

First Phase of Planned Water Project Outlined

Frazier outlined the construction plans for the water mains, pumps or water mains on Falls Avenue, Harrison Street, Blue Lakes Boulevard, East 2nd Street, Lake Drive, Filer Avenue, Addison Avenue, Elsie Boulevard, Morningstar Drive, Mindako Avenue and Highland Avenue South. These streets are to be included in the initial phase of the waterworks construction.

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Wounded GI Wants to Go Back to War

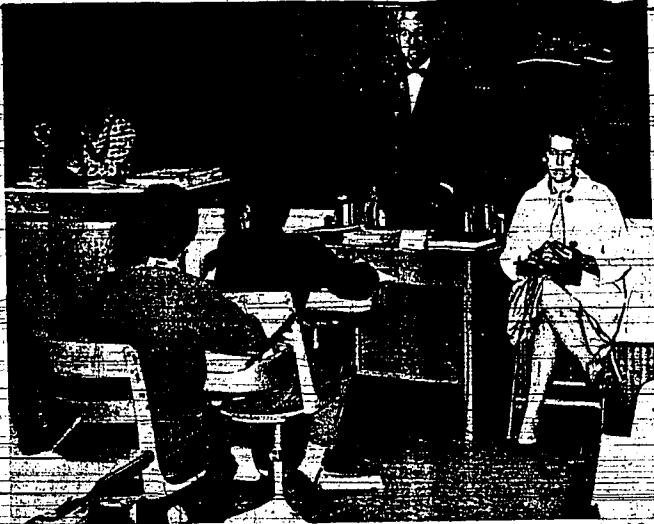
GORDON (AP)
Sp. Claude Spiva wants to go back to Viet Nam as soon as he is well enough to do so. "I don't want to go back," said Mrs. J. D. McMillan of Decatur, Ga., "but I feel that once should be enough."
She said her son had planned to leave the Army when his enlistment ended in 14 months. Spiva would have six years in the Army at the end of his enlistment.
"I felt I was really doing something," Spiva said from his hospital bed. "I feel I can do a better job for the Army in Viet Nam than here in the United States."
The sergeant was wounded Oct. 8 when guerrilla forces ambushed a list of military forces truck convoy. He was riding in a truck which was stung when several grenades landed on it. "The grenades killed two of my men, and in the course of the 20-minute ambush the company executive officer and a machine gunner were also killed," he said.
Spiva suffered a bullet wound in his arm and received grenade shrapnel in his right leg.
He said U.S. troops must stay in Viet Nam until the war is over. "I don't want to see the South take over the Southeast Asian. Most of the troops are peopling are the ones that are peopling during basic and advanced training."
"They will give anybody," he said.
Spiva referring to demonstrators who are protesting involvement in Viet Nam, said, "The troops in Viet Nam don't think too highly about this. I think that everyone should do a hitch in the service."

Plan Aimed At Outlawing Contracts

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Right-to-Work Committee is planning a nationwide campaign aimed at outlawing union shop contracts.
Moving from the suburbs to a major offense for the first time, the Right-to-Work Committee hopes to add at least a dozen states to the 10 that now forbid the union shop.
The committee is making financial, public relations and psychological on labor's failure to win repeal of Section 142 of the Taft-Hartley Law.
"That is the section of federal labor law that permits the states to outlaw union shop contracts under which all employees must join the union."
Viewed as a sure thing for repeal earlier this year, the repeal bill was blocked by a filibuster led by Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen.

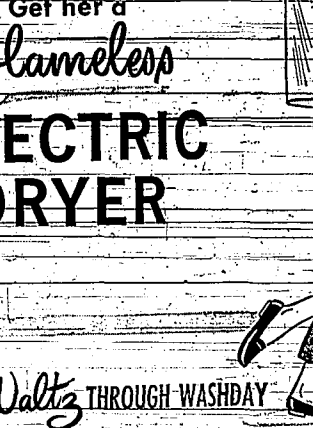

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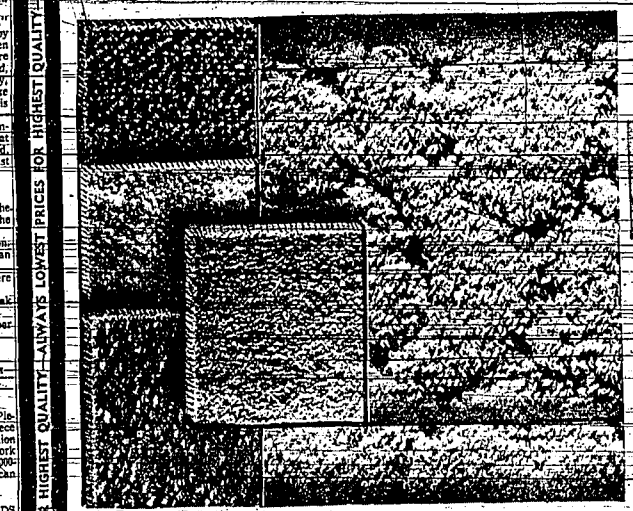
