First Phase of Planned Water Project Outlined

First phase of the city's new waterworks improvement project was discussed and plans and specifications given Monday night by Rodney Preator, of Morrison, Meierle and Associates, during a meeting of the Twin Falls City Commission. The water distribution system is the first phase of the \$2.5-million water-project which was approved by Twin Falls citizens in a water bond election last fall. Preator outlined to the commission plans for construction of main loops or water mains on Falls Avenue, Harrison Street, Blue Lakes Boulevard, East and West Avenue, Main Street Drive, Filer Avenue, Addison Avenue, and Blue Lakes Boulevard. These streets are being considered for the initial phase of the waterworks construction.

92 Guerrillas Are Reported Killed in Central Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. combat troops reported 92 Communist guerrillas killed and 26 captured in fighting in central Viet Nam today and Monday.

Men of the 1st Air Cavalry Division, who arrived in the area only seven weeks ago, fought three engagements against an enemy force of between 500 and 600 men near the Special Forces camp at Plei Me, 210 miles north of Saigon.

The airborne cavalry reported they reported they captured 26 Communists.

U.S. spokesman said both North Vietnamese regulars and part-time fighters were killed.

Wounded GI Wants to Go Back to War

GORDON, Ga. (AP) — Sgt. Claude W. Sprague, wounded in an ambush by the Viet Cong, wants to go back to Vietnam as soon as he is able.

"I don't 'daren't' agree him to go back," said Mrs. J. D. McMillan of Decatur, Ga. "Of course, it's up to him to decide if it's worth it, once he should be discharged."

She said her son had planned to leave the Army when his enlistment ended in November, but Sprague would have six years in the Army. "I don't know if he'll want him to go back," she said. "I can't see a job for him in the Viet Nam than here in the United States."

The sergeant was wounded Oct. 8 when guerrilla forces ambushed a U.S. supply column, buried a U.S. soldier.


