

3 U.S. Planes Shot Down Over North Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Three U.S. Air Force planes were shot down Tuesday over North Viet Nam and the four men aboard are listed as missing, a U.S. military spokesman said today. He said the downed U.S. military planes were an F4C Phantom, with a two-man crew, and two F105 Thunderchiefs. Two parachutes were observed from the Phantom but a search produced no trace of the airmen, the spokesman said. One parachute was spotted from the Thunderchief. The other Thunderchief was lost from sight, he said but did not elaborate. He described the anti-aircraft fire as heavy.

Vatican Asks Ban on All Nuclear Arms

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Demands rose in the Vatican Ecumenical Council today for the Roman Catholic Church to condemn all nuclear arms, even for use against the enemy, in support of conscientious objectors. The demands voiced by bishops from England, Canada, Europe and North Africa represented a growing wave of opposition to the stand taken by the U.S.—proliferation of nuclear arms are permissible as a deterrent.

Bishop after bishop attacked this concept, saying modern war represented such a horror that the Roman Catholic Church must condemn it without reservation.

During the session, the bishops also took a final vote that gave overwhelming approval to the council's major draft decree on bishops' powers. This document gives the bishops collective authority and freedom from the Vatican. It decentralizes church administration by providing jurisdictional status to national groups of bishops and urges broader international representation on the Vatican curia.

Twins KO Drysdale, Lead in Fourth, 7-1

MINNEAPOLIS-ST. PAUL (AP) — Zolio Versalles' three-run homer highlighted a third-inning barrage by the Minnesota Twins that lifted the American League champions into a 7-1 lead over the Los Angeles Dodgers in the opening game of the 1965 World Series Wednesday.

Frank Quilici started the six-hit rally that routed Dodger starter Don Drysdale with a double and—batting for a second time in the inning—knocked in the sixth run with a single.

Versalles connected after the double by Quilici and an error by Jim Lefebvre allowed pitcher Jim Grant to reach base. Earl Battey drove in two more runs with a looping single to right.

The only hit allowed by Grant through the first three innings was Ron Fairly's homer in the second. Don Mincher tied the bottom of the second with a homerun.

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Humphrey Will Preside During Johnson's Surgery

WASHINGTON (AP)—A specific agreement provides that Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey will act for President Johnson if need be during the latter's hospitalization for removal of his gall bladder. This was emphasized Tuesday by the President in announcing the forthcoming operation. However, he said he does not anticipate the need for presidential decision, or actions, during the short time that I will not be available for the purpose.

Johnson and Humphrey have had an agreement since shortly after their election, providing: 1. In case of inability of the President would—if possible—so inform the vice president, and the latter would serve as acting president, exercising the duties of the office until the inability ended.

2. In the event an inability prevented the President from communicating with the vice president, the latter, after such consultation as he deemed appropriate, would decide whether to take over the powers of the office and serve as acting president until the inability ended.

3. In either event, the President would decide when the inability had ended and at that time would resume the full exercise of his powers and duties. Johnson said the agreement with Humphrey is the same as that between former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, and between the late President John F. Kennedy and Johnson when he was vice president.

A proposed constitutional amendment covering the subject of presidential inability was passed by Congress in July and is now before the states. Eight of the required 34 state legislatures have ratified it. Michigan acted only Tuesday. Others are Arizona, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Pennsylvania and Kentucky.

Busy Day Is Maintained By President

WASHINGTON (AP)—Besides keeping a busy schedule today, President Johnson did some footwork — even walking out on Pennsylvania Ave. — in an apparent effort to dispel any thought that he's a sick man.

Johnson, who will enter Bethesda Naval Hospital Thursday night for gall bladder surgery, was seen walking out after signing a new law authorizing a federal attack on heart disease, cancer and stroke.

The first person he encountered was a vacationing public health nurse. Johnson handed her one of the pens used to sign the bill.

Then, a young man came up to claim an autograph as Johnson, now leading a pack of reporters and photographers, was turning down West Executive Avenue, the private street between the White House and the executive office building.

Johnson walked the length of the street, then turned into the White House grounds and made a beeline for the tree-shaded, open-air private street between the White House and the executive office building.

The President released "Blanco" from the enclosure and brought him out on a leash. Then, he unleashed "Blanco" and after giving "Blanco" instructions to "sit run," watched with approval as the small beagle playfully tackled the big collie.

China Claims U.S. Violated Air Space

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China hurled new defiance at the United States today after claiming to have downed one of four U.S. planes it said violated Chinese air space. There was no comment on the Chinese claim from U.S. officials in Washington or Saigon.

A spokesman for Peking's Defense Ministry termed the alleged aerial intrusion "a planned and premeditated action, part of the U.S. imperialists' efforts to expand their war aggression in Asia ... If the U.S. imperialists insist on imposing war upon the Chinese people and engaging in a trial of military strength, we say to them, you are welcome, he continued.

"If you dare to come, we will dare to hit back. We will fight whenever you come, and wherever you appear. We will wipe you out wherever you come singly, or in pairs."

Radio Peking reported that Chinese fliers downed an American fighter Tuesday over Kwangang, a mainland province adjoining Communist North Viet Nam. The broadcast said the "three other American planes" fled in dismay when they saw the situation unfavorable.

No further details were given and the fate of the pilot was not disclosed.

Wild Rivers Support Is Reiterated

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie reiterated today his support for legislation in Congress which would include portions of Idaho's Salmon and Clearwater Rivers in a proposed Wild Rivers System.

Smylie made public a letter to L. Crookham Jr., Caldwell, Cong. boss of the Idaho Water Resources Board.

Tractor Firm Broken Into, \$107 Is Taken

Approximately \$107 was taken from a safe at Modern Tractor Co., Eastlund Drive, sometime Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

It was reported \$107.22 was missing from the safe, which had roller wheels, making it easy to move. The burglary is under investigation.

Voters must approve the consolidation and assumption of bonded indebtedness for the plan to be put into operation. It takes a simple majority vote for consolidation. Assumption of the school trustees of the three Joint Districts. This plan called for grades one through eight to be maintained at each school and a new high school built in the vicinity of Hansen.

The bonded indebtedness of each school district as of July 1, 1965, is Kimberly No. 414, \$89,800; Hansen No. 415, \$36,000; and Murtaugh Joint School District No. 418, \$269,200. The new district, if the two issues are approved by the voters, would come into existence July 1, 1966. Each district will vote at the high schools. Cassia county residents in Joint District No. 418 will vote at the Truman Blvd residence.

Loyal Troops Crush Rebels in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)—Radio Jakarta said loyal troops crushed Communist-backed rebel forces in Jogjakarta today after fighting in which that former capital of the Indonesian republic changed hands three times. Action was reported still going on, however, elsewhere in central Java. There was no word on the fate of the leader of the uprising at Jogjakarta, 250 miles southeast of this city. He was Col. Suhernan, a dissident officer of the Diponegoro Division. Information also was lacking on the whereabouts of Lt. Col. Untung, the presidential guard officer who was reported to have fled to Jogjakarta after collapse of the coup he proclaimed against rightist general officers here last weekend.

Dominican Has Another Bombing

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—The office building of the magazine "Ahoru" was blown up today. It was the third bomb incident this week. The first went off in a drive-in movie theater, damaging a car. The second exploded in a bar, injuring seven U.S. soldiers and four Dominicans.

Dr. Rafael Molina Morillo, publisher of the weekly magazine, blamed right-wing elements he said are "enemies of democracy and nationalism." "Ahoru" — the Spanish word for "now" — has been highly critical of U.S. intervention and of the Dominican military leaders who led the fight against the rebels.

The Indonesian radio repeatedly broadcast appeals to troops in central Java to remain loyal to Sukarno's government.

Another Jakarta broadcast reported that pro-Sukarno members of the Diponegoro division were being brutally slain by the rebels. It said one regimental commander was killed in front of his family, then his wife and children were hacked to pieces.

There was no word on the outcome of a top-level conference of military chiefs and civilian officials Sukarno called today at his summer palace in Bogor, 40 miles south of Jakarta. The president-mat-mat-continuously with leaders in Bogor Monday and Tuesday, trying to re-establish his authority and stave off civil war. Anti-Communist feeling was reported high in Jakarta. A major campaign to break the back of the Indonesian Communist party, the PKI, was said to be underway, and other political groups demanded that the PKI be banned.

Congressional Goal Set by Rights Head

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's civil rights leadership has set a new congressional goal for 1966—Passage of a federal security act to take civil rights criminal cases out of state courts.

Joseph L. Daniels, director of the Public Accommodations Act in 1964, the Voting Rights bill in 1965 and two other rights bills in 1966, said in an interview.

The conference, an amalgamation of more than 100 church, labor and civil rights groups, met privately last week.

The meeting came shortly after a five-day conference in Birmingham, Ala., July 1-5, at which Thomas L. Coleman, special deputy sheriff of Lowndes County, of Mississippi, was killed in connection with the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by the U.S. Civil Rights Commission.

The church and the U.S. Civil Rights Commission met in Hayneville, Ala., on Tuesday night to discuss the proposed act.

The conferees agreed, he said, that "every assault with a racial purpose or effect should be made a federal crime."

As congressional passage of such an act, he added, "should be the major legislative goal of the leadership drive in 1966."

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Army Captain Has Inside Look at Viet Nam Fighting

ZONE D, South Viet Nam company Daniel commands. 1st Battalion, 173rd Airborne Brigade, had been pinned down deep into the mud of the jungle floor, Army Capt. Walter Daniel watched a grotesque performance 20 feet away as bullets whined and danced about him. A hidden Viet Cong gunner was rolling the body of a dead U.S. paratrooper over and across a burst of machine-gun fire. The dead man was from the company Daniel commands. Three others had been killed minutes earlier in this clearing by machine gun fire from heavily dug Viet Cong positions. Two of Daniel's platoons had taken moderate to heavy casualties. Daniel crawled back down the jungle hillside, waded a stream and reached his radio. "We've taken every other hill we came up against in Viet Nam, my company has," Daniel said. "But I don't think we can take this one. We'll have to bring the rest of the battalion in." As he called for reinforcements, three medics worked over a wounded paratrooper. "Keep pounding his heart, keep it beating," one medic called as another applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. They kept breathing into his mouth and hammering his chest for an hour. But he died. This was the second wounded man the medics had lost by early afternoon. But it was no fault of theirs. "We need helicopters to get these people out. Can't we get helicopters?" one medic asked. The answer was obvious. Alpha Company was pinned down in virgin jungle towering 200 feet. Since midday, paratroopers had been trying to clear an opening for the rescue helicopters to land. The going was terribly slow. Nearby, Sgt. Gerald F. Mahoney, from New York, missed a 4-11 bus on Oct. 17 and I'll have my holiday in a hospital. I don't like that." Mahoney had been hit in the knee and the thumb, but he could hobble along.

Johnny Cash Charged With Drug Selling

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — Country singer Johnny Cash has been released on \$1,500 bond after a night and a day in jail on charges of smuggling drugs. The 33-year-old singer, wearing a gray suit with velvet collar and cuffs, was grim-faced and gave no comment to newsmen at a bond hearing before U. S. Commissioner Colbert Caldwell Tuesday night. His lawyer, former El Paso County Judge Clifford W. Bean, said Cash was leaving for his Casitas Springs, Calif., home. Cash, a former Memphis, Tenn., appliance salesman who became country music's biggest star in the mid-1950's, was charged with smuggling and concealing illicit drugs after his arrest Monday night at the El Paso International Airport. U. S. customs agents said they found in his possession 668 tablets of a stimulant and 475 tranquilizer tablets. At his arraignment, Cash waived preliminary hearing. Testimony brought out that he was carrying \$12,000 in checks when arrested.

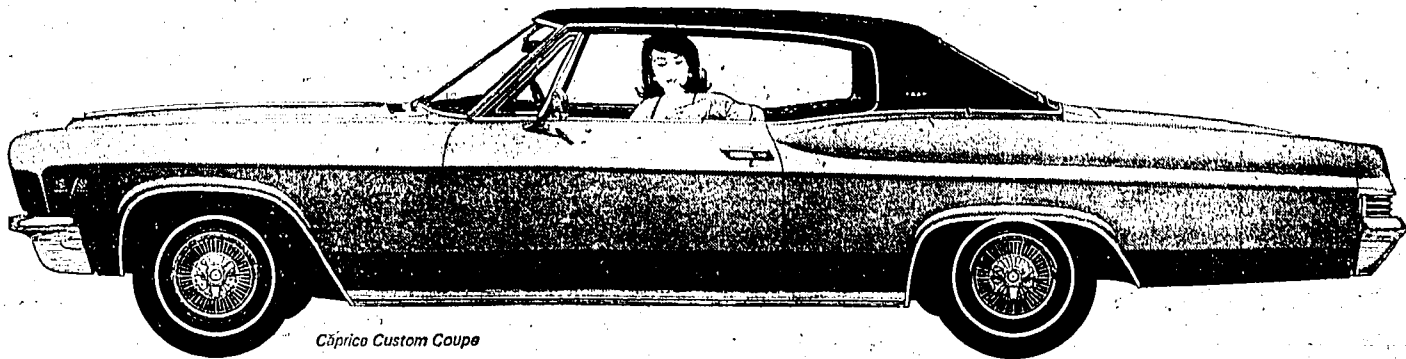

Willy Lee Sykes, 21, was originally arrested in Rock Island on April 13, and charged with an April 8 robbery, but failed to appear in court on July 26 after posting \$5,000 bond.

Special agent in charge of the Butte, Mont., FBI Bureau Robert W. Evans said that an FBI agent and Pocatello Detective Tom Kearns arrested Sykes at an apartment in East Pocatello where the fugitive was said to have been living for a month.

They were the first of about 130 men assigned to the Bureau of Land Management Supervised Camp. The first enrollees—representing all sections of the nation—seemed cheerful and optimistic as they filed off the four-engine airliner and answered questions at a press conference.

RENEW LICENSES
POCATELLO (AP)—The State Board of Medicine reported Tuesday 662 physicians renewed their licenses to practice medicine and surgery in Idaho by the Oct. 1 deadline.

Dr. John E. Comstock, board chairman, also reported six physicians were granted temporary licenses during September. He said they will be granted permanent licenses at the board's next regular meeting in Boise.

KILLED BY TRACTOR
IDAHO FALLS (AP)—An Eastern Idaho woman was killed Tuesday when she was run over by a tractor driven by her son during potato harvesting about 10 miles north of here.

The victim was identified as Mrs. Mae Pancheri, 56, of the Osgood area north of here. Police said the accident occurred when the woman's son, Jerry Pancheri, 27, was driving a tractor and lost his hit.

They said Mrs. Pancheri saw him reach for it and feared he would be injured. She ran to help him, they said, but apparently got caught by one of the tractor's wheels.

HUNTER KILLED
GRANGEVILLE (AP)—Idaho County authorities report a hunting accident has apparently claimed the life of William McMahon of Lowell.

Idaho County Coroner Dr. William C. Morrison said Dr. Milton H. Brinton, Jr., told him McMahon died of a gunshot wound suffered Tuesday while hunting between the Lochsa and Selway Rivers.

Brinton said McMahon was riding a buckskin horse and wearing buckskin chaps when he was shot.

JURY TRIAL SET
BLACKFOOT (AP)—A jury trial for Lavar Chaffin, accused of the first degree murder of his wife Aug. 15, has been set in sixth district court for Nov. 15.

Chaffin appeared before Judge Ezra Monson Sept. 13 and pleaded innocent to the charge. At that time the judge denied a request that Chaffin be released on bond.

Officers said a butane tank in the truck apparently exploded. Further details were not immediately available.

Law Signed To Combat Heart Disease

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson signed into law today a bill to launch a major attack against heart disease, cancer and stroke—without ever mentioning that he faces a gall bladder operation himself Friday.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey was there too, and he and Johnson traded warm words, handshakes and smiles. The President gave a friendly pat on the shoulder to the man who will undergo the operation.

The bill authorizes a three-year, \$30 million program to launch a campaign against what the President called three "murderous diseases that will claim the lives of every 10 Americans who live their lives this year."

"Now," he said, "these are not dry statistics; these are deadly facts whose anguish touches every single family in this land of ours."

Mail Carrier Relives Old Delivery Days

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—One snowy March in the terrible winter of 1898, America's first rural mail carrier looked out of the window at solid drifts of white and cringed.

For Joshua N. Corbin, now 91, knew he would have to ride his horse, Harry, through 34 miles of deep drifts to get the mail through.

Reflecting on those early days, Corbin chuckled as he said the mail didn't always get through—particularly that day it snowed so hard in '98.

"It took me a whole week to deliver the mail in snow up to my horse's bridle," he said.

Corbin was one of four rural carriers in the nation's first rural free delivery experimental program in Carroll County, Md. He was the first of the four to start, on Oct. 1, 1896, when he was 22.

He said in those early days people used everything from teapots to cigar boxes as mail receptacles.

And not all of them wanted the mail delivered: "One man—a Republican—told me to keep in the middle of the road when I passed his place."

"And some men didn't like it because they were used to going into Westminster for the mail. It gave them a chance to sit around the country store-post office, and talk."

Corbin said most of the country folk in those days viewed the rural carrier as something of a federal interloper and were somewhat hostile.

Corbin describes himself as a life-long Democrat who voted for President Johnson.

He said he has enjoyed good health because "I never smoked paper-wrapped cigarette or chewed tobacco." But he added, a twinkle in his eye, "I have been known to take a drink now and again."

Corbin said he earned \$25 a month as a rural carrier. On the strength of this salary, he said he got married. He has been a widower 19 years.

Thrifty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another facet of President Johnson's economies has come to light.

Some offices in the White House still are using up his old vice presidential stationery for nonofficial business.

It is impressive bonded paper with the seal of office and the embossed lettering "Office of the Vice President, Washington."

Utah Symphony Concert to Open Mini-Cassia Series

BURLEY—The first program of the season for the Mini-Cassia Community Concert will be at 8 p.m. Saturday in the Burley High School Auditorium and will feature the Utah Symphony Orchestra.

Maurice Abravanel came to Salt Lake City in 1947 to become conductor of the Utah Symphony Orchestra. His original contract called for him to conduct 10 concerts. Last season he conducted his 70th. He has effectively employed the tools and materials at hand to build a major orchestra that is respected and applauded throughout America and the world, concert officials note.

The most recent achievement of Maurice Abravanel to receive wide acclaim was his appearance as guest conductor Aug. 4 and 6, 1961, at the famed Hollywood Bowl. Sharing the spotlight with him under his baton were such luminaries as Jim Peerce and Mary Costa. Abravanel has conducted the Los Angeles Philharmonic on many occasions, but this was his debut at the fabulous Hollywood Bowl.

Maurice Abravanel, American citizen of Spanish-Portuguese ancestry, was born in Salonika, Greece, and raised in Lausanne, Switzerland, where he first conducted at the age of 16.

He studied in Berlin with Kurt Weill and was engaged in New Orleans, Altonburg and Kassel, meanwhile serving as guest conductor in the Berlin State Opera. In 1932 he made his Paris debut as a symphony conductor. He was also guest conductor of the Paris National Opera and musical director of the Balanchine Ballet Co.

was the youngest conductor ever hired there. He was also the most controversial both praised for the steps for bringing a much needed "new spirit," and criticized for the same reason. He also was the busiest. At one time he conducted seven performances of five different operas in nine days.

After two years at the Metropolitan he left to conduct several concerts in the Tabernacle with the full Utah Symphony. In addition, of course, he chooses young soloists to perform with the symphony at children's concerts and twice has directed the all-state youth orchestra.

Since coming to Utah in 1947, Abravanel has guest conducted 14 different symphonies throughout the country. In most of these concerts Abravanel presented American music and performed many times works of Utah composers, Leroy Robertson and Crawford Gates.

The most important effort of Abravanel is his concerts in schools and his encouragement of young, talented musicians. He encouraged a local, young pianist whom he re-engaged almost every year with the Utah Symphony over the objections

of many people in his community. Today this young pianist, Grant Johannessen, is known all over the world.

Abravanel inaugurated concerts in schools at assembly time, where complete performances of important symphonic works quite often are greeted with standing ovations.

Every year he auditions many young musicians and presents the best in an annual "Salute to Youth" concert, an evening performance in the Tabernacle with the full Utah Symphony. In addition, of course, he chooses young soloists to perform with the symphony at children's concerts and twice has directed the all-state youth orchestra.

Abravanel acted as director of the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara during July and August, 1961. At the Academy under his direction some 130 students receive extensive training for music careers. Abravanel spends more than 600 working hours each year on projects connected with musical youth activities.

Mestre Abravanel and the Utah Symphony have made more than 35 recordings. It is under his direction that the symphony has steadily developed until it is today what has been called "the equal of any orchestra in the land."

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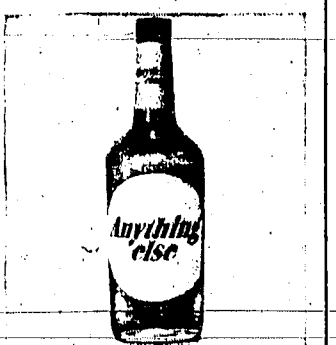
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Closed Circuit TV for Schools Discussed

About 20 Twin Falls educators and other interested persons met Tuesday with Herbert Everett, principal of the television and radio department at Idaho State University, to discuss the feasibility of using closed circuit educational television in the Twin Falls school system.

Everett told the group educational television is usually only a portion of the teaching program and the most useful function it serves is to help teachers upgrade the weak points in their teaching.

If Twin Falls should choose to incorporate the program in its school system, Everett said, about 6,000 programs from about 500 colleges throughout the nation would be available for rebroadcast to Twin Falls students.

He said the best place to start a system of educational television is at the higher levels of education, that being in the senior high school. He said students in this age range are more readily adaptable to changes and more understanding of laws apt to occur at first.

Everett said the system would not save Twin Falls school any money, but he assured the group it would improve instruction noticeably.

Social sciences, physical sciences and mathematics are the best subjects to begin operation with, Everett said, adding a minimum of two months should be allowed to teach instructors use of the operation.

Everett suggested the high school personnel and College of

Southern Idaho officials investigate the possibility of utilizing the audio-visual equipment. He said original cost would be about \$5,000, with about \$1,000 a year upkeep.

Ernest H. Rapland, superintendent of Twin Falls School District No. 411, said the system "seems to have possibilities" but said further thought would have to be given before any concrete action could be taken.

Karl Prussion, Los Altos, Calif., a former FBI counterspy and a member of the Communist party for 26 years, will speak at 8 p.m. Thursday in the O'Leary Junior High School Auditorium.

Prussion, whose lecture is titled "Wake up, America," joined the Communist party while a student at Wayne University in Detroit in 1933. He eventually became disillusioned with the party and became an FBI undercover worker in the San Francisco peninsula from 1947 until Aug. 12, 1959.

He was one of the two friendly witnesses at the hearings of the House Committee on Un-American Activities during the San Francisco City Hall student riots in May, 1960.

Robert Sass, president of the Twin Falls Exchange Club, which is sponsoring Prussion's appearance here, says, "Prussion pulls no punches—he cites names, places and instances of Red subversion."

Sass noted, "Only a longtime member of the Communist conspiracy, such as Prussion, could present this shocking, documented expose."

Prussion has had the courage to continue to tell why Americans become Communists, why Communists leave the party, and how Communists have been brainwashed into silence when they do leave the party instead of alerting their fellow citizens to the danger of the conspiracy.

Besides discussing aims of the Communist Party, Prussion will tell what Americans can do through legislation.

U.S. Official Hits Japan Press on War

TOKYO (AP) — Edwin O. Reischauer, U.S. ambassador to Japan, Tuesday criticized the Japanese press for failing to give a balance picture of events in Viet Nam.

Reischauer spoke with Japanese newsmen in Osaka after delivering a major speech urging Japan to drop what he termed its apathetic attitude toward the Viet Nam war and realize Japan's involvement in Asian events.

Reischauer told newsmen he had not seen statements by South Vietnamese leaders given major news play in several months. On the other hand, he said, statements by North Vietnamese officials were given wide coverage.

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Pope May Visit Communist World Next

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The impact of Pope Paul's visit to the United Nations strengthened again, that he is profoundly impressed here to be preoccupied by the chasm between communism and Christianity. But the Pope has made it un- clarity. Until now he has been ap- plomacy to improve condi- tions for Catholics living under com- munist rule. A third approach could be a personal trip.

The handshake and animated conversation the pontiff had with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko at the United Nations has added to this impression.

Poland appeared the Red country most likely to receive the Pope.

When he returned from New York Tuesday, the Pope vowed he would "continue to work as much as possible for world peace."

Observers took this to mean that he would also continue to travel, personally carrying the gospel of peace wherever he felt it would serve mankind.

Many in Vatican circles are convinced that Pope Paul's three flights outside Italy have smoothed the way for a Communist peace pipeline into a Com- munist land whose political ideology includes atheism.

The thinking goes like this: Pope Paul broke the most difficult ground of all in January, 1961 by going to the Holy Land. The trip was fraught with potential danger. He visited Arab Jordan and Jewish Israel in an area tense with animosities and hatreds. He came and went in peace, and it was a triumph for him as a messenger of peace.

Next came India in December 1961. Despite many fears that he would come to the land of non-Christians, that, too, was a triumph. With his first trip to the New World behind him, where is the Pope to turn in his personal peace program? He has been to the Middle East, to Asia and to the Western Hemisphere.

He could go to Latin America to show his respect for its largely Roman Catholic population or to Africa as a sign of esteem for the emerging nations.

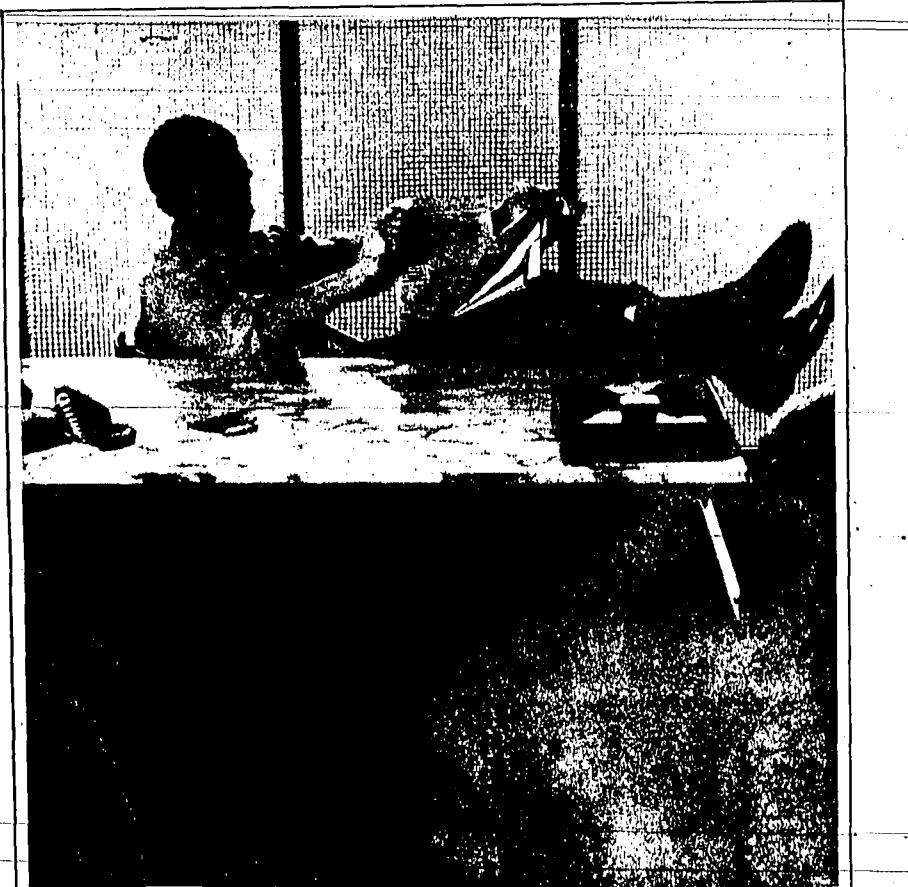

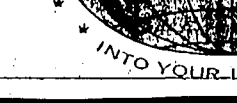

It was the 52nd time in his pro career that Brown has surpassed what Hutson has gained over 100 yards in a game. Hutson was with the Packers from 1935 through 1945.

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
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
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
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Duck Shooters Benefit as Public Hunting Area Opens on Minidoka Wildlife Refuge

RUPERT—With the public's hunting and fishing domain decreasing steadily, the most welcome news available in Magic Valley this season will be a 3,400-acre public hunting ground on the Minidoka Wildlife Refuge. Leon Littlefield, refuge manager, reports about 72 percent of the refuge, including the best habitat for ducks, will open Saturday along with the rest of the season in Magic Valley. Also opening on that tract will be the Hungarian Partridge season and, in addition, waterfowl hunting, in conjunction with the general Idaho season. In all cases, bag and possession limits will coincide with those set up by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission.

Never before opened to the public, the refuge now offers the public a chance to hunt what must be judged as classic decoy setting. The area runs roughly four miles west from Bird Island. It includes two long bays crisscrossed with dikes and other vegetation along the shoreline for blind cover. The water ranges from a few inches to well over a man's head.

Explaining the reasons for the opening, Littlefield said "We (the government services) are now in the recreation business as you know. It is our hope to provide the public with all our facilities for use in hunting, fishing and other recreational aspects as long as it does not interfere with our primary objective—conservation."

After serving on refuges in Montana and Twin Lake in California, Littlefield noted "People around this area aren't really conscious yet of the impact made by private hunting clubs and individual interests. Montana, Idaho and eastern Oregon still have an abundant public shooting and this is being discovered more and more each year. You can see it all with all these Utah and California hunters coming in. They make a month of it, taking big game, fish and birds. The Boise area already can feel a pinch and Twin Falls will probably be next. We are trying to keep places for Joe Bonker to get in some good bird shooting for a \$5 license and \$3 duck stamp. This isn't going to be easy."

"In California when I was there around 1960—a \$300 annual payment in a private club would get you a blind and the atmosphere—but no shooting. For \$1,000 a year you could get some pretty good shooting. I know of one instance where a man paid \$1,000 for the hunting rights in an ideal spot," Littlefield continued.

"Another reason for opening this is to draw some attention to this wonderful recreation facility to the people of the Twin Falls area. We get pretty good use of the lake from people around here but it could accommodate a lot more. Twin Falls area people are taking good use of these facilities but they haven't found us yet," he added.

Switching back to the hunting aspect, Littlefield said "I would expect this to be a good opening weekend here. Right now we have about 15,000 ducks on the area, a large number of every species. The large concentrations of mallards would be in for a while yet but we have everything here, dabblers and divers. There might be some geese taken but there are only about 250 on the refuge and it would be a matter of being in the right place at the right time."

An ardent waterfowler himself, Littlefield said "I think this set up will offer something to this area that its citizens don't know much about. There should be good diver hunting here—canvassacks and redheads. They're deep water birds. I notice a tendency around here to dismiss these species with the idea they are fish ducks. On the coast that may be true but not here. A canvassack or redhead taken here would be excellent eating. And the hunters will have to learn some different techniques for taking them."

The situation is ideal. On the two marshy necks of the 22-mile-long reservoir, Littlefield and his crew can maintain the water depths desired.

"The two bays offer it all. The upper ends are kept at about three or four inches ideal for dabblers (mallards and pintails). Toward the reservoir end they are deep and that's where the divers will be."

Access to the area is from the old U.S. Highway 30 meandering through the desert north of the freeway. The turnoff is plainly marked by a large sign and is found two miles east of the microwave station.

"The service spent \$4,500 graveling roads, installing parking lots and sanitary facilities. It will be open every day during the season. However, Littlefield said the two marshy bays probably will go dry around Dec. 1 as the reservoir is drawn down.

"We can dam the bays but the soil is sandy and the water seeps away. But by Dec. 1 we usually have considerable ice and the peak of the duck population is well passed," Littlefield said.

There are restrictions that all using the area must remember. Boats will be allowed but without motors. "They are several submerged dikes and boulders in the area. A motor would tear the bottom off a boat if it hit one," Littlefield explained. Two launching sites are available for light boats. No warning fires will be allowed due to the dry desert vegetation around. Also, hunting on the reservoir proper may be done from the bank only. There can be no shooting from the islands.

Vehicles may be parked on designated areas only. These have been situated close to the hunting areas as a convenience but the designation is needed for several reasons.

"Everyone knows that a lot of hunters would just tie up their cars as a blind to shoot from rather than get out of it or put it far enough away to prevent birds from flaring. Using designated parking will help the hunter who knows better from those who don't. Maybe we can teach them some thing," he smiled.

He added "there should be a lot of trading of ducks from the reservoir to these bays. There are roads on these flyways and general use by traffic would hamper hunters already established on the marshes."

Entry to the area is by the Bird Island road only. No more than two dogs will be allowed per party for retrieving purposes.

Littlefield also emphasized another point. "It would be best for hunters to brush up on their species identification. We have practically every kind of duck here. Under the 1965 hunting rules for this area, three of the six ducks must be mallards. Hunters should remember at least three of the six ducks must be mallards.

The area will be checked every day by Littlefield, his assistant and wildlife conservation officer Charles Stribling, Pocatello.

Just what the area will accommodate in numbers isn't known.

"For the first year we will leave it open to all comers. If we find excessive use, it may be necessary for us to regulate the number allowed each day.

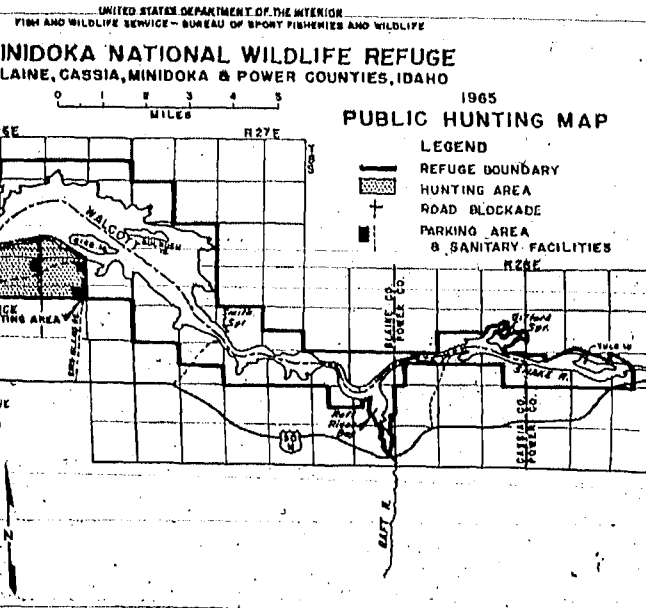

For right now, though, we expect good use early, then a decline to a hard core of regulars.
