

# Senate-Approved Farm Bill Awaits Final Signature

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has passed a record-setting farm bill which the Agriculture Department estimates will cost \$4 billion during the 1966 year. Approved earlier by the House, the measure awaits President Johnson's signature. The key features in this year's legislation: (1.) It covers four years, the longest period ever approved by Congress for an omnibus farm measure, and (2.) It provides payments to cotton growers to don't use their entire allotment. In addition to cotton, the measure sets production and price controls for wheat, feed grains, wool, dairy products and retirement of surplus land.

Any of its provisions simply amend existing programs. The bill's approval came Tuesday on a voice vote. The House passed the compromise version of the bill last Friday, 213-150. Cotton support price next year would be pegged at 21 cents a pound. The figure was an effort to enable farmers to compete with the world market price, now about 24 cents a pound.

Provisions of the other bills: — Growers would be guaranteed at least \$1.84 1/2 a bushel. This would insure a basic support price of 75 cents per bushel. — The program would continue as operated during the past four years. In addition, the secretary of agriculture could set total price support at between 65 and 90 per cent of parity.

— The Commodity Credit Corporation could sell dairy products when they are not considered surplus. — Essentially the same as existing, but modified to increase U.S. production with the aid of foreign markets.

— The government will share the cost of finding uses for surplus land. It is estimated to remove 40 million acres from production.

# Churches Are Radicated in Red Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP) — Church and parochial schools have been virtually eradicated in Cuba, according to a study of Congress study published today by the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee. The study said religion never had an important influence on Cuba and that as a result of Minister Fidel Castro's campaign against the church, easier and more successful similar campaigns in other mainland countries.

Religion in the pre-Castro Cuba was already of so little importance to the people that the struggle between the Catholic Church and communism of brief duration (and) not bloody," the study said.

Koufax, who pitched the Dodgers into a 3-2 Series lead Monday in Los Angeles, had seven strikeouts through the six innings and allowed only two hits.

# 150,000 Guardsmen Form Backup Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 150,000 Army National Guardsmen and reservists who will form a first line backup force for the regular Army are in for about twice as much training starting next month. This became evident today from information provided by the Army on the extent of increased training planned for the "select force" whose 976 units were announced Wednesday. The announcement said the Army Reserve will be represented by about twice as many men as originally projected for this highest priority force. But the National Guard will still dominate.

The force, drawn from all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, will include 11,000 Army reservists as well as 15,000 National Guard units and 232 from the Reserve, resulted from a judgment that more combat support type elements were needed to balance the forces and these were available in the Reserve. The heart of the force is three National Guard infantry divisions and six independent infantry brigades.

The over-all force will be 5,000 more than McNamara announced. Army officials denied that the increased Reserve participation was in any sense to mollify critics of the McNamara plan in Congress and elsewhere.

They said the revamped roster, which includes 744 National Guard units and 232 from the Reserve, resulted from a judgment that more combat support type elements were needed to balance the forces and these were available in the Reserve. A special meeting of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, City Commission and Civic Auditorium Association board members was held Wednesday night by three men serving on a newly-formed College of Southern Idaho site committee. William Grange, auditorium board member; Frank Feldman, city commissioner, and Jack Shaw, Chamber of Commerce director, called the meeting after they were appointed by their organizations to serve on the site committee in response to a request by William D. (Bill) Wiseman, a CSI trustee.

Wiseman, elected by the college board of trustees to form the special site committee, has scheduled a meeting of his committee Nov. 8.

A sign on a safe read, "Don't waste your time—only small change inside—the deposit has been taken to the night depository at the bank."

It apparently was disregarded in a futile safecracking attempt at Roper's Clothing Co., 125 Main Ave. W., early Thursday morning.

The would-be burglar climbed to the roof of the building sometime between midnight and 7:40 a.m. Thursday, tore a hole in the roof and ceiling of the store, climbed down to the floor and went to work on a safe in the rear of the business, according to John Roper, store owner.

The attempted burglary was discovered by Merrill J. Call, assistant manager of the business, when he opened the store at 7:40 a.m. Thursday. A crowbar or other pry instrument was used to tear a two-foot diameter hole in the ceiling and the roof.

After entering the store, the thief attempted to open the safe in the rear, but because of the solid construction was unable to do any damage other than jam the combination.

According to Roper, no cash was missing and a check was being made to see if any merchandise had been taken. An occupant of an office upstairs in the building next door was present until midnight and told police he hadn't noticed any unusual activities before he left for the night.

According to Detective Tim Qualls, who is investigating, the possibility of this break-in being connected with other recent burglaries is being checked out.

Roy Slotten, of the Idaho Employment Service, spoke on the Job Corps at the meeting.

Slotten has charge of screening applicants for the corps and applicants are then sent to Washington, D.C., for final decision.

A boy must be in the 16 to 22 age group and must have been out of school for at least three months and with no skill. The boys are first sent to industrial camps where it is decided which labor camps they shall be sent to urban or rural. Rural camps work mostly on education and if they reach the Sixth or Seventh grade, they advance to the urban camps where they are taught skills by which they can earn a living.

Slotten said this program is entirely on a voluntary basis and that 13 boys had been sent from this county so far.

He also said, "The Job Corps is one answer to the problem of poverty and ignorance and disadvantaged youth, which is not just limited to the poor. Disrupted families are often to blame. In my opinion, if we make a self-supporting citizen of one youth in 10, the program is worthwhile."

The November meeting of the group will be held at the home of Mrs. Mary Bolton. Guest speaker will be announced.

# Indians, Game Protectors Have Battle

OLYMPIA (AP) — More than 40 Indians and a dozen state fish and game protectors tangled Wednesday afternoon in a wild rock-throwing, fist-swinging, club-swinging melee on the banks of the Nisqually river east of here.

The affair, second of its kind in less than a week, stemmed from a state court order enjoining the Indians from net-fishing off their reservation.

The Indians maintain an ancient treaty with the United States authorizes them to fish in their usual fishing grounds, even though they are off their reservation, without interference.

Most of the Indians involved in the melee were described by eye witnesses as women and children.

They stoned the fish and game protectors and succeeded in knocking one of them out of his boat into the river. He clung to the side of the boat until he reached shore.

More than half a dozen other fish and game protectors suffered minor cuts and bruises.

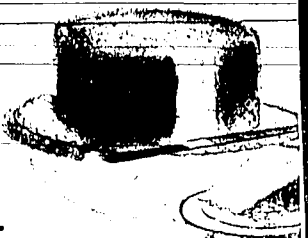

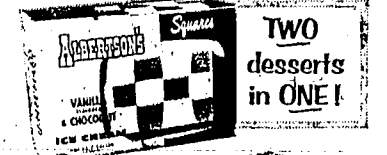

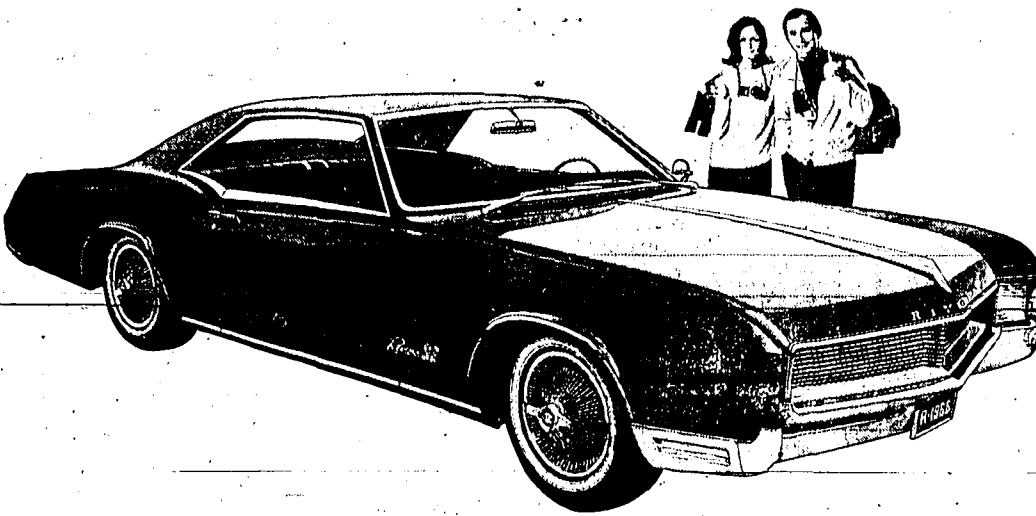

### Boilermakers Resume Talks On Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Talks resumed today between Western contractors and the AFL-CIO International Brotherhood of Boilermakers. More than \$1 billion in construction projects remained closed in six Western states. Union representatives, negotiating for 13 union locals, and the Western Field Construction Negotiating Committee have been meeting since Oct. 5. The strike began Oct. 1.

Major issues are wages, transfer of assignment of key men and conditions under which men may be required to work.

More than 20,000 workers have been idled in California, Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Utah and Idaho.

### Gov. Wallace Takes Issue To People

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Gov. George Wallace, stalled by a State Senate filibuster in his bid to run for reelection next year, is off on a tour of North Carolina today to take the issue to the people.

Wallace, who has indicated that in addition to running for governor he might run for president in 1968 as he did in several states last year — an states-ripley — was rebuffed Wednesday by the State Supreme Court in an effort to choke off the filibuster against succession.

The court, in an administrative ruling on the constitutionality of the Senate's closure rule, held that it is valid. That scathed hopes by the governor's forces — that they might be allowed to invoke closure to halt the filibuster by opponents of the proposed amendment with less than 21 votes required by the Senate rule.

### Team Should Choose Site, Buhl Asserts

BUIH. — A resolution urging trustees of the College of Southern Idaho to employ an outside team to recommend a site for the college was adopted by the Buhl Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday.

The resolution states, "Whereas the Buhl Chamber of Commerce is vitally interested in the growth of an area wide junior college designed to serve the needs of students throughout Magic Valley;

"And whereas the college should be designed to afford the best education for the greatest number of students at the lowest cost to the taxpayers of Magic Valley; and whereas, the determination of site will play a large role in the future growth and support of the junior college.

"And whereas, conflict apparently exists between people living in different geographical areas and in different interest groups, whereas, local interests should be subordinated to the common good.

"Whereas, a proper site selection is essential to the future expansion of the tax base of the college, district, and the expansion of the tax base to include the whole of Magic Valley is necessary to the development of a desirable college, and in turn, to reduce the tax load for the individual taxpayer within said college district.

"And whereas, recognizing the amenities and suspensions that, and the importance of harmony among the entire Magic Valley in what should be a common endeavor — the Buhl Chamber of Commerce feels that the employment of an out-of-state, impartial and qualified selection team composed of educators and trained personnel in this field should be employed, and that this expense now may prove to be the least expensive in terms of money and the support from all the people of Magic Valley for the years ahead.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Buhl Chamber of Commerce requests the trustees of the College of Southern Idaho to employ an impartial, out-of-state survey team composed of educators and trained personnel to recommend a site or sites for such college and that such recommendations be made in order of their preference assigning the reasons in detail therefor, and that this be done at such time as the trustees deem it necessary.

"And appropriate action in an effort to broaden the tax base of the college district by the inclusion of the whole of Magic Valley."

### Wife Fear's Husband's Guillotine

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — A construction crane operator from nearby Norton is accused of threatening to lop off his estranged wife's head with a home-made guillotine.

Jeanette Bolin, 21, of near Medina filed an assault warrant Wednesday against her estranged husband, Leslie H. Bolin, 25. She alleged that threats to her life were made Monday when she and Bolin met at Barberton Citizens Hospital. Their year-old son is a patient there.

She said she accepted Bolin's invitation to dinner and after the meal he forced her at gunpoint to accompany him to an abandoned house in Akron.

Inside the house, she told police, he gagged her with a stocking, tied her hands behind her back, and jabbed pins in her legs. Then, police quoted her as saying, he took her to the basement where a guillotine device, with blade raised and a tub in position to catch the victim's head, was set up.

Mrs. Bolin told police she had to rest her head on a wooden block under the guillotine, but at this point, her captor ended the threat. The two of them disassembled the guillotine, she related, before he drove her back to the hospital where her car was parked.

Police said they found the disassembled guillotine at the house.

They said Bolin would not say where he got it, but did say: "I was going to kill my wife, but I couldn't go through with it. I love her too much."

Municipal Judge Evan Reed ordered that Bolin undergo psychiatric observation.

The event is scheduled Oct. 21-22, in Boise, and the Home and Farm Safety discussion is scheduled for the afternoon of the first day.

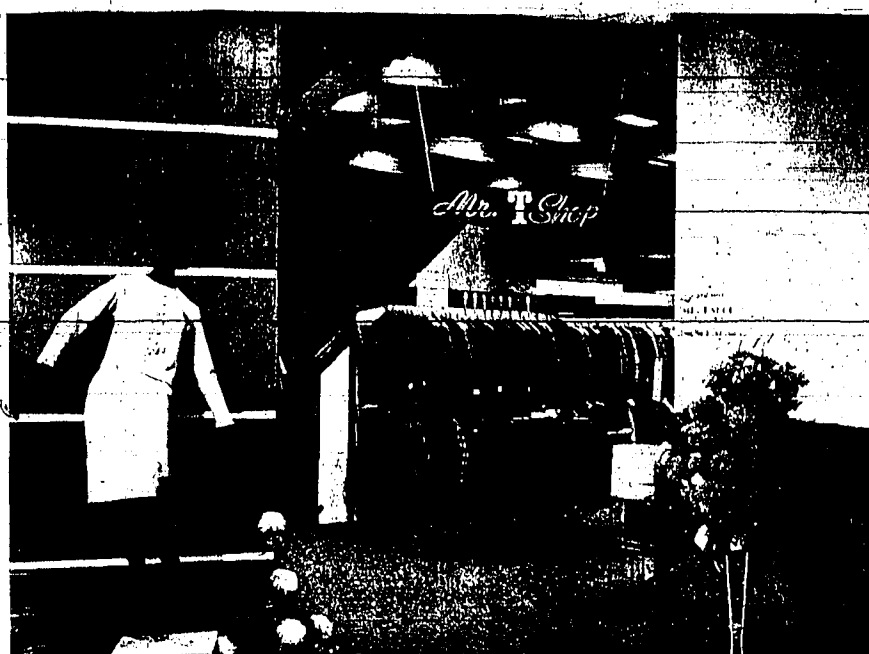

Owners will be compensated, largely from federal funds, for billboards they have to remove.

The outdoor Advertising Association of America, which speaks for more than 600 billboard operators across the country, didn't oppose the legislation.

# KEEP "e" TO SAVE SOFT "g"

## Exception to Rule on Final Silent "e" Noted

If suffixes start a, u, o.

When g precedes, it's g in go.  
To save soft g, keep e you must,  
And say the g like j in just.

This article will deal with the first of two small classes of exceptions to the rule about final silent e before suffixes. Recall that the general rule, which covers about 95 per cent of your spelling situations, went like this:

When suffixes begin with vowels,  
Silent e grabs crying towels.

When suffixes start with u, o,  
Then silent e—make sure it stays.

Suppose we take the word change and add the suffix able. Apply the rule strictly, and you get changeable. That happens to be a misspelling. So why is the rule violated? And why do we have courageous instead of couragous? Why did not the final silent e of change and courage disappear, since both the suffixes able and ous begin with vowels?

The answer is in our verse at the top of the column. The letter g is pronounced hard (like the g in go) when it precedes a suffix that starts with a, u, o. In order to keep the soft g (pronounced like the j in just) of change and courage, you have to retain that final silent e in changeable and courageous. That is the reason behind the exception to the rule.

Remember: Keep that final silent e only before suffixes starting with a, u, o. If you have the word-mange and you add the suffix y, you have mangy. No need to keep that final silent e because your suffix did not begin with a, u, o. Also, this rule has to do with retaining the soft g. If you have a word which has a hard g and you must add a suffix, just follow the regular rule. Rogue becomes rogulish; plague becomes plaguy.

Take this word outrage. The g is soft, pronounced like j in just. Now we have to keep that soft g in words which are built upon outrage. You are told to add ous. What to do? Follow the rule and drop the final e of outrage? If you do, then that g is smack up against a suffix beginning with u, o, and that will be a hard g like the g in go. What to do? "To save soft g, keep e you must."

So you write outrageous. What you do with hard g and soft g applies also to the letter c. Just like the letter g, c also is hard c (like c in can) before suffixes that start with a, u, o.

You are told to add able to notice. Now the c in notice is soft (like the c in perceive), and you want to keep it soft after the able has been added. If we follow the rule ("When suffixes begin with vowels, silent e grabs crying towels"), then we shall have noticeable. But that soft c of notice is now hard because a suffix able follows which begins with a. What to do? "To save soft g (or c), keep e you must."

So you write noticeable. A Quiz

## International Yellow Page Book Printed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—You are an exporter—in Chicago, Paris or Tokyo. You want an up-to-date list in Arabic, Russian or Zambian.

Robert Nelson of Rochester, N.Y., has been thinking of you. He has published, in four languages, a directory which includes the name, address and telephone numbers of businesses in 136 countries.

He calls his 1,500-page book the International Yellow Pages. It is patterned after the Yellow Pages classified listings of U.S. telephone directories.

Nelson told a luncheon gathering here he found the term Yellow Pages was not copyrighted in this country and that American telephone firms actually found his usage of the term helpful to them.

He said he just "felt there

was a need" for an international business directory. So, with the help of business associates, he planned, financed and published the first edition of International Yellow Pages two years ago.

The current edition, the second, lists 539,000 firms in English, French, German and Spanish. Nelson said he had found that most foreign business can be transacted in one of those languages.

The idea is based in the use of the telephone in conducting foreign business, Nelson said. He predicted the number of such calls would grow even faster through use of communications satellites, phonovision and telephonic equipment capable of translating speech into another language during a conversation.

**Warhead Unit Of Missile Is Located**

**WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. (AP)** — The warhead section of a \$750,000 Pershing missile was found Wednesday in a canyon five miles north of Blanding, Utah.

**Groups Plan Demonstrations Against War**

Campus organizers and peace groups laid plans today for a nationwide series of demonstrations this weekend to protest U.S. involvement in the war in Vietnam.

Protest leaders said they hoped to enlist thousands of persons — including college students and union members — for teach-ins, "speak-outs," and marches scheduled mainly for Friday and Saturday.

In Madison Wis., demonstrators will attempt a citizens arrest of the commander of Trux Air Force Base. A 35-hour teacher strike is scheduled in the University of California. An estimated 15,000 persons will march on New York's Fifth Avenue.

At last count, demonstrations were expected in 28 cities in 28 states, and the list was growing. Leaders said demonstrations also were planned in 13 foreign countries. Earlier this week, 40,000 labor unionists and students marched in Tokyo to the Japan Diet to protest American involvement, and more than 100,000 persons staged similar demonstrations elsewhere in Japan.

The steering committee of the National Coordinating Committee for the End of the War in Vietnam Lt. Col. Lester Arasimich, head of the demonstrators' charges of "necessary to murder" during a meeting in Amster-

dam, Mich., last month. The American South, Viet Nam — there have been too many killings," the Coordinating Committee said in its publication, "We must say something about this and do something about it."

The National Coordinating Committee has a national headquarters in Madison, Wis. Plans were made to attempt to enter the Trux Air Force Base at noon Saturday and try to make a citizens' arrest of the commanding officer.

At Northern Illinois University at De Kalb, Ill., an unrecognized organization called Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) planned to have a vigil at a World War II memorial tank in De Kalb.

Thomas Getts, Northern student and a member of the SDS Coordinating Committee, said

two men came to his residence, identified themselves as members of the American Legion, and said "there could be some talk about" the demonstrators halted at the tank. The Detroit committee to end the war in Viet Nam said demonstrators would picket an Army induction center for two hours Saturday and a teach-in would be held Friday at a Wayne State University auditorium.

In Chicago, a morning program was scheduled at the University of Chicago, a rally at Buckingham Fountain, and a march through the Loop. A program also was scheduled for the

# Red China Is Masterminding Campaign Against Thailand

London (UPI) — Communist China is reported to be masterminding a new campaign against Thailand in an apparent attempt to open another front in southeast Asia.

Diplomats say Peking's campaign against Thailand is aimed at provoking a revolt there against the present government.

The move is part of China's flexible strategy in Southeast Asia, the growing American build-up in the region and the Viet Nam and the Viet Nam situation.

Failure to score a major victory during the recent monsoon season were understood to be causing anxiety both in Hanoi and Peking about the Communist prospects in that part of the world.

China is therefore looking for possible alternatives with stepped-up subversion in Thailand and the immediate target is Peking's toughest ally.

Peking's toughening policy is also partly prompted by recent severe setbacks on other international fronts which threaten China once again with diplomatic isolation.

Peking was understood to be increasing assistance to the clandestine Thai Communist Party's campaign to win power in Thailand. The party is largely Peking oriented.

The reports said there are growing indications that Peking is trying to build up a puppet regime as a "front" for the Communist Party which it hopes could help to undermine and overthrow the present pro-Western regime.

Peking's designs have been spotlighted by a meeting a few days ago between Mao Tse-tung and Pridi Phanomjorn, a former Premier who has been living in exile in China for many years, the reports said.

There was speculation the move signalled Peking's intention to use him as a possible front man for a new major "liberation" campaign.

Peking has set up "liberation movements" in Thailand as part of its campaign of subversion. They are the "Independence Movement" and the "Patriotic Front."

Liason with the Thai Communist and liberation movements is maintained by Wu Hsiu Chuan who is the contact man between China's Communist Party and foreign parties.

Just how far and how fast Peking intends to go at present in its campaign of subversion of Thailand remains an open question. Peking apparently is "dipping" presently, but some diplomats believed it is set for an all-out onslaught.

## Smylie Stuns Observers With Answer

BOISE (UPI) — When Gov. Robert E. Smylie answered a Democrat's question about his plans for 1968 he took a number of observers by surprise.

Smylie's answer to a news conference marked the first time — at least in recent years — that he has replied in detail to a question raised by a politician on the other side of the fence.

Flatly, without equivocation, the three-term Republican governor said he would not be a candidate for president or vice president in 1968. Such talk, he said, was "flattering" but he said he was not seeking national office that year.

State Sen. Cecil Andrus of Orofino raised the question in an address to the annual meeting of the Idaho Press Club in Boise. He said he felt Smylie's 1968 plans might have a bearing on the outcome of the 1968 race for governor.

In replying to Andrus, the chief executive went further than just rule himself out of the 1968 presidential race. He also answered in advance an anticipated question that could crop up during the campaign next year — the reason for his many travels out of state.

He said he would continue "to make every effort to forge a national image for Idaho that's vibrant, that's ongoing, that's energetic."

By answering Andrus as he did, Smylie appeared to many observers like a candidate for re-election and — in that respect — strengthened the belief he will run for governor again next year.

His answer also indicated to some that he intends in the forthcoming campaign to take an aggressive stand toward his administration and his many activities in connection with it and the GOP in recent years.

Democrats already have indicated that they want Smylie, himself, to be the issue of the campaign ahead. And, they have

The powerful perfume, more than noticeable in the water, brought about an awareness on

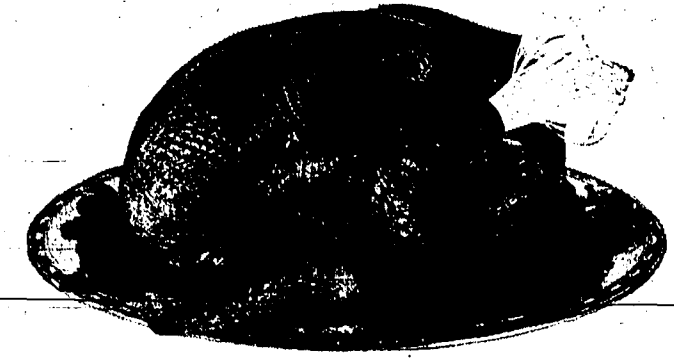

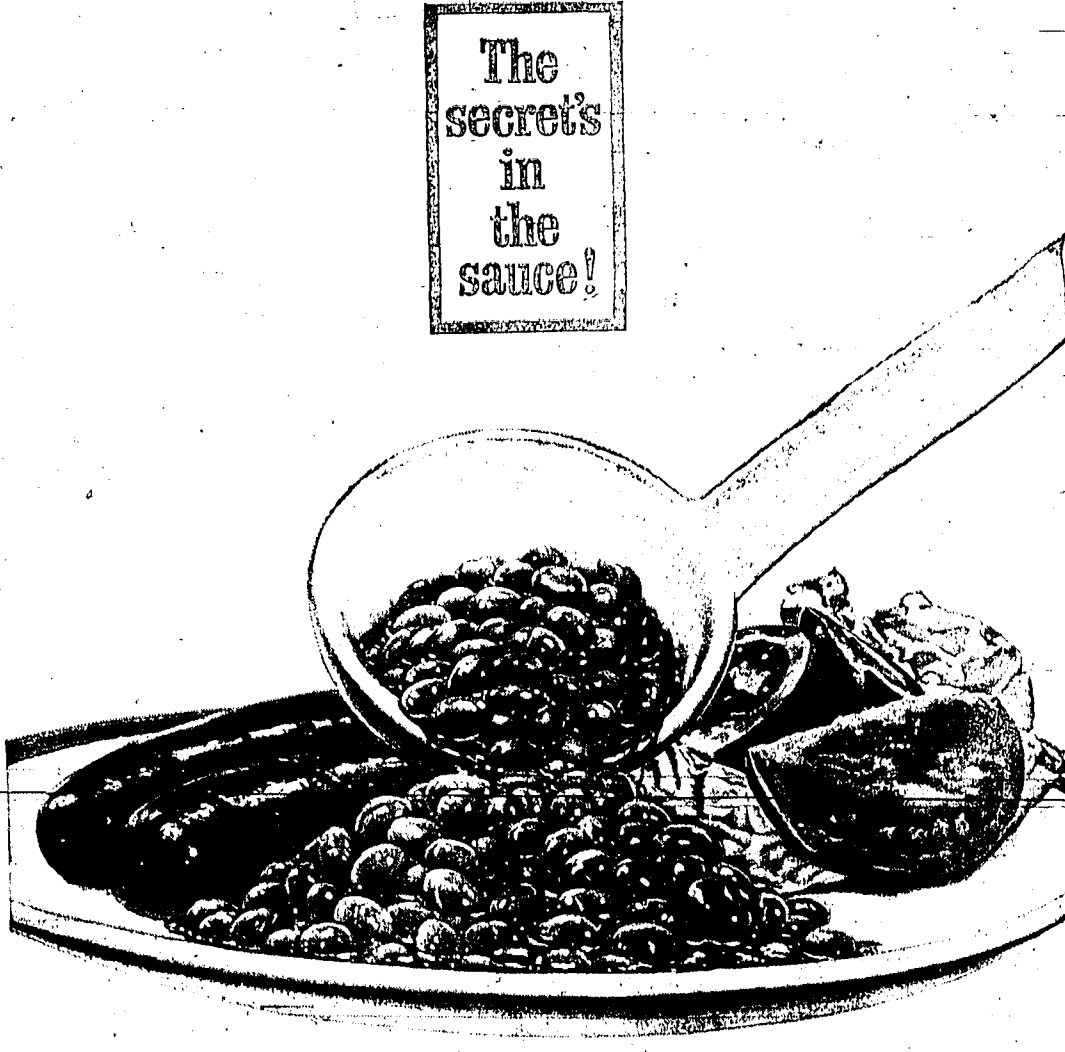


