Rome Enters Discovery of America Race

ROME (AP)—Another race of sea-farers has been slipped in as a dark horse entry in the who-discovered-America sweepstakes.

Rome University professor says he has found indications that the venturesome Etruscans probably "got there" a half-century before either Christopher Columbus or Leif Erickson was born.

Dr. Maria Gattoli-Celli—a student of the still-untranslated Etruscan language, said Saturday he had sent a report on his research to the Institute of Etruscan Studies at Florence.

"We cannot be excluded," he said, "that there was an Etruscan migration to South America because of shared names, recognizable patterns, and other things were not much inferior to those in which Columbus sailed."

Dr. Gattoli-Celli bases his conclusions on what he says are similarities in language and religious symbols between the Etruscans of the Italian peninsula and primitive tribes in the Guianas of northern South America.

The Etruscans appeared in Italy out of nowhere long before Rome was founded. There have been theories that they were seafaring people from the Near East, perhaps linked with the Phoenicians.

Their red-sailed ships plied the Mediterranean in trade routes to eight centuries B.C. Their statues had an Egyptian look. Their bronze work was the finest in the ancient Mediterranean world. They taught the Romans how to build the arch. Then they disappeared, swallowed up in expanding Rome.
