

Tshombe Government Is Dismissed, North Katanga Deputy to Form New One

LEOPOLDVILLE, (the Congo) (AP)—President Joseph Kasavubu dismissed the government of Premier Moise Tshombe today and called on Evariste Kimba, a deputy from North Katanga, to form a new one. Kimba is a member of the Baluba tribe which traditionally is hostile to Tshombe's Lunda tribe. But Kimba was Tshombe's foreign minister after Katanga Province seceded in 1960. There had been speculation Kasavubu would dissolve the government, then call on Tshombe again to form a new one with the understanding that his cabinet include supporters of Interior Minister Victor Nendaka.



The president's action, announced in a speech to a joint session of Parliament, came after a period of intense rivalry between Tshombe and Nendaka. Tshombe took office July 8, 1964, after returning from a year's exile in Europe following the defeat of his Katanga secession by United Nations forces. He returned to a country torn by rebellion. Ignoring African opinion, he hired white mercenary troops who have succeeded in bringing the rebels under control in much of the Congo.

Public Land Withdrawal Is Proposed

Proposed withdrawal from operation of the mining laws of 110.2 acres of public land in the Salmon and Sawtooth National forests were reported Wednesday by Bureau of Land Management. A 30-day waiting period is provided before the Department of Interior acts on the withdrawal application, during which written comments or objections may be submitted by the general public either to the land office, Bureau of Land Management, Box 2237, Boise, or the regional forester, U. S. Forest Service, Ojden.

4 Idaho Guard Units to Have War Quota

BOISE (UPI)—Four units of Idaho's Army National Guard will increase their strength to 100 per cent of their authorized wartime quota, Gov. Robert E. Smylie was notified Wednesday. Maj. Gen. George B. Bennett, Idaho Adjutant General, informed Smylie of the plan after a special briefing in Washington, D.C. The increased strength of the Idaho Army National Guard units is part of the Defense Department's plan to increase the readiness of the nation's reserve forces. Idaho units involved are the Headquarters and Headquarters Company of the 11th Engineer Battalion, Idaho Falls; Company A of the 11th Engineer Battalion, Rexburg; and Company C of the 11th Engineer Battalion, from St. Anthony and Driggs. Smylie said about 64 guardsmen will be involved.

There were 10 write-in candidates and each received one vote. India Reports Fight Killed 80 Pakistanis

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — India reported today a major battle between regular troops of the Indian and Pakistani armies in the mountains of Kashmir. It claimed at least 80 Pakistanis were killed. The Defense Ministry said in a communique the Pakistanis launched a "massive attack" with more than a battalion of troops Monday on Indian positions six miles northwest of Tangdhar area of Jhawal sector in west central Kashmir. A Pakistani unit, probably of 600 men or more, attacked three times but were beaten back, the communique said. The clash is the biggest reported since the India-Pakistan cease-fire of Sept. 23. The clash was announced shortly after Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri warned his people and army that Pakistan was threatening "wider conflagration and a bigger war."

94 Cubans Steaming to Key West

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard cutters Cape Shoalwater and Lamar steamed Tuesday toward Key West with 94 more refugees, and the exodus of people from Communist Cuba continued to grow in proportion. The Cape Shoalwater picked up 24 exiles rescued from a sinking 18-foot boat in the choppy Florida Straits which separate Cuba from Florida. The cutter also was towing another boat carrying 28 refugees. The cutter followed the Shoalwater in with another 42 Cubans aboard.

Elsewhere in the rough waters, either Coast Guard patrol ships were towing disabled craft, carrying sick refugees and running down reports that some boats were on the way. Stormy weather in the area has caused Castro's refugees, en route to Florida, to be held at sea today. The cutter allowed the migration, but one Cuban aboard the Shoalwater said thousands were ready to leave when it could be arranged.

Sen. Kennedy Proposes Red China Be Invited to Nuclear Talks in Geneva

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy proposed today that Communist China be invited to join in Geneva talks aimed at an agreement to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons. Kennedy, a New York Democrat, called in a prepared Senate speech for accelerated U.S. efforts to enlist the help of the United Nations, and all other nations — including Communist China — in the effort to prevent nuclear catastrophe. "The rulers of China may be persuaded that their long-run interest, like that of the United States and all other nations, lies not in the spread of nuclear weapons but in their strict control," Kennedy said. "We are now engaged in regular discussions with the Chinese ambassador in Warsaw. But these are not the only possible means to explore possible Chinese accession to a system of nuclear control. We should, at the outset, invite the Chinese to participate in the disarmament talks at Geneva when those talks resume in January. queen from among the candidates.

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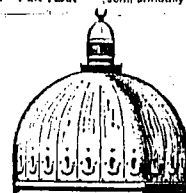
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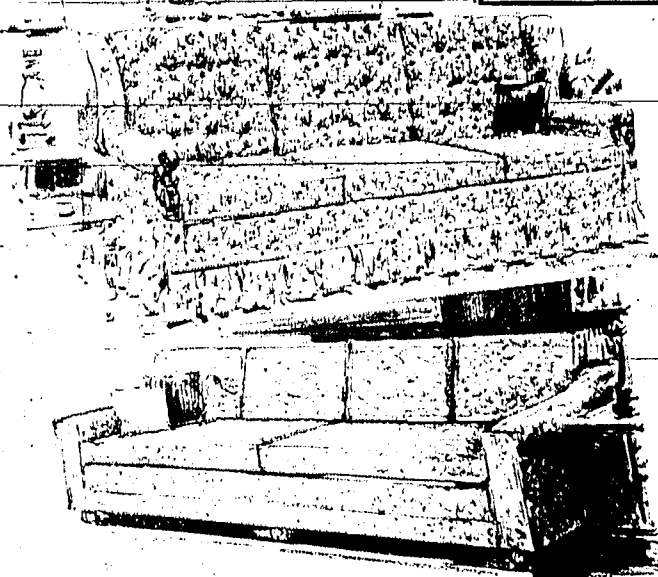

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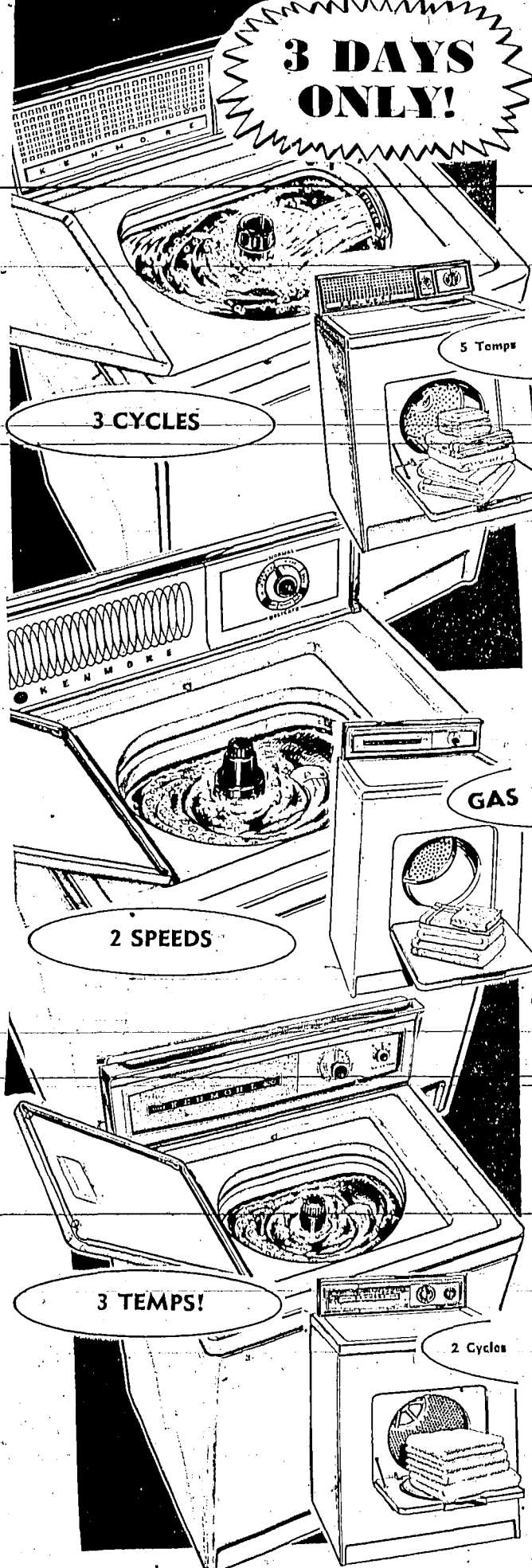

Man Charged On Fireworks Possession

CRAWFORDVILLE, Ga. (AP) — A civil rights photographer who was attacked by a Ku Klux Klansman was held in jail today on a \$500 bond on a charge of possessing fireworks. The Klansman, charged with assault, was free on \$100 bond.

The victim of the first swinging attack is Brig Cobe, a drunken youth who works for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. State police said Cobe had a firecracker when taken into custody. Georgia law makes possession of fireworks illegal.

Klansman Cecil Myers of Athens, Ga., who chased the photographer and tackled him Tuesday, left town with his wife, Joseph Howard Sims, also of Athens. The two men were indicted, tried and acquitted of murder last year in the shotgun killing of a Negro educator near Colbert, Ga.

"I asked them to leave town," said W.E. Watson, chairman of the county committee. The men were not on the scene when 15 Negro pupils tried again to block school buses carrying white children to other counties.

Myers and Sims, dressed in black and calling themselves "Black Knights," had marched through the town on Tuesday afternoon and headed back to a church. Myers ran past a trooper and swung twice at the photographer, then wrestled the youth to the ground before officers could separate them.

Roddy spoke of the infection of Halo blight in the bean fields and stressed the importance of notifying the county agent or fieldman if there is suspicion the crop is infected. He pointed out that early detection of infested crops will permit prompt destruction and minimize the opportunity of spreading to nearby blight-free fields.

Fields which have been known to have the blight should not be planted again for three years or until complete decomposition of infested plant debris has occurred, he said.

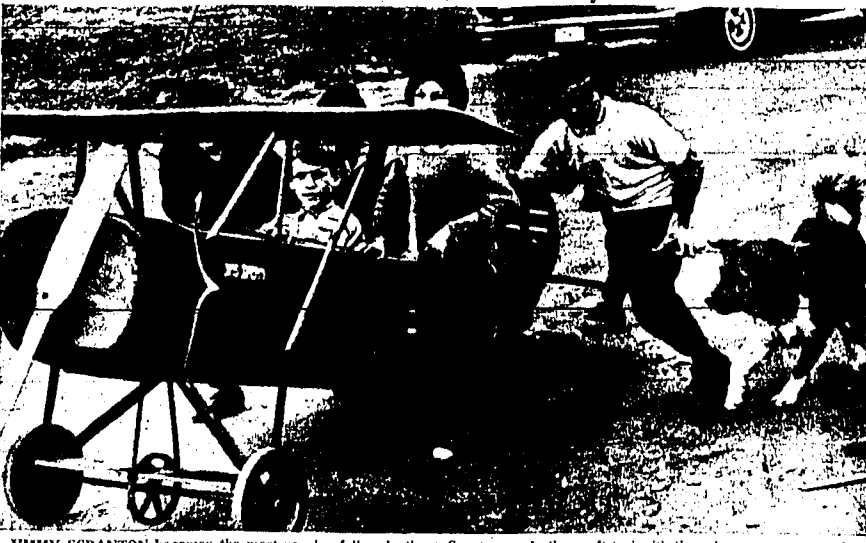

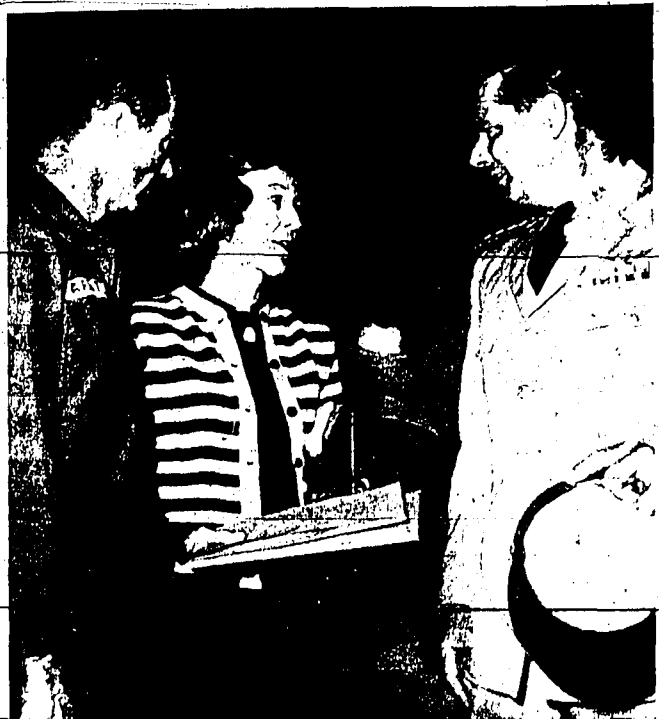

12 States Eligible for Federal Funds

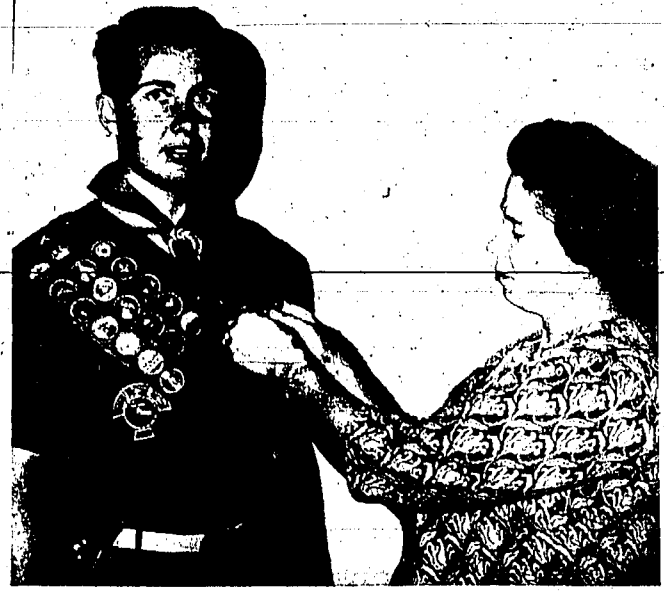

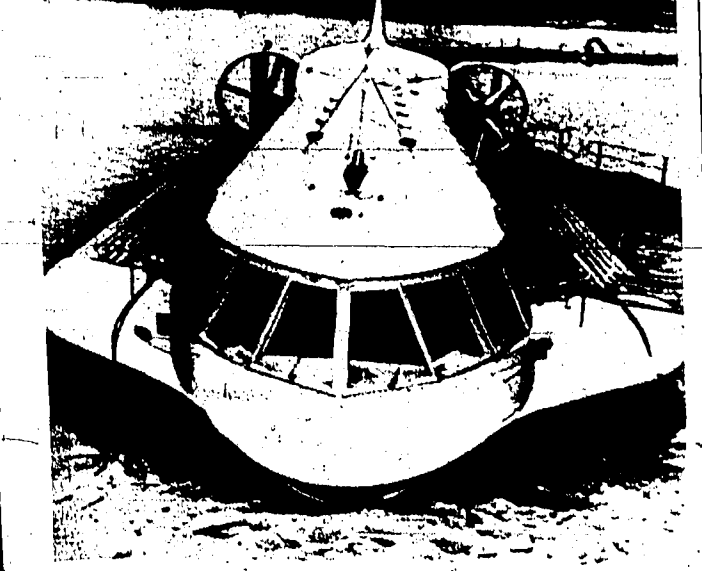

Jet Aircraft Buying Will Bring Jets to Most Cities

NEW YORK (AP) — A U.S. airline took off into the jet age 40 years ago and soon flew into rough weather with heavy costs and too many empty seats. But now most carriers are flying high with record profits.

On Oct. 13, 1955, Pan American World Airways ordered the first U.S. commercial jets, touching off a scramble by airlines to provide jet service.

Today, about 35 per cent of the 1,884 aircraft flown by the nation's airlines are jets. The jet fleet will double by 1969.

Airline industry profits soared to \$138.9 million in the first half of this year. The total for the same period last year was \$79.3 million.

Jet routes include not only the 2,451 miles between New York and Los Angeles but also the 173 miles between Buffalo, N.Y., and Cleveland, Ohio.

The Air Transport Association says the current wave of jet aircraft buying will bring jet service to almost every city served by scheduled airlines.

Many airline officials have mixed feelings in looking back on the beginning of the jet age. "It was rough for a while," said one executive. "We had to digest tremendous costs. It left the airlines up to their eyeballs in debt."

The first commercial jets cost about \$5 million — double the price of the most expensive piston-driven airliner.

Between 1955 and 1964, turbine-powered aircraft acquired by the airlines — almost all of which were pure jets — cost \$4.5 billion. In the next five years, the total cost is expected to climb to at least \$9.2 billion.

Not only do jets cost plenty, but at first they added to the seating capacity of airlines at a faster rate than demand for seats increased.

Between 1958, when jets were first put into service, and 1962, available seat miles on airlines increased 30.3 per cent while revenue passenger miles went up only 13 per cent. By 1961, the last year, profits jumped to most \$38 million.

The turning point in the jet age arrived three years ago. Airline profits, reflecting higher passenger demand with the growth of the leisure dollar, rebounded to \$32 million in 1962. In 1963, they grew to \$77 million. Last year, profits jumped to \$226 million.

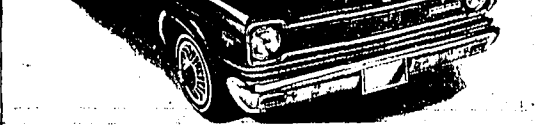

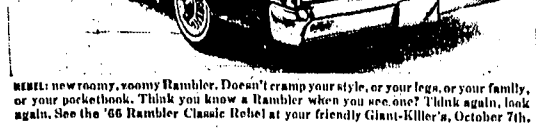

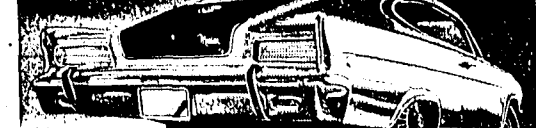

Logistics Is Problem at Choral Meet

BOSTON (AP) — Decide to bring 16 choral groups to Boston from all over the world and you have a lot of good music but a logistics problem big enough to worry any general from Hummibal to Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"But you get a lot of help, too," says Philip J. Webster, manager of Boston's Handel and Haydn Society which is sponsoring an international choral festival in progress at Symphony Hall this month.

"We are amazed at the public response," Webster says. "The total price tag of the festival will be about \$250,000, and the society is responsible for about \$150,000. But we already have \$50,000 raised in contributions, and we expect to make up the rest in such things as ticket and program sales."

Some of the choruses come in formidable sizes. The Huddersfield Choral Society of England, for example, is a small army of 180 singers plus baggage. Just to get them to Boston and back home will cost \$40,000.

And where do you put them when they arrive? The Boston Council for International Visitors has found places for many in private homes, but the hotel tab for just three of the larger groups will be \$5,000.

Pentagon's Cafeterias Note Thefts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The most staggering the imagination sees will be more, some 2,000 salt and pepper shakers and nearly 200 coffee dispensers also have disappeared.

Throw in a horde of hot knives, forks and spoons and you run into a cost estimated in five figures.

These statistics came to light with an appeal from the Army Welfare Fund Recreation Office. It complained the losses are cutting down the money that otherwise would be coming in the fund from the proceeds of Pentagon concessions.

"Okay, folks, what are you doing with the stuff?" the Army office asked in its monthly publication.

"The merchandise is disappearing faster than it takes the Beatles to get the girls screaming. At the rate it is vanishing, we all have a problem, and this includes you," it said.

The Pentagon's population of some 27,000 military and civilian workers is fed at six big cafeterias, eight snack bars and two restaurants.

The eating places are operated by private concessionaires under federal contract.

Cubans Confused as Foreigners on Policy

HAVANA (AP) — The average Cuban is just as confused as the foreigners are about the reasons for Prime Minister Fidel Castro's new open door policy for Cubans wanting to go to the United States.

"Humanitarian is not," said an elderly Negro maid. "There is something more to it than what he says in public."

"I think he got caught up in his own rhetoric and now he can't back down," said a barber.

"He's sincere and Cuba has never closed the doors on those wanting to leave," said a government official. "It was the Americans who cut off all numbers. Nine out of ten con-

versations are about the possibilities of leaving Cuba.

People shout to one another across the street: "When are you leaving for Camaroca?" Many are jesting. Others are serious. The name of the little fishing village designated as the exit point for refugees is on everyone's lips.

The consensus — and many indications seem to bear this out — is that if there is an accord reached between Cuba and the United States, more people will want to leave than can be accommodated in an orderly manner under the terms now left open for a long time.

In his speech Sept. 28 in which he offered to open the doors, Castro said his reasons were: —To put an end to "imperialist propaganda" that his government was holding back those who wanted to leave. —So that the world would know the "American imperialists" and not the Cuban government shut down the exit avenues. —To allow families divided between Cuba and the United States to be reunited.

But experienced observers here say Castro's move will: —Give the world a picture of him as a humanitarian since he made the offer. —Get rid of a dissatisfied element here that does little but put an added strain on the state's economy. —Divert attention from what is considered a weak story about the disappearance of his close friend and fellow revolutionary Ernesto Guevara. —Attempt to break the blockade imposed by the Organization of American States, by challenging the United States to allow "Americans to visit" in Cuba and Cubans to visit in the United States. —Government officials refuse to say how many persons want to leave the country.

WORLD SERIES BASEBALL RESUMES TODAY

Grant Gets Starting Nod For Twins, Osteen Will Take Mound for Dodgers

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—Minnesota Manager Sam Mele, over a barrel because the World Series could wind up Wednesday, made a back-to-the-wall move Tuesday by naming Jim Grant to face Claude Osteen of the Los Angeles Dodgers in the sixth game. Although the 30-year-old Grant will start only two days rest after lasting only five innings in the previous game.

L.A. Wants to 'Wrap It up' in Last Game

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—"Let's wrap it up in one game"—that was the confident cry of the Los Angeles Dodgers Tuesday when they boarded their special plane for Minnesota and the windup of the World Series. Prior to embarking at International Airport for the noon takeoff, the Dodgers held an hour-long meeting in their home stadium where they swept three straight 1-2 leads in the series.

Twins Have Confidence in Home Park

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—The Minnesota Twins, bubbling with renewed confidence on their return to Metropolitan Stadium Tuesday, unlimbered their heavy artillery in a brief batting practice for Wednesday's sixth game of the World Series against Los Angeles.

Manager Sam Mele watched his batting start, Tony Oliva, who led American League hitters with a .321 mark during the regular season but who is batting only .158 in the series, belt two balls into the empty bleachers.

"That's a nice familiar sight," Mele smiled. "It's great to be back in your home park. I think this will make a difference for all of us."

Don Mincher followed Oliva into the batting cage and cracked another drive into the bleachers, as did Harmon Killebrew, Bob Allison, Joe Mauer and Zoilo Versalles.

Jim Grant, who was named by Mele to start the sixth game for the Twins, did not participate with the other players. He put on his uniform and warmup jacket, came out on the field and talked with reporters and then returned to the clubhouse.

Mele said that the key to the Twins' success Wednesday would be "whether we can get an early lead."

"If we do that, the Dodgers won't be so daring on the base paths," he said.

Someone told the husky, 6-foot right-hander, who won the series opener and lost the fourth game, that Mele wanted to see him immediately.

Grant headed straight for Mele's office and the two spoke privately for nearly five minutes. When they broke up, the Twins' manager came out and announced: "It'll be Grant for us tomorrow."

Mele then added, "Grant has been my best pitcher all year (11-7). I just wanted to check with him to see how his arm is and how he feels generally. He told me he feels good."

"I told him to go just as hard and as long as he could. I'll have Jim Merritt in the bullpen along with a lot of other guys. I'll probably use Jim Kaat in the seventh game."

The only hitch there is that there won't be any seventh game if Osteen beats the Twins Wednesday.

The popular, always-smiling 26-year-old left-hander can wrap up the whole thing for the Dodgers by pitching them to their fourth straight victory after they dropped the first two games to the Twins here.

It was Osteen who really turned the series around when he checked the Twins on five hits for the Dodgers' first win of the series, 4-0, in the third game.

Tigers Now Sorry They Let Wills Go

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—Each time Detroit officials look out there at shortstop and see that thin-shanked little guy with No. 30 on the back of his Dodger blouse, they feel the same way as the Minnesota Twins—a little sick inside. The fellow they're looking at is Maudy Wills, whom the Tigers looked at

once before and decided they didn't want. What wouldn't they give to have him now? But alas, as they always tell you five minutes after you've missed catching your plane at the air terminal, now it's too late.

Wills has collected 10 hits so far in the World Series and owns a cool .455 average. His average on the base paths against the Twins is even better.

There is no rancor in his tone as he talks about how the Tigers had him at their Lakeland, Fla., spring training base in 1959 and handed him back to the Dodgers.

At the time, the Dodgers were three-deep at shortstop with veteran Pee Wee Reese, Don Zimmer and Bob Lillis, so they could afford to be magnanimous. They sent Wills over to the Tigers.

"As I understand it," explains Wills, "it was one of those 10-and-25 deals."

By that, Wills meant the Tigers paid the Dodgers \$10,000 merely for the privilege of looking at him and if they decided to keep him it would cost them \$15,000 more.

Wills played mostly B games although I did some pinch running in a few games," says Wills. "Billy Hitchcock worked with me a lot and I had a good spring. I thought they were going to keep me."

"As I remember it, the Tigers' ownership was undergoing a change or something at that time. Jim Campbell was running things and Bill Norman was the manager."

"Like I said, I did well and I felt I was going to stay with Detroit. But Campbell called me in two days or a day before camp broke. I forgot exactly what day it was, and he said they decided against keeping me. He told me they were sending me back to the Dodgers."

Typically, Wills found some consolation at the time. "I didn't feel too badly when they sent me back," he says. "It was my first time in a big league camp and I didn't feel as if it was wasted. I had learned a lot and I felt I had accomplished something."

Subsequently, the Dodgers acquired Wills to their Spokane farm in the Pacific Coast League and that's the place he began blossoming under manager Bobby Drabek, the man to whom he owes all his success, he claims.

"At one time—I decided—I'd never make the major leagues," he confesses. "In my own mind I must have quit 100 times. Then I decided I'd be the best ballplayer in the minors."

"Bobby wouldn't let me think of myself as a minor leaguer," Wills recalls. "He gave me the incentive to get back to the majors. He urged me on all the time and I stole 25 bases in 48 games with Spokane."

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) — The Navy reported all its Sealab 2 aquanauts look healthy and enjoying fresh air today but one, Robert Sheats, 50, stricken by the painful bends.

Sheats was gripped by a pain in his hip Monday night as the chamber containing the project's third team was decompressed to the surface level.

At 6 p.m., Sealab doctors separated Sheats from his pneumatic chamber and returned him to a simulated depth of 60 feet.

As atmospheric pressure increased, the pain subsided and Sealab 2, oldest member of the project, remained somewhat lonely but in relative comfort.

A poletop said Sheats was decompressing at the rate of 3 feet an hour and if the pain did not return, he would emerge from the chamber today.

Sheats talked to his doctors during the night through an intercom connecting the chamber and the Sealab surface vessel, Berkley.

The re-ascending process is necessary to fill the body of helium bubbles which would form in the blood-stream if a diver ascended too fast after breathing the helium-rich atmosphere in the Sealab 2 underwater living project.

Three teams occupied the Sealab 2 capsule, at a depth of 205 feet, for 15-day periods.

Ike Fears 'Let Washington Do It' Attitude

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, on the eve of his 73th birthday, feels American society is threatened by so-called easy money, the temptation to "let Washington do it," and, for that matter, long hair-does affected by so many young men.

The long hair displayed by some younger male circles, he says, is really symptomatic of something much deeper — a diminution of self-respect, individually and nationally.

These and other opinions on current affairs were expressed by the five-star general and former chief executive in an interview with United Press International.

Thursday Eisenhower will celebrate one of his most active birthdays in recent years, marked by publication of his second post-White House book, "Waging Peace." This is a massive work of 741 pages covering six years in the White House, including his problems with Cuba, Hungary, Viet Nam and such world leaders as former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Actually publication date for Eisenhower was somewhat of an anti-climax. He has been talking about the book almost daily for several weeks, taping television shows, granting interviews and all the while, maintaining a speaking schedule away from his Pennsylvania home.

His capacity for work seems, if anything, to have increased in retirement. And physically, it agrees with him. He looks slimmer than when he left office in 1961. His stance is trim and erect, that of a man 30 years his junior.

And he still has that electric smile, a trademark for many years that evoked roaring cheers from New Delhi to New York. A UPI photographer, snapping pictures informally throughout this interview, cracked:

down on one particularly broad Eisenhower grin and said softly, "Man, he still has it."

Eisenhower "still has it" in many other ways. While he never may great shakes as a professional politician, there are Republicans today who believe he still is the best party has to offer when it comes to commanding public attention.

"Like it nor," he was told, "you're still head of the Republican Party in the minds of millions of Americans."

He thought this was "unfortunate." While he likes to be consulted on the course of his party, he thinks that public attention should be focused on Republicans who are on their way up.
