earthen dam stretching across a valley in Whittingham holding back 11 miles of the Reidsboro River to a depth of 200 ft. in some places was an engineering feat when completed in 1924. Most of the residents left after the start of the reservoir project. Some stayed on until the water lapped at their doors.

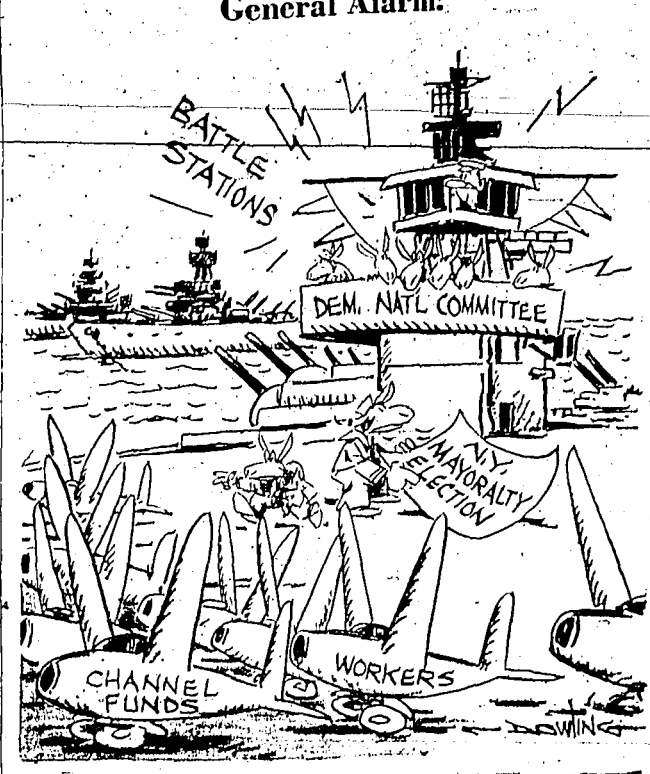

Report Says Red China Is Using Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Internal Security subcommittee published a Chinese Communist claim that Cuba is using Cuba as a springboard for Latin American infiltration.

The claim was made to the subcommittee Aug. 14 by Chinese Communist spokesman Chen Chu, whose father was Chinese and released her was Chu is a waiter in a restaurant in Miami.

Some 10,000 Chinese Communists entered Cuba in the last five years, he said, and in Cuba you have money to falsify documents and passports for these people to emigrate illegally.

With the establishment of diplomatic relations between Communist China and Cuba in 1959, Chen said, "the door was opened wide for the Red Chinese Communists that lined all over Latin America."

Chu said he got his information "from members of the Chinese colony who have emigrated from Cuba to Miami."

Three Faiths Form Missouri Monastery

WIEN, Mo. (AP)—Four members of three Christian faiths have formed an ecumenical monastery in a north central Missouri hamlet to promote Christian unity through prayer. Two Roman Catholics, an Episcopalian and a married Syrian-Orthodox priest are the members of the new monastic order, the Brothers of Christ Unity, said a booklet to promote the life. The life is one of poverty, chastity, obedience and prayer.

"We live under modified Benedictine rules," said the Rev. Robert Bowman, the Episcopalian.

The Rev. Mr. Bowman will take his final vows as a member of the two-year-old order Thursday at Christ Church Cathedral in St. Louis.

Other members of the order are the Rev. Joseph Starnann, a former bishop of Jefferson City, both Roman Catholics, and the Rev. Francis J. Starnann, Episcopalian bishop of Missouri, will conduct the ceremony.

An oblate cannot become a member because he is married and has the pledge of chastity. Father Starnann and Brother Bona are full members.

The Rev. Mr. Forbes lives at the monastery with his wife and children. He handles the monastery's publication and attempts to raise money.

Brother Starnann started the order. The Rev. Mr. Bowman joined in its realization. The Rev. Joseph M. Marling, a Catholic bishop of Jefferson City, allowed the group to use an old Franciscan monastery at Wien, a farming town of persons. The monastery was founded by the Franciscans in 1711.

U.S. Soldier Killed in Korea

SEOUL (UPI)—South Korean troops accidentally killed an American soldier Tuesday during a mixup in a counter-guerrilla warfare training exercise, U.S. military authorities announced today.

The identity of the American soldier was withheld pending notification of kin.

A spokesman said the accident occurred when a soldier in the 32nd U. S. Army Infantry Division ran into a South Korean Army patrol. The Americans were participating in counter-guerrilla exercises and lived the South Koreans also.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)—A bomb exploded in the southern Malaysian city of Malacca Tuesday, injuring two persons and badly damaging a car, police reported today. They blamed the blast on Indonesian saboteurs.

Ohio Man Is Candidate for Father's Seat

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (AP)—Clarence J. Brown Jr., political newcomer with a noted Republican name, squared off today against a young prosecutor at a nationally watched fall election for the congressional seat Brown's father had 27 years.

Brown swapped six opponents for the GOP nomination in a special primary Tuesday while James A. Berry, prosecutor of Clark County, most populous of the 7th District's eight counties, easily defeated a lone Democratic opponent.

Democrats promised a strong campaign with party help from Washington in the western Ohio district which has elected only two Democratic congressmen since the turn of the century.

Democratic leaders term their chances the best in 30 years because President Johnson carried all but one county last year and Democrats cut in half the 1962 margin of Clarence J. Brown Sr. Brown, ranking Republican on the House Rules Committee, died Aug. 27.

The term sought by his 38-year-old son and Berry, 35, runs to Jan. 3, 1967. The winner will be determined in a Nov. 2 special election called to coincide with Ohio city elections.

Hagerman Sets School Bond Election Oct. 19

HAGERMAN — A \$275,000 school bond election is scheduled for Oct. 19 in Hagerman school district No. 233. Funds will provide a new elementary school building and playground and a new science, English and music rooms and facilities at the high school. Supt. George Carnio said passage of the bond issue would mean a 5.38 mill increase. Present school district levy is 33 mills. Polls will be open from noon until 8 p.m. at the Sportsman Lodge and at Prince Memorial gymnasium. Qualified property taxpayers and their husbands or wives are eligible to vote. The bonds would be retired in 20 years. Need for the school remodeling program was outlined by board members and building officials at a general community meeting Monday night after an open house at both the high school and elementary school. Richard Williams, Twin Falls mechanical engineer, explained the present high school building does not conform to state requirements. He said the ventilation system is not good and there is no air filter to distribute air to the rooms. There are no individual temperature controls in the high school rooms. He also noted the heating system is beyond repair in the elementary school. Other needs discussed were the undesirable location and fumes from the hot lunch room. A new English room would be constructed above the science room. It was pointed out the present science room is inadequate and dangerous and the present English room was converted from an old dressing room and is poorly located. A science room which is now located in the main high school building basement.

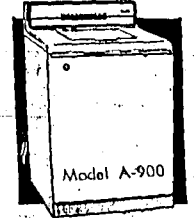
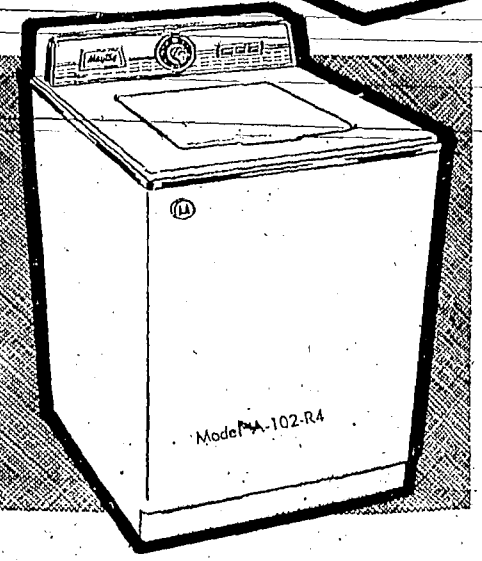

\$2 Million "Greenhouse" for Hothouse Honeys of Social Set Begins Business

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—They call it the "Greenhouse," a posh sanatorium for the hothouse honeys of the social set.

For \$600, a woman can buy herself a week of relaxation, low-calorie food, exercise, beauty tips and treatment, and all-around pampering at the \$2-million resort which opened near here this week.

A two-week stay, which is recommended for maximum benefits, costs \$1,100.

"It's much too reasonable," insisted Mollie Cullum, manager, at a preview for the nation's women's editors. "You couldn't do it in a top-flight hotel for the price."

Fully air-conditioned, the white brick building's focal point is a courtyard pool with water temperature kept precisely at 97 degrees.

Texas sunlight pours through a two-story glass ceiling onto the white marble courtyard floors. Private badminton rim the courtyard on the main floor and around the balcony.

Baskets of begonias, vines and ferns hang from the ceiling. Palm trees grow in gigantic pots.

Carpeted corridors off one end of the courtyard lead to exercise rooms, a sauna, herb baths, a beauty salon and massage rooms. A sunken dining room looks out on the pool. A drawing room, library, and card room

are located in the front of the building.

Mrs. Cullum, an ebullient housemother type with international social connections, oversees a staff of 55. The staff includes a Swedish masseuse, French and German facial experts and a dance specialist who leads the exercise corps.

The big selling point is relaxation and getting away from it all.

"We've got to counteract the pressure from the big cities," Betty Richardson, salon manager, said.

Once in the greenhouse, she said, "the women aren't allowed off the grounds."

The depressurization begins each day with breakfast in bed. Breakfast consists of fruit, black coffee and a slice of melba toast.

Meals are designed to make the customers shed six pounds a week. Alcohol is absolutely ruled out.

After breakfast, the women don saffron terry cloth robes and blue exercise suits and head for phase one of their daily programs.

The program varies from day to day, Mrs. Richardson said, because "we're afraid the women would get bored with the same schedule."

However, in whatever order the day will include an hour's session with the masseuse, exercises for muscle tone and posture in the pool and in special rooms, facials and hair treatments. Trips to the sauna and herb bath, lessons on make-up and nail care are interspersed in the daily routine.

After work, the women can meet in the dining room for a low-calorie candlelight dinner. However, group eating is not required.

Optional evening activities are planned, including lectures and guest speakers, dance instruction, gift wrap instruction, movies and one shopping trip into town.

Although definite schedules are set up, the women may skip any part of the program.

"We're going to advise them but we're not going to tell them what to do," Mrs. Richardson said. "They don't come here to be bossed."

The place is operated by Almann-Marcus, the Dallas department store known for its variety of merchandise ranging from \$17,000 leopard coats to his-and-her submarines.

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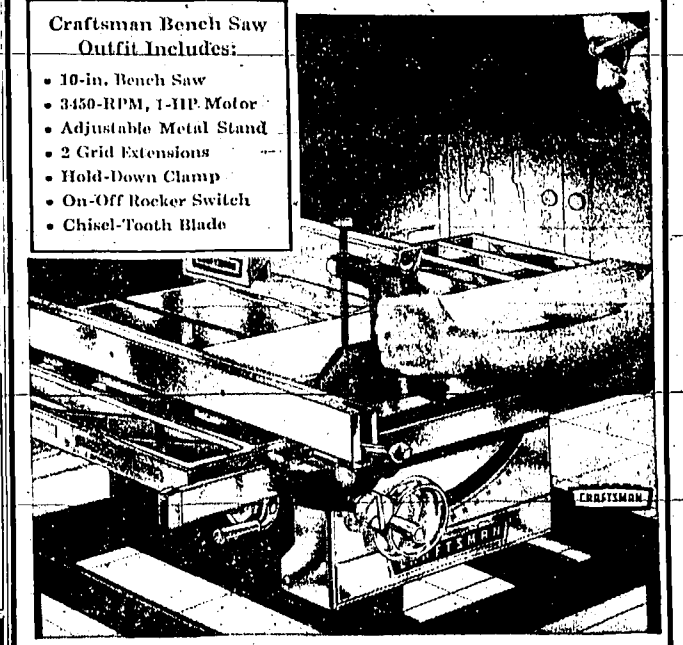

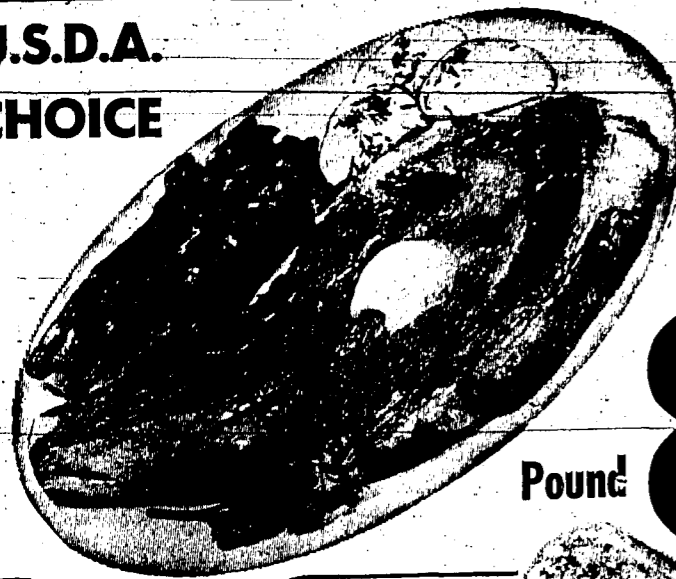

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A school principal again turned a teenager away from classes today because the youth and his parents refused to change his long hair style.

Stephen Mackey, 14, arrived at the school amid the howls of fellow pupils — no one could tell whether they were for or against the lad — and left within minutes after conferring with the principal, Harold K. Costlow.

Accompanying Stephen was his father, Dr. Louis H. Mackey, a professor at Rice University who declares:

"The question is: Does a boy have to forfeit his civil liberties in order to get an education at Lamar High School?"

Lamar is part of the Houston school system.

Dr. Mackey quoted Costlow as saying: "I will now appeal to the Board of Education."

Stephen was expelled from school earlier and told he could not come back until he had his hair cut. His father said his son underwent no barbering except a light trim at the back, administered by his mother.

The principal had barred the youth last Friday.

Costlow said it was an unwritten policy of all Houston schools to send home boys who don't have "normal haircuts." He said he could give no clear-cut definition of a normal haircut other than what looks right.

Viet Nam Conflict Causes Hiked Red Cross Work Load

All American Red Cross chapters and overseas units have been told to prepare for even heavier responsibilities toward men in the armed forces and their families as a result of the conflict in Viet Nam, according to Milo Pope, local Red Cross chapter chairman.

The call for increased service was made in a letter to the 4,000 American Red Cross chapters and overseas installations. It was signed by E. Roland Harrison, ARC national chairman, and General James E. Collins, the organization's president.

Increases in United States military manpower in Viet Nam, as announced in President Johnson's recent statements, have already caused increases in the need for Red Cross services to the armed forces and their families," the message states. "These needs are related not only to Southeast Asia but also to many installations in the United States and many chapters.

"The Red Cross will continue to expand its staff in Viet Nam as needed to carry out our services to the armed forces. Additionally, at the request of the military, we will shortly institute morale and recreation activities for isolated units of able-bodied troops in Viet Nam.

The letter pointed out that both chapters and the national organization must plan for:

1. A growing need for emergency services to the armed forces and their families.
2. Increased continuing services in military families,

Astronaut-Aquanaut Compares Living Underwater to Space

— Commander M. Scott Carpenter, the first man to orbit the earth in both inner and outer space, says very "huh" but "huh" is a powerful for far than danger in space.

"You know, you can use the water to swim and to propel yourself."
"Your ability is severely restricted by the water, where it is not in space."
The umbilical cord from the support vessel—Berkona—to Sealab 2 contains a closed-circuit television link and Carpenter could be seen sitting in front of one of the 11 portholes in the 57-foot undersea chamber being tested in hopes that it would permit aquanauts to leave the Sealab for periods as long as three hours. "Inner space is hospitable," he replied.

Still, in considering what could happen to man in space or beneath the ocean, Carpenter de-
clared that space was possibly the most hazardous as to because of such hazards as toxic gases and the "blinding" of space suits by meteorites.

Without man attempts to maintain life in space or in the ocean, he is going to face some basic problems that are much the same, Carpenter indicated.
"I don't think there would be any real differences. You still have to build your house. You have to adapt to both environments. You have to develop proper equipment," he said.
Carpenter appeared quite fit and self-contained.

Recalling his space flight and the current beneath-the-sea experiences which he could compare with it, Carpenter confessed that there were "nutty" views that were beyond any comparison.
"I've seen greater bliss, greater beauty from space. I've seen the beauty of a sunset in very hard to match. It's a very impressive thing."
"But to see the lights, the life of sea down here is very impressive too."
"I've been impressed in other ways from what I've seen down here as from what I've seen in space," he said.

There was no opportunity to ask him about the reference to the "nutty" views. Because of the high helium content of the gas which the aquanauts breathe, their voices have a high pitch, and the sound is distorted electronically. The result is that Carpenter sounds as though he is holding his nose.

He was asked about the sensation of weightlessness, sea variety and space variety. In space terms, it's called "gravity-free flight," and in ocean environment, it's "neutral-buoyancy."

"They're quite similar," Carpenter said.
"But when it comes to doing work, it is easier to do work down here because you have a little purchase on land. The buoyancy gives you means and the density gives you means."

Gooding Has Reduction of Tax Levies

GOODING — Gooding county residents will have some reduction in their taxes starting Dec. 1, as the result of the tax levy approved Monday by the Gooding county commissioners.

The state levy this year will be .025 per \$100 of assessed valuation, compared to .03 cents for last year, due to the enactment of the sales tax.

The county school levy showed a slight decrease from .8576 for 1964 to .8153 for 1965. Other county levies remained the same, with the exception of the indigent fund, which was raised from .25 cents to .35 cents.

Other county levies are current expense, 75 cents; fair, 5 cents; county hospital, 20 cents; weed eradication, 7 1/2 cents; War Memorial, 2 1/2 cents; airport, .0163; and public health, .02 cents, for a total of \$2,341.60, as compared to \$2,323.84 last year.

Special state taxes remain the same as last year, and include sheep commission fund, \$4; livestock disease control and T. B. fund, 50 cents; state brand honey advertising tax, per colony, 5 cents; bee tax, per colony, 3 cents. These do not apply to all property but only to types of personal property.

City and village levies remained the same. For the city of Gooding, general, \$2.50; street lighting, 60 cents; library, 40 cents; airport, 15 cents; fire department, 20 cents; recreation, 30 cents; for a total of \$4.15.

The city of Wendell, general and streets, \$2.50; street lights, ect., 50 cents; fire department, 20 cents; park and recreation, 20 cents; and library, 20 cents, for a total of \$3.60.

The village of Hagerman, general, \$1.20; streets, 70 cents; lights, 20 cents; water, \$1; library, 20 cents; recreation, 30 cents, for a total of \$3.60.

The village of Bliss, \$1, general and a total of \$1.

The Gooding cemetery district was raised from 2 1/2 cents to 5 cents; others remained the same. Wendell, 5 cents; and Hagerman, 5 cents.

The highway districts were all the same, district 1, Gooding, 70 cents; district 2, Bliss, \$1; district 3, Hagerman, 75 cents; district 4, West Point, 85 cents; district 6, Wendell, 95 cents.

Gooding fire district raised from 45 cents to 55 cents, and Wendell remained the same with 30 cents; Hagerman, also the same with 60 cents.

School districts in the county will see a slight change. This year the county assessment ratio was below average. When the assessment ratio is below average the law enables the state board of education to demand raises.
