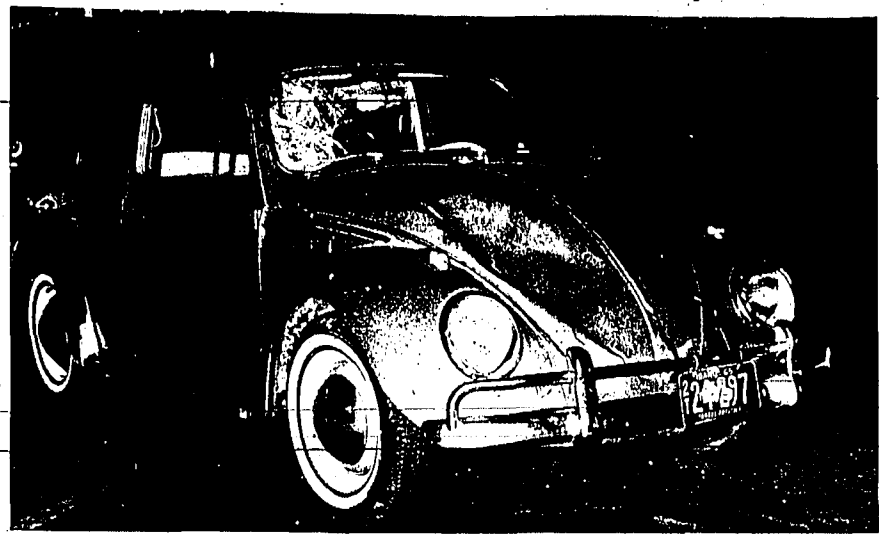


## Plane Is Downed By Reds

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The loss of another U.S. bomber over North Viet Nam was reported today, and its two crewmen were presumed captured. The plane, an F-4C Phantom, was shot down Monday over a bridge 40 miles west of Vinh, a U.S. military spokesman said. It was the sixth American plane reported lost in North Viet Nam in three days and the 15th since the United States began bombing North Viet Nam last February. Radio Hanoi claimed North Vietnamese planes brought down five U.S. planes Monday and 11 other planes from the carrier Midway smashed 13 railroad cars and pounded bridges on other strikes in North Viet Nam, the spokesman said. Two planes from the carrier Independence attacked a Marine railway installation about 80 miles north of the frontier between North and South Viet Nam. Pilots said they damaged three buildings and sank a barge. U.S. B-52 bombers from Guam blasted a Viet Cong target in the Ho Bo woods 30 miles northwest of Saigon. The Vietnamese army said its troops killed 53 Viet Cong, wounded 13 and captured 23 in operations in the northern coastal provinces. Troops of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division rounded up 115 suspects during an operation 25 miles north of Saigon. A spokesman said five of the suspects were identified as Viet Cong and one was killed when he tried to escape. The Viet Cong inflicted "heavy" casualties in an ambush of a small government squad in a northern coastal province. But government troops reported they killed 11 guerrillas in a raid in the Me Long Delta 65 miles southwest of Saigon.

## Survey for Urban Renewal Project Given Green Light

The Twin Falls City Commission Monday night adopted a resolution approving a proposed study, planning and survey of an area of downtown Twin Falls for an urban renewal project. The area was selected by the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Commission for the city's first such renewal project. Voy Hudson, chairman of the Urban Renewal Commission, stated Tuesday the city would not know for approximately six months whether the study will show it was feasible to go ahead with the project. According to Hudson, the urban renewal program is "the only chance for rejuvenating the town. This project, if approved, will do away with much of the decay found not only in the downtown area, but in some of the residential areas," he said.

## Youth, 14, Dies in T.F. Traffic Mishap

Carl Lee Nelson, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loren Nelson, 483 Fillmore St., died Monday night after being taken to Magic Valley Memorial Hospital with injuries received in a car-pedestrian accident about 8:15 p.m. near the intersection of Filer Avenue and Fillmore Street. Nelson and a companion, Steve Finley, also 14, were returning from the Save-On Shopping Center when the accident occurred. Driver of the 1962 Volkswagen, Marvin J. Durrant, 41, 1105 Blue Lakes Blvd. N., told officers he did not see the boy until the moment of impact and was not sure of what he had struck until he stopped and went back to investigate. The two boys were walking south across Filer Avenue. The Finley boy said he turned back to see where Nelson was and saw the accident occur. Durrant was driving east on Filer Avenue.

## Priest Leads Negroes in Class Boycott

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)—Sign-carrying Negro school children, led by a Roman Catholic priest, marched to "freedom" classes today as the civil rights boycott of Milwaukee public schools went into its second day. Leaders said the boycott would continue for at least two more days. About 200 children assembled at St. Boniface Catholic Church this morning, as did a much larger group Monday, and marched to the substitute boycott by the assistant pastor, the Rev. James Groppi, a vice chairman of the boycott committee. St. Boniface was to have been one of the "freedom" schools but an order of Auxiliary Bishop Altheim banned use of Catholic Church facilities for the boycott. Although no figures were available on today's absenteeism, Monday's demonstration saw fewer pupils participating than did in a similar protest last year.

## Wilson Makes New Appeal To Rhodesia

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP)—British Prime Minister Harold Wilson made a new appeal to Rhodesia's white government Monday night not to declare independence, he told newsmen: "As soon as I feel disposed to make the announcement, I will make it... you people can put two and two together and get the four." The purpose of a declaration of independence would be to preserve minority white rule in the British colony where Negroes outnumber whites 16 to 1. British demands that the Rhodesian whites agree to constitutional amendments providing for majority rule eventually. Wilson made his new appeal after Smith rejected the British prime minister's proposal that a Commonwealth mission mediate the conflict.

## Prices Drop On Gasoline During 'War'

Gasoline prices in Twin Falls, ranged from a low of 27.9 cents per gallon at the Monaco Station, 169 Addison Ave. W. to a high of 30.9 cents per gallon at regular at most major oil company stations Tuesday morning. The gas war, which has been in progress since Labor Day, at first involved only the Falls Cooperative Supply Co. and a few major oil companies. The dispute was settled in a conference at Salt Lake City and prices were raised back to normal, but meanwhile, most independent dealers in Twin Falls had lowered their prices to meet the increased competition. Most of the larger oil companies, including those that were being undercut, lowered their prices about a week ago. According to several local independent dealers, they set their prices by those advertised by other dealers and are waiting for someone to raise prices back to normal before they make a move. Once they bring their prices back to normal, all other stations will probably go back to normal also, they declared. According to Charles McFarland, attendant at West Five Points Mobil Station, the service station operators will just have to ride the situation out until they are able to raise their prices back to previous levels. But he is about the only other city in the Magic Valley that is also having a gas war at this time.

## College Site Plans Are Aired at Burley

BURLEY—Controversy and conflicting opinions over plans for the College of Southern Idaho site were aired at the Burley Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday noon in the National Hotel. Burley chamber directors voted Friday to invite Thomas Mahan, Jerome, and John Hepworth, Burley, to speak after two Burley men, Ed Elliott and Robert Saxcil, attended a meeting last week in Jerome. Fred Brailsford, Gooding, also was a special guest at the Monday meeting here. William (Bill) Wiseman, Burley chamber member and college board trustee, pointed out that a Seattle firm wanted \$2,500 to make a study and propose a site and there is no money budgeted for this purpose. The proposal to hire the firm died for lack of a motion at the last trustee meeting, he declared. He said letters have been mailed to interested civic groups asking them to present suggestions for a site at the Nov. 8 board meeting. He emphasized members of a group as I have had the pleasure of working with. Wiseman denied the board has taken any action approving or rejecting any committee to select a site. He criticized the "barbershop gossip" being spread throughout the area and particularly rapped editorialists appearing in Jerome and Burley newspapers attacking the board. The college board has not held any secret meetings, he asserted. Mahan outlined the background of the college, noting Twin Falls county voters approved the formation of a junior college district in November, 1964. The last session of the legislature approved a bill providing for college districts and the Magic Valley district would include eight counties and parts of two others. ## Man Killed In Dominican Shooting

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—A man was killed early today in another flurry of shooting between Dominican troops and rebel partisans in the heart of Santo Domingo. The firing quickly subsided, but bands of angry civilian youths, most of them unarmed, raged the downtown area. President Hector Garcia Godoy canceled an order sending additional troops into the city in a weapons recovery operation. He also ordered a curfew in the number of tanks that swept into the rebel sector Monday night to occupy Ozama fortress and protect troops guarding the tense area. The fortress, renamed Constitution Plaza by the rebels, overlooks the river and harbor facilities. Five of the 10 tanks in the fortress were removed but a full battalion, about 400 battle-ready troops, remained. Maj. Humberto Trifillo, the battalion commander, told newsmen his orders were to not shoot unless fired upon.

## Warsaw Nations Deploy Tactical Atomic Weapons

BERLIN (AP)—Sources in West Berlin report that Warsaw Pact nations will practice the deployment of tactical atomic weapons in maneuvers to be held in Communist East Germany near the West German frontier. Travelers on the autobahn between West Berlin and Frankfurt in West Germany said they observed large troop units assembling on both sides of the superhighway in Thuringia, East Germany's most southwestern state.

## 16 Cubans Arrive in Small Boats

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)—Sixteen refugees from Cuban communism arrived here today as an assortment of small boats waited to leave Cuban ports for Florida. The refugees—nine adults and seven children—arrived aboard a 25-foot inboard motor boat. Heavy two-way small boat traffic between Cuba and Florida has resulted in more than 600 new Cuban refugees reaching American soil. But the growing flotilla is becoming top heavy at the Cuban end, according to officials returning earlier. "I counted a waiting line of 170 boats at Camarioca," said Pedro Cifuentes, an exile from Miami who arrived from the Cuban exit point Monday with 16 refugees. This was one of 10 boats bringing 60 refugees to Florida during the day. The Coast Guard cutter Dillenger brought in 17 refugees. A mother and her son knelt and kissed the dusty dock when they reached U.S. soil.

BOISE (UPI)—A November draft call more than four times that of last year was issued for Idaho Tuesday, and Selective Service officials said they have started to call up childless married men for physical examinations. Maj. Gen. John E. Walsh, Idaho Selective Service director said the November call would be the first since 1964. Mrs. Mary VanHook, clerk of the Twin Falls County Selective Service Board, announced Tuesday that the draft quotas filled for October were for six men, and may go as high as 24 in November. According to Mrs. VanHook, November quota will be released this week. At present, only single men are being drafted from Twin Falls County, but childless married men may be called if enlistments do not increase a substantial amount, she said.

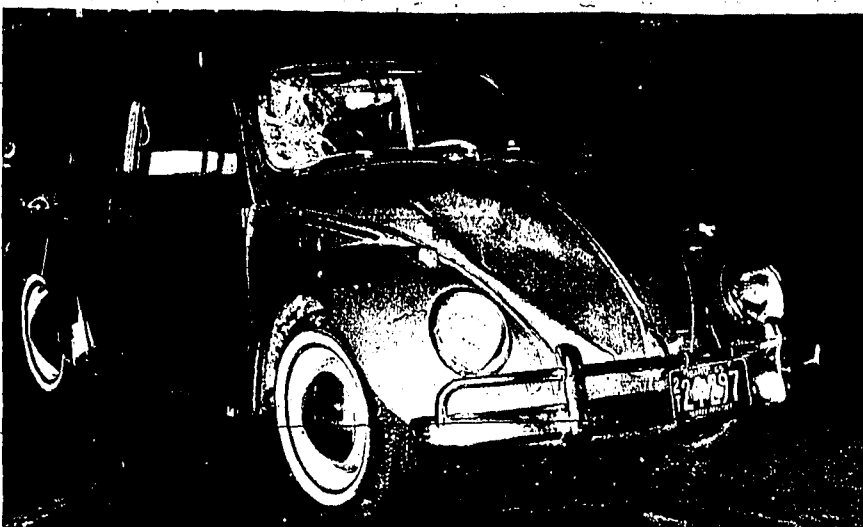

# FBI Confirms Testimony of Morrissey

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI says Francis X. Morrissey was truthful in Senate testimony on his nomination to be a U.S. district judge in Massachusetts.

The FBI's findings on its investigation into Morrissey's testimony were made public Monday night on the eve of scheduled Senate debate on the controversial nomination.

The nomination was to reach the Senate floor despite the urging of two Republicans that it be sent back to the Judiciary Committee for further consideration.

Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach said Monday night that the FBI check had led him to conclude "that there is no basis whatsoever to question either Judge Morrissey's credibility or his recollection of the events surrounding his studies in Georgia."

Morrissey, 55, and a long-time friend of the Kennedy family, now is a Boston municipal judge.

His testimony concerning a law diploma won in Georgia had been disputed by the American Bar Association and questioned by some members of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The committee ultimately recommended confirmation on a 64 count, with 0 members not voting.

The requests for a delay in Senate debate on the nomination came from Republican Sens. Jacob K. Javits of New York and Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts. They urged that the nomination be sent back to committee.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois planned to report on the case at a meeting today of all GOP senators. He wouldn't predict whether his party might take a united stand against Morrissey.

## Crews Will Remove Rock Along Route

SALMON — Crews of Rocky Mountain Construction Co. are expected Wednesday to begin removing a rock point along the Salmon River Road which threatens to break loose.

Arthur Bevan, forest engineer, said the company, which holds the contract on the road widening project, will attempt to bring the rock down in sections starting at the top.

Up to 15,000 yards of rock threaten to topple into the roadway. Crews spent the weekend drilling getting ready for Wednesday's blasting.

Traffic is still being permitted down the Salmon River Road at intervals during the morning, noon hour and afternoon. Bevan said travel is heavy with hunters and fishermen going downriver. Motorists had been urged earlier to use the Williams Creek Road from Salmon to the mouth of Panther Creek on their way to the Middle Fork and Corn Creek.

Bids were opened Monday on a 1.5 mile section of the road from Shoup to Pine Creek but announcement of low bidder is not expected until later. Bevan also reported that funds now have been authorized for a 2.5 miles section of the road from the end of the present construction to Panther Creek. Rocky Mountain Construction Co. is now 80 per cent finished on 4.5 miles of road below the Pine Creek bridge.

With completion of the next two projects, the Salmon River Road will be a two-lane dirt surfaced road from North Fork to Panther Creek, a distance of 26.5 miles.

Bevan said that the Forest Service hopes to oil the entire section as soon as funds are appropriated. He said heavy traffic makes it impossible to keep the road in condition through grading.

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### Boilermakers Strike Idles Work Project

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — No political breakdown in a West Idaho states boilermakers bargaining session has led to a second construction project at the National Reactor Testing Station. It is the SSG naval reactor project. Boilermakers placed pickets at the SSG projects Monday morning, and all 350 craftsmen left their jobs there. The SSG project had previously been held for a few days by an electricians dispute in over placement of workers awaiting security clearance, but the project had been resumed as talks continued. The Fluor Corp. is building the \$20 million advanced test reactor while the Electric Boat Co. is building the SSG project.

### Spain Gets New Freedom Of Press Law

MADRID, Spain (AP)—Spain has projected a press law that gives the Spanish people freedom of expression unknown previously under the Franco regime, the republic or the Spanish monarchy. The text has been sent to the Cortes — parliament — and formal passage might take place in a few weeks. The law abolishes formal censorship. Instead, directors of newspapers will bear the responsibility for what they publish, answering to the Ministry of Information or the national government. But the law also gives them the right to appeal against any decision to the ordinary Spanish courts. The new law gives a newspaper publisher the right to publish what he wishes, the only limitations being those specified by Spanish law. General limitations according to the text of law, are: Respect for morals and truth, the present constitutional order, maintenance of the domestic order, independence of the courts in applying the law, and safeguard of private honor and privacy. Once passed by the Cortes the law removes large areas of governmental direction from the nation's newspapers, magazines and books. The law establishes legal responsibility for newspapers and provides private citizens with the right to sue editors for libel or slander — a new factor in Spain. Newspaper directors will be responsible for infractions of law by their periodicals. In cases of grave infractions, the punishment is between one and three months' suspension of the paper, or up to a year's suspension and fine of between \$333 and \$1,666. Another provision of the law says that foreign news agencies operate in Spain through a Spanish news agency. Spain has 104 daily newspapers and more than 6,000 magazines and periodicals whose publication will be controlled in the future by the new law.

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# MASTER TWO MORE PLURALS More Rules on Forming Plural Nouns Explained

For nouns ending in *quy* (*kwec*), where the *u* is like *w*. If you change *y* to *i*, add *es*. It won't trouble you.

There are not many words in English whose singular form ends in *quy* (pronounced *kwec*), and all of them form their plurals the same way.

For nouns ending in *quy* (*kwec*), where the *u* is like *w*. Four such words are *obsequy*, *colloquy*, *colloquy* and *obloquy*. The final *quy* is pronounced *kwec*, so that the *u* is like *w*. How do we form the plural of such nouns? The rhyme goes on:

If you change the *y* to *i*, add *es*. It won't trouble you.

Good. Applying the rule contained in the verse, we now have these plurals, *obsequies*, *colloquies*, *colloquies* and *obloquies*. Here's all there is to that rule.

Up to this point we have given you several rhymes which cover both the main spelling rules (for areas of most frequent difficulty) and the principal exceptions. But whether to add simply *s* or *es* to nouns whose singular ends in *a*—here the *u* is like *w*—the advice would be to consult the dictionary when you are not certain. It so happens that there are no very many exceptions to any rule we could give here that the rule is almost worthless. Suppose we take a quick look.

The plural of *potato* is *potatoes*; the plural of *Negro* is *Negroes*; here *us* has heroes for plural, and *mosquito* has *mosquitoes*. Notice that all these plurals end in *es*; notice also that the final *o* of the singular is preceded by a consonant. The only rule, actually, for forming the plural of nouns which end in *a* is this: if the *a* of the singular is preceded by a consonant, add *es* to the plural.

You no sooner have this rule in your head than a good speller comes along and tells you that the rule does not work for *zero*, *tabacco*, *pinno* and a few dozen others. Which is why we suggest that the wisest course is to consult your dictionary when in doubt about forming the plural of words ending in *a*.

In our next article we shall take up such matters as whether to write *man-of-war* or *man-of-war*, *mother superior* or *mothers superior*, and why. We also shall look into words that have been brought over—singular and plural—into English from other languages, mainly Latin and Greek.

## Ikeya-Seki Comet Visible On Horizon Early in Day

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — It doesn't explode in the solar encounter, again before sunrise Thursday, say astronomers at the California Institute of Technology.

Striking in from the edges of the solar system, it will make a hairpin loop around the sun during a five-hour period beginning at 10 p.m. Wednesday. Then, if it survives, it will head back toward the outer reaches of the solar system.

Astronomers at Caltech believe it will come within 800,000 miles of the sun during that swing-around; passing through the hot solar atmosphere. They say the sun's corona may be disturbed for a few minutes, but there will be no effect on earth.

There is a chance the comet's tail, rising halfway across the sky, can be seen Wednesday evening after the sun and the comet's head have slipped below the horizon.

A faint smudge of light when first seen, Ikeya-Seki gets brighter as it draws nearer the sun. At the time of closest approach it is expected to appear about a fifth size of the moon and be almost as bright.

Among the interested viewers of the comet's departure will be astronauts Walter M. Schirra and Thomas P. Stafford — if their Gemini 6 space ship gets under way as planned, and the comet survives.

They are to try to photograph the comet next Monday from orbit, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said. They should be able to see Ikeya-Seki every orbit, every 90 minutes, on their two-day flight.

Two Japanese astronomers first detected it Sept. 18, when the comet was far out in the solar system and just beginning to light up from the sun's rays. Since then, several astronomers have seen it as it rose above the horizon an hour or so before sunrise.

Now it is so near the sun that it rises only a few minutes before the sun pops up and dims its light. It is racing toward the sun at what will be nearly a million miles per hour by Wednesday night.

The comet and its 10-million-mile tail will be visible just before sunrise Wednesday and, if

it doesn't explode in the solar encounter, again before sunrise Thursday, say astronomers at the California Institute of Technology.

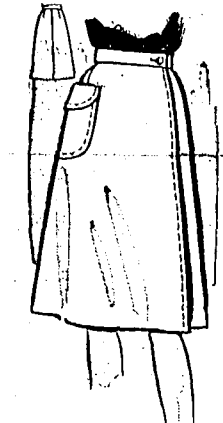

**Apricot Wheat Bread**  
1 1/2 cups dried apricots, finely cut  
1 8-ounce can crushed pineapple  
1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
2 cups sifted flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
5 shredded wheat biscuits, crumbled  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 cup milk

In a sauce pan, simmer apricots, pineapple and one-fourth cup brown sugar for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Add butter or margarine and stir to melt. Cool to room temperature. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add remaining brown sugar, shredded wheat biscuits crumbs and nuts.

Mix well. Stir in eggs, milk and apricot mixture. Blend thoroughly. Turn into a greased 9 by 5-inch loaf pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven, 350 degrees, for one to one and one-half hours. Turn out on rack to cool. Makes one 9-inch loaf.

In beating the na-Giants, cast the top team in a thriller at Fayetteville for their 21th triumph in a row.

"The credit belongs to so many people, all over the state, too numerous to mention," Broyles said. "This belongs to the people who have worked so hard to build up Arkansas."

He praised his team for its 27-24 come-back victory over Texas, last week's top-rated team, but he said part of the credit belonged to the Longhorns, too.

## Royal Tries To Forget 27-24 Loss

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—Texas Coach Darrell Royal said Monday he's having to force himself to quit thinking about Saturday's 27-24 loss to Arkansas and to look ahead to this week's game with Rice, "a team which puts out a superhuman effort against us."

Royal said this year's defeat by the Razorbacks "who climbed into the No. 1 spot among college football teams — hurt worse than last year, when Arkansas spoiled Texas' perfect season with a 14-13 victory."

Both times, Texas lost the top rating after losing to Arkansas, which at that time had won 17 consecutive games. Texas is now No. 5.

# Baseball Owners Meet to Choose Commissioner

CHICAGO (UPI)—Baseball's 20 major league owners convene Tuesday to try to pick the game's fourth commissioner, and it was a toss up whether they'd be successful in this meeting. The owners were instructed by the chairman of the screening committee, John Fetzler of the Detroit Tigers and John Galbreath of the Pittsburgh Pirates, to be prepared to sit for three days if necessary.

The man to be chosen to succeed Ford Frick, holding office now only until his successor is named, must be approved by seven of the 10 owners in each league.

It was unlikely any candidate would have that much support in either league at the beginning of the session.

Some dozen or more men still were named as candidates, but none has openly campaigned for the job. Lee MacPhail of the Baltimore Orioles was regarded as one of the major candidates, but American League President Joe Cronin and Paul Richards of the Houston Astros also were rated in the running.

Arthur C. Allyn of the Chicago White Sox was openly skeptical that the meeting would end successfully, or last for its scheduled two days.

"What they think is in Detroit," he said, "and the meeting lasted about four hours and broke up. I hope we get it over with, even if we have to stay there five days or longer."

"We've got to get a commissioner so we can go along with running baseball."

Allyn said he favored a "non-baseball" man, and no specific candidate for the job.

"I think anybody from baseball automatically would be accused of prejudice," he said, "and while I don't think it would be true, it would happen."

Frick has been accused of prejudice, and I think unjustly," he added, "but it's bound to happen if the man has any baseball connection, with a team or league. I'll admit that some decisions look like they've been prejudiced, but I don't believe they have."

Allyn said the owners still had to determine what length of contract would be offered to the new commissioner and how much the salary would be.

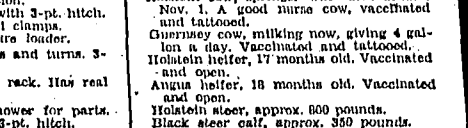
"I think these are things subject to negotiation," he said.

## Milwaukee to Buy Braves if Sale Ordered

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—County Board Chairman Eugene Grobschmidt testified Monday that the county has the resources to buy the Milwaukee Braves and could do so, should a court order the sale.

Grobschmidt, testifying for a deposition taken by Braves' attorneys, estimated it would take between \$5 and \$10 million to purchase the National League baseball club.

The deposition was taken to aid the Braves in the defense of the county's federal antitrust suit against the team. The suit was filed in an effort to force the club's proposed move to Atlanta, beginning with the 1968 season.

As a form of relief, the suit asks that the club be ordered to stay in Milwaukee and be sold to local interests.
